Health and protocol keep Karmapa away from March event in Sikkim

Citing reasons of health and protocol, Karmapa

Ogyen Trin-ley Dorje, conveyed inability his accept the



State Gov-ernment's invitation to visit Sikkim in mid-March, an invitation which was extended to him after health reasons led the Dalai Lama to cancel his scheduled visit here.

In a letter dated 25 February to the Chief Minister, the Karmapa, while thanking him for the invitation extended to him (on 02 February) to visit Sikkim in March for a religious event at Rabongla, informs that he was currently in USA undergoing a thorough medical examination for some ailments he has been diagnosed with.

He has further shared that since the Dalai Lama was originally scheduled to bless and attend the occasion, "I personally feel that it would not be appropriate me to attend this program as I feel the need to maintain proper formality and protocol in such a situation".

His present health

condition and teaching commitments have fur-ther made it difficult for him to visit Sikkim at this

point in time, he adds.
"I am very appreciative of your kind gesture and invitation and look forward to visiting the State of Sikkim later this year," the Karmapa's let-ter concludes.

College students hold protest rally demanding justice for molestation victim



Students took out a rally today in protest of the molestation of a Sikkimese girl by a civil service officer in Bihar.

The rally which started from Government College in Tadong to Titanic park in MG Marg saw huge participation of students from Government colleges of Tadong, Burtuk and Law college as well as students of Sikkim University.

The students carried placards and shouted slogans.

"The main objective of the rally is to express solidarity with the girl who became victim of molestation. However we are surprised not to see any action from the state government. No statement was given by the government. Where is the Women's Commission? Why is our civil society quiet?" questioned the stu-

dents while talking to reporters.

Joint Commissioner in the Income Tax department, Ram



Babu Gupta was arrested on charges of molesting a girl stu-dent from Sikkim on 24 Feb. He has been sent to jail for 14 days.

Gupta, allegedly molested the victim at a girls hostel in Patna, where she lived along with other girls from Sikkim.

The incident dates back to 17 Feb when the victim who

was at the hostel was forcefully taken inside her room by the tax official and molested.

The victim, however, managed to escape and informed her parents in Sikkim who came to Patna on Monday after which an FIR was registered against Gupta at the Digha police station.

During investigation, it came

to light that Gupta ran a coaching institute, Eklavya Super-30 for medical exams in Patna Boring Road area.

The victim along with 30 other girls from Sikkim were studying at this institute for past few months and were staying at the girls hostel provided by the turn to pg03

ICAR-National Organic Farming Research Institute [NOFRI], Tadong organized 'Frontline Demonstration on In-tensive Organic Vegetable Production' for the progressive farmers of Lingee, Payong, South Sikkim on 26 Feb under Mission for Integrated Development of Horti-[MIDH-Vegetaculture ble] and Tribal Sub Plan [TSP] project in order to increase awareness and strengthen the progres-sive farmers on intensive organic vegetable pro-duction by dissemination of scientific knowledge

along with input support.

During the programme, 24 farmers representing different Self Help Groups attended the programme and benefited with the technical know-how and various inputs distributed.

Ioint Director ICAR-NOFRI, Dr RK Avasthe, briefed about the overall activities of ICAR-NOFRI. He stressed upon the importance of scientific knowledge for commercial and intensive production of organic vegetables to bring about perceptible change in the vegetable production sce-

nario of the region.

He said that hi-tech low cost production tech-nologies are available with ICAR, which can be a good source of income for the rural youth. He further detailed about the importance of soils

in crop production and asked the farmers to conserve the soil by planting crops. He also emphasized the significance of soil health card and its role in organic nutrient

management system. Senior Scientist [Hor-ticulture], Dr Ashish Ya-dav, briefed about the organic production tech-niques of vegetable crops and said that vegetables are quick cash crops. He discussed about the intensive vegetable production techniques under low cost plastic tunnel and plastic rain shelters.

During the program,
Dr Yadav and Subject Matter Specialist [Plant Protection], Dr NJ Singh, practically demonstrated the construction of low cost plastic tunnels

to the farmers.

Dr Singh discussed pest and disease management in organic production system. He stressed upon the importance of good agricultural practices to minimize incidence and that ular monitoring of farm is important for better management of insects and pathogens.

GRC reiterates demand for Sikkim-Darj merger

С orkha Rashtriya Congress G[GRC] has reiterated its demand for the unification of Sik-kim-Darjeeling today. The organisation stressed that Sikkim is the only key to separate Dar-jeeling from West Bengal.

