#### Earthquake on Iran-Iraq border kills over 400

TEHRAN, NOV 13 (AP): A powerful 7.3 magnitude earthquake near the Iraq-Iran border killed over 400 people across both countries, sent residents fleeing their homes into the night and was felt as far away as the Mediterranean coast, authorities said today.

Iran's western Kermanshah province bore the brunt of the temblor Sunday night, with authorities saying the quake killed 407 people in the country and injured 6,700. Kermanshah is a rural, mountainous region where residents rely mainly on farming

The CM brought to the notice of the President that the issue of reservation of seats for the Limboo and Tamang communities as STs in the Sikkim Legislative Assembly was pending for the last 14 years.

for his support and assistance to fulfill people's aspirations

at the earliest.

President for his kind support to address the pending issue of permitting the 17th Gyalwa Karmana to visit Sikkim and allow him to take his seat at Rumtek Monastery. The 11 left-out Sikkimese

communities have been requesting for recognition as Scheduled Tribes since in the erstwhile regime of the Chogyal they were entitled to equal facilities with other com-munities of Sikkim. Drawing historical inference, the CM apprised that the Ministry of ome Affairs, Government of India had suggested seeking recommendation of the State Government vide Ref. No. BC-12016/24/75-SCT.V dated

21.07.1976 as follows: "There are also other tribal communities for e.g. Magar, Gurung, Tamang, Tsong, Subba and Rai. The Sikkim Government may kindly review the case of these communities and any other communities which may have been left out..."

In view of the above historical facts, the CM requested the President for his consideration to grant tribal status to the left-out communities.

The President expressed great satisfaction on the progress made by the State Government in all spheres of develop-ment including total Organic State, Cleanest State, Open Defecation Free State, etc.

The CM has invited the President to visit Sikkim in the near future. The President thanked the CM for his visit and the invitation.

It may be mentioned here, the CM was accompanied by Minister Somnath Poudyal to the meeting with the President of India.

### Ringhim Panchayat elected uncontested for eighth time

Phigu Tshering Lepcha of Ringhim Ward, un-der Ringhim-Nampatam GPU of Lachen-Mangan constituency, North Sikkim has become the Panchayat for the eighth time this year. Mr Lepcha has already completed seven terms in 35 years and this time again he was elected uncontested.

In the first phase of organic farming done in 14000 hectares in the first year to meet end-to programme beginning from production to post harvest manage-ment, processing, branding and marketing, which will be completed in 2018, the Horticulture & Cash Crop Development secretary said.

### Global 2% rise in CO2 'giant leap backwards for humankind'

BONN, NOV 13 (AFP): The carbon dioxide emissions that drive global warming, flat since 2014, are set to rise two percent this year, dashing hopes they had peaked, scientists reported at UN climate talks today.

"This is very disappointing," said Corinne Le Quere, director of the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research at the University of East Anglia and lead author of a major study detailing the findings.
"With global CO2 emissions

from human activities estimated at 41 billion tonnes for 2017. time is running out on our abil-ity to keep warming below two degrees Celsius (3.6 degrees Fahrenheit), let alone 1.5 C." The 196-nation Paris Agree-

ment, adopted in 2015, calls for capping global warming at 2 C below pre-industrial levels.

With the planet out of kilter after only one degree of warm ing -- enough to amplify deadly heatwaves, droughts, and super-storms -- the treaty also vows to explore the feasibility of holding the line at 1.5 C.

Earth is overheating due to the burning of oil, gas and es-

pecially coal to power the global economy. Deforestation also plays a critical role.

"The news that emissions are rising after a three-year hiatus is a giant leap backward for humankind," said Amy Luers, a climate policy advisor to Barack Obama and executive director of Future Earth, which co-sponsored the research.

This year's climate summit is presided by Fiji, one of dozens of small island nations whose very existence is threatened by rising seas engorged by warmer water and melt- off from ice sheets on Greenland and Antarctica.

Thousands of diplomats in Bonn are negotiating the "rule-book" for the Paris pact, which goes into effect in 2020.

