#### Don't need to stand up in movie halls to prove patriotism: SC

NEW DELHI, OCT 23 (PTI): People do not need to stand up in cinema halls to prove their patriotism and "cannot be forced to carry patriotism on their sleeves", the Supreme Court said today, asking the Centre to consider amending the rules to regulate the playing of the national

anthem before a film.

The top court also observed that it cannot be assumed that if a person does not stand up for the national anthem, then he

is "less patriotic".

Observing that the society did not need "moral policing", a bench of Chief Justice Dipak Misra said the next time, "the government will want people to stop wearing T-shirts and shorts to cinemas saying this would disrespect the national anthem.

It said it will not allow the government to "shoot from its shoulder" and asked it to take a call either way on the issue of regulating the playing of the anthem before a film.

Malik was killed on October 13 at Tukvar forest and four other policemen were injured during the raid when the clash with Gurung's supporters had taken place.

Besides Gurung, 19 others named in the FIR were booked on charges including murder and arson, state police said.

Director General of Police Suraiit Kar Purkayastha had visited Darjeeling after the incident to monitor the situation.

Gurung has been in hiding since August after cases under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act were registered against him for his alleged involvement in several bomb blasts in Darjeeling and adjoining areas.



As per the American and European standards the current reference range for acceptable blood lead concentration in a healthy adult who does not have excessive exposure to environ-mental sources of the element is less than 0.25 mg/L. For children it is less than 0.05 mg/L.

Prolonged exposure of lead, which is highly toxic, can cause permanent damage to the kidneys, liver and haematologic systems.

Children are more at risk because lead expo-sure can reverse their brain growth and cause irreversible damage to their overall well being.

The scientist said GSI already collected eight blood samples from in and the surrounding areas of Korba coal field areas in Chhatisgarh to ascertain the heavy met-al concentration amongpeople staying there.

"We are trying to un-derstand the heavy metal concentration among the people living in Korba coal field areas. We will analyse the blood samples to find out the mag-nitude," he said. GSI has also collect-

ed fly ash, soil and other sources of heavy metal which ultimately affect people, mainly the chil-dren, he added.

#### Mamata inaugurates restored house of Sister Nivedita



## Withdraw 'harmful ordinance', Editors Guild tells Raj govt

New Delhi, Oct 23 (PTI): The Editors Guild of India has has asked the Rajasthan government to "withdraw the harmful ordinance" that bars the media from reporting on accusations against public servants, judges and magistrates without its sanction.

The ordinance is a "pernicious instrument" to harass the media, the Guild said in a statement last night.

"The ordinance promulgated by the

"The ordinance promulgated by the state government last month was ostensibly done to protect the judiciary and the bureaucracy against false FIRs.

"But in reality it is a pernicious instrument to harass the media, hide wrongful acts by government servants and drastically curb the freedom of the press guaranteed by the Constitution of India," it said.

The Rajasthan government had last month promulgated The Criminal Laws (Rajasthan Amendment) Ordinance, 2017, that seeks to protect serving and former judges, magistrates and public servants in the state from being inves-

tigated for on-duty action, without its prior sanction.

It bars the media from reporting on such accusations till the sanction to proceed with the probe is given by the government.

Rather than taking stern measures to prevent and punish those who indulge in frivolous or false litigations, the Rajasthan government has passed an ordinance that is bent on "bludgeoning the messenger", the Guild

While the Guild has always stood for fair, balanced and responsible reporting of FIRs filed in courts of law, it believes that the remedy being employed by the government is "draconian" and gives it "untrammelled power" to even imprison journalists for reporting matters of public interest.

"The Guild requests the Chief Minister Vasundhara Raje to withdraw the harmful ordinance and prevent any Act from being passed that would endanger the freedom of the press," it said.

# 3 Indians among 6 arrested for smuggling protected animals in Nepal

KATHMANDU, OCT 23 (PTI): Three Indians and a Pakistani were among six people arrested here for allegedly smuggling protected live animals to Nepal from Nigeria, a media report said today.

The Central Investiga-

The Central Investigation Bureau of the Nepal Police arrested three Indians -- Mohammad Usman, 34, Mohammad Faim, 35, and Mohammad Sherif Shahid, 35, the Himalayan Times reported.

Two Nepalese -- Sanjeev Bhari, 40, of Kathmandu and Raj Kumar Tiwari, 42, of Bara -- and Jawaid Aslam Khan, 55, of Pakistan were also arrested, police officials said.

were seized from the accused after a raid at the house of Bhari in Kathmandu on October 18, said Superintendent of Polcie Jeevan Shrestha, the CIB spokesperson.