Addressing a press conference here this afternoon, GRC general secretary, Amar Lucksom, informed that GRC has

been meeting the concerned Ministers and officials in the Centre and has been doing other required exercises for the unification of Sikkim-Darjeeling.
"Even after bandh for 105

days, the people of Darieeling have got nothing and are still under WB. So we want to send a message to people and people's representatives of Sikkim that Sikkim is the only key that will help separate Darjeeling from West Bengal," he said.

GRC president, Bharat Dong, stated that despite its 16-year movement on Sikkim-Darjeeling merger, the people of Sikkim are not aware of the issue. "It is purely in the hands of

Government of Sikkim to sepa-rate Darjeeling from West Bengal," he said.

He alleged that if former and present Chief Ministers of Sikkim took the issue serious-

ly then Darjeeling would have merged with Sikkim long time back.

Mr Dong mentioned that WB government had also issued white paper mentioning that Darjeeling was not a part of it. On the same, he added that Sik-kim and its people just need to ask West Bengal for Darjeeling. He also stated that the merger will also address various pending issues of Sikkim.

The event was followed by allocation of schools to the students as per merit acquired during the Selection Test.

It may be mentioned here, the state government had launched the CMMSS from the year 2010 wherein the state government bears education expenses of students selected from amongst the Class V top-pers of Government schools in empanelled public schools both within and outside the State. It is awarded after students qualify in the entrance test conducted by HRDD, Government of Sikkim.

A total of 20% of the state

toppers are awarded admission in public schools outside the State and 80% of the toppers are awarded admission public schools within the State, it is informed.

Till date 769 students,

647 within the State and 172 outside the State, have been granted the scholarship with additional 50 students sponsored this year.

As per the selection process, all students securing 1st position in Class V Annual Examination between the age of 11-12½ years and who have studied in Government Schools from Class I-V will be eligible for appearing for the selection test for CMMS. The preference for allotment of the school will be based on marks achieved in the selection test and availability of seat in a particular school.

As per the data from the

department, 145 students under this scholarship will be appearing for Class X board examination and 90 students will be appearing for Class XII board examination this year.

The empanelled schools outside the State are Scindia Boys' School [Gwalior, Madhya Pradesh], Scindia Kanya Vidhyalaya [Gwalior, MP], Pinegrove School [Dharampur, Himachal Pradesh], Ary-an School [Dehradun, Uttrakhandl, Singhally Hills International School [Dehradun, Uttrakhand], and Delhi Public

School [Haryana].

The schools empanelled within the State are Tashi Namgyal Academy [Gangtok], St Xavier's School [Pakyong], St Joseph's School [Martam], Namchi Public School [Namchi], Don Bosco School [Mal-basey] and St Mary's School [Gyalshing].

Language and Religion Don't an Indian Make

Unfortunately, chauvinism is becoming increasingly commonplace

Recently, an MLA belonging to a party which wears Hindutva on its sleeves remarked that those in India who do not say Bharat Mata Ki Jai are Pakistanis. He was not the first to draw such a conclusion and there have been many from his ilk who draw this parallel and air it with a shallow ignorance and dangerous conviction to rabid applause. And then the army chief exposed his inadequacies on the secular front when he praised the Indian-ness of Arunachalis because they spoke shudh Hindi. Wonder whether his rating of Arunachalis as Indians will scale down if he learnt that they also like beef apart from referring to schools as vidvalava?

None of this - equating Hindu credentials to patriotism or Hindi to being Indian - are new stupidities and have been around ever since there have been individuals and groups cursed with a monochromatic view framed by how insularity has explained things to them. Earlier though, they navigated in the fringe, but now that they swim in the mainstream, the closet bigots have come crawling out and amplified the insularity. They now work hard to paint "secular" as a short-coming even as they lather themselves with superficial nationalism. And because the monster of intolerance for anything that does not kowtow to blanket majoritarianism has become so commonplace, it is a big worry.

