Chamling writes to Sushma for Karmapa's visit to Sikkim

GANGTOK, MAR 20 (PTI): Chief Minister Pawan Chamling today said he has written a letter to External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj, seeking permission for the 17th Karmapa's Ogyen Trinley Dorie's visit to Sikkim.

The 17th Karmapa is the head of the 900-yearold Karma Kagyu lineage and currently resides in Gyuto monastery near Dharamsala after making a dramatic escape from Tibet in 2000.

"I wrote a letter to-day to Sushma Swaraj seeking her assistance and co-operation in per-mitting the 17th Karmapa, His Holiness Ogyen Trinley Dorje to visit any monastery in Sikkim, if not Rumtek Monastery. to bless our people," the CM posted on Facebook

This (17th Karma-pa's visit) would fulfil the long pending demand of the people and the Sikkim government, he adds.

Chamling has been trying to impress upon the Centre to allow the 17th Karmapa to visit Sikkim where the previous incarnation had es-

The budget has shown total expen-diture to be Rs 309 crore and total income to be Rs 304 crore. However the target set for the revenue incomes is Rs 45.35 crore this year which is 10 crores more than last year. However, Mr Bhattacha-rya claimed that the state government has not released funds meant for the civic board since last three years including this year.

Workshop on Assessment of Livability Indices for Sikkim daylong State level workshop on Assessment of Livability Indices for Sikkim was held at the conference hall of The Regal Hotel in Tadong today

The workshop was organized by Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs, Government of India, in coordination with Urban Development & Housing Department, Government of Sikkim. The meeting was chaired

by Chief Secretary, Govern-ment of Sikkim, AK Srivastava, and attended by Secretary, UD&HD cum State Mission Director, Smart City Mission, LB Chhetri, Municipal Commissioner [Gangtok Municipal Corporation], District Collectors [East and South]. Municipal Executive Officer [Namchi], officers of line departments viz Energy & Power, Health, HRDD, UD&HD and SREDA.



Chief Secretary, Mr Srivastava, in his inaugural address, gave a brief about the liveability assessment which has been initiated by the Min-istry of Housing and Urban Affairs to assess the liveability

standard of 116 Indian cities which include the identified smart cities and few more cities with a population of over

The cities will be assessed on 15 core parameters such as

governance, social infrastructure, education, employment, health and safety and security. The Liveability Index will also take into account physical infrastructure such as housing, open spaces, land use, energy and water availability, solid-waste management and pollution, among others, he added. He also focused on the

Sustainable Development Goals for various infrastruc-ture developments. However, he specifically mentioned the requirement of smooth traffic, good drainage system, shopping complex, amusement park, good gymnasium and most important, a stress relieving centre viz meditation centre as key requirements for liveability.

The Ministry under a World Bank-funded pro-gramme has selected the IP-SOS Research in consortium with the Athena Infonomics India and Economist Group for the assessment of the liveability indices.

The Ministry of Urban De-

velopment has developed a set of 'Liveability Standards'

79 indicators in 15 categories for measuring institutional, social, economic and physical aspects that affect quality of life. These included education, healthcare, roads, mobility, jobs, grievance redressal, pollution, emergency response, green open spaces, as well as cultural and entertainment

opportunities.

It is informed that the economist portal will be used to spatially map the data and the Liveability Index outputs will serve as a database for decision making on urban policy and planning.

In Sikkim, the two Smart Cities, Gangtok and Nam-chi, will be participating and all the cities are required to submit the details by 16 Apr, 2018. The ranking will be announced on 15 Jun, 2018 by

Bodies of 39 Indians abducted by ISIS in Iraq in 2015 found

BAGHDAD, MAR 20 (AP): Iraqi authorities have found the bodies of 39 Indian construction workers abducted when Islamic State militants overran the northern city of Mosul more than three

years ago, officials said today.

The bodies were buried near the village of Badush, northwest of Mosul, in an area that Iraqi forces recaptured

The killing was a "heinous crime carried out by Daesh terrorist gangs,' Iraqi official Najiha Abdul-Amir al-Shimari told reporters. Daesh is the Arabic

acronym for the Islamic State group.