The final destination of the apes is believed to be India, he said.

"Preliminary investigation suggests the racketeers would smuggle apes to India from Nigeria by making Nepal their transit," Shrestha said.

He said the apes were brought to Nepal from the African country by air, but officials at the Tribhuvan International Airport here failed to intercept the animal species. The accused have been

The accused have been handed over to the District Forest Office, Kathmandu, where legal action under National Parks and Wildlife Conservation Act will be initiated, while the animals and birds rescued alive have been sent to the Central Zoo.

Anyone involved in the trade of protected species may face a jail term of five to 15 years, and also be slapped with a fine of up to Rs 100,000, the report said. Indian national Usman is a repeat offender and was arrested with 109 tortoises and 162 birds of different species from Kathmandu in June last year, it said.

Police had raided a house and recovered the reptiles and birds kept in boxes and cages. Officials said the tortoises, which weigh three to five kg each, and the birds, including several varieties of parrots, were smuggled into Nepal from India.

ity its order of November 30, 2016, by which the playing of the anthem was made mandatory in the movie halls before the screening of a film, and may replace the word "shall" with "may".

"People go to cinema halls for undiluted entertainment.

Society needs entertainment. We cannot allow you (Centre) to shoot from our shoulders. People do not need to stand up in cinema halls to prove their patriotism," the bench, also comprising Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, said.

"Desireability is one thing but making it mandatory is another. Citizens cannot be forced to carry patriotism on their sleeves and courts cannot inculcate patriotism among people through its order," the bench said.

The court's strong remarks came on a petition filed by Ko-

dungallur Film Society, Kerala to recall the November order passed on a PIL filed last year by one Shyam Narayan Chouksey seeking directions that the national anthem should be played in all the cinema halls before a film begins.

In contrast to today's remarks, a bench headed by Justice Misra had ordered the theatres across the country in November last year to "mandatorily" play the national anthem before a movie and the audience must stand and show respect, in a bid to "instil committed patriotism and nationalism".

During today's hearing on the PIL, Attorney General K K Venugopal, appearing for the Centre, said India was a diverse country and the national anthem needed to be played in the cinema halls to bring in

uniformity.

He said it should be left open to the government to take a call on its own discretion on

whether the anthem should be played in theatres and whether people should stand up for it.

"What is stopping you from amending the Flag Code? You can amend it and say where to play national anthem and where it can't be done. Nowadays, anthem is played during matches, tournaments and even Olympics where half the crowd does not understand its meaning," Justice Chandrachud said

The bench said "You (Centre) take a call. Government should not show any reservation to the amendment as the court would not allow it to shoot from its shoulders".

Justice Chandrachud said the practice of playing national anthem in theatres was earlier discontinued in Mumbai because people used to move out of the halls when it was played.

of the halls when it was played.
"If the court is supposed to
enforce respect for the National Anthem on citizens, it should

also enforce the other fundamental duties in Article 51A," Justice Chandrachud said, adding that cultural and social values are inculcated by parents and teachers and not through court orders.

The court then asked the Centre to consider taking a call by January 9, the next date of hearing, on amending the national flag code for regulating the playing of national anthem in cinema halls across the country.

It said the Centre has to take a call uninfluenced by its earlier order on the playing of the anthem in theatres.

The apex court had in its

last November order said that "love and respect for the motherland is reflected when one shows respect to the national anthem as well as to the national flag".

It had also barred printing of the anthem or a part of it on any object and displaying it in

a manner at places which may be "disgraceful to its status and tantamount to disrespect".

Passing a slew of directions, the court had then said that fundamental duties in the Constitution "do not allow any different notion or the perception of individual rights that have individual thought, have no space. The idea is constitutionally impermissible".

"The directions are issued, for love and respect for the motherland is reflected when one shows respect to the National Anthem as well as to the National Flag. That apart, it would instil the feeling within one a sense committed patriotism and nationalism," it had then said.

It had also said proper norms and protocol should be fixed regarding its playing and singing at official functions and programmes where those holding constitutional office are present.

tions," it has said.

The PIL has sought a direction to the EC to ensure compliance of the RTI Act and other laws related to political parties and deregister them if they fail to abide by them.

"Direct the EC to ensure compliance of the Representation of the People Act, Right to Information Act, Income Tax Act and other election laws and rules so for as they relate to political parties and de-register them if they fail to comply with the election laws and rules," it has said.

