## SDF releases 127-point manifesto for Panchayat elections

#### SUMMIT REPORT

GANGTOK, 12 OCT:
Sikkim Democratic Front released its election manifesto for the upcoming Zilla and Gram Panchayat Election 2017 in the State here at the party head-office today. The fifty-five page election manifesto of the ruling party starts with the message of the SDF president, Chief Min-ister Pawan Chamling, and enumerates 127 "responsibilities and commitments" to the people on various issues which



will now be shouldered by the panchayats. The party manifesto also

The 127-point manifesto begins with the ban on cow slaughter and states that the Pancha-

yats will be responsible for implementing the law in letter and spirit. This is followed by the ban on firecrackers and ban on grazing to be enforced by the Panchavats.

Further, the manifesto promises a minimum of Rs 1,000 as pension for farmers, development of villages as business centres with linkages with the market economy, formation of Gram planning forum and Ward development committee, es-tablishment of Women's club in every Zilla, etc.

Meanwhile. in his message, the party president has assured, "During the ongoing Pan chayat Elections, we will become the total holistic voice of the people to empower our people to create people's government and ensure qualitative governance for the people and by the people. We will ensure a model, equity and justice, democratic freedoms, non-communal develop ment and progress, safe, secure, happy and pros-



#### Talwars acquitted by Allahabad HC in Aarushi murder case

ALLAHABAD, OCT 12 (PTI): The Allahabad (PTI): The High Court today acquit-ted Nupur and Rajesh Talwar in the 2008 murder of their teenage daughter Aarushi and domestic help Hemraj, saying that neither the circumstances nor the evidence was enough to hold them guilty.

The verdict ends, at

least for now, the nineleast for now, the fine-year ordeal of the Noida couple who were sen-tenced to life by a Gha-ziabad CBI court on No-vember 28, 2013 for the double murder that not only transfixed but also shook the nation with its element of filicide

The Talwars, who are both dentists, are expected to be freed tomorrow from Ghaziabad's Dasna jail after the completion of paperwork. The CBI did not immediately say if it would appeal the High Court verdict. It said it would study the order and decide the future course of action.

"I am grateful to the

judiciary for the verdict," Talwar's father and a former Group Captain in the Indian Air Force. "They have really suffered. They are emotionally drained. At my age it was very trying to see my daughter behind bars." he told reporters in New Delhi.

"It's been an exhausting journey for us. We are really grateful to the High Court for having aquitted and ending the injustice meted out to them," said Vandana Talwar, an aunt of Aarushi who was 14 when she was killed.

A division bench

comprising justices B K Narayana and A K Mish-ra upheld the Talwars' appeal against the CBI court verdict, holding that the circumstances of the case and the evidence on record did not estab-lished a chain showing their involvement in the murders of Aarushi and Hemraj.

Pronouncing the verdict in a packed court room, the bench said that it is a fit case where henefit of doubt can be given to the appellants and set aside the judgement of the CBI court convicting the Talwars who were arrested in May 2008.

The CBI court had

relied on circumstantial evidence to convict the couple in the absence of any motive. In his judgement, Additional Ses-sions Judge Shyam Lal has cited judgements of the Supreme Court to say that the mere fact that the prosecution had failed to "translate that mental disposition of the accused into evidence does not mean that no such mental condition existed in the mind of the assailant."

The incident has outraged AAP workers, many of whom posted videos of Kejriwal using the car, especially during the 2014 Republic Day, after he became the chief minister of Delhi for the

first time.

AAP's Haryana convenor Naveen Jaihind has announced an undisclosed amount as reward for

Jaihind had sought
the "lucky car" for his campaigning when he contested the 2014 Lok

Sabha poll from Rohtak.
"I want this car back There are a lot of emotions, memories attached to it. Whoever returns the car, I will give him a suitable reward, which will be much more than what he will get from selling the car," Jaihind

said.

Like Jaihind, many AAP volunteers recol-lect the "iconic" car for it witnessed the ups and downs of the Aam Aadmi

Party.