The bodies are "citizens of the friendly Indian state. Their dignity was supposed to be protected, but the forces of evil wanted to defame the principles of Islam," said Najiha, the head of Irag's Martyrs Establishment, a government body dealing with people killed in the fight against the Islamic State group

The abducted workers, most from northern India, had been employed by a construction company near Mosul when militants captured wide swaths of the area.

Relatives said they received phone calls from some of the workers five days after Mosul was captured, asking

for help.
Around 10,000 Indians worked and lived in Iraq at that time.

As many as 40 Indians were originally abducted by terrorist organisation ISIS in June 2015 from Mosul in Iraq but one of them escaped by posing as a Muslim from Bangladesh, External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj said today in a suo motu statement in Rajya

Swaraj said the mass grave had ex-ctly 39 bodies, with distinctive features like long hair, non-Iraqi shoes and IDs.

The bodies were then sent to Baghdad for DNA testing.

DNA testing by Martyrs Foundation has established identity of 38 Indians while there has been 70 per cent matching of the DNA for the 39th per-

son, she said.

Minister of State for External Affairs VK Singh will be flying to Iraq to bring back the bodies on a special flight. Prime Minister Narendra Modi to-

day said all Indians stand in solidarity with the families of the 39 Indians killed in Mosul in Iraq and the government is "fully committed" to ensure the safety of Indians abroad.

Every Indian grieves with those who lost their loved ones in Mosul. We stand in solidarity with the bereaved families and pay our respects to the Indians killed in Mosul.

Shattered families of massacred Indians ask "why Centre kept us in the dark?"

CHANDIGARH, MAR 20 (PTI): As they try to come to terms with the grim reality, family members of the 39 Indians massacred years ago in Iraq by terror organisation ISIS have one question: why did the Centre keep them in the dark all this while?

Heart-rending scenes were visible outside the homes of the deceased in Punjab as wailing family members tried to give vent to their pain having heard on TV, External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj's statement that all 39 Indians in ISIS captivity were dead and their bodies had

been recovered.

Several relatives of the

not officially informed about their loved ones by any gov-ernment authority.

What do we say now? asked a dejected Sarwan whose 31-year-old brother Nishan was among those killed. "The government kept us in the dark all these years," Sarwan, who belongs to Amritsar claimed

Now after four years, they are making such a shocking statement, he agonised.
"We met the Union min-

ister (Swarai) 11 to 12 times and were told that as per their sources, the missing Indians are alive. They have been saying that Harjit Masih, the lone survivor, is a liar. If your sources have been saying they

were alive and now suddenly what happened. The govern-ment should have told us they have no information about missing Indians rather than making false statements," said Sarwan, who received heard his brother's voice over a phone call in June 21, 2014.
With hopes dashed all of a

sudden, anger seethes out.

"It is the government's biggest failure. Most of the missing Indians were from Punjab. When the government could save nurses from Kerala why it completely failed in saving other Indians." he asked.

We have been seeking time from the minister for the last several months but

we were not given a chance to meet her, he claimed.

An inconsolable Gurpin-der Kaur, whose 27-year-old younger brother Manjinder Singh was among the missing Indians also asked similar questions.

"Initially, they were saying the Indians are alive. Now the minister today made such a statement," Kaur said, her

we were not even told about it; we came to know from the TV, she added.

Manjinder Singh, who was into farming, was pushed into Irang by fraudulent tray.

into Iraq by fraudulent travel agents, she claimed. Man-jinder Singh wanted to go to Dubai, said Kaur.

"I am trying to know from the government how all this happened," she said.

The family of Gobinder

Singh learnt about the shat-tering news also from TV channels.

"We have not received yet received any call from the Union ministry about the confirmation of death of 39 Indi-ans," said Davinder Singh, the deceased's younger brother.

Gobinder Singh was a resident of Murar village in Kapurthala.

We now request the government to announce finan-cial help and give a government job to the son of Gobinder Singh so he can take care of his family, Davinder Singh

"We just got false assurances from the government," said Dimplejeet Kaur, sister of Dharminder Kumar (27).

"All our hopes dashed today," she said.

Kumar went to Iraq to earn for his family in 2014. He was a resident of village Talwandi Jhira in Gurdaspur

Last year, the government of India collected DNA sam-ples of the family members of the missing Indians.

