UN expert finds holes in 'Swachh Bharat Mission', gets panned

New Delhi, Nov 10 (PTI): Prime Narendra 'Swachh Bharat' mission today came in for sharp criticism by a top UN expert on sanitation who said it "lacked a holistic human rights approach", drawing swift reproval from the government.

The government also took exception to the United Nation's Special Rapporteur on the human rights to safe drinking water and sanitation Leo Heller's reference to Mahatma Gandhi's spectacles in the mission's logo, abd his "rambling" report con-taining "inaccuracies, sweeping generalisa-tions and biases".

"In the last two weeks I have visited rural and urban areas, slums and settlement

camps where undocumented pop-ulation is residing... and I have found that these initiatives lack a more human rights approach," he

A press release by the office of the High Commissioner, United Nations Human Rights, on the issue, which had a reference to Mahatma Gandhi, drew strong criticism from the government. The release was distributed at the press conference.



GUWAHATI, Nov 10 (PTI): In the biggest GST rejig yet, tax rates on over 200 items, ranging from chewing gum to chocolates, to beauty products, wigs and wrist watches, were today cut to provide relief to consumers and businesses

amid economic slowdown.

As many as 178 items of daily use were shifted from the top tax bracket of 28 per cent to 18 per cent, while a uniform 5 per cent tax was prescribed for all restaurants, both air- conditioned and non-AC, Finance Minister Arun Jaitley said after the GST Council meeting here.

Currently, 12 per cent GST on food bill is levied in non-AC restaurants and 18 per cent in air-conditioned ones. All these got input tax credit, a facility to set off tax paid on inputs with final tax.

laitley said the restaurants. however, did not pass on the input tax credit (ITC) to customers and so the ITC facility is being with

drawn and a uniform 5 per cent tax is levied on all restaurants without the distinction of AC or non-AC.

Restaurants in starred-hotels that charge Rs 7,500 or more per day room tariff will be levied 18 per cent GST but ITC is allowed for them. Those restaurants in hotels charging less than Rs 7,500 room tariff will charge 5 per cent GST

but will not get ITC.

The all-powerful GST Council pruned the list of items in the top 28 per cent Goods and Services Tax (GST) slab to just 50 from current 228. So, only luxury and sins goods are now only in highest tax bracket and items of daily use are

shifted to 18 per cent.

Also, tax on wet grinders and armoured vehicles was cut from 28 per cent to 12 per cent, he said, adding the tax rate on six items was reduced from 18 per cent to 5 per cent, on 8 items from 12 per cent to 5 per cent and on six items from 5 per cent to nil.

Chewing gum, chocolates, cof-

fee, custard powder, marble and granite, dental hygiene products, polishes and creams, sanitary ware, leather clothing, artificial fur, wigs cookers stoves after-shave deodorant, detergent and washing power, razors and blades, cutlery, storage water heater, batteries, goggles, wrist watches and mattress are among the products on which tax rate has been cut from 28 per cent to 18 per cent.

The top tax rate is now restricted to luxury and demerit goods like pan masala, aerated water and beverages, cigars and cigarettes, tobacco products, cement, paints, perfumes, ACs, dish washing machine, washing machine, refriger-ators, vacuum cleaners, cars and two-wheelers, aircraft and yacht.

The cut in tax will cost Rs 20,000 crore in revenues annually, Bihar Deputy Chief Minister Sushil Kumar Modi said.

Launched on July 1, the GST weaved 29 states into a single mar-ket with one tax rate but while traders and small business complained of increased compliance burden. voices of dissent rose on high tax rate on some common use goods.

GST rejig: Tax rate on 178 daily items reduced to 18% from 28%

With economy growing by its slowest pace since Narendra Modi government came to power, the "panic-stricken govt has no op-tion but to concede demands for change" in the tax, former Finance Minister P Chidambaram, said on Twitter today.

In ease compliance burden, the Council relaxed the return filing criteria and also lowered the penalties for late filing.

