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Chenrezig project on verge of completion

GANGTOK, 06 JAN:

The state government's ambitious Chenrezig Singkham Riwo Potala project near Sangachoeing monastery in Pelling, West Sikkim is on the verge of completion with artisans and contractors working hard to complete the 134 feet tall statue of Chenrezig, the Buddha of Compassion.

Funded by the Cultural Affairs Department and executed by the Building and Housing Department, the statue will be the world's tallest statue of Chenrezig.

The project had begun in 2010 and is scheduled to be complete by March this year. The Dalai Lama is expected to inaugurate and bless the statue.

North India reels
under intense
cold; fog disrupts
rail, air traffic

NEW DELHI, JAN 6 (PTI):

Cold wave swept parts of north India with snowfall in the higher reaches of the Kashmir Valley, and Delhi recording its lowest minimum temperature of the season at 4.2 degrees Celsius, while dense fog continued to disrupt rail and air traffic.

Punjab and Haryana reeled under intense cold wave while dense fog engulfed most parts of both the states delaying some trains and affecting flight operations.

In Delhi, due to poor visibility, the Railways had to cancel 36 trains, reschedule 30 while 85 trains were running late.

High-altitude areas of Jammu region experienced light snowfall over the past few days, as a result of which several parts, including Bhaderwah and Banihal, were reeling under sub-zero night temperature.

Meanwhile, 11 bodies have been recovered from a spot in north Kashmir's Kupwara district where a passenger vehicle was hit by a huge avalanche of snow yesterday. Three people were pulled out alive from the avalanche site.

Chief Minister Pawan Chamling today announced that the government will be spending an additional Rs.10 crore per year for sponsoring Sikkimese students studying at CCCT Chisopani in South Sikkim. He was addressing the inaugural function of the Pabyuik Naitam Tourism Festival 2017-18 at Naitam.

During his two and a half hour long address, the CM talked to the youth wherein he said that the state government has invested a lot in improving education facilities in the State. He urged people to take maximum advantage of the facilities provided by the government.

The Chief Minister also made the announcement of upgrading Pabyuik Naitam Secondary School to a full-fledged Senior Secondary School.

Talking about Sikkim's Organic Mission, the Chief Minister said, "Uttam kheti, madhyam vyapar and nicho nikai (best is farming, second comes trade/business and lowest is government service)" urging the gathered villagers comprising mostly of progressive farmers to take up organic farming and help the government spread its



organic mission.

The Chief Minister also apprised the farming community of the State to gear up and be prepared to fulfill demands for vegetables in the State from 31 Mar 2018 and also informed that a six-storied Market Complex called Organic Bazaar is nearing completion at Gangtok for rural farmers to sell their organic produce. He also urged the people of Pabyuik Naitam to be pioneers in cultivating yam (ban tarul) and rear deers in their homes just like sheep and goats, along with organic dairy farming.

He said that the state government is leaving no stone unturned to develop the tourism sector in the state, which can be a sustainable source of income and employment for the people of the state. With the opening of new start-up schemes the opportunity for the people of Sikkim in the sector is unlimited and now it is all up to the people especially the youth to utilize it properly, he added.

The Pabyuik Naitam Tourism Festival showcased the traditions, cultures, organic foods, attires and homes of the ethnic communities of Sikkim

along with host of other activities like paragliding, musical and dance performances by students of Pabyuik Secondary School and local residents.

The Chief Minister stated that such tourist festivals should not be confined to entertainment for the people of the area but it should be taken as an opportunity. The younger generation of the area should be inspired by such events and utilize it to the optimum, he added.

He further assured that the demands of Pabyuik Naitam will be addressed in public interest to promote agro based

industries in the locality.

On the occasion, the CM announced that Rs 2 Lakh will be given to the organizing committee of the festival as aid from the government and also a sum of Rs 10,000 each for all the cultural programmes presented today.

Earlier the inaugural function began with welcome note by SDF spokesperson, KT Gyaltsen where he expressed his heartfelt gratitude towards the Chief Minister for attending the function as chief guest and also for providing so many

Nearly 1,000 flights to be hit by airspace closure for R Day

NEW DELHI, JAN 6 (PTI): Nearly 1,000 flights to and from Indira Gandhi International (IGI) will be cancelled or rescheduled in the run-up to Republic Day parade as airspace over Delhi will remain closed for about two hours every day for over a week.

An estimated 500 domestic flights could be cancelled and as many international flights will be rescheduled due to the restrictions, an airport official said, adding it was being done due to in-

creased traffic and capacity constraints this year.

The airspace over Delhi remains shut for commercial flights due to rehearsals in the days leading to the Republic Day on January 26.

The Airport Authority of India (AAI) has issued a NOTAM or Notice to Airmen informing the airlines that no take-offs or landings would be allowed from or to Delhi airport from 10.35 am to 12.15 pm for nine days between January 18-26, according to

airport sources.

IGI witnesses 67 air traffic movement (both take offs and landings) per hour between 8 am to 11 pm everyday. With airspace shut for 100 minutes for nine days, an estimated 1,000 flights will either be cancelled or rescheduled.

"On an average 100 flights will be affected every day. We will accommodate 40 international flights before or after the closure hours.

"Out of the remaining 60, we will try to reschedule

some of the flights. So, we could see roughly 50 flights being cancelled each day," said an airport official.

The Delhi International Airport Limited, which operates IGI, says no international flights will be cancelled.

"Keeping in consideration the capacity constraints and to minimise inconvenience to the passengers, Airports Authority of India-Air Navigation Services, several major airlines and DIAL have consulted on various options and jointly

agreed that the best and safest course of action is to cancel domestic flights scheduled during the NOTAM period.

"International carriers have been requested to re-schedule and not cancel their flights," said a DIAL spokesperson.

Airport officials say that while on earlier occasions they were able to reschedule most of the affected flights, severe capacity constraints at IGI mean that it can't be done anymore.

"Since we had spare ca-

capacity we were able to accommodate flights either before or after the closure hours. But because we don't have any spare capacity now, these flights have to be cancelled," said a source.

Also, the airspace closure has been extended by two days, as a result the restrictions are in place for nine days instead of seven days.

The airlines were asked to curtail operations for R-day on December 29, when the NOTAM was issued.

recorded a low of minus 15.6 degrees Celsius while a few areas in the higher reaches of Kashmir Valley received fresh snowfall.

There was light snowfall in Gulmarg, Pahalgam and few other areas in the higher reaches of Kashmir last night.

Srinagar recorded a minimum temperature of minus 1.2 degrees Celsius while Gulmarg recorded a low of minus 9.4 degrees Celsius.

Kashmir is currently under the grip of 'Chillai-Kalan', the 40-day harshest winter period in Kashmir, when the chances of snowfall are maximum and the temperature drops considerably.

In high-altitude areas of the Himachal Pradesh, the mercury stayed between minus 15 and minus 22 degrees Celsius while lakes, springs and rivulets there have frozen.

In Haryana, Ambala braved bone-chilling weather at 5.6 degrees Celsius while Hisar registered a low of 2.6 degrees Celsius, four notches below normal.

