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Scrub typhus has claimed six lives in West Sikkim

SUMMIT REPORT ANGTOK, 12 SEPT:

Six people have reportedly died due to scrub typhus in the State so far. As per the state government, only two of these deaths are Tahoratory confirmed' deaths while the rest are suspected to have died due to scrub typhus. All cases reported thus far come from

West Sikkim.
Till August, 12 cases of scrub typhus were reported in West Sikkim. While 101 cases of suspected scrub typhus were reported, only 12 tested positive for the disease.

Meanwhile, Health Department has begun spreading awareness on scrub typhus in all the districts. Informa-tion regarding the outbreak of scrub typhus has been sent to the Center Surveillance Unit and the State Surveillance Unit of the Health Department is in touch with CSU Delhi.

Districts, PHCs and PHSCs have been directed to remain vigilant on reporting of fever cases while suspected cases are to be tested for scrub typhus and early treatment of individual is advised.

Testing facilities for scrub typhus are available in PHC, District Hos-pital and STNM Hospital.



Save the Minor by helping them heal from the trauma of crimes visited on them

The safety of children around grown-ups even in environments where they are expected to be safe is being discussed at the national level and on even media platform at present. Children, however, have always been in harm's way and Sikkim is not new to disturbing incidents of minors being targeted with sexual violence. It is important that these discussions continue and the society does not get inured to the horror of sexual offences being committed against children just because it gets reported so often.

Words fail you when it comes to deploring the rape of a minor. While rape in itself is a reprehensible act, when the victim is a minor, the heinousness of the crime multiplies. The crime is no longer one in which the victim is violated physically, but becomes a transgression which scars an innocent mind permanently.
Unfortunately most cases of child abuse and rape of minors are committed by people known to the child. Family friends and relatives, whom a child is normally conditioned to trust, are known to betray the faith and turn into animals as are neighbours and acquaintances that families leave children unattended around. While the Courts and the conscience of the predator will decide how the culprit lives with his guilt, it is the impact of such crimes on the fragile minds of children that is a matter of deeper and continued concern. Everything that a child has been led to believe and conditioned to accept [like trusting and respecting her/ his elders] are felled in one swoop of a warped mind. As much as the culprit needs to be punished, the child needs to be saved. The emotional trauma that is sure to haunt the mind which is still uncertain of what singled her/ him out to be targeted with such a crime needs to be

Minds of the minors understand and weigh everything as rewards and punishments. Already confused, the child cannot be left to find the reasons behind the crime by herself. She should not be allowed to go through the rest of her formative years trying to figure out what she had done wrong to deserve such 'pun-ishment'. She has to be told that she was in no way responsible for what happened to her. It is important that victims understand that a deranged mind and ignorant elders allowed the crimes to happen. Everyone responsible for the child's care has to apologise to her for having ignored the warning signs [every culprit must have displayed some signs of his paedophilia] and allowed the crime to visit her. Victims also need professional help. It is now obvious that most parents don't have the wherewithal to handle such situations and ensure that their children heal properly. Hence, they along with the child need to be counselled by professionals so that the situation does not become worse

for the child who has already suffered enough.

It is also important for all parents to look out for possible paedophiles in the family or the neighbourhood. Because this is such a repulsively deviant behaviour to discover in someone you know, most peo ple tend to subconsciously ignore it even when it is obvious. We do so at our own peril.

Religion is not the only reason Rohingyas are being forced out of Myanmar

Recent weeks have seen an escalation of violence against the Rohingya in Rakhine, the poorest state of Myanmar. A tide of displaced people are seeking refuge from atrocities

- they are fleeing both on foot and by boat to Bangladesh. It is the latest surge of displaced people, exacerbated by the recent activity of the Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army

Religious and ethnic differenc es have been widely considered the leading cause of the persecution. But it is becoming increasingly hard to believe that there are not other actors at play. Especially given that Myanmar is home to 135 official recognised ethnic groups (the Rohingya were removed from this list in 1982).

In analysing the recent violence, much of the western media has fo-cused on the role of the military and the figure of the de facto leader Aung San Suu Kyi. Her status as a Nobel Peace prize laureate has been widely questioned since the latest evidence of atrocities emerged.

She continues to avoid condemn

ing the systematic violence against the Rohingya. At least the media gaze has finally shifted somewhat towards their plight.