"As part of efforts to rationalise T structure, the Council has been reviewing rates from time to time. In the last 3 meetings, we have been systematically looking at 28 per cent tax bracket and rationalising certain items out of that bracket into lesser categories, mostly 18 per cent or even less,

GST tax slabs of 5, 12, 18 and 28 per cent were decided going by the principle of fitting each item into a category most close to cu-mulative pre-GST taxes.

"Optically, some items should not have been in 28 per cent despite being in old regime. Secondly, some items manufactured by small entities had excise exemption," he said, adding in the last meetings 30-40 items have been taken out of 28 per cent bracket.

Bipin Sapra, Tax Partner, EY India, said, "While the reduction of rates would substantially reduce the prices of a number of commodities; however the government may need to balance the revenue considerations too."

Krishan Arora, Partner, Grant Thornton India LLP said the decision of GST Council on pruning of the 28 slab list would be a welcome move for many industries in mass consumption space.

In certain cases, it is also likely to bring down the total tax impact even lower than earlier regime which would be a big relief to the

Rationalisation exercise of tax slabs needs to be carried out com prehensively keeping in mind the significance of the industry and the overall tax incidence under earlier regime, Arora said.

Vishal Raheja of Taxmann de-scribed the move as "great step" and said, "In future, we may expect that Government will further slash tax rates by moving from 4-tier tax slabs to lesser slabs or even single GST rate"

Abhishek A Rastogi of Khaitan Co said while it was expected that there will be rate cuts, it was never expected that the list will be trimmed down so significantly.

"With the rate reduction on a plethora of products, the next step of the government should be to ensure that the benefit of the rate reduction goes to the consumers," he said. "It appears that after this mass

rate reduction various anti- profiteering problems may kickoff for businesses which would not pass on the benefit to the consumers.'

Govt to table Bill in Parliament to allow NRIs to vote

NEW DELHI, NOV 10 (PTI): A bill to amend the electoral law to allow Non-Resident Indians (NRIs) to vote through postal or e-ballots would be introduced in the upcoming winter session of Parliament, the Centre today informed the Supreme Court.

A bench of Chief Justice Dipak Misra and Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud considered the submission of the Centre and acceded to its request that the hearing on petitions seeking voting rights for NRIs, be adjourned.

Lawyer P K Dey, appearing for the Centre, sought adjournment for six months on the ground that the Bill would be tabled in the Winter Session. However, the bench deferred the hearing by 12 weeks.

On July 21, Attorney General K K Venugopal had told the court that NRIs could

not be allowed to vote by merely changing the rules made under the Representation of People (RP) Act and a Bill was needed to be introduced in Parliament to amend the Act itself to grant the voting rights.

The court had on July 14 asked the Centre to decide whether it would amend the elec-toral law or rules to allow NRIs to vote by postal or e-ballots in the polls in the country, taking note of the fact that the Centre and the Election Commission of India (ECI) were agreeable to the report of a panel that NRIs might be allowed to vote.

The poll panel had said the move to al-

low NRIs to use proxy voting on the lines of defence personnel and e-ballot facility would require changes either in the RP Act or in the rules made under the Act.

The Centre had said that in principle, it was

agreeable to the recommendations made in the report prepared by a 12-member committee led by the deputy election commissioner Vinod Zutshi to explore the feasibility of alter-native options for voting by overseas electors.

Former attorney general Mukul Rohat-gi, appearing for one of the petitioners, had said that NRIs could be given the right to vote by making changes in the rules only and there was no need to amend the provi-sions of the RP Act.

The bench was hearing a batch of petitions filed by Nagender Chindam, the chair man of London-based Pravasi Bharat organisation and other NRIs including Shamsh V P. Earlier, the Centre had said that the draft legislation to provide voting rights to NRIs through postal ballots would be further revised before it is tabled in Parliament.

"There cannot be a command or an order directing the CJI to constitute a bench of specific strength," the bench said while making it clear that neither a two-judge, nor a three- judge bench can direct the CJI to constitute a specific bench.

"Needless to emphasis that no judge can take up a matter on its own unless allocated by the CJI as the CJI is master of the court," the bench said and annuled the decision of the two-judge bench, in the hearing which witnessed heated exchange of words between the judges and advocate Prashant Bhushan, representing the petitioners.