Let's take the two instance cited above for instance. Patriotism is an instinctive and even personal emotion but the kind of nationalism that demands that we make public displays of it by lustily shouting Bharat Mata Ki Jai is an exhibitionist display that not all are comfortable with. Further, because the call has been rather provocatively appropriated by the Right, it has lost the pure passion with which the freedom fighters first raised it. If those who feel similarly do not join the chorus, they cannot be accused of being anti-nationals because they are instead taking a position as Indians. But wait, the MLA in question did not accuse them of being anti-nationals, he called such people Pakistanis. To begin with, no aspersions should be cast on the citizenship of Indian Muslims. If anything, their belonging is even more reiterated than that of Hindus or people of other faiths here because they did receive an option in 1947 to relocate to a Muslim country carved out for them. In fact, those who stayed back did so despite the communal rioting which birthed this nation. Agreed, there were many other factors at play in ensuring that India remains one of the countries with the largest Muslim population - its written-into-the-Constitution commitment to secularity for one - but since we are debating in jingoism, this argument has also been slipped in. Citizenship, as things stand, require no displays or evidence of nationalism or even patriotism. let that be made clear. What the BJP-RSS penchant to equate what they as antinational behavior with Pakistan is also dangerous because it is an overt, almost exclusive targeting of the Muslims as being anti-India They drum up this sentiment and then follow the killings and rioting. We allow the horror to perpetuate because we do not call out the nightmarish regression which cannot accommodate diversity. For these parts, this is something that should not be allowed to go unchallenged because a step away from Muslims being Pakistanis is the equating of all Mongoloid looking folk who do not fall in line as Chinese. Think about it... both stereotypes play out from existing prejudices.

A similar shortsightedness was also displayed by

the Army chief when he presented the Arunachali flu ency in Hindi as evidence of their "amalgamation". In one swoop, he presented supporting arguments for the Sankritisation of the entire region to make "amalgamation" possible. This is such an obsolete approach that even pseudo-academics can demolish this position. Unfortunately, not enough of them will and the argument will keep gaining strength and end up deepening resentments among local communities as they watch state-muscle bulldoze diversities and individuality to extend the "mainland" to the margins.

These are dangerous trends which are being in-

creasingly normalized to dangerous levels.

Nigeria's conflict is a result of environmental devastation across West Africa

Nigeria is experiencing a major conflict between omadic herdsmen and in digenous farmers. In 2016 the conflict led to the death of 2,500 people, displaced 62,000 others and led to loss of US\$13.7 billion in revenue. In January 2018 alone, the conflict claimed the lives of 168 people.

The herdsmen are pre-dominantly Fulanis, a primarily Muslim people scattered throughout many parts of West Africa. The farmers, meanwhile, are mostly Christian. There-fore, when violence erupts between the two groups, with symbolic results like churches being burnt

down, it is unsurprising that the dominant narrative in Nigeria and abroad is that this is a conflict motivated by religion and

What's missing is the environmental perspective. Nigeria spans more than 1,000km from a lush and tropical south to the fringes of the Sahara Desert in the north. And, in Nigeria, the Sahara is moving southward at a rate of 600 metres a year. At the same time, Lake Chad in the country's far north-east has largely dried up. Fulani herdsmen who once relied on the lake have thus moved further south in search of pasture and water for their livestock. The further south you move, the more the population becomes Christian, hence when resource conflicts emerge they appear religious.
Such conflicts between herdsmen and farmers

aren't entirely new. A drought in the late 60s, for instance, kicked off struggles over land use across the Sahel, and the Fulanis do have a history of strategic annexation of territories. What's new this time round is that the conflict has taken on an entirely different scale, as a problem once restricted to the north of Nigeria has become a major issue in the country's south.

This is because environmental devastation has

necessitated widespread migration of Fulanis from all over West Africa to the south of Nigeria, which has been unable to prevent nomads from other countries from coming in along its long borders. The influx of new people has disrupted the existing

dynamics and relationship between predominantly farming local communities and nomadic herdsmen.

But environmental explanations are largely ignored in favour of talk of ethnic or religious conflict. Such talk quickly becomes highly emotive, preventing a full analysis of all the driving forces behind the conflict. The dominance of the "ethnic war" narrative therefore makes it harder to de-velop holistic and sustainable solutions and, in a country that is a mix of cultures and religions, puts national unity and peace-building at risk

SILENCE FROM THE AUTHORITIES

The government's response to all this has been near silence. In the vacuum, political explanations have emerged, often from people with a vested interest. For instance, elites and political leaders from af-fected regions suspect the president, Muhammadu Buhari, who himself is Fulani, of being complicit in the attacks (though they have stopped short of directly accusing him). There's no evidence the president has anything to do with the conflict but, in a hierarchical society like Nigeria, the word of elites can be taken as gospel.

The central government has proffered solutions such as cattle "colonies", which take lands from indigenous farmers and give it to the Fulanis to graze. But among the farmers this only reinforces worries of an ethnic land grab.

