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Bimal Gurung reminds people of 09 Apr 2008

Former Gorkha Janmukti Morcha president, Bimal Gurung, in a press release issued today from an undisclosed location, has reminded people of 09 April, 2008, a day he marks out as the 'Black Day' when ex-servicemen who were marching in support of the Gorkhaland demand were brutally lathicharged by West Bengal Po-lice in Darjeeling.

The fugitive leader

has further said that on 09 Apr, 2008, 'democra-cy was crushed by West

Bengal'.

"The inhuman treatment and humiliation meted out to our ex-ser-vicemen by the West Bengal Government and its police will not be for-gotten by Gorkhas living across the world," the message reads.

Calling on everyone to

stay alert and vigilant, Mr Gurung has further said, "In Bengal... none of the indigenous communities are safe. Only Rohingyas and illegal Bangladeshis are. The same tiger that seeks to devour me today will be waiting to make you its prey tomorrow."

the sacrifices made by our ex-servicemen won't go in vain, it may take us time, but Gorkhaland will be formed," the message

4 killed, 8 injured in road mishap near Lachung

Four persons were killed in a road mishap today at Lachung in North Sikkim when the vehicle they were travelling in plunged off the road at Chumpyong-kyong be-tween Phaka and Thomsi at around 8:30 AM.

The Mahindra Maxx vehicle, bearing reg-istration number SK-03J-0209, was plying towards Leyma from La-chung ferrying labourers.

The deceased in the mishap are: driver Lak-pa Sherpa, 45, and three ladies Doma Sherpa, Kamala Sherpa and Mingma Bhutia, all of whom died on the spot. The ladies were all residents of Nepal currently engaged as labourers in Lachung.

A total of 12 persons were on-board the ill-fat-ed vehicle at the time of the accident.

passengers have been referred to STNM Hospital, Gangtok. They are, Sanjeet Subba of Nepal, Lhamu Bhutia of Sarchok, Mingma Doma Sherpa of Dentam, Namgyal Bhutia of Khamdong, Phurba Lha-mu Sherpa of Sombarey, Samiana Chettri of Chupaka, Dawa Rai of Nepal and Dawa Doma Sherpa from Kalimgpong, West Bengal. The autopsy of the fatalities was conducted at the District hospital here.

"We have agreed to expedite past agree-ments and understandings reached between the two countries," he pointed out.

"The visit has helped in clearing misunder-standing and mistrust and strengthening mutu-al trust and understand-

ing," Oli added.

During the talks the two countries agreed to conduct feasibility stud-ies regarding construc-tion of Raxaul- Kathmandu railway line and oper-ating Nepalese steamers to transport goods and people from Nepal to other countries, he said.

Other important agreements have been reached in cooperation in agriculture and hydropower sectors.

Many observers see Oli as favouring a closer relationship between Nepal and China.

However, the issue of China-Nepal ties was not discussed during the delegation-level talks.

Oli's first tenure as prime minister in 2015-16 saw protests by Indi-an-origin Madeshi people in the southern Terai (plains) region over the new Constitution of Ne-pal. The Madhesis say the new Constitution is discriminatory to their interests.

Blackmoney SIT reviews cryptocurrencies; directs clampdown

tion Team (SIT) on black money has asked probe agencies to check and curb the use of crypto-currencies as it reviewed their operation and circulation in the country and links to shady off-

Officials said the SIT recently held a meeting in the national capital during which it was briefed about the overall scenario of the opera-tions of this virtual currency in the country.

shore transactions

The SIT official sources said, called cryptrocurrencies like bit-coins "illegal" and asked probe agencies such as the Income Tax Department, the Enforcement Directorate (ED) and the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) to detect and stop their usage and check transactions being done over the Internet, including those with cross-border ramifications.

The panel, they said, would also prepare a report that would be ubmitted to the government in sometime.

"The government is the final authority to frame rules and law to regulate these virtual currencies and the SIT would provide its report to it on the subject," a se-nior official said.

During the meeting, the NCB informed the SIT that about four cryptocur-rency-fuelled drugs smuggling transactions have been unearthed in the country in the last over two years time while the tax department informed the panel about the searches it conducted on bitcoin exchanges across the country last year.

A reported prepared by the banking regulator --the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) -- was also taken up during the meeting, they said.

Finance Minister Arun Jaitley, in his speech on February 1, had said that cryptocurrencies not legal and affirmed to eliminate their usage.

The RBI, in the past, has come out with three specific warnings to discourage public from investing in the virtual currencies. A govern-ment-appointed panel constituted to study the subject and suggest mea-sures to tackle it had submitted its report to the Union Finance Ministery early this year.

Court-appointed SIT on black money was notified by the government in 2014 and is headed by Justice (retd) M B Shah and has multiple central probe, enforcement and regulatory agencies as its member.

