Panic buttons and **CCTVs** to be installed in all Govt buses

eneral Manager General Manager of State Transport De-partment, ST Bhutia, to-day informed that the department will soon begin the installation of panic buttons and CCTVs in all government buses.

While speaking to SummitTimes, Mr Bhutia said, "As per the guide-lines laid down by the Supreme Court, the work on installing panic button in the buses will begin soon. This has been

done to ensure the safety of the passengers.

There are around 129 buses operating un-der Sikkim Nationalized Transport.

"If there is some threat or SOS calls to be made by the passengers while travelling they can push the panic button installed in the bus. This will send an alert to the control room for prompt action," added Mr Bhutia.

It is informed that the mechanism will operate through GPRS system.

"We have allocated a separate budget for the installation. We are now taking technical inputs from experts on this," said a senior Transport

Department official. The Transport Denartment has also installed speed monitoring devices in 20 buses.

"The speed monitor-ing device is to control over speeding of the vehicle. This will also be installed in other vehicles too," said the General

the National Academy of Letters, today presented its annual awards to 23 eminent authors writing in as many Indian languages.

The recipients were awarded an engraved copper plaque, a shawl and a cheque of Rs 1 lakh on the opening day of Akademi's annual event 'Festival of Letters' here.

Speaking at the award ceremony, Chan-drashekar Kambar, who was appointed the new president of Sahitva Akademi through election on Monday, said that the Akademi will continue to bring together "all the rich and diverse literatures, and cultures of the

country here".

"The Akademi believes that Indian litera-ture is an all encompassing idea... This occasion highlights and defines for us what we see as Indian literature today. Besides we also need to look at this idea of Indian literature in a global context," he said.

Written in 23 lan-guages including En-glish, Bodo, Telugu, Hindi and Punjabi, most of the awarded books found society and social issues as

the central theme. While Afsar Ahmad's 'Sei Nikhonj Manushta', written in Bengali, shows the crisis of people los-ing their land, Assamese author Jayanta Madhab Bora's 'Moriahola' deals with issues of displaced people, their aspirations and conflicts.

Kambar also noted

that despite the influence of "Euro- American modernism" Indian writers have continued to stay in

"No doubt that our colonial past and access to English education, literature led to new trends in Indian literature, we adopted them to our own context and creative base. On the other hand, native trends still did not die out completely... Through popular culture, and cinema they are still connected to their earli-er orality and myth," he

While English author Mamang Dai's 'The Black Hill' talks about life in the lesser-known world of the Indo-Tibetan border of Arunachal Pradesh, Autar Krishen Rahbar's book 'Yeli Parda Woth' in Kashmiri covers various aspects of the facets of life in Kashmir.

Kalimpong Police has three persons on charges of murdering their father. As per reports, Kuber Rai [70] was allegedly murdered by his sons name Sunil Rai [36] and Puran Rai [26] at Lower Dun in Lolay Gram Panchayat, Kalimpong Block 1 on 19

According information received from Police sources, the incident occurred on 19 Jan when the sons attacked the father who was in an inebriated state and killed him. However,

In the presence of villagers, the last rites of the deceased were per-formed on 20 Jan morning and the final rites were completed after five



WCD to recommend lifting time bar on reporting child sexual abuse

NEW DELHI, FEB 12 (PTI): The Women and Child Development (WCD) Ministry will seek a change in the CrPC to allow filing of complaints of child sexual abuse many years after the crime.

The development came after meeting last month between WCD minister Maneka Gandhi and a 53-year-old Indian-origin scientist from Canada, a survivor of child sexual abuse, who asked for legislative amend-ments to allow victims to report

such crimes even years later.
"We are in the process
of writing to the Ministry of

Home Affairs (MHA) asking them to amend Section 473 of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC). So, time limitation will go away," Secretary, WCD, R K Shrivastava, today said at a press meet.

He said that the ministry will pursue the matter with the MHA as it has been receiving "several complaints of incidents that have occurred

many years ago".

