Start a "revolution of development" says CM

GYALSHING, 12 APR [IPR]: Chief Minister Pawan Chamling, who is on a 32day Sikkim Public Out-reach Campaign, conclud-ed the third day of his tour of West district at Rinchen-pong constituency.

The CM today ad-

dressed the public regarding development wherein he asked the public to make use of the opportunities and amenities provided to them by the state gov-ernment. He mentioned that the State and its people need to under-stand that the governmental emoluments are given to them to increase their economic well-being and living standards making Sik-kim a "self-sustaining and self-reliant" society.

Mr Chamling urged the Sikkimese society to work together towards the common goal of making Sikkim better in every way. He asked the public



to start a "revolution of development" where ev-ery citizen is conscious and is responsible for the overall development of themselves and the state. Identifying developmental opportunities and ventures to help the State and its people is the

duty of every Sikkimese

citizen, he added.

While speaking on the various demands put forward by the Ka-luk-Rinchenpong con-stituency, Mr Chamling assured the public that "public interest" de-mands will be put forward on priority basis. He also sanctioned the

upgradation of Khaneysirbong Secondary School to Senior Secondary School in the coming months.

Rabindranath Tago-re Memorial Parks and Garden at Rinchenpong along with the construction of the "Statue of Unity" and other infrastructural demands like VLW Office at Deythang and Community Hall at Man-galbaria was also sanctioned by the CM.

Cal HC stays WB panchayat polls till further orders

Kolkata, Apr 12 (PTI): Displeased with the State Election Commission's (SEC) decision to cancel its own order to extend the nomination process by a day, the Calcutta High Court today stayed the ongoing panchayat election process in West Bengal till further orders.

Rejecting the SEC's contention that the writ petition of the BJP was not maintainable, the court held that the SEC is endowed with pow-ers relating to holding of elections, but in case of any digression, it needs to be corrected by the court of law.

Justice Subrata Ta-lukdar stayed till further orders the ongoing pan-chayat election process in West Bengal.

Talukdar also sought from the SEC by Mon-day a comprehensive status report on the poll process, detailing the number of nominations filed and the percentage of those rejected, among other information.

The court said would hear on April 16 the pleas challenging the SEC's decision to with-draw its April 9 notification, which had extended the date for filing nomi-

nations by a day.

The BJP had challenged the cancellation of the notification dated April 9 by the commission vide its order dated April 10, withdrawing the one-day extension granted to the candidates to file their nomination papers.

The deadline to file nominations had expired at 3 pm on April 9.

NEW DELHI, APR 12 (PTI): NCERT has published informa-tion about helplines for children in all course books from Class 6-12, giving around 26 crore school children access to them, the Women and Child Development (WCD) Ministry said today. WCD Minister Maneka Gand-

hi had suggested the idea to Union Human Resource Development Minister Prakash Javadekar last year during a telephone conversation.

"The National Council Of Ed-

ucational Research And Training (NCERT) has published the information regarding Childline (1098) 24x7 Helpline for chilback side of the front cover of all course books from Class 6 to Class 12. To equip the children with the information regarding the possible modes of protec-tion/complaints," the ministry said in a statement. Gandhi had requested her

through NCERT publications,
screening of educational films
on child sexual abuse in schools
and having strict norms to emplay the support staff ploy the support staff.

Today, she thanked the HRD Minister and NCERT for imple-menting her suggestion and

stated that parents, guardians and teachers should remain vig-ilant about children as well as their behaviour. Any suspected situation should be reported immediately on the Childline No.1098 and the POCSO e-Box, the ministry said.

Through these course books,

the information is expected to reach approximately 26 crore students in 15 lakh schools.

NCERT was also advised to include a chapter in social science subject regarding the issues mentioned above.

"The narrative may continue till Class 12 for having a

reasonable impact on young

minds. The information will not just reach these children, but is about to stay with them on daily basis. As a result, it is expected that the children will be more aware and they may use the Child Helpline or POC-SO e-box, in case of any distress. The easy accessibility of this information in the hand of children themselves may also deter the prospective abusers, at least to a reasonable extent." the ministry said.

The information via these

books will also be available to 10 lakh teachers along with the family members and care givers of these children.

SEC's decision to recall the extension order, Justice Talukdar said that the operative part of the apex court order is crucially connected to the cancellation of

the notification.

The high court also said that the SEC should have informed it today that it has ensured a level playing field for all players. Justice Talukdar also ex-

pressed his displeasure at the conduct of the BJP representative, Pratap Banerjee, who had moved the petition on behalf of the party in view of an ongoing cease work by lawyers, for not disclosing that a similar petition had been moved by the party before the Supreme Court also

Justice Talukdar observed that this court must hold a very dim view of the conduct of the BJP rep-

resentative appearing in person.
"However, in view of public interest involved, this court is not vacating its directions to the

SEC," the judge said.

Likening its conduct to forum hopping, Justice Talukdar imposed a cost of Rs 5 lakh on the BIP which would have to be deposited with the registrar general of the high court.