Manika Batra leads India to historic women TT gold at CWG

GOLD COAST. APR 8 (PTI): Pad dler Manika Batra inspired India to a historic gold medal with her stunning singles victories, fashioning an unthinkable 3-1 win over formidable Singapore in the final of the women's team event at the Commonwealth Games here.

World No. 58 Batra first scored the biggest win of her career by humbling world number four and multiple Olympic medallist Feng Tianwei 3-2 and then brushed aside 100th-ranked Yihan Zhou 3-0 to engineer a sensational win over the mighty Singapore table tennis side.
It was mother of all upsets as

prior to this final, the Singapore women's team had never lost in the Commonwealth Games since the sport was inducted in the program way back in 2002. "Even in my wildest dream I

had not thought that I will beat an Olympic medallist and world number four," Batra told PTI after her shock win over Feng

"I knew that she was having

problems with my pimpled rub ber and I realise that but I did not use it as my strength all the time. I kept changing my game. I did not want to kept her settle so I changed my rubber after the second game," she added.

"It was my first time play-

ing against Feng, the moment I knew I won against the world number four, I felt on top of the

The victory tasted even sweeter as the women had returned empty handed from the Glasgow edition four years ago. It was only the second table tennis team gold for India at the Games with the men achieving the feat in the 2006 Melbourne

Earlier today, India had blanked England 3-0 to reach the women's team final for the second time.

While Batra was the architect of India's historic win, the experienced pairing of Madhurika Patkar and Mouma Das played the supporting role to perfection by winning the crucial doubles tie 3-1 (11-7 11-6 8-11 11-7) against Zhou and Mengyu Yu for a 2-1 lead in the

After Batra shocked Feng 3-2 (11-8 8-11 7-11 11-9 11-7) in the opening singles, Mengyu had equalized for Singapore with a straight game win over Patkar.

Batra then proved to be too od for Yihan, who failed to read her deceptive strokes. The Singaporean put a back hand long as the Indian completed a 3-0 (11-7 11-4 11-7), leading to

wild celebrations.

Batra's childhood Sandeep Gupta said,"She always had the game to upset top players and she has done it again. It is time we get over the mentality that pimpled players cannot survive at the highest level."

"You just need to have an attacking game with the de-fence of the pimpled rubber. Her strength is that she can change from defense to counter attack very fast," said Gupta


They also attended Project Future India at Gandhinagar, Gujarat from 23 to 25 Dec 2014.

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Mary Kom assured of medal, Vikas enters quarters at CWG



COAST, APR 8 (PTI): Five-time world champion M C Mary Kom (48kg) assured herself of a medal on debut at the Commonwealth Games by advancing to the semi-finals, while Vikas Krishan (75kg) entered the men's quarterfinals here today.

The 35-year-old Mary Kom quite literally sailed past Scotland's Megan Gordon to make the lastfour stage with a 5-0 win Her victory assured the Indian boxing contingent of its first CWG medal.

Also advancing, but to the quarterfinal stage, vorld champion-bronze-medallist Vikas Krishan.

Vikas also claimed a unanimous 5-0 verdict over Australia's Campbell Somerville but his endurance was once again put to test in the final three minutes of the bout as the local favourite turned on the intensity .

Mary Kom, a sitting

Raiva Sabha MP, will face Sri Lanka's Anusha Dil-rukshi in the semifinal on April 11.

"This will be my first Commonwealth Games medal and I am happy to achieve that but gold is what I'm after," Mary Kom said after her win.

"I am fighting for 16 years. I know Megan and

she will do well. I gave her advice to keep trying. Young people need exand preparation,"

The Indian veteran is the favourite to win the gold, which would be her third in the last five months.

She had won gold

medals at the Asian Championships and the India Open before settling for a silver at the Strandja Memorial tour-nament in Bulgaria.

Vikas is also a top contender in his weight category and has come into the tournament on the back of a gold medal in Bulgaria.

HC stops infringement of Patanjali trademark

New Delhi, Apr 8 (PTI): The Delhi High Court has restrained four avurveda firms and a trust from manufacturing, selling or advertising any goods or services bearing the mark or word Patanjali', the registered trademark of yoga guru Ramdev's

company.

The order by Justice Rajiv Sahai Endlaw came on a plea by Ramdev's company Patan-jali Ayurved Ltd which has contended that the four firms -- Karamveer Ayurveda, Dr Zee Biotech. Dhatri, and Diwai Gramodyog Sewa Sansthan -- were manufacturing and marketing products similar to its own by infringing its trademark.

