Six footballers from Sikkim
were picked up by different Indian Super League franchises to play in the cash-rich league in its upcoming edition. A glittering ceremony was held in Mum-bai on Sunday where the fortunes of 199 players from across the country were put

to test. Around 30 players from the list were not picked by any teams. Star Midfielder Bikash Jairu

(Rs 55 Lakhs) from Sikkim was picked by the new entrant in the ISL this season, Jamshedpur FC along with Robin Gurung (Rs 26 Lakhs) who plays as a defender.

Senior players Nirmal Chettri (Rs 35 Lakhs) and San-Nirmal ju Pradhan (Rs 30 Lakhs) went to North East United FC and Mumbai City FC respectively.

Finally, the two young-sters, Kunzang Bhutia (Rs 10 Lakhs), who plays as a Goalkeeper, was picked up by ATK-Kolkata, and Nim Dorjee Tamang (Rs 15 Lakhs) will be featuring in the Indian Super League for the very first time for FC Pune City.

Nim Dorjee had a brilliant season with Shillong Lajong FC in the I-League this season, he plays as a stopper.

"My new journey in ISL begins with FC Pune City and I don't know how I will ever thank you all for your support and well wishes. As much as I am excited to get into my new home, I will miss all of my teammates,

beloved fans and manage ment team from Shillong Lajong FC. For all that I be come today, I owe to you all. God bless," said Nim Dorjee Tamang in his Facebook post today.

Indian Super League 2017 will kick-off on 17 Nov with 10 teams. Bengaluru FC and Jamshedpur FC will be the new teams debuting this season.

MUMBAI, JUL 23 (PTI): India Defender Anas Edathodi-ka and midfielder Eugeneson Lyngdoh emerged as the costliest picks for an identical Rs 1.1 crore in the Indian Super League (ISL) domestic players (ISL) domestic draft here today.

While Edathodika was picked up by new outfit Jamshedpur FC, Eugeneson was snapped up by two-time champions ATK.

Other top picks among the 134 players chosen were goalkeep-er Subrata Paul, who was chosen by Jamshed-pur for Rs 87 lakh, and right-back Pritam Kotal, grabbed by Delhi Dynamos for Rs 75 lakh.

"He was our no. 1 pick. He also scores goals and should be valuable," ATK's legendary coach Teddy Sheringham told reporters when asked about Lyngdoh.

Incidentally, team's technical director Ashley Westwood was the coach of ISL debutants Bengaluru FC in the I-League with Lyngdoh in its ranks.

The team also chose

striker Singh for Rs 65 lakh enabling a reunion with Westwood, under whom he played for Bengaluru FC in the I League.

Steve Coppell, Jam-shedpur FC's head coach, said, "Picking Indian players is a priority and we will try and match the skeleton of the team. A decision on choosing foreign players will be taken soon. We have some for-

eign players in the mind.

We had terrific and solid players in the pick. Now our job is to cement the team.

New Delhi, Jul 23 (PTI): President Pranab Mukherjee today cautioned the government against using the ordinance route to bring in a law, saying it should be used only in a compelling situation and not taken re-

course to in monetary matters.

At a farewell function in Parliament, he also told the opposition not to disrupt proceed-ings in the two Houses as it took away from it the opportunity to

raise people's concerns.

"I am of the firm opinion that the ordinance route should be used only in compel-ling circumstances and there should be no recourse to ordinances on monetary matters," he said.



Congress, AAP jump in support of Narmada-ousted families in MP

BHOPAL, JUL 23 (PTI): The Congress and the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) have jumped in support of the 18,000 families from Madhya Pradesh which have been dis-placed by the recent closure of the gates of Sardar Sarovar Dam on river Narmada in Gujarat. The Congress has de-

cided to raise the issue both in Madhya Pradesh assembly and in Parliament. The AAP too will raise the matter in Lok Sabha.

Congress leader of opposition in assembly Ajay Singh said his party is going to take to the task the Madhya Pradesh government in the House for failing to rehabilitate 18,000 families.

"The state government has asked these oustees to vacate the submergence area of the dam by July 31. We are planning to bring an adiournment motion on the issue in the House," he "Our leader and the

party chief whip in the Lok Sabha Jyotiraditya Scindia is going to raise the issue in parliament," state Congress spokes-man Pankaj Chaturvedi said. "The affected people

are on tenterhooks given that the water level in the dam was swelling due to the rains. The state government should take immediate steps to save precious lives," he added.

