Following the same, the department has issued the rescheduled Annual School Calendar across the State, it is informed.

Speaking to Summit-Times, Director [Exam-ination & Text Book], HRDD, Dr YP Nepal, has said that the department has issued the new cal-endar to be followed for this academic session

along with reforms.

"The changes have been made with the aim to benefit students of the school and also to con-



somewhat with the calendar of rest of the nation. The new calendar will also align Sikkim's academic calendar with that of CBSE and NCERT to some extent which will help and benefit the local

students in many ways, said Dr Nepal.

He further informed

It may be mentioned here, previously Government Schools throughout the State had summer break of 10-15 days which has now been extended to 25 days.



Co-ordination meet held for Kailash Mansarovar Yatra 2018

GANGTOK, 04 Jun [IPR]: A co-or-dination meeting for Kailash Man-sarovar Yatra 2018 was held at the conference hall of Manan Kendra in Gangtok today. Additional Chief Secretary, SC Gupta, chaired the meeting in the presence of District Collector [East], Kapil Meena, heads of various departments of the State Government and central organizations including BRO, ITBP, NDRF, Customs and Immigration and BSNL.

Chief Executive Officer, Sikkim urism Development Corporation [STDC], Suman Thapa, briefly presented the details of the previous yatras conducted by the State Government for the pilgrims since 2015 while STDC General Manager, Vijay Thapa, put forward a note on the preparedness and management of the pilgrimage for this year. Mentioning that there will be a total of 10 batches of pilgrims, he provided a copy of the itinerary.

The first batch will arrive on 15

Jun after clearing their medical examination in New Delhi. They will then be sent on a four days long acclimatization to 15th Mile and Sherathang. On the fifth day, the yatris

will have to clear the final medical examination conducted by the ITBP and on approval will head out for the pilgrimage to the Chinese territory. This schedule will be followed by all the ten batches, it is informed.

Additional Chief Secretary Mr Gupta, stated that it was of utmost importance for the departments and bodies involved to be cautious while maintaining clear communication so that all issues and emergencies can be dealt with promptly and

He also enquired about the basic facilities and services in detail including accommodation for acclimatization, power and water sup-ply, transport, health and medical assistance and communication. He further instructed that a WhatsApp group should be created for the ex change of relevant information and

details of the pilgrimage.

problem of waste in the mountains especifically that of single use plastic waste.

The Himalayas, long been

portrayed as sacred, pristine and untouched, has a flip side too, of plastic clogged waterways, waste being rolled down hill sides and burnt, and this was what was intended to be resolved by the Himplant Clean vealed by the Himalayan Cleanup. Remote places in the moun tains have serious issues of dealing with plastic waste that have no solutions.

At a presentation on 01 Jun at Vigyan Bhavan in Delhi during the session on Himalayan Ecosystem organised by the MoEF CC as part of World Environment Day, IMI and Zero Waste representatives, Privadarshinee Shrestha and Roshan Rai, presented the findings of the cleanup campaign to an audience that consisted of Government officials, NGO members and other dignitaries.

They presented the details of information collated by number from 89 sites spread across 12 states that revealed that 97% of waste collected was plastic.
"Not a patch of ground is free

of plastic waste was the most non expression across the cleanup sites in the 12 mountain

States," they stated.

Result of the waste audit organised as part of the cleanup provide insights to the con-sumption patterns as well as the type of waste being generated in the mountains. The top five polluters by number across the sites were multi layered plastic such as that of popular snack food items, PET bottles, single use plastic items, other plastic items and tetrapak packaged

Taking the question of who is responsible for the waste, the Himalayan Cleanup included a brand audit which was conduct-



ed in collaboration with Global Alliance for Incinerator Alternatives -GAIA's national brand audit which has covered 10 cities in India. The brand audit reveals the top brands that are polluting our mountains and demands that the brands take responsibility for the waste through Ex-tended Producer Responsibility mechanisms.

The Himalayan Cleanup shows that the top 15 plastic polluters include prominent brand names including Hindu-stan Coca Cola, Pepsi Co India, Britannia Industries and others.

The Himalayan Cleanup has recommended Mountain Policies to stop single use plastics and to phase out multilayered plastic. Extended producer responsibility especially for mul-tilayered plastic, PET and tetrapak is of utmost necessity. No incineration/burning of waste in the sacred and ecologically sensitive Himalaya is also an important recommendation, for the Himalayan states, where burning is seen as the most common solution. Tourism and defense which have large waste footprints in the mountains

need to be integrated into waste management systems. Special resource support to the mountain states needed considering the challenges of geography and

connectivity, the release adds.

Member of Parliament from Sikkim, PD Rai, who delivered the keynote address at the event, spoke about the urgent need to address the issue of plastic pollution in the mountains, and that local and regional policies must be strengthened to bring about sustainable waste manager

It is to be informed here, the Himalayan Cleanup was anchored together by the Inte-grated Mountain Initiative and Zero Waste Himalaya. IMI works across the 12 mountain States on issues of mountain policies and advocacy. Zero Waste Hi-malaya is a platform of organ-isations and individuals that advocates for sustainable waste management practices in the Himalayan region based on principles of zero waste.