Representing the Trinamool Congress, its vice-president Kalyan Banerjee earlier prayed for vacating the order on the SEC, alleging that the petitioner had suppressed that it had moved both the high court and the apex court with similar petitions. Apart from the BJP, the CPIM

and the Congress too has moved the high court challenging the SEC's decision.

Opposition parties in West Bengal today termed the high court order staying the rural elections process in the state "victory of democracy over dictatorship" and sought the resignation of Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee over the alleged violence during filing of nominations.

BJP national general secretary Kailash Vijayvargiya, who is in the city to participate in a sit-in demonstration to protest against the alleged violence, said the judgment was a blow to the ruling TMC.

"The ruling TMC has tried to turn the panchayat polls into farce by not allowing the opposition candidates to file nominations. This high court ruling is a triumph of democracy over dictatorship," Vijayvergiya told

Senior BJP leader Mukul Roy said the order is the "victory for the masses of Bengal".

Leader of the opposition and senior Congress leader, Abdul Mannan, too, welcomed the judgment and demanded the resignations of Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee and State Election Commissioner A K Singh.

"The people of Bengal can get justice only by moving court because the entire state admin-

istration has been turned into a back office of the ruling TMC. a back office of the ruling I Mc.
The chief minister and the SEC
should immediately tender
their resignation as they have
turned the poll process into a
joke," Mannan told PTI.

Senior CPI (M) leader Sujan Chakraborty said "democratic rights were being throttled" in West Bengal under the TMC rule.
The CPI(M)-led Left Front

has called for a six-hour strike in West Bengal tomorrow in protest against the pre-poll violence in the state.

TMC secretary general Par-tha Chatterjee, on his part, said people have "full faith" on Ma-

mata Banerjee.

"We will not comment on the court order. Law will take its own course. The opposition parties do not enjoy popularity among the masses and that is why they are approaching the courts (to stall proceedings),"

informs that the CME is being organised by the Departments of Radiology [Interventional Radiology] and Medicine, SMIMS.

More than 100 delegates from Sikkim, West Bengal, Assam and Meghalaya have already reg-istered for the workshop which will have guest faculty of international repute in attendance to enlighten the delegates on the recent advances in stroke and its

One of the primary objectives of the CME is to spread awareness on the role of Neurointerventional procedures in management of various neurovascular diseases. Utilised in place of more

which require opening the skull or exposing the spinal column, neurointerventional procedures are minimally invasive. These procedures can be accomplished through a tiny incision. The benefits of neurointervention include shorter recovery time, fewer complica-tions and less pain after the procedure is done, the release adds.

The CME is also being organised to sensitise the first person of contact [doctor/paramedical staff] in early detection of stroke and to assess its clinical severity according to National Institute Health Stroke Scale [NIHSS].

As a part of the CME, training on NHISS will also be conducted. Subsequently, interested in-dividuals will be able to take an online examina-

tion for the same.

It may be mentioned here, this CME is the first step toward establishing a standard of care in management of acute stroke in the State of Sikkim

No Class 10 Maths re-test after scientific evaluation: CBSE to HC re-examination.

NEW DELHI, APR 12 (PTI): The CBSE today told the Delhi High Court that it decided not to hold re-examination of class 10 Maths test as a scientific evaluation of random answer sheets did not indicate any un-usual pattern to believe that there was wide-spread benefit of the al-

leged paper leak.
The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) made the sub-mission in an affidavit in which it said it was not conducting the retest for another reason -- class 10 is a gateway to class 11 and therefore "remains largely an internal segment of school

education system". The affidavit was filed

in response to a PIL. being heard by a bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Justice C Hari Shankar, in which an NGO had sought that CBSE be directed to hold the class 10 exam in April, if required, and not in July as it had proposed earlier.

The court had asked the Board to indicate by April 16 its plans, if any, to re-conduct the Maths test for class 10. Subsequently, CBSE had issued a notification on April 3 saying it will not hold re-examination of the class 10 Maths paper.

In its latest affidavit, CBSE cited reasons

for its decision and said "the Board triggered a scientific approach to take a considered view after seeing the general trend emerging out of a random evaluation of the class 10 Mathematics exam on priority basis.

"Accordingly, evalua-tion of class 10 Mathematics was taken up and same did not indicate spikes or unusual patterns, giving any impression of wide-spread benefits of the alleged paper leak." affidavit. filed

through advocate Amit Bansal, had also said that the Ministry of Human Resource Development had set up a High Powered Committee on April 3 to examine the entire system of conducting class 10 and 12 exams by CBSE.

Technology is powerful enabler of mass surveillance: SC on Aadhaar

NEW DELHI, APR 12 (PTI): Technology is a "very powerful enabler" of mass surveillance, said the Supreme Court today, countering the fervent plea of UIDAI that Aadhaar was not needed to carry out surveillance of the citizens as the State had ample means to do it.

A five-judge constitution bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra, hearing petitions challenging Aadhaar and its enabling 2016 law, also red-flagged certain provisions of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) and Rules made under it and asked the Centre how could bank accounts be suspended and then frozen if they are not linked to Aadhaar.

The bench also referred to the testimony of Facebook CEO Mark Zucker-berg before the US Congress to press home the point that technology was a powerful enabler of mass surveillance, which could even influence elections in a major democracy like the US.