The car was witness to two assembly election wins in 2013 and 2015 and also to the party's poor performance in the Lok Sabha polls.

treme significance. In the absence of motive, the conviction based on circumstantial evidence can in principle me made."

Dadhiram Maurya, the jailor of the Dasna prison where the Talwars are lodged, said the couple felt they have got justice.

"After having break-fast they were praying. Their schedule was normal. She said they got justice today and had tears of joy.

"Any person after spending this amount of jail (time) will feel or jail (time) will feel happy to get freedom. So they were happy after they were told about the news," he said.

Lawver Rebecca John who was part of Talwars' legal team, said she was relieved by the judge-ment. She claimed the whole case was based

"innuendos" would "not have carried through".

John hoped that the Talwars, who have been in media spotlight over nine years, will be allowed privacy after their release from the iail.

Aarushi was found dead inside her room in the Talwars' Noida residence with her throat slit in May 2008. The suspicion initially fell on 45-year-old Hemraj, who at the time was missing. But his body was recovered from the terrace of the

house a day later.
As the Uttar Pradesh Police drew flak over shoddy investigation into the case which was making national head-lines, the then chief minister Mayawati recommended a probe by the Central Bureau of Investigation.

#### 568 nominations pass scrutiny in East

GANGTOK. 12 OCT [IPR]: The scrutiny of nomina tion papers of candidates for the General Election to Zilla Panchayat/Gram Panchayat of East District was conducted by Returning Officer cum District Collector, East on 11 Oct in the presence of Observer, Rinzing Chewang Bhutia, who is also the Special Secretary of Land Revenue & Disaster Management Department, Government

The scrutiny process commenced at 11 a.m. and the nomination papers of 87 candidates contesting for the Zilla Panchayat Territorial Constituencies and 498 candidates contesting for Gram Panchayat Units were scrutinized. Scrutiny of five nomination papers were adjourned for hearing on 12 Oct as objections were raised in those cases.

At the end of the scru-tiny of the nomination papers, total of seven nominations were rejected. Election to six Territorial Constituencies and 146 Gram Panchayat Wards will be uncontested.

The last date for withdrawal of candidature is 13 Oct. The allotment of symbol to the contesting candidates will be done on the same day 3 pm onwards. Following the allotment of symbols to the candidates, a meeting of the contesting candi-dates to Zilla Panchayat/ Gram Panchayat with the Returning Officer and Assistant Returning Officer, respectively, has been schedule at 4 pm of 13 Oct at District Administrative Centre in Sichey.

The contesting candi dates are also requested to bring two passport size photographs for is-suing their identity cards.

### LOTAL Talk on Sikkim Succession Act 2008

The 2nd edition of LOTAL Talk on a recent 'High Court Order on the Sikkim Succession Act 2008' was held today at ICFAI University in

Lower Sichey, Gangtok.
It may be mentioned here, LOTAL Talk is an initiative started by Law graduate student, Pramit Chhetri. The objective of the talk is to deliver on complex legal issues in a simple way and also share experiences of speakers.

While addressing the

students, Advocate-High Court of Sikkim, Dr Doma Bhutia, who was the re-



source person for the programme, detailed the Sikkim Succession Act and shed light on many aspects of the Supreme Court judg-

ment on Right to Privacy.

Stressing on the Sikkim Succession Act, Dr

Bhutia said that Sikkimese women married to non Sikkimese have filed a PIL in the High Court of Sikkim and raised a host of issues like non issuance of Certificate of Iden-

tification to Sikkimese women married to non Sikkimese. She further said that such act is not consistent with the basic feature of the Constitution and added that the freedom to choose one's spouse and start a family should be respected and they should not be denied their rights.

She further enlight-

ened the students on the judgment which declared the Right to Privacy as a Fundamental Right.

Simultaneously, a talk was also delivered by Dean-cum-Official Registrar, ICFAI University, Sonam Tshering Ven-

chungpa, wherein he said that the privacy laws are rights applicable to both women and men and needs to be sensitive.

