New Delhi, Mar 28 (PTI): The Editors Guild of India today demanded strict action in the recent cases of alleged killing of journalists in Bihar and Madhya Pradesh, saying the culprits in these "heinous attacks" on scribes, who had exposed wrongdoings, should be brought to book speedily.
The Press Council of

India (PCI) too sought reports from both the state governments in these cases, and also from the Delhi Police commission-er on the alleged assault on journalists by cops while they were covering a demonstration in the Jawaharlal Nehru Uni-

versity (JNU) here.
A 35-year-old journalist Sandeep Sharma, working with a television channel, was reported-ly mowed down by a truck in Bhind district of Madhya Pradesh on Monday. He was involved in exposing the nexus between sand mafia and some police personnel.

Chief Minister inaugurates Sikkim's first Entrepreneurs' Hub Centre

In a major development for the State, Sikkim's first Entrepre-neurs' Hub Centre was inaugurated by Chief Minister Pawan Chamling here at Samman Bhawan today.

The Entrepreneurs' Consul-tation Centre is the first of its kind in the entire North East Region. Sikkim is also perhaps the only State where such a Centre will be located in the office of the Chief Minister, which goes to show the impetus laid by the Government on facilitating an entrepreneurs to evolve

The initiative is also in line with the Chief Minister's Startup Scheme launched by the state government last year.

Addressing young and budding entrepreneurs, the Chief Minister congratulated the founding members and the entire team of entrepreneurs for setting up the Hub Centre and for embracing the field of en-trepreneurship. He called upon the entrepreneurs to take up the mantle of educating the youth in the State who are disillusioned and are still living with the tra-

NEW DELHI, MAR 28 (PTI): The CBSE today announced re-exam-ination in the Class 10 mathematics and Class 12 economics subjects in the wake of reports of paper leaks even as Union HRD minister Prakash Ja-vadekar said a new leakproof system would be put in place for conduct-ing the board exams.

Seeking to reach out to parents and students worried over the alleged incidents of repeated leaks, Javadekar said he has spoken to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and apprised him about the developments.

He also said that the HRD ministry had initiated an internal probe into the matter

Guv not to visit injured DSP in Durgapur KOLKATA, MAR 28 (PTI):

WB govt advises

The West Bengal government has advised Government nor K N Tripathi against visiting Durgapur to meet a DSP, injured in violence over a Ram Navami procession in Ran-iganj, citing its inability to provide him adequate security, according to a statement issued by the Rai Bhavan.

The governor had planned to visit the hospital in Durgapur where Asansol-Durgapur Dep-uty Commissioner of Police Arindam Dutta Chowdhury is being treated to acquaint himself with the situation, the statement issued by the Governor's press secretary read.

Chowdhury lost a hand during the violence when the agitators hurled a bomb at him

"The state government informed that in view of deployment of police in the area, it will be difficult to provide adequate security to the Hon'ble Governor during the visit," the statement read.

The government said the situation was tense in the violence-hit region, including the near-by areas of Raniganj and Asansol and it was not "advisable for the gover-nor to visit Durgapur".

The governor appealed to all sections of society to maintain peace, it added.

Heavy police force was deployed in the Raniganj area yesterday after clashes broke out between two groups on Monday over a Ram Navami procession in which one person was killed and two police officers were injured, according to officials.

In another incident one person was killed and five police personnel were injured in a group clash in Purulia on Sunday.

Singtam's old ticket counter and old bridge receive renewed attention



SINGTAM, 27 MAR:

Established in 1974, the ticket counter in Singtam bazaar is part of the history of the town, and a quaint piece of "architecture" which the people are familiar with and have even grown fond of over the years. This, along with the Old Bridge, constructed in 1929, are in desperate need of conservation and upkeep, a possibility imperiled by the "beautification" works underway here.

While one understands the need for urban spaces to receive facelifts and modernisation, the construction of the flyover here and the amphitheater are progressing at such a fast clip that these landmarks of Singtam

could be lost.

While some might find nothing wrong with such losses, others hold a different opinion.

"The ticket counter is a part of history and had watched the passage of time here. It stands today as one of the last remnants of the era gone by. And since Singtam is moving towards beautification process, I on behalf of the association request the concerned authority to kindly take this as an appeal for renovation and maintenance of the old ticket counter. The structure could fit in well, in its own way, with the idea and devolvement of tourism in Sikkim by celebrating heritage," shares Tinku Adhikari, president of the SMTWA.

An application with a request seeking protection and declaration of the above-mentioned spots as heritage es-tablishments of Singtam was also submitted to the Municipal Executive Officer today, emphasizing "the importance to safeguard these pieces of

history".

The MEO, Himmat Rai, while responding to the letter, said, "We will definitely be looking into these matters because it represents the history of Singtam Bazaar and the state too.'

Nearly 300 killed in communal violence in 2015-17, Govt tells RS

New Delhi, Mar 28 (PTI): Nearly 300 peo-ple, including 111 in 2017 alone, were killed in various incidents of communal violence in last three years across India, the Rajya Sabha was informed today.