"Any order passed contrary to this order (by the constitution bench) should not hold the field and shall be treated to be annulled," the CJI said in hard-hitting remarks while refusing the request of a lawyer to bar the media from reporting the case, saying he belived in "freedom of speech, freedom of expression and freedom of press".

The bench said if the principle of law,

judicial discipline and decorum of the court was not followed, there would be 'anarchy" and "chaos" in the administration of justice as well as the functioning of the institution.

Perturbed by vesterday's order, the CII. without taking names of the concerned judges, said there were hundreds of matters listed in the court daily and if the or-ders were passed like this, then the court cannot function.

Members of the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA), including its President R S Suri, vice-president Ajit Sinha, Secretary Gaurav Bhatia and several se-nior advocates including Ashok Bhan, Aman Sinha and others strongly countered the allegations levelled in the pe-titions and said strong action should be taken against any attempt to "browbeat"

'Getting orders by terrorism should not be tolerated by this court. Strong action needs to be taken against any such attempt," SCBA members said while requesting the bench to initiate contempt proceedings in the matter.

The hearing in the jampacked courtroom saw allegations flying thick and fast with Bhushan even raising his pitch while asking the CJI to recuse himself from hearing the matter as his name has allegedly figured in the CBI's FIR.

The CII retorted by asking Bhushan, who was accompanied by advocate Kami-ni Jaiswal, one of the petitioners, to read the contents of the FIR and warned against losing his temper.
"We have been giving you indulgence

and you cannot deny that, despite you levelling wild allegations against me. You can afford to lose your temper but we cannot", the CJI said.

Bhushan, who was representing an NGO 'Campaign for Judicial Accountability' and Jaiswal, seeking constitution of an SIT to probe the corruption case allegedly involving judges, said the CJI's name fea-

"What FIR against me? It is nonsense. There is not a word in the FIR naming me. Read our orders first. I feel sorry. You are liable for contempt now," the CJI said.

Bhushan dared the bench to issue a ntempt notice to him and said the hearing cannot be conducted in this manner without allowing him to speak.

The activist advocate was also rebuked by Justice Arun Mishra, who observed that FIR cannot be lodged against sitting judicial officer of lower courts, judges of the higher judiciary, the Vice President of India or the President of India because they

have immunity.

He said the contents of the petition filed before it was per se contemptuous.

Bhushan left the court in a huff mid-way during the hearing, alleging that he was not being allowed to speak while the court has heard "all and sundry". He was seen apparently being pushed and jostled while he was leaving the courtroom.

The CJI also said he had set up the fivejudge constitution bench as a two-judge bench comprising Justices A K Sikri and Ashok Bhushan, while hearing a separate plea with similar allegations of bribery earlier in the day, had said that the matter

should be placed before the CJI for passing an appropriate order.

At the fag end of the hearing, one of the bar members requested the bench to pass an order gagging the media from reporting the case, claiming it would tarnish the image of the institution which is a "temple of justice"

The CII refused to accept the oral submission, saying "I believe in freedom of speech, freedom of expression and freedom of press".

"Prime facie, I am always of the view

that freedom of speech and expression should be respected. I am not going to pass any order restraining the press," CJI Misra said.

The constitution bench also made it clear that the pleas regarding alleged bribes taken in the names of judges would be taken up by an appropriate bench after

The CBI, in its FIR, has named several persons, including former Orissa High Court judge Ishrat Masroor Quddusi, as accused in the alleged corruption case.

> Odisha, WB to hold first-ever joint coastal security exercise BHUBANESWAR, NOV 10

(PTI): The governments of Odisha and neighbouring West Bengal will soon organise a joint security exercise named as Sagar Kavach to further tighten the existing coastal security mechanism along the 630 km long coastline.

This was informed by Odisha's Additional Chief Secretary, Home Department, Asit Trip-athy after attending a meeting here.

Sagar Kavach security ercise is a realistic drill to check the efficacy of the security parameters and preparedness of var-ious security forces like the Indian Navy, Marine police force, Indian Coast Guard (ICG), Forest Department, Fisheries and district administration," Tripathy told reporters.

