22 states abolish check posts after GST rollout

NEW DELHI, JUL 3 (PTI): As many as 22 states, including Delhi, West Bengal and Maharashtra, have abolished check posts within three days of the implementation of the Goods and Services Tax (GST).

Eight states, including Assam, Punjab, Him-achal Pradesh, and some north-eastern states, are also in the process of abolishing check posts, a finance ministry statement said.

State border check posts scrutinise material and location-based tax resulting compliance, in delays in delivery of goods and cause environment pollution as trucks queue up for clearance.

One of the key objec

tives of the GST, which came into effect from July 1, was to make India a single market where goods and services can flow seamlessly.

The other important states which have abolished the check post include Uttar Pradesh. Bihar, Haryana, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu. With the abolition of check posts, the long queues often witnessed at state borders will not be seen.

Darjeeling boarding schools extend vacation

Darjeeling (WB), July 3 (PTI): The boarding schools of Darjeeling, which were scheduled to reopen Tuesday, have extended their vacation due to the indefinite shutdown in the hills.

The vacation had be-

gun on June 23.

"We have decided to extend the vacation as the shutdown is going on.
We have not given any time-frame as to when the schools will reopen. As soon as normalcy re-turns in the hills, we will inform parents and reopen schools," Principal of St. Jo-seph's North Point, Father Shanjumon told PTI, Father Shanjumon is a member of the Darjeeling ICSE Schools Association. St. Joseph's North Point is a prominent boarding school in the Darjeeling Hills.

The Gorkha Janamuk-ti Morcha(GJM) had given a 12-hour window to schools on June 23 to evacuate boarders. The indefinite shutdown in the hills over the demand of separate state of Gorkhaland entered its 19th day today. Normal life was affected due to the shutdown, Except pharmacies, all other shops, restaurants, private offices and hotels remained closed.

The ministry also told the West Bengal government to send a detailed factual report on the law-and-order situation in Darjeeling, which has seen violence for nearly 20 days.

This is for the sec-ond time that the central government has sought a report from the state on Darjeeling.

The communication was sent after the West Bengal government told deployed in Darjeeling, and instead send men paramilitary personnel.

The West Bengal government also re-quested the home ministry to recall around 300 men SSB personnel and replace them with

CRPF personnel.

A home ministry spokesperson said the "inappropriate" requests of the West Bengal govern-

ment are being examined.

"A state government can't name the central force to be given. The reasons for recall of the paramilitary women personnel and SSB with CRPF were not immediately known," he said.

Future of all-party platform for Gorkhaland vague

The Darjeeling hills could be in for a political make over. Riding the resurged Gorkahaland movement, the Gorkha National Liberation Front (GNLF) is promising to bounce back from limbo.

And ironically, the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM), which had almost hounded out the GNLF from the hills is giving its political bête noire the piggy back to prominence. The GJM realizes it too and that makes the future of the all-party platform set up to give direction to the movement uncertain.

Sensing that the GJM-spon-

sored renewed statehood stir had created an opening for it to claw out of the indeterminate state it was in: the GNLF leadership did well to pounce on the opportunity and took to the streets supporting the movement, but maintaining individuality and respectable distance from the GIM

The timely move is paying its dividends. Since the GNLF was the original protagonist of the Gorkhaland movement and had once enjoyed com-

plete socio-political sway in the Darjeeling hills, the no-menclature still holds a degree of romanticism. No woner then, the GNLF's support base has swelled overnight during this unrest as former supporters are returning to the fold.

The development has giv-en the GNLF new-found confidence, so much so that it has decided against sending its party president to all-party meetings unless GIM chief Bimal Gurung attends. The message is clear – the GNLF is now protective of its upto-the-minute stature, which was unthinkable till a month back.

Having allied with the Trinamool in the last Assembly elections and thereafter in the civic elections held in the month of May to get even with the GJM, the GNLF was quick to amend its policy, ended the alliance and hit the streets in support of the separate state movement as soon as the renewed stir began.