While officials did not comment on the exact amendment being suggested, Gandhi told reporters, "The sub-stance of it will be that if you

have been molested at some point in time when you were a minor, then you are still entitled to get justice."

She, however, said that there could be a problem revisiting old cases of crime.

"Only problem I envisages that how do you prove it? (But) The best we can hope is that people get frightened that they could land in trouble." Gandhi said.

The WCD ministry has also instructed the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) to look

Section 468 of the CrPC lays down time limitations for filing a complaint after an offence has taken place, also called the Statute of Limitations

If the offence is punishable with a fine then it needs to be reported within six months. A crime carrying a term not exceeding one year has a period of limitation of a year.

If a crime is punishable between one and three years. then it has to be reported with-in three years and for anything beyond a three-year jail term, there is no time restriction for reporting the crime.

Section 473 of the CrPC, to which the ministry has sought changes, allows a court to take cognisance of an offence even after the expiry of the period of limitation provided the delay has been properly explained or that it is necessary to do so in the interests of justice."

The 53-year-old scientist was subjected to sexual abuse for seven years between the age of six and 13 years.

The Prevention of Child

Sexual Offence Act (POCSO), 2012, is unclear on whether a survivor of child sexual abuse can report the crime after the

age of 18 years.

Moreover, the POCSO cannot be applied retrospectively to cases prior to its enactment in 2012 and such cases fall under the provisions of the Indian Penal Code (IPC). When it comes to punishment for rape (IPC's section 376), there is no statute of limitations.

However, it was only after

the Criminal Amendment Act of 2013, that the definition of rape was expanded to include forced digital penetration and oral sex (both common in child sexual abuse).

China differs with Nepal over height of Mt Everest: Report

BEIJING, FEB 12 (PTI): China continues to differ with Nepal over the height of Mount Everest and sticks to its own calculation of the world's highest peak which is four meters less than the Kathmandu's measurement, a media report said today.

China's response came after reports said that Beijing had agreed to accept Nepal's measurement of the moun-tain, which is almost four meters taller.

The Chinese official media has contradicted the recent "The New York Times' report that China had recognised the mountain's

China recognises Mount

Qomolangma as the world's

tallest, measuring 8.844.43 meters above sea level, the National Administration of Surveying, Mapping and Geo-information (NASG) told the state-run Xinhua News

The peak of Mt Everest played a significant role in the settlement of boundary between Nepal and China, which earlier claimed the whole mountain as part of its territory after it took control

But it was finally settled in 1961 after the interven-tion of the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC) founder Mao Zedong, who suggested that the boundary line should pass through the summit of the Mt Everest, which was agreed by Nepal.

More and more international climbers are reportedly using the Tibetan side of the Mt Everest as China has improved facilities compared to Nepal.

In 2005, the NASG mea-sured Mt Everest's rock base at 8844.43 meters above sea level. The depth of the snow on the mountain top was measured at 3.5 meters.

The NASG said that China had never in any form said it has changed the 2005 result which has been authorised by the central cabinet and released to the public in accordance with relevant regulations.

According to the NASG. the standard height of the mountain is important data for China and international research on mapping, geo-sciences, environment and climate change and it also showcases comprehensive national strength.

"Each country's surveyors have the intention of making others recognise their own measurements and their own outcome.

But the different heights come from different mea-surement methods," Zhao Kangning, former deputy di-

rector of China's National Administration of Global Navi-gation Satellite Systems and Applications, told the Global Times.
"The different measure-

ments of Mount Qomolangma's height between China and Nepal is a competition over the mountain," Xu Jianying, a research fellow of Research Centre for Chinese Borderland History and Geography at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (CASS) said.