Among the 39 Indians who were missing, most were from different places in Punjab like Amritsar, Gurdaspur, Hoshiarpur, Kapurthala and

dressing the concluding session of the two-day long training programme as part of the Human Resource Development Programme on Integrated Pest Management [IPM] organized by the Central Integrated Plant Man-agement Centre [CIP-MC], Gangtok, Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Government of India for Nandok Gram Panchayat Unit.
She said that her de-

partment has various schemes for farmers but their benefits cannot be enjoyed unless farmers implement it whole-heartedly. She also informed about the



Pension scheme in which Rs. 1,000 per month will be given to those farmers who have attained the age of 50 years and are totally dependent on farming for their livelihood. The Dy Director briefed the gathering of around 40 farmers about the criteria to be fulfilled to avail this benefit. Panchayat president,

Upper Nandok GPU, Uma-kanta Sharma, in his address, urged the farmers to become serious about their profession and urged

them to avail full benefits not only from the state gov-ernment but also from the Central Government agencies. He informed that the government had recently announced Rs. 1 crore for the best progressive farm-er as an award. On this, Mr Sharma urged all Nandokians to put their level best

For the love of butterflies

Inspired by nature and its beauty, Sonam Wangchuk Lepcha turned himself into a naturalist, butterfly enthusiast and then a photographer and a writer.
Sonam [27] was born

and brought up in the Noom-Panang village of Upper Dz-ongu in North Sikkim. Born to parents, Sherap Pintso Lep-cha and Late Dukmit Lepcha, Sonam completed his fundamentals from various schools of North Sikkim.

Despite the effects of mo-

dernity and westernization on the young these days, some how Sonam has been able to cultivate and nurture his love for nature. He felt that he needed to treasure all of it and document it. He would have never come up with any books if nature had not inspired him to.


Sonam has published three books so far. In the year $2011, he \, came \, up \, with \, his \, first$



book "Dzongu Nye Mayally-ang, North Sikkim". The book focused on the natural heauty of Dzongu [photography] and also had short stories of his small Noom-Panang village.

In the year 2015, he released the 2nd edition of his

book, "The Myths of Mutan-chi", a collection of tales from Dzongu. Sonam has also re-leased his new book "The Book on Dzongu Butterflies-North Sikkim" which gives an idea of the different species of butterflies found in Dzongu region of North Sikkim.



"It is fairly recent since I began appreciating the fact that our Renjyonglyang, espe-cially Sikkim, is truly blessed with beautiful species of but-terflies known as Thamblyok in Lepcha. During my explorations. I had to acknowledge that Sikkim is indeed a paradise for butterfly enthusiasts, said Sonam while talking to

mmitTimes.
"This has been established

by individuals like Isaac Kehimkar who published a book on Indian butterflies. Similarly, Meena Haribal and Nosang Mu ringla Limboo, have also based their respective books on Sik kim butterflies," added Sonam.

Sonam's journey in the exploration of butterflies in Sikkim started when he was on a short trip to Namprikdang in Dzongu, North Sik-kim in 2016. He came across

many species of butterflies in the valley but failed to iden-tify even one, which really saddened him. However, his urge to understand butter-flies turned him towards documenting and photographing

butterflies thereafter.

He later visited Blyokvoo near Upper Dzongu. The original name of Blyokvoo is Thamblyokvoo which stands for the 'meeting place for butterflies'. This visit piqued his interest and fascination for butterflies and the rich cultural heritage of the Lepcha community.

Sonam believes that in

future, places like Dzongu in Sikkim can prove to be important geographical habitats for promoting conservation and protection measures for various butterfly species. It will be equally potent to build awareness about these precious little inhabitants with the help of eco-tourism and by means of informative guided tours for nature enthusi-

asts that are aimed at sharing and broadening the knowledge base about the species.

Before such plans are implemented, it is equally vital that proper measures and stringent laws are in place to curb any illegal practices, such as trapping of butterflies: as such incidents have occurred in the past. The focus should be on conservation policies, he adds.

Sonam further states that all his books aim to encourage the youth of Sikkim as it has become important to appreciate and explore natural treasures that our region holds.

Unhappy Because We Revel in Pessimism?

