Bahadur Deuba and for-mer premier Prachanda today filed their nominations for the second phase of the parliamentary and provincial polls scheduled to be held in 45 districts on December 7. Deuba, also the pres-

ident of the ruling Nepali Congress, filed his nomination for a parliamen-tary seat from his home district Dadeldhura in far west Nepal. He would be contesting the election for the sixth time from

the same constituency.
CPN-UML chief, I Oli filed his nomination from Jhapa district con-stituency No 5, situated in eastern Nepal.

Prachanda, CPN-Mao ist Centre chief, filed his candidacy from Chitawan district constituency No 3 situated in central Nepal while former Prime Minister and CPN-UML senior leader Madhav Kumar Nepal fielded his papers from Kathmandu constituency No 2.

Apart from the prom inent leaders, other can-didates also filed their nominations, between 10

am and 5 pm.
"The candidates registered their candidacy at the offices of the chief returning officers and the returning officers in their constituencies in a peaceful manner today, an Election Commission

spokesperson said.
On October 22, candidates had filed their nomination papers for the first phase of polls scheduled to take place on November 26.

Another senior leader of UML Jhalanath Kha-nal fielded his candidacy from Ilam constituency No 1 in eastern Nepal, while Nepali Congress general secretary Sha-shanka Koirala field-ed his candidacy from Nawalparasi 1.

Education body demands roll back of GST on sector

NEW DELHI, Nov 2 (PTI): A private body representing education sector stakeholders has approached the government demanding rollback of GST applied on various service providers in the sector.

The Education Promotion Society for India said there were serious implications of GST being imposed on several on-campus outsourced services like transportation, security, hostels mess and canteen, train-

ing, medical, shops and admission- related services.

In a memorandum submitted to Finance Minister Arun Jaitley, it said the levy of GST on outsourced services in many cases will be detrimental to the quality of higher education.

The higher educational institutions will be forced to stop outsourcing and do it in-house that will ulti-mately impact their delivery of quality education as they deviate from their core focus of providing edu-cation," it added.

Suu Kyi visits Myanmar region torn by Rohingya conflict

YANGON, NOV 2 (AP): Aung San Suu Kyi made her first visit as Myanmar's leader today to the conflict-torn region where more than half a million Rohingya Muslims have fled state-led violence that has spiraled into Asia's worst refugee crisis in decades.

Her visit to Rakhine state comes as Suu Kyi is under intense international scrutiny for her response to the exodus, which the U.N. has called "ethnic cleansing," and as her gov-ernment said it is working on a plan to repatriate those who fled to Bangladesh. Suu Kyi arrived in the state

capital, Sittwe, in the morning and headed to restive north-ern Rakhine where many Rohingya villages were located. During a 2015 election campaign, she visited southern Rakhine, where there hasn't been much conflict.

"The state counselor just arrived but she is heading to Maungdaw, northern Rakh-ine, with the state officials," said Tin Maung Swe, a deputy

The global image of Suu Kyi, a Nobel Peace laureate, has been damaged by the crisis and she has come under intense criticism to do more to end the violence and condemn those responsible Several fellow peace prize winners have publicly con-demned Suu Kyi for what they see as her apparent indifference to the plight of the Rohingya.

Though Suu Kyi has been the de facto head of Myanmar's civilian government since her party swept elections in 2015, the former political prisoner is limited

by a constitution written by the military junta that ruled Myanmar for decades. The military has effective veto power over all legislation and controls key ministries in-cluding those overseeing security and defense.

The military is in charge of operations in northern Rakhine, and ending them is not up to Suu Kyi.

Even when Suu Kyi has

spoken on the issue, she has drawn criticism. In a September speech, her first public comments after the current crisis began, she asked for pa tience from the international community and suggested the refugees were partly responsible, saying more than half of the Rohingya villages had not been destroyed by the violence.

Suu Kyi faces a poten-tial domestic backlash if she speaks on behalf of the Rohingya, who have been the target of anti- Muslim rheto-

Though Rohingya first arrived generations ago, they were stripped of their citizenship in 1982, denying them almost all rights and rendering them stateless. They cannot travel freely, practice their religion, or work as teachers or doctors, and they have little access to medical care, food or education.