Madhya Pradesh AAP convenor Alok Agarwal said their MP Bhagwant Mann is going to raise the oustees' issue in the parliament.

He said that 18,000 families in Madhya Pradesh's Alirajpur, Barwani, Dhar and Khargone districts are on the verge of drowning following the closure of the gates of Sardar Sarovar dam last

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

When Aid to Combat AIDS Flatlines

...deliver social justice along with supporting the science

 $T^{\text{he 9th International AIDS Society Conference on HIV Science began in Paris on Sunday, 23 July. This biennial gathering is the largest open scientific con$ ference on HIV and AIDS related issues - bringing together a broad cross-section of more than 6,000 professionals from around the world to meet and examine the latest scientific developments in HIV-related research with a focus on moving science into practice and policy. A lot of what is discussed at this conference is technical and scientific and hence beyond the immediate comprehension of the lay audience. The occasion, however, provides an opportunity to take a relook at where the battle to contain the spread of HIV and the morbidity of AIDS has reached.

UNAIDS released a report recently showing that for the first time, the scales have tipped: more than half of all people living with HIV (53%) now have access to HIV treatment and AIDS-related deaths have almost halved since 2005. It is still a staggeringly high number though. In 2016, 19.5 million of the 36.7 million people living with HIV had access to treatment, and AIDS-related deaths have fallen from 1.9 million in 2005 to 1 million in 2016. Provided that scale-up continues, this progress puts the world on track to reach the global target of 30 million people on treatment by 2020. As mentioned, the numbers are still high, and there is not much else to cheer about yet since funds for awareness, care and research are falling short as the developed world tightens its purse-strings on the excuse of the economic recession and changed priorities. You see, AIDS is no longer a major concern for the developed world any more. Donor government funding to support HIV efforts in low- and middle-income countries decreased by US\$511 million from US\$7.5 billion in 2015 to US\$7 billion in 2016. This marks the second successive year of declines, and is the lowest level since 2010. That in itself is a massive slashing of funds and perhaps explains the subdued HIV-AIDS programmes across India and in Sikkim. What is worrying is that funding should actually have doubled, since as per a UNAIDS estimate, U\$ 25 million is required for fighting AIDS in poorer countries. And that was as per 2010 figures. Even then, the AIDS workers were short by 11.3 billion, and now the funding has flat-lined even further, if such a thing is even possible. This cannot be good for the effort against AIDS because some things were finally falling into place and what is required is more, not less financial support. In the absence of adequate financial support, not only are those already living with HIV denied the healthcare they need, but efforts to protect more people from contracting the vi rus get compromised.

Sample this, as per UNAIDS, around 5 million HIV+ve people around the world are alive today thanks to antiretroviral therapy [ART]. Experts have reasoned that patients treated before their immune system is badly damaged by HIV faced lesser risk of death and sickness. This means that access to ART has to be delivered as soon as possible.

While there is not much that Sikkim can do about

the global budgets for AIDS control, there is still much that it can learn from the arguments proffered by experts. Dr. Brigitte Schmied of Austrian AIDS Society, speaking at such an even some years ago had said: "AIDS was never just about science; it has always been about social justice as well." It is the social justice aspect that Sikkim could focus on since funds are not something it can still marshal on its own. The world continues to live in hypocrisy despite increasing evidence that laws that criminalize injecting drug users, men who have sex with men and sex workers, undermine, rather than advance, public health goals. As a result of such laws, as well as stigma and discrimination, members of these communities have significantly reduced access to both treatment and prevention services; a situation which tantamounts to denial of their human rights. Injecting drug users, for instance, data from UNAIDS informs, are 28-times more likely to be living with HIV but still remain marginalized and out of the reach of health and social services because of legal and social stigmas. It is also now coming to light that after the earlier years of wide awareness and targeted interventions, awareness levels are falling again, with young people (15–24 years) the world over lagging behind on multiple fronts—knowledge of HIV, HIV testing, treatment and prevention. This is a social challenge, and environment where "funding" for "social work on HIV and AIDS has gone scarce, it is perhaps the perfect time for some genuine social engagement to evolve in Sikkim to address the AIDS situation.

Bleached Girls: India and its love for light skin

theconversation.com "LET'S SCRUB OUT THAT TAN" is a common refrain in beauty parlours in India, where girls grow up with constant reminders that only fair skin is beautiful.

