## West Sikkim ranks in health in 'Transformation of Aspirational Districts' initiative

GANGTOK, 30 MAR:

The NITI Aayog, on Wednesday,
launched the baseline ranking for
115 aspirational districts based on 49 indicators across five sectors that include health and nutrition, education, agriculture and water resources, financial inclusion and skill development and basic infrastructure. With the latest available data from the ministries

concerned, NITI Aayog has completed a baseline ranking of 101 districts. Sikkim's West District has been ranked 4th in the health sector while overall it is ranked 30th amongst 101 districts evaluated for the baseline ranking.

However, in the agriculture sector West Sikkim comes in the bottom 20 ranking 99th out of 101 districts.

The baseline ranking would be fol-lowed by delta ranking of these districts from May 2018 based on their "incremental progress"

Prime Minister Narendra Modi had launched the 'Transformation of Aspirational Districts' programme in January to quickly and effectively transform some of the most underdeveloped dis-

tricts of the country.

The broad contours of the programme include convergence (of central and state schemes), collaboration (of central, state level 'Prabhari' officers & district collectors), and compe-

tition among districts.

With states as the main drivers, this program will focus on the strength of each district, identify low-hanging fruits for immediate improvement, measure progress, and rank districts.

Under the programme, identified districts are prodded and encouraged to first catch-up with the best district within their state, and subsequently aspire to become one of the best in the country, by competing with, and learn-

Given that the class 12 examination are very very important in the context of the future of a child, like for examinations that have to be taken and university admissions, the date for examination has been fixed at April 25, Swarup told reporters.

## ECI has received petition seeking disqualification of MLAs: JAC

Joint Action Committee, which is seeking the disqualification of 14 MLAs, has said that the Election Commission of India has received the petition which was forwarded by the Governor of Sikkim and is consid-

ering the case.

Addressing a press conference here today, JAC chief coordinator, Nawin Kiran Pradhan, informed that they have received a letter from the Election Commission of India mentioning that the petition sent by the Governor was received by the commission.

He further informed that the ECI had also sent a letter for the Chief Secretary of Sikkim on 14 Mar 2018 to inquire whether the 14 MLAs have been saved by an Act of the legislature.

"We enquired with the Chief Secretary office about the letter on 27 Mar and the CS office confirmed that the letter has been received and they are working on it," he said.

Mr Pradhan has again sent a memorandum to the ECI along with a copy of the judgment in Pahalman Subba and others Vs State of Sikkim and others of the High Court of Sikkim dated 25 Aug, 2017 He stated that in this case, these 14 MLAs have not only held the office of profit but also enjoyed various benefits. He further added that posts of Parliamentary Secretaries have already been declared unconstitutional so these MLAs should be disqualified.

The committee has sought the disqualification of the MLAs for holding office of profit.

#### Fresh communal flareup in Bihar, rioters go on rampage in Nawada

Nawada (Bihar), Mar 30 (PTI): In yet another incident of communal flare-up in Bihar, scores of vehicles were today vandalised and a hotel was set ablaze in this district, where members of two communities clashed following reports of desecration of an idol, an official said.

Trouble erupted in Godapur village under the Town police station area, where an idol was found vandalised, following which the members of two communities indulged in heavy stone-pelting, District Magistrate (DM) Kaushal Kumar said.

He added that an enraged mob also went on a rampage on National Highway 31, hurling stones at the vehicles and leaving scores of them damaged. The mob also set a hotel on fire, the DM said.

The police fired 10 rounds in the air to quell the mob that also allegedly manhandled a number of local journalists, who had gone to the spot to cover the incident.

The situation was brought under control, though tension prevailed in the area, the DM said, adding that a heavy deployment of police was in place.

No arrest was made

in this connection so far, he added. Nawada is located at a distance of around 70 kms from state capital Patna.

Bihar has witnessed a spurt in communal clashes in the recent past. On March 17, violence broke out in Bhagalpur, where a religious procession was being led by Arijit Shashwat, the son of Union minister Ashwini Kumar Choubev.

On Sunday last, the members of two communities had clashed in Aurangabad over a Ram Navami procession. Similar incidents were reported from Sitamarhi, Nalanda, Sheikhpura and Munger districts over the next few days.

