Twenty-two candidates

Twenty-two candidates of Sikkim have qualified for the Regional Mathematical Olympiad [RMO] The Pre-Regional Mathematical Olympiad was held on 20 Aug at Government Senior Secondary School Rangpo, Sikkim Centre, a press release informs.

Homi Bhabha Centre for Science Education (HBCSE) declared the Pre-RMO Result 2017 today. A total of 13,500 students have qualified for the RMO 2017 from all over India.

The top 500 students (plus those having the same score as the 500th candidate) from each re-gion have been selected to appear for the Regional Mathematical Olympiad, as per the release.

Dr. Hannah Yonzan, the Principal of Government Senior Secondary School. Rangpo reported that 41 candidates had appeared out of the 46 registered nd 22 candidates qualified the said examination.

Out of 22 qualified candidates, 13 are from Rangpo Sr. Sec. School, 08 from Thurpu Sr. Sec. School and 01 from East Point School Singtam. The candidates who have qualified will need to register for the RMO 2017 Exam at https://secure.hbcse.tifr. res.in/rmo2017regn/ by verifying their details on or before 01 Oct.

The RMO Exam will be held in the respective regions on 08 Oct 2017 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Based on the RMO

exam, the final list of 30 top students plus the next 5 girl students will be sent by each regional co-ordinator to HBCSE by 30 Nov. This should re-evaluation (provision for which is mandatory).

HBCSE will announce

the list of students eligible to appear for Indian Na-tional Mathematical Olympiad 2018 (INMO 2018) from all regions by 07 Dec.
The INMO exam will

be held on 21 Jan 2018 and will be conducted by each regional co-ordinator and the papers sent to HBCSE.

Those students who qualify INMO will be eligible to appear for International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO).

raised by the MPs and MLAs were - recent series of ex-treme climatic events such as heavy rains, floods and landslides affecting the region; policy framework by the Center often does not take into account that the increased cost of infrastructure projects in the North Eastern Region: lack of basic infrastructure such as hospitals and schools in far flung areas of most Mountain States and adverse impact of climate change on main drivers of economy such as agriculture and tourism.



Recognise the Contribution of Counsellors

Intent is never enough, rehabilitation requires commitment

Rehabilitation of any kind is difficult. It is an ongoing task even when it is material tasks that one speaks of. The process continues, for example at Dikchu where the dam that had forced a sweep of rehabilitation when it was being constructed continues to create new needs and reasons for relief and rehabilitation even though the project itself was completed and commissioned sev eral years back. These are the material challenges of rehabilitation. It is, however, also obvious that when one speaks of rehabilitation in terms of reconstructing lives shredded by substance abuse and alcoholism and not just homes rendered unsafe by blasting of sinking, the challenge multiplies many times over. It is already difficult of make people change, but when the change being demanded is to give up not only psychological cravings but also surmount the body's physical dependence on chemicals, the challenge acquires epic proportions.

Very few measure up to this daunting task; families often take the convenient exit route of ignoring the problem or shaming the victim (ves. it happens to addicts as well) and even doctors have been known to, on occasion, prefer prescribing the prescription med of abuse as medication instead of making time for counselling sessions which could all eventually go to waste. The society still washes its hands off addicts by branding them as misfit delinquent no-gooders and many schools would rather expel the "bad apples" rather than heal them. Even the Government prefers to engage with the problem as a law & order/ crime & punishment issue rather than understand the many layers and nuances with which a solution can be fashioned.

It is against this backdrop that the support provided

by counsellors who continue to work among the addicts despite the general thanklessness of the society makes them heroes in these present times of easy distancing and convenient othering. Unfortunately, heroes are always in short supply and although there are many in Sikkim who are actively involved in counselling addicts and working patiently to get them walking the path of recovery, there is a felt need for more if Sikkim is to even make a dent in the citadel that addiction has constructed in the State. For this to happen, Sikkim will have to also recognise the contributions of these volunteers at the right platform as much to thank them for persevering with a responsibility that the society has danced away from as to inspire more to deploy their persuasive skills towards saving more lives. After all, where others would turn a blind eye or spare only disdain, they counsel, coax, care and tend to victims of substance abuse and try to rehabilitate them. What they do is not easy, and the least they deserve in return is recognition for their service.

After this, even the "sober" should seek out their counsel to inform their anti-drug laws better and construct the social networks required to catch and steady those who fall under the spell of "drugs".

