TRADERS WANT GOVT TO ENSURE ORGANIC SUPPLY IF IMPORT BAN IS TO BE IMPOSED

SANDEEP PRASAD GANGTOK, 01 APR:

The ban on import of vegetables from outside the State, a disruption which is currently being proposed without the wholesalers and vendors here being served any official communication "in written," has the sabji markets caught in confusion, unsure of what comes next. The ban which was believed to kick in today now appears to be slated for imposition, seizure and disposal from 04 April onwards, although even this, as per the traders, has been communicated to them only verbally

Given the finances at stake of placing bulk orders from suppliers in Siliguri only to run the risk of having consignments "seized and disposed," as an official informed them today, the traders have decided not to bring any more vegeta-bles from Siliguri until the matter is resolved.

The last shipment of vegetables arrived in Gangtok on 31 March it is informed, and this should last, on a stretch, till 04 April when the State action on vegetables from outside will become clearer.

This, and some other decisions, was arrived at today at a meeting convened here at Lall Bazaar by the All Sikkim Traders Association and attended by wholesalers of vegetables and fruits from Gangtok and two wholesalers from Siliguri.

Speaking to media-persons after the meeting, the ASTA vice-president, Lakpa Sherpa, in-



over the ban, they have decided to not lift any more vegetables, save potatoes and onions which are apparently exempted from the ban, from Siliguri until the matter was resolved.

Interestingly, a 10 March 2018 Home Department notification announcing the ban, although it did not mention the date from which it was to be imposed, had listed the vegetables which were to be banned from being brought from outside the State.

Be that as it may, a senior Hor-ticulture official who reportedly visited Lall Bazaar today, informed the vegetable sellers there that they are being given time till 04 April to finish their stocks of vegetables from outside the State and that after that date, such vegeta-

The decision to stop bringing fresh stocks from outside follows from this verbal communication, because several wholesalers, till before this visit, informed Summit-Times that they would continue bringing vegetables from outside until they were officially directed not to.

A written notice to this effect has still not been served.

NMC Bill: Doctors. students to observe token strike on Monday

NEW DELHI, APR 1 (PTI): Scores of medical students and resident doctors of several hosnitals across the country are set to observe a token strike tomorrow, over some of their demands regarding the National Medical Commission Bill not being accepted by the government.

The stir called by the Indian Medical Association (IMA) would be held for two hours from 12 noon to 2 pm. Health-care services at multiple hospitals are likely to be affected briefly.

In Delhi, resident and

junior doctors and medical students will hold a peaceful protest in front of the All India Insti-tute of Medical Science (AIIMS).

Besides, protests will be held across India and a large number of doctors and medical students are et to hold rallies in many districts.

The Bill still remains anti-poor, anti-feder al, anti-democratic and lacks national character", the IMA has alleged.

The Bill does not address the issues of DNB (Diplomat of National Board) and practical dif-ficulties with common medical entrance test NEET and foreign grad-

The Cabinet has apparently agreed to four of the 10 demands put up by the IMA in connection with the Bill, the associa-tion said in a statement.

Removing the clause for separate Exit Exam-ination and to have a common final year MBBS examination, amend-ment to drop the pro-vision of bridge course for AYUSH doctors and subsequent registration to practice modern medicine and introduction of a new punitive clause for quacks and unqualified persons for practising modern medicine were welcomed by the IMA.

"Although, the Cab-inet-approved draft of NMC Bill has marginally increased the state representation and control of the government over 50% of the fee levied, IMA feels that these are cosmetic in nature and the Bill still remains anti-poor, anti-federal, non turn to pg03

Bharatiya Janta Par-ty's Sikkim unit has appreciated the efforts of the State Government towards organic farming. The party, through a press release, has said that the Central Government led by Prime Min-ister Narendra Modi has been encouraging other States in the country to look up to Sikkim in its commitment towards or-

ganic farming.

However, the release mentions that the State has been witnessing low participation from the Sikkimese people in ag-riculture and animal husbandry, contending that most lands are occupied by private companies from outside the State.

The release adds that lack of proper irrigation systems and water scarcity in some remote ar-eas of the State present

The release adds that while enquiring with lay people and hawkers, the BIP state-unit found that they were in panic-mode due to the sudden ban with possibility of price hike if vegetables from outside are not allowed into the State.

The party has also questioned the State Government whether all the vegetables produced in the State are organic certified.

The party has further alleged that the concerned department is not helping local farmers and some certification agencies are providing organ-ic certification without any parameters.

Soon automakers to deliver cars fitted with number plates: Gadkari

NEW DELHI, APR 1 (PTI):

Yehicles will soon come fit-ted with number plates and the cost will be included in the four-wheelers' price, Union Minister Nitin Gadkari said.

