The apex court had

earlier on October 27 permitted the Centre to withdraw seven of the 15 companies of CAPF from Darjeeling and Kalimpong dis-tricts for deployment along the borders of Jammu and Kashmir and in the north-eastern states and to the poll-bound states of

Gujarat and Himachal Pradesh.

The Calcutta High Court had earlier stayed the withdrawal of CAPF from Darjeeling hills, the scene of unrest over the statehood demand, till October 27 after the state government ap-proached it opposing the Centre's decision.

Govt should compensate victims of its inaction: Delhi HC

NEW DELHI, NOV 27 (PTI): The government should provide financial assistance and support to people who are the victims of their inaction and omissions, including wrongful incarceration, the Delhi High Court said today.

The court's observation came as it asked the AAP government and the legal services authority here to examine the feasibility of framing a scheme to compensate the victims of inaction or omis-

sion by the authorities.

A bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Justice C Hari Shankar issued the directions while noting that

ground water in Mustafabad locality of Shiv Vihar area of northeast Delhi has been polluted by carcinogenic dis-charge from industrial units which are allegedly illegally operating there, due to the in-action of the local authorities. The court said that as a re-

sult of the polluted ground water, several persons of the area are suffering from cancer.

"The court is concerned with the inaction and omissions of the local authorities, resulting in contamination of ground water which has resulted in several people suf-

"It cannot be denied that

it is the responsibility of the uthorities to provide financial assistance and support to the victims and their family." it said and asked the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government and the Delhi State Legal Services Authority (DSLSA) to give their recommendations in four weeks.

The direction came during

the hearing of a PIL initiated by the court after a news re-port highlighted the plight of the residents of the colony.

The report had said that the untreated effluents were contaminating ground water, the main source of drinking water in the area, and it was linked to the high rate of can-

Two deaths and eight suspected tumour cases have peen detected in the locality, it had said. The bench from time to

time has been issuing directions, including ordering a CBI probe into how the indus-trial units were allowed to operate there as well as calling for testing of water samples to find a solution to the problem.

The court today issued notice to the Delhi Jal Board (DJB) and the power distribution company of the area, asking them to indicate the proce-dure followed by them while

granting water and electricity nections to such units.
"In view of the nature and

magnitude of the problem, the issues need consideration," the bench said while making DIR and the discoms of the area a part of the public interest litigation.

The DJB and the discoms have to indicate their stands before the next date of hearing on December 20.

The court told the CBI to

start taking action against those who have violated the law by setting up illegal industrial units and those who allowed it to happen.

Direction was also issued

to the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC) to provide the reports of the water sample tests to environmentalist Sunita Narain who has been appointed as amicus curiae by the court. DPCC, represented by advocate Sanjeev Ralli, said the reports will be ready in 15 days.

The Delhi government,

represented by standing counsel Ramesh Singh, said 28 families have been identified in the area for grant of compensation under its various welfare schemes. The CBI said its probe was underway as the court asked it to file a status report by January.

"Unhygienic when consumed can affect our health in various ways. Vomiting, fever, bacterial infection can occur," says Dr AH Khan, who runs a private clinic here at Singtam Bazaar.
Officials from

Health Department say, "We keep informing and instructing meat shops

for health hygienic premises. they follow it but just for a day or a two. Shop owners keep neglecting avoiding instructions."

Meat shops are also not allowed to slaugh-ter animals in the shop. This mostly happens in chicken shops. As per rules and regulations, meat is to be supplied from the slaughter house located at Majhitar where the process is done under the super-vision of officials and veterinarians from the Animal Husbandry Department. This process is hardly followed here. As per rules, meat shop owners are required to put up a black glass win-dow in the shop which in Singtam, as always, is ignored.

Anxiety is Trumping Potential Too Often

Open deliberations instead of slotting pigeonholes

T here is an Assembly election scheduled soon in the State, the promise to emulate whose "model" elevated a Chief Minister to the Pradhan Mantri's chair three years back. That model is now being challenged, protested even, and the aspiration of a community there to be included in one of the segments which enjoys reservations and quotas appears to have become big enough to get even a 56-inch chest go through some nervous flutters. Write up another victory for the persuasive power of anxiety-inducing rhetoric which plays on the often misplaced and almost always

exaggerated sense of persecution.