The BJP and the opposition RJD have been trading charges over the issue, blaming each other for the sudden rise in such incidents.

Leader of Opposition in the state Assembly, Tejashwi Yadav (RJD) has alleged that those associated with the Sangh Parivar are fomenting communal passion in the state and that they were "trained" to do so by RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat during his week-long tour of Bihar last month.

The BJP has hit back, with its state unit spokesman Rajib Ranjan issuing a statement, squarely blaming the opposition party for "spreading communal frenzy" and accusing it of trying to "defame" the NDA government in the state.

Meanwhile, Congress
Legislature Party leader
Sadanand Singh urged
Chief Minister and JD(U)
chief Nitish Kumar to "reconsider" his party's tieup with the BJP.

In a statement, he said, "Chief Minister Nitish Kumar must give a serious thought to the revival of the Grand Alliance in Bihar. Political compulsions are preventing him from effectively cracking down on the rioters."

"The state cannot prosper in such an environment. Moreover, the recent incidents have given the government a bad name. The chief minister should reconsider his decision," Singh said, referring to Kumar's exit last year from the "Mahagathbandhan", comprising the JD(IJ), the RJD and the Congress, after which he rejoined the BJP-led NDA.

#### The Dalai Lama in Exile

#### The Precious One is special

On 31 March, 1959, the Dalai Lama crossed into India at Tawang in Arunachal Pradesh after a 15-day journey from Lhasa, completing one leg of an epic journey which continues to this day, starting on his sixtieth year in exile, having spent more years away from home than he spent in Tibet growing up. A lot has changed over the years, the Dalai Lama has aged, China, save the totalitarian instincts, has junked communist ideology for all practical purposes and there are now many more refugee-creating situations around the world. What has not changed though is China's handling of Tibet and the foisting of a situation there which continues to force people to rebel and flee and even end their own lives in protest.

One may ask here, how, despite countries and their leaders wanting to be friends with China, does Tibet still make news; how their situation still makes headlines? Even when the Tibetan Government in Exile goes out of its way to temper down its desire for autonomy in Tibet just so that host India does not get discomfited? Well, because of the Dalai Lama. Tibetans in exile have been refugees for nearly six decades now. Media has lost interest in other exiled people within a few years and communities in exile have "assimilated in new homes shortly after. And yet, Tibet, its people both within and in exile remain in conversation. How much does one read about the Lhotsampa refugees from Bhutan anymore, for instance?

It is in the manner that the Dalai Lama has led Ti-betan aspirations, modulated public debate on Tibet and communicated a nation's desire for greater expression that keeps the movement alive [in the media circles and thus public consciousness]. It is because of the Dalai Lama's personality and the hope he inspires that the aspirations remain alive even inside Tibet. Tibetans in Tibet have never experienced democracy and their world-view now comes distilled from Beijing which is no democrat. And yet, Tibet witnesses uprisings. Rioters, even when they veer away from the Dalai Lama's path of non-violence, hold up his photographs and his flag of Tibet to prove their devotion to him and qualify to become patriots. Distressingly, an increasing number of them are hurting themselves through self-immolation, a desperate act of violence on self in the hope that the world may pay heed. The world, however, is not nearly as engaged as it should be even

though the issue remains unchanged.

And yet, the Dalai Lama keeps everything Tibetan relevant. Which is also why China has launched and sustained a concerted effort to demonise him and strong arming countries into ignoring him. China, which routinely humbles India, browbeats the Koreas, stares down USA and generally bullies everyone else, has met with only failure when it comes to challenging the Dalai Lama. It has swamped Tibetans into a minority at home, indulged Tibet Autonomous Region with developmental funds but has utterly failed in quelling the unquestioned devotion the Dalai Lama commands [even if in secret] among the million Tibetans still in Tibet. And this frustrates them. China obviously plans to wait out the 14th Dalai Lama and the Dalai Lama obviously knows this as well. While China continues to unsuccessfully project the Dalai Lama as a "splittist" in the world's eyes, the Dalai Lama is reinforcing the Tibetan spirit in exile - literally forcing democracy on his people, ensuring that they practice it, and grooming alternatives in the religious realm who could deliver the unifying compassion that his people in exile will need in a future without him. When the Dalai Lama stepped on to Indian soil in 1959, very few knew of him of or the Tibetans. That is no longer the case even if there is an awkward sidelining even in the host country. The awkwardness results from the fact that the world has not seen a leader who has remained relevant and universally loved for any substantial period of time, and for six decades the Dalai Lama has showed us what selfless commitment means and can deliver. And this journey began on this day back in 1959. Just like the Kundun hence, even this day has