At present, a vehicle license plate -- which is attached to vehicles bearing its official registration number, common-ly known as "a number plate" -- is procured by various states separately from designated

'We have taken an important decision. Now, manufacturers will fit the plates and embossing will be done later through machine," Road Transport, Highways, Shipping, Water Resources and Ganga Rejuvenation Min-ister Gadkari told PTI.

Naturally, the price of the plate will be included in car's cost and the consumer will get some relief, he said.

The minister said the new technology number plates were intended to bring relief not only to consumers but also to bring in uniformity across states as each state used to buy these plates earlier.

The prices for number plates

procured by states ranged from Rs 800 to Rs 40,000, he said.

plate (number plates) number is issued by the district-level Regional Transport Office (RTO) of

. Also. Gadkari said that there would be no compromise in terms of security as far as vehicles were concerned and such orms will be same for all models be it economy or luxury.

"We will not compromise with security... what security norms we have done for economic models, same is for luxury and SUVs," he said.

The government has recent-

ly made it mandatory for all cars manufactured after July 2019 to have air bags for drivers and speeding alert systems beyond 80 kmph and sensors for reverse parking to avoid accidents.

"Motor vehicles of category M1 (cars), manufactured on and after the 1st day of July, 2019, shall comply with the additional safety features and its requirements stipulated in AIS-145 -2017," the notification issued by the Road Transport and Highways Ministry has said.

There will be 'zero tolerance' on air safety issues: Prabhu

New Delhi, Apr 1 (PTI):

Asserting that there will be "zero tolerance" on air safety issues, Civil Aviation Minister Suresh Prabhu has said the aircraft with engine problems will remain grounded till

the issues are addressed.

His remarks came
against the backdrop of aviation watchdog DGCA grounding 14 A320 neo planes, operated by Inplanes, operated by indigo and GoAir, due to problems with their Pratt & Whitney engines.

"Pratt & Whitney has

done some retrofitting, which has resulted in some challenges in engines. So, when I became the (civil aviation) minister, it was pointed out to me... I said this is too risky because safety should not be compromised on any account," Prabhu told PTI

Ministry on March 12, noted that safety should not be compromised on

on the compromised on any account.

On the same day, avi-ation regulator DGCA or-dered IndiGo and GoAir to immediately ground 11 A320 neo planes powered with a certain series of P&W engines after incidents of "Let them rectify this

error and till that time they will be grounded and we called the airlines and told them to make alternate arrangements," Prabhu said.

"By doing this, we are ensuring that there will be zero tolerance on safety issues," he said, adding that the engines will be required to be certified again for air worthiness.
While 14 planes were

grounded by IndiGo and GoAir last month due to engine issues, some of them are back in opera spare engines from P&W.

Following the grounding of aircraft, there has been a significant number of flight cancellations by the two carriers. According to the minister, the situation is more or less stabilised in

Prabhu said funds are not an issue. The funds are coming by way of cross-subsidisation, "so there is no prob-

Bishnu Chettri, general secretary of the Sangathan, said that keeping the Hills away from such an important election was a violation of the provisions of the Constitution. requires, then they will troop to the concerned Department and gherao it until the issue is re-solved. "We will have no option left. Apart from the local consumers, this is also tourist season and hotels need to be supplied as well," Mr Sherpa said.
What the meeting also resolved

is that they will ensure that if they cannot bring in vegetables from outside Sikkim, then they will not allow anyone else to do so either.

The hint here is clearly to the loophole they are spying in the notification announcing the ban which says that sale of vegetables from outside Sikkim will be acted against. They see this as meaning that there is nothing stopping people or establishments from

bringing in their supplies for consumption.

The traders are clearly op-posed to such an eventuality and have announced plans to camp at Rangpo and stop anyone else from bringing in vegetables from outside. "We will also seize and dispose vegetable supplies being brought in from outside," they announced today.

The meeting also resolved that they will not tolerate any black-marketing or hike in prices of the existing stock and inform that directions have been passed that vegetables should continue to be sold at the existing prices till stocks last (or are seized and disposed by the authorities).

To get a sense of the scale of supplies that will need to be met

locally if the ban is imposed in earnest, a wholesaler dealing in fruits informed the meeting that he moves 4,000 kg bananas (the highest selling fruit in Sikkim) every day. He is not convinced yet that the local produce can meet his requirements. He will know soon enough.

The traders, it is learnt, have also kept the option of approaching the Courts if the ban is forced through without adequate measures taken to ensure that there was no shortage or loss of business.

And even as the traders deal with this new situation with no clear communication or detailed consultation on the matter, consumers across the State are feeding off rumours and speculations.

Perennial waterfall goes dry

in Goa; mining blamed
PANAJI, APR 1 (PTI): A perennial waterfall in Goa, revered by locals and visitors for its religious significance and natural beauty, has dried up, with the villagers blaming it on the reckless mining activity.

