Himagiri, the project developer, has a warehouse to store explosives

at Lingzya.

Since the construction of the Power Project has been suspended since 2008, they had approached to the Controller of Explosives at Kol-kata to dispose the expired explosives stored in the warehouse.

The Controller of Ex-

plosives had nominated an expert to destroy the explosives at the ware-house site. While disposing the explosives by the explosive expert on 24 Mar. a blast occurred which led to the damage of property of the public

of Linzya.

The Panchayats and public have complained that they were being ig-

vestigation was required. It was further informed that they have asked for medical relief first as a medical camp is required immediately for patients who have suffered due to the explosion.

The Deputy Speaker inspected each and every house and interacted with the Panchayats and public.



Meanwhile, there is no data available on the amount of losses incurred by the farmers.

It is to be mentioned

here that the ban on the import of several vege-tables and crop items is scheduled to come into force soon in the state al-though no specific date has

been provided so far. While lost farmers have welcomed the ban, the recent weather conditions have definitely dampened spirits and roused concerns over the feasibility of such a ban.

Sikkim Against Addiction Towards Healthy India [SAATHI] conducted a work-Addiction shop on the multiple aspects of substance abuse and its solutions for School Managing Committees of various schools at Singtam in East

Sikkim today.

Deputy Director, Human Resource Development Department, AK Bhandari, attended the programme as chief guest along with 40 teacher coordinators and SMC members, a press release

Principal of Government Senior Secondary School, Singtam, KB Chettri, who was one of the resource persons for the programme, spoke about how habit is formed due to experimentation and leads to dependency. He expressed hope for the members to understand that the SMC members have a larger role to play because of how they can influence the society to take up the matter of drug abuse as a disease to be treated.

"By bridging the gap between parents and children, by creating more parteacher associations which focuses on listening to the grievances of children and tries to under-stand the adolescent behavior, a lot of substance use can be prevented. The tell-tale signs of drug use could be apparent and yet may go unnoticed if we are not on constant vigilance," said Mr Chettri

Chief guest Mr Bhandari, in his address, elaborated on

the importance of school curriculum to encourage communication between teachers and students so as to build a trusting relationship.

Psychiatrist, Singtam Hospital, Dr Satish Rasaily, asserted that the root cause of substance abuse is peer pressure and the ultimate matter of how these cases are handled rests in the hands of the society and family.

"Since different people

have different ways of using, they cannot undergo the same treatment. Rehabs are not for

bitual users. Community has a huge role in understanding how to make sure that users and dependents are not stigmatized but helped," added Dr Rasaily.
School Management Com-

mittee member, Rangpo Min-ing School, Nagendra Sharma, focused on the importance of moral values to be inculcated in school curriculum.

'Moral value could help children master the art of discrimination and Sharma. SAATHI teacher coordi-

ators from Melli SSS, Tashi Lhamu and Deepa Rai, stated that their schools had multiple cases pertaining to use of tobacco products, cannabis, gutka, etc. They further in-formed that after interven-tion through SAATHI, they realized that helping young minds find goals and purpose truly propels them to channelize their energies in progressive activities.

"I have not accused the Chief Minister in particular; the comment was directed at the Government and since the CM heads the government I had to take his name but there were no other in-tention," he said. The Chief Minister,

in turn, said that Sikkim and Darjeeling should bury the past and launch a new beginning to the relationship by giving full support and co-operation to each other for the progress and pros-perity of Sikkim and the

Darjeeling Hills.

The Chief Minister raised concerns over issues of security and safety of NH10 which is essential for the well-being of Sikkim and the Sikkimese people and urged that NH 10 be always

kept open.
To this, Mr Tamang responded, "There will be no political disturbances or strikes that will cause NH bandhs any more. No strike, not even for 12 hours will be allowed now in the Dar-jeeling hills."

Tamang Mr Tamang also said that both the states should work together for the overall development and begin afresh with continued support and cooperation

Both the leaders decided to take up certain pertinent issues jointly with the Central Government such as tribal status for the 11 leftout communities, overhead stations for the upcom-ing railway line and taking consent for construc tion of towers of hydel projects.

It was also decided that a meeting regard-ing reciprocal transport arrangement for taxis through Secretary-lev-el dialogue would take place shortly so that a consensus is reached which would be beneficial to both the states.

was also decided that a discussion on creation of tourist circuit comprising Sikkim and Darjeeling Hills would also be taken up.