Pramit Chhetri who conceived the idea of Lotal Talk said that the main motive of this talk is to enlighten Law students on burning issues and to discuss complex legal issues. The gathering of stu-

dents was also informed about Sikkim Judicial Museum started by the High Court and request-ed to visit the museum and reap the wide knowledge in law once it is inaugurated later this year.

#### Reconciliation, Not Recrimination

See past the false narratives and open uncomfortable conversations

 ${f A}$ communal divide is the easiest to cleave and the hardest to bridge. We live in a country which has still not repaired the damage caused by the Partition riots in 1947 and remain infiltrated by agent provocateurs at all levels who are resolute in their mission to paint monsters and fan paranoia, keeping people on edge and distrusting. These are people, leaders and groups perennially suspicious of the other and fearful of losing their privileges even as they imagine slights and denials. They live in a world of imagined persecution even as they project nefarious intentions on others and then marshal the scared and the fearful into pliant foot soldiers carrying forward their insular agendas. It is usually easy to see through their conspiracies and call them out, but the world is now becoming increasingly segregated, whispering fears in their respective echo chambers and consuming information filtered to suit their world view. The diversity of opinions and analysis necessary to "understand" issues is being increasingly sacrificed at the altar of selective information and pre-packaged explanations. Some years ago, this misdirection was seen in the political and communal uproar over botched Census figures which accorded the nation's Muslims an astronomically high rate of growth. Although it was almost immediately clarified that the Census officials had announced the figures based on wrong calculations, the data, even though wrong, suited the false narratives of the alt-Right in our country and remained in circulation. Unfortunately, technology, which was once expected to deliver as a tool to dispel falsehoods and "fake news" has ended up reinforcing these problems. It is now widely accepted that technology, like power and money, takes what is already inside you and amplifies it. As a result, the resentful and the easily scared become even more so when they play in the world wide web. Of course, the same is true for the liberal and the tolerant as well, but the problem is that each side ends up becoming more convinced of their respective position because they end up preaching among the converted instead of bridging the divide.

We already live with stories of the horror created by divisions on religious and communal lines and still allow ourselves to drawn in the same direction. This cannot be healthy. And the collective health suffers even more when technology is boosted by power because then begins the mission to homogenise a remarkably diverse people and force independent thought to conform to a narrow ideology. Take for instance the beef ban. As per data collected by the National Sample Survey Office, around 80 million people in our country eat beef. This number, believed to be under-reported in that the actual figures might be higher, suggests that one in every 13 India is a beef eater. What needs to also be borne in mind that of the remaining 12, not everyone has a problem with others eating beef even for they themselves don't. Most of the beef eaters are Muslims, Scheduled Tribes, OBC and Scheduled Caste. Now, reflect this against the anti-reservation, "anti-appeasement" belligerence and false narratives that have been hammered by a certain group, and the real targets of the Gau-Raksha drama becomes obvious. It thus becomes important for us, as free citizens of a free country, to challenge claims more often and demand better explanations.

There are several issues kept alive in Sikkim as well by those who want to tap into the inherent parochial nature of the people to whip up fear and suspicion in hopes of creating a situation where people start believing every conspiracy theory that is sold to them. This provides these agent provocateurs with a weapon that can be deployed at will to earn them the political clout and mileage that they crave. The people, however should know better. History shows that many crises have been the results of lack of simple reconciliation between parties. The parties involved will never come to the discussion table because their very existence in the public mindset is threatened if touchy issues are resolved and there no enemies to protect against. We use the word "resolved" not solved. Issues which threaten the social fabric cannot be solved by a third party, they have to be resolved by the parties involved so that there are no lingering hard feelings which would bring us back to square one. The approach has to be one of reconciliation, not recrimination, and for that we need to have difficult and uncomfortable conversations with those who do not think like us or believe in what we do. Simply put. to move ahead, we need to step outside our segregated circles.