From Sunday classified ads touting the marriageability of an "MBA graduate. 5-½ ft. English medium. Fair complexion" to elderly aunties advising young women to apply saf-fron paste to "maintain your skin whiter and smoother", the signs are everywhere.

Even sentiments like, "She got lucky he married her despite her [dark] complexion" are still whispered around India in 2017.

Younger generations are now starting to push back. On July 7, 18-yearold Aranya Johar published her Brown Girl's Guide to Beauty on Youtube. The video, a spoken-word poem containing lines like "Forget snow-white/say hello to chocolate brown/I'll write my own fairy-tale" went viral, reaching 1.5 million viewers around the world in its first day alone.

Iohar's candid slam came just before Bollywood actor Nawazuddin Sid-diqui used Twitter to indict the Indian film industry's racist culture when he wrote: "Thank U 4 making me realise dat I cannot b paired along wid d fair & handsome bcz I m dark & not good looking, but I never focus on that." His post recalled the vehement

pushback of actress Tannishtha Chatterjee, who was was bullied for her skin tone on live TV in 2016.

Though many Indians still feign ignorance about social discrimination based on skin colour, the country's obsession with whiteness can also be violent. In recent years, fear of black and brown skin has also spurred harassment and attacks on African students living in India.

Why do Indians so hate their own

THE BLEACHING SYNDROME

Indian history offers some answers.
Throughout medieval and modern

history, the Indian subcontinent has been on the radar of various European settlers and traders, including, from the 15th to 17th centuries, the Portuguese, Dutch and French. The subcontinent was invaded and partly ruled by the Mughals in the 16th century, and colonised by the British from the 17th

many claimed to be superior.

Being subject to a succession of white(ish) overlords has long associated light skin with power, status and desirability among Indians. Today, the contempt for brown skin is embraced by both the ruling class and lower castes, and reinforced daily by beauty magazine covers that feature almost exclusively Caucasian, often foreign, models.

century onwards until independence in 1947. All these foreign "visitors" were of relatively fair complexion, and

It's been the dark man's burden in this majority-non-white nation to de-sire a westernised concept of beauty, and post-colonial activism has not

been able to change this.

According to a study we conducted from 2013 to 2016, 70% of the 300 women and men we interviewed reported wanting a date or partner with someone who had light skin. This colourism is what pushes so many Indians to lighten their skin, creating a phenomenon termed "bleaching syndrome".

Bleaching syndrome is not a superficial fashion, it's a strategy of assimilating a superior identity that reflects a deep-set belief that fair skin is better, more powerful, prettier. And it's not limited to India; skin bleaching is also common in the rest of Asia

A THRIVING BLEACHING MARKET An inventive and growing market of creams and salves has cropped up to

fill this demand, which now pulls in over US\$400 million dollars annually.

Some of the most widely-sold

products include Fem. Lotus, Fair and Lovely and its gendered-equivalent Fair and Handsome. Most of these appealingly named creams are in fact a dangerous cocktail of steroids, hydroquinone, and tretinoin, the long-term use of which can lead to health concerns like permanent pigmentation, skin cancer, liver damage and mercu-

ry poisoning among other things.

Nonetheless, a 2014 marketing study found that almost 90% of Indian girls cite skin lightening as a "high need". These young women are willing to overlook the after-effects of bleaching, and the advent of on-line sales allows them to use these products in the privacy of their own

Initially focused on feminine beauty, the fairness creams market now also caters to Indian men. Products marketed to men promise to fight sweat, give them fairer underarms and attract women

And Bollywood stars with huge followings, including Shahrukh Khan and John Abraham, regularly endorse and promote skin bleaches. BLEACHING BACKLASH

The brand Clean and Dry took bleaching to new levels in 2012, when it began heavily advertising for a new

wash to lighten the vagina.

This time, women had had enough. In 2013, the activist group Women of Worth launched their Dark is Beautiful campaign, which was endorsed by the Indian theatre actress

With other feminist groups, the women compelled the Advertising Standards Council of India to issue guide-lines in 2014 stating that "ads should not reinforce negative social stereotyping on the basis of skin colour" or "portray people with darker skin [as]... inferior, or unsuccessful in any aspect of life particularly in relation to being attractive to the opposite sex".

This guidance is in keeping with the Indian Constitution, which provides for equality for all (article 14) and prohibits discrimination on the grounds of religion, race, caste, sex or place of birth (article 15).