But there remain issues that are not being explored. It is also critical to look beyond religious and ethnic differences towards other root causes of persecution, vulnerability and

We must consider vested political and economic interests as contributing factors to forced displacement in Myanmar, not just of the Rohingya people but of other minorities such as the Kachin, the Shan, the Karen, the Chin, and the Mon.

and the Mon. LAND GRABBING

Land grabbing and confiscation in Myanmar is widespread. It is not a new phenomenon.

Since the 1990s, military juntas have been taking away the land of smallholders across the country, without any compensation and regardless of ethnicity or religious status.

Land has often been acquired for "development" projects, including military base expansions, natural resource exploitation and extraction, large agriculture projects, infrastruc-ture and tourism. For example, in Kachin state the military confiscated more than 500 acres of villagers' land to support extensive gold mining.

Development has forcibly dis-placed thousands of people - both internally and across borders with Bangladesh, India, and Thailand - or compelled them to set out by sea to Indonesia, Malaysia and Australia. OPEN LETTER FROM ONE NOBEL LAUREATE TO ANOTHER:

As we witness the unfolding horror we pray for you to be courageous and resilient again.

We pray for you to speak out for justice, human rights and the unity of your people. We pray for you to intervene in the escalating crisis and guide your people back towards the path of

Myanmar: Major ethnic groups

In 2011, Myanmar instituted economic and political reforms that led it to be dubbed "Asia's final frontier" as it opened up to forinvestment. Shortly afterwards, 2012, violent attacks escalated against the Ro-hingya in Rakhine state and, to a less-

er extent, against the Muslim Karen. Meanwhile, the government of Myanmar established several laws relating to the manage ment and distribution of farmland.

These moves were severely criticised for reinforcing the ability of large corporations to profit from land grabs. For instance, agribusiness multinationals such as POSCO Daewoo have eagerly entered the market, contracted by the government.

A REGIONAL PRIZE

Myanmar is positioned between countries that have long eyed its re-sources, such as China and India. Since the 1990s, Chinese companies have exploited timber, rivers and minerals in Shan State in the North.

This led to violent armed conflicts between the military regime and armed groups, including the Kachin Independence Organization (KIO)

and its ethnic allies in eastern Kachin State and northern Shan State. Rakhine In

State, Chinese and Indian interests are part of broader China-India relations. interests These revolve principal-ly around the construction of infrastructure and pipelines in the region.
Such projects claim to guarantee em-

ployment, transit fees and oil and gas evenues for the whole of Myanmar.

Among numerous development

projects, a transnational pipeline built by China National Petroleum Company (CNPC) connecting Sittwe, the capital of Rakhine, to Kunming, China, began operations in September 2013. The wider efforts to take Myanmar oil and gas from the Shwe gas field to Guangzhou, China, are well documented.

A parallel pipeline is also expect-ed to send Middle East oil from the Kyaukphyu port to China. However, the neutral Advisory Commission on Rakhine State has urged the Myanmar government to carry out a com-

prehensive impact assessment.

In fact, the Commission recognises that pipelines put local communities at

risk. There is significant local tension related to land seizures, insufficient compensation for damages, environmental degradation, and an influx of foreign workers rather than increased local employment opportunities.

Meanwhile, the Sittwe deep-sea port was financed and construct-ed by India as part of the Kaladan Multi-modal Transit Transport Project. The aim is to connect the northeast Mizoram state in India with the Bay of Bengal.

Coastal areas of Rakhine State are clearly of strategic importance to both India and China. The government of Myanmar therefore has vested interests in clearing land to prepare for further development and to boost its already rapid economic growth.

All of this takes place within the wider context of geopolitical ma-neuvering. The role of Bangladesh in fuelling ethnic tensions is also hotly contested. In such power struggles, the human cost is terribly high.

COMPOUNDING THE VULNERABILITY OF MINORITIES

In Myanmar, the groups that fall victim to land grabbing have often started in an extremely vulnerable state and are left even worse off. The treatment of the Rohingya in Rakhine State is the highest profile example of broader expulsion that is inflicted on minorities.

When a group is marginalised and oppressed it is difficult to reduce their vulnerability and protect their rights, including their property. In the case of the Rohingya, their ability to protect their homes was decimated through the revocation of their Burmese citizenship.
Since the late 1970s around a mil-

lion Rohingya have fled Myanmar to escape persecution. Tragically, they are often marginalised in their host countries.

With no country willing to take responsibility for them, they are either forced or encouraged to continuously cross borders. The techniques used to encourage this movement have trapped the Rohingya in a vulnerable state.