However, Li Guoqiang, another expert at CASS, said that "the dispute over the height of Mt Qomolangma should not be politicised"

Back to School

Let's make this year genuinely about students, learning and schools

overnment schools across the State opened their Gates to welcome students back to a new academic session on Monday, 12 February. Even as some schools will begin a new year in upgraded avatars, there is at least one that will be reopening with a people-funded new facility after having remained shut for some years. There will also be a clutch of primary schools which will not reopen this year because the low enrolment numbers just don't justify their continuation and the human resource could be much better deployed elsewhere. The closure of anything is a difficult moment, especially when it is a place of learning and holds so many memories and significance for so many lives. But some closures are a practical necessity, and it makes sense for the HRDD to focus on the schools which still retain students and staff them with the best of faculty and facilities. Sikkim's falling fertility rate and growing awareness among the youth could prove a boon for the coming generations. If Sikkim can manage its resources well, then the young can now be lavished with infrastructure, resources and access much in excess of what their numbers require. It is simple. There might be fewer students coming into schools, and maybe some schools will even shut down, but the number of books, libraries, laboratories, and most importantly, teachers, will not go down and if anything, will only increase. What this means is that if Sikkim's planners can, well, plan, then this abundance of learning resources can be assigned in ways that every child in a government school gets focused and dedicated attention. This is an opportunity which is pregnant with immense possibilities if it is taken as an opportunity and not rued as a downturn.

Meanwhile, the rather long winter break is over, and thankfully, a new holiday scheduled will also be attempted this year to ensure that academic breaks are not so long that too much time is wasted every new session just repairing the academic connections for students. There is also a new transfer policy in place for the teachers and the promising EQUIP initiative is looking to expand its footprint. All of these make the start of a new academic year exciting and one hopes that the mood sustains and pushes learning to a level here. And the excitement is palpable in more obvious terms as well, as for instance, in the preparatory rush at stores dealing in uniforms and books (a crowding that will continue for at least a week more) and in the number of laundry-fresh uniforms all over the state as students and teachers return to class.

In the coming weeks, Sikkim will also learn whether the Department responsible for education in the State has done any learning while the students and teachers were away. The good news is that education has received heartening attention over the winter holidays with a slew of teacher training workshops, several teacher transfers (hopefully to staff schools better) and most recently with the Chief Minister announcing that primary education will now receive primary attention

And what is it that schools, whether primary, secondary or senior secondary, should deliver? If nothing else, then at least a generation that is better lettered, less parochial and more inquisitive. Look at it this way, Sikkim always had among the best per capita distribution of schools and the most enviable teacher-stu-dent ratios. It also now arguably has the highest per capita density of universities and children now have more options to explore by way of higher education. Without getting into the "quality" or reliability of the institutions of higher education, imagine a scenario where the schools here fostered a real thirst for knowledge that universities could help quench and expand. For far too long, schools have been about regimented teaching, and that has clearly not worked too well. How about the State started getting more liberal with the learning process? Open more minds, and they will not only take care of themselves, but also carry the state along. Now that there are fewer students in the classrooms and more options in the staff room, wider explorations are possible if the teachers were freed from clerical chores and inspired to work more with the students. With fewer schools to look after, the finances could also be invested more keenly on improving the learning environments at schools and making classrooms more student and learning friendly. One hopes that fewer teachers are borrowed out of classrooms to stand-in for tasks they are neither trained nor appointed for. One hopes that education-related problems will receive immediate attention and are not kept pending for the next winter holidays. One hopes that the process begins to make school interesting so that fewer students dropout. One hopes that there are fewer schools this year which are short-staffed and more teachers who motivate learning. Wishful thinking? We wish the same every February and still con-

How to use the power of urban planning to tackle inequality

Income inequality creates both spatial and social divides and shows itself within cities in many ways. Gat-ed communities in Indonesia have become a glaring example. However, legislation and urban planning can help bridge these divides and reduce

inequality.

"Inclusionary planning instruments" are designed to do just that. But to be effective they need to be

strongly enforced.