Chandigarh airport recorded the lowest minimum temperature of 1.8 degrees Celsius, followed by Bathinda in Punjab which shivered at 1.9 degrees Celsius.

Adampur in Jalandhar district, Pathankot and Halwara recorded minimum temperatures of 2.3 degrees Celsius, 4 degrees Celsius and 4.3 degrees Celsius respectively.

Uttar Pradesh witnessed dense to very dense fog at many places as cold wave swept some parts of the state, with Fursatganj in Rae Bareilly recording the lowest minimum temperature of 2.6 degrees Celsius.

Cold wave conditions prevailed in northern parts of Rajasthan with Sriganganagar being the coldest recorded place at 1.9 degrees Celsius while dense to very dense fog occurred at isolated parts of the state.

Bikaner, Dabok, Jaisalmer and Jodhpur recorded minimum temperatures of 4.6 degrees Celsius, 6.5 degrees Celsius, 7.2 degrees Celsius and 7.9 degrees Celsius respectively.

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Departmental team visits ITI site in North Sikkim

MANGAN, 06 JAN [IPR]: A team comprising of Secretary, Skill Development and Entrepreneurship Department, TW Khansarpa, District Collector [North], Karma R Bonpo, Senior Engineer [Power Department, Mangan], Joint Director [Skill Development and Entrepreneurship Department] visited the construction site of the upcoming Industrial Training Institute at Chadey in North Sikkim today.

ITI, Chadey is one of the five ITIs in Sikkim and will be the first in North Sikkim. The construction of the ITI is being undertaken by the Energy and Power Department and is funded by National Hydro Electric Power Corporation Limited [NHPC] Stage V Power Project. The ITI once completed will function under the Skill Development and Entrepreneurship Department.

The Secretary informed that the department will start the process of accreditation of the ITI with the National Accreditation Board for Education and Training (NABET) and directed the District Administration and Power Department to submit the required documents. Once accredited the ITI will provide training in four trades based on the demands of the District. He also stated that there is huge shortage of trained manpower in the country and local youth trained in the ITI will be able to get jobs in various industries.

The team also inspected the Teesta Urja Industrial Training Centre which was found suitable to be converted into a livelihood school. Once converted the livelihood schools will be able to provide capacity building training in various fields such as hosiery, tourism management, hospitality.

A press release informs that 66 farmers from Khop, Perbing Tangzi, Tek, Manghim, Rabikhola and Namthang attended the program.

Deputy Director [Food Security & Agriculture Development Department], Dr Pratap Subba who was the resource person of the programme detailed the farmers about ongoing



crop insurance scheme for rabi crops and urged them to harness maximum benefits of Crop Insurance Scheme.

Horticulture Inspector, Purnima Theengh informed the gathered farmers about the current schemes of the depart-

ment and encouraged the farmers to cultivate vegetables on large scale for sustainable production.

Representative from IFFCO-TOKIO, Sarda Tamang informed the gathering about crops to be insured and amount of premium that has to be

paid by the farmers.

Subject Matter Specialist (Animal Science), KVK South Sikkim, Dr Chewang Norbu Bhutia informed the farmers about insurance facilities for livestock. He also briefed the farmers about National Bank for

Agriculture and Rural Development [NABARD] schemes for Scheduled Tribe farmers.

Twenty-two farmers instantly applied for crop insurance on potato and mustard at the end of the programme, reads the release.

Agri protest: Potatoes hurled at various places in Lucknow

LUCKNOW, JAN 6 (PTI): Potatoes were hurled from a truck at various prominent places here today in what is seen as a protest by farmers against low purchase price of the produce, even as the state government dismissed the incident as the work of "miscreants".

Lucknow District Magistrate Kaushal Raj Sharma told PTI, "There was a truck which had sacks of potato and it started throwing potatoes in various parts of the city early this morning."

"Now, whether this has been done by the farmers or by someone else is yet to be ascertained. So far, no farmers' group has claimed any responsibility for this act."

He added that the "potatoes were thrown on Vidhan Sabha Marg, near VVIP guest house and near the 1090 Crossing. The roads were then cleaned by the Lucknow Municipal Corporation, soil was also put on the smashed potatoes so that motorcyclists and other two-wheeler riders do not skid off the road. Fire brigade was also roped in to get some roads adjoining the Vidhan Bhawan building washed, so that the road does not become slippery."

"This seems to be the work of anti-social ele-

ments. It is not very clear whether this is a work of farmers or any farmer organisation...We are probing all possible angles..." Sharma added.

When contacted, a state government spokesman said, "This was not done by farmers, but by miscreants."

Meanwhile, the Rashtriya Kisan Manch has slammed the state government over the incident.

The group's President Shekhar Dixit said, "There is difference in the words and actions of the government. I am not pointing fingers at the Narendra Modi government or Yogi Adityanath government. But this has been the situation even during the regime of SP and BSP."

"Today it is the potato farmers who have thrown potatoes on the streets of Lucknow, tomorrow it may be the sugarcane farmers, the wheat and paddy farmers...if the situation does not improve," he added.

Speaking to reporters, Uttar Pradesh Agriculture Minister Surya Pratap Shahi said, "This was a pre-planned act, as the potato which was thrown on the streets of Lucknow was partly or completely rotten, and rejected in the mandi (market)."

KALIMPONG, 06 JAN:

Kalimpong has seen a dip in the maximum and minimum temperatures by almost 3 degree Celsius in the past few days. Today the maximum temperature recorded was 13 degree Celsius at 11 a.m and the minimum was 07 degree Celsius this morning at 6.23 a.m. On Friday, the minimum degree was 7.8 Celsius. The icy cold winds in the afternoon and evening have forced people to stay indoors or huddle around a fire.

Snowfall in the higher reaches of Sikkim has caused piercing cold wave conditions in Kalimpong also. The late evening temperature in Kalimpong has been hanging in between 8 to 9 degree Celsius but because of the wind chill factor it feels like 5 degree Celsius. Kalimpong weather in December was very good with maximum hitting 18 and minimum 10 degree Celsius.

The sudden dip in mercury has also meant that many people are heading towards the plains to their winter homes or relatives.

LTVC wants at par to BL protections and rights for Limboos

GANGTOK, 06 JAN:

The Limboo Tamang Voluntary Committee (LTVC) today demanded indigenous primitive status for Limboos of the State at par with the Lepchas of Sikkim.

Addressing a press conference here at the Press Club of Sikkim, LTVC members also sought amendment of Revenue Order No. 1 to include land belonging to Limboos having Sikkim Subject Certificates for protection against alienation to other communities and allow sale and purchase of land between Bhutia, Lepcha and Limboo.

The organisation is also seeking reserved constituencies in the State Legislative Assembly and has demanded that these seats be reserved as Tsong seats exclusively for Limboo candidates possessing SSCs or COIs.

Similarly, seats should also be reserved exclusively for Tamangs

by virtue of their also having become Scheduled Tribes.

The organisation has also demanded the withdrawal of the Burman Commission Report.

