More than 420,000 Rohingyas, mostly Muslims, fled Myanmar's Rakhine State to evade atrocities which the United States. Reports suggest that the violence also forced some 800 Hindus in Rakhine State to take refuge in Bangladesh.

Bhanjyang slide inspected, found highly vulnerable to further collapse

DISTRICT **AUTHORITIES ORDER EVACUATION, PLACE SLIDE ZONE UNDER 24X7 WATCH**

SUMMIT REPORT NAMCHI, 22 SEPT:

A team led District Collector (South), Raj Yadav, and comprising of Joint Diand comprising of Joint Di-rector, Senior Geologist and Assistant Geologist from Mines & Geology Depart-ment, Assistant Engineer, and Junior Engineer from Roads & Bridges Department and Training Officers from Land Revenue & Disaster Management Department visited the landslide affected area at Bhanjyang in South Sikkim. They have decided to evacuate the area coming under the sweep of the slide which has left the area vulnerable and destabilized.

The team surveyed the slide area and then sat in a meeting at the District Collector's office here to discuss and come up with a relief plan for the affected people and



areas, a press release from the District Collector [South] informs.

The Mines & Geology De-

vulnerable and may collapse anytime leading to a massive landslide.

The meeting agreed upon evacuating the landslide vul-nerable area. It was decided

that evacuation orders shall be given to the people resid-ing in the landslide prone areas along with a warning message to the people through Social Media as well.

Senior Superintendent of Police [South] was requested to depute a police personnel to monitor the slide and traffic at the landslide prone area 24X7. The Power Department has already installed halogen lights for improved visibility to monitor the section. The inspection team also found cracks formed about 400 feet from the road which the team has marked as highly

'dangerous'. Tarpaulin sheets have been placed there to pre-vent rain water from seeping through the cracks.

The damaged footpath is already undergoing repair works helmed by District Review Committee [DLRC].

The Roads and Bridges Department has been directed to keep one JCB 24X7 on standby to clear the roads immediately in case of a slide

Aviation Minister slams AAI officials for slow progress in Pakyong airport construction work

GANGTOK, 22 SEPT:

Civil Aviation Minister, Ugen Gyatso Bhutia today pulled up the officials of the Airport Authority of India at Pakyong Green Field Airport and said that the blame game must stop and work should be completed as per the scheduled time given for the formal inauguration of the airport.

The state government wants

to know if the AAI is ready to meet the deadline for the formal inauguration of the airport, he

Minister of State for Civil Aviation, Jayant Sinha, had said Aviation, Jayant Shina, had Said that the Pakyong Green Field Airport will be operational by November this year during a meeting during a meeting during a meeting with the Sikkim Tourism Minister, MP Lok Sabha, PD Rai, and Tourism Constant of Tourism in New Del Secretary, C. Zangpo in New Del-hi on 12 Sept. Today the State Civil Aviation

Minister along with officials of the line departments, Building & Housing Department Minister, DT Lepcha and area MLAs of Rhenock & Namcheybong reached the airport to take stock of preparedness for the inauguration of the airport by the end of Nov but were surprised to see that a lot of construction works are yet to be completed.

Mr Gvatso directed the officials of the AAI to coordinate with the state line departments like Power & Energy, Water Security & Public Health Engineering, Roads, Forest, Directorate of Handlooms in preparation for the inauguration adding that the state is ready to extend all pos-



sible help.

The high level committee of AAI is expected to arrive at Gangtok on 23 Sept and will be holding a meeting with the Chief Secretary.

"We [Ministers] seek ap-ointments with the so called high level committee to discuss the matter with great urgency as the Prime Minister is expected to inaugurate the state's lone airport by end of November this year," said the Civil Aviation Minister making his displeasure

He added that the state gov ernment is not satisfied with the pace of the construction works and directed to expedite works. The state does not want to miss the deadline and if it is missed, it will be a great embarrassment to the state government, he added.

Mr Gyatso stated that the Union Civil Aviation Minister

has already pursued the matter with great concern and has al-ready invited the PM to inaugurate the airport.

He further directed all the

state line departments to coordinate and work as directed by the Government. Forest department has been directed for beautification of the airport whereas the state Special Branch has been directed to train its manpower in consultation with AAI for security purposes. He also directed the State

Roads and Bridges Department to complete the upgradation and surfacing of road from airport to Ranipool immediately.
State Building & Housing De-

partment Minister, DT Lepcha, said that the state government will not tolerate lame excuses and assurances. He added that the construction and beautifi-cation work has to be completed on time to avoid last minute

The state government has also handed over the mutation papers of the land transferred to AAI which consists of 205.11 acres including 5 acres of land at Rangpo for staff quarters of AAI.