The team encountered three large flocks of Scarlet Minivets, followed by Common Iora, Orifollowed by Common Iora, Oriental White-eye, Flycatchers like Grey-headed Canary, Common Green Magpie, Large Cockoo-shrike, Large Wood-shrike, Grey-capped pigmy Woodpecker and greater Yellownape, three species of bulbuls [Black-crested, Himalayan and Red-vented] while Asian Rarred Owlet and Crested Asian Barred Owlet and Crested

### SSC demands equal salaries for temp and regular employees

SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 13 NOV:

Sikkim Subject Committee has submitted a memorandum to the Chief Secretary's Office on two issues today. The committee has demanded that temporary gov-ernment employees be paid at par with regular employees and that sec-ond Saturday of every month be declared a government holiday.

SSC has said that the

Supreme Court judgment in the State of Punjab & others vs Jagjit Singh & others case passed on 26 Oct 2016 calls for 'equal pay for equal work' in the case of temporary em-ployees working under the government. Hence, the Committee has demanded that the judgment be implemented in Sikkim

Addressing a press conference here today, SSC vice-convener Nawin Kiran Pradhan, alleged of injustice and exploitation of temporary employees of the state government. He informed that the historic judgment of the Supreme Court has to be applied in all States of the country but it has not been implemented in Sikkim so far.

"It is the right of a temporary employee to

get equal pay for equal work. We will not stop with this representation to the CS but will continuously pursue this mat-ter till its logical end. I would also like to appeal to temporary employees to come forward," Mr Pradhan said.

He stated that a recent notification of the Department of Personnel on 18 Aug 2017 mentioned that the salary of temporary employees under the state government has not been made at par with regular employees. On the same, he alleged that this notification was totally against the judgment of the Supreme Court.
Likewise, SSC general

secretary, Sonam Pintso Bhutia, demanded that the state government immediately take initiative on this issue otherwise the SSC will approach the High Court to provide justice to the temporary employees of Sikkim.

The Committee has also demanded the reintroduction of second Saturdays as state holiday to provide time to government employees to spend some time with their families. The state government had scrapped the second Sat-urday holiday in 2014.

Those hopes were premature.

"As each year ticks by, the chances of avoiding 2 C of warming continue to diminish," said co-author Glen Peters, research di-rector at Center for International Climate Re-

search in Oslo, Norway. "Given that 2 C is ex tremely unlikely based on current progress, then 1.5 C is a distant dream," he told AFP.

The quake was centered 31 kilometers outside the eastern Iraqi city of Halabja, accordmeasurements from the US Geological Survey. It struck at 9:48 pm Iran time, just as people began retiring for the night.

The earthquake struck 23.2 kilometers

below the surface, a shallow depth that can amplify damage. Magnitude earthquakes can be highly destructive.

Iranian social media news agencies showed images and videos of people fleeing their homes. More than 100 aftershocks followed.

The quake's worst damage appeared to be in the town of Sar-pol-e-Zahab in Kermanshah province, which sits in the Zagros Mountains that divide Iran and Iraq.

Kokab Fard, 49-year-old housewife in Sarpol-e-Zahab, said she fled empty-handed when her apartment complex collapsed. "Immediately after I managed to get out the building collapsed," Fard said. "I have no ac-

cess to my belongings."

### Unfortunately, Not Every Child gets to be a Student

Children's Day should hence not be limited to schools either

This is not a new theme, but since this is not really a new Day we might as well revieit old thomas which new Day, we might as well revisit old themes which continue to hold true. It is Children's Day today, but we may as well call it Students' Day. It will not come as a surprise if most do not even see a discrepancy there because for most of us, children and students are the same. But they aren't. Despite whatever the governments at the Centre and the in the States might claim about Right To Education, many children remain out of the school system and many are only occasionally students, their privations keeping them engaged elsewhere for survival. And yet, Children's Day will see festivities exclusively limited to school campuses

Since most of the children, at least in Sikkim, are enrolled in schools, this focus on schools is perhaps not misplaced, but it would have been welcome if the celebrations at schools were complemented by some genuine attention being invested on the young who are not as privileged and need issues besetting them addressed. In Sikkim's case, these would be children employed at homes as domestic help or working in commercial establishments across the State. Yes again, all that talk about banning child labour has remained essentially that, talk, with the children most at risk continuing to be made to slave as domestic servants or "helpers" at shops. Yes, there is a law against employing children under 14 years of age in any kind of work. and while there is no doubt that this law is extensively broken, very little is done to ensure enforcement or penalize those who continue to make children work for survival.