Myanmar's backers globally have also had to tread carefully, not wanting to undermine Suu Kyi's weak civilian government at a time when the country is just emerging from decades of authoritarian rule. Still, counties such as the U.S. have warned Myanmar about potential repercus-sions if it doesn't address the crisis, including the risk of attracting interna-tional terrorists, scaring off investment, and ultimately stunting its transi-tion to democracy.

Kolkata Metro has Feb 2018 date with advanced Chinese trains

New Delhi, Nov 2 (PTI): Come February, mmuters of Kolk ata Metro would finally get a taste of travelling in the most advanced coaches they have seen, with China-made rakes making their way into the 'City of Joy', a senior railways official said.

Imported at a cost of Rs 7.1 lakh per coach from the China Railway Rolling Stock Corp. Ltd (CRRC), the city would get 14 trains with a total of 112 coaches, he told

PTI.

This means Kolkata Metro will soon be able to shed its non-AC rakes, at least in the existing north-south corridor.

"These will be state-of-the-art AC coaches with comfortable seating and much like the metro trains run by the DMRC in Delhi. They will also have CCTV cameras," said the official

Real-time from the coaches will be visible to the motorman console. This would enable him to act swiftly in case of any disturbance in the coaches, officials

The coaches would be fitted with 30-tonne air conditioners, instead of the existing 22-tonne machines.

The commuters will also be able to communicate with the motorman during an emergency through eight talk-back

Once operational, the trains will replace the old ones, which have been running for over three decades in Kolkata's 27.22-km-long southnorth subway line.
As many as 300 Kolk-

ata Metro services ferry over 6,50,000 commuters on a daily basis, making it the second-busiest metro system in India after Delhi.

Accident Care

More needs to be done in response to accidents and mishaps

I magine a scenario in which a road mishap, say in remote North Sikkim, leaves a group of people injured and in immediate need of medical attention ranging from the routine first-aid to specialist interventions. You do not even have to stretch your imagination if you have been following news on a regular basis and are aware of such accidents in different parts of Sik-kim in the not so distant past. While accidents cannot be averted with certainty, what can be assured is that accident victims receive the required medical attention sans the red tape and without having to bounce through a circuitous route to medical attention. But that is invariably what happens. Continuing with the scenario outlined earlier, the injured will first be rushed to the nearest PHC if they are far from the district hospitals. There can be no qualms with this since trained medical attention is necessary in the early hours to establish the nature of injuries. Of course, it would be ideal if the first responder teams to accident sites included doctors and paramedics so that such diagnosis can be made on the spot. After this, the injured will be taken to the nearest district hospital where they will be checked again and then, if required, referred on to STNM Hospital in Gangtok and chances are that from here they will be driven onwards to CRH down in Tadong. The more complicated cases will then be referred out of the State to Siliguri or Delhi.

From the time of the accident to their eventual discharge from hospital, the victims (the less injured ones) of a road mishap end up spending more time on the road, moving from one 'referral' to the next, than they spend recuperating or coming to grips with their trauma and grief. Sikkim's roads are a punishment for even able-bodied passengers, the trauma that injured bodies suffer careening from one medical inspection to the other should not be wished on anyone. The doctor with referral powers at the final end of the state is just as capable as the doctor who must have attended to the accident victims first. Why then, should the power to refer patients out of the State not rest with the first doctor itself depending on his/her prognosis. That would cut down on travel time substantially, and time is of essence in such cases, all will agree.