Highlighting the instances of corruption and indirect funding to political parties, the petition has said the central and state governments

have allotted land/buildings and other accommodation in prime locations to the parties all over the country either free of cost or on concessional rates.

"This amounts to indirect financing of the political parties. Doordarshan allots free airtime to political parties during the elections. This is another instance of indirect financing," it has alleged.

The plea has also said that "a body or entity does not become a political party in the legal sense until the EC under Section 29A of the Representation of the People Act registers it. Therefore, this registration lends it the colour of Public Authority."

### The Grassroots Should Demand More A countability Now

Allow rural pragmatism to take the lead

m xactly}$  a week for now, the panchayat wards and zilla panchayats which have not already posted an SDF candidate into office will go to polls. At the GPU level, the Sikkim Democratic Front has cornered a majority even before the votes have been cast and it is unlikely that there will be any major surprises in how the zilla panchayats are staffed. Next week, the panchayats would have been elected, through polling in some places and by consensus in most others and hopefully, rural Sikkim will convey clearly what it wants its representatives to deliver. To do so with more coherence than what the manifestos offered, the people will need to make the Panchayats and their political seniors more accountable. Most of the Panchayats will be wearing the ruling party colours and thus it will be for the people to hold the SDF high-command on its assurance of party-based polls providing them

more accountable representatives.

Before rural Sikkim submits petitions for development aid, it should send up representations asking only one question – whom to contact in the party or department should their elected by consensus or mandate panchayat representative come up short when it comes to serving the people? The previous panchavat terms had started on very promising notes with the people standing up to the Panchayats and leading delegations to reach complaints to the concerned authorities; even monitoring committees had been formed but the initiative lost direction somewhere along the way. The new term should begin from where such initiatives were lost the last time. Panchayats, because the nation plans to empower people at the grassroots level, will have more responsibilities and funds devolved to them in the coming years. Their decisions will be more intelligent and their conduct more responsible only if the people remain more involved. This is easily achieved by ensuring better attended [in numbers and debates] Gram Sabhas. This, only the people themselves can ensure, and for all its ugly exchanges, the gram sabhas held recently for the Forest Rights Act in North Sikkim offered a good example of engaged and even confrontational democracy at work in Sikkim. The State needs more of such engagement to reinforce democracy at the grassroots.

This time, the peope should also leverage their expressed support for the party in office [by way of allowing a majority of seats to be bagged uncontested] to demand their pound of flesh by asking only for more accountable panchayat representatives in return.

The new Panchayats, with a whole term ahead of

them, will hopefully use every power already devolved to them to take the State forward from the grassroots onwards and through their performance, ensure that even more responsibilities are passed on to them. These, of course, will have to be of more consequence than playing gau-rakshaks or enforcing firecracker bans. These representatives are there to serve the people, not police them. Expectedly, there will soon be a whole round of workshops, awareness meets, sen-sitization programmes and even study tours to keep the Panchayats occupied and ease them into their new roles, and here the panchayats should not allow resource persons to talk down to them and instead take control of the interactions to figure out how to get the people's work done. One hopes that the Panchayats grow more powerful in the coming years and rural Sikkim better informed. This because development plans drafted by city-bred minds in department offices and ministries in Gangtok, or worse still, in Delhi, have not been as inclusive and workable as would have been good for Sikkim. As the Panchavats become more powerful, rural Sikkim will find a stronger voice in dictating affairs of the State and that can only be good. For all their well-meaning, West-inspired and semi-educated interventions, urban folk, even in Sikkim, do not really have the connect with the land and its people to fashion practical solutions for the future. That is something only the people who live in the real Sikkim, in the bastis, can deliver. Thus far, rural pragmatism has been over-powered by city-bred ideas of inferred political correctness. The new Panchayats should take up the challenge to give a fighting chance for rural aspirations to come to the fore and get heard. That is the responsibility that the fresh lot of Panchavats carry on their shoulders, a responsibility that we. municipal corporation and nagar palika types, need to assist for once, not direct like always.

# How media sexism demeans women and fuels abuse by men like Weinstein $prure\ attention entire$

The sexual abuse scandal currently embroiling media mogul Harvey Weinstein has stunned the United States, with Hollywood and the fashion industry declaring that "this way of treating wom-

As an Argentinean woman who studies gender in the media, I find it hard to be surprised by Weinstein's misdeeds. Machismo remains deeply ingrained in Latin American society, yes, but even female political leaders in supposedly gender-equal paradises like Holland and Sweden have told me that they are criticized more in the press and held

to a higher standard than their male counterparts. How could they not be? Across the world, the film and TV industry – Weinstein's domain – continues to foist outdated gender roles upon viewers.