### What's behind the huge increase in breast cancer rates in China?

Breast cancer is the most common China, according to the latest data from China's national cancer registry. An analysis of the data reveals that the cancer has increased at a rate of around 3.5% a year from 2000 to 2013, compared with a drop of 0.4% a year over the same period in the US.

The analysis also reveals that breast cancer rates are higher in ur-ban areas of China than in rural areas. And the higher the population density, the higher the rate. For small cities (population below 500,000), the incidence of breast cancer is 30 per 100,000. For medium-sized cities (population between 500,000 to 1,000,000), it is 40 in 100,000. And for large cities (population above 1m), the incidence rate is 60 per 100,000 women.

With the rapid development of

China's economy, more and more people have moved from rural areas and towns to large cities. As a result, many "megacities" have sprung up. By 2014, China had six megacities with populations above 10m. It is your likely that uphonication is have very likely that urbanisation is having a big impact on breast cancer incidence in China.

Here is a list of some of the factors that may be behind the rise in breast cancer incidence in China:

Childbearing: Having more than ne child lowers breast-cancer risk. With the one-child policy in place since 1979, most women – especial-ly if they worked in the city – had to strictly follow the policy in order to avoid being fined. Although the one-child policy rule was replaced in 2015 with a two-child policy rule, the possible benefit on breast cancer incidence will probably take 15 to 20 years to show.

Research also shows that the women who have their first child at age 35 or younger tend to have a protective benefit from pregnan-cy. However, in China, many women have chosen to delay having a child as a result of work pressure and cultural



Women are also less likely to breastfeed than previous genera-tions, which may be another contributing factor. Research has shown that both pregnancy and breastfeeding reduce a woman's risk of developing cancer, because they reduce the life-time number of menstrual cycles. As a result, women are exposed to less oestrogen. (Oestrogen can stimulate breast cancer cells to grow.) It has also been hypothesised that breast cells need to mature in order to produce milk and mature cells are more resistant to becoming cancer cells.

Researchers in China have found associations between these "repro-ductive factors" - including oral con-traceptives and hormone replace-ment therapy (HRT) - and the rise in breast cancer incidence in China.

Stress: Stress - which is more likely to be experienced in large cities - has been linked to increased risk of developing cancer. Although stress may not directly cause cancer, it does affect the levels of various hormones and it suppresses the immune system. And, once cancer has developed,

stress is believed to aid its progres-

Lifestyle: In modern China, women are generally less physically active than they were in previous genera-tions. A study published in the International Journal of Behavioral Nutrition and Physical Activity, shows that levels of physical activity for adults in China fell by nearly half between 1991 and 2011, and they declined more rapidly for women than for

An unhealthy diet is also increasingly common in urban China, with a proliferation of fast food outlets. This has resulted in an increase in obesity

among Chinese women.

Increased alcohol assumption has long been associated with the increased risk of developing breast cancer and a World Health Organisation bulletin notes that, in China, alcohol consumption is increasing faster than in other parts of the world.

Ageing: Ageing is the biggest risk

factor for breast cancer. Women are living longer in China, which is a key factor related to the increased incidence of breast cancer in the country. As people get older, there is more genetic damage and less ability to repair the damag

SMALL IMPROVEMENTS
Even though the prevalence of breast cancer among women in China is lower than in many developed coun-tries, the rapid increase in incidence of the disease - which is also being

Because of China's large popula-tion, even with a small percentage of improvement on cancer prevention, a sizeable number of women's lives could be saved. There are many risk factors that can be reduced by raising cancer awareness and having better education on diet, exercise, stress reduction as well as improving breast cancer screening. Public health authorities in China can play a crucial role in developing well-defined strategies to tackle the issue and reduce the breast cancer burden in China.

### Evolutionary biology can help us understand how language works

As a linguist I dread the question, "what do you do?", because when I answer "I'm a linguist" the inevitable follow-up question is: "How many languages do you speak?" That, of course, is not the point. While learning languages is a wonderful thing to do, academic linguistics is the scientific study of language.