There is still more that needs to be done when it comes to handling accident trauma cases. Accidents, as mentioned, cannot be avoided, but what defeats all explanation is the scenario which definitely confounds everyone – the level of medical assistance available for trauma victims in Sikkim. This basic facility remains unattained even though by now, speciality wings should have been added to district hospitals and even Primary Health Centres here at least on paper. Given the hilly terrain, poor driving etiquette and unreliable roads, every PHC in Sikkim should have reasonably advanced infrastructure and manpower to attend to accident cases. Tourist destinations in high altitudes [like Nathula and Gurudongmar] should have personnel and equipment to allow visitors with high altitude sickness symptoms to recuperate. This facility, one may add here, need not necessarily be provided and maintained by the Government and could even be sponsored by tourism stakeholders; after all, it is tourists who develop complications there, with the residents mostly acclimatized. Agreed the army assists in times of emergencies, but this should still be a service that is more accessible and specifically dedicated to tourist emergencies. These should already have been in place, and yet, one stares at a reality where in the event of a medical emergency, a victim's fate depends on the presence of mind of the people around, the speed at which the referral can be typed out and the road wor thiness of the ambulance which zips the victim from one referral pit-stop to the other. 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Guyana, one of South America's poorest countries, struck oil. Will it go boom or bust?

Today, Guyana is one of South
America's poorest countries, with
an average per capita annual income
of around US\$4,000.

But within the decade, it could be among the richest. In 2015, Exxon-Mobil and its international partners discovered vast oil reserves off the Caribbean coast of this small country. By 2018, five new wells will be pumping out 120,000 barrels of Guyanese crude daily.

crude daily.

Deep-water surveys estimate Guyana's oil reserves at around 2 billion
barrels. That pales in comparison to
neighboring Venezuela but surpasses
the reserves of Trinidad and Tobago,
long the Caribbean's biggest oil producer.

In short, Guyana is on the verge of unprecedented wealth – but only if it plays its cards right. As I've seen during two decades of research into Caribbean oil and gas development, natural resources can easily become

GUYANA LAYS THE GROUNDWORK

Given its marine reserves, by the mid-2020s Guyanese oil production offshore could rise to 400,000 barrels a day. Once production starts next year, Guyana will receive a 2 percent royalty on gross earnings and 50 percent of oil proceeds. While that's a fairly low royalty by

While that's a fairly low royalty by international standards, it will make Guyana rich. At the current market price of around \$50 per barrel, this country of 750,000 people can expect to net \$1 million a day in oil earnings.

Since full monetization of Guyana's oil and gas resources will occur in five to 15 years, the country has less than a decade to deal with numerous energy-related hurdles, including unresolved territorial issues with Venezuela, environmental protection, wealth management and social concerns.

The government's top priority is to resolve a border controversy dating back to Guyana's days as a British colony. For 200 years, Venezuela has claimed sovereignty over two-thirds of Guyana's territory, including its exclusive economic zone.

This controversy - which hing-



es on a disagreement over the U.N. Convention on the Law of the Sea – is unlikely to scare off international oil companies. Venezuela could muck things up a bit for Guyana, though, by increasing Navy patrols in Venezuela's exclusive economic zone, which abuts Guyana's disputed maritime area, deterring oil vessels and intercepting commercial ships.

Hoping to avoid such confronta-

Hoping to avoid such confrontations, Guyana is now pursuing a judicial settlement at the U.N. If the countries fail to settle, the case will go to the International Court of Justice in The Hague.

Inadequate infrastructure is another constraint to growth. Guyana now has an ambitious \$164 million plan to upgrade its road networks, bridges, ports, telecommunications and river transport system. But to get Guyana's crude to international markets, some of this construction must be done by 2018 – a tall order for a small nation.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTIONSAs oil production expands, protecting the marine environment will become an urgent issue for the entire Caribbean region.

In April, three Venezuelan doctors transporting medical supplies from Trinidad to Venezuela drowned when their boat overturned in an oil slick. A barge belonging to Trinidad and Tobago's national oil company had ruptured, discharging 300 million barrels of crude into the sea just seven miles from Venezuela.

Most recently, in October, a fisherman discovered an unreported "massive" spill off of Trinidad's northwest coast. A video posted to Facebook shows black waters near Chaguaramas, the site of a major national park. The source of the spill remains unknown.

Such catastrophes are commonplace around Trinidad, which for 110 years has been the Caribbean's major oil producer.

oil producer.