While this might be a new development for the mainstream, we in the margins are familiar with such manipulations which are almost a standard fare for vote-bank driven politicking that constantly seeks to re-frame and rearrange identities and statuses. The North-East, a Region into which Sikkim is now clubbed, supports many political careers based on the complications of identifying locals and othering the outsiders. The more one learns of the "unique" situations that now beset the region, the more one realises that there is nothing very unique to any situation and that the conditions are common to every place with an identity-driven confrontation, only the protagonists differ. Following the Gujarat muddle, and the Maratha chauvinism before that, it is also now confirmed that even the "mainstream" grapples with this problem. This then is clearly a human condition. So why should these be discussed almost exclusively at regional levels and not resolved through wider deliberations and collaborations?

Maybe the time will come for that as well, but for now, it will be within smaller circles that the issue is discussed. And such discussions should be encouraged because the sooner the issues of identity and belonging are discussed more openly, even if within sub-regions, the fewer, hopefully, will be the feelings

The question of who is local being a sensitive one emotional responses were expected, but the whole exercise is at risk of becoming a parody of itself with anyone wanting to have a say in the discussion, instead of engaging, forms an association / organisation and begins issuing press releases expounding a fear or occupying a position. There is nothing wrong in holding an opinion, but before one foists it on the public, some basics have to be worked out. When something as sensitive as belonging are being debated, at least proper homework and due diligence to identify the fault lines need to be done. Instead, it is increasingly being seen that "leaders" take the easier option of stoking the generalised fear that inflicts every community and then fans this into (out)rage. The success rate of this approach is disturbingly high as is being proven with every electoral victory being reported from around the world. All the more reason then to encourage engagement, even if uncomfortable to begin with, before things come to such a pass that confrontation becomes the only response that people find themselves equipped with. The casual arguments that consistently get played into the public domain nowadays have become a worrying strain that inflect almost all the voices that one hears on the issue. The local-non local, insider-outsider, special-underprivileged, enti-tled-sidelined debate, because those who understand issues better are not speaking up, is flirtingly close to becoming a Frankenstein that could soon run amok.

The reviews are coming in harsh for Justice League (Warner Bros.), the keystone movie of the DC extended-universe. In some ways this shouldn't come as a surprise, given the somewhat dubious artistic record of the Justice League comics.

If you walk up to someone on the street (or, more accurately a local comic book store) and you ask them to identify their favourite Superman, Batman or Wonder Woman stories, they can tell you, but ask them their favourite Justice League story and you'll have a harder time finding a frontrunner.

The reason for this is obvious: Justice League doesn't have a lot of good stories. But if Superman is awesome and Batman is awesome and Wonder Woman is awesome, shouldn't the three of them together be thrice as

Not necessarily.

The problem is simple: You're taking three characters who work well on their own and jamming them (along with all the baggage of their respective fictional universes) together, while tossing in a handful of other heroes that you hope will function on their own in future movies as well.

As a novelty, it's delightful to see

so many iconic characters in one place. As a storytelling vehicle, however, it creates an obvious problem and clear question: Who is our main

LOOKING FOR OUR HERO

The protagonist — essentially, the hero — in a comic book or movie is the character the audience is meant to identify with. He or she is the main player in the narrative and the individual upon whose choices the events of the plot depend.

A good protagonist can leave the

audience feeling invested. Whether in a comic book or a film, that's important. Gaudy tights in comics and gaudy computer-generated imagery in film can be alienating. We need to care about the people in those tights, the people in front of that green screen.

For writers, attempting to create shared-universe storytelling — what we see in the Justice League — has challenges. They need to create a viable protagonist out of several characters. This general issue can be seen in comic books as well. Writing a team superhero book is a very different beast than writing a superhero tale



surrounding a singular character.

fundamental mechanisms by which we are made to empathize with a character and feel immersed in their struggles are different when we go from one person to many people. ANCIENT ARCHETYPES REFLECT

OUR INTERNAL STRUGGLES

The distinction between single superhero versus a group of superheroes is as old as literature itself. It begins with The Epic of Gilgamesh, a Sumerian/Babylonian text circa 2100 BC that is very much a single-protagonist superhero story in all the ways that matter.

In contrast, the ancient Greek epic The Iliad, is a team book (but also a superhero story), featuring a diverse cast of Trojan and Greek heroes with strongly differentiated viewpoints and ideologies, as well as the sort of internal conflicts, struggles and even bantering that we associate with group superhero stories.