The UN expert, who visited India at the in-vitation of the govern-ment will submit a full report on his findings with recommendations at the 39th session of the Human Rights Council in September 2018.

Heller was also critical of the certification mechanism being followed while declaring a particular area open-defecation free (ODF).

"The certification procedure is not very straightforward.

According to responsible ministries, the protocol to certify an ODF area is not the same for

rural and urban areas. I also learned that in some places. ODF certified aras are not de facto open defecation free," he said.

Let the Young **Explore**

Sikkim needs to allow the young to dream and aim big

Take a look around, and you will be forced to notice that more and more of the young are beginning to think out of the box and explore options beyond the straitjacketed dictates of security that we would impose on them if we had the way. Maybe more of them are still hemmed down by the timidity that we project, but a brave number of them are stepping out, and that is welcome. This change reflects in the nature of people being felicitated by Sikkim. Where earlier generations had achievers from the established and secure professions, without taking anything away from their struggles and successes, one needs to remark that the younger achievers are from more off-the-beaten-path disciplines. The recent felici-tation of achievers from among the Nepali speakers in Gangtok for instance featured young success stories from the creative fields and celebrated brave decisions. Take Megha Nidhi Dahal for instance. When the then 28-yearold Megha Nidhi, who was already "settled" and "secure" as a software engineer in the software capital of India at Bangalore, discovered his passion for public service and decided to pursue his real calling, he reaffirmed the faith Sikkim needs to have in its youth. He may be the first Sik-kimese to crack the UPSC exams in the general category, but his success is bound to inspire many more youth to many more successes in many more fields. He took a brave decision to switch tracks and pursue his passion. His family backed his decision and he has made all of the State proud. A similar respect and support is palpable in the stories of all other young "achievers" felicitated recently and that is the approach that Sikkim needs to take. Sikkim needs to ensure an environment which inspires more of its young to pursue more divergent dreams.

Every generation wants to leave its mark. They do not always know how when they are young, but what they are instinctively passionate about is their pursuit for excellence, a pursuit which the elder generation needs to learn to allow to breathe. Unfortunately, despite an astoundingly high percentage of Sikkim made up of the young in their most productive age-bracket, there does not appear to be a genuine environment which encourages youthful exuberance to take flight. The policy initiatives are in place, but the societal attitudes are still regressive.

Disenchantment, pessimism and opportunism are

behavioural traits that one normally associates with those who have been around for slightly more time. It will be wrong on our part to infect the young with it before it is their time to be so practical. But we try, sucking them into our mechanizations of entitlement and contacts and are not satisfied until we have given them a jaded outlook as well. This is unfortunate. Take a look around, at the community level, what has the elder generation really done to either get noticed or make a difference. An entire generation was smothered by elders who extended privileges when they should have provided challenges. An entire section has matured with a worrying sense of entitlement and no sense of service. This age-group needs to be convinced to allow the next their own futures and not the one imposed by us.

Slightly over a quarter of Sikkim's population is in the age-group with the most potential. As per the Census 2011 data, 22% of Sikkim's population was aged between 15 to 24 six years ago. Although learning is a process which begins with birth and continues till death, it is this slot from 15 to 24 which can benefit the most from opportunities. This one-fourth of Sikkim's population should be indulged by the remaining 78% with the best of opportunities and the most of resources. If this section excels, they will ensure a better future for the larger majority in coming years. Indulging this section should not be too difficult a task because when expanded, the age-group from 15 to 59, recognised as the "working age group" constitutes 65% of the population. What is more, a staggering 70% of Sikkim's population is made up of adults
- those aged above 18 years. This means that the percentage of dependents – the very young and very aged
- is very low in Sikkim, hence, supporting the dreams and aspirations of the 15 to 24 year olds should not be an impossible burden for the State to bear. Given how much easier Sikkim has it compared to the statistics and ground realities of the other states, the working age section has no excuses to deny the age-group on the verge of finding itself even its most ambitious.

The young have more than proven that they are willing to experiment and explore. Now it is upon us to let them

Hate Globalisation? Try localism, not nationalism

It hardly needs saying, but there are changes afoot in the political economy of the world. Where there is globalisation, there are globalisation protestors. This is nothing new, but it is becoming mainstream.