The president has often spoken of "recharging"

Lake Chad to its former size, perhaps using water

diverted from the Ubangi River in the Congo basin, and he recently spoke on the subject at an African Union conference. Yet the lake still is not really built into the government's strategy for the farm

HEALTHY LAKE, PEACEFUL PEOPLE

So what would a sustainable and just solution to the conflict actually involve? Lake Chad certainly will need to be "recharged", along with a massive programme of tree growing and sustainable water management. This will require the engage-ment of neighbouring countries – who have serious environmental problems of their own – and the support of international donor agencies, but it would go a long way towards stemming the migration southward and should reduce incidences

The government must also recognise, publicly, that this is at root a conflict over resources exact erbated by environmental problems. It must point this out when the need arises, rather than waiting

until half-truths dominate public discourse.

The Nigerian media, for its part, often thrives on emotive narratives. But this story of conflict between herders and farmers calls for less sensationalism and more investigative journalism that helps reveal further nuances to the complex issue. This isn't a simple tale of ethnic conflict – the environ-ment cannot be ignored.

Ever since their birth as two separate countries in 1947. India and Pakistan have been psychologically obsessed with their assorted mutual conflicts. They have fought four conventional wars, and regularly display their nuclear capability to outpace and undermine each other. From the outside, it resembles nothing so much as a fam-

ily feud – and psycholog-ically speaking, it's a very apt analogy. Across the subcontinent, family and lineage are the most influential institutions in people's lives, and people tend to transpose the psychological moral structure of their kinship relations into ev-ery other institution in the outside world. Respecting your seniors and expecting

care and nurture is the norm, and it holds sway in various forms across every sphere of life. As one famous South Indian prov-

erb puts it, after living together for six months, "they" become "we" and "we" become "they"; neighbours should be treated like family members. It is the violation of this norm that underpins the modern India-Pakistan (or Hindu-Muslim) rivalry.

By the time of partition, the two

sides had lived together in one society for more than a millennium. South Asian Hindus and Muslims shared not just a cultural gene pool and biological ties, but common kinship in-stitutions: the extended family group joined by marriage, which is called Khandan in Pakistan and Pariwar in India, or the lineage group with common descendants, known as Biradari



in Pakistan and Jati in India

The rupture between the two can be traced to what happened within India's predominantly Hindu Congress party, which represented both communities against the British Raj in the years before the partition of In-dia and Pakistan in 1947. As partition neared, the reservations of Muslims were not properly considered, and their demands were thus not met. The Muslim minority was excluded from most decisions, which created in them a fear of "not mattering at all". The Muslims, suddenly the "ju-nior" family members, felt neglected and as younger siblings oftentimes do, they became extra-competitive.

THEM AND US

Viewed this way, the India-Pakistan conflict owes more to historical and psychological "nearness" than to mere competition for resources or

territory. And that much is clear in the language they use to talk about each other

In many parts of India and Pakistan, especially in both Punjabs, the word used for the 1947 Partition of India is "batwara", which literally means "the distribution of ancestral land" between brothers or patrilineal cousins. The word comes with resonances that the English word "partition" simply doesn't carry: harmonious family, painful division, cousin rivalry, love-hate competition.

These are the psychological dy-namics that play out in the dispute over Kashmir. Both India and Pakistan claim Kashmir as if it were their ancestral property, and people on both sides feel a deep emotional attachment to it. In the subcontinent, to give up a claim to one's ancestral property brings "dishonour" to one's family and group, and is considered a weakness. For Pakistanis, the rivalry against

Indians is driven by a deep sense of being "wronged" at the time of partition, the corollary being a "desire" to compete with and trump Indians at any cost. It's this bitterly competitive urge that drives Pakistan's leaders, army officers and populace to defy India's obvious demographic, economic and military supremacy, and to do so with such intensity. As William Blake said, "it is easier

to forgive an enemy than to forgive a friend". Whoever we are, it seems we can all feel a special kind of enmity for the enemies we most resemble whether a sibling or a neighbour, we simply cannot accept "them" as "us" despite our obvious similarities

Bhubaneswar, Feb 27 (PTI): The Chilika lake in Odisha has emerged as the single largest habitat of Irrawaddy dolphins in the world with the spotting of 155 such animals, a Chilika Development Authority

(CDA) official said.

The finding is based on the preliminary report of the first ever 'Annual Monitoring' of the lake held on Saturday, CDA Chief Executive Susanta Nanda said.

