Contribution from total

tax revenue is of the order of Rs.770.31 crore and in the



case of Non-Tax revenue it is Rs.481.92 crore.

The total expenditure includes allocation amounting to Rs.57.72 crore under the dispensation of the North Eastern Council, Rs.141.48 crore under non-lapsable pool of central resources and Rs. 1570.36 crore under Centrally Sponsored Schemes, he added. In anticipation of the sub-

mission of the Report by the Pay Commission, the government has considered it necessary to make the necessary budgetary provision to meet

The Government will be tabling a new legislation to restrict entry of certain non-organic products like fruits and vegetables to the state of Sikkim in the current session of the Sikkim Legislative Assembly, Chief Minister Pawan Chamling said while presenting the budget for the next fiscal year

He said that the restriction on non-organic products has been imposed to provide better marketing back the present youth into farming and provide safe and healthy

food to consumers.

Mr Chamling said that complete utilisation of fully certified lands by bringing all fallow land including current fallow under cultivation through planned strategies are his present priorities in the agriculture sector.

He said that the total vegetable requirement to feed the entire population of the state including the tourists and floating popula-tion is 95,000 metric tonnes per annum; however, this requirement varies according to peak and lean tourist season. For sustaining vegetable production to feed the entire population, his government will continue to lay stress on vege-

table production programme.
"The State Government has

"We do not have any comment on the issue. We are grateful to the government and people of India for hosting Ti-betan refugees for last 60 years. We want to express our gratitude to people of India for it." Dagpo told PTI.

Last week, the Indi an Express had reported that following a com-munication by Foreign Secretary Vijay Gokha-le, Cabinet Secretary PK Sinha had sent out a note to senior functionaries of the central and state gov ernments asking them to skip events being organ-ised by the Tibetans.

The report had said

the government had issued the note citing "sen-sitive" phase of India's ties with China.

Asked whether the Indian government's reported note is an indi-cation of change in New Delhi's policy towards the Dalai Lama and the Tibetan refugees, Dagpo said, "No". "The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) already clarified its position on the issue last week," he said.

Following the media report on the note by the Cabinet Secretary, the MEA on Friday had said that the Dalai Lama is a revered religious leader and is deeply respected by the people of India, adding there is no change in that position.

"Government of India's position on His Holiness the Dalai Lama is clear and consistent. He is a revered religious leader and is deeply respected by the people of India. There is no change in that position," MEA Spokesperson Raveesh Kumar had said. He said the Dalai Lama

is "accorded all freedom to carry out his religious activities in India"

The Right is Not Always Fair

Politics hence should make space for more voices

 $T^{\text{he rise and rise of the Right in India is not a phenomenon unique to the country. The Right, Far Right and the Alt-Right are increasingly recording}$ gains in polities where such successes would have been unthinkable till even a few years ago. But that is the situation where electoral politics has delivered too many governments to. In all fairness, the Far Right, which is what every Right-wing faction aspires to be if allowed, has not stolen power and influence and has been voted to a stronger sitting by a democratic process. That, however, does not mean that there is no reason to worry. There is plenty that demands con-cern. But first, let's try and understand what allowed Radical parties to become so "mainstream".

It is obvious that frustration with status quo drove

people to vote so far Right. Around the world, as also in India, the electorate has traditionally fought shy of Radical parties and limited their presence to the fringe or as part of coalitions. While this kept such parties in check, it also, over the years allowed the more liberal and left-of-centre parties to grow somnolent, increasingly compromised and easily distracted. When the economy was doing fine and the lay citizenry could go about their lives partaking in politics only during elec-tion cycles, when the economic meltdown happened, the disparity that had settled in became stark and the blame was shouldered on dispensations that had been in office for too long. People lost faith in their leaders and their politics and leveraged the vote to effect radical change. Populist and majoritarian rhetoric presented options that the then leaders were unable to offer. This space could have been filled by the Left as well, but the timing was against them because their ideology had by then collapsed under the persistent stress a world that had changed faster than they could adapt. Further, the current rage of change has been powered by a middleclass which finds itself unmoored from its sense of security and they, while they may lean socialist, are not conditioned to lean far enough left. The Right and its other extremities thus found their favour.