"Can you deprive a person of his property (money)? Can a rule be made beyond the scope of the law? The consequence here leads to deprivation. One cannot withdraw his own money as the account is not linked... first, the account is suspended and then it may be blocked after six months. Can you do this," asked the bench, which also comprised Justices A K Sikri, A M Khan-wilkar, D Y Chandrachud and Ashok Bhushan.

The PMLA's rule 9(4) has been challenged by the petitioners on the ground of proportionality, the top court said, adding "what is the need to make Aadhaar compulsory when there are other

officially valid documents available."
Senior advocate Rakesh Dwivedi, appearing for the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) and the Gujarat government, initiated the submissions by sharing his experience during Emergency days and said he too had faced surveillance and intelligence officers used to keep a tab on public speeches made by persons against the

The governments of the day have been putting important persons and political opponents under surveillance and it has ample means to do that, he

"No government needs Aadhaar to surveil its own people. There are tools available to do this," he said, adding that for example, it can monitor bank accounts for unusual activities under a master circular

The bench responded by saying that those days of Kharak Singh (who had moved SC against police surveillance long back) are gone and now data has massive power which can provide "a goldmine of information" for commercial exploitation by private entities.

"The point is that technology is a powerful enabler of mass surveillance," the bench said, adding that elections in one of the most powerful nations has been believed to have been influenced due to misuse of leaked data.

The bench referred to the ongoing testimony of Facebook CEO Mark Zuck-erberg by the US lawmakers who accused him of failing to protect personal information of many Americans from alleged Russians's design to upset US Presidential polls.

Dwivedi then said that UIDAI's tech-

nology cannot be compared with algorithms of Google and Facebook and moreover, section 33 of Aadhaar Act makes misuse of data punishable and the law is more robust and if there was any issue, it could be regarding its enforcement.

"The Act does not preclude you (UIDAI) from acquiring such a technology," the bench replied.

Banking Safe

Deposits need to play back more robustly as credit into the local economy

The past year has been about bad loans and non-performing assets. With the biggies having secured and digested impossibly large loans and not regurgitated anything back into either the economy or towards their EMIs, the banks were delivered a crippling blow; so crippling that even the demonetization-induced flood of cash is unlikely to tide them over. Even though Sikkim is far removed from the mechanizations of real economics and financial realities, living as it does in a bubble which is getting buffeted around but is yet to burst, people here are also suffering. For the past little over a year, the usually laidback banks (yes even banks become laidback when in Sikkim) have been on overdrive, reopening files to chase down missed EMIs and bad loans, serving notices and running from court to lok adalat and back to court to recover dues.

If one looks at the C:D ratio in the State, improved on paper, in the past three years from an embarrassing 28.6% in 2014-15 to 42.6% in 2016-17. Banking norms advise the CDR to hover closer to the fifty per cent mark. This means that fifty per cent or more of the deposits made by account-holders should ideally be played back into the economy by way of loans and advances. This is as much to keep the economy buoyant as to trigger economic growth. Economies, one may add here, do not grow when earnings are saved. Economies boom when investments are risked. But, like with most things in Sikkim, even the euphoria over the loan boom might be misplaced. Agreed, a whole lot of individuals and families have managed to secure loans to build homes/hotels and purchase vehicles with greater ease in recent years, but fact remains that these loans do not really do anything for the economy by way of creating jobs. And the data bears this preference out as well because the tertiary sector (in which housing and vehicle-purchase loans are counted) have notched up between 51% to 82% of the projected targets for loans in Sikkim. Consuming a lion's share of the loans are the miniscule industries in the State which were so favored in 2014-15 that they received 241% of the target projected for this sector At whose cost, one may ask? The farming community who received only 22% of the loans they were expected to receive that year and in 2016-17, received only 15% of the loans the sector was in need of and expected to receive. Loans to outside agencies emptied out about 40% of the deposits in banks in Sikkim in the last fiscal, 2016-17, and that should attract some attention because that was available loans which could

not go to local entrepreneurs.

For an economy to benefit from the presence of so many banks in the State – there are 34 banks in Sikkim which have 142 branches between them here – the State needs to hear about more substantial loans being given to new enterprises here. Unfortunately, that has not been the case in Sikkim. The bigger loans in Sikkim continue to be secured by applicants based outside the State. Is it because the branches here do not have the authority or do not enjoy the confidence of the regional offices to process "big" local loans? Experience also shows that banks here are hesitant to take risks. And yes, Sikkim's poor repayment history is also partly to blame for this, after all, as of 30 June 2016, the recovery position of commercial banks in Sikkim had declined to 18.83% from 34.5% as on 30 June 2015. But come on, these things do not seem to stop banks from throwing thousands of crores behind already lost thousands of crores. Even when it comes to bad loans, it is not the banks that really suffer because they have ways of getting their money back, the real loss is suffered by Sikkim because nothing substantial is achieved for the local economy; not when only personal, housing or car loans are released or when loans go bad because none of these create opportunities or more money.