The tragedy of the Rohingya is part of a bigger picture which sees the oppression and displacement of minorities across Myanmar and into neighbouring countries.

The relevance and complexity of religious and ethnic issues in Myanmar are undeniable. But we cannot ignore the political and economic context and the root causes of dis-

placement that often go undetected.

Stephen King: a master of horror who finds terror in the everyday

Stephen King's writing spans more than 40 years and more than 60 books, and while the content of his fiction varies widely, lying under-neath it is a picture of the contemporary world that his "constant readers" devour, buying over 350m copies of his novels. This makes him one of the most successful authors in the world not bad for an English teacher who threw his first novel in the bin to be rescued by his wife Tabitha, who convinced him to publish it.

King's career began with the pub-

lication of Carrie in 1974, the story of a teenage girl's transition from girl to woman, and from bullied child to vengeful adult. The central character remains one that readers can relate to: a lonely child whose life is filled with emotional abuse.

This is an important aspect of King's success. His stories are not usually about superheroes that live in an unrecognisable landscape, they are everyday people, living in a recognisable America. More than this though, the stories he tells are a reflection of the lives of these ordinary people, even as they contain horrors and supernatural events that are extraordinary. The Shining, one of King's most famous novels, is the sto ry of a dysfunctional and abusive fam ily unit. It deals with emotional and physical abuse - and the anger and

neglect of an alcoholic parent, under the guise of a haunted house story. It was a story that King was familiar with himself, as he has spoken openly about his troubles with alcohol.

Themes like these are found throughout King's work. Loss of innocence, abuse, and the battle between good and evil are woven into his stories. He weaves these tales together, linking them to each other in a web that readers

take great plea-sure in discovering.

One of the greatest abilities King has as an author is being able to understand the fears of his readers and to

translate those fears into a work of fiction. From abuse to the loneliness of poverty and hunger, King is able to connect to his readership and to offer them a sense of hope: people just like them, he seems to say, can overcome any trial. Like the children in IT. or The Body (which was famously m into the movie Stand By Me), King tells his readers they can achieve ex-traordinary things when they work together for a common good.

King writes primarily to the work-ing class audience he grew up among, whom he calls his "constant reader and he excels at providing detailed and

familiar description of life in a working class environment. In The Stand, for example, Arnette is a kind of work-ing class everywhere and through his portrayal of this town he highlights the problems faced by working class families across America in both the late seventies and late eighties, as employment was disappearing.

Although King is considered to be

a horror writer, his work encompass-

more horror. He has written de-tective fiction (such as the Bill Hodges trilogy), time travel stories (11.22.63), science

tion, and westerns, as well as horror sometimes all in a single novel, as
 with The Langoliers and the Dark Tower series. He writes in a style that makes his fiction accessible to people aged from 15 to 100, a style that has made him one of the most popular authors in the world.

RECOGNITION AS A 'REAL' WRITER

But just because King is one of the most popular authors on the planet, does this make him one of the great American writers, like Edgar Allen Poe? Or is he merely a master of pulp fiction – good for reading on a plane but not to be taken seriously? King's success as a

writer has only recently translated to serious literary success. Popular fiction has long been considered as trashy and not been taken seriously. Slowly, however, King's work is being considered

for its literary content.

Stephen King's Gothic by John
Sears is a ground-breaking academic work on the author. It is inspiring a growing number of academics who find literary value in King's writing and there have been several aca-demics who have championed King as a serious literary author, including Tony Magistrale, who has writ-ten several books on King and his work. Recently, a special issue of the Science Fiction Film and Television journal was dedicated to King and a new journal Pennywise Dreadful: The Journal of Stephen King Studies is set to launch is first edition in November

As King approaches his 70th birthday in September, his popularity does not seem to be declining. There are several new adaptations of his works, including IT, Gerald's Game and Mr Mercedes and his forthcoming collaboration Sleeping Beauties, with son Joe Hill, is being hotly anticipated. The blend of realism, social commentary and horror means that the Grandmaster of horror's career is still going strong, and he is - finally - being considered as a "real" writer. 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Tamang murder trial through video conferencing not possible: Judge

the Madan Tamang murder case of 2010 is not possible through video conferencing owing to infrastructural problems, the chief sessions judge

here was informed today. The Darjeeling district judge in a communication to City Sessions Court Chief Judge K K Kumai said that at present there was no Internet

facility in Darjeeling.
The facility has been suspended by the West Bengal government since June 18 in a bid to curb communication among trouble makers in the hills, where an indefinite bandh called by Gorkha Janmukti Morcha president Bimal Gurung is in force for three months.