Take away Hope and there is nothing left

Happiness is not a quantifiable emotion and its definition and measure differs from person to person. But still, the UN insists on preparing a World Happiness Index every year. It is possible that the enumerators have worked out indices and algorithms which can measure happiness in very general terms for country-sized populations with some reasonable accuracy. We hope it does, because what follows is born from where our country finds itself in the world rank-

India has been ranked a sad 133rd in the World Happiness Index 2018 which measured 156 countries in terms of happiness. India dropped 11 places from last year's almost as miserable 122nd rank. If consistency can bring some joy to this dismal news, then we have been consistent because the year before last, the country was ranked 118th. Since Look East is being bandied about so much of late, here is another stat from the Index, save war-ravaged Afghanistan ranked 145th in the list of 156, everyone else in the neighbourhood is, as per the UN, happier than us. Pakistan is ranked 75th, Nepal 101st, the "happy nation" of Bhutan not as gleeful at 97th, Sri Lanka at 116th and Bangladesh is ranked 115th. Myanmar, despite being embroiled in ethnic violence, is still happier at 130th.

The Index explains how the rankings were worked out, but we have our take on it as well. It is the pessimism that has been coursing through our country of late which has hounded out happiness. Hope, that feeling that keeps us going, is being sucked out of the

Given how desperate things can get in our country, it remains a miracle that it still holds together. And the miracle comes by way of hope, the inexplicable optimism which sees a future despite the travails of the present. Take that away and everything will collapse. And the surest way to kill hope is by infecting the society with pessimism.

As pessimism sinks in, suspicions grow, and before one even realizes, it's misanthropy all around. Not only do people stop trusting, they also start hating. It is then no longer about being pragmatic, but an obsession with remaining defeatist. That is one condition that even democracy cannot assail. Demoralise a people to a nadir from where they can spy no silver lining and from thereon even humanity can be subverted at will. Fear can also help in the subversion, but fear is difficult to instill and even more difficult to sustain whereas pessimism is an instinctive trait in the present times of frequent dejections and thus easier to contaminate with. When the pollution is complete, the people become dejected, see no hope and refuse to get involved. The public domain is then occupied by "vested interests" who feed paranoia with one hand to keep people dispirited and "negotiate" favours for themselves with the other. The people are too distracted by their dejections to notice or even care and when they are so indisposed, surrender the power that was theirs. Take away faith, dismember hope and then there are no solutions possible. Happiness goes into

A society so disinclined then lives in an environment where there are no meaningful debates, because loaded with pessimism minds speak only to themselves and refuse to engage other voices. There are worrying trends all across the country which suggest that we are a people who are losing hope and hence clinging to straws as weak as projected nationalism and hollow strength, not because things are bad, but because we refuse to see the positives, refuse to engage. This is a worrying trend which has encroached on Sikkim too. There is too much of leader speaking/ arguing with leader and not enough of people speaking to leaders. Because of this there is too much claiming and complaining in the public domain and not enough positivity.

This trend has to be stemmed. People have to get involved more. Without involvement, there is no sense of achievement, no sense of belonging; what is democracy then? Where is happiness? Perhaps we speak too soon here, both, for India and for Sikkim. But what if we are speaking up too late?

The Shape of Water: An allegorical critique of Trump

Resistance to Donald Trump's pres-idency has taken many forms, including legal challenges, resignations, media criticism, women's marches, political rebukes and endless rounds of late night mockery. The Best Picture winner at the 90th Academy Awards provides another, less obvious example of resistance. The top film was The Shape of Water, an allegorical love story between a mute woman and a

I am a high school English teach er and an adjunct professor in the University of Ottawa's Faculty of Education with a background in live theatre, critical pedagogy and youth culture. I teach Bachelor of Education students who may one day teach high school English classes.

Part of my course covers the importance of critical literacy, which I believe we can teach by asking teen-agers to view film as more than just entertainment but as a vital source of insight on contemporary culture,

sues and society.

Many of my classroom discussions focus on the ways in which this year's top movies, not just Oscar nominees, offer clever responses to the racist, sexist and xenophobic poland rhetoric that have accompanied Trump's rise to the top.

Lady Bird argues that the lives of young women are worthy of exploration. Three Billboards Outside of Ebbing, Missouri offers a flame thrower portrayal of the corruption, racial conflict and violence at the heart of the American dream. Black Panther triumphantly demonstrates that Black actors and filmmakers can produce a Hollywood blockbuster and that African-American culture can yield an exciting, mythological


story appealing to all audiences.