Throughout the Middle East and North Africa, poor municipal governance and service delivery contrib-uted to the Arab Spring uprisings. These uprisings ultimately led to the arriv al of a million refugees on

Western shores.
This May, Tunisia will hold its first municipal

elections since 2010. Experts are de bating whether Tunisia's decentral-ization law should be passed before the elections to make sure municipal governments have the powers and resources to meet their citizens' needs.

The World Bank and other international financial institutions are implementing decentralization programs to improve municipal political participation and service delivery

#### throughout the region. But are they working? DECISIONS REMAIN IN HANDS OF ELITES

My research on authoritarian states in the region finds that decentralization programs simply help keep authoritarian regimes in power and, in municipalities, keep decisions and services in hands of elites.

Political decentralization is the transfer of decision-making powers and responsibilities from central to lower-level governments, including municipal elected officials.

It's also meant to bring public input into municipal decision-making processes. With improved public participation in decision-making, the thinking goes, policies should better support local needs and provide ser-

vices equally to everyone.

The World Bank and other inter national financial institutions first promoted decentralization in Latin America after the fall of authoritarian rulers in the 1980s. Decentralization

followed democratization.

Yet in most states of the Middle East and North Africa, decentralization programs are being implemented while authoritarian regimes are still in place. Authoritarian rulers have long manipulated democratic institutions, such as elections, to stay

#### WHY WOULD AUTHORITARIAN RIILERS GIVE UP POWER?

The answer is that they don't. To stay in power, authoritarian regimes use several clever strategies. Two are particularly important in regards to decentralization.

The first strategy is an unelected administrative system that oversees elected institutions.

Moroccan municipalities are un-der the jurisdiction of the Ministry of the Interior that approves municipal council decisions. The ministry justifies this supervisory role based on its expertise. But in fact, it allows the ministry to facilitate mayors who are supportive of the regime and obstruct those who are not.

The second strategy is the use of patronage. Authoritarian rulers grant privileges and resources to key constituencies or political parties to ensure their support.

In Jordan, certain tribes receive

privileges.

In Morocco, privileges go to specific political parties. These privileges trickle down through a party.

ACCOUNTABLE TO THE

#### MOROCCAN KING

The system works both ways. Municipal politicians promise votes to those higher up in the party in exchange for services they can give to those who voted for them. Services are denied

Decentralization need not, and does not, affect these strategies. Nor does it necessarily result in less municipal supervision. Instead, supervision is "decentralized" to a lower administrative level.

Here's how it works in Moroc-co, where the greatest degree of decentralization in the region has occurred: The minister of the interior is no longer responsible for actually reviewing municipal decisions. But governors who are appointed by and accountable to the minister of the interior —and ultimately, the king do that job.

Responsibilities are either not handed down to municipal governments, or municipal governments only gain partial authority over them.

#### ONLY HAVE THE POWER

TO RECOMMEND Jordan recently passed a decentral-ization law and a municipalities law that created new elected provincial and local councils.

But the laws removed authority from municipal councils.

Citizens no longer vote for those municipal councils. Instead they vote for mayors and local councils that are smaller than municipal councils, and have fewer powers. Municipal councils are now composed of local council heads and have fewer powers than preiously. Local councils, meantime, large ly only have the power to recommend

The real authority belongs to the executive director, who is appointed by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs. He determines the annual budget and

sends it to the elected mayor And under Morocco's d centralization, approximately 70 per cent of the roles and responsibilities of the regions, provinces and municipalities overlap. This confusion gives appointed governors authority over areas that, according to the municipal charter, belong to municipal governments.

Decentralization aim to bring the public into municipal decision-making municipal decision-making processes. But neither public participation nor service delivery are necessarily improved.

Moroccan municipalities must create committees for to those who did not vote for them equity and equal opportuni-

ties." Members of the public must be on the committees. The committees' views must be included in municipalities' development plans.
Yet many elected officials are at

the same time also heads of civil society organizations such as a neigh-bourhood development association. They take advantage of this dual role by dominating the committees at the expense of other representatives.