Pataniali also contended before the court that the firms were passing off their prod-ucts as that of the company and they were claiming to do so under authorisation of the trust, Maharishi Patan-

Smooth sailing might be boring, but inviting rough weather is foolish

 \mathbf{T} hese are uneasy times we live in. A time, when people, despite years of education teaching them otherwise, throw all decencies and basic courtesies to the wind and get possessed by paranoia: the minority starts fearing being swamped out by the majority; the majority views minority efforts at furthering their cause as unjustified, even unconstitutional appeasement; the powers that be get distrustful of the fourth estate and the media gets carried away by sensationalism. It is all a babble of voices and the decibels keep rising and the cacophony reinforces confusion and distrust. The region knows of these sentiments rather well and despite the obvious shallowness of parochial positions, continues to manifest it in new avatars and new divisions despite a history of dense with examples of how insularity can harm and distract.

The usual provocateurs during such periods of hyperbole are the politicians and the wannabe leaders. But there are no real surprises in that because political currency has become more about teasing fears than promoting visions and collaborations born more shared insecurities than universal prospects. Turn to any "camp" and each will solemnly proclaim that the pollution of society is the handiwork of "vested" interests. Look deeper and it becomes apparent that given how things have shaped up, deteriorated rather, and where it could lead, the situation can serve no one's "vested" interest. No politician, bureaucrat, "social worker," community leader or professional can benefit from the animosity which are being recklessly sown. Divisions along religion, caste and community lines exist in all societies, but because we claim to be civilised, these divisions are kept blurred and under-played. When we ignore its ugliness, we do more than just brush our filth under the carpet, we accept that these things are wrong. But we are now allowing our country to become one where this ugliness is being swept back into the public domain, not to be thrown out for good but to be sprinkled over everyone as acceptable and normal. It is this new development that should get Sikkim more wary of its own weakness to suspect and

It is easy to put up a harmonious front with combined cultural programmes and mutual back-slapping during less turbulent times. The test of a society's maturity and that of its democracy comes when this camaraderie can be maintained even during difficult times. Social Media groups and platforms are littered with warning signs flagging a noticeable passion for regressive ideas. Such sentiments, which were earlier limited to anonymous pamphlets and phone calls are now broadcast more widely on Facebook, People are less careful in private and it is more than obvious that the divide which was papered over has cleaved back into Sikkim. Unless the leaders and elders restore empathy, the people will get pushed over and thus bring down all facades of tolerance and amity. The problem with such situations is that it plays in

the grey zone where everything is not black & white, right and wrong. It is more about what is proper and acceptable and what is potentially harmful and damaging. Working as it does in the realm of subjective interpretations, the larger picture gets blurred. What each side should realise here is that democracy was never about confrontation and snatching claims, it is about collaborations and compromise. Given the way things have panned out of late, it appears that no side is willing to approach the middle ground. If one enters an argument convinced of the righteousness of their cause and unwilling to make any compromises, no matter what the other's point of view, the issue can hardly be resolved without painful hostility.

Imagine a showdown for Sikkim (not of violence, but of ideas and claims)! No matter who comes out victorious, no one will be left standing when the dust settles. Given the puerility that we have been forced to suffer through, it is time for Sikkim to relearn the rules which weaved its social fabric. If every side were to tone down their defiance and listen to the other voices in the fray, they would realise that everyone wants more or less the same thing and no matter what each groups priority may be, their difference can be worked out. Most importantly, when everyone around you is losing their mind, it is necessary for the leaders to keep their cool.

It is embarrassing that such moralising needs to be spelled out, but alas! things keep coming to such

Winnie Madikizela-Mandela: revolutionary who kept the spirit of resistance alive

No other woman – in life and after – occupies the place that Winnie Madiki-zela-Mandela does in South African politics. A stalwart of the African National Congress (ANC), she nevertheless stands above, and at times outside, the party. Her iconic status transcends political parties and geographical boundaries, generations and genders. Poets have honoured her, writers have immortalised her and photographers have adored her.

Her life has been overbur-dened by tragedies and dramas, and by the expectations of a world hungry for godlike heroes on whom to pin all its dreams, and one-dimension-

al villains on whom to pour its rage. Yet perhaps it is in the smaller and more intimate stories of our stumbling to make a better world that we are best able to recognise and appreciate the meaning of the life of Madikizela-Mandela.

In her particular life, we may see more clearly the violence wrought by colonialism and apartheid, the profound consequences of fraternal political movements to whom women were primarily or-namental and, yes, the tragic mistakes made in the crucible of civil war.

Her political power stemmed from the viscer-al connection that she was able to make between the everyday lives of black people in a racist state, and her own individual life. State power, in all its vi-cious dimensions, was exaggerated in its response to her indomitable will - and in its stark visibility,

Fearless in the face of torture, imprisonment, banishment and betrayal, she stood firm in her conviction that apartheid could be brought down. She said what she liked, and bore the consequences. Her very life was a form of bearing witness to the brutality of the system.
A life of misrecognition

Many obituaries will outline the broad sweep of her life; few will mark the extent to which her revolutionary ideas were shaped before she even met Nelson Mandela. To most of her social circle in the 1950s, for a long time into the 1980s, and certainly for Nelson Mandela's biographers, Madikizela-Mandela was a young rural naif who charmed the most eligible (married) man in town.