The locals claim that for the first time in decades

they have seen the waterfall, located in Harvalem village near the Pandava caves in North Goa district, about 50 km from here, going dry even as the summer is vet to set in.

A temple dedicated to Lord Shiva stands nearby, and the place is considered religiously significant as people from far and wide bring the ashes of their de-ceased near and dear ones for immersing in the water.

"The mines which are located upstream this waterfall have gone so deep that they have actually dis-turbed the water table," claims Sangesh Kundaikar, vice president of the Rudreshwar temple at Harvalem.

"The waterfall has a history spanning nearly 500 years. The people claim the waterfall has never gone dry to such an extent," Kundaikar said.

The mine owners are responsible for this situation, he alleged. "The rivulets which feed the waterfall have thinned

down. For the first time we have seen that the water-fall has dried completely in March itself," he said. A dozen mining leases located upstream the wa-

terfall in Sonshi village, located about 5 km from Har-valem, used to divert the water for mining purposes and later pump it back into the rivulet.

But, the stoppage of mining activity last month, following a Supreme Court order, has forced the mine owners to abandon their leases. The state government earlier issued a circular

asking the mine owners to continue pumping water from the pits owing to safety issues (so that it does not cause flooding in nearby villages). But, some mine owners have refused to dewater the pits.

Protect Forests from Greed as well. Not Need Alone

Yes, going genuinely green will require more effort

ome years ago, in the run-up to a National Art Fes-Some years ago, in the run-up to a National Alt restival that Gangtok was hosting, the sculptors had to twiddle their thumbs with no material to work with for two days because the wood they had ordered from Siliguri was held up as clearance from the Forest Department was taking too long. They might as well have contacted some locals who would have commissioned some others to chop down the required kind of wood. The worst that would have happened is that the woodcutters would have been arrested under some clause of the Forest Act. After all, much the same has transpired for much lesser a cause than Art at reserve forests across the State. Once, the people with the saws, all of them essentially daily-wagers were arrested for cutting down trees for timber reportedly required for the construction of an army garage. Only the porters languished in judicial custody, the string was never unspooled to reach to the better informed people who had placed the order.

The laws protecting our forests and wildlife are very strict. Apart from rape and murder, violations of the Forest Act are perhaps the only crimes that cannot be settled out of court or withdrawn. We have seen how strict forest officials can become when it comes to evicting encroachers from forest land when they are impoverished families like migrant labourers or rural folk who rely on the forests for sustenance. We often hear of woodcutters arrested for illicit felling and rural folk have been banned from taking their cattle to graze. How often have we heard of a raid on a palatial building which has consumed many trees just to get the flooring done and consumed still more trees for the paneling and the furniture? The porters who double as woodcutters might or might not be aware of the forest laws, they might even be felling trees knowing that it is illegal to do so, but they are driven by their need to do so. Those who order the wood from them are definitely aware of the laws against such activities and have only their greed to blame for their actions. What has to be targeted is this greed.

No amount of legislations and laws and rules can succeed if the only people who get rounded up are those driven by their need. Greed, on the other hand, can be easily suppressed if some examples are set or a genuine stab made at raising awareness and transposing some guilt. People in need for a wage and some quick money are easily replaced so rounding them up does not address the problem until the demand remains. Our protectors of the forest have to start striking at places from where the demands are being placed from. Why is it that illicit wood is almost always caught in-transit or in houses serving only as ware houses? Why are those who place orders after which trees are felled, never booked?

Today this area is part of the Russian Federation, north of Georgia, covering the modern day Russian Re-publics of Karachay-Cherkessia, Kabardino-Balkaria, and Adygea.

One of many accounts by slaves over the course of the 19th century, this letter, written in Arabic, takes us back to a time when men and women moved around quite differently within the Med-

MAGHREB. AN ELDORADO FOR EUROPEANS

Until the first half of the 20th century, it was rare for men, women and children to cross the South Mediterranean from North Africa in a bid to reach the shores of Europe and beyond.

On the contrary, Italians, French, Spanish and Greeks flocked to North Africa, fleeing poverty and overpopula tion in their own countries. They sought their fortunes on fresh soil, in Maghreb and in the trans-Atlantic colonies

North African (rather than European) countries were also a landing point, not only for African slaves forced to cross the Sahara but also, until the mid-19th century, for Caucasian, Georgian and Greek slaves, following their upris-ings against the Ottoman Sultans in the

At the time Muhammad Khaznadar not yet under European colonial rule. The French had taken Algiers two years earlier, and also conquered a number of cities on the Algerian coast in a series of violent attacks between 1830 and 1832. The rest of North Africa was either

ruled by the Alawite dynasty, as was the case in Morocco, or as in Tunis and Trip-oli, under the authority of a governor appointed by the Ottoman Empire.

