# Act East policy will be made a reality: PM

KOHIMA, FEB 22 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi today expressed firm resolve that the Act East Policy would be made a reality in order to connect the people of the Northeast with South East Asian countries to foster speedy development.

He emphasised that the development of the Northeast was an essential component to realise the dream of a developed

Modi underlined improve ment in connectivity of the Northeast to achieve the target.

"Transformation of the region by transportation is being worked out to bring about faster development in the region," he said.

Modi was addressing a poll rally at Tuensang Town public ground in Nagaland ahead of as-

sembly poll on February 27.

He affirmed that the BJP-led NDA government was committed to the transformation of Nagaland.

"The dream of having a new India will go alongside with the vision of the Naga people to-wards having a new Nagaland," he said.

"Unless Northeast is developed, the dream of having a developed country will not be achieved and therefore BJP government is paying special attention to the requirement of the



region," Modi said.

He flagged connectivity issue of the Nagaland and said his government was working to overcome the problem.

"Connectivity is a connectivity is a fuge challenge in Nagaland. We are working relentlessly towards it. In less than four years, we have added 500 km of national highways. We have also planned to invest more than Rs 10,000 crore in the roads of Nagaland,"

Modi lauded the efforts of the Naga people towards peace and tranquillity in the region.

He emphasised on checking leakage of developmental fund provided by the Centre and said the loopholes would be plugged with the help of technology.

"With the help of technolo-

gy, we will plug the loopholes which are causing wastage of public money."

Apparently referring to former prime minister Rajiv Gandhi's comment that villages received only 15 paise out of Re 1 from the Centre, he said "with determination, we need to change this situation."

"Every penny of developmental fund sanctioned by the central government should reach the grass-root level," he said.

Dwelling on the prime fo-cus of Naga people - solution of vexed Naga political issue, Modi asserted that his government was making all efforts with all seriousness.

He also exuded confidence that within next few months an honourable and acceptable solution would be achieved for which all have to come together.

"Solution of the Naga political problem will strengthen the democracy of the country and therefore we will make all efforts

to solve the problem," he said.

Making a reference of the problems faced by the people of eastern Nagaland, Modi asserted that his government was willing to have talks with the organisations of the area to hammer out a solution.

"Eastern Nagaland Public

Organisation (ENPO) area is a huge area and therefore we will pay special attention for the area", he said adding the Centre was serious towards the protection of the Naga tradition and

culture.

Modi also announced that his government will spend around Rs 1,800 crore for mak-ing Nagaland's capital Kohima a smart city.

Making a statement in the

Nagamese dialect, Modi said, "The BJP-NDPP alliance power te ahise koele development apuni laga bosti te punchai dibo". (If BJP-NDPP alliance comes to power we will bring development to your villages)

"We want to provide a stable, inclusive and corruption-free government in the state", the prime minister said while urg-ing Nagas to elect BJP-NDPP candidates to bring about a change in the state.

"I assure you that NDPP-BJP will form a new government in Nagaland. This government along with that at the centre will drive Nagaland forward," he

The BJP has fielded 20 candidates and its alliance partner the NDPP 40 for the February 27 elections to the 60-member Na-

# Centre sets up committee on medicinal and aromatic plants for NE

The IMC would identify the gaps in the existing mechanism or institutional arrangements, suggest a policy inter-vention for optimally harnessing the medicinal and aromatic plants of the north-eastern region, an official statement said here today.

The committee will also suggest ways for accelerating the devel-opment of the sector, suggest a plan of action for the dovetailing of the schemes and pro-grammes of the ministries and departments It would also suggest

actionable measures to generate more livelihood opportunities, which would lead to the eco-nomic transformation of the region, based on cultivation and sustainable management of medicinal and aromatic plants, the statement said.

The committee will

create synergy among the various programmes of the Union government to enable the medicinal and aromatic plants sector become vibrant.

The IMC will fa-

among the ministries and departments in various programmes that are being implemented on conservation, sustainable management and development of medicinal plants in the north-east.