The antithesis of globalisation, nationalism, and the pursuit of your own country's interests over those of everyone else, has bubbled back up in Europe. And it's not just Europe, of course. In the US, president Donald Trump is (among other initiatives) rethinking the American commitment to free trade.

In the rest of the world, the expe rience of globalisation shows it creates some winners and some losers. This varies geographically and in dif-ferent economic fields, and is shown in different aspects of our lives.

And so, someone in London might find their house is worth more. As for-eign capital flows in to buy up large swaths of the capital it increases their wealth, while others might be priced out of the market. In some sectors of the market, wages might be declin-ing as a result of global competition, migration, casualisation or automa tion. In the final analysis, however, it is not a matter of whether globalisation causes these changes, it is rather more that people feel that it does.

WALLS AND WAILS

Globalisation is not, however, merely a matter of trade, migration and for-eign outsourcing. To many it seems Britain itself is for sale as an increas ing proportion of UK businesses and assets answer to foreign owners.

Economic theory suggests, there-fore, the nation will increasingly be run for the benefit of foreign capital, rather than the citizens. On top of this, there is the danger that inflows of foreign capital will cause the exchange rate to appreciate, making it more dif-ficult to export, reducing manufactur-ing output and reducing employment in those sectors affected.

To protect them from forces be-

yond their control, citizens across the world are increasingly looking to the nation state for protection, hence the rise of what is often called nationalism. As Abraham Lincoln noted:

The legitimate object of governnent is to do for a community of people whatever they need to have done, but cannot do at all, or cannot so well do, for themselves – in their separate,

and individual capacities."

It is clear, no individual or community can stand against the forces of global capital, and Western gov-ernments appear averse to giving the workforce the means to protect itself, through, for example, increasing employment rights and unionisation. However, in their search for a strong government to protect them, citizens are in danger of giving the state too much power over their lives

It is by no means assured that the policies which suit a strong domestic government will be better than those which suit foreign owned multi-na-tional corporations. Also, history indicates the fear of global capital may be coopted by unscrupulous politi-cians into a fear of other nations or fear of other peoples

THINK LOCALLY
Rather than nationalism, therefore, we might turn to localism. In the UK context, this might be devolution with real (financial) localised power, and that power realised through local

government and local business.

An economy of big businesses

(operated for the benefit of global vners) is less than ideal for the individual and society. In contrast, a so-ciety of many small local businesses is more resilient, more empowering and more in keeping with the spirit of capitalism and of the market. We must also bear in mind that increasing business concentration (fewer, but larger firms) is a driver of increasing inequality. If a business is too big to (be allowed to) fail, then the government has failed in its duty to keep business small.

Economic theory indicates that those with no stake in a community other than profit extraction avoid suf-fering from localised ill effects such as unemployment, poverty, want and homelessness. It follows those who live and work in a community have a greater stake in its prosperity.

The government might likewise nsider how we might prevent those who do not even live in the country

from driving up house prices.

Local protection from exploitation by global interests requires the right mix of global and local policies. And local government policies require adequate financing. By local financial power, I don't mean local taxes. That has the potential to fragment the nation, as it has, to some extent, in the EU (whether perceived rightly or wrongly).

If we fund education or social care out of local taxes, for example, there will tend to be a race to the bottom as local authorities will be motivated to underperform to encourage vulnerable families to go and live elsewhere. It follows taxes should be collected nationally, and shared proportionally (on the basis of demographic profile) to the devolved authorities.

There is no space here to discuss in detail other possible localism pol-icies here, but there are many ways to promote local ownership and local empowerment. That could include local currencies, boosts to council housing, local authority ownership of utilities or support for locally-owned high street shops. However, it is not a policy mix I suggest, rather it is an emphasis.

Ultimately, the only viable alternative to the choice currently on offer, the choice of Big State or Big Business, is Small State and Small Business, or more appropriately Lo-cal Government and Local Business. To pursue localism will require a systemic shift in how the national government goes about shaping society, but I suggest it is possible to promote social justice in a capitalist context in no other way.