He directed the Director of AAI to take responsibility to ensure that the construction and preparedness for inauguration of airport is completed before 30 Nov, later this year.

When asked about the completion of construction of the airport on time, Pakyong Airport Authority Director, Ragu Nath, refused to speak to the media and only said that he has been

recently posted to Pakyong. He added that he is not the appropriate person to talk to media nor is he assigned to speak to any other official on progress of the work as of now.

State govt notifies conduct of Panchayat Elections 2017

The state government has authorized the State Election Commis-sion to hold the Panchayat Election through a notification published on 21 Sept. The two-tier Panchayat election is scheduled to be held in Oct-Nov later this year.

With this notification the State Election Commis sion is empowered to hold the Panchayat polls for 183 Gram Panchayats consisting of 1038 Panchavat wards including two Dz-umsas of North Sikkim and 113 territorial constituencies for Zilla Panchayats. In the notification, it is

said that in terms of Secsaid that in terms of Sections 12, 13, 14, and 15 of the Sikkim Panchayat Act of 1993, in respect to Gram Panchayats and Sections 49, 50, 51 and 52 of Zilla Panchayat [Terri-torial Panchayats], read with the Article 243B and E of the Constitution of India election has to be held for the purpose of constituting new Gram and Zilla Panchayats in the state of Sikkim.

It is further said that as recommended by the State Election Commission in pursuance of Conduct of Panchayat Rules, 1997, the state government has autho-rized the conduct of election to elect members of the Gram and Territorial Panchayats in accordance with the provisions of the Sikkim

Panchavat Act.

Sources in the State Election Commission at Gangtok have said that the Commission has also notified the roster reservation system of the Panchayats which is ex-pected to be formally announced on 23 Sept. Sources have also said

that the formal Code of Conduct for holding elec-tion will be notified on 03 Oct and election is expected to be held in the last week of Oct and all the election procedures will be completed by 10 Nov.

The Panchayat ward-

wise voter's lists have also been compiled by the State Election Commission based on enrolment of voters list updated till January 2017.

The State Election Commission has already called an all-party meeting

on 23 Sept, it is informed. The delimitation of Wards Panchayat [WP], Gram Panchayat Units [GPU], and Territorial wards for Zilla Panchayat [ZP] are over and the same has been notified with slight increase in number of seats com-pared to 2012 as per the mandate of Sikkim Pan-

chayati Raj Act, 1992.

The State Election
Commission has completed all the formalities for the upcoming elections, the source further informed. It may be mentioned that the tenure of the sitting Panchavats is going to end on 27 Nov later this year.

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 22 (PTI): Countries like India and Japan, Brazil and Germany must be given permanent seats in the UN Security Council, Bhutan today said as it backed reforms in the world body to revitalise and strengthen it.

Bhutan Prime Minister Tshering

Tobgay said the UN reforms would be incomplete without reforming the Security Council to reflect the changing realities of the world.

"As such, countries like India and Ja

pan, Brazil and Germany must be called upon to serve as permanent members in the Security Council. And Africa must be appropriately represented." Tobgay said in his address to the UN General Assembly. "And Africa must be appropriately represented," Tobgay added.

The Secretary General's reform ini-tiatives will provide the much-needed framework to revitalise and strengthen the UN. Bhutan joins all member states in backing this bold endeavour, he said.

Asking member countries to join him in observing a moment of silence serving a moment of sile to remember the victims of global terrorism, Tobgay said the recent acts of terrorism have brought pain and suffering to countless people in nearly every part of the world, and far too many lives have been cruelly lost.

"The horrific acts committed by terrorist groups undermine global peace and security, and Bhutan joins the call for united action to combat these extremists. To win the fight against terrorism we have no option but to strengthen the United Nations, so that multilateralism and global cooperation are further enhanced," he said.

Referring to the three recent hurricanes that battered communities in the Caribbean and in the United States, and the devastating floods in Bangladesh, India, Nepal, and Sri Lanka that have taken more than 1200 lives, he said these disasters are not isolated incidents.

"Experts are increasingly convinced that natural disasters like hurricanes and floods are made worse by climate change. Climate change is a reality. Each of the last three years has been the hottest in recorded history. Sixteen of the 17 hottest years on record have all occurred in this new century. And this must alarm us, for we are only in 2017," Tobgay said.