As a consequence, the GNLF is now part of the all-party platform supporting the statehood demand, hold-

ing press conferences sepa rately again since 2007 and is taking political decisions rele-

vant to the hills as against its past 10 years' dormancy. The GJM by now must have realized how the revived movement in the hills also has resurrected the GNLF. The GJM must have also noticed how the GNLF is making its moves in keeping with the neople's mood and not towing the GJM leadership is

also wise enough to understand that it has unwittingly helped the GNLF to spring

back to life. But, what can the GJM leadership do? The vio-lent movement backed by the protracted bandh, a relentless tate government and an in different Centre has turned the GJM's job to lug along the movement by its own that much more difficult.

Tolerate it must have to everything that will help it sustain the movement. But that is just for now. Once the shake off begins, the all-par-ty platform is likely to be the first victim. And that develop-ment, by an educated guess, could be just round the bend.

DM North, Karma R. Bonpo has informed that no shortage of essential commodities has been reported in the North district so far.

However, as a precautionary measure, coupons for fuel are being issued at Mangan Police Station while coupons for LPG cylinders are being distributed at the District

Administration Centre.
At present the district has 9500 litres of petrol and 8624 litres of diesel at Mangan IOC pump while the Zero fuel pump has 4398 litres of

petrol and 6585 litres of diesel in stock. As of to-day, there are 500 LPG cylinders at MIGA service centre.

SC refuses urgent hearing on jailed Justice CS Karnan's plea


New Delhi, Jul 3 (PTI): Jailed former Calcutta High Court judge, Justice C S Karnan, today again failed in the Supreme Court in getting an urgent hearing on his plea seeking bail and chal-lenging the award of six month jail term for contempt.
"Declined. We will not

accept an oral request against the judgment," a bench comprising Chief Justice J S Khehar and Justice D Y Chandrachud said when the counsel for Justice Karnan sought urgent listing of the peti-tion saying "he has been

put to grave injustice".

Mathews J Nedumpara, counsel for the former judge, said Justice Karnan has been in jail without a detailed judgement and moreover, one of the seven judges of the bench, which had convicted him, has already

Karnan was arrested on June 20 in pursuance of the apex court's judge-ment awarding him sixmonth jail term for contempt of court.
On June 21, a vacation

bench of the apex court had refused to entertain the plea of the arrested ex-high court judge say-ing it "cannot override" the seven-judge bench

order in the case.

Karnan, 62, who retired on June 12 as Calcutta High Court judge, was arrested on June 20 by the West Bengal CID. He had been in Coimbatore since May 9 when the apex court held him guilty for contempt of court and sentenced him to six months imprison-

Karnan has the dubious distinction of being the first sitting high court judge to be awarded a jail term by the apex court and also the first to have retired as a fugitive.

A seven-judge bench of the Supreme Court, headed by Chief Justice of India I S Khehar, had on May 9 directed the West Bengal director general of police to take the then serving judge into custody immediately.

Despite several at-tempts, Karnan has failed to get any relief from the apex court's vaca-tion benches which has refused to hear his plea seeking a stay of its jail term order.

Rediscover the Value of Translations

In the build-up to Bhanu Jayanti, expand the reach of language

Those who manage to find the time to the shorter, routine news-reports, would have hose who manage to find the time to read even noticed the series of meetings underway across the State in preparation for Bhanu Jayanti coming up next Thursday. In some places, Bhanu Jayanti celebrations have also begun in the earnest across the State. With this, it will be the 203rd time that Nepali-speakers and readers thank God for sending Bhanu Bhakta Acharya among them, thank Bhanu Bhakta for teaching them about the cohesive power of language and celebrate his memory as the Adi-Kavi, the first people's poet. The focus of the celebrations, like always will be on language and on Bhanu Bhakta's Nepali rendition of the Ramayana, and rightfully so, but the defining trait of the man is getting increasingly sidelined and needs to be pulled back into focus. Bhanu Bhakta did not create the Nepali language, but he did make it more relevant by translating the Ramayana from Sanskrit into the language of his people. He flattened the hierarchy of knowledge by making information [in this case, Faith] accessible to the people. When he translated the epic, he made it possible for his people to appreciate their Faith and its stories better. It is heartwarming to see young students recite with confident fluency what Bhanu Bhakta wrote more than a century and half back. Maybe now it is time to take the homage a step further; by providing a fresh impetus to translations, both, from and into the Nepali language.
Since students form the backbone of the Bhanu