On Children's Day, disturbing realities of growing up without privileges should be addressed, the shame accepted and more than tokenism invested on resolving the challenge. Take the students out into the real rld and its ugliness in as much as how we continue to fail the young and leave them to the mercy of their economic conditions or exposed to the predatory plans of those who exploit. One will not have to look too hard to find such examples, they sleep in the kitchens or under the stairs of too many homes around us. One is not suggesting here that the students be unleashed on Sikkim homes to rescue the under 14-yearolds from bondage, although even that is an idea worth exploring. The students could however be encouraged to take gifts and sweets for such kids on Children's Day. They will not be judging the families which employ them, yet, at the same time, they will be noticing that children continue to be made to work when they should be at play or studying. Open their eyes to this, and may be they will also grow more compassionate. What better gift for them on Children's Day than compassion? Even if the schools and elders shudder at thought of such direct confrontation, at least tell the children at school about how privileged they are to be able escape the trap which keeps others their age at home - not as pampered children but as domestic servants. That way, may be when they grow-up, they will do something real about sending such abuse and exploitation.

What we could also do on Children's Day is release the report card on POCSO Act cases in Sikkim in the past year. Inform the State about how many complaints were received under the Prevention of Children from Sexual Offences Act, how many cases registered, how many convictions secured and how many predators did we release back into society after "settling" the cases.

## How women bring about peace and change in Liberia

iberian President Ellen Johnson Liberian Fresident Entir Journal African country. Her two terms in office ended with elections last month since, like the United States, presidents in Liberia are barred from serving more than two terms.

Affectionately known as "Ma El-len," Sirleaf took office at the end of a 14-year civil war in which an estimated 200,000 Liberians were killed.

Sickened and fatigued by war, thousands of Liberian women, through mass action, brought about an end to the conflict in 2003.

These same women took great risks to elect Sirleaf on her promise to sustain peace and make gender equality central to her administra-tion's agenda. Some women hid their sons' voter ID cards to prevent them from voting for Sirleaf's opponent; others tricked the young men into exchanging their cards for beer; still others managed market stalls while their female owners went to register to vote and watched babies so that

mothers could vote on Election Day.

These women, many of whom belong to the Women in Peace Building Network (WIPNET), are identifi-able by their white T-shirts with blue WIPNET insignia. They are a power ful, widely respected group for what they have accomplished and continue to fight for.

When Sirleaf came to power in 2005, the world was electrified. On Inauguration Day in January 2006, proud Liberians, world leaders and dignitaries watched as she took the oath of office.

Sirleaf singled out the women in the peace movement, thanking them for their courage, and committed to supporting their agenda. The Sir-leaf administration kept some of its promises but with notable challeng-es. Liberia has tough rape laws, but weak enforcement mechanisms, and in 2016, Parliament signed into a law a new domestic violence bill but removed a ban on female genital muti-

At the end of Sirleaf's two terms in office, peace has held, but the results of progress on gender equality

#### WOMEN AND PEACE HUTS

Today, some of the powerful grass-roots women who brought Sirleaf to power are at the forefront of running what are known as peace huts. Spread across the country, the purposes of these huts are to put wom-en in charge of mediating domestic abuse and other disputes before they escalate, to empower women through entrepreneurial opportunities and to educate them about their rights.

By and large, Liberian women and girls are well aware of their rights,

and especially those enshrined in the UN Security Council Resolution 1325.

Adopted in 2000, the resolution recognizes that women bear the brunt and horrors of war, and calls for women's full participation in conflict prevention, resolution and peace-building. Peace huts in Liberia are instrumental in teaching womer
— including those not formally educated - about these rights.

Peace huts work for gender equal-ity, peace and human rights. But they much more. The Ebola crisis of 2014 led to the deaths of an estimated 11,315 people and strained already fragile health-care systems. Women who ran peace huts in some of the communities stepped in to help the sick and dying, and some of them died in the process.