The culture and history of these

ancient texts is very different from the era of North American comics, but the issues, pitfalls and opportunities for dynamic storytelling are very much the same. When strong, group-oriented comic books such as Fantastic Four, X-men and Teen Titans come along, beginning in the 1960s, the artists use them to explore this same dynamic of internal conflict in a way that is captivating. The trick to success is to create a

functioning gestalt protagonist — a group of heroes who serve, metaphorically, as pieces of a whole. Reed Richards, Mr. Fantastic, isn't your protagonist in the Fantastic Four and neither are Ben Grimm (Thing), Sue Richards (Invisible Woman) nor Johnny Storm (Human Torch). Your hero is all of them as one. You identify with the group.

Thus, the broader metaphor that

gets created through all the internal group tension is one of the inter-

nal tensions that we, as individuals, all deal with every day. Humans are complex creatures with a pluralistic perspective on the world; we are paradoxical in nature and often feel like w have a symphony of voices in our head rather than one distinctive voice.

A gestalt protagonist reflects our internal dialogues by externalizing that symphony. This creates a deeper more nuanced character for the audience to engage with.

This is one of the major reasons both X-men and Teen Titans worked so well during their respective hey-

days in the 1980s.
Take X-men for example: Cyclops isn't a person - not really. He represents an aspect of a person — their Type A side, their drive, their need for order and structure. Wolverine is the opposite to that — he represents the instinctual, the raw primal impulses

that all humans grapple with.

A similar phenomenon can be seen in Teen Titans through the contrast between Beast Boy and Cyborg's distinctively different responses to depression: Beast Boy plays a clown while Cyborg withdraws. This works well since a human being with depression doesn't do one or the other. They do both, typically. Thus, the gestalt protagonist works.

Similarly, the hero of the Harry Pot-

ter series is more often Harry, Ron and Hermione, not Harry alone. Downton Abbey, Game of Thrones, The Walking Dead — all use a gestalt protagonist — you're rooting for the group, not the individuals, and it works.

A THIN SPIN-OFF

So what's different with Justice League? The answer is translation. It's one thing to build a gestalt pro-tagonist from scratch and a very, very different thing to form one out of pre-existing solo protagonists. The superheroes of a group book are usually too thin and fragmented to stand on their own.

For example, when a spin-off series is created, the character needs to be radically recontextualized in order to allow them to support their own book. They change a lot, add new ele-ments that weren't there before: new back story, new relationships, new internal conflicts. DC will have to do this with Aquaman's upcoming film.

That can work but taking a fully fleshed-out protagonist and trying to fold them back into a shared universe

is significantly harder.

The Marvel cinematic universe has been successful in terms of both critical and popular crowds — but even there we see brutal charac-ter inconsistencies as the Avengers bounce back and forth from group and solo films. This is obvious in the first Avengers movie.

The film's writers felt they had to contrast the two "science bros" by making Hulk the calm, rational scientist and Iron Man the undisciplined reckless scientist, but doing so contradicted the narrative arc of those

characters' solo films.

Captain America had to become morose in a way that conflicted with his solo film. Thor forgot everything he learned in his solo film and became irrational and naive again.

So what did all these inconsistencies earn the writer and director of The Avengers? Universal praise for doing the impossible. Writer Joss Whedon made it work: Not in spite of these inconsistencies but through them. Whedon is considered the best of his generation at character juggling, though, so expecting the same of others, including Justice League — even though Whedon is involved — is asking a lot.

Shared-universe storytelling is a big trend in Hollywood and when it works, it works spectacularly well. Unfortunately, it doesn't often work. There are deep challenges involved.

To be successful, writers will need to craft a gestalt protagonist out of other singular protagonists so that audiences will achieve satisfaction with these films. They need to transcend the simple novelty of a cinematic all-star team. They need to do what the film's tagline tells us and actually unite the league.

If we're going to do justice to the Justice League, we have to look backward — at our storytelling past — in order to look forward to the future of

Learning by Giving: How today's students can become tomorrow's philanthropists

If someone asked you to picture a philanthropist, chances are a billionaire like Bill Gates or John D. Rockefeller Sr. would come to mind. But not all philanthropists are billionaires, or even millionaires for that matter. People who make

modest gifts of time or money can make a big difference in their commu-

We are professors who teach and do research about philanthropy, the practice of expressing generosity by giving away money and in some cases time. We see our job as motivating and preparing college and graduate students to become future leaders of nonprofit organizations or donors with good ideas about how to make a difference - starting right nov

TEACHING ABOUT GIVING

One approach, known as "experiential philanthropy," teaches about charitable giving through handson experiences. Students get real money, typically about US\$10,000 per class, to give away to local nonprofits. One of us (David) has determined that hese courses are being taught on more than 80 different campuses.