The first meeting of the committee is scheduled to be held on March 12 and it will be co-chaired by the secre-taries of the Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region (DoNER) and Ministry of AYUSH.

The IMC will have members from various ministries, departments and several organisa-tions in the relevant

# Indian billionaires' wealth equals 15% of GDP, poor becoming poorer: Oxfam

NEW DELHI, FEB 22 (PTI): Inequality in India is on the rise for the last three decades, so much so that the total wealth of Indian billionaires is 15 per cent of the GDP, thanks to the "lopsided" policies of successive governments, Oxfam India said

in a report today.

It said the wealthiest in India have cornered a huge part of the wealth created in the country through crony capitalism and inheritance, while people at the bottom are seeing their shares being reduced further.

"These inequalities are the result of package of reforms adopted during the big bang liberalisation of 1991 and the subsequent policies adopted," said Oxfam India CEO Nisha Agrawal. The report noted that by the latest es-

timates, the total wealth of Indian billionaires is 15 per cent of the GDP of the country; this has risen from 10 per cent only ve years ago.

In 2017, India had as many as 101

The report titled 'The Widening Gaps: India Inequality Report 2018', noted that the country ranks among the most unequal countries in the world on all parameters of income, consumption and wealth and the

reason behind this is the "lopsided" policy choices made by successive governments.

"Specific policy choices which favoured

capital rather than labour, and favoured skilled rather than unskilled labour, are part of the structure of the growth trajectory in India," the report said.

The report analysed various sources of data and describes how the path of inequality has changed in India-from being stagnant in 1980s, to its increase since 1991, and to its subsequent and continued

surge in recent years until 2017.
What is particularly worrying in India's case is that economic inequality is being added to a society that is already fractured along the lines of caste, religion, region and gender. Apart from being a moral concern, reducing inequality is central to the functioning of India's democracy, said Pro-fessor Himanshu, author of the report.

Agrawal further noted that the only way to reverse this trend is to increase tax collection through progressive direct taxation such as introducing wealth and inheritance taxes and spending them on health, education and nutrition for the poor, focusing specially on the early child-hood development of the poor.

"Only then can one hope to create

a more equal opportunity country and spread the benefits of high growth more widely," Agrawal added.

A report released by the international rights group Oxfam before the start of the World Economic Forum in Davos noted that the richest 1 per cent in India cornered 73 per cent of the wealth generated in the country last year.

The survey also showed that the wealth of India's richest 1 per cent increased by over Rs 20.9 trillion during 2017. On the other hand 67 crore Indians comprising the population's poorest half saw their wealth rise by just 1 per cent.



Adding to his achievements, Yougan was also awarded with Sangai Sangai Young Leader Award 2016 in Delhi and has been nominated for the Martha Farell Award 2018 for giving a voice to issues on alternative sexualities and gender equality.

# The Art of the Dodge ...and this is why problems remain

Only fools would expect USA to do something compassionate or considerate. We should have known this well from experience and history by now, but since the US footprint is so big and prominent across the world mindspace, there is no escaping its headlines. But not everything that comes out of the US of A is unhealthy, there are still some lessons one could learn well from the American life. In the latest instance, it is about this bizarre hyper-violence unique to USA mass shootings in schools. An 18-year-old expelled student with a history of violence and even social media admissions of becoming a "professional" school shooter managed to walk into a gun-store, pick up an assault rifle, go to his former school, shoot people, expend what must have been hundreds of bullets, kills seventeen people and walk away. This is not the first time such mass shooting has happened in the US. It will not be the last because it has now become such a divided people that all it requires is an artful dodge by the corrupt, compromised and the powerful for sup-porters to discover the fig leaf behind which they can tuck in the ugly profiteering that puts so many people