#### GAINS AND LOSSES

There is general agreement among most Liberians that the Sirleaf administration stabilized the country and attracted investment. But there are those who also feel that, notwithstanding a staunch patriarchal culture, women have actually lost ground, especially in politics.

Of the 1,026 approved candidates in the election cycle, only 163 were women, and, in a field of 20 candi-

dates, only one woman, Macdella Cooper, ran for president, and she lost badly

Tackling corruption, infrastructure, youth unemployment and reconciliation by promoting national unity and advancing a peace agenda topped ballot issues in the elections.

Noticeably absent was a targeted focus on addressing violence against omen and girls.

Yet the UN Women's Global Da-tabase on Violence Against Women report that 39 per cent of Liberian women between 15-49 years old experience physical and/or sexual violence at the hands of intimate part-

ners at least once in their lifetime.

Women who run peace huts
spend much of their time supporting victims of gender-based violence.
Where they are available, women work with the police to arrest the alleged perpetrators. But justice for victims is often hampered by a weak legal system.

Nonetheless, Liberian women rightly view themselves as the guardians of a hard-won peace connected to the fight for gender justice. They view peace as foundational to prosperity that can take root only if there is an end to gender-based violence and respect for rights.

### AN UNCERTAIN BUT

RAPE IS A CRIME

HOPEFUL FUTURE
The elections on Oct. 10 did not yield clear results. The frontrunners, Sen. George Weah and Vice-President Joseph Boaki, were scheduled for a run-off election on Nov. 7. However, the Liberian Supreme Court recently suspended the second round of voting pending an investigation into altions of "fraud and irregularities."

It is, therefore, too early to tell if gender equality will top the new administration's agenda, but there's room for guarded optimism.

Large groups of activist women in Liberia are prepared to continue to fight for equality and are unafraid to do so. Wearing their WIPNET T-shirts. women have come out in force in re-cent years to press the government to change or implement laws, usually with the support of an engaged public.

The new administration would do

well to work with women in the peace huts and in civil society to achieve success. Without a strong voice for gender equality, it's unlikely that the new Liberian government will realize its political goals.

## Why conflict can be necessary to bring about justice

ach week, it seems that fresh inci-Each week, it seems that it could be dents of violence, aggression and hatred emerge. The threat of nuclear war, terrorist attacks, mass shootings and the ongoing brutality in Myanmar continue to confound us. It's as though conflict is to be expected; it's inevitable.

It would be easy to fall into despair

about the state of our world given recent events that have caused so much human suffering, death and anxiety.

As a professor of political science and

esearcher in conflict resolution I see and hear the despondency in my students. Many send me emails expressing fear that the world is heading towards very serious trouble. There is a high level of anxiety about what is happening in distant lands,

across the border and here at home.

Given the prevalence and persistence of violence and conflict throughout history, and in the present day, it would also be easy to draw the conclusion that it's an inescapable part of the human experience, something we ought to resign ourselves to, and a fact of life that we will never be rid of.

#### SHOULD PEACE ALWAYS MEAN NO CONFLICT?

From my perspective, it's not clear wheth-



er the situation now is worse than it was in the past. Some, in fact, argue that our world is more peaceful and less conflicted

than it once was.

This might be good news to some. But I believe it's important to reflect on the possibility that peace and stability may not serve the interests of everyone.

If we seek justice or liberation in our world, then we must change the conversation about conflict. This is because con-

flict has, in many cases, proven integral to achieving a more equitable and secure

we place justice above peace as the ultimate goal, the discussion about contemporary violence and conflict shifts into an examination of the complexity of these issues, and the different attitudes, expecta-

tions and circumstances that drive conflict.

It seems to me that talk of peace is often no more than a championing of the positions power privilege MANDELA FORCED TO

time, those who cham-pion change, those driven by a desire to upend the status quo in the interest of justice or liberation,

fully prepared to use violence to achieve

their goals.

Think of Nelson Mandela and the African National Congress, which was willing to pursue a peaceful solution in South Africa. When the white minority did not reciprocate the desire for that peaceful solution, armed struggle was viewed as the only recourse.

I see many cases of contemporary vio-

lent conflict arising from the fact that peo ple must live in countries with arbitrary borders - countries that lack any single political tradition, and that have institu-tions that are too weak to manage conflicting pressures from within. Such situations exist everywhere from Iraq to Congo and Somalia.