They should serve as a warning for Guyana. Maritime crude drilling goes hand in hand with leaky pipelines, ruptured barges and rig malfunctions. In my experience, spills rarely result in sanctions for oil and gas producers.

According to a June 2017 report from Guyana's Environmental Protection Agency, the country's forests and ecosystems are, today, almost untouched. To keep Guyana pristine even as the oil and gas sector grows, proper environmental management systems are critical.

AVOIDING THE RESOURCE CURSE

Revenue management is another big question mark right now. From Iran to Nigeria, worldwide experience confirms that social conflict and eco-

from drilling, mining and the like is unequally distributed.

This is called the "resource curse,"

and Guyana must move quickly to avoid it. Recent opinion polls show that the Guyanese public has little faith in the leadership ability of both the government and the opposition. Indeed, Guyana's gross misman-

agement of its corruption-plagued sugar and mineral extraction industries raises doubt about whether the coming oil windfall will actually benefit citizens.

The Guyanese government seems to be aware of these financial management risks. On Oct. 26, Guyana became the latest member of the Extractive Industries Transparency

Initiative, an international watchdog that partners with organizations like the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

In addition to monitoring Guyana's resource governance, the initiative requires mandatory full financial disclosures to "demonstrate commitment to reform and anti-corruption."

A critical next step would be to establish a sovereign wealth fund, following the good examples of Trinidad and Norway. This type of national savings account ensures that oil revenues are invested and spent in a way that transcends political cycles and generations.

ETHNIC STRIFE

There is good reason for concern about Guyana's future as an oil power. Though the country has enjoyed relative political stability over the past decade, its society is fractious. Politics in Guyana – whose population is 29 percent Afro-Guyanese and 40 percent Indo-Guyanese – divide along racial lines, with the two main ethnic groups competing over money and power.

and power.

Protests in 2012 killed three people, and more unrest occurred earlier this year.

Challenges aside, Guyana also has some solid foundations for economic development. Its well-educated population and open, market-driven financial climate make it an attractive destination for American, Chinese, Mexican and Brazilian companies, among others

among others.

From 2006 to 2015, foreign direct investment – mostly in Guyana's mining, tourism and telecommunications sectors – averaged \$188 million per year, representing 7.9 percent of gross domestic product. That will surely grow once oil starts flowing.

The odds of a success are aided by Trinidad and Tobago, which has been providing technical assistance to Guyana since 2016. In addition to helping its neighbor develop its energy and gas expertise, Trinidad hopes its own refinery will soon begin processing Guyanese crude.

One way or another, oil riches will transform Guyana. With sound economic policy and thoughtful leadership, it can be for the better.

What evolutionary theory can teach us about the appearance of aliens

Aliens could be everywhere. There are at least 100 billion planets in our galaxy alone, and at least 20% of them could be habitable. Even if a tiny fraction of those planets – less than one percent of one percent – evolved life, there would still be tens of thousands of planets with aliens in our vicinity. But if we want to figure out where to start looking for these neighbours, we need to understand what they might be like and where they might thrive.

Ultimately, we want to understand as much as possible about an extraterrestrial species before we encounter it. And yet, making predictions about aliens is hard. The reason is simple: we have only one example – life on Earth – to extrapolate from. Just because eyes and limbs have evolved many times on Earth doesn't mean they'll appear even once elsewhere. Just because we are made of carbon and coded by DNA doesn't mean aliens will be – they could be silicon based and coded by "XNA".

However, as my colleagues and I argue in our

However, as my colleagues and I argue in our new study, published in the International Journal of Astrobiology, there is another approach to making predictions about aliens that gets around this problem. That is to use evolutionary theory as a guiding principle. The theory of natural selection allows us to make predictions that don't depend on the details of Earth, and so will hold even for eyeless, nitrogen-breathing aliens.

Darwin formulated his theory of natural selec-

Darwin formulated his theory of natural selection long before we knew what DNA was, how mutations appeared, or even how traits were passed on. It is remarkably simple, and requires just a few ingredients to work: variation (some giraffes have longer necks than others), heritability of that variation (long-necked giraffes have long-necked abies) and differential success linked to the variation (long-necked giraffes eat more leaves and have more babies).