Battle the Bottle

Booze is a problem that the society ignores at its own peril

The festive season is upon us; a march of weeks and months which will be as much about piety as they will be about excesses, making it perhaps the right time to speak about alcoholism. The cops appear to already be on the issue, at play with the new breathalyzer toys they have been issued, stopping vehicles and inviting drivers to blow into the equipment. One could argue about the many levels at which such random stopping [without any apparent reason] for random checks is wrong (inconvenient in the least), but that line will not find many backers in light of the weekend road mishaps which have become too frequent for comfort. And while checking by cops might lead to some challans and avert some accidents, what remains unaddressed is the root problem - alcoholism, a condition which does not surface only on weekends or only at night and is a 24x7 worry for too many families.

The problem of alcoholism is not talked about enough probably because it is substance abuse and HIV/ AIDS which receive funding, leading unfortunately to a situation where this condition is not as widely discussed as the scale of the problem requires. Many people tend to identify alcoholism as a traditional dispensation of the Hill People. This is an ill-informed preconception since alcoholism [as a wide-spread problem] could not have debuted in the hills more than half a century back or six decades at the most. Alcoholism really becomes possible with the arrival of the IMFLs [India Made Foreign Liquors] since the local brews required too much work and time to be manufactured in enough quantities to feed alcoholism on a scale that cause the kind of health and social complications which are now possible and common. It is hence wrong to begin any discussion on alcoholism by suggesting that it is a traditional weakness of the Hill People. The communities here might have allowed 'drinking', but that cannot be construed as addictive levels of drinking. The prejudice, however, because it serves so many businesses so well, has been allowed to set in and after it was ignored in the initial years [of IMFLs and other mass distilling units arriving], spread rapidly to ingrain itself in the society.

The damage wreaked by alcoholism cannot be stressed enough and media here should carry forward its success with getting the problem of substance abuse addressed and report more effectively and widely on the abuse of alcohol which is just as impairing. But the local media, when it overlooks the problem of alcoholism in the society, ends up reflecting the social acceptance of this malaise. Sikkim's indifference towards this problem will weigh heavy on its collective conscience some day. Many excuse alcoholism with the argument that the person is earning enough to indulge himself/ herself. Substance abuse, because it usually starts at a much younger age, is more scandalous also because of the petty crimes that the addicts invariably resort to finance their addictions. While there is no denying that substance abuse is a serious concern, alcoholism, because not enough seem to be taking it seriously, is even more worrying. Even if one were to keep the emotions aside, the impact alcoholism has on the economy should attract corrective action. Most people turn alcoholic in what should be the most productive years of their lives, both professionally as well as part of a family. When their faculties are compromised, as alcoholism is wont to do, their work suffers as do their families. Indifference towards this problem puts too much at risk because like with all social problems, alcoholism does not affect only the individual but has the entire family suffering. While the younger 'addict' makes the elders of the family suffer guilt pangs, an alcoholic, because in most cases they are working members of the family, end up abusing the family [because they have more 'power' but less control]. This is a social problem and requires the community to step forward and engage proactively in its battle against the bottle. Sadly, in Sikkim, even the war-cary has not heen sounded yet.

Trump speaks at the **UN: 5 takeaways**

It is a short distance from Trump
Tower on Fifth Avenue to the United Nations headquarters on First Avenue, but these are different worlds. Donald Trump's native world is one of unilateralism and competition, with more than a hint of bravado and aggression. The U.N.'s world is one of multilateralism and cooperation, with a heavy dose of diplomacy and collaboration.

Those two worlds met when Trump gave his first speech to the U.N. as America's president. And the nationalism and pragmatism of the relatively recently inaugurated leader of the U.S., if no longer the free world, collided with the cosmopolitan, enduringly optimistic, if often weary, leadership of the U.N. Not sur-prisingly, it starkly contrasted with Barack Obama's final speech to the U.N. a year ago.

'IT'S COMPLICATED'

Since his inauguration, Donald Trump has conceded on several occasions that foreign policy is "complicated." And his speech at the U.N. reinforced that fact. He attempted to bridge an uncomfortable divide between the isolationism and muscular foreign policy embraced by much of his political base and the inescapable need to cooperate with other countries in order to tackle a series of foreign policy problems that even the most powerful of states cannot address alone. My initial impression as a student of in-ternational relations is that he largely

failed to reconcile that tension.