Priti Patel, Ancient Rome and Moral Leadership

Priti Patel's ignominious departure from the UK cabinet after it emerged that she had held undeclared meetings with Israeli officials during a personal holiday exposes many flaws in her conduct. The commentariat tells us she showed a lack of judgement, a lack of awareness of due process and a willingness to conduct what, in effect, was her own foreign policy.

One word that hasn't come up so frequently is

"corruption". That's in many ways understandable. Corruption is generally understood in transactional terms with four key parts. An act is understood as corrupt if there is a (i) deliberate attempt (ii) to abuse (iii) entrusted power (iv) for some sort of private gain. Corruption is normally regarded as a process rather than an outcome and acts that tick all of those boxes are subsequently judged as such. That all of those terms can and do require some sort of external judgement to be made ensures that we can't talk about objective realities. We do, however, have a decent starting point for making sense of a complex world.

This understanding of corruption is, however,

relatively new. Indeed, it's only in the past few decades that corruption has been understood in this form. Yet corruption has, of course, been around for as long as humans have sought to organise them-selves. Aristotle, for example, argued corruption is a symbol of the dysfunctionality of states that have moved away from their "pure" state of being. For Aristotle and a number of his contemporaries, corruption has a clear moral dimension and that moral core is the very essence of corruption, lead-ing inevitably to decay, degradation and ultimately state failure.

WHY ROME FELL

A similar logic has been used by historians such as Ramsay McMullen when they argue that the ever-deepening problem of corruption is the primary reason the Roman Empire fell. MacMullen's thesis is straightforward and well

documented: corruption led successive govern-ments to concentrate more on the need to generate private gains (of whatever sort) for themselves and their supporters, and less on the demands of running a large and complex empire. The moral core that characterised much of the thinking of Rome's founders had withered away over time; subsequent Roman leaders not only lost control of the overnment, but the government lost sight of what



it existed to do. Even when it became apparent that corruption was at the core of the administration's work, attempts at reform came too late. Like a cancer, corruption had penetrated too many parts of the public ethos.

The fall of Rome was also pivotal in Montesquieu's thinking on corruption (and state failure). He explained in detail how the virtuous thinking of Rome's founders helped it become an empire, but how the corruption of Rome's moral fibre ultimately brought the empire down. For Montesquieu and MacMullen, as well as many others, corruption was at the very core of Rome's descent into dissolution.

A QUESTION OF MORALS

Corruption, no matter how it is defined, certainly has a moral dimension to it. That remains so regardless of the fact that many would prefer to couch their analysis, and, indeed, their prescrip-tions, in the language of rationality, interests, costs

Much of the recent work on corruption – pro-duced largely by those with the economist's mindset – has purposefully avoided the moral minefield and instead aspired to embrace some sort of objec-tive understanding of corruption. That's ultimately unlikely to be a fruitful way forward in terms of actually fighting corruption in practice; morals drive understandings of what's appropriate and ignoring them doesn't mean that they simply go away.

Bringing issues of morality back into our analysis subsequently helps us comprehend much more about what we understand corruption to be as well as how (and, indeed, whether) we go about tackling it. The moral dimension to the corruption chal-

lenge, therefore, cannot be an optional extra.

It's with that in mind that the behaviour of Priti Patel is so interesting. There is little evidence to suggest that she might be guilty of corruption in the modern understanding of the term, but she certainly did do things that corruption analysts of yesteryear would recognise as falling in to that category. At a push one could certainly argue she broke the ministerial code and that's clearly a process violation. But it is really by looking at broader normative issues of what's right, why it's right and how we can recognise it as such do we really see

why behaviour such as Patel's can be so corrosive.
Rome ultimately didn't fall because of the specific acts of one person. Rome's problems escalated over time as the moral core that characterised the thinking of Rome's founders ceased to shape their decision-making. Theresa May is hardly Romulus Augustus, but a government that neglects the im-portance of moral leadership is in dangerous waters. If nothing else, Priti Patel's resignation should give us reason to ponder the ramifications of that.