Men who came from afar, like Mu-hammad Khaznadar and his master Shakir, climbed prodigiously high in the social ranks: Shakir was the Vizier, the chief advisor to the Ottoman governors of Tunis, Italians, Maltese, British, French and other Europeans rushed to Tunis and Algiers and Tripoli to make money though more or less legal means, in trade, coral fishing and sometimes smuggling (tobacco, arms, coffee, etc.).

DEBUNKING THE THEORY OF A 'GREAT REPLACEMENT'

has happened since the days of Muhammad the Treasurer? What brought on the upsurge in African migration to Europe [especially since the 1950sl? How did Maghreh change from a place that attracted and controlled the migration and movement of women and men from Africa, Asia and Europe, to a stopover on the way to the Mediterranean and Europe?

If we just jog our short memories and take a look back at the 19th century, we can remember all the great trans-formations this part of the world has undergone: the slow takeover of African markets and economies by European powers; the official abolition of slavery from the late 1840s onwards, in Tunisia and Algeria, and the gradual disappear ance of slave trafficking, first in the Mediterranean and then from West Africa to Maghreb; the advent of colonization, first in Algeria in 1830, then in Tunisia as early as 1881, and Morocco and Libya in the early 1910s, just prior to the outbreak of World War I; the immigration of European colonists, whose number in Algeria would reach 1 million, against 9 million "Muslims" when the country became independent in 1962, when the pieds-noirs left the country en mass for mainland Europe; and, finally, the eco-nomic immigration of North African workers, and workers from other African nations, after World War II, to help rebuild and bolster the economies of the former colonial powers.

Talking into account all these historical events, migration from the South to the North cannot possibly be described as an "invasion" or as part of the so-called great replacement theory, as some would have us believe. It is the result of constructed economic dependence, new labour migration, exploitation, and colonial and post-colonial domination. From a simple treasurer, Muhammad the slave became Prime minister at the beginning of the 1880s, when France took over Tunisia. His life, like that of millions of other migrants, was also shaped by the many great transformations that transpired in the Mediterranean. [the writer is Assistant professor, his-

Iesus wasn't white: he was a brown-skinned, Middle Eastern Jew. Here's why that matters

I grew up in a Christian home, where a photo of Jesus hung on my bedroom wall. I still have it. It is schmaltzy and rather tacky in that 1970s kind of way, but as a little girl I loved it. In this picture, Jesus looks kind and gentle, he gazes down at me lovingly. He is also light-haired, blue-eyed, and very white.

The problem is, Jesus was not white. You'd be forgiv-en for thinking otherwise if vou've ever entered a Western church or visited an art gallery. But while there is no physical description of him in the Bible, there is also no doubt that the historical Jesus, the man who was executed by the Roman State in the first century CE. was a brown-skinned, Middle

Eastern Jew.
This is not controversial from a scholarly point of view, but somehow it is a forgotten detail for many of the millions of Christians who will gather to celebrate Easter this week.

On Good Friday, Christians attend churches to worship Jesus and, in particular, re-member his death on a cross. In most of these churches, Je-sus will be depicted as a white man, a guy that looks like Anglo-Australians, a guy easy for other Anglo-Australians to identify with.

Think for a moment of the rather dashing Jim Caviezel, who played Jesus in Mel Gibson's Passion of the Christ. He is an Irish-American actor. Or call to mind some of the most famous artworks of Jesus' crucifixion – Ruben, Grunewald, Giotto – and again we see the European bias in depicting a white-skinned Jesus.

Does any of this matter? Yes, it really does. As a society, we are well aware of the power of representation and the importance of diverse role models.

After winning the 2013 Oscar for Best Supporting Actress for her role in 12 Years a Slave, Kenyan actress Lupita Nyong'o shot to fame. In interviews since then, Nyong'o has repeatedly articulated her feelings of inferiority as a young woman because all the images of beauty she saw around her were of light-er-skinned women. It was only when she saw the fashion world embracing Sudanese mod-el Alek Wek that she realised black could be beautiful too.

If we can recognise the importance of ethnically and physically diverse role models in our media, why can't we do the same for faith? Why do we continue to allow images of a whitened Jesus to dominate?

Many churches and cultures do depict Jesus as a brown or black man. Orthodox Christians usually have a very different iconography to that of European art – if you enter a church in Africa, you'll likely see an African Jesus on display

But these are rarely the images we see in Austra-lian Protestant and Catholic churches, and it is our loss. It allows the mainstream Chris-tian community to separate their devotion to Jesus from compassionate regard for

those who look different.

I would even go so far as to say it creates a cognitive disconnect, where one can feel deep affection for Jesus but little empathy for a Middle Eastern person. It likewise has implications for the theological claim that humans are made in God's image. If God is always imaged as white, then the default human becomes white and such thinking undergirds racism.