WOMEN'S WORK
Television commercials are particularly guilty, fre-

quently casting women in subservient domestic

Take this 2015 ad for the Argentine cleaning product Cif, which is still running today. It explains how its concentrated cleaning capsules "made Sleeping Beauty shine."

In it, a princess eager to receive her prince remembers that – gasp – the floors in her castle tower are a total mess. Thanks to Cif's magic scouring fluid, she has time not only to clean but also to get dolled up for the prince – who, in case you were wondering, has no physical challenges preventing him from helping her tidy up.

But why should he, when it's a woman's job to

be both housekeeper and pretty princess?

Somewhat paradoxically, advertisements may also cast men as domestic superheroes. Often, characters like Mr. Muscle will mansplain to women about the best product and how to use it – though they don't actually do any cleaning themselves.

More recently, there's been a shift - perhaps an awkward attempt at political correctness – in which women are still the masters of the home, but their partners are shown "helping out" with the chores. In exchange, the men earn sex object status.

WE'VE COME A LITTLE WAY, BABY

Various studies on gender stereotypes in commercials indicate that although the advertising industry is slowly changing for the better, marketing continues to target specific products to certain customers based on traditional gender roles.

Women are pitched hygiene and cleaning products, whereas men get ads for banks, credit cards, housing, cars and other significant financial invest-

This year, U.N. Women teamed up with Unilever and other industry leaders like Facebook, Google, Mars and Microsoft to launch the Unstereotype Alliance. The aim of this global campaign is to end stereotypical and sexist portrayals of gender in ad-

As part of the #Unstereotype campaign, Unilever also undertook research on gender in adver-

tising. It found that only 3 percent of advertising shows women as leaders and just 2 percent conveys them as intelligent. In ads, women come off as

### interesting people just 1 percent of the time. BRITAIN PAVES A PATH

Even before it was forced to reckon with allegations that Harvey Weinstein had also harassed women in London, the United Kingdom was making political progress on the issue of women's portrayal in the

In July, the United Kingdom's Advertising Standards Authority announced that the U.K. will soon prohibit commercials that promote gender stereo

"While advertising is only one of many factors that contribute to unequal gender outcomes," its press release stated, "tougher advertising standards can play an important role in tackling inequalities and improving outcomes for individuals, the economy and society as a whole."

As of 2018, the agency says, advertisements in which women are shown as solely responsible for household cleaning or men appear useless around kitchen appliances and unable to handle taking care of their children and dependents will not pass muster in the U.K. Commercials that differentiate between girls' and boys' toys based on gender ste-reotypes will be banned as well. STICKY FLOORS

The U.K's move is a heartening public recognition that gender stereotypes in the media both reflect and further the very real inequalities women face at home and at work.

Worldwide, the International Labor Organiza-tion reports, women still bear the burden of household chores and caretaking responsibilities, which often either excludes them from pay work or leaves them relegated to ill-paid part-time jobs

In the U.K., men spend on average 16 hours per week on domestic tasks, while women spend 26. The European Union average is worse, with women dedicating an average of 26 weekly hours to men's nine hours on caretaking and household tasks. In Argentina, my home country, fully 40 percent

of men report doing no household work at all, even if they're unemployed. Among those who do pitch in, it's 24 hours a week on caretaking and dome tic chores for men. Argentinean women put in 45

You can do the math: On average, Argentinean women use up two days of their week and some 100 days annually – nearly one-third of their year – on unpaid household labor.

#### REAL-WORLD CONSEQUENCES

These inequalities, combined with advertising that reinforces them, generate what's called the "sticky floors" problem. Women – whether would-be investment bankers or, I dare say, aspiring Hollywood stars – don't just face glass ceilings to advancement, they also are also "stuck" to domestic life by endless chores.

The cultural powers that be produce content that represents private spaces as "naturally" im-bued with female qualities, gluing women to traditional caregiving roles.

This hampers their professional development and helps keep them at the bottom of the economy pyramid because women must pull off a balancing ct between their jobs inside and outside of the lomestic sphere. And they must excel at both, all while competing against male colleagues who likely confront no such challenges.