Unfortunately, the law can do little to stop the subtler forms of racism and bigotry present in Indian society. And, to date, that vagina bleaching product is still on the market.

The "bleaching syndrome" goes

far beyond skin colour, with Indian women also questioning their hair texture and colour, speech, marital choices and dress style, raising real concerns about female self-esteem.

As Aranya Johar rhymed on Youtube, "With the hope of being able someday to love another/let's begin by being our own first lovers".

Droughts in East Africa: some headway in unpacking what's causing them

 $\begin{array}{c} \textit{the conversation.com} \\ D^{\text{rought is a common phenomenon in East Africation} \\ call and has occurred throughout known history. \end{array}$ Now, with climate change top of the mind, whene er there's a drought some are quick to blame climate change as the "cause".

It's a fair scientific question to ask: Are these droughts (in part) the result of changes in the earth's climate brought about by human activities?

Or are they solely the result of natural processes?
With successive large scale droughts in East
Africa in 2010/11, 2014, 2015 and the ongoing drought, it's easy to assume climate change caused by human behaviour does indeed play a role.

But droughts are complex extreme events that re sult from a combination of drivers. In the atmosphere these include; regular climate variability – including day-to-day weather – but also larger seasonal pat-terns related to cycles, such as El Nino and La Nina. It could be human-induced drivers – like greenhouse gas emissions, or events like volcanic eruptions.

Beyond the atmosphere itself, the condition

of water reserves, soil, and vegetation are critical. This could of course be coupled to human activity like irrigation or the number of livestock.

Finally, whether a drought becomes a problem doesn't just depend on the meteorological condi-tions but on human decisions on the ground. For example, the effects of a lack of rainfall strongly depends on human vulnerability: how dependent on the climate are people's livelihoods, do they have assets or financial reserves, and access to markets?

ATTRIBUTION SCIENCE

Let's first look at the science. It's impossible to say for any single event that it could not have occurred without anthropogenic – caused by human activity – influence. But, in the same way that loading a dice can increase the likelihood of rolling a six, the presence of human-induced climate change can alter the likelihood that a drought will occur.

In the last few years there's been rapid develop-ment in the science of quantifying what role human activity plays in bringing about extreme weather events. These links can be established fairly routinely for some extreme events. But for others we are pushing the boundaries of this new emerging field. Droughts in a relatively data poor region like East Africa belong in this category.

With the World Weather Attribution initiative

and the Climate and Development Knowledge Network we are aiming to shed light on this. We are assessing whether climate change, brought about by human activities, altered the risk of the ongoing drought in Kenya and Somalia.

We are not the first to do an "attribution" study

like this in East Africa. But we are the first to:

- Use three different and largely independent methodologies to analyse the role of climate change.
- Do this while the event is still unfolding.

- Partner with scientists and practitioners in the region.

Every extreme event attribution study has four outcomes when analysing the impact of human-induced climate change. Climate change can make an event more likely, less likely, not significantly changed its likelihood, or we may conclude that the impact of climate change cannot be reliably as-sessed. The outcome may also depend on how we define the extreme event in question, for instance in terms of the region, and time period we look at. High quality observational data and local sci-

entific expertise are crucial. Working with national institutions such as the Kenya Meteorological Department and Ethiopia's National Meteorology Agency, we identify the event that captures what's happening on the ground and can be interrogated in climate models.

And we use proven scientific methods. When we initially make these results available, they are not yet peer reviewed. But we apply approaches that have been published in numerous peer-rewed papers

EAST AFRICAN DROUGHT

When examining the current drought in East Africa we can first look at rainfall. We note that some weather stations recorded a decrease in rainfall in recent years. But the region also has large year-to-year natural variability. Combining our multiple methods, we found that human induced climate change is currently not a game changer.

At the same time temperatures in the region

are increasing. This may contribute to the current drought conditions. While these increases can be attributed to human-induced climate change, the effect of a changing climate on rainfall is much less straightforward.
On a global average, a warmer atmosphere can

hold more water vapour leading to more extreme rainfall. But more greenhouse gases in the atmosphere can also affect what type of weather systems - a lot of low pressure that brings rain or high pressure that brings clear skies - come into a region. This could mean it does rain more on average but at a different place.