Northern Kentucky University pioneered this approach in 1999. Since then, students there have collectively awarded more than \$1.5 million to lo-

cal charities as part of their coursework.

A wealthy donor, Geoffrey P. Raynor, is building on that model through the Philanthropy Lab. So far, this national initiative has spread to more than 20 universities, including many attended by the nation's richest students, such as Princeton and the University of Chicago.

These courses are for all students, however. Un-

dergraduates majoring in everything from chem-

istry to philosophy and business to history enroll. While some of them are or want to become rich, others do not come from wealth or aspire to become upper-class. All of them sign up because they want to learn how to use their money and time to make change on the issues they care most about. DOES IT WORK?



Giving away money - particularly when it's not - can be fun. But does it actually teach students anything about philanthropy or how to be come philanthropists?

To find out, one of us (Lindsey) led a study published in Nonprofit and Voluntary Sector Quarterly that surveyed more than 600 Northern Kentucky University students who had taken an experiential philanthropy course there from 2009 to 2013.

The research team found that students were more interested in donating to and volunteering at local nonprofits after taking the course. They were also more likely to know more about issues affecting their community and what nonprofits were do-

Our findings suggest that by studying – and actually engaging in – philanthropy, students learn more about what philanthropy is, why they should do it and how they can make a difference

PAYING FOR IT

While the logic behind these programs may be clear, the question of where the money students give away comes from is not because it's not something covered in a traditional university budget.

So far, foundations like the Learning by Giving

Foundation, founded by philanthropist Doris Buf-fett – Warren Buffett's sister – and the

Once Upon a Time Foundation, funded by the same person as the Philanthro-py Lab, are a leading source of financial support.

The federal government has also pitched in to support a program called Pay it Forward, which engages college students in hands-on philanthropy, grant-making and volunteer service. However, Congress abolished that funding in 2011. Its courses are being taught today only in Ohio, where local foundations foot the bill, at campuses like Denison University, The Ohio State University-Newark, Central Ohio Technical

College and the University of Cincinnati.

Cutting these programs means that young peo-ple will be less likely to be able to take philanthropy courses in college. This is troubling, because one of us (Jodi) found that after having opportunities to be actively engaged in giving with a group of peers young people can better understand philanthro-py's impact.

That's because after learning through these hands-on philanthropic experiences, students of-ten want to donate their own money to nonprofits.

Many other kinds of courses about philanthropy and nonprofits are taught at U.S. and foreign universities. But experiential philanthropy is different because students gain practical knowledge and skills. Whether a class gives away \$200 or \$2,000, they become equipped for future leadership in the

Sub-divisional lice officer of Ambassa, Pranab Debnath said the car was recovered from near Ambassa municipality office in neighbouring Dhalai district and the bike was recovered from South Maharanipur in Gomati district last evening

The Taidu branch of Gramin Bank has been closed indefinitely af-ter the kidnap at Taidu on Friday when the four were on way here after office hours and a notice has been put up in the bank's notice board com-municating it.

Superintendent police of Gomati district, Bijoy Debbarma said a massive search operation by police and paramili-tary Tripura State Rifles (TSR) is on at Taidu and adjacent Ambassa to trace the kidnapped bank employees, BSF was alerted so that the kidnappers cannot sneak into neighbouring Bangladesh with the captives.
State Director Gener-

al of Police A K Shukla. Inspector General (Law and order), K V Srijesh Deputy Inspec-General (Southern and Range) Arindam Nath yesterday visited the spot at Taidu and the adjacent areas yesterday.

The government officials said that the situation in the state was better after the impo-sition of the AFSPA, the member

The controversial AFSPA was extended for six more months

in the entire Assam by declaring the state "disturbed".

The stringent law was first imposed in the state in 1990 after violence perpetuated by the ULFA had created severe law and order crisis.

In Arunachal Pradesh, the

AFSPA has been imposed in two districts -- Tirap and Changlang -- and some police station areas in a few other districts due to the presence of ULFA, NDFB and several Naga insurgent groups.