DARWIN'S ALIENS

In our paper, we use evolutionary theory to make a number of predictions about aliens. First, we argue that aliens will undergo natural selection. This is something often either taken for granted or assumed to be an unknown. We show that there are

firm theoretical grounds for believing that aliens will undergo (or have undergone) natural selection.

This is because "apparent design" is what sets life apart from non-life – such as a single celled organism from inert rocks. Living things have many intricate parts fine tuned for the common purpose of replicating the organism. The only way to achieve this apparent design, or adaptedness, the only way to get life, is through natural selection.

only way to get life, is through natural selection. So as aliens are highly likely to undergo natural selection, we can make some predictions about



what they will be like. In particular, our predictions are about complex aliens. By complexity, we mean anything more complex than, say, a virus.

Even a bacterial cell has intricate parts that

Even a bacterial cell has intricate parts that work together to achieve goals, like moving and eating. In other words, most "aliens" we would be interested in finding, or even able to find, are complex. That's because the only things so simple that they could have arisen without natural selection would be molecules, which are both physically hard to detect and hard to distinguish from the background of inert molecules. They'd also be transient – without natural selection making them fitter they'd disappear. Even if we did find them, we probably wouldn't even classify them as life.

Complexity on Earth has arisen through a hand-

Complexity on Earth has arisen through a handful of something called "major transitions in individuality". These occur when independent organisms come together to form a new type of individual. On Earth, genes came together to form genomes, single celled organisms formed multi-cellular organisms, like us. In some rare cases, multi-cellular organisms, like insects, have formed societies that act as "super organisms" themselves. These events are rare, and require extreme evolutionary condi-

tions to occur

We argue that complex aliens will, too, have undergone major transitions, as this is likely the only way to advance beyond a simple replicating molecule. Because the conditions for major transitions to occur are rare, and because they are quite well understood from an evolutionary perspective, this allows us to say something about the makeup of

In particular, just as you and I are made up of cells which are made up of nuclei and mitochondria (the breathing engine of the cell) which are made up of genes, aliens will be a similar nested hierarchy of units. Aliens might not be made of "cells" as we think of them, but they will be made up of parts which were once free living, and those parts in turn will be too – all the way down to the aliens' hereditary material (whatever it is). Our parts have mechanisms in place that keep all the parts working together to make an organism.

For example, our cells all start as one single cell (the "zygote"), and this means all our cells are clones, which is why they cooperate to make us. Aliens will have similar ways of enforcing cooperation between their internal parts, at each level of units.

Aliens may not have two legs, or any legs at all, but their structure, from an evolutionary standpoint, will be much more familiar than we might have thought. By familiar, I don't mean superficially familiar. They may look, on the surface, wildly different from anything on Earth. But they will be similar on a more fundamental level: their bodies will be constructed in the same way (formerly free-living parts within formerly free-living parts), and they will have undergone a similar evolutionary history (independent organisms cooperating to form new, higher level organisms).

There is much more work to be done to understand what aliens might be like and where we might find them. And the tantalising question – "Are we alone?" – remains unanswered. But, as we have shown, if we're not alone, perhaps we understand more about the makeup of our neighbours than science fiction would have us believe.





New Delhi, Nov 2 (PTI): A former deputy director of the Minis-try of Environment and Forest (MoEF) has been awarded a three jail term by a special court here for taking bribe to grant environmental clearance to an Orissa-based pow er and steel company in

49-year old Neeraj Khatri was arrested in January 2013 for allegedly accepting a bribe of Rs 7 lakh for granting envi-ronmental clearance for the company -- Chariot Steel and Power Pvt Ltd. (CSPPL).

Special CBI Judge N K Malhotra also sentenced the company's Managing Director Suresh Joshi to three years in jail, while handing down jail terms of two and one years to mid-dlemen--Raisri Achutananda Srichandan and his son Raisri Chinmaya Srichandan respectively.