Former U.S. president Barack Obama once

pointed out this double standard in homage to his then-competitor Hillary Clinton. She, he reminded an audience in 2008, "was doing everything I was doing, but just like Ginger Rogers, it was backwards

The sticky floor problem puts women in a position to be exploited by men like Weinstein, who tout their ability to help female aspirants to get unstuck. Until society – and, with it, the media we create – comprehend that neither professional success nor domesticity has a gender, these pernicious powerful dynamics will endure.

### The hidden connection between obesity, heart disease and trade

his week, representatives from This week, represent are meeting at a World Health Orga-nization global conference in Uruguay to tackle the global pandemic of

noncommunicable diseases (NCDs).

These NCDs are the chronic diseases — including cancers, cardio-vascular diseases, respiratory dis-eases and diseases — that now kill around 40 million people each year. They are responsible for 70 per cent of all deaths globally and have a much bigger impact than infectious diseases such as HIV and malaria. Reducing the preventable deaths they cause is one of the key health targets of the new Sustainable Development Goals.

The good news is that the meet-

ing's draft agreement recognizes the need to address conflicts between public health goals and private sector interests in tobacco, unhealthy foods and alcohol products. Alongside physical inactivity, consumption of these products is one of the main drivers of NCDs. The bad news is that the agree-ment is virtually silent on the role of trade and investment agreements in promoting the global rise in NCDs.

TRADE AGREEMENTS BOOST

#### HEART DISEASE AND OBESITY

There is plenty of research evidence of the impact of trade and investment agreements on NCDs such as heart disease, and on major risk factors such as obesity and tobacco use.

One of our studies, for example, revealed that consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages in Vietnam spiked dramatically after that country opened itself to trade and foreign investment. Soft drink companies

based in the United States increased their market presence even as the World Health Organization identified the rise in consumption of high-sugar content drinks as a major cause of rising youth obesity.

Another study found that consumption of unhealthy foods and sugary drinks increases after im-plementation of trade agreements, often those with the U.S. There was also a correlation between such trade agreements and higher rates of heart tease and obesity.

Other research has found that

when countries opened themselves to trade, cigarette consumption rose; as more cigarettes entered the domestic market, price competition made them more affordable.

LIMITING GOVERNMENT

#### POWER TO PREVENT DISEASE

Trade and investment agreements are not the only cause of these NCD-promoting patterns. Globalization processes more generally are also involved. This includes the way that products such as high-sugar drinks and cigarettes can function as symbols that people in low-income countries have "made it" to the middle class. But as our analysis of the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement has found, such agreements can limit the ability of governments to implement laws, policies and regulations aimed at controlling these NCD risk factors.

These agreements require gov

ernments to have scientific proof for any new control measure they intro-duce that could interfere with trade rules. But what if the measure, by being new, has only limited evidence? Agreements also call on governments to prove that their control measure

is "necessary" and that no other less trade-restrictive options might exist, such as mass education campaigns.

Extended patent protection on drugs used to treat NCDs, meanwhile, price them beyond poor peoples' reach. And they drain limited government health budgets

### OF BEING SUED

Many trade agreements also contain rules that allow foreign investors to sue governments over perceived losses due to new regulations. Philip Morris did just that when Australia introduced tobacco plain packaging. Several tobacco-exporting countries launched government-to-government disputes under the World Trade

Organization (WTO) system.

These challenges were not successful in the end, although the final WTO ruling has yet to be made public. But the very fact that they were considered possible creates a "regulato-ry chill" in which governments grow reluctant to enact new public health measures for fear of a future trade or investment dispute. This is especially concerning for low-income countries that lack the financial resources to fight such a regulatory challenge.
Few NCD control measures have

actually gone to formal trade or investment dispute. But under the WTO system, there are an increasing number of challenges being raised against government policies on food or alcohol labelling intended to inform consumers of health risks, on marketing restrictions and on tobacco control measures. As a result of these informal challenges, governments in some instances have delayed or backed away from their policies to avoid the risk of a dispute.

#### THREE STEPS TO REDUCE

PREVENTABLE DEATHS
So what should governments do, especially since much of the liberalized global diffusion of NCD risks has already occurred? Fortunately, there are three simple steps they can take to ensure the "policy coherence" that is the theme of the Uruguay meeting.

First, governments should agree that all future trade and investment agreements contain a full carve-out or any non-discriminatory public ealth measure aimed at controlling NCD risks (or any other health concern), whether or not there is scientific proof or other less trade-restrictive means available.