This way of seeing her as primarily beautiful, and not as an emerging political figure, has co-loured both contemporaneous accounts of Madik-izela-Mandela (for she was surely too young and beautiful to have a serious political idea) as well as scholarly accounts of the period (which focused on the thoughts and actions of men).

This misrecognition resonated in the ANC, which had no way of accommodating Madikize-la-Mandela's political qualities other than by casting her in the familiar tropes of wife and mother. Astutely, she embraced the role of mother and wife of a political leader and fashioned it into a platform for her own variant of radicalism, drawing on re-cent memories of the forcible dispossession of land and its impact on the Eastern Cape peasantry, and black consciousness.

She kept those traditions alive in the ANC, es

pecially in the everyday politics of the townships, when the leadership of the party was crafting new forms of non-racialism and at times vilifying black consciousness. Even though she was not part of the inner circle of the black consciousness move-ment, being older than the students leading it at its height, she was an ally in words and spirit,

In the tumult after the 1976 uprising, she built a bridge between different political factions. In the early 1990s, when Nelson Mandela was urging armed youths to give up violent strategies, it was Madikizela-Mandela they called on (along with the then leader of the South African Communist Party Chris Hani) to defend their change in tactics.

She played a similar role in brokering between

moderates and radicals in the ANC and its breakaways up until her death. This was a form of gen-dered politics made possible by her status as mother of the nation, uniting warring sons and holding together her political family, even if peace was maintained only in her presence

WHITE POWER AND BLACK SUFFERING

Winnie Madikizela was born in a rural Eastern Cape village called Bizana in September 1936. Her parents, Columbus and Gertrude, were teachers and her childhood was marked by the stern Methodism of her mother and the radical Africanist orientation of her father.

Rural life, with its entrenched gender roles, shaped her childhood. Not only was she aware of her mother's desire to bear another son, but she and her sisters were expected to care for their male siblings. She was barely eight when her mother



died months after giving birth to Winnie's brother Her childhood was cut short, and she had to leave school for six months to work in the fields and to carry out, with her sisters, all the daily chores of the household, from preparing food to cleaning. In her large and rambunctious family in which her parents upheld discipline with physical punishment, she learned to defend herself with her fists,

Her rural background made her aware of land dispossession as a central question of freedom. By her own account, she learnt about the racialised system of power early in her life. From her father, she learnt about the Xhosa wars against the colonisers, and later would imagine herself as picking up where her ancestors had failed:

If they failed in those nine Xhosa wars, I am

one of them of them and I will start from where those Xhosas left off and get my land back.

She was to retain the theme of land disposses-

sion by colonialism throughout her political career. Associated with this was the idea that race was central to colonialism. Taught by her grandmother that the source of black suffering was white power, her framing of politics was defined completely by the ways in which her family understood the relations of colonialism, and by their personal experi-

As with many other ANC members with Eastern Cape roots, she did not think of urban struggles as the only space of resistance, or workers as the only agents of change. She warned, in 1985, that

The white makes a mistake, thinking the tribal black is subservient and docile.

Militant to the core

After six short years together, Madikizela-Man-dela's husband, Nelson, was sentenced to life imprisonment. By this stage, she too was inextricably involved in the national liberation movement, politics with single parenting. She was attuned to the mood of people, and was more of an empathic leader than a theorist or tactician. She was an effective speaker, and had a gift

for winning over an audience. Adelaide Joseph, a friend and fellow ANC activist, recalls that when she made her first public speech...right

on the spot, while she was speaking, the wor composed a song for Winnie Mandela. And they started to sing right in the hall.

She joined the ANC Women's League and the Federation of South African Women, and participated in several campaigns. She was militant to the core. On one occasion, when a policeman arrived at her house with a summons and dared to pull her arm, she assaulted him and had to defend herself in court for the action.

She was far from being a bystander, or a pas sive wife patiently waiting for her husband's release from prison. In her autobiography, Madiki-zela-Mandela credits several other women for influencing her politically. Among these were Lilian Ngoyi, Florence Matomela, Frances Baard and Kate Molale, all leaders of the Federation. For her, they were the "top of the ANC hierar-

chy" although at the time no women were in fact in any formal leadership positions in the ANC. The ANC only allowed women to become full members in 1943, and during the 1950s, women were locked in an intense battle for recognition within

In the ANC Women's League and in the Federation, she held positions as chairperson of her branch in Orlando, and was a member of their provincial and national executives. In the 1970s, with her close friend Fatima Meer, she formed the Black Women's Federation. It was a short lived organisation with few campaigns, but signalled an adher-ence to the new township based politics that was

sweeping the country.