Higher temperatures can furthermore affect the interplay between land surface and the atmosphere. For example rain evaporates faster with higher temperatures but once the rain has evapo-rated higher temperatures don't have much of an effect. Therefore, it strongly depends on the region and the season how human-induced climate change is affecting rainfall, and if it leads to longer or more frequent dry spells.

This demonstrates that science often doesn't provide a simple statement, such as "climate change is to blame". In the case of the drought in Somalia we have no evidence that climate change made this event more likely.

But this does not mean that climate change

didn't play any role.

The less-simple-but-more-honest from science is that these events are part of the regional climate and even without a strong climate change signal will happen again in the near future. We don't know if climate change has made them slightly more likely, and furthermore, a period of low rainfall may now also be aggravated by rising temperatures and more research is needed to

quantify this effect. RISK AND VULNERABILITY

And that honest message matters even more be-cause of a second element of our analysis: risk is not just determined by what's happening in the cli-

mate, but how something in the climate affects us.
In cases of high vulnerability a relatively moderate lack of rainfall can have a dramatic impact on people's lives. Somalia is a case in point, where decades of conflict have left the country unequipped to provide assistance in times of crisis.

As a result, it's important for governments like Kenya's that are preparing legislation on disaster management to understand the different risk fac-

tors that result in a drought.

In the presentation of our findings it has become apparent that scientific evidence is relevant to these discussions. And the demand is there for better data and information. This was made clear

in the policy brief on the Kenya drought study. Honest climate analysis can inform public awareness, policy and practice – especially when events are happening and the appetite to address the problem is highest. Let's use that window for well-informed debate about addressing rising risk, rather than playing a blame game.

According to the police, Choeying had set himself ablaze on July 14 on the university cam-pus, while protesting against the Chinese rule in Tibet, and was being treated at a Varanasi hos pital, before being shifted to Delhi.

The police in Vara-nasi had said that as per the accounts of evewitnesses, Choeying shouted "freedom" before pouring kerosene on his body and setting himself ablaze.

The police were looking at every possibility which led the Tibetan student to take the extreme step, including failure in examinations.



Set up 24x7 helpline for athletes: Gopichand on doping

DELHI, JUL 23 (PTI): Concerned about the rise in doping viola-tions, chief national badminton coach Pullela Gopichand today suggested setting up of a 24x7 medical helpline to ensure that sportspersons don't use over-the- counter drugs.

The former All England champion came up with the suggestion during the sixth meeting of the All India Council of Sports (AICS) chaired by Vijay Kumar Malhotra.

Gopichand "Shri mentioned that most of the sportspersons take off the counter medicines like Corex and get caught in dope. In the recent case of women athlete also, it is doubted that she took medicine for stomach upset and got caught in dope," the AICS said in a statement.
"Shri Gopichand sug-

gested that NADA should create a 24x7 helpline so as to enable sportspersons to seek advice before taking any medicine.

Sprint queen P T Usha pointed out that only two dope collecting officials are deployed for a large num bers of sportspersons

"During this time, there are chances of inter-changing the dope samples.

Sports Authority of India's director gener-al Injeti Srinivas said it would be better if each federation appoints an expert director for each discipline, one who should be available to give advice to their re-

spective sportspersons.

The SAI DG also mentioned that as a precau-tionary measure, the dope collecting officers are regularly changed to avoid any vested interested.

Malhotra expressed his anguish over the ram-pant cases of dope and the recent media coverage "tarnishing the image of not only sports but also the image of the country".

One in three Indians uses free Wi-Fi to watch adult content

New Delhi, Jul 23 (PTI): One in three Indians surveyed has admitted to having used free public Wi-Fi to watch adult content at places like hotels, airports, libraries and even workplace, says a study by Norton by

The global study, which included over 1,000 respondents from India, found "more than one in three Indians admit to using public Wi-Fi to watch adult content".

But Indians are not alone in this behaviour. At a global level, one in six respondents admitted to using public Wi-Fi to

watch adult content.

This includes response of people from across countries like Japan, Mexico, Nether-

lands, Brazil, the US and the UK.

Hotels/Airbnb (49 per cent), friend's place (46 per cent), cafe/restaurants (36 per cent) and workplace (44 per cent) were among the top venues with Indian respon-dents saying they used the public Wi-Fi at these places to access adult content.

Interestingly, 31 per cent respondents said they had watched adult content on streets using public Wi-Fi, while 34 per cent had done so at a bus/train station.

About 24 per cent admitted to have used public Wi-Fi at libraries, while 34 per cent said they had used the service at an airport.