Trump's inaugural presidential address was more memorable for his reference to carnage than an appeal to inspirational values. And, likewise, his first U.N. speech will probably be remembered more for his threats against North Korea and his reference to the decimation of the U.S. middle class than a few desultory utterances in which he commended the United Nations for its humanitarian efforts.

STRADDLING TWO CONSTITUENCIES

Unsurprisingly, Trump's commentary was broad-ranging and inchoate. In again invoking the concept of "principled realism," he tried to straddle, and to please, both his base and the audience in the room. But just like his wavering recent comments about events in Charlottesville or the fate of the "Dreamers" of DACA, his ambivalence on the future relationship between the United States and the United Nations will likely leave neither his supporters or his global audience



satisfied.

So, against this background, what were the lessons gleaned from Trump's speech?

Here are five key points #1. WE ARE THE WORLD?

For the last three decades, every student who takes a university course in international relations has been taught two things. The first is that the countries of the world are becoming more interdependent. The second is that the United Nations is one of the mechanisms that can be used to address issues that require a collective response, like climate change or growing inequality. Trump rejected that formulation. In his speech, he argued that the United Nations should be built on the basis of sovereign, strong and independent states fed by patriotism and nationalism – not cosmopolitanism. States should be left alone unless they threaten external security or, Trump suggested eccentrically, they abrogate human rights -

singularly referring to Venezuela. #2. THROWBACK TO W

Rogue states, or "regimes," are back in fashion. The term, like the "Axis of Evil," was introduced by George W. Bush's administration. Then, it principally referred to Iran, North Korea and Iraq, and was used to justify an interventionist U.S. foreign policy. That language disappeared during the Obama administration, in favor of a focus on strategic patience and diplomacy. Trump's rejection of Obama's foreign policy could have taken him off in several directions. But in this instance, he has returned to Bush's.

#3. A LINE TO REMEMBER

But Bush's foray didn't end well. He used the term - and the threat those countries reputedly posed to international stability – to justify a long, bloody and costly war in Iraq that

altimately destabilized the Middle East. The consequences of Trump's return to that language could prove catastrophic on the Korean Peninsula. Never before can I recall an American president threatening to "totally destroy" another country like North Korea, as Trump did while standing at a lectern of an organization whose core mission is dedicated to peace. That, I suspect, will be the line from his speech that will be longest re-membered, regardless of whether war actually breaks out

#4. LOOKING OUT FOR NUMBER

Paradoxically, according to Trump, in pursuing its own narrow, short-term self-interest on security and trade, the United States will remain a "model" for the rest of the world. Again, this claim upends conventional American wisdom.

Attempts to enhance America's global reputation for the last seven decades have been built on its efforts to cultivate at least an image of enlightened self-interest. This has entailed promoting global stabili-ty, trade and democracy. Taking this long-term view has been at a cost to American taxpayers, workers and even American lives in a series of wars. American presidents have routinely justified this sacrifice by calling the U.S. "a model" from which the world has ultimately benefited. Until now, none has justified selfishness as a virtue to the rest of the world. "As President of the United States, I will always put America first just like you, the leaders of your countries, will always, and should always, put your countries first," proclaimed Trump. It was a line reminiscent of Gordon Gecko's famous speech in the movie

Wall Street, that "greed is good."
#5. IGNORING THE NEEDS OF
OTHERS

Economic and national security may be in, but enhancing economic and social development, addressing global inequality and combating climate change are certainly out.

The irony is inescapable: Two

more hurricanes were threatening America's shores as Trump spoke. Seemingly oblivious to that fact, he completely ignored two of the great-est interrelated challenges facing hu-manity in a building whose central mission is to protect the species: how to feed the world's population while ensuring all of our children actually remain alive so that they can enjoy that meal. America First, he clearly implied, entails the right of the American middle class to drive to the mall and have enough money to spend on U.S. manufactured products when it gets there. But, on this occasion, the possibility that they may have to drive through a hurricane, flood, forest fire or smog to get there was not recognized by Trump as a major problem.

And on questions of economic, political or social development? The nearest he got was a reference to refugees: Wars should cease so that they can return to their homes. It's cheaper that way. The president is probably unacquainted with the fact that a large proprtion of the world's potential environmental refugees live in the Caribbean, and when the sea rises I suspect they will be heading in boats towards Florida, if not Mar-a-Lago, with no home to return to

SO WHAT'S THE BOTTOM LINE?

First, principled realism is a nice term if you are trying to appear coherent. But its principle components – of isolationism and engagement – are inherently contradictory. Cobbling them together should lead us to ex-pect contradiction and equivocation rather than be surprised by it.