But it is The Shape of Water that offers the most detailed, poetic critique of Trump and the hollow promises of his "Make America Great Again" philosophy.

LIVES OF QUIET OPPRESSION

Set in 1962 Baltimore, director Guillermo Del Toro's film tells the story of Elisa, a young mute woman who works as a cleaner at a mysterious govern ment facility that is home to a recently captured "Amphibian Man." Zelda is her African-American co-worker and Giles, a gay graphic designer whose work and identity are "ahead of his time," is her roommate.

These are the Americans who live lives of quiet oppression in the past tense America that shimmers myth-



The Cold War is in full swing in the film, and the dichotomy between the United States and Russia, between "good" and "evil," is both referenced and undermined.

Americans and Russians are in conflict, but it's a Russian agent who acts ethically. There is a traditional Main Street dessert shop, but the affable server turns out to be a vile racist and homophobe who adopts a southern accent for marketing purposes and is actually from Ottawa.

The pies look appealing, but they are mass-produced and the store is part of a new phenomena, the franchise. The film is poised at the moment when authenticity is being lost to illusion.

A TRUMP PROXY

Opposing the quiet, marginalized Americans is Strickland, a shadowy government worker upon whose character the filmmakers apply hateful qualities like layers of slime. It becomes evident that Strickland is designed as a bridge to Trump's present-day political toxicity when a smooth-talking car salesman tells him: "You are the man of the future."

A further connection to Trump is made when Strickland announces:

"The future is bright. You gotta trust in that. This is America." Here the film has fun with its ironic presentation of the past. As audience members in 2018 watching a film set in a period of time more than half a cen tury ago, we may question whether the future has indeed turned out to

Robert Mueller investigation into the Trump campaign's alleged involve-ment with Russia, we may feel pro-foundly uneasy about the relationship between trust and leadership.
Witnessing the assault on other

ness and a turn to American nativism, we may question what it now means to be American, and where a nation that was once so welcoming to immi-

grants has gone.

But then the film also picks up on the way in which truth in the Trump era has been attacked, questioned and undermined. "Bonanza is not violent. It's real life. The way it was.' Strickland tells his son about the popular Western TV show of the time. A TV show is said to be "true" much in the same way that Trump draws on cable news personalities as experts fit to serve in the White House

Like Trump, Strickland boasts about his power to sexually assault women when he harasses silent Elisa with the line: "Bet I can make you squawk a little." He has sex with his wife in a mechanical manner that diminishes and belittles her. His casual vulgarity oozes male privilege. His repellent masculinity crowds out a

woman's agency. Strickland calls the beautiful South American Amphibian Man an "affront" and takes pleasure in torturing him with his sizzling cattle prod.

"How did they get in?" he asks of the Russian agents who infiltrated his facility, the question echoing the current political discourse around "illegals" and "shithole countries" as well as the president's restrictive immigration policies.

A REBUKE TO IGNORANCE

When the mute woman, the Black woman and the gay man act together to free the beautiful "undesirable" from his prison, the film suggests that the creativity and humanism of outsiders can prevail against cruelty and corruption.

Cowardly, vile and literally rotting

from having lost fingers earlier in the story, Strickland dies by the same violence he promulgated. He is the real monster. Elisa and Amphibian Man fall in love and slip away to a watery paradise. Breathing underwater, she opens her eyes and looks at him. She

Not everyone can escape to the ocean's depths to escape the Trump presidency, but we can escape to the movies. The Shape of Water reminds audiences of the humanity of those people who are marginalized and belittled. Its artistry alone is a rebuke to

How kids in a low-income country use laptops: lessons from Madagascar



Every child, no matter what country they're from or their social background, should have the chance to use and learn about technology. That's the thinking behind a number of projects led by in-ternational organisations like UNESCO and UNICEF. They hope to bolster education and economic growth by making digital technologies available

in the developing world.

The One Laptop Per Child project was a pioneer in this field. This educational proj-ect, launched by the MIT in 2005, produces laptop computers suitable for children aged between 6 and 12. These are loaded with an operating system that features free edu-cational software called Sugar. The programme has been rolled out at schools in more than 30 countries.

The project aims to equip all primary school children and all teachers with computers in a way that involves communities and that ensures everyone feels a sense of responsibility for the equipment. For example, kids aged six to 12 own their computers and can take them home to use.