In Indonesia, there are two instruments that have the potential to create more inclusive societies. But power differences between rich developers and the urban poor, lack of expertise in how to implement inclusionary planning, and even insufficient awareness of relevant instru-

RISING INEQUALITY GLOBALLY

A rise in inequality globally has been pointed out over the last five years by several organisations, Oxfam Interna tional has just published a report on inequality that highlights a significant difference in wages.

Between 1980 and 2016, the top 1% of the world population captured 27% of the total world income growth. The bottom 50% received only 12% of the income growth, according to the World Inequality Report 2018.

Indonesia is not immune to these

global trends: both income and wealth inequality are rising in the country. The Gini index for Indonesia (a coefficient between 0-1 used to measure income inequality – the closer to 1, the more unequal) increased from 0.31 in 1990 (UNDP, 1990) to 0.41 in 2015.

What's more, according to Oxfam, wealth inequality has increased to a level where the four richest men in the country have more wealth than the poorest 100 million people.

Inequality is one of our main con

cerns if we want to have harmonious and just societies. The mainstream international development agenda recognises this and the 2015 Sustainable Park international development tainable Development Goals include a goal (SDG10) to "reduce inequality within and among countries"

INEQUALITY IN CITIES

Income inequality manifests itself in cities. We can see clear differences between different social groups in terms of access to housing and basic



Houses for upper-middle-class families in Indonesia are spacious, built with good-quality materials and located in neighbourhoods with good services and infrastructure. In the case of gated communities, there are also security devices in place.

Conversely, poor housing lacks appropriate structural conditions. There is overcrowding, often with one family living in a single room. And there is no sanitation and access to basic services.

Gated communities are, especially in the Global South, the main housing option for upper-income groups. The rich justify living in gated communities to reduce insecurity and fear of crime. However, belonging and exclusion of the "unwanted" people are strong reasons behind living in closed enclaves.

Even when poor and rich groups might co-exist in the same territory they do not interact with each other, except for some formal work exchange between employer and em-ployee, where there are strong power relations at play.

Residents' access to services and infrastructure is also divided along lines of wealth. This creates patterns of "splintering urbanism", reflecting the unequal distribution of services and infrastructure in the territory.

INDONESIA'S PLAN-NING INSTRUMENTS

Inclusionary planning regulations can serve to reduce the gap between rich and poor, including disparities in the services and infrastructure available to them. These instruments require private developers to incorporate social housing or/and services and infrastructure for less advantaged groups when building housing

for upper-income groups.

Indonesia has two potentially inclusionary planning instruments

for new private residential developments. The first is the "1.2.3 Ratio" scheme and is included in national regulation. It says that for each house built for high-income residents, pri-vate developers should also build two houses for middle-income families

and three for low-income families.

The second instrument is called 'socialisation", included as a stage of the Environmental Impact Assessment. The assessment is required when seeking planning permission for a new housing project. The "socialisation stage" requires developers that plan to build a project in an al-ready urbanised area to obtain per-mission from suiting and developers mission from existing residents for the project to go ahead.

tempts by the government to reduce inequalities in the cities and to enforce some sort of "planning gain". These could be seen as a positive step towards redistribution, with incredible potential to create positive change in Indonesian cities.

However, our research data from Jakarta and Yogyakarta show that "Ratio 1.2.3" is hardly being enforced. Land is scarce in many Indonesian cities and it is not profitable for the private sector to build houses for middle- and lower-income families. Additionally, many government officers responsible for the "Ratio 1.2.3" application are unclear on the en-forcement mechanism.

In the case of "socialisation", it has become a very limited process. It has turned into economic negotiations between powerful private developers and less powerful local residents who live close to the proposed project. The latter are usually represented by the neighbourhood association leaders.

In the best situations, the local communities manage to obtain a few new sources of employment, as se-curity guards, cleaners, gardeners or

They may also receive some fundfor annual community events, such as the Independence Day celebration. The local roads and mosque might get spruced up.