Union Minister of State for Home Hansraj Gangaram Ahir said 111 people were killed and 2,384 others were injured in 822 communal incidents in the country in 2017. In 2017, the highest 44 peo-ple were killed in Uttar Pradesh in 195 commu-nal incidents, followed by 12 deaths in 91 such inci-

dents in Rajasthan.

In 2016, 86 people were killed and 2,321 others were injured in 703 communal incidents in the country. That year, among all the states, Uttar Pradesh had seen 162 communal incidents in which 29 people were killed.

As many as 12 people were killed in 101 communal incidents in Kar-

nataka in 2016. In 2015, 97 people were killed and 2,264 others were injured in 751 communal incidents in the country.

Govt issues notice to Facebook over data breach

NEW DELHI, MAR 28 (PTI): The government today issued a notice to social networking giant Facebook, seeking its response over the user data breach and details of the measures it has put in place to ensure safety and prevent mis-

use of personal data.

The Ministry of Electronics and IT (Meity) today said that a notice seeking details relating to breach of data from Facebook had been sent to Cambridge Analytica particularly with regard to reports in the media about questionable practices attributed to the UKbased firm in their efforts to influence elections.

"It is felt that there is a need for further information about the data breach from Facebook. Accordingly, a letter has been issued by the Ministry of Electronics & IT on March 28, 2018 to Facebook seeking their response," Meity said in a

The ministry has raised five questions in all including whether the personal data of Indian voters and users has been compromised by Cambridge Analytica or any other downstream entity in any manner.
The ministry

asked social media major to submit a reply wheth-er the company or its related or downstream agencies utilising Face-book's data have previously been engaged by any entities "to manipu-late the Indian electoral process".

The letter sent to Facebook said that at present, it has largest footprint in India in terms of its user base and sought its reply on proactive measures being taken by the company to ensure safety, security and privacy of such large user data and to prevent its misuse by any third party.

Four SADA cases in one day SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 28 MAR:

Gyalshing police on 27 Mar arrested and booked a 34-year-old man from Mangley, West Sikkim, under Sikkim Anti Drugs Act, 2006, after he was allegedly found in possession of 183 capsules if Spasmoproxyvon and 40 N-10 tablets along with eight bottles of illegal cough syrup. The police were acting on a tip from a source who alleged that the accused was selling the substances to buyers at Pelling. He reportedly revealed to the police that he had bought the substances from Siliguri. After conducting medical examination the accused was arrested and is currently in police custody.

In another SADA case on the same day, two persons in their 20's were intercepted by Rangpo Police at Mandi Bazaar allegedly looking for prospective buyers. Upon searching their belongings, the police reported-ly recovered 56 capsules Spasmoproxyvon and 10 N-10 tablets. Both the ac cused were later booked under SADA, 2006 and arrested.

Rangpo police on the same day during routine checking of incoming vehicles at Rangpo checkpost detained a 30-yearold woman from Tadong, East Sikkim. Upon searching her belongings in front of independent witnesses, the police re-covered 923 capsules Spasmoproxyvon and 104 N-10 tablets. The woman has been booked

under SADA, 2006. In the fourth SADA case of the day, a 25-yearold man was intercepted at Jubilee Line in Singtam, East Sikkim, after Police received informa-tion from sources that the man was selling contraband substances. On investigation, 278 Spasmoproxyvon capsules were recovered from his belongings. The accused has also been booked un der SADA, 2006.

We will ensure no injustice is caused. I just want to tell the parents and children that it is extremely unfortunate that this incident(s) happened, Javadekar said.

OK, Let's Talk Village Tourism Now

An exciting prospect in need for more inputs

There is no doubting that tourism is by far the safest ontion for the est option for the economic upliftment of Sikkim And let's also accept that during peak season, Gangtok bursts even past its seams. The 'season' has not even set in earnest, and the rush of tourists, much as it excites at the potential of what the coming months hold, should have one wondering how the capital will manage when it peaks.

When it comes to economic/employment engagement options, there is tourism, hydel and industry (almost exclusively pharmas really). There is also the potential of Organic Farming, but that is still in infancy and has not tickled the interest of the young in any meaningful way yet. The abundant hydel potential is obvious, but that calls for heavy investment which the State cannot afford on its own, and also, being technical in nature, although hydel projects bring in investments and will eventually also earn revenue, they create few jobs for the locals. Much the same applies to pharmaceutical units. In both activities, locals have limited career progression opportunities. It is different with tourism, especially when we are talking village tourism that the State has often announced as its priority sector.