If we continue to prioritize peace over justice, then we will also continue to live in a world in which far too many people are suffering injustice. And that means, iron-ically, such a world will remain unstable and conflicted.

I struggle with the dilemma that the humane solutions are often ineffective, and the effective solutions are often inhumane. The status quo makes many states in Africa and elsewhere vulnerable to on-going conflict, yet the changes necessary to address these problems would likely also involve intolerable amounts of upheaval and conflict.

For now, the international community appears willing to tolerate the status quo, believing that it provides a tolerable level of stability.

But can we be certain that this stability serves the interests of everyone?

Make public the peace accord signed with NSCN-IM: Ibobi Singh

IMPHAL, NOV 13 (PTI): Senior Congress lead-er and former Manipur Chief Minister Okram Ibobi Singh has demanded that the Centre make public the peace accord it signed with the National Socialist Council of Nagaland (IM).

Singh demanded this while participating at a sit-in protest organised by the Congress at Thangmeiband area yesterday.

He said any solution

to end to the Naga insurgency should be confined to Nagaland state only and not Manipur.

The Centre and NSCN (IM) had signed a peace accord on August 3, 2015.

Singh cautioned the Centre that offering any sort of autonomy related with administration, culture and finance, as per the demands of a particu-lar rebel group, will "lead to chaos and disintegration" of a sensitive state like Manipur.

Singh said the Centre should not try to "ap-pease" a particular community as the border state (Manipur) is inhabited by more than 30 different ethnic groups and is not a domain of one community.

The NSCN (IM) has been demanding integra-tion of Naga inhabited areas of Manipur, Assam and Arunachal Pradesh with Nagaland.

A Congress leader to-day said the party would organise a series of protest meetings at all 60 as-sembly constituencies of the state to demand that the Centre make public the peace accord it signed with the (NSCN-IM).

## **Chopper-based air dispensary** for NE to be a reality soon

(PTI): The Northeast will soon get a helicopter-based air dispensary the first of its kind, to serve the people in remote areas in the region. Union minister Jitendra Singh has said.

The Northeast is all set to get India's first-ever air dispensary in a helicopter. The Union helicopter. The Union Ministry of Development of Northeast (DONER) has already contribut-ed Rs 25 crore as part of the initial funding for this initiative, he said at a meeting here yesterday.

Representatives of the aviation sector and helicopter service Pawan Hans were among those who attended the meeting.

For a few months, the



DoNER Ministry explored the idea of introducing a helicopter-based dispensary/OPD service in far flung areas, where no doctor or medical facility is available and the patient does not have access to medical care, the

minister said. The proposal put forward by the Ministry of DoNER has been accept-ed and is in the final stages of the process in the ministry of civil aviation, a statement said.

Singh said his min-istry was keenly pursu-ing the proposal so that it could be the central government's gift to the people of the Northeast by the beginning of 2018.

The service being introduced in the Northeast can also be emulated in other hill states having difficult topography, such as Jammu and Kashmir and Himachal Pradesh, he said.

According to the plan, helicopters will be based at two locations - Imphal and Shillong, which have premier post- graduate medical institutes from where doctors, along with equipment and paramedical staff, would be able to fly over eight states in the region.

On its way back, the same helicopter can also carry a sick patient to a city hospital, he said.

The minister said three twin-engine helicopters are proposed to be stationed for the initial operation on six routes in the region around Imphal, Guwahati

### State needs central funds for Bru repatriation: Lalbiakzama

AIZAWL, NOV 13 (PTI): The Mizoram govern-ment would not be able to implement the Centre's proposal of repatriating over 3,500 Bru families from Tripura in the first week of December for want of funds, a senior state home department official said today.

Additional Secretary for Home Lalbiakzama told PTI that the state government had sent a plan to the ministry of home affairs in September, seeking sanction and release of funds for the programme, and was waiting for an approval.

"The Ministry of Home Affairs has to sanction the state gov-ernment's proposal and release funds to the tune of more than Rs 120 crore. Only then the state government will be able



to go ahead with the repatriation process," Lalbiakzama said.

after the Centre approved the proposal, it would take the state gov-ernment at least a month to procure rice from the Food Corporation of India (FCI) for distribution among these families, he said.