Jayanti Samarohs, let's speak of them. To share a thought, the Harry Potter series recently celebrated its twentieth anniversary, two decades through which it created publishing history and was translated into 73 languages. It has still not arrived in a Nepali version to Nepali readers wherever they reside. The first book in the series was reportedly translated by a publisher in Nepal in 2012, but one is yet to see copies in Sikkim or Darjeeling. What is more, only the first book was translated. The Harry Potter series has seven books. Or, take Arundhati Roy's God of Small Things, which is available even a bootlegged Mandarin edition, but not yet in Nepali. If a reader in China can appreciate the Booker winning novel, why should a Nepali reader in Tumin not get the same opportunity? In the same vein, why should the Chinese who picked up God of Small Things in Mandarin, not be able to pick up a translation of Indra Bahadur Rai's Jarr or Guru Prasad Mainali's Paral ko Aago? This is important, and, by not concentrating enough on translations, especially relevant children's literature and the seminal literary works, we are denying an entire block of readers for a chance to part of world events and progressive thoughts.

Language provides a people with their identity and literature is their introduction to the world. Translations bridge the gap between people, and Bhanu Bhakta understood this about two centuries ago... time we did too.

I have been rewarded: UP Cop ok on BJP man

From Chinese missile shelters to US warships, the South China Sea conflict is heating up

The volatile politics of the South
China Sea continue to make

China, Vietnam, Malaysia, Brunei, the Philippines and Taiwan have been fighting over this azure stretch of the Pacific for more than a century, but tensions have increased markedly in recent years as China, claiming the South China Sea as its own, has built on some 250 islands there.

Now the Asia Maritime Transparency Initiative (AMTI), a US think tank, has warned that China was building new military facilities on the disputed Spratly archipelago, off the coast of Phillipines, Malaysia and Vietnam.

On June 29 the organisation reported on its website that new satellite images show that missile shelters, communications facilities and other infrastructure are "near completion", including those on Mischief Reef, which has been a symbol of China's assertiveness in the South China Sea since the country occupied it in 1995.

Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines and Vietnam, along with an arbitra-tion tribunal, were already challenging China's presence in the South Chi-

The AMTI report could increase tensions with the United States, which insists that this trade route re-

main under international control.

Presidents Donald Trump and Xi Jinping were supposed to discuss the situation during their first meeting at Mar-a-Lago on April 5 2017. But the launch of 59 Tomahawks in Syria and growing tensions on the Korean p insula completely overshadowed the maritime issue.

FREEDOM OF NAVIGATION

On May 24, the US triggered a confrontation cycle in the South China Sea by sending the guided-missile destroyer USS Dewey to pass through the contested waters, sailing close to Mischief Reef.

It was the first military maritime exercise in eight months and the first of Trump's presidency.

American patrols in the South China Sea had been a regular prac-tice under the Obama administration since 2015.

The South China Sea Freedom of



Navigation Operations (FONOPS) is a US military program, open to regional allies (including Australia, Japan and the Philippines), in which the US leads maritime exercises in the area.

FONOPS is aimed at reiterating the inalienable principle of freedom of navigation in international waters laid out in the United Nations Conventions on the Law of the Sea (UN-CLOS).

China disputes this application of the UN declaration and perceives FONOPS as essentially a unilateral American endeavour. The State Department asserts that the US can and will exercise its freedom of navigation on worldwide, without interference by any other country.