Village tourism is inclusive because it involves the people and spreads the returns among them. It also has minimal impact on the environment since the very idea of village tourism hinges on keeping things the way they are and maybe just adding a dash of glamour and modern amenities to the rural experience with some exaggerated rituals and even pseudo-hospitality. All this we know and no one questions the logic of opting for village tourism/ homestays to bring about a quantum leap in the earnings of the rural Sikkimese. If it succeeds, the face of Sikkim

The operative word here is "if". It is obvious from the number of training camps and sensitisation programmes that the government is serious about weaning the people away from their traditional economies into the service sector of tourism. Even though there are some impressive success stories in the homestay sector, the government has to be extremely careful about how it moves ahead with this process. Its calculations have to be accurate and its role as the facilitator more nuanced. It is not enough to sponsor training sessions, they are only part of the "facilitating" process. The Tourism Department has to also get its statistics worked out and its projections formalised and achievable targets set. Before we convince every village in Sikkim to polish up their hospitality skills, the basic information we should have at hand is whether we can supply them the guests. Sikkim Tourism has to start collating a more detailed data on the profile of tourists who check into Sikkim. Are the tourists who come to Sikkim the kind who will opt for a rural experience in enough numbers? Equally important - do they spend enough time in Sikkim to soak in the rural ambience? It is unlikely that

such a study has been conducted. It should.

The general belief is that a majority of the tourists coming to Sikkim want to do Tsomgo, check out Baba Mandir, spend a day sightseeing around Gangtok and depart. Some also holiday at Pelling and return and others make a beeline for North Sikkim. This is not the tourist who will be spending idyllic evenings sipping Chang listening to folk songs by a campfire. For a starter, the Department should work out whether a majority of the tourists arriving in Sikkim would appreciate a rural escape. If they will, no problems. If they don't, then the Department has to find out where such tourists can be found and promote Sikkim's latest offerings there. Then, it will be playing out the role of the facilitator properly.

Are bullies alpha males or sick puppies?

 ${f G}$ rowing up in a rinky-dink Canadian city, I was tortured a lot. Part of the problem was that I was stunted by an environment filled with second-hand tobacco smoke and devoid of nutritious food. Consequently, I was small and weak. Not surprisingly, I was targeted a lot, bullied really, by students and teachers

In almost every year of my Catholic educatio past Grade 5, I have memories of abuse heaped upon me by all those in my life who were bigger and stronger than me. Since I was a stunted child, that pretty much amounted to everybody. Mine was not a pleasant childhood.

Of course, I cried and complained at first, but I

quickly learned to stuff my tears. I, like most others, was taught to believe my pain and suffering was the "natural order" of things. The strong rise to the top. The weak suffer and decline

My victimization was the natural and inevitable result of my "beta" status. No sense shedding tears or blaming the aggressive alphas. Like Eric Trump said a couple years ago while bragging about his "al-pha" daddy's assault talk — that's just what happens when "alpha personalities are in the same pres

No doubt we have all heard, and perhaps have even used, the term "alpha male." Ever since biologist David Mech first coined the term in 1970, certain types of aggressive and dominating behaviours, and even certain types of economic systems, like capitalism, have come to be associated with the "alpha" type. ALPHAS ARE NOT NATURAL AT ALL

The basic idea is simple. The alpha, the "strong dog," fights and bites his way to the top where he leads the pack and enjoys lots of food and sex, while the betas simper and grovel at the bottom.

Since Mech coined the term, those wishing to

justify aggressive, dominating, competitive, exploitative, even assaulting behaviour may adopt the alpha appellation, like a badge of evolutionary

It seems sensible enough, especially since it is based on natural biology. The only problem, according to an older and wiser Mech, is that alphas are not natural at all. In a video he posted on Youtube in 2008 (presumably because, despite numerous pleas, his university publisher won't stop print-ing his book) he admits he was wrong. "The term 'alpha' isn't accurate when describ-

ing most of the leaders of wolf packs," he says. The term implies that alphas "fought and competed to get to the top" whereas in fact, the actual opposite is true. "The social interactions among members of natural wolf packs are much calmer and more peaceful," says Mech.

There is some dominant/subordinate be haviour, but it is nothing like so often assumed. It is more a family hierarchy, with mom and dad at the top, and children flowing in right behind. It is more about ensuring family survival.

This is especially obvious in times of food scarcity where "alphas" dominate in order to ensure food goes to the pups. As Mech says, " ...the most practical effect of social dominance is to allow the dominant individual the choice of to whom to allot food." Parents, "both dominate older offspring and restrict their food intake when food is scarce, feeding pups instead."

A BEGINNER'S SCIENCE MISTAKE

As it turns out, alphas don't compete their way to

the top. As Mech says, in nature, all a wolf has to do to become an "alpha" is mate with the opposite sex and produce some offspring, "becoming the natural leaders that way.

In reality, wolves don't prowl around like some cartoon depiction of savage beasts. Instead, they act like healthy parents.

They assert wise authority to guide and preserve the pack. This is a much different behaviour pattern than we typically ascribe to them. I'm not even sure "dominance" is the most appropriate word for it anymore. Parenting seems much more

If there is no such thing as an alpha wolf, if an alpha is really just an attached and involved parent, why did Mech coin that term in the first place?

It was a beginner's science mistake. Biologists over generalized. They took observations of captive wolves, observations that wolf biologists had been making ever since Rudolph Schenke's 1948 "Captivity Observations," and they took it too far.

They assumed that what they saw in a zoo was the same behaviour that they would see in nature. They were wrong.