Twin Earthquakes expose Mexico's deep inequality

m 1810}$, priest Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla rang the bell of his church in the small town of Dolores, near Guanajuato, Mexico. His parishioners gathered round, and he urged them to revolt against Spain's two-year-old Napoleonic government.

Hidalgo's call to arms, which later became known later as the Grito de Dolores (Crv of Dolores), triggered the Mexican War of Independence. Every September 15, the president of Mexico takes to the balcony of the National Palace in Mexico City to reenact it.

This year, just a week before Independence Day, a historic earth-quake struck Mexico's southern coast, killing nearly 100 people. So President Enrique Peña Nieto add-ed a poignant element to his Grito by including in the incantation a reference to the impoverished states that were most devastated by the quake, crying "Long live the solidarity of Mexicans with Chiapas and Oaxaca!"

It was a nice twist on tradition. but these two states will need more than expressions of solidarity to recover. The 8.2 magnitude quake is the strongest Mexico has experienced in 100 years, surpassing even the Sept. 19, 1985 earthquake that killed up to 40,000 people in and around Mexico City, according to

the highest estimates.

It was also significantly more powerful than the recent 7.1 magnitude earthquake that killed upwards of 200 people in and around Mexico's capital on September 19.

NATURAL AND MAN-MADE DISASTERS

This latest quake shook Mexico City 32 years to the day after the 1985 "big one." I was 11 years old when the quake hit, and I recall the government of President Miguel de la Madrid reacting with what can only be described as criminal apathy: In the first days after the disaster, he prevented the army from rescuing victims and rejected international aid.

The people of Mexico City, how-ever, took to the streets, distributing food, water and blankets among those who needed them and digging neighbors free from the rubble with

This time around, the death toll

is significantly lower than it was in 1985: 78 fatalities in Oaxaca, 16 in Chiapas and four in Tabasco for the first earthquake, and more than 220 for the second. In part, this reflects improvements in building regulations since 1985 and the creation of both a Mexican Seismic Alert System and a

National Civil Protection System.
Still, the damages are daunting. Scores of buildings in Mexico City

have suffered catastrophic damage.
But it was Oaxaca and Chiapas Mexico's two poorest states - that took the harshest blow. More than 2,500 schools have been severely harmed and 85,000 houses have been

it needs to go.
Unequal development in Mexico is an ongoing challenge. A recent report from the Bank of Mexico showed that during the second trimester of 2017, the Mexican economy grew in north (0.9 percent), center-north (1.2 percent) and central zones (0.7 percent), home to such powerhouse cities as Monterrey, Guadalajara and Mexico City, but contracted over 1 percent in

the rural south.

If there's a silver lining to these earthquakes, it's that the post-disaster recovery analyses have finally shed some light on the historical neglect of Chiapas and Oaxaca,

lion against the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), which

had just been signed.
Condemning NAFTA as a death sentence for traditional agricultural methods still practiced on collective-ly owned indigenous lands, the First Declaration of the Lacandona Jungle asserted that Chiapas' rural popula-tion had "nothing": "no land, no work, no health care, no food nor education" not even a roof over their heads.

As the recent earthquake reveals,

the plight of indigenous Mexicans has not improved markedly over the past 200 years. Their homes offered tenuous shelter from the quake at at best, and their food supplies, long deli-

cate, are now running short. THE WORST AND THE

BEST OF MEXICO

Mexico is and always will be a land
of earthquakes. Pre-Columbian records report seismic activity at-tributed to the wrath of gods said to be unhappy about the state of human affairs.

Today, quakes still unearth the

best and the worst in Mexico. It's not clear that Peña Nieto, whose government is dogged by scandals and wildly public corrup-tion, can make use of this crisis to bring social change to Oaxaca and

Other politicians are falling short of this high bar, too. In a Facebook video, the wife of Chi-apas Governor Manuel Velasco, a member of Peña Nieto's inner circle. toured a ruined Chiapas home to show the administration "is helping" but lamented her "tousled" hair.

The populace, at least, is coming to its own assistance. Right after the quake in Mexico City, people formed veritable factory lines of diggers to excavate their buried neighbors and lent out bicycles so stranded col-

leagues could make their way home.
Residents of Mexico's southern region have also showed the country what resilience looks like, even in the face of overwhelming historic odds. In the town of Juchitán, Oaxaca, where the historic town hall pancaked after the earthquake, a man picked up a Mexican flag that had previously decorated its facade, shook off the dust and then, in an act that touched millions, he placed it atop the debris.