It has also taken issue with the recent job advertisement of the State Government which required candidates to have "knowledge of any of the State languages viz. Nepali, Bhutia and Lepcha". No mention of Limboo language in this notification has upset the group.

While demanding that the State government set up an Inquiry committee to look into the delay in completion of the Mahatma Sirijunga Statue Project in West Sikkim, LTVC is also seeking that the practise of sending BL candidates to the Rajya Sabha from Sikkim be reconsidered and capable persons from any community of Sikkimese origin be sent to the Rajya Sabha.

UP govt blames contractor for saffron on Haj office wall

LUCKNOW, JAN 6 (PTI): Facing flak for giving a bright saffron coat of paint to the boundary wall of the UP Haj Committee office here, the BJP-led state government today went into damage control mode and admitted "laxity" on part of the contractor tasked with the job.

"Secretary of the UP Haj Committee R P Singh has taken immediate cognisance of the matter, and issued directives for its rectification," a statement issued by the government said.

Singh said, "There was laxity by the contractor in the painting and maintenance work of the UP Haj Committee office.

On inspecting the boundary wall of

the office, it was found that there has been laxity, and a dark shade of paint has been used contrary to the instructions issued".

"Further painting of the boundary wall has been stopped, and instructions have been issued to officials that painting and maintenance of the boundary wall should be done as per directives," he said.

He also ordered action be initiated against the erring contractor.

The boundary wall of the Uttar Pradesh Haj office, opposite the state legislature building in the heart of the capital had been given a saffron look overnight, days after the secretariat building facade was given the same coat.

World Book Fair begins with call for climate change awareness

NEW DELHI, JAN 6 (PTI): Themed around 'Environment and Climate Change', the 26th New Delhi World Book Fair opened here today with a call for increased awareness and efforts to protect the environment.

The 9-day annual event was inaugurated by environmentalist Sunita Narain, European Union ambassador to India Tomasz Kozlowski, National Book Trust chairman Baldev Bhai Sharma and Madhu Ranjan Kumar, Joint Secy- Minister of Human Resource Development.

Addressing the visitors through a video conference, HRD minister Prakash Javadekar said that climate change awareness is important as humans have exploited earth beyond limits.

"We have taken more from the earth than it could offer.

It is about time we realised the importance of awareness, and it won't be possible without col-

lective efforts by not wasting electricity, water; by taking bicycle to travel or by walking more instead of using petrol and diesel-run vehicles," the minister said.

Author-environmentalist Sunita Narain also spoke strongly about the effects of climate change and the need for awareness calling it the "biggest threat faced by the poorest of the poor".

"The western world is talking and negotiating about environment change, they are holding meetings while here in India we are witnessing climate change with extreme cold, extreme drought and extreme rains.

"It is no more an upcoming event, climate change is here.

And the worst affected are the poorest people, the farmers, the marginalised. We don't need to be told about climate change, we are living it," she said.

The book fair has a dedicated theme pavillion in Hall 7 E with

books in English, Hindi and other Indian languages on environment-related issues like climate change, global warming, water and air pollution.

Kozlowski also emphasised the role of books in spreading awareness about climate change.

"The most important aspect of a book fair is the participation for general public, and with the event's theme of environment and climate change we hope to spread the message to as many people as possible.

"The fair has a very high reputation of creating awareness and bringing change in the society. It is a medium to develop cultural ties between India and the European countries," the ambassador said.

Over 20 European Union countries will participate with a delegation of publishers, editors and authors. The EU pavil-

ion will also showcase some of the latest publications in English and other European languages along with panel discussions, talks, photo exhibits and cultural performances.

Apart from the EU nations, more than 40 countries including Canada, China, Egypt, Pakistan and United Kingdom will participate in the book fair.

In authors corner, visitors can get to interact with some of the well-known writers like Ruskin Bond, Jerry Pinto, Michael Creighton, Paro Anand, Mridula Garg and Ranjit Lal among others.

The author interactions will be held at five Authors Corners in Reflections (Hall 11), Conversations (Hangar over lake), International Events Corner (Hall 7A), Lekhak Manch (Hall 12-12A), and Sahitya Manch (Hall 8).

In the Season of Fires

Preparedness is still the best approach

Winter's upon us and as the mercury plunges, the need for artificial heating goes up. Yes, in Sikkim, the chill has not set in to the scale that the norths of America and rest of India are shivering through, but it is only a matter of a few days or weeks before it gets really cold. With the winter months also being the only "dry" season in the State, the danger of fires goes up. And this winter has been unseasonably dry. Sikkim has already suffered one big (Bhaley Dhunga) and some smaller forest and bush fires this season and some kutcha homes have also been consumed by unattended fires and/ or short-circuits which have flamed out of control. If recent records are anything to go by, it is only a matter of time before reports of bush fires searing through Sikkim forests start making more headlines.

So much for the predictable part, now, if the concerned agencies and the lay citizenry would stand up and speak on how they intend to keep things safe in the coming months. Sikkim loses wooden structures to fires every winter and more hectares of forest undergrowth than is perhaps healthy, and yet it keeps exclusively busy dousing flames in the first quarter of every year. This is obviously because not enough initiative is taken to crackle some awareness which would help things be otherwise. This would require only very simple initiatives like better vigilance around the trouble-spots, some sensitisation programmes and imparting at least some basic fire-fighting skills at the grassroots level [no pun intended] since it is invariably resident people who notice forest fires first. Simple things like safer alternatives to heating, or at least more responsible methods need to be reiterated. Improperly ventilated rooms for coal fires are a definite no-no given the fatal toxicity of Carbon Mono-oxide that coal gives off when lit in closed rooms. Unattended heaters do not only trip the neighbourhood transformers, but can also spark an inferno when kept close to the inflammable woollens [the blankets included]. These appear to be obvious dangers that everyone is aware of, but need recounting because too many incidents in the past bear testimony to the fact that one can get dangerously careless at times.

What winters also do is expose the inferior electrical wiring that many people have opted for in Sikkim. Short-circuits have triggered many a fire in Sikkim and these are mostly thanks to either inferior wiring or improper connections, both, result when builders try to cut corners. What fires also expose is the unplanned manner in which urban areas have been laid out even in the capital. There are areas here which have to be reached through congested lanes which no fire tender can pass through or are situated in tight corners that no fire hose can negotiate. Given the fact that we know that many houses and many areas sit on potential tinderboxes, it is required of the Fire Department to identify these areas and then inform the residents there that they reside beyond the saving showers of the modern fire tenders. It would be nice if a plan of action on how to fight the fires in such "beyond reach" areas is drawn up, but if that is too much to ask for, a warning would have to suffice.

That done, sessions on how to avoid fires and, more importantly, how to fight it at their own level, with or without the help of trained firemen. We take too many things for granted and how to react to fires is perhaps one of them. Fact remains that most people don't know what to do first [except run] in case of a fire. Winters being a time for fires, the concerned Department should start coming out with public interest messages and community workshops on how to avoid fires, how to fight them and how to seek help in case of an emergency and how to stay safe through an emergency. As for the people, we have to bear in mind that as most banes of modern living, precaution remains the best cure even against fires.