Even though Mech takes full responsibility for

the term, we should not blame him. He was a stu-dent doing what wolf biologists had done for decades. Nor should we be too hard on the biologists who made the mistake. Science is all about correctwho made the mistake. Science is all about correcting mistakes. We don't blame scientists for doing what they are supposed to do. We support them so they can do their important jobs.

ALPHA BEHAVIOUR AS LUPINE PTSD

Still, the error does raise a couple of important, and I imagine for some quite difficult, questions. If alpha behaviour is not natural behaviour, then what is it really?

And what about all the human "alphas" who have adopted, or been assigned, the alpha appellation. What does that term really mean?

Emerging research suggests that alpha behaviour may be the result of emotional disturbance caused by the stressful and generally objectionable experience of captivity.

Wolves in captivity are strangers to each oth-

er. They have lost their important primary attachments, are dealing with lack of control over their environment, and may even be experiencing lupine

but animals do have "comparable mental and emotional capacities as humans" and they are subject to trauma-induced mental and emotional pathology.

Losing your pack, for whatever reason, and get-

ting dragged into captivity would certainly qualify as trauma. In this context, the alpha behaviour wolf biologists observe in zoos certainly qualifies as emotional pathology.

This brings us to the second question which is: If alpha wolf behaviour is an as-yet-to-be-understood lupine emotional pathology, what about the proud human who adopts the term alpha?

For reasons obvious to anybody who has ever been victimized by the alpha types, it is an important question. There are some tantalising clues. For example, we are learning that childhood stress and neglect ("toxic socialization") impact our neurology, psychology and emotional health in complex

Toxic childhoods increase the incidence of conduct disorders, antisocial behaviours and even psychopathy. Toxic childhood experiences lead to serious emotional debilitation. Toxic childhoods cause neurobiological changes that undermine one's ability to empathise.

ALPHA MALE? OR SICK PUPPY

When you consider the types of questionable activities that alphas get up to in their quest to the top, when you consider the plausible hypothesis that alpha wolves may be traumatized puppies and when you see the neurobiological and emotional damage experienced by neglected and traumatized children, you naturally ask, what about the alphas in our lives and in political office?

What's really going on? Are we witnessing the alpha pinnacle, or are we dealing with an addicted

and traumatized puppy?
Unfortunately, scientists are just beginning to explore the question. Are the antics of the school yard bully an indication of some kind of empath-ic damage? Are the "stomach-churning" sexual assaults of "senior figures from business and politics" neurobiological dysfunctions? Are the antics of the "top dog" indicative reflections of a toxic childhood?

Alpha dog or sick puppy? It's an important question that, given the increasingly ridiculous state of our realities, I feel we all need to be asking right now.

Is my child depressed? Being moody isn't a mental health issue

theconversation.com T t is difficult to open up a magazine or newspaper today without seeing a headline trumpeting the presence of a "mental health crisis" — particularly on our college and university campuses.

Indeed, if the media coverage is to be believed, we are drowning in a sea of mental illness that threatens to overwhelm post-secondary institutions.

The call then is for more pills, more therapy, more of everything, including more panic. Perhaps it's time for some sober critical analysis.

The prevalence of mental illnesses (defined using

ar diagnostic criteria) is not rising in this cohort. Youth self-reports of negative emotions are inrouth sen-reports of negative emotions are increasing. But the self-report scales used in studies documenting this have not been calibrated for generational changes in language use. Nor have the results been validated using clear, clinically valid, diagnostic criteria applied by expert clinicians.

Some of the surveys that have contributed to this parts also allarge different experience into manifest.

panic also collapse different questions into meaning-less categories (for example collapsing "all the time"

and "often" into one category). The above noted self-reports do identify the ups and downs of everyday emotions, but these are not criteria for diagnosis of mental illness. So we can say that youth on campus may report feeling more negative emotions than previously, but this is not the same thing as saying that young people have more mental

THROWING GASOLINE ON THE FIRE Instead of applying critical thinking to these self-re-

ports, many health and media professionals have

rushed to throw gasoline on the fire.

Here's an example. In late 2017, the study "Mental ill-health among children of the new century: Trends across childhood with the focus on age 14" was pub-lished by the National Children's Bureau in the United

This showed that self-reported negative emo-tions were present in about one quarter of this surveved group, but this was interpreted as 25 per cent

of 14-year-old girls in the UK suffer from depression!

The fact that parental reports identified about five per cent of this cohort as having significant mood problems was ignored by almost all commentators.
This latter number is much more in keeping with

known rates of depression in the population.

The presence of a mental disorder was not independently established and the discrepancy between parental and child reports was ignored.

The cautionary words popularized by astronomer Carl Sagan, that "extraordinary claims require extraordinary evidence" were not applied. As expected, this study was followed by yet more calls for more therapy, more pills and more panic.

NEGATIVE EMOTIONS ARE HEALTHY

These concerns are not the result of substantial epidemic increases in the rates of mental illness. They arise, in some part, from poor mental health literacy and unrealistic expectations of the normal emotional states that life challenges elicit.

In many cases the self-identification of being "ill"

arises, to quote from Shakespeare's Hamlet, from not being able to differentiate the normal "slings and ar-

rows of outrageous fortune" from pathological states.