Second, we learned once again

that Trump looks longingly backwards rather than forwards. His speech, when dispassionately analyzed, would have seemed more befitting if delivered in 1917 rather than

And finally, the lukewarm applause Trump received - both when criticizing Iran and at the conclusion of his speech – suggests that, with few exceptions, the world's leaders share the sentiment held by a large portion of the American electorate: that the next three years and four months are going to feel like an eternity.

Standing too much at work can double your risk of heart disease

nere's been a lot of interest in the harmful ef-There's been a lot of interest in the national confects of prolonged sitting at work, from academics and the public alike. The attention being paid to sitting — or rather, not sitting — while on the job stems from the scientifically validated message that being sedentary in general, both indoors and outdoors, is bad for your health.

However, comparatively little attention has been devoted to the harmful effects of prolonged standing at work, despite past studies linking it to chronic back pain and musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs) in the lower limbs.

What's more, research has shown that prolonged

standing might increase the risk of cardiovascular disease. That's because standing too long can result in blood pooling in the legs, increased pressure in the veins and increased oxidative stress, all of which can contribute to an increased risk.

PROLONGED STANDING AT WORK

DOUBLES HEART DISEASE RISK

We recently published a study that adds to that body of evidence on the adverse health effects of prolonged standing. It compared the risk of heart disease among more than 7,000 workers in Ontar-io, followed over a 12-year period, across different

types of occupations.

Briefly, we grouped the workers into four categories according to the body position of their jobs.

The categories were: workers who mostly sit, workers who mostly stand, workers who use a mix of sitting, standing and walking, and workers who use other types of body positions, such as crouching or kneeling.

We found that people who primarily stand on the job are twice as likely to develop heart disease as people who primarily sit. This was the case even after taking into account a wide range of factors, including personal factors (including age, gender, education levels, ethnicity, immigrant status and marital status), health (e.g., diabetes, arthritis, hypertension, mood and anxiety disorders) and the type of work being performed (e.g., physical demands, shift schedule).

An elevated risk for those who stand at their

jobs (compared to sitting) was still present after taking into account smoking, leisure time, physical activity, alcohol consumption and body mass index.

In fact, the incidence of heart disease among ose respondents who stood a lot at work (6.6 per cent) was is similar to the incidence of heart disease among workers who smoked on a daily basis (5.8 per cent) or those who were obese (6.9 per cent). This suggests that workplace wellness programs should focus on reducing prolonged stand-ing at work, just as they target smoking and unhealthy diet habits, to curb cardiovascular disease.

IS MY SIT/STAND DESK HARMFUL?

For those who may wonder whether their standing or variable desk is a health risk, the short answer is "No." The focus of our study was prolonged standing at work, without opportunities to sit. We expect that people using sit/stand desks do sit when they feel tired, unlike those in occupations that require prolonged standing, such as grocery store clerks or

The opposite question, "Does standing a little bit more during the day reduce risk of heart disease?" is harder to answer, and was not specifically examined by our study.

The available research evidence suggests that

while being sedentary in general is bad for you, the amount of time we spend sitting at work (distinct from sitting at home, in traffic, and so on) is not strongly linked with decreased risk of long-term conditions such as diabetes or heart disease.

To reduce the potential health impacts of sitting

in general, you would likely need changes in overall energy expenditure. And standing a little more throughout the day (without at least walking in addition to the standing) probably won't achieve this.

HOW CAN I REDUCE RISK?

Based on our study, and other studies in this area, it would seem wise to focus on ways to reduce standing time in certain occupations. In our study, peo-ple whose jobs involve standing for long stretches of time included sales and service workers, cooks,

food and beverage servers and bank tellers.

With the exception of cooks, there aren't specific reasons why workers in many of these occupations need to stand for prolonged periods of time. Rather, the need to stand in these jobs has more to do with the need to be seen by the public as being attentive, interested and polite. So most workers could still perform their duties using a mix of sitting and standing.

As a result, greater awareness of the potential health effects of standing too long can help roll

back this social expectation.

And luckily for workplaces, in the case of prolonged standing, there are interventions that are known to be effective and readily available: They're

Preventing long-term health conditions such as heart disease likely requires multi-faceted inter-ventions, focusing on factors inside and outside the

Reducing prolonged standing at work - and providing more flexible work environments in general – should be one of the aspects of work that are

considered in the future.

The state government had on Wednesday announced the formation of a nine-member Board of Administrators in place of the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration for Darjeeling hills and appointed Tamang and Anit Thapa as its chairman and vice-chairman.



saying this from the very begin-ning that Binay and Anit are hand in gloves with the state government.