Her mode of work in any case was not that of painstaking organisation-building; she was more capable as a public speaker and as someone who could connect with people in the harsh condi-tions of life in apartheid's townships. She attended funerals and counselled families, acts of public

courage that sustained activists. She offered a form of intimate political leadership, instinctively aligning herself with people in distress.

Gender was her political resource, enabling her to draw on effective qualities to form political communities and providing a mode in which she could enter into the lives of people in the townships. She embraced the role of mother and wife of a political leader and fashioned it into a platform from which she challenged the apartheid state.

BANISHMENT AND BRUTALITY

If the apartheid state had hoped to break her, they failed. She was fearless in the face of the state's attempts to

silence her. Her home was repeatedly invaded and searched, and she was arrested, assaulted and imprisoned several times. Then, in 1977, in an act of extreme cruelty, she was served with a banishment order to a place in the Free State called Brandfort - a place she had never heard of nor had she ever

It was a horrendous uprooting from her family and community in Soweto, a form of exile that she described as "my little Siberia." Madikizela-Mandela grasped very clearly the power that could derive from associating actions against her with actions against the nation. As she put it,

When they send me into exile, it's not me as an individual they are sending. They think that with me they can also ban the political ideas. But that is a historic impossibility... I am of no importance to them as an individual. What I stand for is

what they want to banish.

But although the state did not break Winnie, by her own account it did brutalise her. Talking about her long period of solitary confinement and torture in 1969, she told a journalist that

that imprisonment of eighteen months in solitary confinement did actually change me ... We were so brutalised by that experience that I then believed in the language of violence and the only to deal with, to fight, apartheid was through the same violence they were unleashing against us and that is how one gets affected by that type of brutality.

The consequences were awful, not just for her but also for Paul Verryn, and especially for the families of Stompie Seipei and Abu Asvat. This period in her life, and in South African politics generally, is one that will not only occupy our moral energies, but also shape the ways in which narratives of violence in the 1980s are written. These were dark times in a country weighed down by states of emergency and militarised control. The exaggerated quality of Madikizela-Mandela's life had to bear. too, the nightmares of our nation's struggles to free

The ANC could barely contain the nature of leadership that Winnie represented. Like many women in the movement, she was marginalised from its powerful decision making structures. Unlike male leaders, her personal life was constantly under the spotlight (no doubt aided by a zealous security machinery that kept her un-der constant surveillance), and she was judged harshly and unfairly for her private choices. Although she was a masterful player of the familial categories of wife and mother, she felt reduced by them too.

Commentators like to use words such as maverick and wayward to describe her, but these tendencies developed because the regular structures of the ANC could not easily accommodate a powerful woman with a radical voice. Stepping outside the agreed parameters of the official party line, as she frequently did, was a form of asserting her independence, a form of refusal of the terms of political cadreship that were available to women in the ANC and in society more generally. It also allowed her to build alliances with the new voices emerging after 1994, from standing with the Treatment Action Campaign against Thabo Mbeki's policies on HIV/AIDS, to supporting the formation of the Economic Freedom Fighters. It accounts for the tremendous affection for her among young activists who are equally wary of the sedimented power structures in politics.

The endless stream of photographs that picture her in romantic embrace with Nelson Mandela, even now in her death, and despite their divorce, miss this fundamental point: the marriage was only a small part of her life, not its definitive point. To present her simply as wife, mostly as mother, is to erase the many struggles she waged to be defined in her own terms.

China objects to India's 'transgression' in Arunachal; Our land, says India

MANASH PRATIM BHUYAN KIBITHU (ARUNACHAL PRADESH), APR 8 (PTI): In a fresh incident of friction, the Chinese military last month strongly protested against the Indian Army's "transgression" into the strategically sensitive Asaphila area along the disputed border in Arunachal Pradesh, but the Indian side roundly rejected the complaint, official sources said.

The sources said the Chinese side raised the issue at a 'Border Personnel Meeting' (BPM) on March 15 here but the Indian Army dismissed it, saying that the area in the upper Subansiri region of Arunachal Pradesh belongs to India and it has regularly been carrying out patrols there.

The sources told PTI that the Chinese side called India's patrolling in the area a "transgression" and the Indian Army object-

ed to the terminology.

"China's protest to our patrolling in Asaphila is surprising," several instances of Chinese intru-sions in the area which had been taken up seriously by the Indian side in the past.

Under the BPM mechanism, the two sides can register their protest over any incident of transgression as there are varying perceptions about the Line of Actual Control (LAC) between the two countries.

The delegation of China's Peoples Liberation Army specifically mentioned extensive patrolling in Asaphila by Indian troops, saying such "violations" may escalate tensions between the two sides in the

However, rejecting the Chinese protest, the Indian side said its troops were aware of the alignent of the LAC and the Army would continue to carry out patrols up to the LAC, the de facto

border between the two countries.

Perceptions of the border in the area between India and China

are vastly different.