While this may, to some extent, explain what is happening in the political space around us and even though most such elevations have been democratically endorsed, there is an inherent problem with such a situation which militates against the basic premise of democracy – diversity. The Right has traditionally been disinterested in the rights or even protection of the minorities and so seeped in insularity that authoritarianism is its natural position. We already see enough evidence of this everywhere, but will continue to flag some worries. Even as they peddle populist spiel with one hand, they reinforce control and authoritarianism with the other, foisting nationalism and majoritarian paranoia to destroy free media, undermine independent institutions and muzzle the opposition. None of this is desirable or safe, and yet, because they ride a wave, they pull it off. It goes without saving that for a democracy to be stable and healthy, all political actors need to believe in its basic precepts of free will, fair competition and checks & balances. None of these find resonance with the Far Right and efforts, overt and subversive, are always underway to undermine the executive, judiciary, free expression and free press. Take a look around. Such political actors, convinced of their right to rule and claiming righteousness, also lose the ability to sift fair criticism from spite. More dangerously, they see their adversaries as enemies. Here, one needs to quote Michael Ignatieff, a political theorist and former leader of the Liberal party of Canada, who wrote this a few years ago: "For democracies to work, politicians need to respect the difference between an enemy and an adversary. An adversary is someone you want to defeat. An enemy is someone you have to destroy."

And when democracy allows adversaries to be "destroyed," democracy itself is dealt a fatal blow. Do we want that to happen?

Rolling Stones tour: they may be older but time waits for no one

An article in Rolling
Astone magazine described the legendary
band - its near namesake - as "growing old angrily". Its portrait of Mick Jagger referenced "age lines around his eyes ... as old as the weariness and cynicism in his voice". That was in 1980 when Jagger was in his late 30s. Eleven with Keith Richards and a triumphant comeback later, Q magazine's review of the band's live album Flashpoint also placed them in "their dotage".

So as the Stones announce that they are cranking into gear again for their first UK dates in five years (they performed a 12-city pean tour in 2017) it's worth remembering that the debates about how

old is too old to rock – and the attendant mixture of derision, veneration and ambivalence - have their own worn lineage.

This is as much to do with genre and how it's authenticated as with age. Jazz and – closer to home for the Stones – blues artists face fewer qualms about staying on the road, even as the fire fades from their performances. John Lee Hooker was recording and touring into his 80s and BB King was just a year short of 90 when he played the last shows before his death (having played Glastonbury at 86). Chicago bluesman Buddy Guy is still touring at the age of 81.

CROSSROADS FROM BLUES TO ROCK

The Stones themselves, now closer to their 60th than 50th anniversary, have played heavily of late on their origins as a blues band - their well-received 2016 album Blue and Lonesome consisted entirely of blues covers. Returning, or retreating, to the blues that influenced them initially seems both a natural and a strategic move. Strategic in that it taps into a lineage of long-running performers that predates rock. But also natural enough given that the blues has been a musical thread throughout their albums and shows.

They emerged in the early 1960s as a blues covers band – and drew heavily on their influences (their very name is taken from a Muddy Waters song) as they forged a new identity as the "greatest rock 'n' roll band in the world". To be fair, they were rather more assiduous in crediting and publicly acknowledging their musical forebears than some of their 1960s contemporaries, (Led Zeppelin, for example) insisting that they would only play US TV show Shindig if the producers also booked black Ameri-

can bluesman Howlin' Wolf.

The key difference, though, is the way in which blues and rock emerged as popular, commercial music genres. Blues emerged from folk forms and was interpreted and authenticated in light of that – as music predicated on life stories and personal stories em-bedded in a collective tradition. The music went back to the era of the Jim Crow segregation laws and, before that, slavery. (BB King's great grandfather, for instance, was born into slavery). It was also subject to heavily segregated markets, in the US, both on the live circuit and on radio.

Rock emerged and was sold as

youth music, making an appeal to authenticity predicated on a generation gap and sense of rebelliousness – the Stones' own "Street Fighting Man", for

example. This meant that while there were numerous musical similarities such as the 12-bar form - some of the social nuances were lost. As author Charles Shaar Murray pointed out, a middle-aged black American man like Muddy Waters in the 1950s and 1960s singing lyrics like "I'm a man" carried the sub-text of not being referred to as "boy", a common form of racist address. The same song in the hands of a young, white Englishman was shorn of this context.