### Westerly Disturbances Pour a Reminder

### Water on the streets expose drained initiatives and opportunities

The persistent downpours of the past week and more are serving as timely reminders of everything that remains ignored in the capital. No sooner do the clouds open up that traffic grinds to a halt, roads having become ferocious rapids making one wonder what the capital has learned from the numerous slips and spillovers that descend on Gangtok every monsoon. The storm water drains cannot channel these short bursts of rain caused by westerly disturbances and that makes one wonder what the monsoon, which will be heavy this year if the present prequel is any indication, have in store for the capital.

What use are storm drains if they don't carry away thunderstorm waters? The only reassuring signs after every shower are the UD&HD workers struggling to unclog the drains, again and again and again. At least someone is responding quickly enough. But what continues to fail the capital is the science behind its jhoras and drains. Either the engineering deployed in their training is all wrong or the training itself is suspect because there is no way that one can be led to believe that the storm drains have consumed crores in construction and repairs and corrective works just to look pretty in fresh coats of cement. They are supposed to drain surface run off, not unleash torrents on the roads. When they do the latter, they not only expose the shortsighted planning that went into their training, but also damage and weaken roads ahead of the monsoons. One could also blame the carelessly "dropped" construction material and the occasional pile of overnight garbage for the clogging, but that can be easily remedied.

That said, what the failure of the jhoras and drains also expose is the quick exit civic enlightenment made the moment donor funding was no longer at hand to publicize citizen-initiatives to manage garbage disposal. Every jhora that spills over to the streets and every drain that finds itself blocked whenever water needs to channel through it, disgorge not just rain waters but also everything that one calls garbage. The jhoras, unfortunately, continue to double as convenient waste bins and the water pipelines continue using these channels as convenient pathways from source to home. Then, of course, there are some sewage lines that still continue to open directly into jhoras greeting many mornings with a stench for everyone unlucky enough to be living near them.

The recent wave of evening downpours is welcome. They washed the dry hills and beat down the dust. Unfortunately, they might have came a little late for the farmers and the hail did not help either, but, if it reminds the Gangtokians [private and public] of all the responsibilities they continue to ignore, it can still be considered timely enough.

## 60 years in orbit for 'grapefruit satellite'the oldest human object in space

Sixty years ago, a grapefruit-sized aluminium sphere with six antennas and some tiny solar cells was launched into Earth orbit. The Vanguard 1 satellite is still up there and is the oldest human-made object in space. It's our first

piece of space archaeology.

Other early satellites –
such as Sputnik 1, the first such as sputnik 1, the first satellite to leave Earth in 1957, and Explorer 1, the first US satellite – have long since re-entered the atmosphere and burnt up.

Vanguard 1's legacy, as we enter the seventh de-cade of space travel, is a new generation of small satellites changing the way we interact with space

### MAKING THE FIRST ROAD MAP FOR SPACE

By the early 1950s, the second world war's rocket technology had devel-oped to the point where the first satellite launch was imminent.

The global scientific community had been working towards a massive cooperative effort to study the Earth. called the International Geophysical Year (IGY), to take place in 1957-58. What could be better than measuring the Earth from the outside?

Everything we knew about the

space environment we had learned from inside the envelope of the at-mosphere. The first satellite could

change everything.

The IGY committee decided to add a satellite launch to the program, and the "space race" suddenly be-

Six nations were predicted to have the capability to launch a satel-lite. They were the United States, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom,

France, Japan and Australia.

This was before NASA existed.
The United Nations space treaties had not yet been written. The IGY was effectively building the first road map for using space.

WAGING PEACE IN THE COLD WAR Vanguard 1 was intended to make the US the first nation in space - hence its name, meaning "leading the way". The term also refers to the advance troops of a military attack

Space exploration was not just about science. It was also about winning hearts and minds. These first satellites were ideological weapons to demonstrate the technological superiority of capitalism - or communism.

The problem was that the IGY was a civilian scientific program, but the rocket programs were military.

Project Vanguard was run by the US Naval Research Laboratory. Public perception was important, and they tried to give the satellite a civilian spin to present the US's intentions in space as peaceful.