Historically, the whitewashing of Jesus contributed

Can the cricketers banned for ball tampering ever regain their hero status? It's happened before

Overnight, Cricket Australia handed out its promised "significant sanctions" for a ball-tampering incident that has engulfed the sport in scandal. Steve Smith and David War-ner, the team's captain and vice-captain, have been banned for 12 months. Cameron Ban croft, who carried out the failed plot, received a nine-month ban.

It was also revealed it was sandpaper, and not "yellow tape and the granules from the rough patches of the wicket" as originally claimed, that Bancroft tried to use to alter the ball's condition in the Test match between South Africa and Australia.

While the International Cricket Council (ICC) initially suspended Smith for only one Test, all three are now banned from international and domestic (professional) cricket in Australia. Smith and Warner have also had their lucrative Indian Premier League contracts torn up, and some sponsors have already distanced themselves from the players and the sport. But these measures fall short of the lifetime hans some called for

As captain, Smith has borne the brunt of the public and media vitriol, particularly as he accepted responsibility for what had happened. He may yet be Australian captain again in the future.

But according to Cricket Australia's investigation, it was Warner who developed the plan and instructed Bancroft - a younger player - to carry it out. Warner also showed a "lack of contrition" and will therefore not be considered for any leadership position in the future

DOES THE PUNISHMENT FIT THE CRIME? Ball tampering is clearly cheating; it breaks the rules and is against the "spirit of cricket". But while it has been deemed the "moral equiva-lent of doping", there is a lack of consistency in how sanctions are dished out to offenders.



been more lenient: Pakistan's Shahid Afridi received a two-game ban for biting the ball in an attempt to alter its condition.

However, a harder line has been taken for incidents of match-fixing. Three Pakistan players were banned and jailed for a spot-fixing incident in 2010. South Africa's Herschelle Gibbs received a six-month ban in 2000 for agreeing to fix a match, even though he did not follow through with it.

Lifetime bans are not uncommon in sport generally. Ryan Tandy was banned for life for attempted spot-fixing in a rugby league game. Lance Armstrong was banned from sanctioned Olympic sports for life and had his results voided for his serial doping in cycling. Even figure skating is not immune: Tonya Harding was similarly banned for hindering the prosecution

into a vicious attack on a fellow competitor. It is difficult to compare sanctions across sports. But, when doing so, the inconsistencies are apparent. Boxer Mike Tyson was handed a 15-month ban for biting off part of Evander Holyfield's ear; footballer Luis Suarez received an eight-game ban for racially abusing an opponent; fellow footballer Paul Davis only served a nine-match ban for

punching and breaking an opponent's jaw.
In light of these punishments, are ni and 12-month bans for premeditated cheat-

ing and lying reasonable and just?

Cricket Australia has been criticised for the time it took to reach a decision. But it's essential that due diligence is done and facts are gathered before a sentence is handed down. Without this, decisions are made through the pressure of public shaming, and social media get to cast the final vote on the punishment.

If sporting organisations want players to act norally on field, then they too should be guided

FORGIVE AND FORGET?

Society is often keen to forgive top athletes when they transgress. When athletes admit their mistakes and ask forgiveness it is usually granted. Over time, sports fans also tend to forget

athletes' errors and focus solely on their on-field ability. In cricket, for instance, Don Bradman's role in disputes over pay as a cricket administrator is largely glossed over. Shane Warne's year-long ban for a doping violation is rarely mentioned.

Drugs cheats are accepted (and somenes welcomed) back into sport – some even after multiple doping offences.

In many sports, athletes' chequered pasts are ignored in favour of their on-field ability. It is often the actions that come as a result of their behaviour that are judged, and not the

Athletes frequently transgress, but their subsequent redemption is often woven into the narrative around them. Stories around sporting heroes follow several patterns, but the most recognised is the hero's journey. The "hero" sets out on a quest but is faced by a crisis or descends into a hellish underworld. They "heroically" overcome these challenges and ultimately return to glory.

In this instance, Smith, Warner and Bancroft are in a hell of their own making. If they manage to return, and do so triumphantly, then it is likely they will be forgiven – and some may even forget their role in this sor-ry affair. Only time will tell whether they will again be considered heroic.

Sindhu hopes to be fit in time to lead India's medal rush

New Delhi, Apr 1 (PTI):

Ctruck by an ankle sprain prior Struck by an annual factor the Commonwealth Games, Olympic silver medallist PV Sindhu hoped to regain peak fitness before the start of individual events and assured India will return with multiple medals.

