SKM wants pay revision effective from 2016, arrears in one release SUMMIT REPORT

GANGTOK, 03 JUN:
Sikkim Krantikari Morcha has demanded that the new pay and scale be effective from 01 January, 2016 and that arrears against it be paid out in one release and not staggered as has been proposed. The State Govern-

ment, it may be recalled, has accepted the recommendations of the 5th Pay Commission and that the new scales will be revised notionally from 01 Jan 2016 and effectively from 01 Jan 2017 and arrears paid out in three

equal instalments.

SKM publicity secretary, Abhishek Sharma, and CLC President of Gangtok, S. Gurung, today said that the gov-ernment has sidestepped the legitimate rights of the employees from get-ting their due arrears as established norms with this move and adding that the Government cannot snatch away the rights of employees who have served for the state.

They have also demanded regularization of adhoc teachers ap-pointed under the Sarva Siksha Abhiyan and that HRDD consider the case at par with the govern-ment decision to regu-larized other temporary employees.



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SILTA takes issue with inordinate delay in Stairway to Heaven project

SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 03 JUN:

Sikkim Indigenous Lepcha Tribal Association [SILTA] has expressed deep dismay over the incomplete state over the incomplete state of Romlyang Tungrong, the Stairway to Heaven project at Daramdin, West Sikkim, despite 22 years having elapsed since the project commenced.

The association stressed

that the project was very important as it is related to the be-liefs of the Lepcha community.

SILTA advisor, Phuchung Tshering Lepcha, had filed a Right To Information application with the Buildings & Housing Department [West/ South] with eight questions related to the project. It is informed that the RTI was filed on 05 May, 2018 with an official reply received on 31 May.



However, he expressed deep dissatisfaction over what he sees as the incompleteness of the answers from

the concerned department.

The project was started in the year 1996 at Daramdin but after some foundation

works, the project has been

left incomplete. He informed that his RTI query revealed that the concerned department had awarded the work to contractor Mahendra Lakhotia released mobilization

no substantial work has been

carried out on site.
SILTA president, Mayalmit Lepcha, alleged that the de-partment has failed to furnish proper information and suspected corruption as having held up the project.

She added that the disinter-

est of the State government has hurt the sentiments of the Lepcha community the world over.

She informed that as per the RTI answers, Building & Housing Department, Cultural & Heritage Department and Lepcha Association of Sikkim were responsible for the project.

"It is very disappointing that Sikkim Lepcha Association has failed to fulfill the aspirations of the community. SLA should explain the situation to the community," she

Ms Lepecha also demanded the Lepcha MLAs, Ministers and members of the ruling party explain the delay and has also served an ultimatum of one month to the Building & Housing Department, Cul-ture & Heritage Department and Sikkim Lepcha Associa-

tion to explain the delay.

She informed that SILTA will also go to the people with this issue and will take stringent action if nothing happens.

"We have scholars and experts of Lepcha history, so we are ready to provide all possible technical support and information to the government for the completion of the project in the earliest," she said.

In a response to the RTI que-ries of Phuchung Tshering Lepcha, the implementing agency

State Building & Housing Department revealed that as of now, the department has already disbursed Rs 47,783,397 [2.20 crore in mobilisation advance, stock booking to the tune of Rs.1,21,27,773, contingency and consultancy charges amounting to Rs 93,05,624 and contractor bill of Rs 43,50,000].

The implementing agency further revealed that the work was entrusted to contractor Mahendra Lakhotia but delays forced it to withdraw the project from the contractor, adding that the said project was again retendered in November 2011, which is still under negotiation process with PAN Architecture & PP Architects in Department of Planning & North Eastern Council and Finance Revenue & Expenditure Departments.

MUMBAI, JUN 3 (PTI): Rising inflation and high crude oil prices will weigh on the minds of the six Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) members at their three-day meeting beginning here tomorrow to decide the

Retail inflation (CPI), a key data for the RBI, has remained above 4 per cent since November 2017. The government has mandated the RBI to restrict the retail inflation at 4 per cent (with a margin of +/- 2 per cent),

while supporting growth.