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Unliked: How Facebook is playing a part in the Rohingya genocide

New technology can have profound impacts on society in ways never intended.

The radio carried codes during the First World War, but later became a household fixture. Early telephones were leased in pairs but after Western Union, a telegraph company, adopted "exchanges," it led to rapid long-distance communication. Likewise, mobile phones have evolved from bulky "walkie-talkies" to small supercomputers.

And now Facebook, originally a connection platform for university students, conjoins one in four people. But today, in Myanmar, Facebook is helping fuel a genocide against the Rohingya people.

Based on our research in Myanmar and in Cuba, we argue that internet usage in Myanmar is dangerous. Unbridled connection to Facebook creates what we call a "virtual coercive," a digital space that bolsters coercion. We suggest that Cuba's internet model may provide lessons to manage social media amid political chaos.

The utility of inventions can be unpredictable, and so too can the social impacts be catastrophic.

Distracted driving is an unforeseen consequence of mobile phones that kills or maims thousands each year. Dealing with distracted driving involves better driver education, curbing usage behind the wheel and penalties for stupidity.

Radio enabled unimaginable horrors during the 1994 genocide in Rwanda.

'BLOOD ON HANDS'

But in conditions of genocide, can a technology like radio be limited or restricted? It's an essential service, but with blood on its hands. That's a burden Facebook now shares.

In 2010, Myanmar had 130,000 heavily restricted internet users. In seven years, SIM card prices plunged from more than US\$3,000 to \$1. The government also relaxed censorship laws, allowing Facebook to attract 30 million Burmese users. Many of them view Facebook as the internet.

Beginning in late August, Burmese security forces pursued a scorched-

earth campaign against the Rohingya. Some 6,700 were killed and 645,000 were forced to seek refuge in Bangladesh.

Along with ultra-nationalist monk Ashin Wirathu, a host of Facebook pages spread hate speech. This vitriolic propaganda further vilifies the already marginalized and much-maligned Rohingya.

Anti-Rohingya content includes explicitly racist political cartoons, falsified images and staged news reports. This content goes viral, normalizing hate speech and shaping public perception. Violence against Rohingya people is increasingly welcomed, and then celebrated online. This virtual coercive serves the Myanmar military's interests.

The military junta's monopoly on information has provided little arena to foster media literacy. Such propaganda in this virtual coercive of anti-Rohingya propaganda preys upon the ill-in-



formed. For many, the misinformation spread through Facebook justifies what the United Nations has dubbed a textbook example of ethnic cleansing.

Myanmar citizens now have unbridled access to low-cost internet on their mobile devices. Freedom of speech advocates will laud this. But this open information pipeline reinforces Facebook's dark side of self-reaffirmation with limited perspective.

This is to the Burmese military's advantage. Just as radio fuelled genocide in the 1990s, Facebook is making it happen in Myanmar today.

FICTION BECOMES REALITY

Facebook's virtual coercive is one of division, competing realities and a lack of mutual acceptance. In Facebook's virtual coercive, fiction is reality and lies can validate.

Considering this, we argue that constant Facebook use in Myanmar is too risky to ignore. Societies require spaces

for tolerance of differing ideas, trade, negotiation, volunteerism and face-to-face dynamics. This is lacking in Myanmar.

Cuba may be an important example in this discussion.

The nature of internet access in Cuba has not led to the abusive coercion or divisive politics. Protests through social media that are common in other parts of the world do not exist in Cuba.

Why?

Internet in Cuba is, simply put, expensive. Spending US\$3 for an hour of WiFi in internet parks is about 10 per cent of a Cuban's monthly earnings. With only limited time to be online, Facebook's bandwidth-clogging bulk makes it unpopular in Cuba. Instead, other SMS and chat apps such as IMO, a direct video chat service, is preferred.

CUBANS ACCESS INTERNET IN SMALL DOSES

Cuba has only limited capacity to monitor its internet traffic, and the government worries about unbridled access.

And so Facebook cannot be accessed during working hours in most government and university settings in Cuba. It creates a disincentive to rely on Facebook for news and connections.

Cubans surf the net in small doses and often in public spaces. This

breaks the virtual coercive through face-to-face interactions.

The shortcomings of Cuba's model are obvious given it creates a barrier to information. Free-speech advocates will be quick to dismiss the idea of limiting the time spent online, never mind the dangers of a state having the responsibility to curtail social media.

But is unbridled access to Facebook really a pillar of free speech if the platform can be harnessed for the purpose of eliminating an entire population?

It's time to entertain disconnecting from the virtual coercive in order to engage in real space. Maybe in this way, Facebook's dark side can be kept at bay while still serving its original purpose of connecting people and enriching, not destroying, lives.

How Indigenous knowledge advances modern science and technology

Throughout history, Indigenous peoples have been responsible for the development of many technologies and have substantially contributed to science.

Science is the pursuit of knowledge. Approaches to gathering that knowledge are culturally relative. Indigenous science incorporates traditional knowledge and Indigenous perspectives, while non-Indigenous scientific approaches are commonly recognized as Western science. Together, they contribute substantially to modern science.

Although the value of integrating Indigenous science with Western science has been recognized, we have only begun to scratch the surface of its benefits.

Indigenous perspectives are holistic and founded upon interconnectedness, reciprocity and the utmost respect for nature. Both Western and Indigenous science approaches and perspectives have their strengths and can greatly complement one another.

As an Indigenous scientist who specializes in combining traditional ecological knowledge with wildlife ecology research, I have come across many examples where blending both approaches has resulted in excellent contributions to modern science.

ROOTS OF FOOD AND MEDICINE

For centuries, Indigenous people's lives depended on their knowledge about the environment. Many plant species — including three-fifths of the crops now in cultivation and enjoyed across the globe — were domesticated by Indigenous peoples in North, Central and South America. Corn, squash, beans, potatoes and peppers are just a few examples of foods that now contribute vastly to global cuisine!

Indigenous knowledge about the me-

dicinal properties of plants has been instrumental in pharmacological development. For example, as settlers arrived in North America, Indigenous people helped newcomers cure life-threatening scurvy through conifer-needle tonics that were rich in vitamin C.

The active ingredient in the pain reliever Aspirin, acetylsalicylic acid, was first discovered by Indigenous people who utilized the bark of the willow tree. Medicinal plant properties are still being recognized to this day — especially in tropical ecosystems — as Indigenous people share their knowledge.

TECHNOLOGY TO TEK

Technological innovations such as the canoe, kayak, toboggan or snowshoe aided in travel and transport and were quickly adapted by European settlers.

Indigenous peoples, with their decades of personal experience combined with that of their ancestors, harbour vast knowledge about the environment and the ecological relationships within them. Tremendous opportunities exist where such knowledge can contribute to modern science and natural resource management.

Indigenous knowledge, also known as Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK), is essentially the cumulative body of knowledge associated with ecological relationships, which is handed down through generations by Indigenous people.

TEK has already provided insight into environmental change, wildlife population monitoring, sustainable harvesting practices, behavioural ecology, ecological relationships and so much more.

Inuit observations have identified several important environmental changes in the Arctic as a result of climate change, and their knowledge about bowhead whale behaviour helped researchers revise their survey methods to improve population size estimates.