Thousands of Bru families had migrated to neighbouring Tripu ra owing to a communal tension triggered by the murder of a game watcher by suspected militants on October 21, 1997.

Though a number of them have returned to Mizoram over the years, a sizeable population continued to live in the relief camps of the neighbouring state.

## Bengal mulls fish farming in cages


The West Bengal Fisher ies department has de-cided to initiate farming of fishes in cages across the state to meet the bur-geoning local demand and also to cut down dependence on neighbour-ing states for supplies, a senior official has said.

"We have decided to initiate the fish cage culture system or cage aquaculture across West Bengal," the official of the Fisheries department told PTI.

For the purpose, brackish water bodies owned by the State Fisheries Development Corporation (SFDC) as well as by fishery cooperatives and private owners would be used, the official said.

"Similar fish cage culture has been done by private organisations, but on much smaller scales. We are planning to come up with this on a much bigger scale," he said, Cage

IndiGo passenger hurt after wheelchair fall, AAI says 'gross negligence<sup>e</sup>

NEW DELHI, NOV 13 (PTI): A woman passenger of IndiGo was in-jured after she fell from a wheelchair while being ferried by the airline staff-er at the Lucknow airport, a "mishap" that has triggered a spat between the carrier and the AAI.

The incident took place at 2000 hours on Saturday and IndiGo has claimed that the mishap happened due to crack in the floor at the airport even as the Airports Au-thority of India (AAI) has said it all happened because of "gross negli-gence of IndiGo staff".

The latest incident comes days after IndiGo came under fire and apologised following the surfacing of a video of a passenger being manhandled at the Delhi

airport.
In a statement shared with PTI today, an IndiGo spokesperson apologised for the mishap involving passenger, Urvashi

Parikh Viren. "Our IndiGo representative was pushing her wheelchair towards the arrival hall. As he was guiding her wheelchair through a vehicular lane. which was dimly lit at that time of the night, her wheelchair got stuck in a deep crack on the tarmac and lost halance and she fell off her wheelchair," the spokesperson said.

According to the airline, the passenger was "injured" and was immediately rushed to the doctor of the AAI and was administered first aid.

The state-owned AAI, which is operating the Lucknow airport, in a statement today said that as per investigations, it all happened due to "gross negligence of In-diGo staff as he chose the wrong path on the tar-mac and mishandled the passenger".

"I am a voung man of 25 with a

lot to learn in football."

Neymar has generally dazzled in Ligue 1 since completing his 222 million euros ( 259 million) transfer from Barcelona, but his recent performances have betrayed signs of unease. He was sent off in PSG's 2-2 draw

at Marseille after being shown a sec ond yellow card for reacting angrily



Although he scored (and squandered a penalty) against Japan, he was also booked for cuffing Hiroki Sakai -- who, coincidentally, plays for Marseille -- on the back of the head.

More worrying yet for PSG's fans have been the reports emanat-ing from Brazil that Neymar has already expressed regret about leaving Barcelona.

He has returned to Barcelona at least twice since the start of the season, twice being pictured on social



## I&B ministry overrules IFFI jury, drops 'S Durga', 'Nude'

NEW DELHI, NOV 13 (PTI): The information and broadcasting ministry has overruled the decision of the IFFI jury and pulled out Malayalam movie "S Durga" and Marathi film "Nude" from the 48th edition of the film festival in Goa later this month, the movies' directors say.

"S Durga" director Sanal Kumar Sasidharan and "Nude" director Ravi Jadhav said they are shocked and disappointed by the decision to drop the films from the Panorama section.

A jury member, who spoke on the condition

of anonymity, termed the ministry's decision

"unprecedented".

The ministry did not respond to the re-

"The jury's recommendations are final and cannot be changed without consulting them. But the ministry has gone ahead and dropped the two films on its own," he said.

"Nude", he added, is so good that the

13-member Panorama jury, headed by Sujoy Ghosh, recommended it as the opening film for 48th International Film Festival of India in Goa from November 20-28.

He described "Nude" as a strong feminist film and "S Durga", a movie with a strong message about women's safety.

The Malayalam film was orginally called

"Sexy Durga" and had won awards in international film festivals.