The RBI has refrained from revising the reporate since August 2017 inflationary concerns.

harden-Indicating ing of the interest rate scenario, several major lenders including SBI, PNB and ICICI Bank have already raised their lending rates from June 1. Some of the banks have also increased the depos-

"Notwithstanding the clamour for a rate hike in market, we believe ground realities call for caution and not rate action," India's largest lender SBI said in a research report.

One of the reasons it cited was that while the GDP numbers are strong, private consumption continues to lose pace, dropping to 6.6 per cent in 2017-18 from 7.3 per

The MPC, headed by RBI Governor Urjit Patel, will for the first time meet for three days as against the usual two.

In the last MPC meet, held in April, RBI Deputy Governor and member of the panel Viral Acharya had indicated that he would vote for withdrawal of monetary

Going Green Weed hypocrisy out of WED

It's World Environment Day on Tuesday. The State has been consistently trying to reconnect the people with their organic and more environmentally conscious roots at least when it comes to farming for a while now. Before that, there was the Green Mission. the Ten Minutes to Earth initiative and the attempt to have all road projects include avenue plantation as part of their work have been some of the efforts towards this end. Some efforts have done well, while others have received only token observance by the people. On Tuesday, the Chief Minister's Green School awards will be conferred, and hopefully this initiative has had some success in building a constituency for the environment among the young, which, really, is the only way to go if the planet is to have a future. The present elder generation has distanced itself too far away from ecological concerns to be rehabilitated and it will fall upon the young to grow up with more sensi-

tivity to correct the damage we have wrecked. The criteria for the CM's Green School award is still not very widely known, but one hopes that it provides durable guidelines to equip students with the capacity to see through the hypocrisy of our generation which sees nothing wrong, in fact even makes a virtue out of doing things only for photo-ops. Environment Day events have become a gathering of VIPs and a gaggle of pleased-to-be-among VIPs who arrive at the venue one person to a vehicle and leave behind a litter of used cups, plastic bottles, wrappers and other such articles which go into putting up an official tamasha. The young should be encouraged to question such excesses and reconnect with their grandparents to under-stand how things were done more responsibly during their pre-plastic and bottled water days. While some might argue that littering is perhaps the more minor of all environmental concerns, it is perhaps because this first step was not taken purposefully enough that we still need to remind people that the environment needs to be protected. It is important for the young to internalize the obvious - that nature can do rather well for itself without humans, but humans cannot make it without nature.

Once people begin putting that toffee wrapper back in their pockets to throw it into a bin later, they will also be able to comprehend environmental concerns better and real engagements can begin from thereon. Schools should be encouraged to go green in more ways than the paint which the urban spaces are opting for. If the young grow up conscious of their carbon footprint and worried enough to reduce damage wherever they see destruction, Sikkim will become the Eco-City that the world will envy. The language of development has to change from its pride in "exploiting" resources to one which not only "harnesses" but also nurtures. It is also obvious that the awards are given to schools which incorporate the most innovative Green Ideas in an academic year. Here again one hopes that these ideas are allowed to grow from the imagination of the students and are not directed by teachers because although teacher-involvement might win them awards, it will not institute a lasting connection with the environment. Sikkim is a small State. Just as it will not take much time for a good idea to manifest exceptional results, so will continued ignorance not take very long to squander away what has been retained [by way of environment]. Two generations of rather shortsighted consumption have already brought things to an edge here and Sikkim will need its young to grow up more responsible to pull things back. All the best...

In praise of doing nothing

SIMON GOTTSCHALK

In the 1950s, scholars worried that, thanks to technological innovations, Americans wouldn't know what to do with all of their

Yet today, as sociologist Juliet Schor notes, Americans are overworked, putting in more hours than at any time since the Depression and more than in any other in

Western society.

It's probably not unrelated to the fact that instant and constant access has become de rigueur, and our devices constant-ly expose us to a barrage of colliding and clamoring messages: "Urgent," "Breaking lews," "For immediate release," "Answer eeded ASAP."