So, for once when there is no counter-argument to why assault weapons should be so easily available, the gun lobby agrees with the protestors and then takes the argument away from them by supporting proposals which seek that minimum age to be able to legally purchase a gun be raised from 18 to 21 and that bumpstock, a contraption which converts a semi-automatic weapon into a rapid firing machine. The Right Wing is lapping this up as a major initiative, but neither really is a significant climb down for the lobby which insists that USA remains the most weapon-dense community in the world. If there are no many guns around without any real need or cause, it is only a matter of time before they fall into the wrong hands. Not every killer buys a gun legally. The gun lobby also does not lose anything in the deal. For one, 18 year olds, even in USA, rarely have the money to splurge on guns, so that is not a significant market segment they are giving up. The proposal is also offensive because when one can vote, drive and drink at 18, what is the logic behind refusing them the right to bear arms. The problem is the easy access to weapons, not at what age they are available. And then, for all we know, the industry itself wanted to do away with bump stocks. Look at it this way, why would people purchase a proper fully automatic weapon at exorbitant prices and after deeper background scrutiny when they can pick up a cheaper add-on and convert the semis into automatic weap-ons? When they do so, the gun lobby loses potential profits. And then there is this mad proposal to arm and train teachers to keep schools safe. The imbeciles who propose such villainous plans are clearly not looking at safety, but the jump in gun sales that such a move

And these are the lessons that we everywhere else need to draw from art of the dodge that is currently on display in USA and has played out often in our country too. While one hand held up the obviously required ban on Triple Talaq, the other signed a law criminalizing it. No one paid enough attention but Triple Talaq was banned by the Courts, and it was the Government which went ahead and criminalized something which had already been declared invalid by the law. A clear mischief was at play to make criminals out of the ignorant. And then there is the end of subsidy on Haj which was billed as financial prudence. A gaggle of obvious misogynists repeat beti-padhao, beti-bachao enough times and people applaud then, drowning out the of-fensive tone of its leaders, the regressive reek of their own positions and the emptiness of anything worth-while being done for gender equality. It is a worry when noise can be allowed to run as substance, claims accepted as performance and misdirections allowed to fool us so easily. And this is why we need to leverage our distance and watch what unfolds in shallow US to then understand the dodges and hoodwinks we allow ourselves to fall for.

# **How Billy Graham's legacy** lives on in American life

On Feb. 21, Billy Graham, the evangelical Christian minister who was widely regarded as "America's pastor," died at the age of 99.

Graham is best known for his global "crusades" – rallies that attracted crowds in the millions – and for the spiritual counsel he provided to American presidents for over a half-century. But, what is less widely known is his contribution to the re-ligious language in American public

Americans before the mid-20th century were often ambivalent about religious language and images in public life. Graham helped change

Rhetoric linking the United States with a divine power, which Graham would later embrace, emerged on a large scale with the outbreak of the Civil War in 1861, M.R. Watkinson a Pennsylvania clergyman, encouraged the placement of "In God We Trust" on coins at the war's outset in order to help the North's cause. Such language, Watkinson wrote, would "place us openly under the divine protection."

In 1864, with the Civil War still raging, a group supported by the North's major Protestant denomi-nations began advocating to change the preamble of the Constitution. The proposed language would have declared that Americans recognized "Almighty God as the source of all authority and power in civil govern-

If the amendment's supporters had succeeded in having their way, Christian belief would be deeply embedded in the United States govern-

But, such invocations of God in national politics were not to last. Despite lobbying by major Protestant denominations such as the Methodists, this so-called Sovereignty of God amendment was never ratified.

Though "In God We Trust" was

to the increasingly common paper money. In fact, when coins were redesigned late in the 19th century, it disappeared from coins as well.

As I demonstrate in my book, these developments were related to the spread of secularism in the post-Civil War U.S. For many people at the time, placing religious language in the Constitution or on symbols of government was not consistent with American ideals.

### GRAHAM'S INFLUENCE ON RELIGIOUS POLITICS

In the 1950s, however, religious language found its way into government and politics, due in no small part to Billy Graham.
In 1953, at the strong encourage

ment of Graham, President Dwight Eisenhower held the first National Prayer Breakfast, an event that brings together political, military and corporate leaders in Washington, D.C., usually on the first Thursday of February.