This meant the launch rocket should not be a missile, but a scientific rocket, made for research purposes. Such "sounding rockets" were, however, part of the military purposes was programs too - their purpose was to gather information about the lit-tle-known upper atmosphere for weapons development.

### KEEP WATCHING THE SKIES!

The astronomer Fred Whipple, from the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, had an idea for the IGY satellite program that would help Project Vanguard present the right image and contribute to the scientific outcomes.

It was all well and good to launch a satellite, but you also had to know where it was in space so that you could collect its data. In the 1950s the technology to do this was still in And in the words of science fiction

author Douglas Adams, space is big. Really big. When something the size of a grapefruit is launched, you can predict where it should end up, but you don't know if it's there until you've seen it. Someone has to look for it.

This was the purpose of Whipple's Project Moonwatch. Volunteers – nowadays we would call them citizen scientists – across the globe watched for the satellite using binoculars and telescopes supplied by the Smithsonian. But their first satellite sighting was not Vanguard 1. The Soviet satellite Sputnik 1 became the first human artefact in orbit on October 4, 1957.

VANGUARD 1'S DESCENDANTS Six months later, on March 17, 1958, the little polished sphere was lofted up to a minimum height of around 600km above the Earth, and there it has stayed, long after its batteries died. Technically, Vanguard 1 is space junk; but it doesn't pose a great collision risk to other satellites. It has sur-vived so long simply because its orbit is higher than the other early satellites.

The historians Constance Green and Milton Lomask say that Vangaurd 1 is the "the progenitor of all American space exploration today". It wasn't just the satellite, it was the

the tracking network hosted by multiple nations. It was Soviet leader Ni-

kita Krushschev who called Vanguard 1 the "grapefruit satellite", and he didn't mean it as a compliment. But funnily enough, after satellites weighing thousands of kilograms and the size of double-decker buses, the current trend is back to small satellites.

Rather than fruit, these satellites are likened to loaves of bread or washing machines. They're cheap to build, with off-the-shelf components, and cheap to launch. They're not meant to stay in orbit for centuries. They'll do their job for a few months or years, and then self-immolate in the atmosphere.

There has been a long tradition of amateur satel-

lites, but now space is more accessible than ever before. Students and space start-ups can get into orbit at a fraction of the cost it used to take. It's revitalising the space economy and allowing a greater number of people

For example, QB50 is an international collaboration to launch 50 cubesats to explore the lower thermosphere. So far, 36 have been launched, including three from Australia last year.

Elon Musk's SpaceX company is planning to launch a network of more than 7,500 small satellites over the next few years, to deliver broadband internet. (There are major concerns about how they will contribute to the space junk problem, however).

When Vanguard 1 was launched,

its only companions were Explorer 1 and Sputnik 2. Soon it may have thousands of descendants swarming

The little satellite meant to represent the peaceful uses of outer space is a physical reminder of the competi-tion to imprint space with meaning in the early years of the Space Age. Now, 60 years on, it seems we are on the cusp of a new age in space.

## Is Sikh extremism really active in Canada?

Both the Liberals and New Democrats have recently been forced to deal with an issue that usually isn't part of the political agenda in Canada – Sikh extremism. oth the Liberals and New Democrats have recently

Justin Trudeau went on the defensive when it was discovered that Jaspal Atwal, convicted of the attempted murder of an Indian politician in 1986, was invited to a reception at the Canadian High Commission during the prime minister's recent visit to India. The prime minister subsequently stated his government supports a united India and condemned those who used violence in their campaign for an independent Sikh state, Khalistan.

Meanwhile, Jagmeet Singh, the first Sikh to be cho-sen to head a major Canadian political party, has also faced questions about his position on Khalistan. The new NDP leader said he condemns "all acts of terror-ism in every part of the world, regardless of who the perpetrators are or who the victims are."

Canada is not the first western democracy to be accused of harbouring Sikh extremists. In the buildup to Trudeau's visit, reports in Indian media proclaimed that such "radicals" had "taken over most gurudwaras in Canada, the U.S. and the U.K., and organize events where the themes of Khalistan and persecution of

### Sikhs in 1984 are a running refrain." A PARALLEL HISTORY? SIKHS IN BRITAIN

Indeed, similar reports about "Sikh radicalisation" in Britain in 2015 led me to conduct research on the issue. I analyzed media reports about Sikhs, interviewed Sikh activists and held a series of community consultations to ascertain the main issues and narratives.