Manipur's Sangai deer needs a new home

IMPHAL, NOV 27 (PTI): The endangered species of brow-antlered deer 'Sangai' is in dire need of a second home as a epi-

demic or a natural calamity at its current and only habitat at Keibul Lamjao National Park (KLNP) in Loktak Lake could spell doom for the entire race.

The Forest department has identified fresh water lake Pumlen Pat in Thoubal district as a suitable site for shifting the 'dancing deer of Manipur' but the local fisherfolk have expressed their reservations to the idea as it could threaten their livelihood, Chief Conservator Forest (wildlife)

Anurag Bajpai told PTI. "As of now, the Forest department is taking up various confi-dence-building measures for the local people and looking for another vo-cation to substitute their livelihood, mostly in the field of handicraft, hand-loom and others," Bajpai

said.

For any species, in-For any species, in-cluding Sangai deer, a single isolated popu-lation always faces the threat of a potential epidemic, thereby increasng chances of its possible extinction.

A census survev conducted in 2016 has spotted 260 Sangai deer in Loktak Lake. "There has been a significant increase in the number of Shangai Deer over the years. The species almost went extinct in the 1950s and only 14 deer were spotted in the area in

1975," the Forest officer Poaching and natural

calamity are the other factors that could affect the population.

"At present, 26 forest guards have been de-ployed at KLNP to check poachers and the state government has given its consent to increase manpower in the area to check the menace," he said

u Sangai is a medi-n-sized deer, with um-sized uniquely distinctive antmeasuring 100 to 110 cm. It thrives on a variety of water living plants, grasses, herbaceous plants, and shoots.

The deer is considered sacred by the local population and the state government had been or ganising awareness campaigns for its preservation. The annual Sangai festival also derives its name from the species.

A captive breeding centre has been set up near the Iroisemba locality in Imphal West dis-trict, where 14 of these species have been kept under controlled condi-tions, said Bajpai, adding that measures are being taken to translocate the animals to its new ground at the earliest.

Sangai deer was de clared 'protected animal' and its habitat 'protected sanctuary' by Manipur Wildlife Advisory Board in 1955. The endangered species has been list-ed under Schedule-1 of Wildlife (Protection) Act,

Siang water unusually muddy: Arunachal MP writes to Modi

from Arunachal has writ ten to Prime Minister Narendra Modi requesting him to take up with the Chinese government the unusual receding of Siang river at Pasighat and a sudden change in its water quality.
Ninong Ering, Con-

gress MP from the East Constituency, appre-hended that the change in water quality, which is unusual during the win-ter saeson, could be due to a possible diversion of the river in Tibet.

While visiting the Siang River at Pasighat

in East Siang district on Saturday, Ering said that the recent report of Chi-na constructing a tunnel of 1,000 km to divert the Siang (Brahmaputra) water to the Xinjiang province to the Taklamakan desert is likely to be true although China had denied it.

He mentioned in the



(Siang/Brahmaputra) being diverted had appeared a few months back. Althogh China de-nied it, the matter remains an area of concern with the river suddenly undergoing a change in its appearance and char-

acter.

After the report apriver Siang peared, the river Siang has become muddy and slushy. It is already two months that the Siang has turned black and contaminated. It is an un-

"The reason for the river getting dirty is unknown. I have already put questions for discussions in Parliament under rule 377. But since it is not in session, I am requesting you to use your good office to seek the reason of the river being muddy in this season when the wa-

ter is crystal clear. Construction of a 600-km long tunnel has already started in the hearsal, Ering said in his

The Congress MP further said there is no other reason for the mighty Siang getting dirty in the month of November other than a heavy land excavation in the Chinese side and that has to be verified by an interna-tional team. When I saw the wa-

ter, it looked like it was mixed with cement. It is a very serious issue and the Centre must take it

seriously, the MP said.

Ering said a large
number of fish has also died in the Siang river in recent times and he got it confirmed from Tuting and Geling areas in Upper Siang district close to China border.

He has also appealed

to the External Affairs ministry and the Water Resources ministry to expedite measures to check the diversion.

The release claimed that leaders of the Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti (KMSS) leaders instigated the people to obstruct the eviction drive.



NAGPUR, Nov 27 (PTI): A ruthless India equalled their biggest victory margin, decimating a lacklustre Sri Lanka by an innings and 239 runs in the second cricket Test for a 1-0 lead in the three-match series, here.

The victory margin is identical to India's Test win over Bangladesh at Mirpur in 2007 when Rahul Dravid was captain.