What I do in my work is to try to understand how and why languages are the way they are. Why are there so many in some places and so few in others? How did languages develop so many dif-ferent ways of fulfilling the same kinds of commu-nicative tasks? What is uniquely human about language, and how do the human mind and language shape each other? This is something of a new di rection in linguistics. The old-school study of language history was more concerned with language for its own sake: understanding the structure of languages and reconstructing their genealogical

relationships.

One of the exciting things happening in linguistics today is that linguists are increasingly connecting with the field of evolutionary biology. Evolu-tionary biologists ask very similar questions about species to those me and my colleagues want to ask about languages: why they are distributed in a certain way, for example, or looking for explanations for differences and similarities between them.

These similarities in outlook allow us to apply all the modern tools of computational evolutionary biology to linguistic questions, giving us new insights into fundamental questions about the pro-cesses of language change, and through that into the nature of language in general

#### EVOLVING LANGUAGE

I recently co-authored a new paper with a set of interdisciplinary colleagues. We use methods adapted from evolutionary biology to investigate how a large group of languages had changed over thousands of vears.

language family (a huge family of languages mostly distributed along a broad arc from Taiwan to Easter Island) because quite a lot is known about how it spread. With a decent model of the history of a language family it becomes possible to uncover the processes of change within these languages. This is the same basic logic as when Gregor Mendel inferred the principles of heredity by observing how the patterns of variation in the forms of plants were governed by their ancestry. When we understand how the building blocks of language work, we will be further along the path to understanding the human mind.

Languages are a lot more than just a bundle of words. They also include all the principles for combining those words into meaningful utterances: grammar. And, like words, grammar also changes over time. We wanted to discover whether grammar evolves in the same way as words.

The lexicons of a languages (the set of words each language has) change in two ways over historical time: the sound systems of individual languages change – meaning that their words sound different – and words are replaced by other words through processes including meaning change and borrowing from other languages. Grammars change in similar ways. Gradually, as rules morph into new rules (for example, ways of expression become acceptable which in previous generations were unacceptable – think of the who/whom distinction, which has nearly disappeared from natural speech), and in big jumps, as languages acquire whole new structures through processes like reanalysis or borrowing

WORDS AND GRAMMAR
But how close are the parallels between the evolution of words and the evolution of grammar? Answering this question will move us along the road to answering the big questions about the nature of linguistic and human diversity. Using tools from evolutionary biology, we developed a compu-tational model for estimating at what pace and in what manner the different languages of this family evolved. In particular, the model discerned wheth-er words and elements of grammar were evolving

at a fast, medium or slow pace.

The diagram below shows how the lexical and grammatical elements of the Austronesian languages evolved differently over the history of the family. The redder branches of the tree show where change happened more quickly and the bluer branches where it happened more slowly. The crosses mark big shifts in the rate of change. What is clear from these results is that the way

in which the words and the grammar of these languages evolved is very different. Interestingly, measurements show that splits on a branch — points in when new languages are formed — are accompanied by a much bigger burst of change in the lexicon than in the grammar.

An important question for further work, then, is to ask what drives the differences in rates of change of different grammatical features. There are hints in the data that grammatical features that speakers are consciously aware of tend to change more quickly, and features which are more abstract and less available to conscious reflection change more slowly.

#### WHAT NEXT?

As our estimates of the age of humans as a species get older and older, we are realising that human language is not just a recent add-on. Rather, it's something with deep evolutionary roots in human (and non-human) consciousness. This is important for the science of human cognition in general, with particular significance in psychology and linguistics.

These large scale studies in linguistic diversity have only recently become possible thanks to to parallel improvements in the quality of data we have access to and the quality of the methods we have available to analyse them. Many linguists are embracing the movement towards open data and reproducible science. There are massive interdisciplinary efforts underway to publish open and interoperable data sets in many different domains, and computational tools for studying evolution are

becoming richer and more flexible.