Warships, it has affirmed, should enjoy the same freedom as any other vessel, meaning free access to both exclusive economic zones (EEZ) and territorial seas without permission from the relevant coastal state.

China, which has also been in bilateral talks on the South China Sea with the Phillipines since early this year, has a different interpretation. For Beijing, military vessels cannot enter a coastal state's territorial seas without official permission.

It also claims that military ships

in EEZ territorial waters are unlawful and suspicious, and only non-military vessels enjoy the right to passage.

The clash of unilaterality is clear here. For the US, ensuring the freedom of navigation throughout Asia-Pacific region is a national prerogative and a atter of vital importance.

As such, China – specifically, its

military activities on some of the disputed South China Sea islands – is clearly its main obstacle. A confrontation appears unavoidable, but thus far interactions have cleverly been kept on a safe track because no US allies in Asia have joined the FONOPS

The Asia Maritime Transparency Initiative's assertion that "Beijing can now deploy military assets, including combat aircraft and mobile missile launchers, to the Spratly Islands at any time" may unsettle that balance.

TRUMP'S INTEREST IN THE SOUTH CHINA SEA

FONOPS, too, is often seen as a challenge to China's claims in the South

In fact, the freedom of naviga-tion-focused operations are not explicitly aimed at questioning Chinese sovereignty in the South China Sea. But the US has a clear interest in preserving its role as a regional hege mon, and FONOPS could be seen as a provocation of Beijing and its diverent maritime stance.

During his first months in office, President Trump was accused of neglecting the South China Sea dis-pute and undervaluing the maritime routes encompassed in the Chinese Nine-Dash line. As the New York Times has reported, the Pentagon has on two occasions turned down requests by the US Pacific Command to conduct operations in the disputed waters, in February and April.

This has worried some US allies in the region, and may have encouraged

others to start developing a more in dependent foreign policy.

Trump's cabinet has given every sign that it will continue the South China Sea policy developed under the Ohama administration On February 4 2017, Secretary of State James Mattis reiterated the importance of the South China Sea on the American agenda. Several months later, Admiral Harry Harris assured that the FONOPS in the South China Sea were planned as usual.

Timing has thus far been key in the waltz between Washington and Beijing. The US needs China's support in facing a growing number of global challenges, from terrorism to North

And with Trump already pushing China on trade, evidently his weapon of choice for addressing the nations' multifaceted bilateral relationship, the administration may have thought it strategic to avoiding outright pressure on Beijing regarding the South

China Sea.
FONOPS is part of this geopolitical balancing act. Relaunching opera-tions in the region in May allowed the US to reassure Asian allies about its continued presence and gave China the chance to criticise the US for jeopardising regional peace, thus bring-

ing that FONOPS cycle to a close.

Now, with the new US-reported satellite images of Chinese military development released, the ball is again in Washington's court.

The media dangerously misuses the word 'trolling'

The word "trolling" has become a media stand-in for online behaviours that are nothing to laugh

Journalist Ginger Gorman touched on this in her recent "Star-ing Down the Trolls" series, which explores the experiences of people who are harassed in digital spaces and offers advice on how to protect yourself.

There is one semantic problem

with the series though – none of the behaviours she describes are actually trolling.

WHEN IS TROLLING NOT TROLLING?

"Trolling" is commonly misused in the media (even I've done it).

To clarify, "trolling" refers to a specific act: throwing bait into the internet water in the form of deliberately provocative statements (not personal attacks, that's "flaming") and waiting for someone

It is not always wholly bad – it can be mischie vous. For example, a person using a fake but fairly convincing customer service account schooled some homophobic Facebook users over their outrage at a 2015 Campbell's Soup ad depicting gay

This stands in contrast to the serious and dangerous behaviours Gorman describes in her story, including an online group who reportedly "try to incite vulnerable people to harm themselves".