Off-spinner Ravichandran Ashwin (4/63) completed a coveted personal milestone of fastest 300 Test wickets in 54 games, beating Dennis Lillee s previous record of 56 matches, as he took the last wicket of Sri Lanka, who were dismissed for a paltry 166 in their second innings. Ashwin is ahead of

Ashwin is ahead of some of the illustrious names, who had completed the milestone in quick time. Among them are Muttiah Muralitharan (58 Tests), Richard Hadlee, Malcolm Marshall and Dale Steyn (61 Tests each).

Ashwin, who had a match-haul of 8 for 130,

Lahiru Thirimanne (23), currently a senior player in the team stunned one and all when he chased a wide delivery from Umesh Yadav to hand Jadeja at point the simplest of catches.

Mathews used to look a fine player when Mahela Jayawardene and Kumar Sangakkara were around but post their retirement, he has not been able to find his mojo.

The Sri Lankan cricket had expected Mathews to carry on the legacy of Mahela and Sangakkara but over the past two years, he has failed miserably with no significant contribution in Sri Lankan victory.

Delhi Soccer Association answerable under RTI Act: CIC

NEW DELHI, NOV 27 (PTI): The Central Information Commission has declared the Delhi Soccer Association (DSA) a "public authority", thus making it answerable to people under the Right to Information Act.

The ruling comes after one D K Bose sought to know from the DSA the status of various complaints received by the association against its office bearers from girl footballers of the national capital.

When no information was provided to him, the petitioner approached the Central Information Commission (CIC).

The football association claimed before the CIC that it did not come under the Right to Information (RTI) Act as it was not defined as a "public authority", hence, it was not answerable to queries posed by Bose through his application.

through his application.

"...respondent is not a public authority as defined under Section 2(h) and (f) of the RTI Act, as is nor financed by the government, neither the government had any external control in day-today administration of the Delhi Soccer Association as defined in the judgement of the apex court titled "TMA Pai and other," the DSA said.

other," the DSA said.

The parent body, All India Football Federation (AIFF), also wrote to DSA asking it to "properly investigate" the matter raised by Bose and provide a suitable item-wise RT reply along with relevant supporting documents.

repiy along with relevant supporting documents.

The DSA, however, replied to AIFF claiming that petitioner Bose of Hindustan Football Club was known for manipulating documents for his personal benefits, and sought action against him.

After going through the responses of DSA, AIFF and arguments of Bose, Information Commissioner Sridhar Acharyulu noted that even in performing its activities as a sole body of football in Delhi, the DSA was expected to act under the control and supervision of the All India Football Federation, a public authority under the Ministry of Sports.

He noted that the the

He noted that the the monopoly recognised, sanctioned and continued by the government through the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports (through the All India Football Federation) was indirect, but had substantial funding by the government.

"This factor is enough to declare the DSA as public authority, though another criterion could also be applied, i.e the direct and real control of the government or governmental agencies over it," he said.

Acharyulu noted that frequent complaints by women sports persons, including those of sexual harassment, against an important executive like vice president reflect an unhealthy atmosphere prevalent in the DSA.

"The submissions by the DSA are self-contradictory. On one hand, it accuses the application as 'misuse', and admits that it has given the information as far as possible, on the other hand, it claims that it is not bound to give any information," he said.

The information commissioner further said that the soccer body did not deny having complete monopoly over the game (of football) in Delhi, but refused to be answerable under the RTI Act.

"This is highly unbecoming of a sports body. In fact, being a public body concerned with public activity like football, the DSA should have voluntarily disclosed the entire information about it, including the bits and pieces asked by the appellant in this and several other appeals, and fulfil its obligation under Section 4 of RTI Act." he said.

tion 4 of RTI Act," he said.

He said the DSA should understand that it was answerable to each and every sports person and sports lover in the country, and has an obligation to the nation to bring out highly meritorious football players from the city, without quarrelling to deny information.

"The Commission has

no hesitation to declare unequivocally that being under the control of the AIFF, and with grant of monopoly, established over the sport of football within the territory of NCR of Delhi, the Delhi Soccer Association is a body controlled and substantially financed by the Government of India, and hence, a public authority under Section 2(h) of the RTI Act, 2005," Acharyulu added.

Love India, desire to live there:DSC Prize winner Arudpragasam

DHAKA, 27 Nov (PTI): Sri Lankan writer Anuk Arudpragasam, the winner of this year's DSC Prize for South Asian Literature, loves India and has a desire to live in the country once he is back from the US after completing his PhD.