This is a cultural issue that has become a diagnostic expectation. A number of converging factors may have created this confusion

First, the increased public perception that being well means only having positive feelings is taking over the social discourse on mental health. When the measure of health is simply feeling good, negative emotions become a marker of being unwell.

However, normal negative emotions actually promote growth and are essential for human development and adaptation. Without negative emotions we exist in "Pleasantville." Without addressing the life challenges and opportunities that negative emotions signal to us, we can't develop resilience.

Mental health is not a static concept wearing a big smile. There are good days and bad days, good weeks and bad weeks. We still have mental health even if we are having negative emotions

PATHOLOGIZING NORMAL LIFE

Second, the use of words originally developed to identify mental illnesses to describe normal negative emotional states has burgeoned.

This includes the the term "mental health" itself which can mean both mental health and mental illness. No such confusion exists in other areas of

Further, the use of terms denoting illness, such as depression, to mean all negative emotions is even more confusing. Now, words like sadness, disappointment, disgruntlement, demoralization and unhappiness are all lumped together as depression.

As a result, the call is for more therapy, more pills

and more panic. We don't need more pills or therapy. We need to stop pathologizing normal life.

A TECHNOLOGICAL MISADVENTURE

Third is the rise of technology and electronic communication. Personal communication devices like smart phones limit the important face-to-face contact with others that makes us human. And the capacity of a text message does not allow for the expression of complex ideas.

We are struggling with the rational use of this technology and have yet to come to terms with how to control it, instead of it controlling us.

Living with, and on, our devices may even make us lonelier. The same phenomenon prevents us from making the face-to-face social connections that are necessary for social connection, the antidote to

This is not mental illness, it is technological mis-

So we have some challenges. We have to think critically about our language and our expectations. We need to develop mental health literacy — understand-ing how to maintain good mental health, understanding mental disorders and their treatments, decreasing stigma and increasing our capacity to appropriately seek help for mental illness, not for everyday unhappiness — to clarify this confusion.

Then, we have to learn how to take control of this

We managed to do that with the automobile. We now need to do it with the cell phone

Council president Ma-hua Das told reporters, "We will hold an inquiry to find out if there was any such leak and if any racket was involved to create confusion among the public.
"I do not believe that

any teacher will commit such an act. We will first ascertain the truth.'

Das asserted that with everal preventive measures in place, there was little possibility of the Higher Secondary question paper getting leaked.

Elaborating on the measures, Das said, "For the first time we have introduced the post of a special invigilator. The Council also did not allow candidates to go to the washroom within one hour of the examination."

'Quarter of Assam's tea sold via Guwahati Tea Auction Centre'

GUWAHATI, MAR 28 (PTI): Assam produces 650 million kg tea per year and a quarter of it is sold through the Guwahati Tea Auction Centre, In-dustry Minister Chandra Mohan Patowary told the Assembly today.

Fifteen per cent of the produce is sold through the Kolkata Tea Auction Centre and the rest to tea traders, Patowary said in reply to a question by Naren Sonowal (AGP) in the House.

Financial incentives are also provided through Tea Board of India to tea producers for value addition, creation of infrastructure, maintenance of cleanliness, blending, colour sorting, packaging, etc, the minister said.

To ensure small tea growers get fair price for their green leaf, District Level Monitoring Committee are being formed under each District Deputy Commissioner, he said, adding, as per Tea Board's Tea Marketing Control Order (TMCO) guideline, the price of green leaf is decided as per the auctioned price of tea of the factory buying the leaf.

As per the Tea Board's 2016 Base line Survey Data, there are 767 big tea gardens in Assam, 409 of which are public limited companies, 253 proprietor-owned, 82 in partnership and 23 public sector owned, he said.

ITANAGAR, MAR 28 (PTI): Two men were paraded naked by a mob in Upper Siang district of Arunachal Pradesh for allegedly raping a high school student, a top police official said

The two accused were thrashed and paraded naked by the mob, including women, in Yingkiong market area on March 26 before being handed over to the

The DIG said that a search has been launched to nab the two accused and a police team has been sent to Jengging in search of the duo, he said.

Terming the incident as "unfortunate", state Home Minister Kumar Waii has sought the support of one and all to bring the guilty to book.

He also asked minors

to avoid going out with strangers to unknown strangers to unknown locations and travelling after dark.

"Such incidents are

tackled with coordinated efforts," he said and advocated that the civil society should be vigilant to ensure the security of

Meanwhile, Arunachal Pradesh State Commission for Wom-en has asked the Upper Siang SP to nab the absconding culprits under the POCSO Act, 2012 and award exemplary pun-ishment to them.


The APSCW also requested the family mem-bers of the culprits and society to cooperate with the police to deliver jus-tice to the victim and her family.

Jagannath temple Ratna Bhandar to be opened after 34 years

Bhubaneswar, Mar 28 (PTI): The Odisha government today granted permission to the Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SITA) of Puri to open the Ratna Bhandar after 34 years for inspection by the Archaeological Survey of India.

Precious jewellery and ornaments of the deities are kept in the Ratna Bhandar which was last inspected in 1984 and only three of its seven chambers had been opened then. No one knows exactly what was

stored in the other chambers.