In both states, the lowest-income families make as little as 37 pesos (US\$2) per day, less than half the the Mexican minimum wage, which is 80.04 pesos, or around \$4.50 a day.

How the invention of zero helped create modern mathematics

A small dot on an old piece of birch bark marks one of the biggest events in the history of mathematics. The bark is actually part of an ancient Indian mathematical document known as the Bakhshali manuscript. And the dot is the first known recorded use of the number zero. What's more, researchers from the University of Oxford recently discovered the document is 500 years older than was previously estimated, dating to the third or fourth century - a breakthrough discovery.

Today, it's difficult to imagine how you could have mathematics without zero. In a positional number system, such as the decimal system we use now, the location of a digit is really important. Indeed, the real difference between 100 and 1,000,000 is where the digit 1 is located, with the symbol

0 serving as a punctuation mark.
Yet for thousands of years we did without it. The Sumerians of 5,000BC employed a positional system but without a 0. In some rudimentary form, a symbol or a space was used

20000004. But that symbol was never used at 5 and 500 had to be determined by context.

What's more, 0 at the end of a number

makes multiplying and dividing by 10 easy, as it does with adding numbers like 9 and 1 together. The invention of zero immensely simplified computations, freeing mathema ticians to develop vital mathematical dis-ciplines such as algebra and calculus, and eventually the basis for computers.

Zero's late arrival was partly a reflection of the negative views some cultures held for the concept of nothing. Western philosophy is plagued with grave misconceptions about nothingness and the mystical powers of language. The fifth century BC Greek think-er Parmenides proclaimed that nothing cannot exist, since to speak of something is to speak of something that exists. This Par-menidean approach kept prominent histor-ical figures busy for a long while.

After the advent of Christianity, religious leaders in Europe argued that since God is in everything that exists, anything that represents nothing must be satanic. In an attempt to save humanity from the devil, they prompt-ly banished zero from existence, though merchants continued secretly to use it.

By contrast, in Buddhism the concept of nothingness is not only devoid of any de-monic possessions but is actually a central idea worthy of much study en route to nirvana. With such a mindset, having a math-ematical representation for nothing was, well, nothing to fret over. In fact, the English word "zero" is originally derived from the Hindi "sunyata", which means nothingness and is a central concept in Buddhism.

So after zero finally emerged in ancient India, it took almost 1,000 years to set root in Europe, much longer than in China or the Middle East. In 1200 AD, the Italian mathematician Fibonacci, who brought the deci-

mal system to Europe, wrote that:

"The method of the Indians surpasses any known method to compute. It's a marvellous method. They do their computations using nine figures and the symbol zero.'

This superior method of computation, clearly reminiscent of our modern one, freed mathematicians from tediously simple calcula-tions, and enabled them to tackle more complicated problems and study the general properties of numbers. For example, it led to the work of the seventh century Indian mathematician and astronomer Brahmagupta, considered to be the beginning of modern algebra

ALGORITHMS AND CALCULUS

The Indian method is so powerful because it means you can draw up simple rules for doing calculations. Just imagine trying to explain long addition without a symbol for zero. There would be too many exceptions to any rule. The ninth century Persian mathematician Al-Khwarizmi was the first to meticulously note and exploit these arithmetic instructions, which would eventually make the abacus obsolete.

Such mechanical sets of instructions illustrated that portions of mathematics could be automated. And this would eventually lead to the development of modern computers. In fact, the word "algorithm" to

describe a set of simple instructions is derived from the name "Al-Khwarizmi"

The invention of zero also created a new, ore accurate way to describe fractions. Adding zeros at the end of a number increases its magnitude, with the help of a decimal point, adding zeros at the beginning decreases its magnitude. Placing infinitely many digits to the right of the decimal point corresponds to infinite precision. That kind of precision was exactly what 17th century thinkers Isaac New-ton and Gottfried Leibniz needed to develop calculus, the study of continuous change.

And so algebra, algorithms, and calculus, three pillars of modern mathematics, are all the result of a notation for nothing. Mathematics is a science of invisible entities that we can only understand by writing them down. India, by adding zero to the positional number system, unleashed the true power of numbers, advancing mathematics from infancy to adolescence, and from rudi-mentary toward its current sophistication. gry, feminist-inspired, riffy, grunge noise, but on the other, well-produced enough, and with enough hooks and memorable tunes, to stand out from the crowd and get stuck in your head.