It disturbs our leisure time, our family

ne – even our consciousness.

Over the past decade, I've tried to understand the social and psychological effects of our growing interactions with new infor-mation and communication technologies, a topic I examine in my book "The Terminal Self: Everyday Life in Hypermodern Times." In this 24/7, "always on" age, the pros-

pect of doing nothing might sound unrealistic and unreasonable.

But it's never been more important.

ACCELERATION FOR THE SAKE OF ACCELERATION

In an age of incredible advancements that can enhance our human potential and plan-etary health, why does daily life seem so overwhelming and anxiety-inducing?

Why aren't things easier?
It's a complex question, but one way to explain this irrational state of affairs is something called the force of acceleration.

According to German critical theorist

Hartmut Rosa, accelerated technological developments have driven the acceleration in the pace of change in social institutions.

We see this on factory floors, where "just-intime" manufacturing demands maximum efficiency and the ability to nimbly respond to market forces, and in university classrooms, where computer software instructs teachers how to "move students quickly" through the material. Whether it's in the grocery store or in the airport, procedures are imlemented, for better or for worse, with one goal in

Noticeable acceleration began more than two centuries ago, during the Industrial Revolution. But this acceleration has itself ... accelerated. Guided by neither logical objectives nor agreed-upon rationale, propelled by its own momentum, and encountering little resistance, acceleration seems to have begotten more acceleration, for the sake of acceleration.

To Rosa, this acceleration eerily mimics the criteria of a totalitarian power: 1) it exerts pressure on the wills and actions of subjects; 2) it is ines-capable; 3) it is all-pervasive; and 4) it is hard or almost impossible to criticize and fight.

THE OPPRESSION OF SPEED

Unchecked acceleration has consequences

At the environmental level, it extracts resources from nature faster than they can replenish themselves and produces waste faster than it can be

rience time and space. It deteriorates how we ap-

roach our everyday activities, deforms how we relate to each other and erodes a stable sense of self. It leads to burnout at one end of the continuum and to depression at the other. Cognitively, it inhibits sustained focus and critical evaluation. Physiologically, it can stress our bodies and disrupt

For example, research finds two to three times more self-reported health problems, from anxiety to sleeping issues, among workers who frequently work in high-speed environments compared with those who do not.

When our environment accelerates, we must pedal faster in order to keep up with the pace. Workers receive more emails than ever before – a number that's only expected to grow. The more emails you receive, the more time you need to process them. It requires that you either accomplish this or another task in less time, that you perform several tasks at once, or that you take less time in

between reading and responding to emails.

American workers' productivity has increased dramatically since 1973. What has also increased sharply during that same period is the pay gap between productivity and pay. While productivi-ty between 1973 and 2016 has increased by 73.7 percent, hourly pay has increased by only 12.5 percent. In other words, productivity has increased at about six times the rate of hourly pay.

Clearly, acceleration demands more work – and to what end? There are only so many hours in a day, and this additional expenditure of energy reduces individuals' ability to engage in life's essential activities: family, leisure, community, citizenship,

It's a vicious loop: Acceleration impos-more stress on individuals and curtails their ability to manage its effects, thereby

DOING NOTHING AND 'BEING'

In a hypermodern society propelled by the twin engines of acceleration and excess, doing nothing is equated with waste, laziness, lack of ambition, boredom or "down" time.

But this betrays a rather instrumental grasp of human existence.

Much research - and many spiritual and philosophical systems – suggest that de-taching from daily concerns and spending time in simple reflection and contemplation are essential to health, sanity and personal growth.

Similarly, to equate "doing nothing" with nonproductivity betrays a short-sighted understanding of productivity. In fact, psychological research suggests that doing nothing is essential for creativity and innovation, and a person's seeming inactivity might actually cultivate new insights, inventions or melodies.

As legends go, Isaac Newton grasped the law of gravity sitting under an apple tree. Archimedes discovered the law of buoyancy relaxing in his bathtub, while Albert Einstein was well-known for staring for hours into space in his office.