The court also imposed varied amounts as fine on convicts and said that it was not a case warranting award maximum sentence as there were mitigating circumstances in their favour.

According to public prosecutor Shampa Ti-kait, Srichandans owned S S Environics, a Bhu-baneswar-based consultant firm which lobbied environment clear ance (EC) for CSPPL's Raiboga limestone mine in Orissa.

of EC was scheduled for consideration by the re-constituted Expert Appraisal Committee (Non-Coal Mining), headed by a joint secretary-level officer, a day after Khatri

officer, a day after Khatri was arrested. Khatri was appre-hended while accepting the bribe from co-ac-cused Chinmaya outside a posh hotel at Mehrauli in south Delhi.

AITA to seek government guidelines to tackle Age Fraud issue

NEW DELHI, NOV 2 (PTI): The AITA has recognised the urgent need to tackle the serious issue of age fraud during the National tennis championships but anticipating litigation, it has ex pressed helplessness to address the menace and is seeking guidelines from the government.


The recent hard courts na

tional championship at DLTA was rocked by allegations that several over-aged players were competing in various age groups, denying a level-playing field to genuine kids.

The aggrieved parents had signed a petition during the championship and demanded appropriate action from the National Federation.

Acknowledging cerns, the All India Tennis Association (AITA) discussed the matter at its recent Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Kolkata. "We don't know what to do

if we make someone (suspects) undergo the medical tests to establish the real age and it is challenged in the court and the court



sets aside the findings.

What will we do then?," said AITA Secretary General Hironmoy Chatterjee said, explaining the predicament. "That's why rill ask the ministry to provide the guidelines.

An AITA Executive Committee member informed that a committee has been formed which will soon start looking into the complaints.

The National Sports Code

(2011) has made provisions to tackle the issue and approved the guidelines, circulated via a letter by the then joint secretary Injeti Srinivas on November 25,

The guidelines stipulated that the Federation should resort to medical examination of an athlete whenever doubt arises with regard to the age of an athlete on account of his or her physical appearance, receipt of

any complaint or any other valid ground, which should be duly communicated to the athlete.

It further stated that the Federation should ensure that the medical tests include physical examination, dental examina-tion and radiological examination at a credible hospital, preferably a government.

If an athlete contest the find-

ings of the medical test in question, it would be incumbent upon the Federation to arrange for a re-examination, preferably at a reputed government hospital.

In the event of a conclusive proof that an athlete has committed an age fraud, he or she should be banned from participating in any sporting event for a period of two years on the first detection and for five years on any subsequent detection.

The guidelines also stipulated

that Federation should conduct random verifications at regular intervals. The Code is though silent on what should be done if the findings are challenged in the court and if the findings are set aside by the judiciary.

We may never see another Usain Bolt ever again: Johnson



NEW DELHI, NOV 2 (PTI): South African Wayde van Niekerk may be the next big thing in world athlet-ics but he will never ever be able to match the aura of Usain Bolt, feels legendary American sprint-er Michael Johnson.

Van Niekerk is the current World and Olympic champion in the 400m and many feel that he will fill-up the void left by the Jamaican, who retired after the last World Championship in London.

"You have to understand when someone is retiring, another person will take his place. So Van Niekerk will be the No 1 attraction in world athletics. But he won't be the new Usain Bolt. Just because you are number 1 does not make you Usain Bolt," Johnson said during a promotional event here today.

"Van Niekerk does not have the electric personality of Bolt. There wasn't

a personality like Usain Bolt before Usain Bolt! Even I was more business like in my approach. So we may never see anoth-er Usain Bolt ever again," said the eight-time World Championship medal-list and double Olympic champion.

Johnson however felt that Bolt should have retired after winning the triple gold medal at the Rio Olympics. "I spoke to Usain and advised him to stop after Rio.

Because I think af-

ter winning double gold medals (100m and 200m) in three editions of Olympics and also winning World Championship, I don't think you have a lot of motivation left.