The elephant that's always in the room with this album is the circumstances of its release. It remains almost impossible to disentangle Love's entire career from her association with Kurt

By attaching herself to rock's man of the moment, having a child with him, and then steadfastly continuing to refuse to behave, Love became the new Yoko Ono, reviled by fans, critics and Dave Grohl alike. Every uniquely gendered in-

sult that could be thought of was directed her way – starfucker, golddigger, he probably writes her songs for her, it's her fault he's addicted, and most damningly

The surprise of Live Through This was its overwhelmingly positive reception in the face of tragedy. Cobain killed himself a week before the album was due to come out. It turned out to be a perfect soundtrack for the grief and disbelief of the Gen X-ers who had just lost their

From the lyrics - which could only be read as rejected attempts to reach out to someone struggling to survive the effects of celebrity - (from Doll Parts: "yeah they

really want you, but I do too") to the title to the perfect way the rage permeating the album intersected with Love's sur-prisingly well-received performance of the rock widow, even now it is difficult to disassociate Live Through This from Cobain's death.

In many ways though, this is unfair. Live Through This is an album I come back to because it is full of well-crafted and super-catchy but angry, biting, songs that – and this is important – I can shout along with when the mood takes me (or,

let's be honest, at karaoke).

Media workshop on Intensified Mission **Indradhanush for NE States**

Adaylong media work-Shop for 'Intensified Mission Indradhanush [IMI] for North East-ern States of India' was organized by Regional Resource Center for NE States at Hotel Shoolin Grand in Guwahati today.

The main objective of the workshop was to discuss the launch of IMI in the eight states of NE India in an intensified manner from 07 Oct 2017 in order to achieve immunisation targeting 90% children and the media's role for the same.

Addressing the workshop, Director-RRC NE, Dr Bamin Tada, said that the immunisation coverage at the national level is at 62 % as per National Family Health Survey 2015-16. This translated into a cohort of 89 lakh missed children who are hard to reach and under-served populations.

On the full immunis tion status of 2015-16, Dr Tada praised the state of Sikkim and Manipur for their progress in achieving a good percentage on immunisation with Sikkim at 83% and Manipur at 65.9% followed by oth-er states of Meghalaya at 61.5%, Tripura at 54.5%, Mizoram at 50.5%, Arunachal Pradesh at 38.2% and Nagaland at 35.7%. He praised the state of Sikkim for achieving better parameters.

Enlightening about the IMI, Dr Tada ensured

of 90% full immune coverage by December 2018.

"While acknowledg-ing the impact of IMI in improving immunisation coverage across the districts over the three phases, the Prime Minphases, the Fillie Mili-ister, through PRAGATI platform, emphasised the need of a supple-mental aggressive action plan to cover all left outs and drop outs in select districts and urban cit-ies with low routine immunisation coverage in specific time-frame. Four immunization rounds rounds

contd from pg04 ge "soft-loud-soft" dynamic that was so effective for many of the genres' best known bands, partic-ularly the opening pair of tracks Violet and Miss World.

The lyrics throughout deal unapologetically with women's issues, from rape (Asking for It) to motherhood (Plump), even through to Love's critique of the Riot Grrrl movement in Olympia. Many of the songs are about relationships with other women, including difficult ones, rather than love songs about men.

Courtney was by no means the

first woman to create women-centric music, but she was one of the first I came across (small country towns, remember?) That I later tried to start a band was in part thanks to not just Love's role model-ling on Live Through This, but bass player Kirsten Pfaff and drummer

Patty Schemel's. (That I was terrible at it was entirely down to me.)

It is such a good album that I feel confident in saying it would be regarded as a classic even if Cobain was currently trying to make a come-back with a reformed Nirvana after years of dodgy, experimental solo projects.

But as much as judging art purely on its own merits sounds like a nice (if unobtainable) ideal, and as nice as it would be to find a way to assess Hole without having to refer to a man who wasn't in the band, an appreciation of Live Through This is in some ways enhanced by knowing what the band was up against to create the album.

Love was a woman who not only did the things she wasn't supposed to do, but kept doing them in the face of whatever fate or other people would throw her way. To say she

has always done this with grace and in sensible ways would be lying. But despite everything, she is still a fem-inist icon to me.