It is also interesting to note that access

to Wi-Fi becomes a deciding factor for a significant chunk of Indians when it comes to choosing hotels, airlines and places to eat. Such is the love for free Wi-Fi that 73 per

cent respondents said "they wouldn't think twice about exchanging, sharing or even doing something to get a strong, free signal".

There is a deep divide between what ople think is safe when it comes to using public Wi-Fi versus the reality, says Ritesh Chopra, Country Manager (Consumer Business Unit) at Symantec.
"What someone thinks are private on

their personal device can easily be accessed by cyber criminals through unsecure Wi-Fi networks or even apps with privacy vulnerabilities," he adds.

The cybersecurity solutions firm also noted that 96 per cent of Indian respon-dents had acted in a risky manner online using a public Wi-Fi.
While 68 per cent had logged onto their

social media accounts, 46 per cent had access work emails, 30 per cent said they had accessed their financial information using public Wi-Fi.

Asked about their reaction if backers accessed/posted their private chat/text con versations, 33 per cent respondents said they would feel angry, while 30 per cent said they would be embarrassed if such a thing were to happen.

About 41 per cent said they would be "most horrified if financial details were stolen and published online".

More than food on the menu at Delhi's first queer cafe

New Delhi, Jul 23 (PTI): The capital's heritage Mehrauli zone, home to many a hip bar and designer store, is where Sam bhav Sharma decided to locate Q Caf, Delhi's first LGBTQ restaurant that provides food, drink and sustenance for the city's nbow queer community.

With the Qutub Minar providing the

perfect backdrop, Q Caf hopes to provide a safe haven for those who fall outside the man-woman binary and struggle to find spaces accepting of their 'other' status.

It started in October when Delhi-based

queer rights activist Sharma tied up with Chez Jerome, an expert in French and Indian cuisines. The French chef later stepped down and handed the reins of control to Sharma and his Italian partner Roberto. For Sharma running the cafe comes with a responsibility.

"I have to make sure that this cafe is not specifically for gay men because they already have many spaces in the city where they can hang out. They are dom-inating queer spaces all around the city," he said. With a small dance floor under an open sky and seating for around 30 people, the cafe usually opens in the evening.

The menu, inspired by French, Greek

and Italian cuisines, could compete with any salads, omelettes, pastas as well as thin crust

eatery in the city. On offer are a variety of pizzas with traditional toppings and dips Specialties of the house include Greek

chicken potato salad, a delicate mix of potatoes, onions, tomatoes and chicken salami, Parisian salad dressed with fresh lettuce and fresh parmesan and freshly baked breads. But it's not all about food.
With events like book reading sessions

and trans nights, Sharma wants to sen-

sitise his customers about queer rights Code section that criminalises sexual acts 'against the order of nature".

"Obviously, the cafe is not any NGO but it also not a place where people should only come to enjoy. I want to utilise this space to revolutionise the struggle we are going through in India. The transgenders, lesbians and hijra folks of our community need more such spaces," said Sharma.

Despite falling under the broader

queer umbrella, gay men stand out from others in the trans community. As a result, transgenders don't feel safe even in those places where they should be welcome, he said. Delhi is amongst the few cities in the country where late night parties in five-star hotels welcome people from the queer community. But few trans people make it inside the elite doors.

Simran Shaikh, a transgender and se-nior programme officer at Sexuality Gender and Rights at Alliance India, echoes Sharma and welcomes safer places for the commu-nity but associates the profound segregation more with "class" than "gender"

"The segregation among the LGBTQ is only of class and not of gender. The discrimination happens when you are not as-

"I don't foresee any such changes with these cafes and bars. There will still be class differences in particular parties where there might not be trans identified individuals," she said.

According to LGBTQ activist Harish Iyer, homophobia within homosexuals is 'rampant".

"It is sad but true. Just because one belongs to an oppressed community (queer) doesn't make them sensitive to everyone

else. Gay men rule the roost in many spaces "I think some gay men have an issue with effeminacy. It is just another form of misogyny that runs deep in our society. Some do so, so that they don't get noticed as gay, in the company of those who look gay," the Mumbai-based activist said.

Praful Baweja, who is also based in Mum bai and is an activist, hopes that the workshops he has been organising will change things for the better for the community.

"Usually when one is looking for employees in any company, the person wants them to be trustworthy. The question of orienta-tion is usually hidden. With workshops we are trying to tell people from the commuto not be bothered by their orientation.