By dominating the committees, councillors are able to put projects into development plans for their own political advantage. Favouritism and inequitable service delivery continue to exist.

#### THE DANGER OF

DECENTRALIZATION

Decentralization can in fact strengthen authoritarianism. While authoritarian rulers can call themselves political reformers, in the eyes of citizens, elected officials appear corrupt and unwilling to improve public par-ticipation or service delivery.

Decentralization justifies administrative supervision over elected bodies. The authoritarian regime is strengthened while elected officials and democratic institutions seem in effective.

International donors like Canada support decentralization by implementing projects to strengthen mu-nicipal leadership and administrative capacity.

But are we, in fact, strengthening authoritarianism?

## Why schools become battlegrounds during conflict

Last week, more than 100 girls who had been abducted by the Islamic militant group Boko Haram from a Nigerian school in Dapchi in February were released to their families. But the community was also threatened that if the group returned and found any girls in school, they would be abducted again - and not returned.

Meanwhile, in Syria, conservative esti-nates are that at least 4,072 schools have been forced to close, used as shelters, or destroyed due to the conflict. And there have been at least 1,292 attacks on schools in the Hama, Daraa, Homs, and Idlib provinces.

While a coalition of NGOs were present-ing the findings of their #SaveSyrianSchools proj-ect in a public hearing in Geneva last week, anothr school was bombed in Syria, killing at least 15

These examples reflect broader trends of targeting education across conflict-affected parts of the world. It is estimated that one in four schoolaged children in conflict-affected nations are not in school. This is a total of around 27 million children. And girls are 2.5 times more likely to be denied an

#### WHY USE SCHOOLS AS BATTLEGROUNDS

There are many reasons why schools and students, despite being protected by international law, are targeted during times of armed conflict and unrest. Students collected together in a school, or isolated travelling to and from school, are prime targets for abduction by armed groups.

Children are often taken to be recruited as

child soldiers, or used as human shields or human bombs. Schools are soft targets, and the targeting of children is very effective in campaigns of terror, having a destabilising effect on communities.

Schools and universities are also ideal locations

for military headquarters and facilities, and can become central to war efforts. This makes them key military targets for opposing sides.

Schools can be seen by armed groups to repre-



sent state authority, and are therefore key targets in campaigns against the government. This is especially true when the groups disagree with the form of education being provided. This reality is perhaps best illustrated by Boko Haram, which in 2015 committed to the cause of Islamic State and

renamed itself the Islamic State of West Africa.

Despite the change, the group remains best known as "Boko Haram", which in the local Hausa dialect roughly translates as "Western education is forbidden". Targeting schools and abducting children is a core strategy of the group, whose extremist beliefs oppose such education as sinful, and particularly object to the education of girls.

Boko Haram's infamous 2014 abduction of 276 girls in Chibok sparked the #BringBackOurGirls so cial media campaign. According to Human Rights Watch, more than 910 schools have been destroyed by Boko Haram in Nigeria; 600 teachers have been murdered, and thousands have been more forced

#### WHAT THE REST OF THE WORLD CAN DO

All children have the right to an education, and that can only be secured when schools are safe places to study. While the world watches and encourages American children rallying to make their schools safer, it's a salient time to remember that 75 million children worldwide experience significant disruption to their education in regions of conflict and

Despite the United Nations declaring attacks on schools as one of the six grave violations that most impact on children during armed conflict, much remains to be done to safeguard education during conflict – particularly for girls.

This is largely because education is not seen as a priority in crisis situations. Its loss is not immediately life-threatening, so it often takes a back seat to other concerns. This forms part of what is sometimes referred to as "the humanitarian-development divide - the disconnect between priorities during protracted crises. Education is often one of the first services to be lost during a crisis,

despite its importance to communities. Education attracts less than 2% of global humanitarian aid. Many affected countries invest far more on their military spending than they do on education.

While many initiatives and funds exist, there is still a need for greater coordination between government bodies and NGOs to effectively mount a response. And with countries slashing their aid

budgets, this will become increasingly difficult.