Research shows that using technology in school makes children more engaged with learning. We wanted to know how children in low-income countries use laptops in their everyday lives; in school and after class. To find out, we embarked on a study in a village in Madagascar four years after the proj ect was launched there

Our results show that the use of computers in low-income countries supports for-mal and informal learning activities at home. It provides easy access to information. educational games and tools for self-expression.

USE AT SCHOOL

Madagascar, an island nation off Africa's southeast coast, is extremely poor: 75% of the population (25 million) live below the poverty line, and the country scores low on the human development index, performing poorly in areas like education and living stan-

The study was conducted in a village located on the island of Nosy Komba, in the northeast of the country. Laptops are seen among residents there as high status objects because they cost a lot of money. None of the parents we interviewed could afford

to buy one. They also have a high symbolic value: parents believe that if their children can master laptop use they will become more intelligent and develop professional skills.

One Laptop Per Child France and an other French organisation, Gducœur. They supplied laptops and provided technical, logistical, administrative, financial and educational support. The laptops were given to 160 children aged between 5 and 15 enrolled in the village's primary school.

Our analysis was both quantita

tive and a qualitative. We examined logs that showed which applications the children had used on their laptops during the previous 12 months; we analysed what they'd produced – for instance, recorded files. And we interviewed the children and their parents.

The results showed that the laptops

and in the children's homes. At school and in the children's homes. At school, computers were generally used to learn about word processing, to play educational games and to support creative activities (drawing, digital story talling). Computers were also used as telling). Computers were also used as a virtual learning environment that offered a range of resources unavailable in the classroom like calculators, ebooks, maps, a watch, measuring tools and so on.

At home the children, like their peers in developed countries, largely used computers to take photos or make videos, listen to music, play games, share content and do homework. The younger children tended to use fewer reading and writing applications. Those in the equivalent of fourth and fifth grade used more digital books; they also shared images and videos more frequently with their friends.

SIMILARITIES AND DIFFERENCES

Our findings suggest that developing countries like Madagascar have something in common with western nations when it comes to laptop use, such as how the children used the computers

But there was one marked difference: computer use in Madagascar tended to be a collective rather than an individual practice. Children and their families would gather around one laptop to play educational games, take photos or make videos. Computers were being used to strengthen existing social relations among siblings, parents and peers

All of this is important and valuable. Laptops have introduced the children of Nosy Komba to previously inaccessible tools. But we found that original projects were limited. While applications used were designed to foster creativity. children need support to develop cre ativity skills.

Educators have a crucial role to play here. They can help to nurture children's creativity: the can help them to connect their lived experience and to express their imagination to produce original content. This will unlock new forms of expression and different kinds of literacy, including visual.


For Sushil, CWG first step towards unfulfilled Olympic dream

NEW DELHI, MAR 20 (PTI): There is nothing to prove anymore but quite a bit left to achieve, says India's most decorated wrestler Sushil Kumar, who considers next month's Commonwealth Games the first step towards accomplishing his "unfulfilled" dream of a third Olympic medal.

A two-time defending champion at the Common-wealth Games, the 34-year-old, who has an Olympic bronze and silver to his credit, feels competing in Gold Coast would prolong his career.

The 66kg freestyle grappler expects to get a fair idea of where he stands at the international stage when he takes the mat in the CWG.

"Since I started wrestling my only aim was to represent the country and do well for it. I have always given my 100 per cent on the mat whenever I was fit. I can't change peo-

sters are giving results. This was a stupendous performance," Raninder said.

expected from established names like Harmanpreet and opener Smriti Mandhana

Looking ahead, the board is planning to scout for talent from all parts of the country including the North East.

"The recent tweaks in the domestic structure, including the introduction of the U-16 category, will take a while to take shape. But there is still a need to find the right available talent from all parts of India including North East, an area which has not been explored much," Edulji said.

The popularity of the women's game has shot up ever since India played in the World Cup final in England last year. The female cricketers finally have money and fame coming their way after years of neglect.

"Since they have all the facilities now, they must perform consistently. That is the only way to keep the interest in women's cricket alive," summed up Edulji.