The academic sabbatical is centered on

the understanding that the mind needs to rest and be allowed to explore in order to germinate new ideas.

Doing nothing – or just being – is as important to human well-being as doing something.

The key is to balance the two. TAKING YOUR FOOT OFF THE PEDAL

Since it will probably be difficult to go cold tur-key from an accelerated pace of existence to doing nothing, one first step consists in decelerating. One relatively easy way to do so is to simply turn off all the technological devices that connect us to the in-ternet – at least for a while – and assess what happens to us when we do.

Danish researchers found that students who disconnected from Facebook for just one week reported notable increases in life satisfaction and sitive emotions. In another experiment, neuro scientists who went on a nature trip reported en-

hanced cognitive performance.

Different social movements are addressing the problem of acceleration. The Slow Food movement, for example, is a grassroots campaign that advoa form of deceleration by rejecting fast food and factory farming.

As we race along, it seems as though we're not taking the time to seriously examine the rationale behind our frenetic lives - and mistakenly assume that those who are very busy must be involved in important projects.

Touted by the mass media and corporate culture, this credo of busyness contradicts both how most people in our society define "the good life" and the tenets of many Eastern philosophies that

extol the virtue and power of stillness.

French philosopher Albert Camus perhaps put it best when he wrote, "Idleness is fatal only to the

Russia's imperial mindset dates back centuries- and it is here to stay

Postcolonial scholarship has overwhelmingly forused as the whelmingly focused on the legacy of Western empires – but despite a long history of foreign expansionism and domination, Russia, in its various incarnations, has never received the same amount of critical scrutiny. The Tsarist empire's position outside the West proper, the Soviet Union's stated opposition to imperialism, and the fact that Russia's empire was a contiguous land empire rather than an overseas one all helped shield it from

postcolonial critique.

The result is a strange oversight – especially considering the fact that the heir to the largest continental empire in modern history clearly remains un-comfortable with the independence of many of its former subordinates.

That discomfort stems from an

imperial mindset that has survived the 20th century's revolutions and geopolitical transformations, and which remains fundamentally entwined with Russia's complex and longstanding sense of its place in the

Neither fully European nor fully Asian but instead splayed over the Eurasian landmass, Russia has always



struggled with its ambiguous identitv. Pre-modern Russia was Christian. but Orthodox; in the 19th century, its intellectual elites engaged in Europe's great enlightenment debates, while its autocratic government and feudal-agrarian economy increas-ingly set it apart from a liberalising, industrialising Europe. Similarly, the Bolsheviks' Marxism-Leninism was simultaneously a product of the European enlightenment and a clear ideological break from Euro-Ameri-

The upshot is that for centuries, Russia's multifaceted, complex iden tity has led it to justify its imperial dominion in its own peculiar way, over subjects both Eastern and Western. Like its Western counterparts, Russia pursued distinct civilising missions that it imposed – by force if necessary – on subject peoples in a centuries-old pattern that has continued into the present. But unlike the Western powers, it did so by arrogat-ing itself "spheres of influence" situated in both East and West.

Depending on when and where they were undertaken, these civilising ventures were enforced in different ways. In "its" East – the Caucasus and Central Asia – imperial Russia styled itself a protector of Christianity, or an "enlightening force" much in the same way as Western powers, using identifiably Orientalist tropes against Muslim "backwardness" and Eastern "irrationality". In the West, conversely, Russia posed as a guarantor of Orthodoxy against the corrupting dangers of Catholic "Jesuitism", or the more liberal expressions of the European enlightenment. Soviet Russia invoked Marx-

ism-Leninism to justify a similar onslaught, this time against "bourgeois nationalisms" – first in areas like Ukraine, and after World War Two, in Eastern and Central Europe. This it managed to do while also framing a campaign against Islamic traditions as a secular struggle against oriental backwardness.