By mapping historical events, I found that Sikh activities in Britain fundamentally changed in 1984 following two events: The storming of Harmandir Sahib (also known as the Golden Temple) during the Indian government's Operation Bluestar in June 1984 and the violence that took place against Sikhs across India in November 1984 following the assassination In April 2017, this anti-Sikh violence was recognized

genocide by the Ontario legislature. Before '84, Sikhs in Britain had focused on campaigning for the right to wear turbans in the workplace nd on motorbikes and in schools. Some even raised funds to support India in the 1971 Indo-Pakistan war. However, the immediate aftermath of Operation Bluestar saw Sikhs in Britain lashing out at the Indian state for the "dishonour" caused to the community with the storming of Harmandir Sahib, regarded by Sikhs as their most significant and precious institution.

In Britain, the immediate response to Bluestar

saw Sikhs protesting in huge numbers at Hyde Park London in June 1984, a protest held annually ever since. This period also saw plots against Indian state officials, including an assassination attempt on Rajiv Gandhi, then the prime minister.

The reaction to Bluestar also saw increased sup-

port for the idea of Khalistan, In Britain, individuals seen to be speaking out against Khalistan or to be align-ing themselves closely with India became fatal victims of violence at this time, including the journalist Tarsem Singh Toor in 1986 and Darshan Das in 1987.

SIKHS IN CANADA

I found a similar chronology of events in Canada where, according to national census data, approximately 460,000 people identify as Sikh.

Canadian authorities were clearly unprepared for the emotional impact of the storming of Harmandir Sahib on Sikhs in Canada. Bob Burgoyne, who worked for the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS) at the time, noted how "it was our lack of understanding of Sikhs and how very emotional (they were) and how this single issue is what propelled us into what was a very tumultuous year."

As in Britain, the immediate aftermath of Oper-

ation Bluestar saw a number of peaceful protests across Canada against the Indian state.

Some violent attacks also occurred that were related

B.C. premier Ujjal Dosanjh and the murder of Canadian journalist Tara Singh Hayer. There were also plots and protests against Indian state officials including the 1986 assassination attempt on Malkiat Singh Sidhu.

In 1985, the Air India bombing took place, Canada's worst mass murder to date. This deplorable act, widely condemned by Sikhs at the time, remains the only act of terrorism outside India to have led to the

Although a number of violent incidents occurred involving Sikhs throughout the 1990s, the majority of these appear to be internal Sikh issues relating to gurdwara governance, the contested nature of religious authority and local factional politic: #ASKCANADIANSIKHS: THE

### IMPACT OF SIKH ACTIVISM

My research in Britain found five different types of Sikh activity beyond the simplistic labels of "fundamen-talist," "extremist" or "radical." These include: Social justice and humanitarian relief; diasporic nationalism around Khalistan; "enforcing" Sikh practices; "defending" the Sikh community against a variety of perceived "external threats;" and personal/factional disputes. Of these, Sikh activism around social justice and

humanitarian relief is the most publicly prominent category in Canada. This includes the Seva Food Bank in Toronto, Calgary Sikh Youth's Walk Away Hunger ogramme, the Seva food truck in Edmonton and B.C. Sikhs who delivered \$1 million worth of donations for Fort McMurray evacuees. Those participating in this activism use the Sikh concepts of sewa (selfless service) and langar (community kitchen) in a contempo-

Sikhs have responded to the recent public discourse and allegations of extremism and terrorism through the hashtag #AskCanadianSikhs, which emerged in response to the lack of Sikhs invited to participate in media discussions about Sikh issues. A key point being made is that many of the events being

referenced happened over 30 years ago. In my research, I made use of Sophia Moskalenko and Clark McCauley's distinction between radicalism and activism where "radicalism" is a "readiness to engage in illegal and violent political action" while activism is a "readiness to engage in legal and non-violent political action."

Given these definitions, it's clear that although the events in India in 1984 saw an immediate "radical" reaction from Sikhs around the world, much of the contemporary political activity being labelled "Sikh extremism" or "radicalism" is in fact activism focused on social justice.

In my research, I found no threat to the West or to the wider public from Sikh activism as highlighted in the 2017 public report on the terrorist threat to Canada which makes no mention of any terrorist threats by Sikhs in Canada.