In the following years, Eisenhow-er signed a bill placing the phrase "In God We Trust" on all American currency and the phrase was adopted as the first official motto of the United

Both of these developments re-flected the desire to emphasize

Americans' religious commitment in the early years of the Cold War. Historians such as Jonathan Herzog have chronicled how leaders such as Eisenhower and Graham stressed the strong faith of the nation in setting the U.S. apart from the godlessness of Soviet communism. But, there were domestic concerns as well. Princeton University historian Kevin Kruse has shown that religious language was not merely rhetoric against commu-

Indeed, this belief in American religiosity had emerged over several decades. Conservative businessmen had allied with ministers and evangelical leaders such as Billy Graham, to combat the social welfare policies and government expansion that began with Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal. These wide-ranging programs, designed to tackle the Great Depression, irked many conservatives. They objected to government intervention in business and Roosevelt's support for labor unions.

As Kruse notes, this alliance of conservative business leaders and ministers linked "faith, freedom, and free enterprise.

To be sure. Billy Graham was not singularly responsible for all of these

developments. But as his biographers have noted, he loomed large in the religious politics of the 1950s

### GRAHAM'S LEGACY

The prevalence of religious language in U.S. politics that Graham helped inspire continues to this day. Indeed, the Trump administration has been

particularly swift to employ it.

In his address to the National Prayer Breakfast on Feb. 8, President Donald Trump emphasized the centrality of faith in American life. After describing the country as a "nation of believers," Trump declared that "our rights are not given to us by man" but "come from our Creator."

These remarks came a week after Trump linked religion with American identity in his first State of the Union address. On Jan. 30, he similarly invoked "In God We Trust" while proclaiming an "American way" in which "faith and family, not government and bureaucracy, are the center of the American life."

Trump's language captured the linking of faith and public life that Graham encouraged as he rose to fame nearly 70 years ago.

# Are religious people happier than non-religious people?

What makes people happy? This question can be difficult to answer. Happiness has been discussed throughout history. Philosophers, thinkers and activists, such as Aristippus, Aristotle, Zhuangzi, Jean Jacques Rous-seau, Jeremy Benthan and Bertrand Russell, have considered happiness and life satisfaction to be one of the highest goals of human moti-

But happiness and life satisfaction can be tricky to define. While both make up part of a person's well-being, happiness refers to an individual's emotions, feelings or

moods. Life satisfaction, on the other hand, is more to do with the way people might think about their life as a whole – including their relationships.

Previous research suggests the "happy person" is young, healthy, well-educated, well-paid, optimistic and extroverted. The same research found the happiest people tend to be religious, married, with high self-esteem and job morale and modest aspirations. It seems your gender and level of intel-

ligence don't necessarily come into it.
Research suggests that around the world, over
84% of people belong to or are connected to a religious group. And our recent research looks at whether different religions experience different levels of happiness and life satisfaction. The findings show that individual religiosity and their country's level of development both affect people's happiness and life satisfaction.

### HAPPINESS RESEARCH

Our study looks at a large number of different religious groups across 100 countries - from 1981 to



2014 – using data from the World Value Survey. Our findings suggest that Protestants, Buddhists and Roman Catholics are happier and more satisfied with their lives, compared with other groups. Jews, Hindus, Muslims, and the non-religious were in between, while Orthodox Christians were found to have the lowest happiness and life

In our research, we found that many factors were positively associated with happiness and life satisfaction. These included being Protestant, female, married and younger (16 to 24 years old). The household's financial situation also came into it, as did a person's state of health and freedom of

We discovered that national pride and trust were important in terms of happiness rankings, as was having friends, family and leisure time. Attending weekly religious practice was also discovered to be an important factor. On the other hand, being unemployed and on a low income was negatively associated with happiness and life satisfaction.