To serve a free society, social media must evolve beyond data mining

As Congress and the Facebook-Cambridge Analytica scandal, many people are now realizing the risks data collection poses to civic institutions, public discourse and individual privacy. The U.K.-based political consulting firm didn't just collect personal data from the 270,000 people who used researcher Aleksandr Kogan's online personality quiz – nor was the damage limited to 87 million of their friends. Facebook recently revealed

that nearly all of its 2.2 billion users have had data scraped by "malicious" people or companies. The firm itself has joined calls for better privacy regu-

For years, watchdogs have been warning about sharing information with data-collecting companies, firms engaged in the relatively new line of business called some academics have called "surveillance capitalism." Most casual internet users are only now realizing how easy – and common – it is for unaccountable and unknown organizations to assemble detailed digital profiles of them. They do this by combining the discrete bits of information consumers have given up to e-tailers, health sites, quiz apps and countless other digital services.

As scholars of public accountability and digital

As scholars of public accountability and digital media systems, we know that the business of social media is based on extracting user data and offering it for sale. There's no simple way for them to protect data as many users might expect. Like the social pollution of fake news, bullying and spam that Facebook's platform spreads, the company's privacy crisis also stems from a power imbalance: Facebook knows nearly everything about its users, who know little to nothing about it.

It's not enough for people to delete their Facebook accounts. Nor is it likely that anyone will successfully replace it with a nonprofit alternative centering on privacy, transparency and accountability. Furthermore, this problem is not specific just to Facebook. Other companies, including Google and Amazon, also gather and exploit extensive personal data, and are locked in a digital arms race that we believe threatens to destroy privacy altogether.

believe threatens to destroy privacy altogether.
GOVERNMENT REGULATION CAN HELP

Governments need to be better guardians of public welfare – including privacy. Many companies using various aspects of technology in new ways



have so far avoided regulation by stoking fears that rules might stifle innovation. Facebook and others have often claimed that they're better at regulating themselves in an ever-changing environment than a slow-moving legislative process could be.

But these companies have clearly failed to regulate themselves. As Facebook Chief Operating Officer Sheryl Sandberg admitted, "We did not think enough about the abuse" potential of their data collection practices.

So government regulation is both reasonable and necessary, to reduce the risks that social pollution and data abuse pose to political stability and personal privacy.

CONSIDERING NEW RULES

Congress is already discussing how to fight the social pollution of misleading advertising with hidden agendas. The Honest Ads Act would require both buyers and sellers of online political ads to disclose more information. Facebook's response to the Cambridge Analytica crisis has included switching from opposing this act to supporting it, and even announcing it's improving transparency before being required to by law.

This is a good start, but it does nothing to pro-

Inis is a good start, but it does nothing to protect people's privacy. New rules must govern privacy policies, which today bamboozle consumers into signing away their rights. Most online sites, apps and services have extremely long documents with obscure legal language that most users never read and can't digest. People simply click "agree" and move on.

A new rule could require standard notices, along the lines of financial services disclosures, communicating a company's privacy protections in a short and straightforward manner. Another rule could also let users opt out of certain uses or analyses of their data.

SEEKING BROADER PROTECTION

Even better than single-issue bills focused on political ads or privacy policies would be sweeping, proactive data protections for online consumers. The European Union's General Data Protection Regulation, which goes into effect on May 25, is a reasonable effort at achieving these ends.

One particularly interesting feature of the GDPR is the "right to be forgotten," which among other things allows individuals to ask companies to remove information about them from online databases. And the potential penalties for a firm violating the law are significant – up to 20 million euros or 4 percent of the company's global annual revenue.

However, even a broad law would not address the most fundamental problem. The internet at present is based on a single business model: surveillance capitalism. Online businesses need new ways to make money, without aggregating, exploiting or selling individuals' data.

CHANGING THE BUSINESS MODEL

To encourage companies to serve democratic principles and focus on improving people's lives, we believe the chief business model of the internet needs to shift to building trust and verifying information. While it won't be an immediate change, social media companies pride themselves on their adaptability and should be able to take on this challenge.

The alternative, of course, could be far more severe. In the 1980s, when federal regulators decided that AT&T was using its power in the telephone market to hurt competition and consumers, they forced the massive conglomerate to break up. A similar but less dramatic change happened in the early 2000s when cellphone companies were forced to let people keep their phone numbers even if they switched carriers.

Data, and particularly individuals' personal data, are the precious metals of the internet age. Protecting individual data while expanding access to the internet and its many social benefits is a fundamental challenge for free societies. Creating, using and protecting data properly will be crucial to preserving and improving human rights and civil liberties in this still young century. To meet this challenge will require both vigilance and vision, from businesses and their customers, as well as governments and their citizens.

Syria's latest chemical massacre demands a global response

Seven years into its catastrophic conflict, Syria has witnessed yet another major chemical strike. This time the target was the rebel-held city of Douma in Eastern Ghouta, just outside Damascus. The death toll currently stands at around 70 – making the attack as deadly as the infamous sarin strike at Khan Sheikhoun almost exactly a year ago to the day. It is thought the number of confirmed fatalities could rise to 150.