Today, in an age where formal empire is considered anathema, this Eastern/Western ambiguity still Eastern/Western ambiguity still shapes Russia's attitude towards "its" neighbourhood. It means the Kremlin can argue that its western "domin-

RUSSIA TO THE RESCUE

To distinguish itself from the liberal West, the Putin government elevates and glorifies traditional el-ements of Russian identity, among them Orthodox Christianity and carefully selected aspects of the So-viet legacy – chief among them the "Great Patriotic War", the Russian term for the fight against Nazi Germany on the Eastern Front.

By invoking this history, Putin's Russia lays claim to an "authentic", traditional European identity. The West, so the argument goes, has degenerated into postmodern decadence, and only Russia is able to salvage Europe's conservatively defined values before they fall vic-tim to what Putin has called "chaotic darkness".

On another front, Russia de-

fines itself as a civilising force over Caucasian and Central Asian "Orientals", whom it presents as irrational and prone to misrule. Accordingly, the "authenticity" of Western and Eastern nations and peoples is defined on distinctly Russian terms. "authentic"

"good", Ukrainian is by definition pro-Russian, and so is the "authentic" Chechen or Georgian. Those in the "Russian" East who do not conform are branded as madmen and Islamist terrorists; in "its" West, they are fascists or moral degenerates.

Non-Russian Ukraine is apparently the most deviant, with the Kremlin frequently making largely unfounded accusations that Kiev is under the sway of neo-Nazis. The Russian government's descriptions of its Eastern opponents are no less flattering, harking back to Tsarist and early Soviet times. Adversaries such as Georgia's Mikhail Saakash-vili or Chechnya's Dzhokhar Dudayev are "madmen", "brigands"

Russia itself, ordinary "individuals of Caucasian (or Central Asian) na-tionality" are routinely confronted with that ultimate indicator of imperial hierarchy: racism.

This is about more than just

"Putinism". It is a pattern that's repeated itself for centuries, and it stems from a deeply held aspiration to "great power" status. The Tsarist Empire did it, so did the Soviet Union, and so does today's Russian Federation, "Decolonising" the Kremlin might therefore take much longer, and much more, than overthrowing the Tsar, dismantling the Soviet Union, or securing some kind of "regime change" in today's Moscow. It will require nothing less than a fundamental redefinition of Russian

FOR PATH-BREAKER REAL KASHMIR PLAYERS, FOOTBALL MORE THAN JUST A MEANS OF LIVELIHOOD

New Delhi, Jun 3 (PTI): A hope for a better life not just for themselves but also for the troubled state they have put on the national footballing landscape -- for the path-breaking Real Kashmir FC players, the 'beautiful game' is far from being merely a means to earn a livelihood.

Their odd jobs, family backgrounds, and determination to rise above it tick all the boxes for the story that is Indian sports. But just as any other story like theirs, it was nonetheless inspir-ing when the club, founded just a couple of years ago, qualified for the elite

A daily-wage earner, who hopes he never has to go back to that job, a small-time private telephone company employee, and a cricket buff-turned footballer -- it is a diverse group that makes

But what unites it is the game, famously described as a matter bigger than life or death by Bill Shankly -- the man who transformed a second division Liverpool into the force that it became in Europe.

"It is very difficult to get a secure

job in Kashmir. I work on daily wage in a dry fruit factory. From 7am to 9am, I have my football training and after that from 10am to 6pm I work at a factory and things like packing, sending parcels, etc.," 22-year-old defender Suhail Ahmad Bhat told PTI.

Bhat, Amir Rehman (defender),

Danish Farooq (midfielder) and Muhammad Hammad (defender) are all from Srinagar and in their early 20s. It wasn't easy for them to pursue football given their diversely difficult circum-stances but not they are hoping to in-

spire many more like them.

Bhat's father is a diabetic and his mother a housewife. He has a family to care for while pursuing his passion on the field. All he earns after a day's hard work is a measly INR 300.

"Is haalaat mein, aadmi ko patthar banna padta hai (In such circumstances, one needs to harden himself like a stone). By the grace of God, I feel I am going towards success. I hope to play in big I-League and ISL (Indian Super League) clubs in future and earn even more," he said.