'REAL WORLD' SUFFERING

Conflating jokes and death threats with "trolling" makes it difficult to legislate or create effective policy around the issue.

This is perhaps understandable, given that the

word has been applied to behaviours ranging all the way from innocuous rickrolling to deliberately targeting someone with cyberhate and publishing their personal details online - a move known as

This makes it harder for victims to be taken seriously and get proper help. To say "I'm being

'trolled'" is nearly always met with advice to "just block them", "don't go on the internet", or the ubiquitous "don't feed the trolls".

In fact, by linking "trolling" with abusive be-haviours that would be met with swift action in the physical world, we have made it easier for law en-

forcement to respond dismissively.

As UNSW's Emma Jane points out in the book Cybercrime and its Victims, the use of the term "trolling" creates a false sense that the online world is separate from the "real" one.

Indeed, as Gorman explains in her series, these threatening online behaviours can spill over and invade our homes and workplaces. She told me that some of the victims she spoke with "have been so frightened for their safety and the safety of their children, they've moved house".

The very purpose of doxing someone is to fa-cilitate this offline harassment, as those targeted during Gamergate – including video game develop-er and now aspiring politician Brianna Wu – dis-

DANGEROUS PEOPLE ARE NOT JUST 'TROLLS'

Gorman's interview with "vicious and committed internet troll" Mark shows just how dangerous the types of people who engage in cyberhate can be.

Mark may be many things, but he is no troll. The

portrait Gorman paints is one of a person whose destructive behaviour and, as she writes, "psycho-pathic tendencies", goes far beyond mere internet

Mark and the group he works with, by his own admission, aim to harm people. By letting him (and others like him) say they are only "trolling", we are "actually [providing] a cop-out ... for real dirt-bags who claim they were 'just trolling'", as an interviewee says in Whitney Phillips's book, This is Why We

Can't Have Nice Things.

Academics and journalists and particularly those of us with a foot in both worlds – have a responsibility to call things what

they really are. Giving these actions their correct name also matters if we are to hold ourselves accountable for our own

online behaviour. As Phillips points out, "For every shrill, sensational article that con-demns trolling behaviours while replicating trolling tactics, there will be a thousand trolls more than happy to rise to the media's occasion."

It becomes even more important if you are trying to draw attention to the seriousness of the ef-

fects of cyberhate and threatening behaviours.

Of particular concern is the realm of "digilantism", which Gorman mentions, in which people fight back against their online abusers by outing them. For instance, publishing personal details, including their place of work. This is still doxing and it can have serious consequences for all involved, even if done defensively.

In the absence of better terminology, Gorman cknowledges trolling is a "catch-all" with real shortcomings.

"[It] actually detracts from the work that I do in bringing attention to this issue because it obscures the seriousness of what cyberhate targets are experiencing," she told me.

By calling these behaviours what they really are - Gorman suggests words like "cyberstalking, cyberviolence, cyberhate and technology-enabled abuse" - we can better equip people to understand the gravity of the situation. From there we can start to figure out effective ways to help.

NE cement companies cut price to pass GST benefits to customers

Accordingly, the cement companies have passed on GST benefits to the consumers by reducing prices up to Rs 15 per bag, the release said.

The actual benefit

varies from state to state, depending on the pre and post-GST rates, the release added.

CBIinterrogates TMC MP Sultan Ahmed

KOLKATA, JULY 3 (PTI): The CBI today interrogated senior TMC MP Sultan Ahmed for his alleged role in the Narada video tapes scandal which purportedly showed him accepting bribe to favour a fictitious firm.

Ahmed was seven hours by the CBI officials here.

The TMC MP is the third person to have been quizzed by the investigating agency after his younger brother Iqbal Ahmed, a Trinamool Congress MLA and deputy mayor of Kolkata Municipal Corporation, and IPS officer S M H Mirza.

According to CBI sources, the TMC MP may be summoned again after verifying his today's statements to the agency's officers.