The White Helmets have reported

The White Helmets have reported that most of the victims were women and children. A local journalist said the scene "was like judgement day ... the situation, the fear, and the destruction are indescribable".

Like previous incidents, the at-

Like previous incidents, the attack has been widely blamed on Bashar al-Assad's government. The agent used has not been confirmed. Witnesses say they smelled chlorine, but the sheer level of destruction suggests that something more lethal may have been used as well. There are allegations that the regime used a sarin barrel bomb.

Whatever the precise details, noone should be surprised by what has happened. Horrified, yes – but Assad has repeatedly used chemical weapons in the civil conflict since 2012, and clearly he is not inclined to stop. As per usual, the incident has at-

racted condemnation from Assad's enemies around the world. US President Donald Trump tweeted that there will be a "big price" to pay for the attack, and derided Assad as an "animal". The European Union called for "an immediate response by the international community". Pope Fran-

cis weighed in too: "Nothing, nothing can justify the use of such devices of extermination against defenceless people and populations." Tough talk indeed. But whether or

not this turns into decisive action is another story. After all, we have been here many times before.

ENOUGH IS ENOUGH

This isn't to say the world hasn't responded at all. After Khan Shaykhun last year, for example, Trump ordered missile strikes against a Syrian airbase with 59 Tomahawk missiles. His reference to a "big price" suggests there could be a similar move in the offing. Asked how the US might respond to the latest attack, White House homeland security adviser Tom Bossert was asked whether a US response was coming and replied, "I wouldn't take anything off the table".

But previous measures, including Trump's missile strikes, have achieved little. Many at the United Nations have worked hard to bring Assad and his allies to account, but they have been stymied by Russia's Security Council veto. Former US president, Barack Obama, succeeded in getting Assad to the negotiating table and – together with the support of Russia – he agreed to accede Syria to the Chemical Weapons Convention, the main international agreement that bans and eliminates chemical arms. But Assad still continues to use chemical arms

Even if these moves have limited the scale of the Syrian government's chemical attacks, they have continued. Trump and his administration have repeatedly said Trump will observe the red line against chemical warfare set by his Obama – but the line is still being crossed, again and again and again.

As well as the big attacks that make headlines, Assad has repeatedly overseen smaller chlorine strikes. In 2017, Trump was asked in an interview about Assad's use of chlorine – and Trump didn't even know that Assad was still using chemical weapons. This doesn't suggest the president is treating this as a priority.

The world is acting, but it isn't doing

enough. SECURING THE FUTURE

Failing to act decisively now could set off a domino effect. Allowing anyone to carry out chemical strikes with impunity sends a dangerous message. If Assad is not held to his account for his actions, why should anyone else stop short of chemical violence for fear of the world's wrath?

Punishing violators in itself reinforces, supports and promotes the convention's ideals. Leaving them unpunished weakens the norm that chemical warfare is wrong – and failing to make an example of Assad threatens the entire weapons control regime. Some argue that violations will not necessarily bring down the Chemical Weapons Convention, but their arguments assume that those who do violate it will be punished somehow.

The world's progress in controlling chemical weapons should not be underestimated, and the admitted ly limited measures such as Trump's missile strikes that have been taken against Assad deserve credit. Still, it's incumbent on all those with the power to intervene to ask themselves how many times we have to see horrific and traumatic images of chemical warfare before stronger action is taken.

It's very easy to sit in front of a computer and type this. It's hardly an easy problem to solve, especially while Russia continues to support Assad's government and its forces. But there are severe implications if Assad is not stopped.

GOLD COAST, APR 12 [PTI]: Double-Olympic medallist Su shil Kumar [74kg] and event debutant Rahul Aware [57kg] provided the golden touch as India snared an impressive four medals on the opening day of the 21st Commonwealth Games' wrestling competition here.

Defending champion Sushil

barely spent any time on the mat, his final lasting just a minute and 20 seconds, and claimed easy victories to claim his third successive gold at the Games, a love affair that began in 2010 Delhi edition.

However, another defending champion Babita phogat [53kg] settled for a silver, while debu-tant Kiran happily flaunted a hard-earned bronze.

Kiran defeated Mauritian Katouskia Pariadhaven by fall in the repechage of the 76kg category for her first major medal at the international level.

Sushil took very little time to defeat Johannes Botha of South Africa on technical superioritv. The South African came into the bout struggling with a leg injury and that just about ended any chance of him getting an upset win over the former world champion Indian.

Prior to the final. Sushil. scored easy technical superiori-ty victories over Canada's Jevon Balfour and Pakistan's Muhammad Asad Butt before scoring a victory by fall over Australia's Connor Evans.

celebrated wrestler, however, doggedly avoided the



media after his triumph, refus ing to take questions despite repeated requests from even the Games news service volunteers.
Aware, on the other hand,

prevailed 15-7 over Canada's Steven Takahashi in an exciting contest during which the Indian was troubled by a groin niggle but chose to carry on with more than a minute left on the clock.

Aware's triumph opened In-dia's gold medal account in the three-day wrestling competition at the Games. He also had a smooth passage into the final with comprehensive wins over England's George Ramm, Australia's Thomas Cicchini and Pakistan's Muhammad Bilal.