According to him, the jury's recommenda-tion is usually made public almost immediately after it hands the list to the minister's office.

The jury submitted its list to the ministry on September 20-21 but the line-up was made public only recently and without the name of the two films, he disclosed.

A disheartened Sasidharan alleged that the



list was delayed on purpose.

He said he is in shock and has not received any letter from the ministry about why Durga" did not make the cut.

The film, a road movie that follows the horrifying experience of two hitchhikers, a man and a woman, at the hands of two men in the dead of the night, won the Hivos Tiger Award in the International Film Festival Rotterdam

Sasidharan told PTI that he's planning to approach the court after this "clever move" by the ministry.

delayed it on purpose. It was a clever move.

"They are supposed to publish the list two-three weeks before the festival begins but they

There's only a week left till the festival and it will be difficult for us to go to the court now. But I will file a case in the Kochi High Court," Sasidharan said. The director said some jury members told him the two films were in the list given to the ministry.

Jadhav, whose film depicts the struggle of

a woman secretly working as a nude model in Mumbai, is equally disappointed. He said he has written a letter to the min-

istry to know what exactly happened and why his film was rejected.

"Give me some reason at least. It was selected as the opening film. It was a big honour. I am really disappointed and shocked to hear that it has been dropped. Nobody informed me

about the decision," Jadhav told PTI.

Jadhav, whose previous credits include critically acclaimed films such as "Natrang", "Balak Palak" and "Balgandharva", said it is difficult for him to accept that a selected film has been dropped without any explanation.

"My film was chosen for this, you can't take away my right. Just talk to me once? My experience of IFFI in all these years has been very good. My previous films were screened there as well."

He said he didn't make the film to titillate anybody. It is, Jadhav said, dedicated to nude models across the world who give their body for the education of art students.

Rajesh Kumar Singh, a member of the pre-view committee that selects entries from the Indian Panorama section for the international competition at IFFI, took up the issue of the two films on Twitter.

"Sexy Durga is now part of Indian Panora-ma section at IFFI and will now be exhibited at Goa and across India," Singh, a producer-director, tweeted on November 9, tagging Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Information and Broadcasting Minister Smriti Irani.

He put out another tweet, again tagging Irani, "If any of the Panorama Jury dares to disagree with the decision to drop two artistically bad films Nude & Sexy Durga from Panorama line up, their understanding of film art & craft is poor. It was a bad decision to select these third rate films in Panorama. @smritiirani." Scriptwriter Apurva Asrani, a jury membe

has praised the films for presenting "a powerful & empathetic portrait of women in today s India".

## ASEAN summit kicks off as China shadow looms

MANILA, Nov 13 (PTI): Leaders of the 10-member ASEAN bloc today began a two-day summit on key challenges even as concerns over terror-ism, North Korea's nuclear programme and China's expansionist military posturing in the region returned as a major focus area of deliberations.

In his inaugural speech at the highly fortified Cultural Centre here, Philippines President Rodrigo Duterte talked about various challenges facing the region and identified terrorism and violent extrem-ism as threats that "know no boundaries".

The inaugural session of the summit was attended by leaders from the Association of Southeast Asian Nations' (ASEAN) dialogue partner countries which included Prime Minister Narendra Modi, US President Donald Trump, Chinese Premier Li Keqiang, Japanese Prime Min-ister Shinzo Abe, South Korean President Moon Jae-in and



Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kvi

Several parts of the city also witnessed demonstrations by civil rights activists who opposed Trump's visit

Diplomats said the thorny issue of China's aggressive military manoeuvres in the disputed South China Sea, North Korea's nuclear missile tests and the overall security architecture in the region will be the focus areas of the summit

North Korea's recent missile and nuclear tests demonstrating its ability to launch long-range ballistic missiles have sparked fears that the reclusive Communist state is developing nuclear weapons than previously estimated by the US.

Regular joint US South Korea military drills as well as US warnings to North Korea have raised tensions recently in the region and beyond.

China claims sovereignty over almost all of the South China Sea, a huge source of hydrocarbons. However, several ASEAN members including Vietnam, the Philippines and Brunei have counter

In the backdrop of rising tensions over Chinese asser-

tiveness in the disputed region, Trump, during a meeting with Vietnamese President Tran Dai Quang in Vietnam vesterday, offered to mediate in the lingering dispute.