"The amount I am getting from the club (Real Kashmir FC) is a good sum and I can manage my family with that better than before. Now that we have qualified for the I-League, I hope my financial position gets better.

"I hope I don't work as daily wage earner again. Football is my future," he

The 23-year-old Amir Rehman has been working as an FOS (Front Office Service) for a mobile company after his training to help his self-employed father run the family.

"From 8am to 10am, I train and from 11am to 6pm, I work as FOS of Aircel (mobile company)in Srinagar. I need to do this to supplement my fam-ily income. My father does embroidery work at home and that is not enough, said the midfielder who played in the Santosh Trophy National Football Championships in 2016.

He signed for Real Kashmir this year and wants to play in an ISL. Of course, the national team too figures in his life goals.

For Danish Farooq, football is in blood as his father played for Mohmmedan Sporting in eastern Indian city

"My father, uncles, and grandfather had played football. My father used to take me to football matches and so I got interested in the sport. I got enrolled in the J & K Bank Academy and then I played for the bank team and became captain. That is how I began. After that I played for Lonestar and then this year signed for Real Kashmir," said the B.A. final year student.

Writing is a lonely and thankless job: Ritesh Shah

Mumbai, Jun 3 (PTI): Writer Ritesh Shah says writing stories is a lonely and thank-less vocation and finds it difficult to detach himself from the arduous process even in his sleep as he feels inspiration can strike

any time.

The 42-year-old scribe has been behind some of the biggest and critically-ac-claimed films of recent times, including "Pink", "Airlift", "Kahaani" and the latest, "Raid" in various capacities -- story writer, screenplay or dialogue writer.

Writing is lonely, difficult, thankless and damn hard. It's not even sit-on-the-ta-ble process, it is lonely. Most of the times you are writing alone, the story can come to you at any place - in a bus, while you're having a drink or in the washroom.

"There is no escape from it. It troubles you in sleep also. Sometimes, you think you have solved it. Sometimes a scene comes, or the full film comes, and then you realise in the morning, it was all non-sense," Shah told PTI in an interview.

The scribe says he would be doing "dis-service" if he glamourises writing. "It is a terrible job. It's hard to write

and very hard to write commercial Hindi films. It doesn't come easily," he says, who has a loyal listener to all his story ideas -



Mainstream films have been Shah's forte and he attributes his love for it to movies penned by veteran writer duo Salim-Javed, which fuelled his appetite in his growing up years and it ended up hav-

ing the biggest influence on him.

The writer, who penned commercially-viable films like "Namastey London" and

"Force", however, emphasises the skill is not easy as "there is a lot of pressure of pleasing".

"Forget the audience, first the actor has to be happy with it, then the technicians, the director, the producer, the fi-nance-marketing people have to like it. So, how can you write something, which pleases you and the audience?" Shah says.

Born in south Kashmir's Anantnag and raised in Srinagar, the writer remembers his 15-year-old self living in the conflict-hit state. He recalls there was not only a threat to life but the education system was also in shambles.

'The education got badly affected in the '90s and the middle-class Kashmiris went to different parts in the country to study," says Shah, who migrated to Delhi in the summer of 1990.

He pursued English Literature at the Hindu College and later opted to do mass communication from Jamia Milia Islamia. Filmmaker Imtiaz Ali and TV person

ality Roshan Abbas were his seniors and "Udta Punjab" director Abhishek Choubey was his junior.

"There are two-three boys in every batch, either in Hindu or Jamia, who migrate to Mumbai. That's a pattern," he says.

His calling to Mumbai happened some where around 1998 when he adapted Polish playwright Slawomir Mrozek's play 'The Police", which a lot of people from the

An actor, who featured in the play -Shah swears he will never disclose his identity - asked him to move to the metropolis and told him that a film can be made on his adaptation.

"I came to Mumbai with that script. I was able to make initial contact with him but after that he didn't get back to me and I didn't know what to do with my time. So, by chance I went for a TV meeting with a friend and happened to get a writing job," he says

After working for six years in the TV industry, he landed his first writing job for films with Sujoy Ghosh's "Home Delivery", for which he would later pen the dialogues. Soon after, he bagged "Namastey London". Nine years and several movies later, came the massive recognition in form of the National Award-winning film "Pink".