Artists such as the Stones were

more associated with a commercial milieu. Whatever their – doubtless genuine – pronouncements of dedication to the music, they emerged through major labels with large marketing budgets. And rock music's rebel credentials were somewhat diluted when its stars, including Jagger, start-ed receiving knighthoods.

TORN AND FRAYED?

But genres evolve and, as the Stones and others have shown, commercial or not, they can still chart new paths. Rock, like jazz before it (now a music of conservatories), has entered the academy. "Classic" and "heritage rock are established categories and ways of thinking about, as well as selling, a music that is now situated across three generations' worth of cultural discourse.

A key, lasting change brought about by the Stones and Beatles generation of rockers was the centrality of the band as a unit of music making, and as a marker of authenticity. As my Newcastle colleague Richard Elliott noted, straightforward derision of ageing artists as mere peddlers of nostalgia is itself a rigidly Romantic view that "fixes rock to a time and an atti-tude" – without allowing for the twists and turns of both the artists and the lifetimes' worth of listening and expe rience their work has informed.

There are numerous of wavs dealing with growing old in the lime-light, from Randy Newman's ironic self-parody to Paul Simon's decision to call a natural end to touring with his voice still strong.

For an act such as the Stones, harking back to their musical roots may be a way of aligning their musical development with its own antecedents, at the same time as allowing for a mode of performance lowing for a mode of performance less reliant on the physicality of their younger days. Paying tribute to the past – both their own, and musical history more broadly – is a means of carrying it forward. Time may be on their side after all.

Many Europeans assessing assessing damage from the recent wintery weather dramatically nicknamed the "Beast from the East". But people visiting certain parts of the English coast found a particularly unwelcome surprise. Thousands of dead starfish and other sea creatures were washed up along the shores in Kent and East Yorkshire, creating surreal scenes reminiscent of post-apocalyptic horror movies. So how did a blizzard cause such marine destruction?

Mass starfish strandings

aren't completely unheard of. For example, several million were found on the coast of

Worcester County, Maryland, USA in 1960. Up to 10,000 were found along the strandline on the Isle of Man in the British Isles in 1999. And 50,000 were stranded on the Irish coastline in 2009

These events are not exclusive to just starfish but have also included other marine animals that live on the seabed including crabs and molluscs There has even been a poem written about these

events written by Michael Symmons Roberts. We don't yet know the exact reasons for mass strandings but they are often blamed on very cold weather or storms. The Beast from the East was a polar vortex that brought freezing temperatures and high onshore wind gusts onto the eastern coastline



of the UK. High winds can disturb the seas along the coast, creating large waves that churn up the seabed where many animals reside. Sediments on the seabed are disturbed and can smother these animals

Animals picked up by these disturbances can be moved high up the shore during the high tides and are left stranded as the tide retreats. Coincidentally, during the peak of the storm, UK shores also ex-perienced low spring tides, which likely made the marine effects of these high winds worse.

As if this wasn't enough, the Beast from the East brought very cold temperatures several degrees below freezing over several days across some parts of the country. Such low temperatures can have dramatic effects on marine life. Previous mass strandings have been blamed on cold temperatures making marine life severely lethargic. Once stranded, any surviving animals would have been ex posed to potentially lethal low temperatures.

Starfish may be at partic-ular risk of strandings after storms because of a behaviour known as "starballing". By curling each of their multiple arms to create a large spherical balloon shape with their body, they can essentially roll over the seabed in fast-moving water and cover much greater distances. But during a storm they could be rolled out of control and left stranded on the beach.

It seems most likely that the mass strandings that oc-curred after the Beast from the East were driven by high

wind speeds combined with low spring tides and extreme cold temperatures (for the UK). Luckily, the event is unlikely to have a long-term impact on

UK starfish populations.

Starfish are abundant and widespread within the shallow waters of the UK and Atlantic Ocean. They are particularly resilient creatures that live in highly dynamic habitats, can regenerate limbs and are highly effective predators. What's more worrying is that these kind of extreme weather events may become more common thanks to climate change.