The communication also informed that irregular electricity supply was another hindrance to holding any such trial through video conferencing from the hills.

These apart, there is no court room in the Darjeeling district court large enough to hold the trial of 47 accused persons to-gether, said the communication that was submitted before the court of judge in-charge Sanjoy Mukher jee in the absence of chief judge Kumai.

The Supreme Court had on August 16 ordered that the proceedings should be conducted through video conferencing from Darjeeling.

The apex court had asked the chief sessions judge's court here to hold the trial mainly through video conferencing for which appropriate facil-ity should be set up at Kolkata and Darjeeling.

It had, however, clari-

fied that if the trial court was of the opinion that physical presence of a particular accused and/ or a witness was necessary before the chief sessions judge's court, the judge can pass specific

order in this regard.
The chief judge of city sessions court judge had on August 17 discharged GJM supremo Bimal Gu-rung in the Madan Tamang murder case and directed that charges be framed against 47 other

accused persons.

Among the 47 acc cused are Gurung's wife Asha and several other

leaders of GJM. Gorkha India League leader Madan Tamang was attacked with sharp weapons when he was overseeing prepara-tions for a public meeting at Clubside in the heart of Darjeeling town on May 21, 2010, and was declared brought dead at the sadar hospital there.

The Supreme Court had on October 8, 2013, directed transfer of hearing in the case from Dar-jeeling sadar court to the city sessions court here a petition by Tamang's widow Bharati.

She had claimed that witnesses could be im-pacted if the trial was held in Darjeeling.

State govt's need to submit UC within one year or funds will stop: NEC secy

SHILLONG, SEP 12 (PTI): The Centre has advised state governments in the North-east region to submit Utilisation Cer-tificates (UC) of Central projects within one year or else the funds will stop, a top official of the North Eastern Council said today. North Eastern Coun-

cil secretary Ram Muivah said, "They (state governments) must submit Utilisation Certificates within one year failing which the Ministry of Finance our chief controller of accounts, will stop release of funds for any project of more than one and a half year.

He said, "From now on we (the NEC) will be very strict. Projects delayed by five years will automatically be closed and be treated in 'as is where is basis', in consul-



tation with the respective state governments.

The NEC official also informed that no projects will be funded for

close it and the liability will be taken over by the state governments," he said.

Several major projects funded by the NEC are facing undue delays in all the states in the

region, according to the NEC monthly report. Some of these projects were delayed by over 100 months.

Reacting to delays of projects in Meghalaya, Muivah said that although the construction is slightly slow in the state but the qualities are good at least for the proj-

The NEC has, howev-

er, exempted power and road projects, he said.

"Exception for power was because they have to survey the flow of water and the volume of water and this takes up to three to four years," he said adding that as far as roads is concerned, roads of longer distance may not be possible to complete within five years.

Meanwhile, the NEC

has appointed IIT-Guwa-hati as the regional labour monitor for the North East Road Sector Development Scheme (NERSDS), Muiv-ah said, adding that they have already submitted

their findings.

Under the NERSDS,
the NEC has submitted nearly 50 roads to the Centre with a total budget of over Rs 3500 crore, Muivah said.

The proposal is accepted by the DoNER ministry and the same is under examination of the Ministry of Finance.
"Once that is ap-

proved, we hope to be able to improve the roads (to be identified by the state government) for the next three years. Our focus will be interstate roads as the Ministry has advised us to take up and focus on the interstate road," he said.

We are facing livelihood issues: Meat-sellers of UP

meat business in Uttar Pradesh has badly been hit, affecting the livelihood of a large number of people belonging to the minority and Dalit communi-ties, said the speakers at a public hearing here today.

The event, organised by SEHAR, a voluntary group, was attended by small meat-sellers, hotel and dairy owners from Noida, Loni (Ghaziabad) and the Mewat region of Rajasthan and Haryana.
Retired chief justice of the

Delhi High Court AP Shah, who was a jury member at the event, said, "Those from the minority and Dalit communities, involved in the meat and fish trades, are being harassed. Their livelihood cannot be taken away as it is guar-

anteed by the Constitution."

The meat-sellers and hotel and roadside eatery owners from Loni and Noida alleged 'harassment" at the hands of the local police.