In terms of the threat to India, the roles of the nine alleged Canada-based Khalistani operatives who were included in a list presented by the Punjab Chief Minister Amarinder Singh to Prime Minister Trudeau in February 2018 remain to be seen.

Given the parallels between the U.K. and Canada, it's worth noting that a key driver in contemporary Sikh activism are the events of 1984. Whether this is protesting against the "dishonour" caused to the community with the storming of Harmandir Sahib, seeking justice for human rights abuses around the events of June and November 1984, publicly articulating the need for Khalistan as an act of resistance against the Indian state or simply raising awareness of what occurred, the feeling that the events of 1984 remain unresolved remains an important issue for many Sikhs.

It will take open and honest discussions about crimes committed across the board in the leadup, during and following the events of 1984 for the communities affected to feel they can finally move on

## AWU students' stir enter 22nd day, Min says no mention of VC in Act

GUWAHATI, MAR 27 (PTI): As the Women's University dent's indefinite strike for a per-manent vice-chancellor entered its 23rd day today, state Education Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma told the assembly that there is no mention of the post in the Assam Women's University Act, 2013.

The state government has not

violated the act as there is no mention of the post of vice-chancellor in it and regular teachers were not appointed as no advertisements were given for the purpose, he said.

Abdul Khaleq of Congress had

raised the issue in the assembly and questioned why a permanent VC had not been appointed though about five years had passed since the University, the only one of its kind in the north east, began classes.

He also said that the government is trying to close down the univer-sity when Sarma himself as education minister in the erstwhile Tarun Gogoi-led Congress government had passed the Assam Women's University Bill in 2013.

Sarma in his reply said, "The state government has not violated the Assam Women's University Act as there is no mention of the post of vice-chancellor in the Act.



"Tarun Gogoi was the Chief of the University as per the Act (which states chief minister is the head of the institution). Why did Gogoi not oint a VC then ?"

Stating there are no professors but assistant professors only on contractual and ad-hoc basis in the university, Sarma said no advertisements were given for appointment to the regular posts. He said Assam Agricultural Uni-

versity Vice-chancellor and registrar have been functioning as the Women's University's mentor and regis-

trar respectively.

There are 74 teachers in the University, besides 15 non teaching staff on contractual and ad-hoc basis. Sarsaid adding they do not receive UGC scale salaries.

The University has been witnessing indefinite stir by its students since March 5 for a permanent VC

and against downgrading it to a technical institute. The students had also held a 36-hour hunger strike from March 19.

Speaker Hiten Goswami address ing a press meet in the Assembly premises appealed to the media to have a positive outlook on the sub ject "so that a negative message does not go out"

Constructive discussion should be held on the issue in the House,

he said adding the students of the University should withdraw their agitation.

According to AWU Students' Forum President Chinmovee Gogoi. the students want a written under-taking from the government on the appointment of a permanent VC and transforming the institute into a fullfledged university.

On March 23 former Tarun Gogoi visited the campus and lent his s port to the agitation.

After his visit Gogoi had tweeted: "Assam Women's University was one of my dream project for empowering the women.

It is not only a pride of Assam but of the whole country. Assam BJP Govt's decision on AWU exposes the hollow promises of flagship program 'BetiBachaoBetiPadhao' ".

Protests had been held across upper Assam in support of the AWU students. Effigies of Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal and Sarma were burnt and nearly 175 colleges under Dibrugarh University organised satyagraha marches.

The agitation has garnered sup port from students and teachers of . INII TISS BHII NEHII IIT-Kharagpur, Jadavpur University and Sikkim University among others.

### Mizoram yet to receive Rs 24.7 cr from Centre for setting up medical college AIZAWL, MAR 27 (PTI): The Centre had sanctioned

Rs 126.72 crore for setting up the first and only medical college in Mizoram but the state was yet to receive the entire amount, state health minister Lal Thanzara informed the assembly today.

Replying to a question from Dr K. Beichhua of the opposition Mizo National Front (MNF), Lal Thanzara said that of the sanctioned amount, the state government was yet to receive an allocation to the tune of Rs 24.7 crore.

He said that the expenditure incurred for establishment of the medical college, to be named as Mizoram Institute of Medical Education and Research (MIMER), till date was Rs 18.06 crore.