"The state government's Law department granted conditional permission to open the Lord's Ratna Bhandar for inspection by experts of the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) to assess its structural stability and safety," SJTA chief administrator P K Jena said.

However, he said he is yet to go through the condi-tions given by the state government.

"We'll certainly take precautionary measures be-fore opening the Ratna Bhandar," Jena said. He had earlier clarified that no assessment of the

ornaments or valuables kept inside the Ratna Bhandar will be undertaken and only visual inspection of its roof and walls will be done.

While a section of servitors are opposed to opening of the Ratna Bhandar, the Orissa High Court has asked the SJTA to inspect condition of the store house of valuable ornaments.

Jena said the modalities to be adopted for open-

ing of Ratna Bhandar will be discussed at a meeting of the Chhatisa Nijog (apex body of temple servitors)

The Orissa High Court on March 22 had ordered the ASI to inspect the structural condition of the Rat-na Bhandar on March 26 and 27 and submit a status

report on March 29.

The ASI has undertaken outer inspection of the Ratna Bhandar and said its outer surface is good. The condition of the inside of the Ratna Bhandar would be inspected after it is opened.

Warner, Smith banned for 1 year, out of IPL, India series

Smith and David Warner were slapped with a one-year international ban and ousted from this year's IPL, while Cameron Bancroft was sus-pended for nine months as Cricket Australia cracked the whip on the errant trio for its role in the ball-tampering scandal in South Africa.

The lengthy bans on the trio effectively rule them out of the November-December series against India. Virat Kohli's men are scheduled to tour Australia to play four Tests, three One Day Internationals (ODIs) and three Twentv20 International (T20I) matches.

In an extensive state-

ment, Cricket Australia announced the sanctions imposed on the three players, who were ordered to leave for home yesterday midway through the ongoing Test series against South Africa. The cricketers have seven days to appeal against the bans imposed on them.

Cameron Bancroft: suspension of 9 months from all international and domestic cricket," the CA statement read.

All three players will, however, be permitted to play club cricket "to maintain links with the cricket community".

As per the CA code of conduct, Smith has been found guilty of having knowledge of a potential plan to at-

condition of the ball; failure to take steps to seek to pre-vent the development and implementation of that plan; and directing that evidence of attempted tampering be concealed on the field of play,

concealed on the field of play, among other things. Smith had also been charged for "seeking to mis-lead Match Officials and others regarding Bancroft's attempts to artificially alter the condition of the ball; and misleading public comments regarding the nature, extent and participants of the plan."
"In addition, all three

players will be required to undertake 100 hours of voluntary service in community

cricket."

In a double blow for Smith and Warner, the two were barred from this year's IPL. This came after the CA sanctions and their forced stepping down as captains of Rajasthan Royals and Sunrisers Hyderabad respectively. Bancroft does not play in the

IPL.
CA said Smith and Banfor team leadership positions until one year after the end of their ban, while Warner will never be an option for captaincy role.

"Any consideration of future leadership would be conditional on acceptance by fans and the public, form and authority among the playing group. David Warner will not be considered for team leadership positions in the

CA Chairman David Peev-er said the rather stringent penalties are a reflection of Australia's current outrage at the actions of the players.

"These are significant penalties for professional players and the Board does not impose them lightly. It is hoped that following a peri-od of suspension, the players will be able to return to playing the game they and eventually rebuild their careers," he said.

SC dismisses plea seeking re-probe into Mahatma assassination

Supreme Court today dismissed a plea seeking a re-investigation into the assassination of Mahatma Gandhi.

A bench of Justices S A Bobde and L Nageswara Rao, which heard the matter, dismissed the petition filed by Mumbai-based Pankaj Phadnis from Abhinav Bharat.

The apex court, which reserved its verdict on March 6, had made it clear that it would not go by "sentiments" but rely on legal submissions to decide on the petition.

The apex court had said the

plea seeking retrial of the case was based on academic research but that could not form the basis to reopen the matter which happened years ago.

The petitioner had questioned the 'three bullet theory' relied upon by various courts to hold the conviction of Nathuram Godse and



Narayan Apte, who were hanged. He had contended that there was need to examine whether there

was a fourth bullet, which was fired Phadnis, a trustee of charita-

unfounded" remarks made by the

against Vinayak Damodar Savarkar and the setting up of a commission to probe the conspiracy behind the incident.

Phadnis alleged that the Maratha community was "ma-ligned" due to these adverse remarks, which should hence be removed. He said there should be a retrial of the case, which led to the conviction and execution of Godse and Apte on November 15, 1949.

The court, however, said it Ine court, nowever, said it did not share his sentiments that Marathas have been maligned and observed," Maratha people have survived in spite of all this. You are talking about two persons who happened to be from Maha-rashtra. They do not represent the state. Observation about two persons does not malign whole Marathis."

Phadnis claimed in his affida-

vit that the alleged conspirators were hanged even before the murder trial had attained legal finality from the top court.