It is very difficult to

win double gold medal in successive editions of Olympics and that too thrice," said Johnson while speaking at the 'Royal Stag Barrel Select Perfect Strokes'

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JCOs are gazetted officers, clarifies Army; cancels earlier note

NEW DELHI, Nov 2 (PTI): In a significant move that will benefit over 64,000 personnel, the Army has said junior commissioned officers (JCOs) are gazetted officers, cancel ling its earlier note that described them as "non-gazetted" officers.

The decision by the Army two days back comes amid growing resentment from a large section of its personnel over issues re-lating to pay-parity and ranking.

In an official note, the Army headquarters has cancelled a communication issued in response to an RTI application in 2011 which had stated that the JCOs are non-ga zetted officers, according to documents accessed by PTI.

Highly placed official sources said the Army committed a "major mistake" in 2011 on the status of the JCOs and now the Army headquarters has removed the ambiguity and made it clear that JCOs are gazetted

The clarification will benefit over 64,000

ICOs who are ranked in three categories --

Naib Subedar, Subedar and Subedar Major.
The 2011 note had triggered widespread trage among the JCOs.
Asked how the Army headquarters made

the "mistake" in 2011, classifying the ICOs as non-gazetted officers, a senior Army offi-cial said there are separate definitions of officers and the ICOs in the manual of military law and it could have been a case of misin-terpretation of the rule book.

The issuance of the letter is also seen as a message by the Army to the government to address grievances of a section of the Army personnel over what they call "disparity" in the current pay band.

The issue of status equivalence between

military officers and their civilian counterparts was discussed at the recently conclud-ed Army Commanders' conference.

Asked whether the Army headquarters will send a fresh communication to the RTI applicant who had filed the query about sta-

said that it was seriously examining the long-standing issue relating to status equiv-alence between military officers and their civilian counterparts.

There has been growing resentment among the military officers who have been insisting that the current status equivalence was flawed and that government must address their concerns.

As per the current pay structure, the subedar majors and subedars are part of the pay band for gazetted officers but there has been discrepancies there as well, said an official.

The Naib subedars whose number of around 55,000 get salary under non-gazett-

ed category, he said.

The matter is among the main issues being examined as part of the pay and allowances anomaly.

Last year, then Defence Minister Mano-har Parrikar had set up a high-level committee to look into the issue.

Except for the US and Israel, 191 of the 193-member countries of the United Nations yesterday voted in favour of a General Assembly resolution -- "Necessity of ending the economic commercial and financial embargo imposed by the United States of America against Cuba". At the height of the

Cold War, the US had imposed the trade embargo on Cuba in 1959. It has remained in force and can only be lifted by the US Congress, which has steadfastly rejected such

Introducing the resolution, Cuba's Foreign Minister Bruno Eduardo Rodriguez Parrilla alleged the US new policy on Cuba was intended to take relations back to a past of confrontation. Notably, last year both the US and Israel had abstained from the vote for the first time since it was tabled in 1992.

No consensus over listing Azhar as global terrorist: China

BEHING. Nov 2 (PTI): China today indicated that there was no change in its policy of blocking India's efforts to list Pakistan-based IeM chief Masood Azhar as a global terrorist by the UN, saying there was still no consensus over the issue.

The indication came hours be-fore China's technical hold on a proposal by the US, France and Britain to list Azhar as a global terrorist was set to lapse.

"We raised a technical hold so as to allow more time for the committee and its members to deliberate on

But there is still absence of con sensus on this matter," Foreign Ministry spokesperson Hua Chunying told a media briefing when asked



whether China would veto the appli

veto-wielding permanent member of the Security Council, China has repeatedly blocked India s move to put a ban on the JeM terrorist under the Al-Oaeda Sanctions

Defending China's consistent technical holds, Hua said China s actions are meant to ensure and safe guard the authority and effectiveUN Security Council.

"We will continue to follow the mandate of the committee and its rules of procedure and remain in constant communication and coor-dination with the members of the committee," she said.

To the follow-up questions, Hua said the committee has its rules. The committee is yet reach the

consensus.
"The Committee is yet to reach an agreement. This is a fact," she said.