Sindhu had suffered sprain on her right ankle while practicing at the Gopichand Academy on Tuesday but scans showed no injury to the bone or ligament, much to the relief

of Indian contingent and fans.
"Preparation wise every-thing has been going on well for me. Of course, unfortunately, I sprained my ankle a bit but I think I should be fine by the time the Games starts, I hope I will be completely fit by then," the 22-year-old Indian told PTI.

Four years ago, Sindhu had hoped of retaining the women's singles gold that Saina Nehwal won for India for the first time in the Delhi edition.

However, the yellow metal eluded her and she settled for a bronze after losing in the semi-finals to Canada's Michelle Li.

A lot has changed since then and Sindhu is currently India's top shuttler and a prime contender for the gold medal at CWG, given the field which is nothing compared to the Super Series tournaments that she



plays throughout the year.

"Last time I had a bronze and this time I want to do well and give my best. I can't tell a particular number but definitely we will get a lot of medals this time," she said.

At Glasgow CWG, Sindhu had entered the tournament as a 18-year-old who had become the first Indian woman to win a medal at the World Championship. Though she settled for

bronze in the event, she went on to add another bronze at the 2014 Copenhagen World Championship.

The following year, Sindhu reached the finals at Denmark Open and then clinched her third successive title at Macau Open. However, those were mere trailers of what was to

come next.

Sindhu simply exploded in 2016 when she clinched India's

first silver medal in badminton at Olympics and became the toast of the country with her title at the China Open. She also won the Malaysia Masters early in that year.

Catapulted to the top echelon of sports, Sindhu continued her run as she clinched the Sved Modi Grand Prix Gold, India Open and Korea Open in a highly-successful 2017.

stayed in the minds of badminton aficionados was the epic 110-minute battle with Japan's Nozomi Okuhara at the Glasgow World Championship final which ended with a loss for the Indian, though her grit and fit-

ness and appreciated by all.
While she won these titles there were disappointments in store in Hong Kong and Dubai Super Series Final where, despite playing her heart out, she couldn't win titles, losing in the final hurdle by a whisker.

The jinx continued at India Open this year where she lost in the final to USA's Beiwen Zhang and then suffered vet another heartbreaking loss in the finals of All England Cham-

pionship early in March.

'Indian laws inadequate to deal with data theft'

New Delhi, Apr 1 (PTI): At 462.12 million, India has the second highest number of internet users in the world after China but lacks the legal framework to ensure data protection and privacy with current laws inadequate for the rapidly-evolving sector, say cyber security experts.

As data theft becomes the po-

litical buzzword pitching the rul-ing BJP against the opposition Congress, recent revelations on the issue have forced people to re-ex-amine their everyday social media browsing habits, particularly on Facebook

It started mid March with in-ternational media reports claiming that the profiles of 50 million Facebook users were harvested by UK-based analytics firm Cambridge Analytica (CA) to influence the US presidential election and the pro-Brexit campaign as well as polls in other countries.

The resulting storm engulfed

India too, with former CA employ-

ee-turned-whistleblower Christopher Wylie claiming the firm ex-tensively operated in the country and had served political parties including the Congress and the Janata Dal (United).

Beyond the global impact of the biggest-ever data breaches and the social media behemoth Facebook, the scandal brought to the fore the shortcoming of India's laws to deal with ever advancing issues of online privacy and data theft in the country, say experts.

"India has the second highest number of internet users glob-ally. However India's Information Technology Act, 2000 and its amendments -- 2008 and 2011 -- are not well suited to deal with social media and internet related cyber-crimes," said Jaspreet Singh, partner, Cyber Security, Ernst & Young.

According to figures by Internet World Stats, a website featuring data on global internet usage, China had highest number of internet users at 738.5 million till

ond and the US third with 286.94 million users. India does not have a dedicated law on data protection and privacy, said Singh.

Consequently, the third party transfers and cross border mov ment of personal data, the entire sharing ecosystem, is not adequately dealt with under the Indi-an IT Act. If any organisation is disclosing the personal information to third parties in India for data profiling or other such marketing and business purposes, there is no effective legal solution that is available," he added.

Supreme Court lawyer Pavan Duggal said it would be a mistake to expect the IT Act to be a holistic one-point legal framework for cyber security as it was enacted 10 years ago.

"... there have been dramatic advances in cyber security and also cyber security breaches, but the law has stood frozen in point of time in history," the cyber law specialist told PTI.

Defunct space lab to re-enter earth tomorrow: China

BEIJING, APR 1 (PTI): A defunct uncontrolled Chinese space laboratory is set to re-enter the earth's atmosphere tomorrow and expected to fall anywhere from Australia to the US, Chinese officials said today.

China's Tiangong-1 space station, which is falling towards earth, was reported to have been 179 km outside the earth's atmosphere by Sunday noon (local time). China Manned Space Agency was quoted as saying by the Hong Kong-based

South China Morning Post.