"There's nothing that I desire to do as

much as I wish to write. I am not tempted to produce or direct or choreograph. I love writing. I love my lines to be spoken on the screen or to be sure that now the audience will laugh or go quiet," Shah says.

Currently, the writer has his slate full

- he has penned the upcoming Arjun Ka-poor-Parineeti Chopra starrer "Namastey England", Diljit Dosanjh's "Arjun Patiala" and Nikkhil Advani's "Batla House".

Shah says he has more to stories to tell and his stock is far from over.

"I came to Mumbai for a week and have stayed here for 18-odd years. I am an e tended guest in this city. I am supposed to go back but I haven't yet," he says.

Philippines' Duterte tells UN expert to 'go to hell'



MANILA, JUN 3 (AFP): President Rodrigo Dute rte has told a United Na-tions rights expert to "go to hell" over criticism of the Philippine leader for threatening the country's top judge.

Duterte's latest pro-fanity-laced diatribe came after Diego Garcia-Sayan, the UN special rapporteur on the independence of judges and lawyers, said the president's statements against former chief justice Maria Lourdes Sereno were a "vicious attack" on the judiciary.

Sereno's colleagues voted to remove her from office last month, shortly after Duterte openly called her his "enemy" and demanded her swift

ouster. "Tell him (Garcia-Sayan) not to interfere with the affairs of my country. He can go to hell," Duterte told reporters in Manila, insisting he had nothing to do with Sereno's dismissal.

"He is not a special person and I do not recognise his rapporteur title." Duterte,

73, has lashed out in the past -- often using less-than-parliamentary language -- at critics of the deadly drug war he



El-Sissi took the oath of office before parlia-ment amid tight security enforced throughout Cai-ro. After the oath, artil-lery delivered a celebra-

tory 21-gun salute.

In an address to the packed chamber, el-Sissi vowed to continue working to restore stability, revive the economy and combat the insurgency in the northern Sinai Penin-sula. He said in his second term he would focus on education and health care.

"Egypt can include all of us, with all our di-versity and richness... except those who choose violence and terror to impose their will and power. Egypt is for all and I am a president of all those who agree with me or disagree," he said at the ceremony, which was also attended by his Cabinet and religious leaders.

LGBT PRIDE MONTH 2018: WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT ITS HISTORY

Every summer in the United States, the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) community and allies come together for a month-long celebration of love, diversity, acceptance and un-ashamed self-pride.

Here's everything you need to know about LGBT Pride Month.

WHAT IS LGBT PRIDE MONTH?

The commemorative month is meant to recognize the sweeping impact that LGBT individuals, advocates and allies have on history in the U.S. and around the globe, according to the Library of

WHEN IS IT?

LGBT Pride Month is celebrated every year in June, with a series of events and parades taking place across the nation.

WHY IS IT IN JUNE?

The month of June was chosen for LGBT Pride Month to

commemorate the riots held by members of the LGBT community against a police raid that took place at the Stonewall Inn in New York

City on June 28, 1969.

The so-called Stonewall riots were a "tipping point" for the gay liberation move-ment in the United States, according to the Library of Congress. The uproar also paved the way for the modern fight for LGBT rights.

Previous presidents of the United States have, on

several occasions, officially declared June as LGBT Pride Montth.

HOW DO PEOPLE CELEBRATE LGBT PRIDE MONTH?

LGBT Pride Month events draw millions of participants from around the world each year. Today, the month-long celebrations include pride pa-rades, marches, parties, concerts, workshops and symposiums across the nation

Memorials are also of-

ten held for members of the LGBT community who have lost their lives to hate crimes or HIV/AIDS.