After coming out of the CBI office here, Ahmed said, "I have tried to answer all the questions to the best of my ability and knowledge. I have fully coop erated with the CBI.

In future too, I will cooperate with it."

The Narada tapes, which were released be fore the 2016 assembly elections in West Bengal, allegedly showed sever-al Trinamool Congress MLAs and MPs accepting money from journalist Mathew Samuels who posed as a businessman.

No arrests have been made so far in connection with the case.

360-day advance rail booking period for foreigners

NEW DELHI, JUL 3 (PTI): Now, foreign tourists can book train tickets 360 days in advance from abroad instead of the present 120 days.

The Indian Railways

would announce the facility this week.

Aiming to attract more foreigners and NRI travellers, railways have undertaken steps to facilitate easy booking of tickets for them.

foreign-However, foreign-ers would be allowed to book tickets only in first AC, second AC and executive class of mail express trains and in Rajdhani, Shatabdi, Gatimaan and Tejas trains 360 days in advance as the facility is not available for sleeper and third AC.

Foreigners are also not allowed to book tickets in Suvidha trains that cater to last minute travel planners.

The aim is to provide adequate time to foreigners and NRIs to plan their holidays well in advance, said a senior Railway Ministry official.

He said the advance reservation period has been extended to 360 days for foreigners/NRIs and they can book their tickets online using credit or debit cards without depending on travel agents.

They are required to give visa details, passport and international mobile numbers while booking online through the IRCTC ticketing site.

IRCTC, a railways PSU, would levy Rs 200 per ticket as service

per ticket as service charge. In case of cancel-lations, existing rules would be applied after deducting flat Rs 50 from

the total fare.

Besides announcing the facility for foreigners, railways would also launch an integrated mo-bile application for passengers shortly.

I'll urge Pacquiao to quit, says trainer Roach

BRISBANE, JULY 3 (AFP): Manny Pacquiao's trainer advised the Filipino legend to quit boxing today after his sensational defeat to unheralded Australian Jeff Horn.

While controversy raged over the scoring of Sunday's World Boxing Organization welterweight title bout in Brisbane, after all three judges awarded it to unbeaten Horn, there were doubts whether 38-year-old Pacquiao

would return for a possible rematch.

Hall of Fame trainer Freddie
Roach said he would consider advising Pacquiao to retire after a glit-tering 22-year professional career in which he won world titles at an un-

precedented eight weight divisions.
"I'm going to talk to Manny about maybe calling it a day, maybe this is it." Roach said.

Given no chance by most observers, the 29-year-old Horn's ultra-aggressive style rocked Pacquiao, with the three judges scoring the fight 117-111, 115-113 and 115-113 to the Australian before 51,000 fans at Suncorp Stadium.

Pacquiao, (59-7-2) who insisted on a Brisbane rematch as a clause in his contract for the fight, declared however that he would "absolutely return for a rematch.

"We have a clause for a rematch.

No problem," Pacquiao said in the ring after the judges' decision.

But Australian boxing great and

three-time world champion leff Fenech also called for Pacquiao, who retired briefly last year, to hang up

his gloves for good this time.

"If they let Manny fight again, that's stupid." Fenech said. "He should go relax and enjoy the

money he has made. He's got nothing to prove. Retire. "Jeff fought the right fight and

took Manny to places he'd not been before he made it a bit dirty"

day in Poland. However, head coach Loew says the hard work for his rising stars is just begin-

India's action in Sikkim is 'betrayal' of treaty: China

BEIJING, JUL 3 (PTI): China said today that the Sino-India border in the Sikkim sector is well demarcated and the Indian Army's action there is a "betrayal" of the position taken by successive Indian governments.

"Former Indian Prime Minister

Jawaharlal Nehru endorsed the 1890 Sino-British Treaty on Sik-kim in a letter to the then Chinese counterpart Zhou Enlai in 1959. Successive Indian governments have also endorsed this," Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said at a media briefing.