BOSTON, MAR 6 (PTI): A signed hardcover copy of Nobel laureate Rabin dranath Tagore's 'The King of the Dark Cham-ber' - the English trans-lation of his famous Bengali play 'Raja' - is up for auction in the US.

Signed on a prefatory page in fountain pen by Tagore, the Bolpur edi-tion of the book was published by The Macmillan Company in 1916.

The play revolves around a mysterious, unseen, omniscient king, who is both benevolent and efficient.

His reluctance to-wards being seen causes most of the drama in the story, rattling his beautiful wife and the kings of nearby kingdoms.

The book was con-signed by an American book dealer, according to US-based RR Auction.

It is expected to fetch USD 500 at the online auction. Tagore became the first Indian to win a Nobel Prize (Literature) in 1913.

He wrote successfully in all literary genres, but was first and foremost a poet, publishing more than 50 volumes of poet-ry. Tagore was knighted by the British in 1915, but gave up his knight-hood after the Jallianwala Bagh massacre in 1919. The bidding for the book ends on March 7.

HRD to seek monthly report on ragging complaints, satisfaction of parents

New Delhi, Mar 6 (PTI): The ragging complaints received by any educational institution, their status and satisfaction level of the com-plainant's parents will now have to be reported to the HRD Ministry on a monthly basis.

The closure of any complaint and the reason behind it will also have to be reported.

A decision in this re-gard was taken at a recent meeting to review the anti-ragging initia-tives and programmes that was attended by officials from HRD Ministry and regulatory bodies such as University Grants Commission (UGC), In-dian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAGR), Indian Nursing Council (INC) and All India Council of Technical Education (AICTE).
"All the reported/re-

solved/active cases will have to be reported on monthly basis to HRD Ministry. Closing of the ragging complaints, reasons for closure along with the satisfaction lev el of the student/parent/ guardian will also have to be mentioned in the report," a senior HRD official said

However, a top Hockey India official has confirmed that Ciriello is already on board and it's a matter of time that SAI makes the official announcement.

"Ciriello started work-ing with the team in the New Zealand tour. He is currently in Bangalore at the national camp. His tenure is till 2020 Olympics. The official announce-ment about his appointment will be made by the Sports Ministry," the HI official told PTI.

The official, however, refused to divulge the remuneration of the big-shouldered Australian, nicknamed 'Big Dog'.

When confirmed by the SAI. Ciriello will replace Hans Streeder who quit in September last year following the sack-ing of chief coach and fellow Dutchman Roelant

Ciriello, a fearless defender, shot into limelight in 2014 when he scored hat-tricks in the finals of the World Cup in The Hague and the Glasgow Commonwealth Games to guide Australia

to two crowns.

It has been learnt that apart from provid-ing inputs to chief coach Sjoerd Marijne, Ciriello will work with Indian dragflickers ahead of the big-ticket events.

Ciriello, a regular in Victorian Vikings domestic team, made his debut for Australia in 2008 and was part of Kookaburras' CWG winning side of 2010 and 2014.

COLOMBO/NEW DELHI, MAR 6 (PTI): The BCCI today said the Tri-nation T20 series in Sri Lanka, also involving the Indian cricket team, will continue despite the country plunging into a state of emergency following communal vio-

The BCCI has confirmed that the "situation is perfectly normal in Colombo" where the tournament is taking place, hours before India were to take on the hosts in the opening fixture of Nidahas Trophy at Premadasa Stadium.
"There have been reports of cur-

few and an emergency being called in Sri Lanka. The situation in picture is in Kandy and not Colombo. This is to notify everyone that after talking to concerned security personnel (Ministerial security division - in charge of team security), we have understood that the situation is completely normal in Colombo. If at all there is any update on the same we shall notify," Indian team's media cell issued an official press note from Colombo.

Sri Lanka has declared a state of mergency for 10 days to rein in the spread of communal violence, a day after Buddhists and Muslims clashed in the Indian Ocean island's central district of Kandy.

BCCI's acting president C K Khanna told PTI: "The Indian cricket board is in constant touch with the Sri Lankan vernment authorities. The security is foolproof and we have been assured that there is no threat to the tournament. So the Indian team, as of now, will be playing the tournament."

The government decision to declare emergency came after a Buddhist man was killed and a mob set fire to a Mus-

lim-owned shop.