Elders of the Heiltsuk First Nation in B.C. recognized two types of wolves — coastal and inland — previously undocumented by Western scientific methods. With such proven value in only a few examples, imagine how TEK can further inform science!

TEK continues to complement Western science. In light of recent moose population decline across North America, my own research aims to incorporate Indigenous knowledge to help identify factors that may be responsible for this decline.

INDIGENOUS EDUCATION IS ESSENTIAL

Despite the recognized value of Indigenous perspectives and knowledge, there are few Indigenous science scholars. Scholars with specialization in Indigenous science can provide mentorship as well as become role models for current and prospective Indigenous science students.

By encouraging Indigenous science scholar recruitment, forthcoming research incorporating Indigenous perspectives can pave the way to promote culturally inclusive scientific approaches.

Many wildlife species are at risk across the planet, and engaging in co-operative management initiatives that embrace Indigenous science are now more important than ever. Collaborations are becoming more and more common. For example, the Canadian government incorporates TEK in assessing species at risk. The World-wide Indigenous Science Network (WISN) restores TEK dialogue to the world's most pressing ecological issues.

Throughout history, Indigenous people, perspectives, and knowledge have contributed substantially to the development of science and technology and will surely continue to do so for generations to come!

Listen up! How to get your message across in just 60 seconds

Do you have something important to say, but find it hard to get people's attention?

Or have you tried to listen to someone who claims to have something interesting to impart, but they can't explain it and the idea gets lost? (Or worse, you get bored and lose interest, even if they're trying to describe their revolutionary new laser shark).

Some people are natural communicators; others ... aren't.

It's a problem many academics face, particularly with the push we're all getting to explain our work to the public.

But there are a few tricks you can use that can help you to better communicate your ideas.

SO WHAT DO YOU DO?

The old academic axiom of "publish or perish" – to get as many articles as possible published in peer-reviewed academic journals – has changed.

Academics are still expected to publish and share their work with the world, but now the emphasis is not just on publications in academic journals squirrelled behind paywalls. And rightly so – knowledge should be shared with all.

But the range of information available means that people have access to so many more ideas and opinions than before. This is both a blessing and a curse, as the amount of information can sometimes cause unnecessary confusion or contention.

With so much information out there, how can researchers effectively reach their intended audience? How can they engage them in meaningful dialogue?

DONE IN 60 SECONDS

There are a few simple steps that anyone can use to get a conversation happening in the right way.

Conversation is a key word. It means an exchange between two people – not a ten-minute monologue in response to the polite question of "so, what do you do?"

Imagine this. You have just met someone at a social gathering (work-related or not) and you have a feeling that they are someone you could benefit from getting to know better. You have 60 seconds to make the most of this chance.

WHAT DO YOU DO?

Here are some suggested starting points. It doesn't have to be perfect! Make do with what you have, wherever you are, distractions or otherwise (we filmed our attempt during some renovations on campus).

We've just taken 60 seconds to explore how you can best use your window of opportunity. Now it's over to you to see what you can do.

Lalu gets 3 yrs, 6 mths in jail, fined Rs 10 L in fodder scam case

RANCHI, JAN 6 (PTI): A special CBI court today sentenced RJD chief Lalu Prasad to three-and-a-half years in jail and imposed a fine of Rs 10 lakh on him in a fodder scam case relating to fraudulent withdrawal of Rs 89.27 lakh from the Deoghar Treasury 21 years ago.

The punishment was handed down to 69-year-old Prasad by CBI court judge Shiv Pal Singh. This is the second time that he has been jailed in the fodder scam.

The judge also imposed a fine totalling Rs 10 lakhs on him.

He was sentenced to three-and-a-half years in jail in a fodder scam case for offences of cheating, along with criminal conspiracy, and other sections under the Indian Penal Code (IPC).



Prasad was also given a jail term of three years and six months in the case under the Prevention of Corruption Act (PCA).

He was fined Rs 5 lakh each under the IPC and the PCA, CBI counsel Rakesh Prasad said, adding that failure to pay the fine would entail another six months in jail.

The sentences will run concurrently, he said.

Prasad, who was convicted in the second case on December 23, is at present lodged in the Birsa Munda Central Jail.

The judge conveyed the punishment to Prasad through videoconferencing.

The court had yesterday concluded arguments on the quantum of sentence against Prasad in connection with the withdrawal of Rs 89.27 lakh from the Deoghar Treasury between 1990 and 1994 when he was the chief minister of Bihar.

It had also heard arguments on the issue of punishment for 10 others convicted in the case.

Earlier today, the court concluded arguments on the quantum of sentence against five

other convicts.

Prasad was given a prison term of five years on September 30, 2013, in another fodder scam case. He was released on bail by the Supreme Court after having remained in jail for over two-and-a-half months.

The CBI special judge had on December 23 acquitted former Bihar chief minister Jagannath Mishra and five others in the case.

In 1996, the Patna High Court had ordered an inquiry into the fodder scam cases and a charge sheet in the Deogarh Treasury case was filed against 38 people on October 27, 1997.

Eleven of them died and three turned approvers, while two other accused confessed and were convicted in 2006-

07, a CBI official said.

On September 30, 2013, Yadav, Jagannath Mishra and several others were convicted in another case pertaining to illegal withdrawal of Rs 37.7 crore from the Chaibasa Treasury in the early 1990s.

Prasad faces another three fodder scam cases for illegal withdrawal of Rs 3.97 crore from the Dumka Treasury, Rs 36 crore from the Chaibasa Treasury and Rs 184 crore from the Doranda Treasury.

Meanwhile, Prasad's son Tejashwi Yadav said in Patna that they will move high court against his father's conviction.

"We will move high court against Lalu Prasad's conviction and appeal for bail after studying the court verdict," he said.

Rapid Response Team to tackle cases of witch hunting in Odisha

BARIPADA (ODISHA), JAN 6 (PTI): Rapid Response Team (RRT) will be set up in Odisha's tribal dominated Mayurbhanj district to tackle cases of witch hunting, a top district official has said.

The district had witnessed 92 cases of witchcraft and sorcery related offences during last five years, District Collector Surendra Kumar Meena said.

To tackle the cases of witch hunting the Rapid Response Team would work in block level, Meena said.

The process of formation of RRTs would be completed by January 15 and at least 26 RRTs would be set up with the Block Development Officer (BDO) as head, the

collector said.

The RRTs will comprise child development programme officer, medical officer, block education officer, welfare extension officer, inspector in charge of police station, Nehru Yuva Kendra volunteer, one office bearer of block level federation of self help groups, he said.

The children, women and elderly persons were mostly victims of the witchcraft practice.

The teams would take steps to prevent any such types of incidents in remote tribal villages and for minimising offences in collaboration with local police and other agencies besides making awareness activities.

Drugs worth Rs 3 cr seized in Manipur

IMPHAL, JAN 6 (PTI): In a major haul, police today seized WY drugs, worth Rs 3 crore in the international market, in Imphal West district of Manipur.