The agency, however, did not provide an exact arrival time or likely landing site for abandoned eight-tonne Tiangong, a Chinese

The European Space Agency forecast the space laboratory's re-entry for about 7.25 am on Monday (local time).

Based on its current trajectory, scientists have said the space station could land anywhere from Australia to the US with the southern part of Michigan's Lower Pen-insula included in the strip of the US from northern California to Pennsylvania where it might crash down, the report said.

Authorities in the US state of Michigan were taking no chances, however, and had put emergency teams on standby in preparation for the possibility of it landing on their patch, it said.

Chinese officials said the falling debris will not cause much damage as small amounts of the space lab's fuel will be burnt together with other parts on its re-entry into the

earth's atmosphere.

"It will not cause damage to objects on earth nor produce toxic substances," Chinese military officials said earlier.

On Thursday, Chinese Defence spokesman Col Ren Gouging said China has briefed all relevant international agencies, including the UN, out the re-entry of the spacelab.

Launched in September 2011,

Tiangong-1 was an experimental space lab with designed life of two years.

'Final evacuation deal' reached for Syria's embattled Ghouta

reached for fighters and civilians to leave the last opposition-held pocket of Eastern Ghouta, a monitor said today, paving the way for Syria's regime to retake the onetime rebel enclave near Damascus.

The deal brokered by regime ally Russia would see fighters with the Jaish al-Islam rebel faction leave Ghouta's main town of Douma for opposition-held territory in northern Syria, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

There was no immediate confirmation from the rebels, but pro-regime newspaper Al-Watan quoted "diplomatic sourc-Al-Watan es" as saying the agreement would see fighters give up heavy weapons and leave Douma for northern Syria.

ElseWhere

The retaking of Eastern Ghouta would mark a maior milestone in Pres-

ident Bashar al-Assad's efforts to regain control of territory seized by rebel factions during Syria's seven-year civil war.

Backed by Russia, Assad's forces have scored a se ries of victories over rebel forces in recent years, often through campaigns of siege, aerial bombardment and ground offensives that have drawn widespread international condemnation.

The Observatory, a Britain-based monitoring group, said Sunday's deal provides for Jaish al-Islam fighters and their families, as well as civilians who want, to be evacuated to rebel-held areas in the northern province of Aleppo.

It will also see Russian military police enter the vn and government institutions return to the area, the monitor said.

Regime forces had already retaken more than 95 per cent of Eastern Ghouta in a six-week air and ground blitz that forced tens of thousands from their homes.

Successive evacuation deals were reached with rebel forces in parts of the enclave, with more than 45,000 fighters and civilians bussed out in recent weeks. Tens of thousands of other civilians have fled to regime-held territory.

More than 4,000 people left the devastated town of Harasta last week under a deal with the Ahrar

And more than 41,000 evacuated a southern pocket including the town of Arbin this week under another deal with the Faylaq al-Rahman opposition faction.

civil authorities in Douma for hundreds of civilians to leave for Idlib, a northwestern province still largely outside regime control, the Observatory said.

 T^{op} South Korean musical acts including a K-pop girlband are set to hold a rare concert in North Korea today in the lat-

concert in North Korea today in the lat-est reconciliatory gesture before a rare in-ter-Korean summit.

Sunday's event -- which will be the first concert by South Korean artists in the North for more than a decade -- comes as a diplomatic thaw quickens on the peninsula after months of military tensions military tensions.

The 120-member group -- 11 musical acts as well as dancers and technicians -- flew to Pyongyang on Saturday to perform concerts on

Sunday as well as on Tuesday.

South Korean singers held a rehearsal Sunday afternoon at the East Pyongyang
Grand Theatre where the concert is set to begin at 0830 GMT, according to South Korean

The rapprochement was triggered by the South's Winter Olympics, to which the North's

leader Kim Jong Un sent athletes, cheerleaders and his powerful sister as an envoy.

Kim followed up by agreeing to summits with US President Donald Trump and the South's President Moon Jae-in. The young lead-er also met Chinese President Xi Jinping in Bei-jing last week during his first overseas trip.

The inter-Korean summit, the third after meetings in 2000 and 2007, will be held on April 27. No date has been set for the US-North Korean summit although it is expected before the end of May.

The most closely-watched group set to per-form Sunday is Red Velvet, part of the South's

hugely popular K-pop phenomenon that has taken audiences in Asia and beyond by storm in recent decades.

The five-member girlband is known for a mix of upbeat electronic music, stylish fashion and high-voltage choreography.

Joy, one of the five members, would miss the trip to Pyongyang due to her TV drama shooting schedule, their agency has said.

Despite the North's isolation and strict curbs on unauthorised foreign culture, backed up by prison terms, K-pop has be-come increasingly popular there thanks to flash drives smuggled across the border with its neighbour China.