"Usually MNCs have a diversity and Inclusion unit where gender issues are addressed, but in smaller companies they may not have such a facility," he said.

"Through workshops we want to ed-ucate even trans people about company structures and how they can contribute in starting small scale businesses. We are also trying to facilitate information of people within the community so that they can

connect to each other," he added.

More spaces like the Q Cafe, they hope, will help in strengthening this connect.

SL policeman injured in Tamil judge's assassination bid dies

COLOMBO, JUL 23 (PTI): A personal protection officer of a prominent Sri Lankan Tamil high court judge died today after being shot by unidentified man during a failed assassination bid on the judge, police said.

The officer was injured and hospitalised in Jaffna's Nallur area yesterday after the unyesterday after the unidentified man snatched his revolver while attacking Justice Manickavasagar Illancheliyan. **Justice** Illancheliyan was unhurt while the policeman had suffered injuries.

The wounded police officer who was admitted to a Jaffna hospital has

died, police said.

"I saw a civilian approach my escort and trying to remove his pis-tol. He fought for several minutes to grab the weapon," Ilencheliyan told reporters. A fearless judge, Illancheliyan had struck terror in the hearts of criminals in the Tamil-dominated Jaffna

town.
"I am handling the most dangerous cases in Jaffna. I call on the au-thorities to ensure protection of judiciary," he said. Ilanechelian's car was caught in a traffic block in Nallur junction when the shooting took place.

Justice Ilanechelian had presided in high profile rape and murder case of Sivaloganathan Vithya, a young student in May 2015. The incident had caused much public outrage.

A deputy inspector general of police was ar-rested and remanded last week by the judge.

China opens cinema theatre in disputed South China Sea island

BEIJING, JUL 23 (PTI): China has opened a modern cinema theatre on Yongxing Island in the disputed South China Sea as part of its plan to establish authority over the area, the state media reported today.

Over 200 residents and

soldiers watched the Chinese movie 'The Eternity of Jiao Yulu' vesterday at the Sansha Yinlong Cinema, located in Sansha mu-nicipality, China's newest city in the South China Sea (SCS).

"The cinema will show at least one film every day, so residents and soldiers on Yongxing Island can enjoy films si-multaneously with moviegoers across the country," said Gu Xiaojing, general manager of Hainan Media Group.

China has been expanding facilities in the islands under its control encouraging population settlements in the disputed area, where Beijing also built artificial islands some with facilities for garrison as well as airstrip reinforcing its control over the area. Vietnam, the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Taiwan have counter claims over the South China Sea.

The theatre is equipped with advanced projection equipment, including the

latest 4K digital projectors as well as a 3D perforated screen for viewers to indulge in the pleasure of big screen, state-run Xinhua news agency reported. Chen Zijian, general manager of Hainan Film Company, which operates the cinema, said they have also purchased two mobile projection units and plan to screen films for free on more islands within the municipality to meet the demands of residents, it added. The opening of the cinema is part of a plan by local cultural authorities to establish community services on islands under Sansha's jurisdiction

In April last year, Sansha opened its first public library. It also has a stadium and has organised various cultural ac-tivities to enrich the lives of residents. Sansha municipali-

ty was set up in 2012.
Also, a total of 12 Chinese-developed underwater gliders are carrying out sci-entific observations in the SCS from the research vessel "Kexue" and sending back re-al-time data. It is the largest group of gliders to perform simultaneous observations in the region. Kexue left Qingdao in east

China's Shandong Province last Monday for a maritime scientific expedition and stopped in Xiamen, southeast China to resupply Friday after completing the first part of the mission.

"The gliders have collect-

ed detailed maritime information, including temperature, salinity, turbidity, oxygen lev-

direction of currents," said Yu Jiancheng, a scientist with the programme. The 12 sub-mersible devices will collect comprehensive ocean data over the next month, said Sun Song, another scientist with the programme.

Underwater gliders are a new type of underwater robot featuring less energy consumption, higher efficiency and better endurance. During the first stage of the mission, scientists also successfulscientists also successfully placed three submersible ovs and conducted several diving missions. Kexue will leave Xiamen today for the mission's second stage. Kexue is China's most advanced, independently-made marine science expedition vessel. It was put into operation in April 2014. The 4,711-tonne vessel is capable of conducting deep and open sea exploration and research, the Xinhua said.