"I have been waiting for this medal for the last 10 years. I can't describe how it feels to claim it. I missed out on 2010, even in 2014, the team was sent without trials. So, I am very happy that I could finally fulfill this dream," said the 26-yearold, who is also the reigning Commonwealth championships gold-medallist.

"My leg was troubling me for a while but I dedicate this to my guru [former CWG gold-medal-list Harishchandra Birajdar] who passed away in 2011, I am happy that all the efforts I put in got the result I wanted. I have fulfilled my family's dream. My opponent probably lacked intensity in the final few moments," added the wrestler from Harvana.

However, Babita settled for ver after being outmanuevered by Canada's Diana Weick-

er in the summit clash.

Babita, who claimed a silver in the 2010 edition before a gold in Glasgow, failed to break through her rival's defences, going down 2-5 in the contest.

"I think my weakness today was my attack, I should have ore aggressive but I gave my 100 per cent. I am satisfied with the intensity I put in but obviously I could not get the result I wanted," she said.

"I had a bit of a problem in my knees too but injuries are a wrestler's ornaments. We live with niggles, there is nothing there," she added.

While Babita's bout lacked spark, Aware's showdown with Takahashi was thoroughly engaging. The Indian trailed 6-7 at one stage but claimed points on takedown to recover and keep himself ahead.

Babita made the final after notching wins over Nigeria's Samuel Bose, Sri Lanka's Deepika Dilhani, and Australia's Caris-

Srikanth rises to World No. 1 ranking



NEW DELHI, APR 12 [PTI]: Kidambi Srikanth became the first Indian male shuttler to achieve the world number one ranking in the Badminton World Federation [BWF] chart released today.

Legendary Prakash Padukone was revered as the world number one player during his hey days before the modern day computerised ranking system was

introduced.

Srikanth thus became only the second Indian after Saina Nehwal, who had occupied the wom-

en's top spot in 2015, to achieve the feat, following his consistent run last year, when he won four titles to be also be-stowed with the Padma Shri award.

"I'm definitely delighted to have achieved

the World No. 1 ranking for the first time, and to become the first Indian man after Prakash sir to achieve this," said Sri-kanth, who trains at the Gopichand Academy.
"It's a testament to

the hard work of Gopi sir, my family, my oth-er coaches and support staff, my team GoSports Foundation, my spon-sors, and everyone else who has believed in me over the years."

Srikanth's meteoric rise coincided with world champion Viktor Axelsen's injury lay-off as the Danish star, forced to spend time off the court, slipped one place to second spot after failing to defend his Malaysia Open title that he had clinched in April last year.

After retiring from Indonesia Masters in Jan-

uary due to an ankle injury, Axelsen was forced to withdraw from India Open, the All England Championship, the European Championships as he had to undergo sur-gery on his foot.

The time away from

the court reflected on his ranking as he lost 1,660

points from his aggregate of 77,130 to slip to 75,470 as Srikanth held the number one with a total of 76,895

Srikanth, who had clinched titles at Indone sia, Australia, Denmark and Australia last year, rose to greater heights after he dispatched three-time Olympic silver medallist Lee Chong Wei in straight games in the crucial mixed team final to earn India a his-toric gold at the ongoing Commonwealth Games.

"It's been a great year, but I have many more goals, and right now, my focus is on coming good at the big events and achieving many more milestones. The Commonwealth Games is on, and this year also holds the Asian Games," the 25-year-old Indian said.

"My target is also to do my country proud at the Tokyo Olympics in two years' time. I thank everyone for believing in me, and hope to inspire many other Indians to keep striving in their pursuit of excellence, added Srikanth, who had stunned legendary Lin Dan to claim his maiden Super Series title at the 2014 China Open.

Praising Srikanth, Badminton Association of India [BAI] president Himanta Biswa Sarma said: It is a great thing for Indian badminton and I believe Srikanth's wonderful achievement will motivate other players to perform well and aim to go up higher on the rankings.

"I would like to congratulate him and helieve that he will continue in spire the generations to come he said

Among other Indians, Olympic silver medallist P V Sindhu, who was spo-radically ranked number two, is currently at third spot, while Saina is currently at the 12th place.

Demonetisation was 'not a good idea': Raghuram Rajan

NEW YORK, APR 12 (PTI): RBI's former governor Raghuram Rajan has said that he had made it quite clear to the government that the demonetisation was "not a good idea" and that its implementation was "not well-planned" since 87.5 per cent of the

currency was being demonetised.
On November 8, 2016, the Centre banned Rs 500 and Rs 1,000 currency notes to curtail the shadow economy and crack down on the use of illicit and counterfeit cash to fund illegal activities and

Speaking at the prestigious Harvard Kennedy School in Cambridge yesterday, 55-year-old Rajan rejected the claim that the Reserve Bank of India had not been consulted by the government before it went ahead with the demonetisation.

He, however, reiterated that the move to cancel 87.5 per cent of the currency val-

ue was "not a good idea".