In Sri Lanka, out of its 21 million population, Buddhists Sinhalese make up for nearly 75 percent, 13 percent of the population are Hindus while Muslim community make up for around 10

Manchester United rode their luck as Nemanja Matic's late thunderbolt capped a dramatic 3-2 win at Crystal Palace on Monday. Mourinho's

trailed to Andros Townsend's early opener and Patrick van Aanholt's second half effort at Selhurst Park.

But Chris Smalling got one back for United and Romelu Lukaku equalised with 14 min-utes remaining.

Serena has high expectations heading into Indian Wells



NEW YORK, MAR 6 (AFP): Serena Williams said Monday that she "can't wait for the future" as she warmed up for her return to the WTA Tour at the Tie Break Tens exhibition at Madison Square Garden.

The 23-time Grand Slam champion is competing at the elite Indian Wells hardcourt tournament this week, her first tour action since her 2017 Australian Open tri-

. Williams was pregnant when she lifted the trophy in Melbourne last year, and missed the rest of 2017 awaiting the birth of her daughter in September.

Monday's event, which featured eight players facing off in 10-point "super tie breaks" as they vied for a 250,000 winner's prize, was a chance to sharpen her skills.
Williams bowed out in the second round,

gaining a 9-7 lead over China's Zhang Shuai but eventually falling 13-11.

"It was good," she said of the experience.

"I wish I would have made a few more shots." Williams opened the laid-back event with a 10-5 victory over Marion Bartoli, the 2013 Wimbledon champion who announced in December she was planning to return to the court more than four years after retiring in the wake of her only Grand Slam triumph.

After correcting the protocol for the "rock-paper-scissors" game used to determine who served first, Williams fell behind 4-2, but a double-fault from Bartoli followed by two aces from Serena saw the American great ahead 5-4.

A couple of forehand winners and a service winner saw Williams take an 8-4 lead, and she finally finished it off with another winning serve.
"It feels different, it feels good," said Wil-

liams, who returned to competition with a Fed Cup doubles loss alongside her sister Venus last month

The birth of Williams's daughter, Alexis Olympia, was followed by complications that scuppered the player's plans to defend her title in Melbourne.

But Williams says she's aiming to be back at her best -- apparently more than comfortable with coach Patrick Mouratoglou's com ments to wtatennis.com that her goal for this season "will be to win Grand Slams"

"I think everyone should have high expectations," said Williams, who will be unseeded at Indian Wells and open her cam paign against 53rd-ranked Zarina Diyas of Kazakhstan.

"That's the message that I'm sending."

Bartoli, who was forced to pull out of an exhibition event at Wimbledon last year because of a mystery virus and dramatic weight loss, has said she was targeting a return to the WTA Tour at the Miami Open later this month.

However, the 33-year-old told AFP her timetable would depend on how her body holds up to training.

"I do not know if my shoulder and my

knees are going to hold, there are so many question marks," she said. "What is certain is that I will not return

to the court until I consider myself 100 percent. I stopped the competition for five years $\frac{1}{2}$ and I'll be back when I'm 100 percent.

'Ethnic cleansing' of Myanmar's Rohingya continues: UN

YANGON, MAR 6 (AFP): Myanmar is continuing its "ethnic cleansing" of the Rohingya with a "campaign of terror and forced starvation" in Rakhine state, a UN human rights envov said today, six months after a military crackdown sparked a mass exodus of the Muslim minority.

Some 700,000 Rohingya have fled over the border to Bangladesh since violence erupted in August, taking with them horrifying testimony of murder, rape and arson by sol-diers and vigilante mobs.

While the majority of those refugees fled Myanmar last year, Rohingya continue to stream across the border by the hundreds every week.

The ethnic cleansing of Rohingya from Myanmar continues. I don't think we can draw any other conclusion from what I have seen and heard in Cox's Bazar," UN Assistant Secretary-General for Human Rights Andrew Gilmour said after speaking to newly-arrived Rohingya in Bangla-

desh's crowded refugee camps.
"The nature of the violence has changed from the frenzied blood-letting and mass rape of last year to a lower intensity campaign of terror and forced starvation that seems

and many Western powers have accused the army of us-ing the counterinsurgency as a pretext to expel a minority that has faced brutal discrimination for decades.