The 'Annual Monitoring' was conduct-ed by the CDA to count the number of the marine mammals and to study the hydrological impacts of removal of pen culture (locally known as gherries), he said yes-

The number is more compared to the last year's figure of around 100 dolphins during the annual census, Nanda said.

Stating that the results of the monitoring are being analysed by plotting the locational GPS, Nanda said the finer details were likely to take some time.

"The dolphins are now seen in differ-

ent sectors of the lake where they were



not seen before due to removal of obstruction for their migration," Nanda said.
While dolphins are seen in different

parts of the lake has raised the hope of

Xi term limit proposal sparks rare public dissent in China

BEIJING, FEB 27 (AP): In a rare public expressi of dissent in China, a wellknown political commen tator and a prominent businesswoman penned open letters urging lawmakers to reject a plan that would allow President Xi Jinping to rule indefinitely.

Their impassioned statements on a popular messaging app were circulated widely after the ruling Communist Party announced a proposal Sunday to scrap term limits on the president

and vice president.

In a statement yesterday on WeChat to Beijing's members of China's rubber-stamp parlia-ment, Li Datong, a former editor for the state-run China Youth Daily, wrote that lifting term limits would "sow the seeds of chaos." "If there are no term limits on a country's highest leader, then we



are returning to an imperial regime," Li told The Associated Press today.

"My generation has lived through Mao. That era is over. How can we possibly go back to it?" Wang Ying, a businesswoman who has advocated for government re-forms, wrote on WeChat that the Communist Party's proposal was "an outright betrayal" and 'against the tides."

"I know that you (the government) will dare to do anything," she wrote, "and one ordinary per-son's voice is certainly useless. But I am a Chinese citizen, and I don't plan on leaving. This is my motherland too!" An official in the information department of the Standing Committee of the legislative body, the National People's Congress, said today that he was not

aware of the open letters.
The congress is all but certain to pass the con-stitutional amendment when it meets for its annual session early next

month, at which it will grant Xi a second fiveyear term and appoint new ministers and other government officials.

Under the 1982 constitution, the president is limited to two five-year terms in office, but Xi "already China's most powerful leader since Mao" appears to want additional terms to see through his agenda of fighting corruption, eliminating poverty and transforming China into a modern leading nation by midcentury.

Government and par-

ty spokesmen have yet to offer any detailed explanations on the reasoning and motivation behind the dropping of term limits. Nor is it clear whether Xi will seek to remain pres-ident for life or will only stay on for a set number of additional terms.

Ministry Foreign Lu Kang spokesman

yesterday said that the proposal "was made in accordance with new situation and the practice of upholding and developing socialism with Chinese characteristics in the new era."

In a commentary to-day, the official China Daily newspaper mentioned the proposal to strip out language in the consti-tution limiting the president and vice president to two five-year terms, saying it was "necessitated by the need to perfect the party and the state's leadership system."

While Chinese cen-sors have moved swiftly to delete any satirical on-line commentary on the move, a range of opposition views continue to be shared. The Global Times, a newspaper published by the Communist Party. aid "outside forces" were trying to challenge the party's leadership.

Book by FBI chief fired by Trump to hit stores in April

New Delhi, Feb 27 (PTI): James Comey, who was abruptly removed as FBI chief by US President Donald Trump last year, will share unheard sto-ries from his career in a book this April.

In "A Higher Loyalty: Truth, Lies, and Leadership", Comey will "explore what good, ethical leader ship looks like and how it drives sound decisions". according to Pan Macmillan, which has acquired the publishing rights in the UK and the Commonwealth excluding Canada.

"Using examples from some of the highexamples est-stakes situations in the past two decades of the American government, Comey will share yet-unheard anecdotes from his long and distinguished career," it said.

Jeremy Trevathan, Publisher at Pan Macmillan UK, said about the acquisition, "This is an extraordinary look at what leadership under pressure, in the highest of public offices, means



from the point of view of someone who has expe rienced the best and the worst aspects of both.

"Each chapter reads like a scene from the West Wing, except this is for real. It's unusual and riveting to read a book that takes you inside key moments of recent histo-

moments of recent histo-ry in such detail."

will be published in the
UK on April 17, the same day Flatiron will publish the book in the US.

Maldives declines India's invite for naval exercise

DELHI, FEB 27 (PTI): Maldives has declined India's invi-(PTI): tation to participate in the eight-day-long mega naval exercise -- Milan -- beginning March 6. in an apparent snub to New Delhi which has been critical of the Yameen government in view of the emergency in the island nation.