Acting on inputs from a reliable source, a mini truck was intercepted near NG College Gate in Imphal West by a team of police officers, Additional SP L Priyadarshini said.

The truck, loaded with sandbags, had come from the India-Myanmar border town of Moreh.

"When the officers searched the truck, they found WY drug packets tucked between sandbags," Priyadarshini said. Driver N Ranjit has been taken into custody, the senior police officer said.

World's Yours (WY) contains a mixture of methamphetamine and caffeine. It is typically produced in a round pill form.

Banned outfit's hideout busted in Arunachal Pradesh

ITANAGAR, JAN 6 (PTI): Security forces in Arunachal Pradesh have destroyed a temporary hideout of the banned United Liberation Front of Asom (Independent) in Changlang district.

Based on specific intelligence inputs, the Jairampur Battalion of the Assam Rifles, under the aegis of DAO Division, conducted an operation near Namdapha reserve forest yesterday and busted the hideout, Defence spokesman Col Chiranjit Konwer said.

The action is part of the security forces' ongoing crackdown on insurgent activities in the run up to Republic Day.

There was information about the presence of cadres of the outfit trying to terrorise people through extortion bids at Miao town, the spokesman said.

Security personnel recovered extortion notes, opium and other documents from the hideout, Konwer said, adding, the cadres had been using the hideout as place of transit.

Aizawl stand in way as Mohun Bagan eye revival

KOLKATA, JAN 6 (PTI): Mohun Bagan will seek a revival of fortunes under new coach Shankarlal Chakraborty when they face reigning champions Aizawl FC in an I-League fixture at the Salt Lake Stadium here tomorrow.

Having kicked off their campaign in style that included a 1-0 win over bitter foes East Bengal in the Kolkata derby, Mohun Bagan's title aspiration has dwindled as they slipped to fifth place

in the table after seven matches.

Mohun Bagan last won against Churchill Brothers on December 10 and dropped points for three consecutive matches before suffering their first-ever home defeat.

The Mariners succumbed to a 1-2 defeat to a 10-man Chennai City FC, their first defeat of the season that came at their home ground, and moments later their 2014-15 I-League win-

ning coach Sanjoy Sen stepped down.

Sen's understudy, Chakraborty, was elevated to the chief coach's position and his first priority would be to help the players regain self-confidence.

"Keeping in mind Mohun Bagan's support base, when the team suffers back-to-back setbacks, more than technical you need to bring back the self-confidence of the players. And that's

my priority at this point of time," Chakraborty said after taking over.

The key to success will be the recovery of linchpin, Sony Norde, who missed Bagan's last two matches and consulted Dr Anant Joshi for his torn meniscus in right leg.

Their defence will be bolstered by a fit-again Arijit Bagui.

Both the teams are on 10 points but Mohun Bagan are just ahead of Aizawl FC on goal dif-

ference.

The northeast outfit is on a two-match winning run including the last one at Gokulam Kerala and they are expected to pose a big challenge to the hosts.

The champions look to have shaken off a rusty start to the season with two wins on the trot.

Paulo Meneses will no doubt see this game as an opportunity to get three vital points and continue their climb up the table.

Govt to set up FTII in Arunachal Pradesh

CHENNAI, JAN 6 (PTI): Arunachal Pradesh would get its first Film and Television Institute, being set up by the union government as part of tapping the potential of the North Eastern region, Union Minister Dr Jitendra Singh said today.

This would be the second such one in the country.

The first Film and Television Institute of India (FTII) was set up in Pune, an autonomous institute operating under the Information and Broadcasting Ministry.

"We are coming out with the

first ever film and television institute in Arunachal Pradesh after Pune", Singh, also Minister of State for Prime Minister's Office and Development of the North Eastern region, said.

This was part of tapping the potential of the North Eastern region, he said.

Singh said he learnt that only two film shootings had taken place in Arunachal Pradesh in the last few decades as the requisite infrastructure for film shootings and storing the equipment was not there in that state.

He said the south Indian film industry could take the lead in giving a fillip to the FTII there by shooting films in that state.

The film industry in the south, he recalled, had taken the lead in the early decades after Independence.

"We did not have Bollywood or Tollywood at that time. We had (famous film studios) AVM, Gemini, L V Prasad dominating Bombay. All our leading film actors and actresses were from from the South", he said.

Singh was speaking at a con-

ference 'Indian Entertainment Industry: Global Leader in Making' organised by Bharat Niti and South India Film Chamber of Commerce.

Singh, who was part of BJP's election campaign during the recent Gujarat polls which the party won, said political parties outsource 'drama companies' to reach the target audience through an optimum blend of social message and entertainment.

"Because entertainment without social message would be a hollow entertainment", he said.

Fears of imminent economic slowdown have come true: Chidambaram

NEW DELHI, JAN 6 (PTI): Senior Congress leader P Chidambaram today hit out at the government over lower growth estimates for the current fiscal, saying the worst fears of an imminent economic slowdown have come true.

There is a decline in new projects and fresh investment, Chidambaram claimed in a statement.

The informal sector is reeling under the ill effects of demonetisation. Job creation is abysmal, exports are plunging, and manufacturing sector growth has slowed down. The agriculture sector has been hit hard and rural despair is abundant, he claimed.

Job creation remained the "single biggest failure" of the BJP government. The bank credit growth was extremely sluggish and it did not bode well for the economy, he said.



"The worst fears of an imminent economic slowdown have come true. The Modi government's tall claims of India growing at a robust growth rate have evaporated in thin air.

"No amount of sugar coating, false bravado and rhetoric along with headlines management can conceal the stark reality. Our fears and warnings have proved true," the Congress leader said.

He said the recent social discontent could be a "direct manifestation of this economic slowdown, which the government was conveniently hiding".

It was time the government stopped making tall claims and did some solid work, he said.

Citing government data, the former finance minister said the GDP growth rate was 8 per cent in 2015-16, 7.1 per cent in 2016-

17. It is estimated at 6.5 per cent in 2017-18, "which proves there is a slowdown".

A decline in economic activity and growth meant loss of millions of jobs, he said.

While the GDP growth is estimated at 6.5 per cent during 2017-18 as compared to 7.1 per cent in 2016-17, the anticipated growth of real GVA at basic prices in 2017-18 is 6.1 per cent as against 6.6 per cent in 2016-17, he said.

Retail inflation soared to a 15-month high of 4.88 per cent in November and industrial output hit a three-month low of 2.2 per cent in October, he pointed out.

"The investment picture remains bleak... The manufacturing sector has seen the sharpest fall and fiscal deficit is likely to overshoot the budget estimates of 3.2 per cent of GDP," the Congress leader said.

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Coal scam: ED attaches 348 acre land in Madhya Pradesh

NEW DELHI, JAN 6 (PTI): The Enforcement Directorate (ED) today said it has attached over 348 acres of land in Madhya Pradesh, valued at about Rs 4.53 crore, in connection with its money laundering probe in the coal blocks allocation scam.

A provisional order for attachment of the land in Narsinghpur district of the central Indian state has been issued by the agency under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

The land belongs to Ms BLA Industries Private Limited, it said.