The sources said the Chinese military specifically mentioned large-scale Indian patrolling in Asaphila near Fishtail 1 on December 21, 22 and 23 last.

Indian and Chinese troops hold BPMs to resolve issues triggering tensions along the border.

There are five BPM points along the LAC at Bum La and Kibithu in Arunachal Pradesh, Daulat Beg Oldi and Chushul in Ladakh, and Nathu La in Sikkim.

The BPM on March 15 had tak-

en place at the Daimai post on the Chinese side in the Kibithu area.

At the BPM, the Chinese also accused the Indian side of dam-aging its road building equipment when a road laying party left its gear in Tuting in December last year following a protest by India.

The Indian Army rejected the

allegation, the sources said.

The Chinese road building team had crossed into Indian ter-

ritory, about 1 km inside the Line of Actual Control in the Tuting area, in the last week of December.

The road construc-tion team left the area after Indian troops asked them to stop the activity.

The team brought in two excavators which were later returned.

The sources said the Indian Army has in-creased war-fighting drills to deal with all possible scenarios along the LAC following the Doklam standoff.

"We are fully pre-pared to deal with any situation," said a senior Army official.

India has been adopting a more assertive approach to counter China's aggressive behaviour along the LAC.

Activities along the LAC by the two countries have increased following the Doklam standoff.

Troops of India and China were locked in 73-day face-off in oklam from June 16 last year after the Indian side

stopped the building of a road in the disputed area by the Chinese Army. The impasse ended on August 28.

Sources said India has deployed more troops and increased patrolling in the mountainous terrains along the borders with China following the

Doklam face-off. India is also strengthening its surveillance mechanism to keep an eye on Chinese activity along the borders in the strategically sensitive ploying choppers to carry out recce missions.

The government has been focusing on strengthening its defencalong the border with China.

In January. Chief Gen Bipin Rawat had said the time had come for the country to borders with Pakistan to the frontier with China, reflecting the seriousness of the situation.

3 new polytechnic institutes to become functional

KOHIMA, APR 8 (PTI): Three new polytechnic institutes will soon become functional in Naga land, state Technical Ed ucation Minister Temjen Imna Along said today.
While a polytechnic

has already been inaugurated at Seithekema C in Dimapur, the second institute at Tuensang would be inaugurated on April 11 and the third institute at Phek within few days, he said.

Interacting with media persons on the sidelines of a regional workshop on technical education for the northeastern states, Along aid, "the available infra structure is poor, but we will try our best to use the infrastructure that is available now.

On the possibilities of upgradation of Khelhoshe Polytechnic Atoizu in Zunheboto district into a full-fledged engineering college, the minister said extensive study is being made on the feasibility.

"There are many issues and the department needs sometime to deal with issues concerning landowners, but we will make sure that a degree engineering college comes up in Nagaland," he said

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IIT-KGP pilot project to protect heritage along Hoogly river

KOLKATA, APR 8 (PTI): IIT Kharagpur, the oldest and largest one in the country, has initiated a pilot project to protect the rich cultural heritage of the cities and towns along the Hoogly river.

The project would focus on five former trading posts and garrison settlements near Kolkata along the Hooghly river - Ban-del, Chinsurah, Chandernagore. Serampore and Barrackpore, an IIT KGP statement said here today.

The pockets bear aces of Portugese (Bandel), Dutch (Chinsurah), (Barrackpore), (Chandernago-British re), Danish (Serampore) presence, as well as India's own rich culture.

The pilot project has been initiated by IIT Kharagpur's department of humanities and social sciences, in association with the University of Liverpool, UK, the statement said.

Principal Investigator on behalf of IIT KGP, Prof enia Mukherjee said, These places, being peripheral cities surrounding Kolkata, are not getting enough exposure. And yet, in these cities too heritage buildings are making way for apartments, multiplexes and so on."

Among the top priori-ties of the project is the con-

buildings, which are mainly private houses, she said.

Lack of funds makes maintenance difficult for even those willing to preserve their properties, Mukherjee said adding, "We will be seeing if it is possible to build up a public-private-partner-

ship for the upkeep of these structures."

The project is being jointly funded by the Arts and Humanities Re-search Council, UK, and the Indian Council for Historical Research and the idea is to involve the people of the region as "owner-custodians" of this heritage, she said.

Bhaker, all of 16, claims gold; silver for Heena

BRISBANE, APR 8 (PTI): Manu Bhaker was in a league of her own as she shattered two records en route to adding the Common-wealth Games gold medal to the glowing list of achievements in her relatively nascent career, while compatriot Heena Sidhu bagged silver in the 10m air pistol event here on Sunday.

The 16-year-old Bhaker's calm

demeanour belied her age as she shot a CWG finals record 240.9 to finish well ahead of her senior teammate Sidhu, who staged a stirring comeback to aggregate 234 at the Belmont Shooting Centre.