Just 29 years of age, Arudpragasam bagged the USD 25,000 prize for his debut novel "The Story of a Brief Marriage", which is set during the civil war in Sri Lanka. The award was presented to him at the Dhaka Lit Fest on November 18.

He is now going back to New York to complete his doctorate in philosophy at Columbia University.

"After that I would move back to South Asia, either India or Sri Lanka. I desire to live in India as I like India a lot," Arudpragasam tells PTI in an interview after his win here

The fact that he has won a major literature prize for his first



book is yet to sink in.

"It's like a bit too early to appreciate but obviously I am very happy. This is the first prize I won, the first real big recognition I got. I think I will feel the positive effects in the coming weeks and months, over a longer period of time. But this prize is a kind of security. You feel you can continue to write," he says.

says.
For the past two years, Arud-

pragasam has been working on another novel.

"It is a structurally complicated novel, so it has taken more time to write. It is about yearning, about a feeling of incompleteness," he says.

There was more good news for the young writer. He was also named the winner of the Shakti Bhatt First Book Prize 2017. The prize carries a cash award of Rs 2 lakh and a trophy.

"The Story of a Brief Marriage" is published by Granta Books and in India by HarperCollins. It is focused on one individual and how the war affected this family, says Arudpragasam.

Two and a half decades into the devastating civil war, Sri Lanka's Tamil minority is pushed inexorably towards the coast by the advancing Army.

Among the evacuees is Dinesh,

Among the evacuees is Dinesh, whose world has contracted to a makeshift camp where time is measured by the shells that fall around him like clockwork.

Alienated from family, home, language, and body, he exists in a state of mute acceptance, numb to the violence around him, till he is approached one morning by an old man who makes an unexpected proposal: that Dinesh marry his daughter, Ganga.

Marriage, in this world, is an attempt at safety, like the beached

fishing boat under which Dinesh huddles during the bombings.

As a couple, they would be less likely to be conscripted to fight for the rebels, and less likely to be abused in the case of an Army victory.

Thrust into this situation of strange intimacy and dependence, Dinesh and Ganga try to come to terms with everything that has happened, hesitantly attempting to awaken to themselves and to one another before the war closes over them once more.

"My book is focused on this one individual (Dinesh) who has become alienated from himself, not just from the body but also from his own memories. He lost his memory. He has forgotten about the basic things - what to talk about, what to say to each other. He has forgotten completely about ordinary life," says the author.

The characters in the novel are fictional but Arudpragasam says

they are based on real people who had such experiences - people he talked to, people he read about and people he saw.

"Each character is a composite of different real people," he says.

Arudpragasam started writing "The Story of a Brief Marriage" in 2010.

"The process was very spontaneous. No reporters or external observers were allowed in the war zone and very few people had an idea of what was happening. Months after the war, through the survivors, some footage - videos and pictures - started making way to the Internet. This is when I came across a lot of this material," he says. Arudpragasam describes "The Story of a Brief Marriage" as a "very psychological and very introspective" book.

"It deals with trauma and what e is means to be traumatised," he s says.

WASHINGTON, 27 Nov (PTI): Ivanka Trump the advisor and daughter of US President Don ald Trump, has said the Global Entrepreneurship Summit co-hosted by In dia and America is a testament to their growing economic and security partnership.

Ivanka will be lead-

ing a delegation of senior Trump administration officials and entrepreneurs at the three-day Summit in Hyderabad beginning tomorrow.

To be inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, more than 1200 young entrepreneurs, a majority of whom are women, from 127 countries would attend the summit.

In addition some 300 investors and ecosystem supporters are also at-

tending the mega event.

The world s largest gathering of young entrepreneurs is being co-hosted by India and the United States.

It is "a testament to the strong friendship between our two people and the growing eco-nomic and security partnership between our two nations," Ivanka Trump told reporters during a preview of her India visit.

Ivanka, 36, has trav-elled to India before, but this is her maiden trip to the country as a senior presidential advisor.

Accompanied by several top administrations official, a large number of Indian Americans are part of her delegation, which numbers 350 from 38 states.

Prime Minister Modi had personally invited Ivanka to participate in the GES, which is being held in India for the first time, when he travelled to the US in June.

This year's mit theme, 'Women First, Prosperity for All', demonstrates the Trump administration s commit ment to the principle that when women are eco-nomically empowered, their communities and countries thrive, she told reporters last week.