Second, since there are already scores of existing agreements potentially tying public health's regulatory hands, governments should commit to not initiating a dispute against another country's non-discriminatory public health measure. Third, governments should refrain from increasing patent protection on drugs used to treat NCDs. These diseases will con-tinue to surge before prevention measures lead to their eventual decline: affordable treatments will be needed.

These three commitments should be written into the final Uruguay agreement. They respect the aim of global trade by ensuring public health measures are not used to discriminate against another country's products or trade interests. They also respect the policy space governments need now, and into the future, to protect the health and well-being of their citizens.

### U-17 World Cup semifinal shifted from Guwahati to Kolkata

"Following a thorough assess-ment of the pitch conditions at Guwahati's Indira Gandhi Athletic Stadium, which has been affected by severe rainfall over the past few days, FIFA has decided to move the venue of the semi-final between England and Brazil to Kolkata's Vivekananda Yuba Bharati Krirangan, where the match will kick off at 17.00hrs" the FIFA said in a statement.

The change of venue will cause some inconvenience to the English and Brazillian teams as they had already landed in Guwahati. The two teams were also scheduled to have training sessions in Guwahati this evening.

The pitch at the Indira Gandhi Athletic Stadium was severely affected during the quarterfinal match between Ghana and Mali on Saturday which was played under incessant

The Assam capital has been exeriencing rain for the last four days, though it relented a bit today.

Rain stopped after light showers in the morning but the ground has been significantly damaged. Ghana coach Samuel Fabian had said that the match should have been postponed and played on another date after his side lost to Mali

### Fresh plea in SC favouring Centre's stand on Rohingyas

New Delhi, Oct 23 (PTI): A fresh plea was today filed in the Supreme Court favouring the Centre's stand to identify and deport to Myanmar around 40,000 illegal Rohingya Muslims

staying in the country.

The plea may be heard by a bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra which is already considering various peti tions, including the lead PIL filed by two Rohingva Muslim refugees, Mohammad Salimullah and Mohammad Shaqir, challenging their deportation.

The apex court has already fixed the earlier pleas for detailed hearing from November 21.

The latest plea has been filed by Binay Kumar Singh, a national executive

member of BJP's Kisan Morcha, T Raja Singh, a BJP MLA from Goshamahal in Telangana and Sunil Ku-mar, who claims to be an activist. They have sought impleadment as parties in the ongoing matter and alleged that the illegal Rohingya immigrants are not refugees but should rather be seen as "aggressors/

invaders".

The plea has raised the issue of Rohingyas settled in Jammu and Kashmir saying Article 370 of the Constitution imposed restrictions on Indians but these people have been allowed to stay there.

"If Indians are not allowed to stay in the State mmu anu .
even the illegally
ated Rohingya of Jammu and Kashmir immigrated community cannot be permitted to stay nearby the sensitive Pakistan border," it said.

# Karna bans riding pillion on 2 wheelers below 100 cc capacity

BENGALURU, OCT 23 (PTI): Karnataka government has banned riding pillion on two-wheelers with engine capacity of less than 100 CC, giving effect to a 2015 court order.

The transport department

"Not only has the registration of such vehicles which have seats for pillion rider been banned, but also riding pillion on two-wheelers below 100 CC is prohibited," said a government order issued by the transport department on October 13 last. The order was issued based

on a Karnataka High Court or-der in a case relating to award of compensation to Hemanth, a minor riding pillion who was crippled for life following a road accident in Mysuru in March

Hemanth and Nithin, who was riding the two-wheeler without a licence, were both aged around 14 then.

A recklessly driven car had crashed against their vehicle.
While Nithin escaped with

minor injuries, Hemanth was crippled for life with serious head injuries. In its June 15, 2015 order

petition related to com pensation claim by parents of Hemanth, the court had taken note of violations of rules and issued a slew of directions to the education and transport departments and the police to prevent minors from riding motor vehi-

It had directed that to avoid repetition of similar situation, the transport department should not register vehicles be-low 100 CC with a pillion seat attached to it and not permit riding pillion on such vehicles (already registered).

There should not be any seat for pillion riders in vehicles be-low 100 CC as mandated under Rule 143(3) of the Karnataka Motor Vehicles Rules - 1989, the court had said.

# Would be too optimistic to call ourselves dominant force: Gopi

ODENSE, OCT 23 (PTI): Indian badminton has been on the ascendancy for quite some time now but a pragmatic chief national coach Pullela Gopichand believes that there is still a long way to go before the country can be termed as dom inant force in the sport.