Other Seoul stars to join the concerts include Cho Yong-pil, a singer who held a solo

sell-out concert in Pyongyang in 2005. Kim's late father and longtime ruler, Kim Jong II, was known to be a fan of the 68-year-

Another famed singer, Choi Jin-hee, is set to perform for the fourth time in the North and to sing "Maze of Love" -- a pan-peninsula hit and one of the late Kim's favourites.

It was unclear whether Kim Jong Un would make an appearance at the concerts. President Moon attended a concert by visiting North Korean singers in Seoul to celebrate the opening of the Pyeongchang Winter Olympics in February.
"I hope that something similar will happen

during this concert held in response (to the North's Seoul concert)," Do Jong-hwan, Seoul's culture chief leading the delegation, told reporters in Pyongyang.

With Jason Statham's Deckard Shaw becoming part of that family, after mak-ing up for his bad-guy duties on Furious 7, the pairing of the two action-stars in a separate movie seemed like a no-brainer. Leitch was linked with the project and a start date for filming was reportedly set for sometime in September of this year

According to the latest report produc-



tion start date has now been specifically narrowed down to September 4th. Not only that, but three locations have also been locked-in for the scheduled shoot-ing. Cameras will reportedly be rolling in Atlanta, GA, with other sequences set to take place in undisclosed locations in Ha-waii and the United Kingdom.

The continual reports of Leitch's involvement with the film has led to speculation that Charlize Theron's Cipher will play the villain in the spinoff, due to their work together on Atomic Blonde.

But plot specifics and further casting details have yet to be confirmed. The easy chemistry displayed between Johnson and Statham – both action franchise vet-erans who never take their movie roles too seriously - should make for entertaining viewing, and maybe move away from the emphasis on family and highspeed vehicles that have marked the films so far. Hopefully, the reports are accurate and audiences can expect to see Hobbs and Shaw crash onto screens

DOCTOR STRANGE WRITER CONFIRMS SEQUEL VILLAIN & STORY DETAILS

mare in Doctor Strange 2, according to the first film's writer. Marvel Studios opened up a new corner to the Marvel Cinematic Universe when Benedict Cumberbatch finally brought the future Sorcerer Supreme onto the big screen in 2016. Directed by Scott Derrickson, Doctor Strange was a moderate success at the box office, which presumably would garner a sequel, but Marvel is being cagey on confirming anything involving Doctor Strange 2.

Cumberbatch is going to be heavily featured in both Avengers: Infinity War and Avengers 4 either way, so a sequel's chances are based on the assumptions that he makes it out alive. Derrickson and Robert C. Cargill, who wrote the first movie, have recently been teasing that they're still working together, and now Cargill's confirmed where their sequel will go should they be fortunate enough

to make one.

MovieWeb shared quotes from a Q&A Cargill recently did at a movie screening, where he confirmed that Nightmare – the ruler of the Nightmare Realm and Dream Dimension - is going to be the villain for Doctor Strange 2.

This is something that Derrickson's has long expressed interest in, but now we know for certain that they intend to follow through. That decision does mean that Baron Mordo's (Chiwetel Ejiofor) antagonistic turn at the end of the first movie won't be the focus, but he's still going to be very much involved.

"Me and Scott have not laid the

groundwork for it but what I can say is that I have a feeling that whatever Night-mare is involved with, Baron Mordo, being somebody who considers himself the defender of natural law will have something to do with it."

Cargill's explanation for Mordo's presence in the sequel could lead to a number of different outcomes. First off, it could mean that Mordo will be involved in helping Nightmare torment the regular world and come after Doctor Strange. But, there's also the possibility that it could force Strange and Mordo, former friends turned enemies, to make an uneasy alliance to defeat him. Cargill actually elaborated on Mordo's future, teasing that Marvel has major plans for Ejiofor. "For those of you who have ever read

the comics, you know that Baron Mordo

has a very particular arc, and that's some thing we discussed with Chiwetel while working on the first movie. And part of the reason Chiwetel wanted to play Mordo was because he has a definitive ending as a character and it's such a fascinating ending. And I do know that whether we're attached or not, that Marvel plans on working towards that ending and fully realizing Mordo as more than just a cardboard cutout villain, but actually taking him to kind of Loki levels of awesomeness. That's the goal with him."

This is great news for anyone who liked what Ejiofor brought to the MCU in Doctor Strange. Even though Cargill admits here that there's not a guarantee that he and Derrickson will be the people to see this arc through, it once again shows Marvel's planning when it comes to their growing cinematic universe. Plus, if Loki (Tom Hiddleston) dies in Infinity War as many expect, then the MCU could use another complicated villain to seed through various films. However it plays out for Cargill and Derrick-son, they've clearly got plans for Doctor Strange 2 that continue to build out the mystical side of this universe