Doctors Without Borders (MSF) has estimated that at least 6,700 Rohingya were killed in the first month of the crackdown alone

Hundreds of Rohingya villages were torched, and recent satellite imagery showed at least 55 villages have since been completely bulldozed, removing all traces of buildings, wells and vegetation.

Myanmar's military has

denied committing any abuses outside one incident in the Ra-khine village of Inn Din, where it said security forces assisted with the killing of 10 unarmed Rohingya.

Rights groups say that is the tip of the iceberg from a force with a grim history of abuses around the country and open hostility towards the Rohingya. In a Facebook post on Tues-

day, deputy army chief Soe Win reiterated the military's stance that the "Rohingya" are not a genuine ethnic group in Myanmar -- a view shared by many in the Buddhist majority, where there is broad support for the army campaign.

Myanmar's civilian government, led by former democracy activist Aung San Suu Kyi, lacks control over the military but has been battered by rights groups for failing to speak in the Rohingva's defence or tamp surging Islamophobia.

Air India allowed by Saudi to use its airspace to fly to Israel: Netanyahu

WASHINGTON, MAR 6 (PTI): Air India has been allowed by Saudi Arabia to fly over its territory on its new route from New Delhi to Tel Aviv, Israeli Prime Minister Renjamin Netanyahu said today, an unprecedented move which would reduce travel time between the two cities by two and a half hours.

India's national carri-er Air India is scheduled to begin its direct flight between New Delhi and Tel Aviv in few weeks from now.

Interacting with reporters after his meeting with US President Donald Trump at the White House, Netanyahu said that Air India has signed in agreement with Saudi Arabia over the matter.

"Air India signed an agreement today to fly to Israel over Saudi Arabia,"

Netanyahu said. So far Saudi Arabia has not allowed planes from any country to fly over it and go to Israel.

Israel does not have diplomatic ties with Saudi Arabia, but it was reported that the two nations

have been working covertly on their shared security concerns over Iran after the 2015 nuclear accord, which both governments strongly opposed.

Such a permission by audi Arabia would reduce the air travel time from New Delhi to Tel Aviv by Air India from about eight hours to five and a half hours, Netanyahu said.

Netanvahu said that as a result of the short travel of Air India, the Israeli national carrier El Al would be at disadvan-tage both in terms of cost and travel time. He said he is in talks with the na tional carrier so that it is

not hurt economically.

Meanwhile in New
Delhi, an Air India spokesperson reacting to Prime Minister Netanya-hu's statement said, "We are yet to receive any Indian regulator."

Air India has sought permission from the Di rectorate General of Civil Aviation for thrice-a week flight from Delhi to Tel Aviv.

NEW WHATSAPP UPDATE LETS YOU DELETE SENT MESSAGES **EVEN AFTER AN HOUR**

WhatsApp has extended the time frame in which you can delete a sent message to over 1 hour. Since the Delete for Everyone feature was introduced in November last year, a sent message could not be deleted after 420 seconds (7 minutes). Now the time to recall that un-thoughtful age has been extended to 4096 seconds, that is, 68 minutes and 16 seconds to be exact.

The update is available for beta users right now but would soon roll to all WhatsApp users. In fact it is only available for beta users on Android and is yet to make it to iOS as well.

Apart from this upgrade, the new update fixes the gif section crash and modifies some Emojis in stickers. Some users reported that they could not add Gifs in messages as the section would stop working as soon Gifs tab was opened. WhatsApp has also brought back text-only profile update and it will reflect in the profile menu in settings.

WhatsApp is also known to be working on a forward message tag that will help users fight off spam and overload of forward messages. Every forwarded message will carry a Forward message tag to make user aware that is probably comes from some other chat of chat group.

This along with the stickers feature is said to be hidden from the app right now and disabled by default but was reported by WaBetaInfo.

WhatsApp recently brought payments feature in India that allows you to send (and receive) money to a WhatsApp number directly from the app. The feature is UPI-based (Unified Payments Interface) which means it directly links to your bank account and doesnt -- rely on or act like -a third-party wallet service. Currently, WhatApp Payment supports several Indian banks including Axis Bank, HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank, State Bank Of India, Yes Bank and Airtel Payments Bank among