But as tools and methods improve, world linguistic diversity is decreasing. Nearly half the peo-ple in the world today speak at least one of Man-darin, Hindi, Spanish, English or Arabic, and thou-

sands of smaller languages are facing extinction. Comparative studies of language are therefore becoming more urgent as a window into the diversity of the human mind.

#### West Bengal has 40 per cent child brides: Survey in SC

NEW DELHI, OCT 12 (PTI): West Bengal has got the dubious distinction of having the maximum number of married girl children at 40 per cent, a survey considered by the Supreme Court

The apex court, which has delivered a historic verdict declaring sexual intercourse with minor wife as rape, quoted the survey in its order, say-ing the figure of 40.7 per cent of child brides significantly rises to 47 per cent in rural areas of the

populous eastern state.

The report said the lowest percentage of child marriages was recorded in Punjab and Kerala at 7.6 per cent.

According to the Na-tional Family Health Survey 2015-16, the states with second and third highest percentage of brides under 18 years of age were Bihar and Jharkhand with 39 and 38 per cent respectively.
The report was sub-

mitted before a Supreme Court bench of Justices M B Lokur and Deepak Gupta, which ruled that sex with a wife who is under 18 years of age is an offence under the Indian Penal Code with an imprisonment of up to 10 years.

As per the data which assumes significance in the light of the apex court's verdict, the national capital of India recorded 13 per cent of the child brides in 2015-16, which has come down from 22.7 per cent in 2005-06.

The states of Rajasthan, Maharashtra and Gujarat have 35.4, 25 and 24.9 per cent of child brides, the report said.

### India end U-17 WC campaign in agony, suffer 0-4 loss to Ghana

New Delhi, Oct 12 (PTI): Rank outsiders ended their maiden FIFA U-17 World Cup campaign in a cry of pain and agony as they were handed a 0-4 thrashing by two-time champi-ons Ghana in their final group match here today.

In their previous match against Iran, Germany dominated the ball possession but their forwards were out of sorts as they had just four shots on tar-



get while the Asian team had 12 such efforts, out of which they scored four goals.

If it was not for Germany goalkeeper Luca Plogmann making several important saves, Iran may have won that match in Margao by a bigger margin.

Germany have players of

calibre of striker and cap-tain Jann-Fiete Arp who recently made his Bundesliga debut for Hambur, but they will have to quickly forget their humiliation by Iran and on track with a win against

Guinea tomorrow.

### FTII students write open letter to Kher, flag several issues

PUNE, OCT 12 (PTI): The students of FTII have written an open letter to newly-appoint-ed chairman Anupam Kher, voicing their opposition to the short-term courses started by the acting school and drawing his attention to a slew of issues being faced by them.
The 62-year-old veteran

was yesterday appointed chief of the city-based Film & Tele-vision Institute of India (FTII), an autonomous body under the Union Ministry of Information and Broadcasting.

The FTII was started to impart learning on different aspects of filmmaking, but it is now slowly being turned into a school that runs short-term crash courses for "generation of funds", said the letter.



The letter has been signed by FTII Students' Association (FSA) president Robin Joy and general secretary Rohit Kumar.

'We sincerely believe the short-term courses being run edge on film-making in such a short duration," it said

A government institute that exists to provide education to students from all sections of the society shouldn't be driven by the agenda of funds generation, which currently seems to be the aim of such short-term courses, the association alleged.

In the letter, the FSA took objection to events like Foundation Day and Open Day started by the institute and stated that over the past one year the administration has spent "large amounts" of money on such events.

"We, students, believe the amount of money being spent on lights, erecting set pieces in front of the campus can be spent on the infrastructure and in buying and repairing equipment which would only help us in finishing our projects on time."

Expressing apprehension about the implementation of the new syllabus, the FSA said there is a confusion among the faculties on the new credit-based semester (which replaced the earlier annual assessment system).

"Students are forced to sign undertakings to finish their courses 'on time'. However, the administration is not providing the resources essential to finish their projects on time," said the letter addressed to Kher.