A closer look at the magnitude of the association between these factors and hap-piness and life satisfaction revealed that health, financial stability and freedom of choice, or control over one's life were the most important factors. But more research needs to be done to understand why some religious groups are happier and more

### satisfied than others. A GLOBAL OBJECTIVE In recent years, interest in

well-being research has surged – with economists such as Nobel laureate Jo-seph Stiglitz agreeing it is time to shift the emphasis from measuring economic production, to measuring people's happiness and life satisfaction.

But to make human happiness the overall guide to human progress requires good data on the quality of human lives – and this is something that is sadly still lagging in most countries.

In the meantime, it might be worth both individuals and governments engaging with positive psychology. New research shows that schools teaching positive psychology radically improves the happiness of pupils in countries as varied as Peru, China, Bhutan and Australia,

It's clear then that while happiness can mean different things to different people, there are some fundamental uniting principles that make us more likely to feel happy or unhappy. And as our find-ings suggest, by improving access to healthcare and supporting their basic financial needs, govern-ments can do much to help boost people's well-being and life satisfaction

# 59 pc candidates in Nagaland polls are crorepatis: ADR

KOHIMA. FEB 22 (PTI): Fifty-nine percent of the candidates for the February 27 Assembly elections in Nagaland are crore patis with JD(U) nominee Ramongo Lotha being the richest among them with a total wealth of Rs 38.92 crore, an analysis of the affidavits revealed.

The Association of Democratic Reforms (ADR), which analysed the affidavits of 193 aspirants out of a total of 196 candidates, found out that 114 candidates are crorepatis.

The findings were an-nounced by Hekani Jakhalu of YouthNet Nagaland, a prominent youth organisation, at a press meet here yesterday

The affidavits of three candidates could not be analysed as their affidavits in the public do-main of the Nagaland Chief Electoral Officer was not at all clear,

Lotha, a retired IAS offi-cer, has movable assets worth Rs 22.81.960 and immovable assets at Rs 38,69,40,000 taking his total wealth to Rs 38.92 crore, the ADR analysis said.

The JD(U) nominee is contesting the elections from Sanis seat in Wokha district.

Akavi N Zhimomi fighting on APP ticket from Ghaspani-I assembly seat in his affidavit has shown nil movable and immovable assets, the analysis said.

Nagland Chief Minister T R Zeliang contesting on Naga Peo-ple's Front (NPF) ticket from Peren seat has declared in his affidavit that his total assets (both movable and immovable) are worth Rs 3.52 crore, it said.

Former three-time chief minister and NDPP nominee from Northern Agamai-II seat

worth Rs 15.37 crore.

Another former chief minister K L Chishi has total assets of Rs 38.20 crore but he also has the highest liabilities among all the candidates at Rs 89 lakh, the analysis said. The other candidates with meagre assets are T Ngampai, Chinkai Konya and K

Kiko Konyak, Jakhalu said. Ngampai is the Congress candidate from Phomching seat and has total assets worth Rs 5,000, the analysis said.

Konya, the NPF nominee from Tehok seat, has total assets of Rs 10,000 while K Kiko Konyak, the NDPP candidate from Moka constituency, has total assets of Rs 20,000.

While 46 candidates have assets valued at Rupees five crore and above, 42 aspirants have assets at Rupees two crore and above, the analysis said.

Sixty nominees have assets worth Rs 50 lakh and above, 26 aspirants have assets at Rs 10 lakh and above and 19 are in possession of assets valued at less than Rs 10 lakh, it said.

Altogether 27 candidates have not declared their sources of income in their affidavits, Jakhalu said.

The ADR analysis also found

three candidates have declared criminal cases against them-selves. The candidates are one each from the NPF. NDPP and BIP.

While three candidates are illiterate, 16 candidates are class-8 pass and five are doctorates, the analysis said.

Only seven candidates are between 25 years and 30 years, 29 candidates are between 31 years and 40 years and the rest are above 40 years.

# Tea Board for preferential trade pact between India, China

KOLKATA, FEB 22 (PTI): The Tea Board today pitched for a preferential trade agreement in tea between China and India to boost exports of black tea and imports of green

Tea Board chairman P K Bezbaruah said here that India and China were not competitors as far as tea was concerned, but rather complement-ed each other.