The rainbow LGBT flag is prominently displayed throughout the month. Gil-bert Baker, an American artist, gay rights activist and U.S. Army veteran, created the flag in 1978 as a new symbol for the gay and lesbian political move-ment, at the suggestion of his friends and colleagues. including Harvey Milk, a San Francisco city supervisor and the first openly gay elected official in Califor-nia. Milk was assassinated later that year.

According to Baker's web-site, the colors of the LGBT flag each have a meaning: red for life, orange for healing, yellow for sunlight, green for nature, blue for harmony and violet for spirit.

Baker died at the age of 65 on March 31, 2017, though his rainbow flag remains an iconic, powerful symbol for LGBT pride.

CHRIS HEMSWORTH:

AVENGERS 4 IS 'EVEN MORE SHOCKING' THAN INFINITY WAR

AVENGERS: Infinity War AVENGERS: Infinity war proved to be the deadliest Marvel film to date by wiping out half the Marvel Cinematic Universe, and if this was too much to handle, you might want to get ready for Avengers 4, as Chris Hemsworth assures it will be even more shocking than

its predecessor.

The third Avengers film brought together most of the current roster of the MCU in order to stop Thanos from collecting the Infinity Stones mounting them on the Infinity Gauntlet, and creating ultimate chaos. In the end, Tha-nos gathered the stones and with the snap of his fingers. brought an end to half the population in the universe. This ending has sparked multiple theories around possi-ble plot details of Avengers 4, and while the official plot is still a mystery, Thor himself assures fans they are in for an exciting ride.

In an interview with Esquire, Chris Hemsworth spoke about the next Avengers film without giving anything away - after all, Marvel is all about secrecy. But what he did share is that the followup to Infinity War will be "more shocking" for different reasons. Hemsworth explained:

second one is even more
shocking, for other reasons
entirely. That's what kind of blew me away the first time I read both scripts, is how they managed to orchestrate so many different characters but give them each their own separate shot and moments, and have it be elevated and feel fresh and unique - not just like a messy, thrown-together assembly of these guys.

Hemsworth added that he is excited for people to see what they've been working on, and that with each step they've been taking with these films there's been "growth and evolution and it continues to surprise people as opposed to sort of flat lining."

Although we saw various

our eves at the end of Infinity War, they will all be return-ing for Avengers 4 and will be joined by Captain Marvel, Hawkeye, Wasp, Ant-Man, Happy Hogan, and others. As mentioned above, plot de-tails are still being kept under wraps, but a first synopsis for Avengers 4 teases that "sacrifices must be made" in order to preserve reality itself. What these sacrifices might be remains to be seen, though it has been heavily rumored Avengers 4 will in-volve time travel and alternate realities.

Whatever the methods to bring the vanished heroes back might be. FACEBOOK TO REMOVE 'TRENDING TOPICS' SECTION NEXT WEEK

Facebook will remove the Trending news box that's sat to the right of the desktop News Feed for the last four years, the company said re-cently. The removal comes after years of criticism around how Facebook picked stories to sit in the Trending box, not to mention more than a year of struggles with the reliability of any news being distrib-

uted through its platform.
The Trending box will be removed next week. Facebook says it was active in five countries and accounted for "less than 1.5 percent of clicks to news publishers on average." The company is currently testing other ways to deliver news, including breaking news labels and a section that collects local sto-

.. Backlash against Trending box started in 2016 after Gizmodo published a report saying that former Facebook editors — who were able to curate headlines, to a degree — claimed they "routinely suppressed" conservative stories. That al-

legations seem tame in light of everything that happened next (the entire platform was co-opted for frequently conservative propaganda), but it led to Facebook firing its editorial team and was in many ways a precursor to some of the rethinking it's been doing on news distribution.

On top of all that, the Trending box was just bad. It's been a long-running joke that Facebook runs a day behind Twitter when it comes to news and jokes, and the Trending section rarely helped matters. The system does seem to have gotten faster at picking up stories over time, but it's still hard to imagine it being the place someone learns about a major story.

Facebook says the removal of Trending will "make way" for future news products. It's not clear if that means it's planning something else for the side of the News Feed, or if it just means that it's taking a different approach to distributing news in the first place.