The FSA took strong objection to the exclusion of student representatives from discussion pertaining to issues such as academics, syllabus, discipline, fee structure, staff and faculties in the aca-

demic council meetings.
"Considering the fact that the students are the prima-ry stakeholders and voting members in the academic council this move to exclude the student representatives is unconstitutional," stated the letter.

"Being aware of Mr Kher's association and activities in the past two to three years, we are asking him some questions through this letter and curious to know his take on them," said Joy. Yesterday, the students'

body, while questioning Kher's appointment as the FTII chairman, alleged there was a "conflict of interest" as the actor ran his own acting school in Mumbai.

### US should not look at CPEC from India's perspective: Pak

WASHINGTON, OCT 12 (PTI): Dismissing the US' concern over the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor, Pakistan's Interior Minister Ahsan Igbal has said that Washington should not look at the multi-billion project from India's perspective as it would provide a platform that would benefit all.

The CPEC will provide a platform for bringing together South and Central Asian, Middle Eastern and African countries by physically joining them through an economic cor-ridor, Dawn News quoted

Iqbal as saying.
The USD 50 billion CPEC passes through Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK), over which India has conveyed its protests to China. The area cov-ers Karakoram mountain ranges, including the Siachen glacier. India has been severely critical of the CPEC, saying the project violates its sovereign-ty as it runs through PoK.

Igbal, who was the keynote speaker at Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies here, urged the US to deal with Pakistan on its own "merit", instead of agging it to other states and issues in the region.

"CPEC is not a conspiracy against anyone. It is not a security plan. It s a plan for economic prosperity, which is bringing investment in the energy, infrastructure and other key sectors," said Iqbal when reminded of US objections to the pull a corridor.

Defence Secretary objections to the plan to

James Mattis last week said the CPEC passes through disputed ter-ritory and the US could not ignore this fact. This was seen in Islamabad as a direct endorsement of India's position on the project, which passes through PoK.

"It will benefit all and will provide a platform for bringing together South and Central Asian, Middle Eastern and African countries by physically joining them through an economic corridor," he said.

"So, I think, the US should not look at CPEC from the Indian perspec-tive, but as a source for peace, stability and prosperity in the region. CPEC can bring the much-need ed stability to a region that has suffered from war for the last several decades," Iqbal added.

"If the US looks at the region from India s per-spective, it will harm the region and US interests too. So, it s necessary that the US should view the situation from an independent perspective not from someone else s point of view," he said.

Viewing Pakistan from someone else s perspective would create complications and only from it, he added.

#### IS targets Damascus police HQ with suicide bombers DAMASCUS, Ост 11 to blow themselves up Three suicide blew them-

(AFP): selves up near the main police headquarters in Syria's capital Damascus today, killing at least two people, the interior ministry said. The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for the attack in a statement released via the Telegram messaging app. The assault was the

second time in a month that suicide attackers have targeted the capi-tal, which has been insulated from the worst of the violence in the wartorn country. State news agency SANA quoted Interior Minister Mohammad Shaar saying both of those killed were police officers.

Two of the suicide bombers detonated their explosives in front of the police HQ on Khaled Bin al-Walid street in central Damascus, his ministry said in a statement carried by state media.

"The terrorist sui-cide attackers tried to storm the police command headquarters... The guards opened fire on them, forcing them

before they entered the building and achieved

their goals," it added.
Police surrounded a third attacker behind the building who also blew himself up, the statement said. The interior ministry said two people had been killed and six wounded in the attack, among them two children.

The Britain-based

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights reported five dead, not including

the three attackers.

IS in its statement on Telegram said two attackers "entered the headquarters building and fought with those inside... then detonated their explosive vests".

Damascus police chief Mohammed Khairu Ismail told reporters at the scene in the central neighbourhood Qanawat that one of the dead was a policeman who tried to stop the bombers.
"One of our forces

grabbed one of the sui-cide bombers and prevented him from entering the building, so he blew himself up, killing the sergeant," Ismail said.