The ED had registered a criminal case of money laundering against the firm, its managing director Anup Agarwal and unknown public servants, based on a CBI FIR, a few years back.

The agency, in a statement, said proceeds of the crime generated in this case were from illegal mining, and new share capital creation which was "layered through various bank accounts and finally integrated in

the form of purchase of immovable properties" like the 348.34 acre land in Madhya Pradesh, has now been attached.

The land in question has been valued at over Rs 4.53 crore, the agency said.

"It was alleged (in the Gotitoria East and Gotitoria West coal blocks located in Mohapani coal field of Narsinghpur district were allocated for captive use in power plant.

"The plant was not set up and the condition of captive use of coal was altered by public servants allowing Ms BLA Industries Private Limited to sell coal, thus giving undue favour to the company," the ED alleged.

An attachment order under the PMLA is aimed at depriving the accused from taking benefits of their alleged ill-gotten wealth, the agency said, adding such an order can be appealed by the affected party before the Adjudicating Authority of the Act in 180 days time.

India is a land of opportunity, says Man-City CEO



JAMSHEDPUR, JAN 6 (PTI): Manchester City FC CEO Ferran Soriano has termed India as a "land of opportunity" and remains keen to tap into the growing football market in India.

Soriano, who is also the CEO for City Football Group that owns six football clubs across continents, witnessed the live action in the Hero Indian Super League during Jamshedpur FC's home encounter against Mumbai City FC yesterday.

Sounding optimistic on the rapid development of Indian football and the growth of India as a football market, the 50-year-old Spanish CEO said he is "very positive on Indian football."

"We think India is a major opportunity for football because there is talent and passion and we are very positive about the development of football in the country."

"That is why we are here. We want to watch some ISL games, meet people and want to see players," said Soriano whose company owns clubs like MLS New York City FC, A League's Melbourne City and Premier Leagues Manchester City FC.

Invited by Tata Steel, owners of Jamshedpur FC, Soriano was impressed with the atmosphere at the JRD Tata Stadium here.

"This is spectacular. Atmosphere is great and we saw some very good football. I am very impressed."

"I think this is a land of opportunity. There is enough evidence that India has talent and they can be coached to get to the top. For Indian talent to grow, coaching is very important. You need good coaches to come to India who can also coach other coaches here," he added.

Mourinho hits back at Conte, raises match-fixing scandal

MANCHESTER, JAN 6 (AFP): Jose Mourinho intensified his war of words with Chelsea manager Antonio Conte in bizarre fashion after his team's FA Cup victory over Derby yesterday, apparently referencing a match-fixing scandal in Italy.

The Manchester United manager was responding to comments made by Conte earlier in the day in which he appeared to make disparaging statements about Mourinho.

The Italian was even interpreted as suggesting that the United manager may be suffering from "dementia" after Mourinho had made a reference, 24 hours earlier, to his own behaviour and the fact that he no longer acts "like a clown".

Initially, Mourinho appeared to be backing Conte following the furore caused by his words on Thursday -- only then to make the reference to match-fixing.

"I was asked about my passion and, you know, I was speaking about myself and then the question to the Chelsea manager was that I said he behaved like a clown," said Mourinho.

"Probably the journalist wanted to say that but didn't have the courage so he said 'Mourinho said you behaved like a clown'."

"I don't blame the Chelsea manager at all and I understand his reaction. I was speaking about myself, saying I



don't need to behave like a clown to show passion."

Mourinho referred to his managerial antics earlier in his career and said he had not lost his passion.

"I celebrated goals running 50 metres, I celebrated goals sliding on my knees, celebrations jumping in the crowd. I'm not free of that, especially if we score a winning goal in a specific moment I am not free to have an out-of-control reaction."

"What I was trying to say that I behave bad a few times and this moment I control myself better. It doesn't mean my passion is not the same. So wrong question and obviously a strong answer and I don't blame."

The United boss -- no stranger to controversy -- then changed tack and referenced match-fixing.

"What has never happened to me and will never happen is to be suspended for match-fixing. That never happened to me and it will never happen."

MATCH-FIXING

The surprising reference to "match-fixing" drew a follow-up question as to whether it was directly aimed at Conte.

The Chelsea boss was acquitted of sporting fraud charges in 2016. Prosecutors had requested a six-month suspended sentence following accusations he failed to report episodes of match-fixing while in charge at Serie B side Siena in 2011.

The former Italy manager -- who has always denied any wrongdoing -- served a four-month ban in relation to the affair in 2012.

But when mention was made of the accusations against Conte, Mourinho said: "Did he? Not me."

Mourinho's reference to that controversy was just the latest twist in a verbal spat between the managers that seemed to have reached a climax earlier in the day when Conte was quizzed by reporters.

The most contentious of Conte's comments came when he used an Italian expression, "demenza senile" -- senile dementia.

"I think he (Mourinho) has to see himself in the past, maybe he was speaking about himself in the past, yeah?" said Conte.

"Maybe sometimes, someone forgets what they said or his behaviour and sometimes I think

there is, I don't know the name, 'demenza senile', when you are a bit..."

Conte tapped his temple as he spoke, and was asked to clarify his comment. "It is like amnesia, when you can't remember things," he said.

Chelsea later tried to distance Conte from claims he had suggested his rival has dementia, saying he simply meant amnesia.

Hosts Bengaluru eye to continue momentum, add to ATK's poor form

BENGALURU, JAN 6 (PTI): Having regained form with a convincing win in their last game, Bengaluru FC would look to continue the momentum when they lock horns with a struggling ATK in an Indian Super League (ISL) match here Sunday.

Bengaluru FC beat Kerala Blasters 3-1 win in their last outing.

The hosts are placed third on the standings with 15 points from five wins in eight games, while ATK are seventh with nine points following two wins.

Bengaluru coach Albert Roca would like to have a win before playing two games on the road against Delhi Dynamos and Mumbai City.

Roca would be hoping for some fireworks from

skipper Sunil Chhetri and the prolific Miku, who bulged the Blasters' net twice.

ATK would like to forget the 1-1 draw against FC Goa after a day-long ordeal of playing a delayed match, which finished well past midnight at the Salt Lake Stadium in Kolkata.

The Goan team had arrived at the airport after its chartered flight got delayed following a technical snag and later due to a crash of a fighter jet at Dabolim airport, which forced the runway to be closed.

After a poor start, the two-time defending champions sprung back into the reckoning with wins over Mumbai City and Delhi Dynamos.



Chennaiyin FC host struggling Delhi Dynamos

CHENNAI, JAN 6 (PTI): Chennaiyin FC take on a struggling Delhi Dynamos FC in an Indian Super League game at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium here Sunday, with a chance to top the standings.

The hosts, with five wins from eight matches, are second on the table with 16 points and a win would put them clearly in front of FC Pune.

A confident Chennaiyin are looking strong under new head coach John Gregory and have recovered well after a loss to FC Goa in the opening game.

The former champions will, however, miss Gregory's services, as he has been suspended for three matches owing to disciplinary reasons. Assistant coach Syed Sabir Pasha is set to step up in his absence.