India has been pressing for ensuring freedom of nav-igation and overflight in the region, a view which finds consonance with positions of major global players in the region including the US, Australia and Japan.

Trade ties between India and ASEAN are on an upswing and both sides want to further boost trade and investment cooperation.

## Trump hails 'great relationship' with self-proclaimed killer Duterte

MANILA, NOV 13 (AFP): Donald Trump declared today he had a "great relationship" with Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte, a self-pro-claimed killer who is waging a drugs war that rights groups say involves mass murder, as the leaders joked with each other in Manila.

The US president is in the Philippines with leaders of 18 other nations for two days of summits, the final leg of a head-line-grabbing Asian tour dominated by the North Korean nuclear crisis.

Allegations of Russian

meddling in last year's US presidential elections have dogged the second half of his 12- day trip. which has taken him fro Japan to South Korea, China and Vietnam.

Rights groups had called on Trump to end

his Asian journey with a strong statement against Duterte's drugs which has seen police

kill thousands of people.
But Trump and Duterte had a series of encounters last night and this morning in which they appeared to enjoy each others' company, leading to warm praise from the US president during official talks at lunchtime.

and suspected vigilantes

"We've had a great relationship. This has been very successful," Trump told Duterte in brief Duterte opening remarks at their reeting.

praised Duterte for organisation of the summits, saying handled them "beautifully".

"I've really enjoyed

being here," he said.

As the reporters were being escorted out of

the room, one asked if Trump would raise the issue of human rights, to which Duterte jokingly called the media "spies",

and neither answered.

Duterte, believing he is taking necessary mea-sures to fight crime, but rights groups warn he may be orchestrating a crime against humanity.

A m n e s t y International accuses police of shooting dead

defenceless people and paying assassins to murder addicts.

When pressured over allegations of extra-judi-cial killings carried out by police, Duterte insists he has never told them to break the law.
But rights

groups say police are following Duterte's incitements to kill, including comments made last year when he said he would be "happy to slaughter" three million addicts.

He has also repeatedly boasted about killing people himself, most recently last week while in Vietnam for the Asia-Pacific economic summit.
"At the age of 16, I

already killed someone. A real person, a rumble, a stabbing. I was just 16 vears old. It was just over a look," Duterte said. Former US president

Barack Obama was one of many prominent crit-ics of Duterte's handling of the drugs war.

Relations between the Philippines and the United States, longtime allies bound by a mutual defence treaty, deteriorated sharply as Duterte turned towards China

Duterte last vear declared the Philippines'
"separation" from the United States.

But Trump told Dute-rte in a telephone call in April that he was doing a great job", which helped to begin a diplomatic thaw.

"We are your ally. We are an important ally, Duterte said today, appearing to confirm relations were back on track, although he has also continued to court China and Russia.

## China hopes quadrilateral meet not directed against it

BEIJING, NOV 13 (PTI): Skirting any direct re-sponse to the first quadrilateral meeting of India, US, Japan and Australia, China today questioned its exclusion from the group and expressed hope that the new concept of 'Indo-Pacific' is not directed against it.

"The relevant pro-posals should be open and inclusive and should be conducive to win-win cooperation and avoid politicising or excluding the relevant parties," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said at a media briefing here.

He was answering a spate of questions on th Indo-Pacific concept and the quadrilateral meeting yesterday at Manila

Asked whether meant "exclusion of the relevant parties" referred to omission of China, Geng said China welcomes the development of friendly cooperation between rel-

evant countries.
"We hope this kind of relations will not be directed at a third party and conducive to the regional peace and stability. This is the general concept and I think this kind of position applies to any proposal," he said.

Giving shape and substance to the Indo-Pacific concept by virtually replacing the previous Asia-Pacific, the US, India, Japan and Australia yesterday held their first official-level talks in Manila ahead of the ASEAN summit with a focus on keeping the region "free and open", amid China's growing military presence in the strategic area.

The move is seen as counter to China's ag-gressive behaviour in the area. They agreed that a open, prosperous inclusive Indo-Pacific region serves the long-term interests of all countries in the region