They have not only compromised the integrity of the movement but also the cause of Gorkhaland and people's "They have betrayed the people of the hills. They deserve to be punished. I urge the people of the hills to pun-ish, curse" and boycott them, Gurung said in an audio statement late last night.

Gurung said the indefinite shutdown in the hills would continue until tripartite talks on the issue begin.

Meanwhile, several shops remained open in Darjeeling even as the situation in the hills remained tensed on the 100th day of the GJM-led in-definite shutdown for a separate state of Gorkhaland.

Although no incidents of violence were reported since last night, police and security personnel have made special se-curity arrangements in the hills and are maintaining a tight vigil to avoid any untoward incident.

The Gorkha Janmukti Mor cha and other hill parties took out rallies demanding that the Centre immediately intervene and start the dialogue process considering the sentiments of the people of the hills.

For the 13th day in a row, police along with the administration, appealed to the locals using public address systems normalcy in the hills.

Peace rallies were taken out by the residents at Kurseong, Darjeeling and Mirik, while GJM supporters took out rallies in support of a separate Gorkhaland and the ongoing shutdown in sections of Darjeeling, Sonada and Ka-limpong, the police said.

Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee had urged the agitators in Darjeeling to withdraw their strike and restore normalcy.

Internet services remain suspended in the hills since June 18.


points from this 2-0 win.

Chinese govt plays Cupid to help youth get married

BEIJING, SEPT 22 (PTI): With over 100 million youngsters in China opting to remain single despite attaining marriageable age, the government has launched an ambitious blind date drive to encourage single youths to get hitched.

Young singles are encouraged to par-ticipate in organised blind dates following a guideline issued by the Communist Youth League (CYL), an influential body attached to the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC), to help young people find the right partner.
Official data shows that more than 100

million Chinese people of marriageable

age remain single.

The sixth census conducted in 2010 showed that 2.47 per cent of women above the age of 30 were single, 'China News Service' had reported in June.

The CYL, Ministry of Civil Affairs and

National Health and Family Planning Commission on September 12 said in a statement that helping young people find the right partner had a direct impact on their further development, which affects societal harmony and stability.

The notice also said that "a civilised,

healthy and rational concept of love and marriage" should be combined with socialist core values.

The initiatives came following reports that an increasing number of Chinese youth were disinterested in love life and were weighed down by tough working conditions and competition to succeed.

In response to the call, the CYL Zhe

jiang Provincial Committee established a special department for matchmaking in June and organised a blind date event which attracted 5,000 people.

Apart from CYL committees, other gov-ernment bodies such as labour unions and women's federations also played Cupid, state-run Global Times reported.

"Family is society's basic unit. Without

a family, people will lose their motivation

to work diligently, and too many single people will eventually affect social stabil-ity," said an employee surnamed Suo at the Women's Federation in Pizhou in East China's Jiangsu Province.
Suo has organised several blind dates

for government employees.

28-year-old Zeng's boss at a state-owned company in Beijing warmed up to Suo's idea. Zeng said that he was allowed to take a day off when going on a blind date.
"My boss believes that a man will only

be committed to work after he has a fami-

ly," Zeng said. While most Chinese netizens welcome the development, some disapprove of organisational interference

An anonymous Internet user said on Zhihu, a Chinese Quora-like website, that her company's labour union often calls her.

"It (labour union) said that work is less important than marriage, and women are destined to get married," she said, adding that she finally blocked the labour union after it called her a fourth time.

Organisers said that few people successfully find a match at those blind date

"It's too short a time to get to know each other. And the men who attend are usually younger than the women," Suo

BEIJING, SEP 22 (PTI): China today said the Kashmir issue should be resolved bilaterally by India and Pakistan through talks, while dismissing calls by the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation for implementation of the UN resolution on the dispute. Asked

about contact group of the OIC calling for the implementation of the UN resolution on Kashmir. Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Lu Kang said the issue should be resolved between India and Pakistan.

"China has noted the relevant report. China's position on the Kashmir issue is clear-cut," Lu said, in response to a auestion.

"The Kashmir issue is left over from history. China hopes India and Pakistan can increase dialogue and communication and properly handle relevant issues and jointly safeguard regional peace and stability," he

The 57-member OIC, of which Pakistan is a member, routinely pass-es a resolution on Kashmir calling for the implementation of the UN resolution.