He said India needs to observe

the treaty and pull back troops immediately from Doklam.

"The India-China boundary in the Sikkim section is well demarcated. The action taken by India is a betrayal of the position taken by the Indian governments," he said.

The spokesman, however, said the line for diplomatic communi-

On the likelihood of a meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Xi Jinping during the G20 Summit in Hamburg, Germany, Geng said he has "no information to offer at the moment" about the arrangements for bilateral meetings between Xi and leaders of other countries.

China has accused Indian troops of transgressing into the Doklam

area of the Sikkim sector, which it claims as a part of its territory.

Bhutan also claims the area as a

part of its territory. China also said it has closed the Nathu La route in Sikkim for Kailash Mansarovar pilgrims from India.

Qatar responds to demands after deadline extended

KUWAIT CITY, JUL 3 (AFP): Qatar today responded to a list of demands from Saudi Ara-bia and its allies after they agreed to give a defiant Doha another 48 hours to address their grievances.

Details of the response were not immediately available, but a Gulf official told AFP that Qatari Foreign Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al-Thani had delivered it during a short visit to Kuwait. which is acting as a mediator in the crisis.

Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt had announced in the early hours of today they were pushing back a deadline for Qatar to agree to a list of 13 demands they issued on June 22.

A joint statement said they were extending the ultimatum, which had been due to expire at the end of the day yesterday, at the request of Kuwait's emir.
The demands includ-

ed Doha ending support for the Muslim Brotherhood, closing broadcaster Al-Jazeera, downgrad-ing diplomatic ties with Iran and shutting down a Turkish military base in the emirate.

Sheikh Mohammed

had earlier said the list of demands was "made to be rejected".



Saudi Arabia and its allies announced on June 5 they were severing ties with their Gulf neighbour, sparking the worst dinlomatic crisis to hit the region in decades

They accused Qatar of supporting extremism and of being too close to Saudi Arabia's regional arch-rival Iran, which Doha has strongly de-The crisis has raised

concerns of growing in-stability in the region, home to some of the world's largest energy exporters and several key Western allies who host US military bases.

German Foreign Min-ister Sigmar Gabriel, who today starts a tour of several Gulf states, called for "serious dialogue" to end the crisis. "We are worried that

the distrust and the disunity could weaken all the parties concerned as well as the entire penin-sula," said Gabriel, who will visit Saudi Arabia. the United Arab Emirates and Qatar.

Riyadh and its supporters have already severed air, sea and ground links with Qatar, cutting off vital routes for im-

ports including food.

They also ordered
Qatari citizens to leave their territories and took various steps against Qatari firms and financial institutions.

It is unclear what

further measures will be taken if Qatar fails to meet the demands, but the UAE's ambassador to Russia Omar Ghobash warned last week that further sanctions could be imposed. As well as expelling

Qatar from the six-member Gulf Cooperation Council, Riyadh and its allies could tell their economic partners to choose between business with them or with Doha, he told Britain's Guardian newspaper.

Qatar has long pur-sued a more independent foreign policy than many of its neighbours, who tend to follow the lead of regional powerhouse

Doha has said it is ready for talks to end the

Kuwait, which unlike most of its GCC neighbours has not cut ties with Qatar, has been heading up mediation

US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson has also called for compromise and hosted senior Gulf officials, but his efforts have been undermined by remarks from President Donald Trump ap-parently supporting Riyadh's position.

Trump spoke sepa-rately yesterday with the Saudi king, Abu Dhabi's crown prince and the Qa-tari emir on his concerns over the dispute, the

White House said.

Trump "underscored that unity in the region is critical," the statement said, but also "reiterated the importance of stopping terrorist financing and discrediting extremist ideology."

Egypt said it would host the foreign min-isters of Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain on Wednesday to discuss

the crisis.

The 13 demands have not been officially published, but a Kuwaiti diplomatic source confirmed today that the list as it has appeared in the media was genuine.