"I didn't ever say that I wasn't consulted (on demonetisation). In fact, I have made it quite clear that we were consult-ed and we didn't think it was a good idea," said Rajan who is currently the Katherine

Dusak Miller Distinguished Service Professor of Finance at The University of Chicago's Booth School of Business.

He said demonetisation "was not a

well-planned, well thought-out, useful exercise and I told the government that when the idea was first mooted."

He added that any macro-economist would say that if 87.5 per cent of the cur-

rency is being demonetised, then it better

be made sure that a similar amount of currency is printed and ready to be put back in circulation.

"India went into it without having

done that. It had a negative economic impact but also the idea was that somehow people who had money stored in their basements without having paid taxes on it would overnight see reason and come to the government and say 'sorry we were

hiding this stuff, let me pay taxes on it,"

Rajan said, calling it a "naive view".

"Anybody who knows India, knows that very quickly we find ways around the system," he said, adding that with "essentially" all the money that was demonetised coming back into the system, the exercise did not have the direct effect that was sought.

While the longer term impact of demonetisation is yet to be seen, its negative economic impact included people not having currency, not being able to pay and economic activity plummeting especially in the informal sector.

There may be some longer term im that people think that if this sort of thing happens then the government is serious about collecting taxes. There may be greater tax payments but we still have to see strong evidence that that is true," he said.

Rajan also expressed concern that a

lot of people probably lost their jobs due to demonetisation but that has not been counted well as it would be mostly in the informal sector.

"The positive impacts (of demonetisation) are out there in the future. We have no idea whether they will be important. To ful at that time," he said while speaking at the 2018 Albert H Gordon Lecture on the topic 'Leverage, Financial Crises, and Policies to Raise Economic Growth'.

To a suggestion that demonetisation could have positively impacted growth, Rajan said "you would have to find a new economic theory to explain how it helped the economy".

He said most estimates of the cost of demonetisation vary between 1.5-2 per cent of the GDP.

"It would be a really die-hard government advocate who would say that the growth benefits of demonetisation were immediate," he said.

"Most of the supporters of the move would say that the benefits of the move are coming by changing the incentive to pay taxes. I would say yes, we will have to wait and see whether that in fact is true," he said.

Afghan district governor among seven killed in Taliban attack

GHAZNI, APR 12 [AFP]: Taliban militants launched a pre-dawn raid on a district gov ernment compound in Afghanistan today, killing at least seven people in-cluding the local governor, officials said.

Six police also died and 10 intelligence officers were wounded in the attack on the Khwaja Omari district headquarters in the southeastern province of Ghazni, the provincial governor's provincial governor's spokesman Aref Noori told AFP. The militants used a ladder to climb into the compound in the early hours of Thursday, deputy provincial Police Chief, Ramazan Ali Mohsini, told AFP.

Mohsini put the death toll at 13, including the governor, police and intelligence officers, adding scores of Taliban fighters were also killed but that could not be immediately confirmed. Afghan officials often give conflicting casualty figures immediately after an attack. "The attack is over and the district is under the control of Afghan security forces after reinforcement forces rushed to the scene following the Taliban attack," Mohsini added.

The Taliban claimed responsibility for the raid in a WhatsApp message to journalists, saying "more than 20 police" were killed and several others wounded.

"Our mujahideen have confiscated weapons and ammunition," Taliban Zabihullah spokesman Mujahid said. "In the attack three mujahideen were martyred and four

others were wounded."

The attack was one of the deadliest by the Tali-ban in several weeks and comes as the militants prepare to launch their annual spring offensive, which marks the beginning of the traditional fighting season.

The Taliban are under pressure to take up President Ashraf Ghani's offer of peace talks but so far they have not responded directly to the proposal.

My data also harvested, sold by Cambridge **Analytica: Zuckerberg**

LALIT K JHA WASHINGTON, APR 12 [PTI]: Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg has told US lawmakers that his personal data was also harvested and sold by Cambridge Analytica and he intends to initiate legal action against the British firm accused of stealing personal in-formation and using it for political purposes.

Zuckerberg replied "yes" when asked if his personal data was included in the information sold to the "malicious third parties" by the lawmakers during a testimony before the House Energy and Com-merce Committee yesterday.

Cambridge Analytica comomised personal information of approximately 87 million users, half a million of whom were from India.

The American people are concerned about how Face-book protects and profits from its users' data, lawmakers said.

Beginning this Monday, Facebook has started to notify those users whose data have heen breached

Responding to a volley of questions, Zuckerberg, 33, said it would take some time to work through all the changes



the company needs to make.

"But I am committed to getting this right, and that includes the basic responsibility of protecting people's informa-tion, which we failed to do with

Cambridge Analytica," he said.

Zuckerberg said he was getting to the bottom of what the UK-based firm did and will tell everyone who may have been affected.

"What we know now is that Cambridge Analytica improperly obtained some information about millions of Facebook members by buying it from an app developer that people had

shared it with," he said. "This information was gen erally information that people share publicly on their profile pages, like their name and profile picture and the list of pages that they follow. When we first contacted Cambridge Analytica, they told us that they had deleted the data. And then about a month ago, we heard a

new report that suggested that

this was not true," he said.