China had in August extended by three months its technical hold on the proposal to list Azhar as a global terrorist after having blocked the move in February this year at the UN.

US shares names of 20 terror groups with Pakistan: Report

ISLAMABAD, Nov 2 (PTI): The US has shared with Pakistan a list 20 terrorist groups like the LeT, JeM and HUM that Washington believes are operating from its soil to target India and Afghanistan, a media report said

Top on the list is the Haqqani network which, the US says has safe havens in the Federally Administered Tribal Areas in northwestern Pakistan and uses them to launch attacks into Afghanistan, Dawn

The list includes three types of militants groups: those who launch attacks into Afghanistan, those who attack targets inside Pakistan and those who are focused on Kashmir, the newspaper quoted diplomatic sources as saving.

India-specific terror groups like Harakat-Mujahideen, Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM) and Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) are also on the

Harakatul Mujahideen is a Pakistan-based militant group operating primarily in Kashmir. The US says that group had links to Osama bin Laden and Al Qaeda

as well, the report said.

JeM operates mainly in Kashmir.

The United States identified LeT as one of the largest and most active terrorist or-ganisations in South Asia. Founded in 1987 by Hafiz Saeed, Abdullah Azzam and Zafar Idbal in Afghanistan, the group had its head-quarters in Muridke in Punjab province. It too is focused on Kashmir, the report said.



Lashkar-e-Taiba was involved in the 2001 Indian parliament attack and the 2008

mbai attacks.
The US blames this group for committing hundreds of target killings and dozens of mass attacks inside Pakistan. The Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP), an umbrella organisation of various militant groups, was based in FATA, but has now relocated to Afghanistan. The US says that the group wants to enforce its own interpretation of Sharia and plans to unite against Nato-led forces in Afghanistan. It has conducted hundreds of terrorist attacks inside Pakistan

Other groups on the list are: Harakatul Jihadi-i-Islami, Jamaatul Ahrar, Jamaatud Dawa al-Quran and Tariq Gidar Group, which is one of 13 TTP affiliates.

The Tarig Gidar Group has been behind some of the deadliest attacks inside Pakistan, including the Dec 16, 2014, massacre at the Army Public School in Peshawar that left 132 schoolchildren and nine staffers

sources, however, rejected as incorrect the suggestion that US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson gave a list of 75 terrorists to Pakistani officials when he visited Islamabad last week.

Tillerson told the US Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Monday that Pakistan was willing to target terrorists if provided specific information about their where-abouts and Washington plans to give Islamabad the opportunity to do so.

He said the information that the US delegation gave Pakistan went "beyond just names of individuals" and also expected "to receive information" from Pakistan that would be useful in targeting militants.

Tillerson said that it was in the interest of Pakistan to change its "long-standing" re-lationship with terrorist organisations.

"The conversation with the Pakistani government is for them to recognise that they will be one of the greatest beneficiaries of a successful peace process in Afghanistan. Tillerson told lawmakers during a Congressional hearing on Monday.

Tillerson, who also visited Afghanistan and India last week, responded to questions on Pakistan's co-operation in the fight against terrorism in the aftermath of US President Donald Trump's South Asia Policy.

"Pakistan lives with two very unstable

borders, one with Afghanistan, one with India and our message to them is -- You have to begin to create greater stability inside your country and that means denying safe haven to any of these organisations that launch at-tacks from your territory," Tillerson said.

WASHINGTON, NOV 2 (AP): In three exhaustive hearings this week, executives from Facebook, Twitter and Google acknowledged that their platforms were used by Russia to try and create division over such disparate issues as immigration, gun control and politics.

House investigators released trove of Facebook and Twitter ads that showed just how extraordinary the cyber intrusion was. The companies' admissions and dis-

closures were one of the first real wins

for congressional investigators, who have been frustrated by delays since they launched probes into Russian elec-tion interference earlier this year.

Initially dismissive of Russia's threat, all three companies have pledged im-provements since lawmakers ramped up pressure and called them to testify.

The few dozen ads released encouraged demonstrations against President Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton and fostered support and opposition to mi-nority groups.