Despite an inferior head-to-head record against the visiting team, the Chennai side will head into the match with confidence.

While CFC's perfor-



mance has looked up since the opening loss, Dynamos (on three points) have endured a forgettable campaign so far, winning only a game and losing their other six. The team has been solid at the back with the duo of Henrique Sereno and Mailson Alves doing a good job while Inigo Calderon and Jerry Lalrinzuala have lent stability to the defence.

Jeje Lalpekhlua has been in good nick upfront and has scored four goals so far. Delhi's defence will be tested by Jeje and the consistent Raphael Augusto.

Chennaiyin have scored 13 goals and conceded five while the Dynamos' tally is five scored and 19 conceded. The Delhi team's defence has been

ineffective, to say the least and will face a huge task against Jeje & Co.

Miguel Angel Portugal's Dynamos have lost six games on the trot and will need something special to change the trend against a solid opponent.

It will be the first game of the new year for Chennaiyin and the team will be keen to start with a victory.

In their last match at the Marina Arena, the visiting Kerala Blasters denied CFC a win thanks to a last-gasp strike by CK Vineeth.

The team management will be hoping the defence steps up to ensure there is no repeat of the Kerala encounter when the rivals cashed in on a lapse deep into extra-time. (Match starts at 8 p.m.)

Goa braces for beef shortage as traders suspend import from Karnataka

PANAJI, JAN 6 (PTI): Goa is staring at a beef shortage with traders suspending import of the meat from neighbouring Karnataka alleging harassment by cow vigilantes.

An association of traders said its members have stopped procuring beef from Belagavi in Karnataka.

This will continue till the state government takes steps to stop harassment by cow vigilante groups, it said.

"Harassment by these groups has increased in the state since Christmas.

Traders have now decided not to import beef as trucks ferrying the meat are being stopped and confiscated in the name of illegality," Manna Bepari, President, All Goa Qureshi Meat Traders Association, told PTI.

Due to this, the state now faces a beef shortage, he said.

Bepari said around 25 tonnes of beef is brought from Belagavi every day. "There is no production of beef in Goa as its lone state-run abattoir is no longer operational."

Cow protection

groups, including the Gau Raksha Abhiyaan, have alleged beef in Goa is brought from illegal slaughter houses in Karnataka, a charge denied by Bepari.

"We bring the stock from legal slaughter houses in Karnataka. If any group has any problem with those slaughter houses, they should go there and protest and not stop our trucks which cause losses of lakhs of rupees," he said.

Gau Raksha Abhiyaan leader Hanumant Parab claimed cattle were be-

ing slaughtered in abattoirs across the border without approval from authorities.

"Due to this we have undertaken stringent checks (on the Goa-Karnataka border) along with police," he said.

Bepari said traders want immediate intervention by the state government in the matter. Till then, they will not buy beef from the neighbouring state.

Beef sale has been banned in Maharashtra, which also borders Goa.

Not all dull and grey: Artists push boundaries with cement

When Mexican artist Cynthia Mijares Rodriguez first visited Jaipur, she was blown away by the intricacies of the 'jaali', a perforated stone or latticed screen historically used as a purdah for women.

But, the feminist in her refused to accept the regressive idea and the artist decided to give the architectural form a contemporary twist in the form of a chic clutch -- "the only bit of a woman that needs to be hidden", she says.

And, that is not all. Cynthia has made the clutch out of cement.

How she transformed the dull, grey, coarse raw material that is dumped in sacks at construction sites to build skyscrapers into a fashionable clutch, she refuses to reveal the recipe.



the potential cement has as a medium of art.

From table lamps and bookshelves to wine racks and comfortable stools, the artist has cemented her imagination in a never-seen-before manner.

She is joined by another Mexican artist -- Alan Saga and two Indian artists -- Iti Tyagi and Somesh Singh, who have redefined the functionality of cement beyond mind's eye.

Somesh, who has pushed all boundaries of creativity, with a laptop bag that folds and functions like any other rubber or a leather bag, says

the objective was to break the prevailing notion that cement is not beautiful.

"People think cement is rough, hard and brittle. They think it will break if it is used for any purpose other than construction. That is what we wanted to change."

He says he wanted to make cement attractive.

"My philosophy of design is if it is not serving a purpose, then it is not a design. Design is a function of art and absolute functionality," he adds.

His works include a fruit basket -- made out of cement

with a wooden finish, a snail lamp with a shell that appears to be plastic, a bar stool and several others.

One thing that runs common is all objects d'art is that they defy the conventional properties associated with cement -- its heavy weight, ruggedness, and rigidity.

Speaking of fluidity, Iti's centre-table is one of the finest examples of how cement is capable of falling like a drape. With a pair of leather boots visible from just beneath the hemline, it simply stands out in the lot.

"Cement expresses my personality. It looks very difficult, but it is pretty smooth to handle. You have to deal with it with a lot of care, lot of delicacy, lot of pampering and when you have done it right, it comes out beautifully," Iti says. A fan of all things mysterious, two of her stools are dedicated to her favourite detectives -- Sherlock Holmes

and John Watson.

A barbeque stool with a cushion -- that actually feels as soft as a cushion, a Dali clock inspired from the Spanish painter's iconic work -- "The Persistence of Memory", and an elegant glass set done in the traditional Japanese view of Wabi Sabi are among other art works in her collection.

Bringing the cultural flavour from his homeland is Alan, who is paying tribute to the folk dancers of Mexico with a pair of wall lamps.

Effortlessly cut-out in the shape of skirts, the lamps are fitted with lights underneath, similar to the outfits of the dancers, illuminating the entire wall behind. He says he turns to objects of historical relevance for inspiration.

A spice rack based on the Taj Mahal, a mirror inspired from the Greek mythological story of Medusa, and fruit tray replicating the Pyramids of Mexico find

place in his collection.

"Every product is not just beautiful, but a story in itself. I found the Taj Mahal very striking and India is known for its spices, so I decided to put the two together," he says.

Alan has also created stunning and elegant jewellery sets out of cement.

Taking inspiration from the logo of the 1968 Olympics held in Mexico, is a pendant, a ring and a pair of earrings.

Organised by Dalmia Bharat, the exhibition is the second in the Craft Beton series, with the latest collection showcasing 48 high-end luxury products -- ranging from lifestyle, jewellery to home accents and furniture.

The exhibition will next move to Mumbai and will be held at the Indian School of Design and Innovation from January 12-14, followed by a show at the Bikaner House in Delhi from January 29-31. [PTI]

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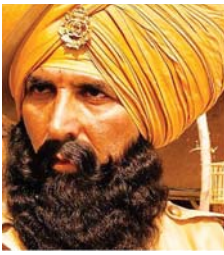
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Akshay Kumar dons a Turban again for his next - Kesari

"The creative for the first ad centers on the messages that 'the truth has power, the truth will not be threatened and the truth has a voice,' and draws upon The Times's acclaimed 'The Truth is Hard' campaign that debuted during the Academy Awards last year," the press release states.

Back in Oct. 2017, the New York Times published an exposé that shared allegations of sexual misconduct against Harvey Weinstein,