"I think we are being too optimistic," was Gopichand's instant reply when PTI asked if India have become world beaters in shuttle sport.



"We as a system are not ready for that sort of a thing (moniker). Unfortunately, there are not many people, who understand world level sport

and it is too early to say that.

There is immense potential but the system, I think a lot still needs to be done," Gopichand said during

an exclusive interview.

The coach is happy with the progress though during a year where Indian shuttlers have won six Super Series title. Apart from Srikanth's hat-trick, Sindhu has won two titles and B Sai Praneeth itive year. We had some very good performances at World Championship, Super series. In all the big events, we have performed well and I think it is a stepping stone for the next 2-3 years, leading upto the Com-monwealth Games and Asian Games, Olympic qualification and then the Tokyo Games," Gopichand observed. A hectic year lies ahead for In-

dia as a host of big- ticket events, including Commonwealth Games, Asian games and World Championship lined up.

Asked how he plans to make the players peak at right tournament next year, Gopichand said: "We will have the periodization and planning for next year but it is going to be a challenge because there are too many important tournaments too close (to each other).

"There is All England and Com-

to each other. Similarly, World Championship and Asian Games are close and then there are tons of other tournaments which decide the rankings, so it will be a challenge. It will be a difficult year but hopefully we will manage," the coach looked determined.

Asked if All England Championship is losing its relevance, Gopichand, who won the title in 2001, said: "It is a changing world. All England has the history and lot of older people take it as the World Championship and Olympics kind of a thing. But today's day Olympics and World Championship have taken their place."

He agreed that with advent of Super Series Premier and the kind of money associated, situation is bound to change.

"We are having premier super

have grand slams and lot more tournaments have more prize money and some of them has same ranking points as the All England. Lot of people will think All England as the first among equals but things are changing."

#### Diplomats' safety an obligation: China on threats to its envoy in Pak

BEIJING, OCT 23 (PTI): China today said the safety of the diplomatic personnel and missions is an obligation of the sovereign countries but declined to comment on its reported complaint to Pakistan that its ambassador to Islamabad faced threats from a Xinjiang-based terror group.

China reportedly asked Pakistan to step up the security of its newly-appointed ambassador in Islamabad in the wake of threats to his life from the East Turkestan Islamic Movement (ETIM), according to reports.

The Chinese embassy made the request in a letter written to Pakistan's interior ministry on October 19, saying a member of the ETIM has sneaked into Pakistan to assassinate its ambassa

dor Yao Jing.

The letter, circulated in the local media in Pakistan, was written by the focal person for the multi-billion dollar China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) Ping Ying Fi who asked the interior ministry to "enhance the security" of the ambas-sador and other Chinese working in the country.
Chinese Foreign Min-

istry spokesman Geng Shuang when asked about the report said, "I am not aware of the information mentioned by you. The ETIM is a UN Security Council listed

terrorist organisation.
Combating ETIM is an important part of the international counter ter-rorism efforts, Geng said.

China alleges that the ETIM, an Al-Qaeda linked group fighting for the separation of Uvgur Muslim majority Xinjiang province, was responsible for a host of terrorist attacks in the province and the country. Xinjiang borders Pakistan- occu-

pied Kashmir.
Asked whether the Chinese government ex-pressed concern to Pakistan about the safety of the diplomatic person-nel, Geng said the safety of the diplomatic person nel and missions is an ob-ligation of the sovereign countries according to the Vienna Convention

China has appointed Yao, who has served as Chinese Ambassador to Afghanistan, as its new envoy to Pakistan. Yao replaced Sun Weidong, who served as China's Ambassador to Pakistan for three years and recently returned to his country.

### Dokalam standoff 'safely resolved' after talks: PLA official

BEIJING, OCT 22 (PTI): The 73-daylong Dokalam standoff was "safely resolved" after several rounds of talks with India, a top Chinese military official said today on the side-lines of the ongoing Congress of the ruling CPC.

People's Liberation Army (PLA) official Liu Fang spoke about the resolution of the Dokalam standoff citing it as an example of how the Chinese military is trying to resolve issues through dialogue mechanisms with different countries.

"We also conducted a lot of prac-

tical cooperation," she said refer-ring to the Dokalam standoff which began on June 16 when the Chinese military attempted to build a road in the territory claimed by Bhutan close to the Chicken's Neck area connecting India's north eastern states with the mainland.