"Around 60-70 shops in the slums of sectors 8,9 and 10 cal authorities. The police ask no-objection certificates (NOCs), which are not being issued by the authority concerned," said Ali Nabi, a meatseller from Noida.

Many sellers and others involved in the meat business said they were facing livelihood issues for months now due to restrictions and the police and local authorities demanding NOCs from them.

"My family is in the meat trade for over three decades.

due to the restrictions. I cannot send my kids to school as have no money," said Ismail from Noida.

CPI(M) leader Subhashini Ali, who was also a jury member at the event, alleged that the curbs on the cattle trade in Uttar Pradesh had led to "extortion by corrupt policemen and so-called gau-rakshaks (cow vigilantes)".

Ali Faiz, owner of a meat shop in Loni, complained that municipality was not issuing NOCs, even when all the pre"Officials are demanding

NOCs after the regime change in Uttar Pradesh. The parameters laid down by the Food department have been met by us, but the municipality is still not issuing the NOCs," he said.

The Centre had, on May 23, issued a notification, banning the sale and purchase of cattle from animal markets for the purpose of slaughter.

In July, the ban was staved for a period of three months by the Supreme Court.

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Brexit bill passes first vote in British parliament

LONDON, SEP 12 (AFP): British MPs voted in favour of a bill today to end Britain's EII member ship, a key moment for the government's Brexit strategy despite oppo-sition accusations of an unprecedented power grab. Lawmakers voted by 326 to 290 in favour of backing the legislation, after more than 13 hours of debate, which will now go forward for further

scrutiny by MPs.

The bill is aimed at repealing the 1972 law through which Britain joined the bloc, transferring in bulk around 12,000 existing EU reg-ulations onto the British statute books. It is the next step in implement-ing last year's historic referendum vote to leave the EU, after Prime Min-ister Theresa May formally notified Brussels of Britain's withdrawal in March.

May's Conservative government won to-day's parliamentary vote thanks to its alliance with the Northern Ireland's Democratic Unionist Party (DUP). The premier described the outcome as a "historic decision" which "gives certainty and clarity ahead of our withdrawal from the Eu-

ropean Union".

"Although there is more to do, this decision means we can move on with negotiations with solid foundations and we continue to encourage MPs from all parts of the UK to work together in sup-port of this vital piece of legislation," May said in

UNSC imposes tough sanctions on North Korea

(PTI): The UN Security Council has unanimously passed a US-drafted resolution that imposes strongest sanctions ever on North Korea, including restricting its oil imports and banning textile exports, to curb the reclusive nation's nuclear programme.

The move comes in response to the sixth and largest nuclear test by North Korea on September 3.

"Today, we are saying the world will never accept a nuclear-armed North Korea. And today, the Security Council is saying that if the North Korean regime does not halt its nuclear pro-gramme, we will act to stop it ourselves," US Ambassador to the UN Nikki Haley said as



the 15-member UN body yes terday passed the resolution on North Korea.

'We are done trying to prod the regime to do the right thing. We are now acting to stop it from having the ability to continue doing the wrong thing," the Indian-origin diplo-

She said the international community was doing that by hitting North Korea's ability to fund its weapons programme. The US had originally proposed harsher sanctions, including a total ban on oil imports by North Korea. But the vote was passed only after Pyongyang allies Russia and China agreed to the reduced measures.

Noting that oil "is the life-blood" of North Korea's effort to build and deliver a nuclear weapon, Haley said the reso-lution reduces almost 30 per cent of oil provided to the North by cutting off over 55 per cent of its gas, diesel, and heavy fuel oil.

"Today's resolution com-pletely bans natural gas and other oil byproducts that could be used as substitutes for the reduced petroleum. This will cut deep," she said.

Haley said these are by far the strongest measures ever imposed on North Korea.

"They give us a much better chance to halt the regime's ability to fuel and finance its nucle ar and missile programmes. But we all know these steps ment them completely and aggressively," she said.

When these new stronger sanctions are added to those passed last month, over 90 per cent of North Korea's publicly reported exports are now fully banned. Moreover, this resolution also puts an end to the regime making money from the 93,000 North Korean citizens it sends overseas to work and heavily taxes, she noted.

"Beyond the USD 1.3 bil-lion in annual revenues we will cut from North Korea, new maritime authorities will help us stop them from obtaining funds by smuggling coal and other prohibited materials around the world by ship," Ha-ley said.