The contact group of the OIC met on the side-lines of the UN General Assembly two days ago.

GENEVA, 21 Sept (IPR): The European Organiza-tion for Pakistani Minori-ties organised an event entitled "Persecution without Prosecution The Plights of Pakistani Christians" at the United Nations, Geneva on 18 September 2017. The event was moderated by Dr. Mario Silva, Executive Director of the Toron-to-based IFFRAS organ-isation, while the speak-ers included Alberto Cirio. Member of the European Parliament and Farrukh Harrison, Pastor and Christian victim from Pakistan. Another speaker Pastor Humayun Sunil, who was also a witness of persecution of Christians in Pakistan, was not allowed to exit the country by Pakistani immigration

Opening the event,
Dr Mario Silva stated
that the situation
in Pakistan for the minorities was not getting any better. He called Pakistan as the 4th most dangerous country on earth for members of religious faiths and stated that despite being a part of Pakistani society since the inception of the country, the Christians were the most persecuted victims of social discrimination, violence and near constant threats of terrorist attacks.

Trudeau tells UN Canada has failed its indigenous people

Declaring that Canada is "no land of wonders," Prime Minis-ter Justin Trudeau has told the United Nations that his country was working to address failures in the treatment of its indigenous people.

Trudeau yesterday told the UN General Assembly that Canada's 1.2 million indigenous people had mostly known "humiliation, neglect and abuse" in a country often held up as shining example of diversity.

"We know that the world ex-

pects Canada to strictly adhere to international human rights standards," said Trudeau, who has put reconciliation with first nations at the top of his reform agenda.

"That is what we expect of ourselves, too."

Trudeau drew applause

when he pledged Canada's "un-wavering" support to global ef-forts to combat global warming which he said was affecting the lifestyles of Inuit communities



Canada's permafrost is melting in the Arctic and "huge pieces of tundra" are eroding into the ocean, he said.

Trudeau also took an implicit swipe at the US over its withdrawal from the Paris agreement on climate change.

"There is no country on this planet that can walk away from the reality of climate change," said Trudeau, alternating between French and English in his

It was Trudeau's second address to the world body following his 2015 election.

"Canada is no land wonders where hardships that you know do not exist," said the prime minister, whose country consistently ranks among world's highest in living standards.

"Canada remains a work in progress," he declared.

He said that Mr Trump's speech at the United Nations on Tuesday had only convinced him that Pyong-yang's nuclear programme must continue.

Kim says Trump 'deranged' as Pyongyang hints at Pacific H-bomb

SEOUL, SEP 22 (AFP): US President Donald Trump is "mentally deranged" and will "pay dearly" for his threat to destroy North Korea, Kim Jong-Un said today, as his foreign minister hinted the regime may explode a hydrogen bomb over the Pacific Ocean.

In a rare personal attack published hours after Washington an-nounced tougher sanctions, the North Korean over his maiden speech to the UN General Assembly in which he branded Kim "Rocket Man" and threatened to "totally destroy North Korea".

Trump "insulted me and my country in front of the eyes of the world and made the most ferocious declaration of a war in history", Kim said, according to the official Korean Central News Agency.

"I will make the man holding the prerogative of the supreme command in the US pay dearly for his speech," which he called "unprecedented rude nonsense"

The dispatch was ac-companied by a photo of the North Korean leader sitting behind a desk holding a piece of paper.

"I will surely and definitely tame the mentally deranged US dotard with fire," he said.

On the fringes of the UN General Assembly in New York, North Korean Foreign Minister Ri Yongho told reporters Pyongyang might now consider detonating a hydrogen bomb outside its territory.

"I think that it could be an H-bomb test at an unprecedented level perhaps

"It is up to our leader so I do not know well."

Pak rakes up Kashmir at UN, warns India against 'limited war'doctrine

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 22 (PTI): Pakistan Prime Minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi today urged the UN to appoint a special envoy to Kashmir and warned India against pursuing the doctrine of "limited war" against his country, saying it will evoke a strong and

"matching response" Abbasi in his maiden address to the UN General Assembly, raked up the Kashmir issue, alleging that the struggle of the people in the Valley is being "brutally suppressed" by India.

In his anti-India rhetoric, Abbasi accused India of indulging in terror activities against Pakistan and warned of a "matching response" if it "ventures across the LoC (Line of Control)" or acts upon its "doctrine of limited war" against his "The Kashmir dispute

should be resolved justly, peacefully and expeditiously. As India is unwilling to resume the peace process with Pakistan, we call on the Security Council to fulfil its obligation to secure the implementation of its own resolutions on Jammu and Kashmir," he added.