The standoff ended on August 28 with mutual understanding after China halted the construction of the road.

"Of course it is safely resolved right now," Liu said.

"My colleagues in the military and other ministries worked very closely and held negotiations with the Indian side many times," while China clearly reiterated its position,



"All of this contributed a lot to the peaceful resolution of China-In dia cross border dispute," she said,

referring to the standoff.

Observers attach significance to the PLA acknowledging peaceful resolution of the Dokalam standoff, at the CPC Congress which is set to endorse a second term for President

The Chinese military is working hard to build up new platforms and measures to improve international cooperation she said, adding, "we already have dialogue mechanisms with 28 organisations".

Referring to the address of President Xi at the once-in- five-years Con-gress of the Communist Party of China (CPC) on October 18. Liu said she is "very very inspired" by the report delivered by him outlining "tremendous progress and achievements".

In his address, Xi had spoken about plans to turn the PLA into a world class force. Terming the speech as "profound and fundamental," she "we totally agree with it"

Besides being president, Xi also heads the CPC and the country's miliCommission (CMC), the overall high nmand of the 2.3 million-strong PLA, the world's largest army.

Liu said China is playing a larger and greater role in increasing its in-ternational influence. China is making efforts in international peace eping, maritime cooperation and disaster relief.

"All this shows our responsibility as a big power nation. We keep our voice louder and louder at the international stage," she said.

The Chinese military is showing its confidence in the international arena and its spokesmen actively interacted with the international media to explain the version of Chinese army and also correct misunderstandings, she said.

"By doing so we want to convey the correct, clear and accurate infor mation about China's military development," Liu said.

She along with other young military officials interacted with the media sharing their experiences in the military and their appreciation of Xi's leadership.

The Chinese military, which has

undergone a massive reform drive since Xi took power in 2012, has an annual budget of over USD 141 billion, next only to the US.

# Smart City challenge calls for startups with social impact

New Delhi, Oct 23 (PTI): A new Smart City challenge has been launched in India which encourages young entrepreneurs to identify local problems and develop innovative solutions which have a lasting social impact and are also successful businesses.

Smart City 4.0, recently launched by the Innovation Acceleration Group at the

University of California Berkeley, US, seeks to develop skills for industry, mentor innovators, accelerate technologies and create fundable startups that work towards developing smart cities in India.

As a part of the ongoing initiative, India's Smart City Co-Innovation Lab will be es-tablished in Allahabad, a city that has been identified by the government under its 100 smart cities mission.

"The challenge is that there is so much new technology coming that can have an impact," said Innovation Acceleration Group executive director Andre Marquis.

But people often think of technology first and then try to look at how it will solve problems, he said.

"At UC Berkeley we look at it differently you have to get in touch with the customer.

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We teach people to get out of the building, understand the customer's problems and build a viable business model that could help solve those problems - and then go

build it," Marquis told PTI. Launched in collaboration with the United States India Strategic Partnership Forum and 1M1B, a non-profit body, Smart City 4.0 aims at developing the skills of young innovators, startups and large corporations for solutions that make cities "smart, safe and sustainable".

The lab will enable large, mid-sized com panies and startups to work with citizens and create sustainable solutions together.

The programme will invite young people between the ages of 18 and 29 to co-create smart city solutions after understanding is-sues that affect the people of a city. The areas of focus will be artificial intel-

ligence, water, energy, transportation, waste management, healthcare, climate and smart agriculture.

The programme will run on two tracks -one for students and the other for startups. The top 20 ideas will enter the Smart City Co-Innovation Lab and will be mentored by industry experts.

The final two teams in the students' category will present their innovations at the Global Social Venture Competition in Milan, Italy, in April 2018, and compete for the top prizes worth USD 80,000 (about Rs 52 lakh)

The top five teams in the startup group will present their ideas to the Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh in October 2018, and work with different government departments to implement their smart city solutions.

"In a year, we are looking at about 15-20 startups to be produced from one lab," said Manav Subodh, director, International Development, Innovation Acceleration Group,

The initiative is designed to create 'Make in India', with local solutions to local problems, and at a larger level, to develop skills among young innovators of India to gear up for the fourth industrial revolution, he said.

The Allahabad Innovation Lab is scheduled to start on January 9, 2018. In the meantime, teams will be shortlisted for the challenge, the organisers said.

UC Berkeley hopes to establish ten more

labs across India and is looking for partners to take the model to cities such as Vizag, Bangalore and Pune.

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