On both sides, the duties at present were extremely prohibitive which was restricting exports from both the directions and needed to be lowered, he said speaking for the prefer-ential trade pact before a 22-member business delegation from Dali pre-fecture in China.

Eighty percent of Chi-na's annual tea production is green tea and 18 percent Oolong variety. while 98 per cent of the beverage produced in India annually is black tea. China's annual production was 2600 million kilograms, while India's was half of that, he said.

India exports around seven to eight million kg of tea to China, while the the latter's exports of green tea to India was not significant.

About non-tariff bar-riers in both the sides, he said that there should be harmonisation of max-imum residue limit for different pesticides by both the countries.

Bezbaruah also advocated greater collab-oration in research with Chinese universities.

The Dali delegation was headed by Chen Jian, secretary of Committee of Communist Party of China (CPC) of the prefecture.

The business delegates comprised areas of walnut, textile, tea, natural spring water, tourism, education and culture.

# Novels my way to respond in measured way: Nadifa Mohamed

New Delhi, Feb 22 (PTI): Somalian author Nadifa Mohamed says she is constantly enraged by conflicts and unrest across the globe and the only way she can calm herself and contribute anything meaningful is responding in a measured way through her novels.

There has to be respect for human life that you don't let people die. That's the line you don't cross. And I feel that this line has been

crossed," she rues.
"I am very aware of how much the present situation, present fears have impacted my ability to rea measured way is through fiction and my novel," London-based Mo-hamed, who was in India recently for the Jaipur Literature Festival, told PTI.

"I am constantly enraged by the news of conflicts, atrocities and unrest and the only way I can calm myself and contribute anything meaningful is through my novels written after adequate research," she says.

According to Mohammed, economic depressions like the Great Recession always bring out the most violent, most irrational responses politically.

ing it in the Muslim world, we are seeing it in too many places. The underlying reasons have been there for long and probably they are recurring. The recent energy behind the conflicts we are seeing, the instability we are seeing may be due

to the gratuity loss," she says. Mohamed, a Granta best young British novelist, is working on her third novel which is about miscar-riage of justice and deals with a murder case from the 1950s.

"The book has been in my mind for about 10 years. I intended it to be a very short and tight novel but it is now almost 600 pages long. It got

For her, what becomes a novel is something that gets under her skin. "It might be personal too. I have written a lot about my family or something that relates to a feeling I have had for a long period of time." She thinks she has been get-

ting deeper and deeper in trying to understand what people have been talking about constantly discrimination, justice, migration, self-identity.

"So I think the novel is still precious for that. There is no other way I know that you sit with someone, you sit with the story for days and days and really absorb it. I am not convinced that I have as much as of a transformative effect on

meaningful attention from them than anything else that I can think of," says Mohammed, who was born in the Somali city of Hargeisa in 1981 while Somalia was falling deeper into dictatorship.

In 1986, she moved to London with her family in what she thought was a temporary move but a couple of years later it be-came permanent as war broke out in Somalia.

Her father's stories were the basis of her debut novel "Black Mamba Boy".

Mohammed s next work "The Orchard of Lost Souls", set in Hargeisa, is the story of three women

born and raised in the Saba'ad refugee camp; Kawsar, a well-off widow in her 50s whose late husband was the city's chief of police before the public offices were purged; and Filsan, an ambitious young soldier in her late 20s.

On migration of authors to other countries, she says, I have noticed that many writers, not surely they are refugees, but they have moved either a lot or one big time in their childhood. So there must be something to do with leaving one world behind and entering a new world at a very formative age that enables or switches on the writer's mind.

Ariana Grande had been due to perform that section of the show, but was unable to travel to London "on doctor's orders".

Gorillaz were named best British group and their leader Damon Albarn used his acceptance speech to send a message about Brexit.

"This country is - believe it or not quite a small, little thing, right, but it's a lovely place and it's part of a beau-tiful world," he said. "But what I want to say is, don't let it become isolated,