But these benefits are not enough to reduce the gap between the two groups, nor will they encourage any sort of social interactions between

new and old residents.

The lack of enforcement of "Ratio 1.2.3" and the limited scope of the "socialisation" process are missed opportunities for Indonesian cities. These instruments have the potential to decrease urban income inequality by "forcing" those who have more money to contribute to the public good for the benefit of poorer families. HOW TO GET MORE OUT OF

INCLUSIONARY PLANNING
To improve the benefits from these inclusionary planning instruments,

- the government should:
 develop clearer and realistic guidelines and instruments that can be ap-
- establish clearer mechanisms for public officers to enforce these instruments
- make society more aware of these instruments and, in particular, of the potential benefits of more harmoni-

ous and just cities. RISING INEQUALITY GLOBALLY

How to combat the inequality gap is often a heated topic for governments. International organisations say that while world leaders now acknowledge inequality, not enough is being done to efficiently reduce it.

Other measures to reduce in-equality include more progressive tax systems, as suggested in the latest World Inequality Report. Under this system, people who earn more also contribute more towards public services and higher public. This covers spending to provide education, health care and social protection for all. Policies for equal salaries between female and male workers are also promoted as key to reducing inequality.

Considering the scale of inequali-

ty, and the urgency of the problem, in-clusionary planning instruments are valuable mechanisms. These should be revisited to ensure the full benefits are realised.

'Talking' killer whale reveals orcas can learn to mimic human speech

History will record that in the second de-cade of the third millennium, a killer whale uttered the word "hello" to a human After eons of existential wandering in the for-est of cosmic loneliness, has humanity finally made contact with another consciousness not from another world but, astonishingly, the oceans of our own?

Although scientists have reported an Orcinus orca at a marine park in Antibes, France, making noises that sound like human speech, the whale was not talking, any more than Hoover the seal or Koshik the elephant or uncountable parrots were when they produced rec-

ognisable copies of human words.

Nevertheless the study, from researchers led by José Abramson at the Complutense University of Madrid and including my St Andrews colleague Josep Call, is still important. Not because it means whales can speak English, but that they are capable of one of the core building blocks of language development in humans: vocal learning, the ability to

copy novel sounds.

The astonishing thing about a whale saying hello" is not what it means to us, but what it means to them - absolutely nothing. It was specifically chosen, along with some other words, phrases and nonsense sounds, as being something completely outside the normal sound repertoire of the whales So when the whale produced reasonable copies of the sounds when instructed to, often on the very first attempt, it was pretty conclusive evidence that these animals have the capability to learn new

sounds by copying.

Abramson and his colleagues did more than this, as they tested multiple sounds in three situations. In one, the whale was instructed using gestures to produce a sound to copy. In another, the target sound was played back through a loudspeaker. And in a third, a human produced the target sound. Each time, the whale's responses were subjected to forensic acoustic analysis to measure just how good the copies were. The answer? Pretty



The evidence that killer whales can show vocal learning provides us with a missing piece of understanding about their lives in the wild. We've long known that killer whales have group specific dialects, collections of distinctive calls that are unique to single pods, or sets of pods. For decades sci-entists have suggested that these dialects are the result of learning, and many clues have supported

We have tracked parallel changes in the calls of wild pods over time, we know that captive killer whales moved to different locations have changed their calls to fit in with the other whales at their new home. The genetic data is also consistent with this idea. And we have circumstantial evidence of an individual copying the sound of another species (a sea-lion). But now we have gold-standard controlled experimental evidence. Now, any expla-nation of these vocal dialects that doesn't involve learning looks pretty outlandish.

Killer whales live in a society organised around females. The vocal traditions that these animals learn as they grow up are crucial components of their behaviour. But they are only part of a suite of knowledge and behaviour that they acquire, large-

ly from their mothers, aunts, and grandmothers My colleague Hal Whitehead and I have argued that this cultural inheritance is vital to whales' lives. Without it, they are incomplete. So it is somewhat ironic that this study, performed on captive animals, adds to a growing picture of the impor-

tance of cultural inheritance in their lives and to the case that these animals should never be kept captive. It is impossible for the whales in captivity to develop and express their cultures in anything like the richness we see in

the wild.