He said the IIN Secretary General should ap-point a special envoy on Kashmir. "His mandate should flow from the longstanding but unimnlemented resolutions of the Security Council."

He lamented that despite over 600 cease-fire violations on the India-Pakistan border since January this year, Pakistan has acted with

restraint.

"But if India does venture across the LoC, or acts upon its doctrine of limited war against Pakistan, it will evoke a strong and matching response," he said.

The Pakistani prime

minister said the gitimate struggle self-determination" the people of Jammu and Kashmir continues to be "brutally suppressed" by Indian security forces.

Abbasi, who assumed

office few months ago, mentioned Kashmir a to-tal of 17 times and India 14 times among other things in his speech.

He also claimed that

from day one of its creation, Pakistan has faced "unremitting hostility" from its eastern neighbour (India).

"India refuses to implement the unanimous resolutions of the UN Security Council, which mandate a UN super-vised plebiscite to enable the people of Jammu and Kashmir to freely decide their destiny," he said. Abbasi demanded

an international investigation into the alleged atrocities in Kashmir and sending of an inquiry commission to the Valley. He alleged that the

Indian security forces' "brutalities" clearly constitute war crimes and violate the Geneva Conventions. However, he said that Pakistan remains open to resuming a com prehensive dialogue with India to address all outstanding issues, especially Kashmir and discuss measures to maintain peace and security in the

India slams Pakistan at UN, says it is 'terroristan', land of pure terror

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 22 (PTI): India today ripped into Pakistan, describing it as "terroristan" and a land of "pure terror" that hosts a flourishing industry to produce and export global terrorism.

In a no-holds-barred speech at the UN General Assembly, India's representative said it is extraordinary that the state which protected Osama Bin Laden and sheltered Mullah Omar should have the gumption to play the victim.

India was exercising its right to reply after Pakistan Prime Minister Shahid Khagan Abbasi raked up the Kashmir issue at the General Assembly. "By now, all Pakistan s

neighbours are painfully fa-miliar with these tactics to create a narrative based on distortions, deception and de-ceit, Eenam Gambhir, a First

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Secretary in the Permanent Mission of India to the UN, said, asserting that efforts at creating alternative facts do not change reality.

"In its short history, Pa-kistan has become a geog-raphy synonymous with tershe said.

Playing on the country's

name, which means "land of pure," she said the quest for a land of pure has actually produced 'the land of pure terror'. Pakistan is now 'Terroristan', with a flourishing industry producing and exporting global terrorism, she said.

Gambhir noted that Pakistan's current state can be gauged from the fact that Hafiz Mohammed Saeed, a leader of the United nations designated terrorist organisation Lashkar-e- Taiba, is now sought to be legitimised as a leader of a political party.

She said that Pakistan's counter-terrorism policy is to mainstream and upstream terrorists by either providing safe havens to global terror leaders in its military towns, or protecting them with "political careers".

The state of Jammu and Kashmir is and will always remain an integral part of ln-dia. However much it scales up cross- border terrorism, it will never succeed in under-mining India s territorial integrity, she said.

Earlier, Abbasi accused India of indulging in terror activities against his country and warned of a "matching response" if it "ventures across the LoC" or acts upon its "doctrine of limited war against Pakistan."

He urged the United Nations to appoint a special envoy to Kashmir, claiming that the struggle of the people in the region is being "brutally suppressed" by India.

He also claimed that there are no Taliban safe havens in Pakistan.

"Having suffered and sac rificed so much due to our role in the global counter terrorism campaign, it is espe-cially galling for Pakistan to be blamed for the military or political stalemate in Afghanistan," Abbasi said.

Attacking Pakistan, Gam-bhir said having diverted billions of dollars in international military and development aid towards creating a "dangerous infrastructure of terror" on its own territory, Pa-kistan is now speaking of the high cost of its terror industry. 'The polluter, in this case

is paying the price," she said.
"Even as terrorists thrive in Pakistan and roam its streets with impunity, we have heard it lecture about the protection of human rights in India. The world does not need lessons on democracy and human rights from a country whose own situation is charitably described as a failed state," Gambhir said.

"Terroristan is in fact a territory whose contribution to the globalisation of terror is unparalleled. Pakistan can only be counseled to abandon a destructive worldview that has caused grief to the entire world. If it could be persuaded to demonstrate any com-mitment to civilization, order, and to peace, it may still find some acceptance in the comity of nations," she said.