There is still something inspi-

rational in a scrappy, messy, sor times self-destructive diva who is visibly ageing but also really visibly trying not to age. Because who ong us isn't sometimes a mess and who can claim they really aren't just a bit self-conscious about their growing wrinkles? (Especially after being presented with the flawless visages of Beyonce or Gal Gadot as our current crop of feminist icons.)

Hole might not have lived up to the expectations placed on them, but Live Through This still speaks of potential - particularly feminine potential - being unlocked in new and exciting ways.

Varshney had slapped the girl on Monday eve-ning reportedly for sitting in a tea shop with a young man belonging to the Muslim community.

The incident was captured on camera and went viral on the social media

The police had earlier registered a case under relevant sections of the IPC pertaining to obsceni-ty at a public place against the youth. He was arrested and released on bail,

police officials said.

However, after the video clipping of the incident went viral, there was

outrage.

In the video, Varshney is heard saying, "Tere ko samajh mein nahi aataa kaun Hindu hai, kaun Musalmaan hai. Pyaar se samaihaa rahee hoon. samajh hee mein nahi aa raha. (Don't you understand who is a Hindu and who is a Muslim. I am politely making this clear, but even then it seems that you are not getting it)."

Kalpana Gupta, a womens' rights protection group activist, charged Varshnev with indulging in moral policing and trying to humiliate the girl pub licly despite her assertion that she was an adult and had the right to befriend any one of her choice.

Amid the outrage, the l's father submitted complaint following girl's which a case was registered against Varshney, police officials said. Some activists had al-

legedly rouged up the girl and the youth and had latcalled up BJP wor cell leader Varshney, ac cording to reports.

China to limit oil supplies to North Korea

KIM VARMA BEIJING, SEP 23 (PTI):

hina will restrict oil ex-Cinila vin result. imports from North Korea, the commerce ministry announced today, as Beijing joined global efforts to enforce tighter UN Security Council sanc-tions on Pyongyang for its provocative nuclear and missile tests.

China, the closest ally of North Korea, accounts for about 90 per cent of Pyongyang's foreign trade.

Beijing has halted its imports of coal, iron ore, seafood and other goods, implementing UN sanctions imposed on North Korea for its provocative nuclear and missile tests. As China is North Korea most important trading partner, the suspension of textile mports is expected to affect Pyongyang's income.

The Ministry of Com-erce said it will implement UN Security Council Resolution 2375 by halting the export of liquefied natural gas and gas condensate to North Korea from today and limit exports of refined oil from October 1.

The ban on textile imports will be effective from today, it said. Refined oil exports to North Korea from all UN members is capped at 500,000 barrels from October 1 to the end of the year and two million barrels annually from January 1, 2018. China will suspend such exports once the to-tal exports approach the ceiling, state-run Xinhua

news agency reported.

Exported refined oil products must be used fully on civil purposes, not for North Korea's nuclear and ballistic missile programmes, or other activities banned by the UN Security Council, the ministry said. A limited amount of petroleum products and liquefied natural gas allowed under the UN resolution, would still be exported to North Korea

The UN Sanctions followed recent missile and nuclear tests by the North Korean regime violating the previous resolutions. China's latest tougher stance is expected to bring about a financial isolation for Pyongyang, cutting off its interna-tional transactions routed through Chinese banks.

Yesterday, US President Donald Trump praised China for instructing its banks to cut off business with North Korea. Last month, the US announced sanctions against five Chinese firms and one individual, two Singapore-based companies and three Russian citizens alleging that they support-ed North Korea's nuclear weapons programme.

Working with India to take ties forward post-Doklam: China

China and India are working together to "take forward" their re-lationship leaving behind the Dokalam episode, the Chinese Consul General here has said.

Chinese Consul General Ma Zhanwu also asserted that by working together cooperation and exchanges can be further enhanced.

"India and China are working together. Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Xi Jinping had a meeting on September 5 to discuss how to enhance the relation-ship," Zhanwu said here last night while addressing an event to mark the 68th anniversary of the founding of the People's

Republic of China.

"As long as the two countries work together, we will able to enhance and develop exchanges and cooperation," he said.

Asked if both the buntries have left behind the Doklam episode.

KOLKATA, SEP 23 (PTI): Zhanwu said. "Yes we have left that behind and are working together to take forward the bilateral relationship".

Prime Minister Modi had met President Xi on the sidelines of the 9th BRICS Summit on Sep-