### 23 dead in 'catastrophic' California wildfires

Sensitive information about Australia's F-35 stealth fighter and other military hardware was stolen during a cyber attack last year, it has emerged. About 30 gigabytes of data was stolen - including details of the Joint Strike Fighter aircraft and P-8 Poseidon surveillance plane. Australia's defence industry

minister, Christopher Pyne, told: "Fortunately the data that has been taken is commercial data, not military data... it's not classified information. "I don't know who did it."

SANTA ROSA (US), OCT 12 (AFP): More than 200 fire engines and firefight-ing crews from around country were being rushed to California which have left at least 23 people dead and thousands homeless.

"This is a serious, catastrophic lifornia fire critical, catastrophic event," California fire chief Ken Pimlott told reporters. "We're not going to be out of the woods for a great number of days to

Pimlott said that after a respite on Tuesday winds kicked up again on Wednesday and the winds and dry conditions were hampering efforts to contain the blazes.

"We are still impacted by five years of drought," the director of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (Cal Fire) said.

"These fires were driven by the critically dry fuel bed," he added. "We are literally looking at explosive vegetation."

Pimlott said the death toll from the fires, among the deadliest ever in California, could be expected to go up further. Thirteen of the deaths have occurred in Sonoma County, a wine-pro-ducing region which has been particularly hard



hit, while six people have died in Mendocino Countv. There have been two and two in Yuba County.

Entire neighbor-hoods in Santa Rosa, a city of 175,000 which the county seat of noma County, have Sonoma been reduced to ashes. Thousands of people have been left homeless and 25,000 people have evacuated their homes in Sonoma County alone, according to officials.

More than 3,500 homes and businesses have been destroyed in-cluding several winer-ies in Sonoma and Napa counties, the heart of the state's wine production. Six hundred people have been reported missing in Sonoma County, but more than half of them have been located, Sherreporters.

"There are still 285 on our missing list that we're looking for," he

Pimlott said firefighters were battling a total of 22 wildfires that have burned over 170.000 acres (68,800 hectares) and that reinforcements had been requested.

He said 170 fire en-gines had been ordered from the neighbouring states of Arizona, Neva-da, Oregon and Washington and another 154 engines from elsewhere around the country. In addition, 60 firefighting crews from other states were on their way to California to provide assistance, he said.

Our primary goal is get these resources to the fires," Pimlott

He said 73 helicopters, 30 air tankers and nearly 8,000 firefighters were

currently taking part in the effort to extinguish the blazes. President Donald Trump has declared a major disaster in California, freeing up federal fund-ing and resources to help fight the fires. And Governor Jerry Brown declared a state of emergency in

eight counties.

Bob Nelson, 53, stopped in his black pickup truck at a police roadblock near Santa Rosa, said he fled his home on Sunday and returned on

"There was no damage," he said. "But then we got evacuated again.
"We don't know about

our house now," Nelson told AFP.

"I've got no idea. It's in the middle of two

fires."
Michael Desmond, 63, is bad: his home was one of hundreds destroyed by the blaze in the Coffey Park neighborhood of Santa Rosa.

"I feel violated; like a thief came in," said Desmond, who sobbed as he surveyed the rubble of the house where he grew up.

Much of the damage in Santa Rosa can be seen from US Route 101, the north-south highway which runs from California through Oregon to Washington state



The director left the meeting and Harvey asked me to stay and chat with him," she wrote

"As soon we were alone he began to brag about all the actresses he had slept with and how he had made their careers and spoke about other inappropriate things of a sexual nature. He then invited me to his room. I quickly declined and asked his assistant if my car was outside. She said wasn't and wouldn't be for a bit and I should go to his room. At that moment I felt very powerless and scared but didn't want to act that way hoping that I was wrong about the situation."

Delevingne said she walked into Weinstein's room. "When I arrived I was relieve to find another woman inches room and thought immediately I was safe," she continued. 