Gandhi was shot dead at point blank range in New Delhi on Jan-uary 30, 1948 by Godse, a rightwing advocate of Hindu nationalism. The assassination case had led to the conviction and execution of Godse and Apte on November 15, 1949. Savarkar was given benefit of doubt due to lack of evidence.

Phadnis had challenged the decision of the Bombay High Court which on June 6, 2016 had dismissed his plea on two grounds --first, that the findings of fact have been recorded by the competent court and confirmed right up to the apex court; second, that the Kapur Commission had submitted its report and made observations in 1969, while the present petition was filed 46 years later.

G-4 nations call for transparency, attribution in UNSC reform discussions

UNITED NATIONS, MAR **28 (PTI):** India and other G-4 nations have called for transparency in nego tiations on UN Security Council reform, underlining that countries and groups making propos-als, specifically on veto and regional represen-tation, should be named in the documents framed for the discussions.

India's Permanen Representative to the UN Sved Akbaruddin, deliver ing a statement on behalf of the G-4 countries, said that at the informal meeting on intergovernmental negotiations on Security Council reform several proposals listed in the papers circulated for discussion are without any attribution of who made the suggestions.

He said there is a a need for utmost clarity and openness specifically in the sections of veto and regional representation.

"Currently, we see several unattributed propositions. Serious proposals made with genuine intent are not orphans with-out support. Or is it that those who have initially suggested these no longer desire to be associated with them. If that is so, we need to know. If not, we should not be selective in attributing, Akbaruddin said yesterday as member states discussed the circulated paper on 'Revised Elements of Commonality and Issues for Further Consideration'.

He asked why countries and groups making a certain proposal are not named.

"Why are some the children of a lesser God? What possible harm can come if we reflect the names of countries, groups proposing a cer tain position? Can't all aspire to being equally treated?, he said in his statement on behalf of

China to resume sharing hydrological data with India on Brahmaputra

BEIJING, MAR 28 (PTI): China said today it will resume sharing with India the hydrological data of the Brahmaputra river as top water resource officials of the two countries wrapped up twoday talks, the first after Beijing last year stopped providing the data crucial to predict floods.

"On the basis of humanitarian spirit and our shared will to develop bilateral ties we will continue with the cooperation on hydrological information cooperation," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Lu Kang told a media briefing here.

He was responding to a question whether China will resume sharing of the hydrological data on Brahmaputra river, which Beijing suspended last year stat-ing that it could not share it with India due to upgradation of data collection station in Tibet.

China's announcement to not to share the data came soon after the 73-day long stand-off between Indian and Chinese troops at Dokalam over Chinese military's plans to build a road close to India's Chicken Neck corridor connecting North-East-

ern states.

A team of officials of India's Ministry of Water Resources held talks with their Chinese counterparts on the cooperation of trans-border rivers in the last two days at the Chinese city of



Hangzhou, the first after Beijing last year stopped providing the

Lu said during the talks the two sides reviewed the achievements of the previous meetings as well as bilateral cooperation on emergency and response and hydrological information.

"The two sides have agreed to continue with such coopera-tion. On the grounds of humanitarian principles and the basis of bilateral relations China will continue with this cooperation with the Indian side on the provision of hydrological informa-tion and emergency response cooperation," Lu said.

Asked whether China would resume the data, Lu said "since you made it quite clear", China will continue with the coopera-tion on hydrological information cooperation.

The two-day talks of the 11th

meeting of the India-China Expert Level Mechanism (ELM) on Trans-Border Rivers concluded yesterday at Hangzhou, a statement from the Indian Embassy

here said today.

The Indian side was led by Teerath Singh Mehra, Commissioner (B&B), Ministry of Water Resources and the Chinese side by Yu Xingjun, Consul, Department of International Cooperation Science and Technology,

Ministry of Water Resources.

The meeting which was held in a "cordial and friendly" atmosphere reviewed the progress made since the earlier meetings of the ELM and their continued cooperation on provision of hydrological information and emergency management in respect of trans-border rivers, the press release said.

The officials also reviewed the data utilisation report upon

provision of hydrological information provided by China to In-dia in flood season on Brahmaputra and Sutlej Rivers.

The institutional mechanism of the ELM was established in 2006 to discuss various issues related to trans-border rivers.

Under existing bilateral

Memorandums of Understanding, China provides to India hydrological information of Brahmaputra River (Yarlong Zangbo) and Sutlej River (Langqen Zang-bo) during the flood seasons.

Under the arrangement, China provides flood season data of the Brahmaputra river between May 15 and October 15 every year. China has been building ma

jor dams on Brahmaputra river to generate hydel power. It oper-ationalised Zangmu hydroelectric project in October, 2015 and three more are under construction.

While dams raised concerns

of water shortages in India and Bangladesh, which are lower riparian states of Brahmaputra river, China said its dams were aimed at generating power and not storing water.

The data shared by upper riparian state, China, to lower ri-parian states, India and Bangladesh is essential every monsoon to allow anticipation of the flow of the water and take necessary measures to deal with flooding in India's north-eastern States.