"Maldives was invited to join the Milan exercise but they have declined." Navy Chief Admiral Sunil Lanba told reporters, and indicated that the country may have taken the decision possibly due to the current situation

"They have not given any reason," he said.

Admiral Lanba was

speaking to reporters on the sidelines of an event.

Ties between India

and Maldives nosedived after Maldivian President Abdulla Yameen declared emergency on February 5 following an order by the country's Supreme Court to release a group of Opposition leaders, who had been convicted in widely criticised trials.

On February 21, India had reacted strongly over the extension of emergency by a month.

India will host navies

from at least 16 countries for the mega naval exercise at the Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

The exercise is taking

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place in the backdrop of China's growing military posturing in the Indo-Pacific region and officials indicated that the issue is likely to figure during deliberations at the event.

Officials said China's military manoeuvres in the South China Sea may figure during discussions among navy chiefs of the participating countries at

the event. 'Milan' was first held in 1995 with the participation of just five navies. The aim of the initiative was to have an effective forum to discuss common concerns in the Indian Ocean Region and forge deeper cooperation among friendly navies.

The exercise is being hosted by the Indian Navy under the aegis of the Andaman and Nicobar Command.

Asked about the presence of Chinese ships in the Indo-Pacific region, an official said, "The deployment of ships by Chi-na's Navy has been since 2008. At any point of time, there are 6-8 ships in the region. We monitor them and know what is

happening."
He further said, "There is no cause for concern, it is standard deployment in the Indian Ocean. As per what we have monitored. there is no change in it in the last few years. We are well aware of what is

Prosecutors seek 30 years' jail for ousted S. Korea president

SEOUL, FEB 27 (AFP): South Korean prosecutors today demanded a 30-year-jail sentence for former president Park Geun-hye, sacked over a wide-ranging corruption scandal which exposed shady links between big business and politics and prompted massive street pro-

tests.
The 66-year-old daughter of a former dictator was dismissed in March 2017 and has now been in custody for almost a year.

"We ask the court to hand down 30 years in prison and (a fine of) 118.5 billion won (110 million) for the accused, who must take ultimate responsibility for the scandal as the 18th president of this country," prosecutors said in a

They said Park, in collusion with her secret confidante and long-time friend Choi Soon-sil, took or was promised bribes totalling 59.2 billion won (52 million) from three South Korean compaturn for policy favours.

Park has also been charged with coercing 18 large firms to "donate" a total of 77.4 billion won to two dubious foundations controlled by Choi.

The Seoul Central District Court earlier this month found Choi guilty of abuse of power, bribery and interfering in government siness and sentenced her to 20 years in prison.

The verdict and sentence was seen as a potential pointer to the decision in Park's separate trial in the same court, because 15 of the 18 charges Choi faced mirror charges against the ex-president.

A date for the verdict on Park ay be announced at the end of Tuesday's session.

"The accused (Park) abused her power delegated by the people for private gain for Choi and herself... violated core constitutional values on the protection of the

Colombian singer Shakira has reportedly paid Spanish tax authorities nearly £18 million after being warned she could be prosecuted for alleged tax

The performer is said to have handed over the six-figure sum to settle a 2011 tax debt after Spanish authorities asked prosecutors to look into her financial affairs between 2011 and 2014 after claiming she could have evaded

paying the proper taxes.

Respected Catalan newspaper El
Periodico has revealed that Shakira, 41, paid £17.65 million for the 2011 tax year and could subsequently launch an appeal against the tax office demand.

The star's 2011 tax return was understood to be one of the four at the centre of the dispute between Shakira and Spanish authorities which was outside the prosecution time limit and could only be settled via administrative proceedings.

The Hips Don't Lie hitmaker is reportedly still being probed over her tax

returns for the following three years.

This comes after Spain's Tax Agency argued Shakira was living in Spain during that period and therefore should have paid income tax on her worldwide earnings and not just earnings obtained in Spain, as reported by respected Cata-lan daily La Vanguardia.

The Barcelona-based singer, previously tax resident in the Bahamas, registered as a full tax resident in Spain in

Sources close to Shakira, who became a full tax resident in Spain in 2015, told La Vanguardia she had always met her tax obligations and was ready to abide by the 'economic consequences' of what they considered could be simple differences in 'evaluation criteria' rather than a deliberate attempt to evade taxes.