In the end, Bhaker finished a whopping 6.9 points ahead of Sidhu.

Appearing in his maiden Com-

monwealth Games like Bhaker, Ravi Kumar (224.1) claimed the bronze medal in men's 10m air rifle event after surviving a shoot-off, while Saniya Sheikh had to be contend with a fourth-place finish in the women's skeet finals with 32.

Deepak Kumar finished sixth in the 10m air rifle, while Maheshwari Chauhan could not make the

dominant Bhaker led



throughout the two stages in her outing. The previous qualification record was 386 by Dina Aspandiyarova of Australia.

The bronze medal went to Australia's Elena Galiabovitch who

Bhaker was the overwhelming favourite to win the event, having bagged multiple gold medals at the 2018 ISSF World Cup in Guadala-jara, Mexico and the subsequent Junior World Cup in Sydney.

The event in Mexico was also a maiden appearance for the young girl from Jhajjar district in Harvana.

after she was on the verge of elimination at one stage. She had also

won a silver at the Delhi Games in 2010.

On expected lines, Bhaker produced some excellent shooting and notched up 10 and above scores on 14 occasions in the eight-women finals, ending with a 10.4 to finish way ahead of pack.

Entering the Games after being embroiled in a controversy over husband-cum-coach Ronak Pandit, Sidhu was off to a poor start and was staring at elimination at one stage, only to pull off a fine fightback and prove her detractors

After a series of 9, Sidhu found her bearings and shot 10-plus scores nine times to not just widen the gap but finish well ahead of the

eventual bronze medallist.

There was no doubt about
Bhaker -- she was miles ahead and certain to emerge champion when Sidhu and Galiabovitch were tied with 195 points with four more shots left in the finals. Bhaker had tallied 201.7 points by then.

After struggling to get going, Sidhu was back in medal conten-tion with 175.3 points, courtesy a few 10-plus scores, even as Bhaker led with 180.2 points with six shots left.

Bhaker led with 141.5 points in Stage 2 Elimination, while Sidhu was placed sixth with 134.9 points.

Bhaker set the tempo when she recorded 101.5 at the end of first stage, leaving the others to play and she held her nerve all through

to continue her golden run.
In the 24-shot final, Bhaker began from where she left off in qualifying, going 1.5 points clear of Galiabovitch after the first fiveshot series itself.

Shooting happened to her by chance after a brush with contact sports and for someone who took to the sport just a little over two years ago, winning with such consistency would easily qualify as

some achievement.

She stole the limelight at the last National Championships in Kera-la, where she won nine golds and broke the national record, held by Sidhu. This was after she attained her maiden success - a silver at the 2017 Asian Championships.

Making her debut in the ISSF senior World Cup in Guadalajara, Mexico last month, Bhaker defeated two-time champion and home favourite, Alejandra Zava-la, to win the individual gold and then teamed up with Om Prakash Mitharval to claim the top honours in mixed team event.

CWG: Women"s hockey team stuns Olympic champions England

GOLD COAST, APR 8 (PTI): The Indian women's hockey team rallied from a goal down to script a stunning 2-1 triumph over Olympic champions England in its third Pool A match of the 21st Commonwealth Games here today.

India, aiming to do better than the fifth-place finish at the last two CWG editions, are now second on the points table behind England and look set to qualify for the semifinals.

Guriit Kaur and Navneet Kaur sounded the board for India in the 42nd and 48th minute after England captain Alexandra Danson had put her team ahead just 35 seconds into the game.

"This is the first time we have beaten England, they are the Olympic champions so we are very happy," India captain Rani Rampal said

"It's always a special moment and achievement when you beat the Olympic champions. We've had very little chance to compete against them, and today was our day. We had to grab the chances and work hard," she added.

The Indian women's hock-ey team had started poorly in the event by going down to low-er-ranked Wales but has since recovered, beating Malaysia and now England.

The team, after conceding the early goal, defended stoically in the first half to ensure that the

It was sweet revenge for India,

who had lost 2-3 to Singapore in the bronze medal playoff at the 2014 Glasgow CWG.

Saina, playing her fifth match in the last four days, was in com-plete command as she took down Singapore's Jia Min Yeo 21-8 21-15 to steer the side through after a shock loss in men's doubles.

Despite playing with a heavi-ly strapped right foot, Saina didn't show any signs of discomfort as she guided the Indian team to victory.

"It was expected that we would play in the finals. I never thought they (Singapore) would give us such stiff competition," Saina said on the resistance put up by Singa-

pore in the doubles games.

"I was actually happy that I could play the match today and make that winning point for the Indian team," she added.

The proceedings were opened by the mixed doubles pair of Satwik Rankireddy and Ashwini Ponnappa against Yong Kai Terry Hee and Jia Ying Crystal Wong.