No odd-even unless you justify its necessity: NGT

New Delhi, Nov 10 (PTI): Uncertainty prevailed over the implementation of the odd-even car rationing scheme as the National Green Tribunal today questioned the rationale behind Delhi government's decision to roll it out for five days next week, saying the scheme "cannot be imposed like this".

The NGT questioned the basis for

the AAP government's decision pointing out that the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) and Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC) have found that the levels of PM10 and PM2.5 were cumulatively higher when the scheme was implemented twice earlier.

"Odd-Even formula can't be imposed like this. You can't have a shock treatment like this. By this scheme, you are only encouraging people to buy more vehicles and allowing more inter-state traffic. We will not allow odd-even vehicle rationalisation scheme until you prove that it's not counter- productive," the bench said.

The NGT termed the plan a "farce" and asked the Delhi government to give an undertaking that it will roll out the scheme only when the particulate matter (PM) 2.5 was over 300.

"You are getting the tag of the worst capital in the world. The SC and NGT have suggested 100 measures to curb pollution, but you always opt for odd-even. Nothing has been done by the Delhi government in the past one year, a bench headed by NGT Chairperson Justice Swatanter Kumar said.

It also quizzed the city government over its decision to introduce 500 buses during the odd-even week and directed it to clearly state how many of these vehicles ran on diesel.

The prevailing level of PM2.5 in

the capital was hovering around 433 microgrammes per cubic metre, while PM10 stood at around 617, as per the latest CPCB data.

The bench also directed the city government to submit the comparative ratio of emission caused by diesel and petrol vehicles and asked it to clearly enumerate the contribution of small

petrol cars in pollution.

It also questioned the justification of exempting two- wheelers and wom-

en drivers during the odd-even scheme despite knowing that two-wheelers caused 46 per cent pollution, as per an IIT Kanpur report.

"We don't want to stop your pro-rammme. It is indeed a laudable project taken in the interest of the environment.

But the manner in which it is being implemented is unscientific and inefficient," it said.

Following a plea by the AAP govern-ment, the green panel however allowed the industries engaged in essential services to operate in the Delhi-NCR on the condition that they would not pollute and cause emissions.

The hearing remained inconclusive and will continue tomorrow

During the hearing, the Delhi government counsel told the bench that they were introducing the odd-even scheme in pursuance to the directions of the apex court-appointed EPCA.

But the tribunal rapped him over this submission and said the Enviconment Pollution Control Authority (EPCA) had issued several suggestions and odd-even scheme was just one of

'The Supreme Court has never said that you implement the odd-even scheme. It was only one of the direc-tions given by EPCA. You have not followed 99 directions and introduced the odd-even scheme and treating it as a picnic," the bench said.

"If the recommendation of Graded Response Action Plan were being followed (which requires that upon the parameter reaching 500 for PM10 and 300 for PM2.5 odd-even will be implemented), which were the days in the last three months when the pollution levels were found to be below the said limit and odd-even was not implemented," the bench asked.

The panel directed the Delhi gov-

ernment to be ready with all the answers and said it would hear the matter tomorrow, which is normally a holiday

The AAP government had yesterday announced introduction of the odd-even scheme as part of a Graded Response Plan to tackle the alarming pollution levels in the capital.

ITANAGAR, Nov 10 (PTI): The Arunachal Pradesh government has erected a statue of legendary music composer and singer Bhupen Hazarika at Bolung village in Dibang Val-

ley district of the state.

The ten feet bronze statue, sculpted by Biren Singh of Guwahati, was erected in the village this vear. It would be formally unveiled tentatively in the early part of 2018, an official told PTI.

"The state govern-ment had allocated Rs 30 lakh for the statue in 2015 as a tribute to the legendary singer who contributed a lot for the state in the cultural field. Bhupen da is more an Arunachalee than an Assamese," Director of Research Department

Batem Pertin said.

The Bolung village is adjacent to Assam's Sadiya area where his parents lived. He often carried to the village by elders. Later as a boy he also moved around the village frequently, an official said

Pertin said that the government in 2016-17

also allocated 70 lakh for erection of two statues of Hazarika at Yazali in Lower Subansiri district

and Itanagar.

Pertin, who is also the general secretary of the Arunachal Pradesh Liter-ary Society (APLS), said that due to persuasion of the society, the govern-ment approved the Bolung project.