Now the Facebook is work ing with governments in the US, the UK and around the world to do a full audit of what they've done and to make sure that they get rid of any data that they still have.

Responding to a question, he told lawmakers that he intended to initiate legal action against the firm accused of stealing personal data and using it for political purposes in the 2016 US Presidential elections.

To make sure that no other app developers are out there misusing data, Facebook is now investigating every single app that had access to a large amount of people's informa-tion on Facebook in the past.

"If we find someone that improperly used data, we're going to ban them from our platform and tell everyone affected" he said

To prevent this from ever

happening again, Facebook is making sure developers can't access as much information, going forward, he said

The good news here is that we made some big changes to our platform in 2014 that would prevent this specific instance with Cambridge Analytica from happening again today. But there's more to do, and you can find more of the details of the other steps we're taking in the written statement I provided," he said.

Zuckerberg told lawmak-ers that Facebook had now removed the option for advertisers to exclude ethnic groups from targeting.

"Every time, there is a control right there - not buried in settings somewhere, but right there, when they're posting about who they want to share it with," he added.

Zuckerberg asserted that Facebook did not sell data.

"We don't sell data. That's not how advertising works, and I do think we could probably be doing a clearer job explaining that, given the misper-ceptions that are out there," he said in response to a question.

"Facebook is neither a me dia nor a financial institution, he said "I consider us to be a technology company, because the primary thing that we do is have engineers who write code and build products and services for other people.

"There are certainly other things that we do, too. We do pay to help produce content. We build enterprise software, although I don't consider us an enterprise software company. We build planes to help con-nect people, and I don't consider ourselves to be an aerospace

company," he said.

It is clear now that Facebook didn't do enough to prevent these tools from being used for harm. That goes for fake news, foreign interference in elections and hate speech, as well as developers and data privacy, he said.

"We didn't take a broad enough view of our responsibility and that was a big mistake. It was my mistake, and I am sorry. I started Facebook, I run it, and, at the end of the day, I am responsible for what happens here. So, now, we have to go through every part of our relationship with people to make sure that we're taking a broad enough view of our responsibility," he said.

China continues its provocations in South, East China seas: Pompeo

WASHINGTON, APR 12 [PTI]: China continues its provocations in the South and East China seas and is making a "concerted" effort to compete with the US, CIA Director Mike Pompeo has warned while identifying Russia as a "danger" for America.

Pompeo, who is a nominee for the position of the Secretary of State, asserted that the State Department must be at the center of formulating and executing the China policy.

He also called for taking a tough position on a host of foreign policy issues including Russia, Iran and North Korea.


"Even while America has re-established a po-sition of strength in our diplomatic relationship, China continues its con-certed and coordinated effort to compete with the United States in dip lomatic, military, and economic terms.

"For years, through Intellectual propert theft and coercive tech-nology transfer, China has exploited weak US trade policy and leeched wealth and secrets from our economy. Militarily, it continues its provocation in the South and East China seas, in cyberspace, and even in outer space," Pompeo said.

He said this in his prepared remarks for his hearing conformation before the Senate Foreign Relations Relations Committee, excerpts of which was released by the White

House late last night.

He said the current administration determined to work diplomatically with the Chinese government in an effort to develop a more productive bilateral partnership.

WASHINGTON, APR 12 [PTI]: A new NASA satellite, which will hunt for exoplanets that have the potential to harbour alien life, is on schedule to launch next week.

The Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite [TESS], will launch from Space Launch Complex 40 at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station in Florida on April 16, at 6:32 pm [EDT].

"We expect TESS will discover a number of planets whose atmospheric compositions, which hold potential clues to the presence of life, could be precisely measured by future observers," said George Ricker, TESS principal investigator.

With the help of a gravitational assist from the Moon, the spacecraft will settle into a 13.7-day orbit around Earth, Sixty days after launch, and following tests of its instruments, the satellite will begin its initial two-year mission.

The satellite, developed by scientists Massachusetts Institute of Technology [MIT] in the US, aims to discover thousands of nearby exoplanets, including at least 50 Earth-sized ones. The spacecraft, not much larger than a refrigerator, carries four cameras that will survey the nearest, brightest

stars in the sky for signs of passing planets.

TESS will spend two years scanning nearly the entire sky - a field of view that can encompass more than 20 million stars. The first year of observations will map the 13 sectors encompassing the southern sky, and the second year will map the 13 sectors of the northern sky.

The spacecraft will be looking for a phe-

nomenon known as a transit, where a planet passes in front of its star, causing a periodic and regular dip in the star's brightness.

method to spot more than 2,600 confirmed exoplanets, most of them orbiting faint stars 300 to 3,000 light-years away.
"We learned from Kepler that there are

more planets than stars in our sky, and now TESS will open our eyes to the variety of planets around some of the closest stars," said Paul Hertz, Astrophysics Division direc-

tor at NASA Headquarters.

The TESS science team at MIT aims to measure the masses of at least 50 small planets whose radii are less than four times that of Earth.

Many of TESS's planets should be close enough to our own that, once they are identified by TESS, scientists can zoom in on them using other telescopes, to detect atmospheres, characterize atmospheric conditions, and even look for signs of habitability