RBI to lease currency verification systems to weed out fakes

DELHI, JUL 23 (PTI): The Reserve Bank will hire 12 currency verification systems for six months to help it segregate fake ones from scrapped notes of Rs 500/1000 denomination.

The central bank is currently engaged in counting huge pile of old Rs 500/1000 notes which were scrapped following demonetisation on November 9, 2016. Earlier in May, the Re-

serve Bank had floated a global tender for leasing of 18 'Currency Verification and Processing Sys-tem (CVPS)'. However, the tender was later cancelled and now a fresh one has been floated to lease 12 such systems.

As per the tender document, the currency notes of all denominations received at regional office of the RBI would



have to be processed at a minimum speed of 30 notes per second.

The term of the lease

contract will be of six months, extendable by three blocks of two months each, it added.

RBI Governor Urjit Patel, while appearing before a Parliamentary panel on July 12, had report-edly said the deposited banned notes were still being counted and there-fore he was not in a position to give a figure on the scrapped currency that was back in the system.

Patel did not provide

"specific number" on the amount of money that had been deposited post-demonetisation.

According to the fi-nance ministry, as on November 8, the day demonetisation was announced, there were 1,716.50 crore pieces of Rs 500 and 685.80 crore Rs 1,000 notes in circulation.

Afghan police search for villagers after mass kidnapping

KANDAHAR, Jul 23 (PTI): Around 30 people have been released while 30 others remain missing, Kandahar police spokesman Zia Durrani told AFP

It remained unclear why the villagers were seized. But some officials said they suspected the Taliban had kidnapped or killed them for suspected cooperation with the Western- backed government which the militants are striving to topple

The insurgents have a heavy presence in Uruzgan, a poppy-growing area. Today they denied involvement, while confirming they had attacked police checkpoints in the area.

"Our mujahideen killed a number of local police and pro- government militias there, also capturing 17 suspects who were later released after interrogation. We have not killed or kidnapped any civilians," the Taliban said in a statement.

Civilians are increasingly caught in

the crosshairs of Afghanistan's worsening conflict as the Taliban step up their annual spring offensive launched in April.

Highways passing through insurgency-prone areas have become ex-ceedingly dangerous, with the Taliban and other armed groups frequently kidnapping or killing travellers.

In July Taliban fighters closed a highway connecting Farah to Herat city in the west, stopping a bus and forcing 16 passengers off it. They shot at least seven of them while the remainder were taken hostage.

Elsewhere in the country, the Taliban today captured a district in the northern province of Faryab after an overnight attack that triggered hours of heavy fighting, said provincial police spokesman Abdul Karim Yourish. He said troops had retreated two kilome-tres from the centre of Kohistan district. There was no word on casualties.

Local media today also reported that the Taliban had overran Tavwara district in the central prov-ince of Ghor, though there was no immediate official confirmation

There has been a surge in fighting in several northern and southern Afghan provinces in recent days, including in Helmand in the south where 16 Afghan police officers were killed by a US air strike on Friday night. The strike, the latest setback in Washington's efforts to pacify the country, hit a compound in Gereshk district, large parts of which are under Taliban control.

Afghan troops and police are battling largely alone on the ground against the insurgency, after US-led foreign forces withdrew from most combat operations in December 2014. The United States is actively considering sending more troops to Afghanistan and US commanders there have requested thou sands of extra soldiers on the ground.

The US contingent now numbers about 8,400, and there are another 5,000 from NATO allies, a far cry from the US presence of more than 100,000 six years ago. They mainly serve as trainers and advisers. (AFP)

Actor John Heard, who played the father in the Home Alone films, has died at the age of 72. The US star, best known as Peter McAllister in the hit 1990 comedy, was confirmed dead by the Santa Clara Medical Examiner's office in California on Saturday

According to celebrity website TMZ, the father of two was found by a maid in a hotel, where he had been recovering from minor back surgery. Details of his death have

40 years' experience in Hollywood, from blockbusters like Big and Glad-iator, to TV shows including The Sopranos.

He was nominated for an Emmy award in 1999 for his role as a detective in the hit crime drama. But it is his part as Macaulay Culkin's irre-sponsible father in Home Alone and Home Alone 2 which remains his most iconic role. Mission Impossible director Christopher McQuarrie posted a photo of the actor in one of his most underrated roles, as a Viet-nam veteran in 1981 movie Cutter's Way alongside Jeff Bridges.