Tendulkar urges Gadkari to act against fake helmet makers

NEW DELHI, MAR 20 (PTI): Cricket icon and Rajya Sabha MP Sachin Tendulkar has sought action against manufacturers of low-quality helmets, continu-ing his campaign for safe two-

wheeler riding.
In a letter to transport minister Nitin Gadkari, Tendulkar said given the high rate of accidents involving two-wheel-er drivers, it is important that safety equipment for them is of

highest quality.

"I am writing to you to request your ministry to consider action against helmet manufacturers using low grade material and selling it with a fake ISI mark. As sportspersons, we understand the importance of using original high-quality safety equipment when we go to play on the field," Tendulkar stated in his letter.

"The high-quality standards need to be maintained when it comes to helmets that will be used by two- wheeler riders in India," he added.

An active campaigner of road safety, Tendulkar has been routinely seen urging people to use helmets, during traffic signal halts, in social media posts.

Citing media reports, Tendulkar said that over 70 per cent of bike riders in India end up

buying fake helmets.

"This is an absolutely alarming situation considering

two-wheelers accounted for over 30 per cent of road accidents, the highest among all kind of accidents in 2016. The availability of fake helmets is a danger to two-wheeler riders considering that wearing an appropriate helmet improves chances of survival of bikers by 42 per cent," Tendulkar said. Reportedly, the government

is contemplating penalising non-ISI or fake ISI marked helmet manufacturers but noth ing concrete has been done till

"I understand that the ministry has been actively working on public safety measures. I would strongly urge your ministry to take strong action against manufacturers of helmets that are putting lives of people at risk by using fake ISI marks on low grade, low quality helmets that will not protect head injuries in an accident," the legendary batsman said.

Tendulkar also called for lowering prices of good quality helmets so that riders do not

seek cheaper options.

The 44-year-old said largescale awareness drives should be launched to educate people about the importance of using

quality safety gear.

"I look forward to your prompt action and extend my full support to your office to promote safe two-wheeler riding among our citizens," he said.



Kim Jong Nam murder suspect thought hit was a prank: lawyer

SHAH ALAM, MAR 20 (AFP): A Vietnamese man accused of assassinating the North Kore-an leader's half-brother with a nerve agent thought she was taking part in a practical joke and only realised he was dead after her arrest, a court heard today.

Doan Thi Huong is on trial with Indonesian woman Siti Aisvah over the Cold War-style killing of Kim Jong Nam at Kuala Lumpur International Airport on February 13 last year.

Defence lawyers have argued that the women were recruited to take part in what they thought were prank TV shows but were instead tricked into becoming inadvertent assassins, in an elaborate plot by a group of North Korean agents.

The women, in their 20s, have denied murdering Kim Jong Un's es-tranged half-brother by smearing VX nerve agent on his face as he waited for a flight to Macau. They face death by hang-They face ueam 2, ing if found guilty.

Huong's lawyer
Hisyam Teh Poh Teik told the trial that one of four North Koreans suspected of involvement in the murder had recruited the Vietnamese wom-an to perform what she

thought were pranks.

According to Huong's police statement presented to the High Court in Shah Alam, she travelled to Malaysia not long

before the assassination.

In the days before the murder, Huong went to Kuala Lumpur airport twice and met the North Korean, whom she knew as Mr Y, according to the statement.

The court previously heard his real name was Ri Ji Hyon, and he fled Malaysia shortly after the murder with the other North Korean suspects.

Under his instruc-tions Huong carried out pranks which involved sneaking up behind people and rubbing her hands on their face, the court heard.

China will not cede single inch of land, ready for 'bloody battle: Xi

will not cede a "single inch of land" and is ready to wage a "bloody battle" to take its due place in the world, a belligerent President Xi Jinping, now enjoying probably a life-long

tenure, asserted today.
In a 30-minute long nationalistic speech in China's Parliament, Xi said "since modern times, rejuvenation of the great Chinese nation has become the biggest dream of our nation".

'The Chinese people and the Chinese nation have a shared conviction which is not a single inch of our land will be and can be ceded from China Xi said, addressing the closing session of the NPC the first by

a President in recent years.

Though Xi made no mention of any territorial issues, the country has been involved in a number of disputes.

Besides the border dispute with India, China claims rights over the disputed islands in East China Sea under the control of Japan and vast stretches of the South China Sea (SCS) where it is firmly asserting its control.