The Singaporeans gave Ash-

wini and Satwik quite a scare be-fore going down 22-20 21-18 in a 41-minute clash.

1 dead, 6 injured in Trump Tower fire

broke out on the 50th floor of Trump Tower here, leaving one person dead and six firefighters injured, the New York City

Fire Department said today.

It said a 67-year-old man, identified as Todd Brassner, was found "unconscious and unre-sponsive" when firefighters arrived at the scene of the fire.

Brassner, a resident of the 50th floor of Trump Tower, was rushed to a hospital in critical condition but later died, Fire Department spokeswoman Angelica Conroy said.

The medical examiner's of-fice will determine the cause of death, CNN reported.

The fire was contained to the 50th floor of the tower, located on Fifth Avenue in New York. It was ruled under con-



trol around 9 p.m. (local time), two hours after it was originally reported, the FDNY tweeted. It also tweeted pictures of

the building with several windows of the 50th floor ablaze.

Indian-origin MP elected leader of Singapore's main opposition party

(PTI): Pritam Singh, an Indian-origin lawmaker in Singapore, was today elected unopposed as the new secretary-general of the city-state's main opposition Workers' Party.

Singh, 41, a lawyer, took over from veteran Member of Parliament (MP) Low Thia Khiang,

Elected to Parliament in May 2011, Singh moved up from the assistant secretary-general post unopposed when cadres elected their party chief at the biennial Central Executive Council elections, in the first change of leadership in 17 years.

Singh is also a town council chairman

He is an MP for Aljunied Group Representation Constituency, a five-member group representation constituency in the north-eastern and eastern region of



Singapore.

Low, who held the party's top post since 2001, had announced in November that he would contest the party-post election to make way for new blood.

Singh was seen as the front-runner for the secretary-general post after Low's announcement.

The election of Singh means that the Workers' Party will have a new leader when Parliament reopens next month after a mid-term break.

MP Sylvia Lim retained the party's chair-manship unopposed.

Pak plans permanent ban on JuD, other terror groups

ISLAMABAD. APR (PTI): Pakistan is working on a draft bill to permanently ban Mumbai attack mastermind Hafiz Saeed-led Saeed-led Jamaat-ud Dawa as well as other terror groups and individuals on the watch list of the interior ministry. move which has the backing of the powerful military establishment.

The bill will replace

the presidential ordinance that banned outfits and people already on the watch list of the interior ministry, Dawn reported today.

Citing its sources in the law ministry, the paper reported that the proposed draft bill to amend the Anti-Terror-ism Act (ATA), 1997 was likely to be tabled in the upcoming session of the National Assembly scheduled to commence tomorrow.

The law ministry was

involved in the process for the purpose of vet-ting the proposed draft bill, the sources said, adding that the military establishment was also on board. The powerful military establishment enjoys considerable influence over policy decisions in Pakistan.

The government decided to prepare a draft bill to amend the ATA as part of its damage-control campaign after the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) approved a nomination proposal ta-bled jointly by the US, the UK, France and Germany to place Pakistan on the international watchdog's money-laundering and terror-financing grey list in February. Earlier,

President Mamnoon Hussain had promulgated the ordi-nance amending the ATA to include entities listed by the UNSC as proscribed groups but it will expire in 120 days.

The National Assem-

bly can extend it for another four months after which it has to be tabled before both the houses -National Assembly and the Senate - for further extension. Through the ordinance, amendments were made to ATA's Section 11-B that sets out parameters for proscription of groups and Section 11-EE that describes the grounds for listing of individuals. In both sections, Sub-Section 'aa' was added.

Russian embassy in UK alleges London withholding on probes

LONDON, APR 8 (AFP): embassy London today accused Britain of "deliberately" withholding information on probes into the targeting of several Russians on its soil, as the war of words between the two countries continues.

The embassy said it had asked the British Foreign Office for "detailed information" on the investigation into the investigation into the March 12 murder in London of Russian exile Nikolai Glushkov.

The 68-year-old busi-nessman, who had re-ceived political asylum in Britain after being jailed in Russia for money laun-dering and fraud, died from "compression to the neck", according to a post-mortem.

The death came a week after the nerve agent poisoning of former double agent Sergei Skripal and his daughter Yulia in the English city of Salisbury.

Britain has blamed the attack on Moscow,



which has angrily denied

"Almost a month has passed since Mr Glushpassed since Mr Glush-kov's death, and like it happened with Sergei and Yulia Skripal, the British side provided no information," the embassy said in a statement.

"Given our numerous requests, the only thing we can suggest is that it is done deliberately."

It added Ambassador Alexander Yakovenko planned to request a meeting with the Comer of London's Metropolitan Police for further information.

"For Russia this murder has a criminal as well as political dimension," the statement said.

British Foreign Secretary Boris Johnson wrote on Sunday that "no other government devotes as much time and effort to the business of trying to sabotage or discredit international inquiries" as