There may also be a lack of political will to confront this problem by countries not directly affected. In Australia, this is reflected by the govern-ment's current failure to endorse the Safe Schools Declaration – an international commitment sup-porting clear guidelines and reporting mechanisms to protect schools and education during armed conflict. These include the commitment not to use schools or universities for military purposes and to support measures to monitor and report on attacks

Education is a right, not a luxury to be indulged in better times. To rise out of conflict and create truly stable communities, education is a necessary investment in the future, and the international community shares a collective responsibility to protect it.

#### I-K CM thanks Tendulkar for sanctioning Rs 40 lakh for school in North Kashmir



AHMEDARAD, MAR 30 (PTI): The has expressed dissatisfaction over the Gujarat government's efforts to control salinity ingress in coastal areas, saying the delay in implementing various works has escalated the project cost by 455 per cent.

A report by the Comptroller and

Auditor General of India (CAG) on the Salinity Ingress Prevention Scheme (SIPS) was tabled in the state Legislative Assembly on Wednesday. The government has not enacted a law in this regard despite being recommended by a high-level committee (HLC) almost 40 years ago, it pointed

The CAG noted that the state gov ernment had appointed two HLCs in 1976 and 1978 to study the problem and suggest appropriate measures to save ground water in coastal areas from getting affected by the ingress of sea water towards land.

Both these HLCs submitted their reports, having various recommendations, between 1978 and 1984, the CAG said, adding all these reports were accepted by the Gujarat government in the subsequent years.

The recommendations ed construction of tidal regulators ndharas", check dams, re-wells and reservoirs, tid-"bandharas". al-cum-demonstration (TCD) farms. afforestation and coastal land recla-But, when the CAG conducted its

audit on the status of the impleme tation of recommendations under SIPS, it found that "except in case of check dams and recharge wells, the progress of works was very slow even after lapse of 25 to 39 years since the acceptance of reports of HLCs".

The CAG said, "No or limited action

was taken for the establishment of tidal-cum-demonstration farms, coastal land reclamation, gully plugging and afforestation."

"Even the plan document, detailed project report and budget estimates were not prepared for these activities," it said.

The apex auditor also said that as against the original cost of Rs 789.65 crore, which was estimated for the project by HLCs, an expenditure of Rs 1.045.65 crore was incurred up to

"For the remaining works, the estimate was revised to Rs 2,544.79 crore. Thus, due to the delay in implementation of the recommended works, cost of scheme escalated by 455 per cent," the CAG said.

The CAG also noted that though the HLCs, way back in 1978, rec-ommended enacting a law "to impose control on the excessive use of ground water", no such legislation was brought by the government as on end of 2017.

The CAG rapped Gujarat for failing to bring such a law and observed that such a legislation had already been enacted and implemented in states like Goa, Tamil Nadu, Kerala and West

But, it was not enacted and im plemented by Gujarat.

Thus, the fact remains that no management techniques recommended by the HLCs have been implemented even after a lapse of 25 to 39 years of its acceptance by the state government," the CAG noted

## US wants visa applicants to submit phone, email, social media details

LALIT K JHA WASHINGTON, MAR 30 (PTI): The Trump administration wants all US visa applicants to submit details of their previous phone numbers, email addresses and social me dia histories as part of its "vetting" practice and to prevent entry of individuals who might pose a threat to the country.

In a document post-ed on the Federal Register yesterday, anyone who wants to come to the US on a non-immigrant visa will have to answer a list of questions under new rules.

The State Depart-ment estimates that the new visa forms would af-



fect 710,000 immigrant and 14 million non-immigrant visa applicants.

It said that in addition to asking the visa applicants to provide their dles of their social media platform, they would also be asked to give details of their phone and mobile numbers used in the last

five years. Other questions seek

five years of previously used telephone numbers email addresses and in ternational travel whether the visa applicant has been deported or re-

moved from any country

family members have been involved in terrorist activities, said the document which would be formally published today.

After its publication, the public would have 60 days to comment on the

proposed new visa form.
"One question lists
multiple social media platforms and requires the applicant to provide any identifiers used by applicants for those platforms during the five years preceding the date of application" the document said

It said the State De partment will collect the information from visa applicants for "identi-ty resolution and vetting purposes" based on statutory visa eligibility standards.

However, it intends not to routinely ask the question of applicants for specific visa classifications, such as most diplomatic and official

visa applicants, it said.