### Australia PM calls for end to cricket sledging

SYDNEY, MAR 27 (AFP): Australia's prime minister called for an end to sledging in cricket today saying it was "right out of control" as he urged the sport to clean up its image amid a ball-tampering scandal.

Malcolm Turnbull described the cheating crisis in which captain Steve Smith admitted to masterminding a plot to change the ball's condition during the third Test against South Africa on Saturday as a "shocking affront to Australia".

He demanded Cricket Australia act decisively in investigating the incident. The governing body is expected to provide an update tomorrow.

Turnbull added that

authorities needed to crack down on sledging
-- verbal abuse involving players on both sides -- if it wanted cricket to "once again (be) held up as a

"I think there has to be the strongest action taken against this practice of sledging," he told reporters in Canberra. "It has got right out of con-trol ... it should have no place (in cricket).

"The game of cricket ... should be one that once again is held up as a role model."

The Test series be-tween South Africa and Australia was ill-tempered even before Saturday's ex-

plosive admissions.

The first Test in

Durban earlier this Durban earlier this month was plagued by an ugly row between vice-captain David Warner and South Africa's

Quinton de Kock.
CCTV footage showed Warner being restrained by team-mates as he appeared to lose his temper during a confrontation on a stair se as the players walked to their dressing rooms.

The incident was reportedly over a jibe about Warner's wife Candice, with the Australian

## Argentina have a 'debt' to settle at World Cup: Messi

BUENOS AIRES, MAR 27 (AFP): Argentina captain Lionel Messi admitted Monday that his generation has a score to settle at the World Cup in Russia after a series of agonising near misses in major tournaments.

"The debt we owe is to ourselves, not to the people. We always give our all, we reached three finals. We haven't been far off," Messi said in an interview with Fox Sports.

Argentina lost the 2014 World Cup final to Germany 1-0 after extra time and then finished runners-up at successive Copa America tournaments, losing to Chile on penalties in both 2015 and 2016

"We always take each World



Cup as a big opportunity, and now more than ever because an important generation will move on, several players will change," Messi said, ahead of Tuesday's friendly against Spain in Madrid.

Vice-captain

Mascherano has already announced he will retire from international duty after the World Cup, while Sergio Ague-ro, Angel Di Maria and Gonzalo Higuain will all be 30 come the

Messi will turn 31 during the competition. He has yet to make a decision on his Argentina fu-ture but would be 35 by the time of the 2022 World Cup in Qatar.

and in Monday's 4-1 defeat
to the Czech Republic wore bandages or long sleeves on their arms, seemingly to hide

Media reports said the players had been told to cover up while playing for China, who are coached by the Italian World

Cup winner Marcello Lippi. China's most heavily inked player, central defender Zhang Linpeng, did not feature in ei-ther of the two heavy home defeats in the China Cup despite normally being a first

He was officially left out because of injury, but some fans suggested he had been dropped because of numerous tattoos on

his arms and on his neck.
Chinese footballers are not generally as heavily tattooed as their international counterparts, but the growing trend has caught the government's attention as it cracks down on what it sees as behaviour contrary to the ruling Communist Party's

alues and morals".

In Monday's defeat by the



Czech Republic, midfielder Cai Huikang wore long sleeves that covered up his tattoos and fel-low substitute Wei Shihao had a bandage that masked the ink on one bicep.

There has been no official

ban from the Chinese Football Association (CFA), but reports in local media say a ruling is imminent and it could be part of a larger move against Chinese sportsmen with tattoos.

Lin Dan, regarded as the best badminton player of all time, is among the Chinese stars who would have to cover up.
China have improved since

the 69-year-old Lippi took over in October 2016, but he was unable to get them to this sum-mer's World Cup and they have now suffered two heavy losses in five days in front of their own

Lippi apologised after the latest mauling.

"The game truly reflected

the gap between Chinese football and European football," the Italian, who guided his country

to World Cup glory in 2006, said.
"Not only compared with
European first-class teams like France, Spain and Germany, but also European teams like Wales

and the Czech Republic, the gap is all-round," The Paper quoted him as saying.
Chinese fans though pointed

the finger at the CFA and said the governing body should be more concerned with the state of the national team than the players' tattoos.

"CFA finally found the prob-

lem of Chinese football! The next step should be controls on perms, smoking and haircuts," one mocked on Weibo, China's equivalent of Twitter.