Russia 'remains open' to Putin-Trump summit: Kremlin

Moscow, Mar 28 (AFP): The Kremlin said today that President Vladimir Putin was still ready to hold a summit with US counterpart Donald Trump despite the mass Western expulsions of Russian diplomats in a

"This depends on the American side, but the Russian side remains open," Putin's spokes-man Dmitry Peskov told reporters.

"Putin is ready and the Russian side is ready for mutually beneficial and mutually trustful relations with all countries including the US to the extent that our opponents or partners are ready for this," Peskov added.

He added that Russia currently had no infor-mation about Trump's readiness to meet with Putin following Washington's decision to expel more than 60 diplomats.

London and its allies have blamed Moscow, citing the use of a Soviet-designed nerve agent dubbed Novichok, Russia's record of targeting dissidents and its history of aggression in recent years, from Crimea to cyher-attacks

Washington led the way in responding, or-dering out 60 Russian diplomats in a new blow to US-Russia ties less than a week after Trump congratulated Putin on his re-election and raised nis re-election and raised the prospect of a summit "in the not-too-distant future." The Kremlin has repeatedly denied Rus-sia's involvement in the nerve agent attack and Peskov played down to-day the extent of the diplomatic fallout.

N orth Korean leader Kim Jong Un has visited China in his first foreign trip since taking power, it has been confirmed following much speculation. The head of the secretive regime has been in the capital Beijing for historic talks with the country's President Xi Jinping. The trip, which lasted several days, comes ahead of planned summits between North Korea, South Korea and the US, with the three having agreed to talk to allay tensions over Mr Kim's nuclear ambitions. Mr Xi hosted a banquet for him and his wife Ri Sol Ju, according to China's official Xinhua news agency, which reported Mr Kim as saying he was "committed to denuclearisation".

US, S Korea agree on new trade agreement

WASHINGTON, MAR 28 (PTI): The US and South Korea have reached an agreement to revise their six year-old trade pact, a senior administration official said today, de-scribing it a "historic" development and a big political win for President Donald Trump.

The agreement has ne after Trump recently told reporters while signing a USD 1.3 trillion spending bill that his administration was "very close" to striking a trade deal with South Korea. Trump has been a big

critic of the existing trade deal between the two countries, slamming it as "horrible" and threaten-ing to yank America out

of it altogether.

The agreement "will significantly strengthen the economic and national security relationships between the United States and South Korea. the official told reporters.

"This agreement is visionary and innovative, and it underscores a pattern of failure by previous administrations to negotiate fair and re-ciprocal trade deals," the official said on condition of anonymity.

According to the deal, South Korea will double its annual quota for imported cars that meet American environmental and safety standards, but not necessarily Korean standards. from 25,000 per manufacturer to 50,000.

"They will reduce me of the burdensome labelling requirements when it comes to auto parts," the official said.

South Korea has also agreed to include US pharmaceutical manu-facturers in its national health program's premium reimbursement plan. The United States

on the other hand has agreed to indefinitely exempt South Korea from recently imposed 25 per cent and 10 per cent steel and aluminium tariffs respectively. It will also extend expiring tariffs on Korean pickup trucks from 2021 to 2041.

The senior official described the deal as a big political win for President Trump.

"This is a good deal for both countries and very big deal in the history of

US trade negotiations," the official said. According to another official, the US maintain 25 per cent tariff on pickup truck.

"Several of our free trade agreements have allowed for zero per cent pickup truck tariff, which has resulted in many cas-es outsourcing a pickup truck production to other countries.

"So what has happened now with the course renegotiation is we have been able to maintain that 25 per cent pickup truck tariff," the official said.

X-MEN: DARK PHOENIX & NEW MUTANTS **GET NEW 2019 RELEASE DATES**

Twentieth Century Fox has delayed both X-Men: Dark Phoenix and The New Mutants, two of their upcoming X-Men universe films, to new 2019 release dates. The film studio originally kicked off their superhero franchise nearly two decades ago with Bryan Singer's X-Men in 2000. Since then, the series has included an original trilogy, a prequel trilogy and a series of spinoffs. In recent years especially, Fox has been diver-sifying its X-Men offerings in terms of tone. Both Deadpool and Logan offered superhe-ro fans something incredibly new - and, arguably, both were successes as a result.

Next, Fox will release

the sequel to Deadpool, but that will be the studio's only X-Men film to hit theaters this year. Although Fox originally planned to also debut X-Men: Dark Phoenix and The New Mutants, the latter s delayed earlier this year



from its April 2018 date to early 2019. Now, not only is The New Mutants delayed again, Dark Phoenix gets a new release date as well.

Fox officially announced w release date for a handful of films, including two of its X-Men movies. X-Men: Dark Phoenix moves from November 2, 2018 to February 14, 2019 – the week before the slot to which New

Mutants had previously been pushed. As for The New Mutants, it moves from February 22, 2019 to August 19, 2019. Of course, there's also

sure to be speculation that the studio is delaying its X-Men films as a way to prepare for the eventuality of the Dis-ney-Fox deal being made official. There's still some time before Disney officially acquires 20th Century Fox and

those at Marvel Studios have said the deal won't affect any Marvel Cinematic Universe film currently in progress.