The revised visa application forms will also include additional information regarding the visa medical examination that some applicants may be required to undergo.

The State Depart-ment estimates that the new visa forms would affect 710,000 immigrant visa applicants and 14 million non-immigrant visa applicants.



## Russian action marks further deterioration in bilateral ties: WH

WASHINGTON, MAR 30 (PTI): Russia's decision to expel 60 American diplomats and ordering a closure of the US Consulate in St Petersburg mark a further deterioration in bilateral ties, the White

House said today.

"Russia's action today to expel American diplomats marks a fur-ther deterioration in the US-Russia relationship," White House Press Sec-retary Sarah Sanders said, hours after Russia in a retaliatory action asked 60 American diplomats to leave the country within seven days and ordered the shutting down of the US Consulate

in St Petersburg within 48 hours.

"The undeclared Russian in-telligence officers by the United States and more than two dozen partner nations and NATO allies earlier this week was an appropriate response to the Russian attack on the soil of the United Kingdom," Sanders said.

The Trump administration had earlier or dered the expulsion of 60 Russian diplomats and shutter the country's consulate general in Seattle.

She said the Russian response was "not unan-ticipated", and the US will "deal" with it.

A fire on a double-decker bus carrying migrant workers to a Bangkok factory has killed 20 people. The bus burst into flames at about 1.30am on Friday in Tak province in western Thailand on the border with Myanmar.Local media said the workers were from Myanmar and had been heading to a factory in an industrial area near Bangkok. Police Lieutenant Raewat Aiemtak said 27 people managed to escape the bus, one of whom was severely burned. He said the driver reported that the fire started in the middle of the bus and spread quickly. The incident is the latest in a series of bus crashes in Thailand, which has the second-highest rate of traffic fatalities in the world after Libya, according to the World Health Organisation.

## US withdrawing from Syria 'very soon': Trump

WASHINGTON. MAR 30 (PTI): President Donald Trump today said the US troops would withdraw from Syria "very soon" as he lamented that America has wasted USD 7 trillion in wars in the Middle

US was using all its resources to defeat ISIS and drive them out of the captured territory.

We're knocking the hell out of ISIS. We'll be coming out of Syria, like, very soon. Let the other people take of it now. Trump said in Ohio where he had gone to deliver a speech on infrastructure.

"Very soon we're coming out. We're going to have 100 per cent of the caliphate, as they call it -- sometimes referred to as "land" taking it all back quickly, quickly. But we're going to be coming out of there real soon. Going to get back to our country, where we belong, where we want to be," he said.

Trump, in his remarks, lamented that US has wasted USD 7 tril-lion in wars in the Middle East.

"We spent USD 7 trillion in the Middle East. We'd build a school, they'd blow it up. We'd build it again, they'd blow it up. We'd build it again -- hasn't been blown up vet, but it will be. But, if we want a school in Ohio to fix the windows, you can't get the money. If you want a school in Pennsylvania or Iowa to get federal money, you can't get the money," he said.

We spent USD 7 trillion in the

Middle East. What we have for it? Nothing. Remember I used to say 'keep the oil' as a civilian. We never kept the oil. If we kept the oil, we would have been OK. If we kept the oil, we wouldn't have ISIS. Because you know who kept a lot of the oil? ISIS. That's how they funded themselves. They kept the oil. We didn't keep the oil. Stupid, stupid, he said. As a result, Trump said, the US has

little money for its infrastructure. "We have to fight for our military. But we're becoming so strong again. And you watch -- not going to take very long. I've asked Republicans and Democrats in Congress to come together and deliver the biggest and boldest infrastructure plan in the last half century. I don't think you're going to get Democrat support very much. And you'll probably have to wait until after the election, which isn't so long down the road," he said.

Earlier in the day, Defense Department Spokesperson Dana White said while the coalition has significantly degraded ISIS, the important work remains to guarantee the lasting defeat of the extremists.

"Our commitment to win must outlast the so-called physical ca-liphate, and the warped ideas that guide the calculated cruelty of ISIS," she said.

This is a group that plots and launches terror attacks globally, White said, adding that they have no regard for anything decent or valuable in life.

"As long as they exist and bring death and destruction around the world, we will continue to degrade destroy and ultimately defeat ISIS,"