Five per cent of entrepreneurs at GES are 30 years or younger. The youngest entrepreneur is 13 and the oldest entre-

Pak law minister quits; Protesters call off deadly protests

ISLAMABAD, 27 Nov (PTI): Pakistan's law minister Zahid Hamid today quit as the government "surrendered" government to hardline religious groups, who called off their violent protests in Islamabad that had left six people dead and

hundreds injured.

An official of the Prime Minister House confirmed that the law minister last night sent his resignation to Prime Minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi, who accepted it today.

resignation Hamid's cleared the main hurdle in the lifting of siege of the capital by protesters who demanded his removal for changes in a law related to the Khatm-i-Nabuwwat (finality of prohpethood) oath in the Elections Act

2017.
His resignation comes in the aftermath of deadly clash-es between security forces and protesters during the weekend that killed six neople and injured hundreds. The sit-in had paralysed the national capital for three weeks.

Activists of Teh-

reek-i-Khatm-i-Nabuwwat, Tehreek-i-Labaik Ya Rasool Allah (TLY) and Sunni Tehreek Pakistan (ST) religious groups started protests three weeks ago.



sources understanding was reached with protesters to call off the protest as their key demand had been accepted and the changes made in the law had already been taken back when parliament restored the original oath

Following the agreement and the subsequent resignation of Hamid, TLY chief Khadim Hussain Rizvi ordered his followers all over the country

the judge said the protesters could not sit at Faizabad if it were located closer to the Army's headquarters.

He also said the "Army chief is an officer in an institution that comes under the state" and rhetorically asked "Is he above the law?"

Later in the day, the gov-ernment opened the Islam-abad Expressway linking the capital with its only airport and thickly populated suburban areas along the highway.

Thousands flee as Bali raises volcano alert to highest level

KARANGASEM (INDONE-SIA), 27 NOV (AFP): A rumbling volcano on the resort island of Bali could erupt at any moment, authorities warned today as they raised alert levels to maximum, accelerated a mass evacuation and closed the main airport leaving tourists stranded.

Massive columns of thick grey smoke that have been belching from Mount Agung since last week hae now begun shooting more than three kilometres (two miles) into the sky, forcing flights to be grounded.

Some 40,000 frightened people have their homes around the volcano but as many as 100,000 will likely be forced to leave, disaster agency officials said after raising the alert to its highest level.

The exclusion zone around Agung, which is 75 kilometres from the beachside tourist hub of Kuta, has also been widened to 10 kilometres.

"Continuous ash puffs are sometimes accompanied by explosive eruptions and a weak boom-ing sound," the National Board for Disaster Man-

agement said.

Bangladesh court upholds death sentence of 139 BDR soldiers

Dнака, 27 Nov (PTI): The Bangladesh High Court today upheld the death sentence of 139 and the life imprisonment of 146 convicted soldiers of the then Bangladesh Rifles over the killing of 74 people, including 57 Army officers, during the 2009 mutiny.

The judgement comes after the court started de

livering the verdict yesterday in the death sentence of the total 152 convicted soldiers at the border guards' headquarters here.

"One thirty nine will have to walk to gallows and 146 will be imprisoned for life," attorney general Mahbubey Alam told a media briefing, quoting the long verdict delivered by a three-judge High

The judgement comes four years after a lower court in Dhaka handed down capital punishment to 152 and life term to 158 soldiers of the Bangladesh Rifles (BDR).

"Yes, I'm an actress and I'm in the public eye," she said on Australia's Channel 7 TV show Sunday Night this weekend through tears, "But I'm a human being, who worked really, really hard to get to that point. And then to have it all taken away was just, it was just malicious, and it was ugly."

"People were calling me a

liar and a fake and for some-one like me prides herself on being very candid and authentic, it was just probably the most devastating thing



they could have said to me," she said.

Wilson told Sunday Night that she did not lie about her age, but rather chose not to reveal it, and also did not lie about her name, saying she legally adopted the family nickname Rebel in 2002. Bauer is expected to ap-

peal the amount of damages they have to pay out, which is the highest defamation payout in Australian history and at least twice the amount awarded in past defamation cases in the country.

"They're whining about the amount they're gonna have to pay me and trying to get it reduced," Wilson said. "Which is really gross considering that I'm giving the money to charity." Bauer Me-dia has not responded to the actress' comments.

After the ruling, Wilson