"The land for erect-ing the statue was donated by the sons of for-mer MLA of Arunachal Pradesh Provisional Legislative Assembly Gora Pertin as a tribute to Hazarika," Pertin said.

"Bhupen da through his songs tried to unite the entire north eastern states in a single string. He not only composed songs for Assam but for all the NE states, he

Interesting anecdote of Hazarika's childhood is that as an infant he was once lost by his parents and he spent a couple of days in a tribal family at Bolung village. He was later returned to his parents by a young girl of the Adi tribe.

BCCI rejects NADA demand to test Indian cricketers

New Delhi, Nov 10 (PTI): In a stern response to India's anti-doping body NADA, the BCCI has said that government body has no jurisdiction to conduct

dope tests on Indian cricketers.

In a letter written on November 8 to NADA chief Navin Agarwal, BCCI CEO Rahul Johri made it clear that there is no requirement for NADA to tests its cricketers since the board is not a National Sports Federation (NSF) and its present anti-dop-ing system is robust enough.

"It is relevant to mention here that BCCI is not a National Sports Federation. Accordingly, NADA does not have jurisdiction to conduct dope testing of Indian cricketers in any domestic or international event organised or under the aegis of BCCI," Johri wrote in the letter.

"In light of the aforesaid,

there is no requirement for any BCCI official to co-ordinate with NADA for dope testing of Indian cricketers either during competitions or out of completions."

The BCCI response was pre-

pared with instructions from Supreme Court-appointed Com-

mittee of Administrators.

Besides responding to the NADA chief, Johri also wrote back to the sports secretary, who had approached the BCCI in October to cooperate with

The Ministry had stated that lack of co-operation from BCCI on the subject may run the risk of NADA not complying with World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) Code.

Johri said BCCI's existing anti-doping mechanism is robust

"The BCCI already has a robust dope testing mechanism which is employed for both during competitions and out-of- competitions and the testing of samples by IDTM is already being done at WADA accredited laboratory (NDTL) under aegis

of the Sports Ministry."

He further claimed that the BCCI is compliant with the WADA Code.

analysis and testing of samples, BCCI adheres to the WADA In-ternational Standard of Laboratories and the WADA International Standard for Testing and Investigations.

"Accordingly, the BCCI has engaged the services of same expert sample collection agency that is also engaged by the ICC to prove sample collection services viz, International Doping Tests and Management (IDTM)

"The IDTM sends the collected samples for testing to a WADA accredited laboratory viz, National Dope Testing Lab oratory (NDTL), as mandated by WADA. Since the CEO of NDTL is sports secretary, the dope testing for BCCI is conducted under the aegis of the Sports Ministry," wrote Johri.

He further reasoned that since BCCI is an autonomous body affiliated to the International Cricket Council (ICC), it is only required to operate within the rules and regulations of the



Pentagon asked to develop enduring defence ties with India

WASHINGTON, Nov 10 (PTI): The Pentagon has been asked by US Con-gressional leaders to develop a "forward-looking" strategy to form an enduring defence relationship with India.

Congressional lead-ers reconciling the differences between the House and Senate versions of the National Defense Authorisation Act (NDAA-2018) also asked the US and India to work closely in Afghanistan.

The new version of the NDAA-2018 require the Secretary of De-fence to "develop a for-ward-looking strategy that would build upon current objectives and goals, underlining a mutual desire to develop an enduring defence rela-tionship with India".

According to it, the US and India "should work closely with Afghanistan" to promote stability in the region to include targeted infrastructure development and economic investment, means to address capability gaps in country, and improved humanitarian and disaster relief assistance.

The US Congress in its last NDAA-2017 had

designated India as a

In its latest conference report, the Con-gressional leaders on Thursday said that the designation of 'Major Defence Partner' is unique to India, and institutionalises the progress made to facilitate defence trade and technology cooperation between the United States and India to a level commensurate with the closest allies and partners of America.

"The designation promotes joint exercises, defence strategy and policy coordination, military exchanges, and port calls in support of defence cooperation between the United States and India," it said.