Of course, killer whales are not alone in mining human speech. We've their ability to mimic human speech. We've known for centuries that some birds can do it, as can a select other few species of mammal including bats, seals, elephants, and other ceaceans such as bottlenose dolphins. Notably absent on this list are our closest living rel-

atives, the chimpanzees and bonobos. True, chimps can subtly modify an existing call to match their group mates, but they have never been shown

to be able to copy a completely novel sound.

While vocal learning underpins something only humans do – communicate via spoken language – i is intriguing that our closest primate relatives can't do it. It tells us something crucial happened in human evolution after our ancestors separated from

the other apes some 5m years ago.

We don't know why this is, but studying the surprising distribution of vocal learning across the animal kingdom is one way to look for clues. Was it, for example, a result of a more mobile lifestyle? Birds, bats, and cetaceans are all highly mobile, but elephants less so. No current answer completely explains all the data, but then our picture is still far from complete.

What's next for the science of "talking" whales? It is clear that there is a lot of complex communica tion going on in whale and dolphin societies, much of which we still don't understand. We are facing a vast ocean of ignorance. To rectify this, in my view, we need to drop our stifling and frankly navel-gaz-ing, human-centric focus on asking "can whales talk?". Instead, we should learn more about how each cetacean species has ways of communicating that are specific to their environment and how they have evolved. Only then will we be able to appreci-

Something 'terribly wrong' with SIT probe on Manipur killings: Supreme Court

preme Court today expressed its dis-pleasure over the progress of CBI's SIT in probing alleged extra-judicial killings and fake encounters by the Army, Assam Rifles and police in Manipur and said something was "terribly wrong".

The apex court, which said it

had given the probe to the CBI so the truth would come out, asked the National Human Rights Commission to depute three persons to associate with the Special Investigation Team to carry out investigations in 17 of

the 42 cases lodged by the SIT.

The SIT told a bench comprising
Justices Madan B Lokur and U U Lalit that they have registered 42 cases and investigations were going on in accordance with the court's direction.

The bench, after going through the status report filed by the SIT, wondered how FIRs were registered against persons who were allegedly killed in fake encounters in Manipur.

"We wanted the CBI to investi-

gate the matter so that you can find out the truth." the bench said.

What kind of investigation is this?" it asked.

"We wanted something to be done expeditiously. We do not want you (SIT) to be in any inconvenience. All we want is to expedite the process," the bench told the SIT.

CBI's DIG Sharad Aggarwal, who is in-charge of the SIT, said all these FIRs, lodged earlier by the Manipur police, have been re-registered by

'We are not satisfied by the progress made by the SIT," the bench said and asked Additional Solicitor Gener-al (ASG) Maninder Singh, appearing the SIT, why the status report did not have the CBI director's approval.

Singh, who initially told the

bench that the status report was approved by the CBI director, said he would file an affidavit in this regard.

"Your next status report will have approval of the CBI director specifically," the bench said and posted the

matter for further hearing on March

It said three persons, to be deputed by the NHRC, would be associated with the SIT and the investigation should be carried out on a "priority basis".

"We make it clear that the association of the NHRC is for the time being in respect of these 17 cases,"

At the outset, senior advocate Colin Gonsalves, appearing for the petitioners, argued that except two cases, the other FIRs have been lodged against victims who had died.

The bench asked the SIT about it and referred to reports of a commis sion of inquiry, another commission headed by former Supreme Court judge Justice Santosh Hegde, the NHRC and findings of the Gauhati

High Court in these matters.

"The allegations are that some persons were killed in fake encounters due to excessive use of force. The commission of inquiry, Hegde commission, high court and NHRO

said that there was excess use of force. The persons who have used that excessive force are the accused," the bench observed.