Vietnam, the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Taiwan have counter claims over the South China Sea.

Xi said China has all the ca-



pabilities to take its due place

Every year, Chinese annual parliament season ends with a press conference by the Premier. This is the first-time a President addressed its vale-dictory session.

Xi this month has altered

the course of the history of China after the NPC besides re-electing him for a second five-year term also ratified a constitutional amendment scrapping the decades old

two-term limit paving the for life.

He has emerged as the most powerful leader after Mao Zedong as he headed the ruling Communist Party of China, (CPC), the military and the Presidency.

Seeking to allay fears about absolute powers enjoyed by him controlling all levers of power, Xi vowed to continue to serve as a servant of the people.

"The Chinese people has been indomitable and persistent. We are resolved to fight the bloody battle against our enemies and on the basis of independence we are determined to recapture the rel-

ics," he said.

"We have strong capabilities of taking our due place in the world. We have fought for that big dream for about 170 years. Today more than ever the Chinese people are close to that dream, ever more confident and capable of realising the rejuvenation of the Chinese nation," he said.

"I am convinced once the 1.3 billion Chinese people carrying on such big dreams we will certainly translate into a reality," he said amid thunderous applauds in a nationally televised speech. "We should safeguard the

sovereignty and territorial integrity of the country and achieve full unification of the motherland. This is the aspiration of all Chinese people This is also in line with fundamental of the Chinese nation" Xi said in an apparent reference to Taiwan which China

claims as part of it.
In his speech, Xi also delivered a stern message to the

separatists.

"Faced with this important question of our nation and history any action that sepa-rates the country is doomed to fail. These separatist actions will be met with the condemnation of the people and punishment of the history," he

said. "Chinese people have strong determination, full confidence and every capabil-ity to triumph over all the separatist actions," he said.

Besides Taiwan, China brands the Dalai Lama as 'splitist". China is also carry-

ing out extensive crackdown in the Muslim Uygur majority Xinjiang against the separatist

group East Turkistan Islamic Movement, (ETIM). Xi said any actions and tricks to split China are cer-tain to meet with the people's

condemnation and the pun-

At the same time, he also sought to allay the concerns of the world about rising China as well as his multibillion dollar pet project the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), saying that China's development does not pose a threat to any other country "China will never seek he-

gemony or engage in expansion. Only those who are accustomed to threatening others see everyone as a threat, he said, taking a dig at the US.

"We will not impose our will on other people and Chi-na will continue to advance its BRI and strengthen exchanges and cooperation with other countries in the world so that reforming and opening of China will benefit all mankind," Xi

The BRI has special implications for India as the China Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) is part of it. India has protested to China over the CPEC as it traverses through Pakistan occupied Kashmir.

US won't resume security aid to Pak till it allays concerns on terror safe havens

WASHINGTON, MAR 20 (PTI): The US will not resume security aid to Pakistan until it addresses America's concerns on terrorist safe havens, the Pentagon said, underlining that Islamabad's action not only help Afghanistan but also protect India and the entire region.

The US in January suspended more than USD 1.15 billion security assistance to Pakistan, accusing Islamabad of harbouring terror groups like the Afghan Taliban and the Haqqani Net-work within its border and showing unwillingness to take decisive ac-

tions against them.
In addition, the Department of Defense had suspended the entire USD 900 million of the Coalition Support Fund (CSF) money to Pakistan for the fiscal year 2017. "The US government

has been very honest and open both publicly and privately with Pakistan on the things that they need to address before we can move forward with the resumption of the aid that has been suspended," Lt Col Mike Andrews, a spokesperson of the Department of Defence told PTI.

French ex-president Sarkozy held in Libya financing probe

PARIS, MAR 20 (AFP): Former French president Nicolas Sar-kozy was taken into police custody on Tuesday for questioning over suspected Libyan financing of his 2007 election campaign, a source close to the inquiry told

Sarkozy, 63, had until now refused to respond to a summons for questioning in the case, which drew heightened scrutiny last November when a business-man admitted delivering three cash-stuffed suitcases from the Libyan leader as contributions towards the French leader's first presidential bid.

Sarkozy's detention was first reported by the Mediapart investigative news site and French daily Le Monde and comes sev-eral weeks after a former associate. Alexandre Diouhri, was arrested in London and later released on bail.