Another wrote: "They play

like crap and don't reflect why, but try to control tattoos..."

The Antiguan, one of the greatest batsmen of all time, was part of the West Indies World Cup-winning teams in 1975 and 1979.

"West Indies have a World Cup pedigree and that makes all of us proud in the Caribbean," said the man who was also in 1983 team that lost the final to India and captained his country in the 1987

"You've got to try everything that is possible to improve the teams and the standard of play," he

said.
"More participants will be good for international cricket.

## Putin blames Russia mall fire on 'criminal negligence'

Russian President Vlad imir Putin todav blamed the mall fire that killed at least 64 people in the Siberian city of Kemerovo on "criminal negligence" as he visited the site two days after the tragedy.

At least 64 people, many of them children, died when a blaze raged through the busy shopping centre in the industrial city on Sunday, one of the deadliest fires recorded in Russia over the past century.
Putin flew to Kem

erovo Tuesdav as questions swirled about the Kremlin's handling of the country's latest manmade disaster.
"What is happen-



ing here? These are not ed hostilities. is not an unexpected release of methane. People, children came to relax," Putin told officials in Ke-

merovo after laying flowmorial of flowers, stuffed children's toys and balloons near the gutted mall's facade.

"We are talking about demographics but are losing so many people. Because of what? cause of some criminal negligence, slovenliness," Putin said in comments released by the Kremlin.

**ElseWhere** 

"The first feelings when they speak about the number of victims and the number of dead children... one feels like wailing -- not crying," Putin said in televised

remarks.
The Kemerovo region declared three days of mourning beginning today.

But many critics won-dered why the Kremlin did not call a nationwide day of mourning and said national television channels did not pull entertainment programmes from their schedule fast enough.

Some Muscovites are planing a vigil in the city

several Russian cities declared a period of mourning in solidarity with Kemerovo.

Investigators witnesses said many people -- including chil-dren - were burned alive because emergency exits were locked, notably at a multiplex cinema where children were watching cartoons.

Investigative The Committee said a criminal probe has been opened and that five peo-ple have been arrested including an official of the mall's security firm who is suspected of deactivating the public address system when the fire broke out.

### Sri Lanka sinks bullet proof vehicles, LTTE ship

COLOMBO, MAR 27 [PTI]: Sri Lankan Navy today dumped in sea several bullet proof vehicles, including an LTTE ship, used by former presidents during the three-decade long civil war to prevent them from falling into "wrong hands

The vehicles, including one used by Vinay-agamurthi Muralitharan, the former LTTE deputy leader who later be came a politician, were dumped in the deep sea area off the western coast and destroyed last morning, the Navy said.

It said the vehicles

used by Presidents IR Jayawardene, Ranasing-he Premadasa, Chandrika Kumaratunga and Mahinda Rajapaksa were sunk after dismantling their communication equipment.

The move was to prevent them from falling into "wrong hands" if they were disposed of through public auctions, it added

Armored vehicles became part of politicians' retinue due to LTTE's feared suicide squads. They allegedly assassinated several top leaders through suicide attacks, Premadasa including Premadasa who was President between 1989 to 1993.

Kumaratunga, President between 1994 and 2005, survived an assassination attempt carried out by the suicide squad while suffering severe eye injuries.

The Navy had also sunk an LTTE ship used to transport their arms supplies from Indonesia, the Navy said.

The ship, which be-longed to the LTTE fleet previously, was taken control of by the Navy in Malaysia and brought back to Colombo.

According to the government figures, around 20,000 people are missing due to various conflicts including the 30year- long separatist war with Lankan Tamils in the north and east which claimed at least 100,000

### North Korean leader Kim visits China: Reports

BEIJING, MAR 27 [PTI]: Speculation is rife that Kim Jong Un made a sur-prise visit to China after media reports that a special train believed to be carrying the North Korean dictator arrived here.

Chinese foreign min-istry spokeswoman Hua Chunying, however, said at a media briefing that she had "no information for the moment" about reports that Kim visited China. "The information will be published in due course," she said.