"Why you have just re-registered the FIRs? I am sorry but there is something terribly wrong," Justice Lokur said, adding that the status report does not even say that FIRs have been lodged against "unknown uniformed people".

The CBI's DIG told the bench that

FIRs were lodged in accordance with the court's direction and they would investigate the matter and file charge

sheets before the competent court.

"You will have to examine and investigate all facets," the bench said.

It referred to the FIRs and in vestigation conducted by the SIT and observed, "We are again back to square one."

Gonsalves said that despite spe cific orders of the court, there was resistance on the part of the SIT in lodging FIRs.

The ASG told the bench that the

"confidence" needed to be shown in the SIT as the probe was going on.

The bench, while making it clear that it has confidence in the SIT, said, "CBI has not understood us correctly. Please correct it and do it immedi-

ately. Enough is enough".

"You have to proceed with the investigation in accordance with our udgement," the bench said, adding, 'Our judgement is very clear. We do not want explanation. You just follow our judgement".

The apex court had on January

16 pulled up the CBI's SIT for not registering the required number of FIRs as directed by it earlier.

The apex court is hearing a PIL seking a probe into as many as 1,528 cases of extra-judicial killings

in Manipur. The court had on July 14 last year constituted the SIT comprising five CBI officers and ordered registration of FIRs and probe into the alleged extra-judicial killings in Manipur.

Investigators brave snow in hunt for clues over Russian plane crash

STEPANOVSKOVE (RUS-SIA), FEB 12 (AFP): Investigators scoured the scene today after a pas-senger plane crashed near Moscow minutes after take-off, killing all 71 people on board, in one Russia's worst-ever

plane crashes.

The site of the crash was enveloped in heavy snow that was waist-high in places, making it difficult to access, with emergency workers forced to reach the wreckage by foot and use snowmobiles

Russia's Investigative Committee said it would consider explanations for the crash including human error, technical failure and weather conditions, as the country has experienced record snowfall in recent weeks. It did not mention the possibility of terrorism.

The Antonov An-148 plane went down in the Ramensky district around 70 kms southeast of Moscow after taking off from Domodedovo airport in the Russian capital and disappearing off the radar at 2:28 pm (1128 GMT) yesterday. "Sixty-five passengers

and six crew members were on board, and all of them died," Russia's office of transport investigations said in a statement.

A Swiss citizen and a citizen of Azerbaijan were among the fatalities on a list released by the emergency services ministry. Three children also died including a five-yearold girl. The flight was operated by the domestic Saratov Airlines and was headed for Orsk, a city in the Ural mountains.

Trump has repeatedly blamed the "crumbling" state of the nation's roads and highways for preventing the American economy from reaching its full potential.

Many in Washington be-lieve that Trump should have begun his term a year ago with could have garnered bipartisan support or, at minimum, placed Democrats in a bind for opposing a popular political measure.

ISLAMABAD, FEB 12 (PTI): Pakistan Presi-dent Mamnoon Hussain has signed an ordinance aimed at reigning in individuals and organisa-tions like the Let, Al-Qaeda and Taliban, which have been banned by the UN Security Council, a

media report said today. The ordinance amends a section of the Anti-Terrorism Act (ATA). enabling the authorities to take action against the UNSC-proscribed individuals and terror outfits, like sealing their offices and freezing their bank accounts, The Express Tribune reported.

The sources in the National Counter Terror-ism Authority (NACTA) confirmed the new move, saying the ministries of Interior, Finance and Foreign Affairs as well as NACTA's Counter Financing of Terrorism (CFT) wing are working together on the matter.

An official in the Presidency familiar with the development confirmed the said legislation but refused to share details, saying the Ministry of Defence was the notifying authority.
"The relevant minis-

try will notify and comment on it," the official said.


Parker, who recently confirmed a third movie would not go ahead, has not publicly responded to Cattrall's post.