Fresh plea filed in Pak court over Bhagat Singh's case

LAHORE, SEPT 12 (PTI): A fresh petition has been filed in the Lahore High Court for the early hear ing of a case to prove the innocence of legendary freedom fighter Bhagat Singh in the murder case of a British police officer, seven months after the court sought a larger bench to hear the plea.

The court has yet to form the larger bench.

Advocate Imtiaz Rashid Qureshi of Bhagat dation yesterday filed an application for early hearing of its petition.

"I have filed the petition in the LCH for early hearing of the Bhagat Singh case. Today I requested the registrar to get a date fixed for hearing of the case and hopefully the case will be heard this month," Queshi told PTI today.

He said he has also written to the federal government for making statue of Bhagat Singh at Shadman Chowk (central part of Lahore) where he was hanged along with his two comrades.

"I have written to the government for building a statue of Singh but has not vet got any response from it in this regard," he added.

A division bench of the Lahore High Court in February had requested the chief justice to constitute a larger bench to hear the petition seeking reopening of the case of Singh

In the petition, Qureshi had said Singh was a freedom fighter and fought for indepen-dence of undivided India

Singh was hanged by British rulers on March 23, 1931 at the age of 23, after being tried under charges for hatching a conspiracy against the colonial government. The case was filed against Singh, Sukhdev and Raiguru for allegedly killing British police officer John P Saunders.

Taking plea in his peti-tion Advocate Qureshi said Singh was initially jailed for life but later awarded death sentence in another "fabricated case".

Pak SC accepts Sharif family's plea against disqualification

preme Court today accepted a plea to form a five-judge bench to hear the review petitions of ousted prime minister Nawaz Sharif, his children, son-in-law and Fi-nance Minister Ishaq Dar challenging his disqualification in the Panama Papers scandal.

The separate petitions were filed by Shar-if and his family against the judgement on July 28 that disqualified 67-year-old Sharif for dis-honesty and ruled that corruption cases be filed against his family and Dar over the scandal.

Sharif, his daughter Maryam, sons Hussain and Hasan, son-in-law Muhammad Safdar and Dar in their petitions asked the court to review the judgement as it vioof law. A three-member bench headed by Justice Ejaz Afzal Khan and comprising Justice Sheikh Azmat Saeed and Justice Ijazul Ehsan too up the petitions.

 \mathbf{M} ore than 300,000 Rohingya Muslims have fled to Bangladesh following a two-week surge in violence in majority Buddhist Myanmar, formerly Burma. Aid officials said refugee camps in the neighboring country were reaching capacity, as fleeing Rohingyas claimed security forces and Buddhist mobs in Rakhine state had attacked them and set fire to their homes. The violence began on 25 August, when an ethnic Rohingya insurgent group attacked police posts in Myanmar and security forces retaliated. The UN has condemned what it called a cruel military operation against the minority community and said it appeared to be a "textbook example of ethnic cleansing". But the Myanmar government has dismissed the Rohingya claims, with leader Aung San Suu Kyi blaming fake news and a misinformation campaign.

China not to share Brahmaputra data for now due to upgradation of collection station

BEIJING, SEP 12 (PTI): China today said that it cannot share with India the hydrological data of the Brahma-putra River for the time being as the data collection station in Tibet is being upgraded. China, however, said it is ready to "keep communication" with India to reopen the Nathu La pass in Sikkim for the Indian pilgrims visiting Kailash and Manasarovar in Tibet, which it had suspended in mid June over the Doklam standoff.

"For long time we have conduct-

ed cooperation on the river data with the Indian side. But to upgrade and renovate the relevant station in the Chinese side, we do not have the conditions now to collect the relevant statistics of the river," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told media here.

Asked when will China provide the data, which was reportedly sus-pended due to the Doklam standoff, he said. "We will later consider that."

Asked whether India has been informed about not sharing of the hydrological data, he said according to his information the Indian side is aware of it.

On August 18, Indian External Affairs Ministry spokesman Raveesh Kumar had said there is an existing expert-level mechanism, established in 2006, and there are two MoUs under which China is expected to share hydrological data on rivers Sutlej and Brahmaputra with India during the flood season of May 15 to June 15.

"For this year, we have not received hydrological data from the

data share by upper riparian state, China, to lower riparian states, India and Bangladesh is essential ev-ery monsoon to allow anticipation of the flow of the water and take necessary measures to deal with flooding in India's northeastern states.