If confirmed, it would be Kim's first overseas trip since he took over power in 2011 after his father's death

Japan's Kyodo news agency, citing unidenti-fied sources, reported that a high-ranking North Korean official had arrived in the Chinese cap-

ital on Monday afternoon.
Japanese broadcaster
Nippon TV showed footage of a train -- similar to the one used for foreign visits by Kim's late father Kim Jong Il -- at a Bei-jing station. There were also reports about heavy security on the Chi-na-North Korea border and later at a guesthouse where prominent North Koreans have stayed in

the past.
Hong Kong-based
'South China Morning
Post' reported that while it is yet to be confirmed if the person is Kim himself, the security arrangements suggest it is some one of great significance.

Historically, the visits of North Korean leaders to China, the country's neighbour and closest ally, were always shrouded in secrecy. Kim's late father Kim Jong-il too used to visit China secretly.

Tensions temporarily abated in the Korean Peninsula recently over North Korea's nuclear programme after US President Donald Trump agreed for a summit meeting with Kim.

## Saudi-led coalition threatens retaliation against Iran over missiles

RIYADH, MAR 27 [AFP]: A military coalition led by Saudi Arabia has threatened retaliation against arch-foe Iran, accusing the Shiite power of being behind a barrage of Yemeni rebel missile attacks on the kingdom.

Saudi forces said they intercepted seven missiles on Sunday, including over the capital Riyadh, in a deadly escalation that coincided with the third anniversary of the coalition's intervention in Yemen.

Displaying wreckage at a news conference in Riyadh of what it said were fragments of those ballistic missiles, the coa-lition claimed forensic analysis showed they were supplied to

Huthi rebels by their ally Iran.

"The missiles launched against Saudi territory were smuggled from Iran," coalition spokesman Turki al-Malki told reporters yesterday.

We "reserve the right to respond against Iran at the right time and right place", he added.

The missile strikes resulted in the first reported fatality from Huthi fire in the Saudi capital.

Egyptian national Abdul-Moteleb Ahmed, 38, died instantly in his bed when what appeared to be burning shrapnel struck his ramshackle room in Riyadh's Um al-Hammam district, leaving a gaping hole in the roof, witnesses told by AFP at the site.

Three other Egyptian labour-ers in the same room were wound-ed and hospitalised, they said. The Iran-aligned Huthis said on their Al-Masirah television that Riyadh's King Khalid International

Airport was among the targets.

Malki alleged the rebels in Sanaa were using the airport there to launch missiles on Saudi territory, adding the coalition had seized a number of smug-

Iran has repeatedly denied arming the Huthis in Yemen, despite claims by the United States and Saudi Arabia that the evidence of an arms connection is

irrefutable.

A Saudi-led military coalition intervened in Yemen on March 26, 2015 to try to restore the gov ernment of President Abedrabbo Mansour Hadi after the Shiite Huthis and their allies took over large parts of the country, includ-

ing the capital Sanaa.

Hours after the missile attacks on Saudi Arabia, hundreds of thousands of Huthi rebel sup-porters flooded the streets of Yemen's capital yesterday to mark

three years of war. Sanaa's Sabaeen Square was a sea of Yemeni flags as rebel authorities ordered all schools and government offices shut for the anniversary.

Huthi supporters carried portraits of rebel chief Abdulmalik al-Huthi and speakers blasted out a fiery speech by Hassan Nasrallah, leader of Lebanon's powerful Hezbollah Shiite movenent, praising the "steadfastness" of the Yemeni people.

War songs, poems and peeches condemning the United States, the main arms supplier for the Saudi-led coalition, ed across the square.

"No one can speak on behalf of the Yemeni people. The people taking to the streets today are the real voice," Ibtisam al-Mutawakel, head of a Huthi cultural committee, told AFP.

About 10,000 Yemenis have been killed and 53 000 wounded since the start of the coalition intervention in Yemen, which triggered what the United Na-tions has called the world's worst humanitarian crisis

heights of fame after playing ageing rock star Billy Mack in Love Actually twelve years

Despite portraying one of the best known characters in the rom-com world, the actor also revealed he can't bear to watch himself in anything on-screen.

He recalled the first and only time he did so: "I tried when I was young and less

complicated to look at, and it was bloody awful. I was third bank robber in Softly. Softly. I was staying in digs with some people – they were all crowded in the front room, and then I came on TV. I walked out, it was so terrible. I had a phoney accent, which was just not committed enough, and my hair, obviously. Oh!"