The group has been actively

working across the Sikkim Darjeeling landscape with the rel-evant government institutions, and also on building a volunteer base with an outreach to schools and colleges. The Zero Waste Himalaya group has been working on waste issues for the past 10 years, and the theme of beat plastic pollution for World Environment Day provided the right opportunity to voice the concerns and challenges of waste in the mountains to a larger audience.

A workshop organised by IMI, ZWH and RMDD on 'Envisioning Sustainable Waste Man-agement Pathways for the Indian Himalayan Region' on 11-12 May in Gangtok paved the way for The Himalayan Cleanup with the participation of 12 mountain States where the planning for the cleanup was done.

The workshop highlighted that mountain States currently had little or no waste management and the most common practice was to transport and dump, and burning of waste. Mountain specific manage-ment issues and policies on waste were also deliberated upon during the workshop along with planning process-es for embedding zero waste practices.

Make Riverfront Cleanups More Meaningful

After force-engaging the young, allow them to get genuinely involved

There is an extensive riverfront cleanup drive underway around the Gangtok hill leading up to World Environment Day coming up on Tuesday. It is always here is an extensive riverfront cleanup drive undera good idea to get the young engaged with real nature, and given the increasing stress that water bodies are under, exposing them to how recklessly we litter, pollute and obliterate the water courses is a welcome initiative. Sikkim if fortunate that it has riverfronts to cleanup, because all it takes is a drive down to Siliguri to realize that rivers, even ancient ones, are no longer perennial. They remain slushy dump-yards for most of the year, encroached and polluted, and then flood the encroachments when monsoon arrives. Clearly then, the move to take the young to streams around the capital should pay some dividends because the staggering loads of plastic removed from even out of the way streams will get the students thinking about the need to dispose more responsibly.

But that is still only the first step. Clearing riverfronts of litter is necessary, but it has to be a yearlong engagement and not just a once in a very long while picnic. Since the grown-ups and their departments are not doing much to address the clogging of streams, may be it will be a good idea to invite the young to form riverfront care clubs in their respective neighbourhoods. Community-level donations and grants from the government could easily sustain these initiatives and the involvement of the young just might deliver Sikkim a more durable solution to the stress runaway consumption is putting the State's water bodies under. These checks were part of the traditional lifestyles here as well, but these were snuffed out when governments took control of everything. Within two generations, the balance was upended in the hands of an uninformed and an uninspired bureaucracy, which, due its insecurities and compromises, has grown suspicious of traditional knowledge and community par-ticipation. That talking down can be chipped away by involving the young early, and since riverfront cleanup drives are the current pursuit, it should be taken a step further and a real sense of ownership instilled in the students.

It is also important that the cleanup drives do not end with the loading of trucks with the collected litter. These groups should be invited to accompany the garbage trucks to the garbage dump-yards so that they realize that most of our waste is not even biodegrad-able anymore and recognize that one area is cleaned at the cost of another areas health and ecology. When the children are taken to garbage dumps, they should not just get a tour of the facilities established there to "treat" waste, but also encouraged to interact with residents of the surrounding area to learn of how their daily lives have been affected just so that other towns and villages of Sikkim can be emptied of their filth. It is not enough to just hold your breath when your vehicle zooms past the Marchak garbage dump on the highway, and if the young learn about the condition there first hand, they will at least empathise with the situation and, in the long run, realize the need for less messy solutions. No one expects them to come up with a solution immediately, but at least they will be seized of the issue, and who knows, when they take charge in the future, will be able to factor in more considerations than just the civil engineering and land acquisition components for projects.

One also wonders whether the children realize that the streams and jhoras they have been so diligently cleaning for more than a fortnight now flow into rivers which were inexcusably allowed to be more harmfully polluted right under the watch of a subsidiary of the very organization which has been condescendingly reminding them of keeping rivers clean? It took the High Court's involvement recently to remind the pollution control board here that its responsibility is towards the environment and not industry (pharma in the present case). Pharmaceutical units along the Singtam-Rangpo axis, it was revealed, were not even meeting 60% of the pollution control requirements but were still allowed to operate and wantonly pollute in just about every production cycle. A High Court order led to the pollution control mechanisms at these units get inspected; what has still not happened though is a study on the scale of pollutants spewed into the Rani Khola and Teesta and may be even Rangeet and the damage it has caused the water bodies and the life it sustains. The young should ask these questions of the organizers of the riverfront cleanup exercises. Like it was said before, the young, after they are forced to get more engaged, should resolve to get more involved as

You likely recognize that the depiction of Latin American immigrants in politics today – as a menacing mass of recalcitrant Spanish-speaking in-

vaders – is overwhelmingly negative.

What you may not know is that stereotypes suggesting that Latin Americans represent a threat to Unit-ed States culture are not just morally repugnant - they're also historically inaccurate. Spanish-language litera-ture actually predates the Puritans' writing in English by nearly a century.

As my research reveals, many re-nowned Latin American writers actually produced some of their finest work while living in the United States. Latina and Latino writers have made exceptional contributions to American literary history.

For a fresh take on what it means

to be a Latina or Latino in the U.S. to-day, check out these five literary lumi-

1. IOSÉ MARTÍ (CUBA, 1853-1895) For Cubans, José Martí is the equivalent of George Washington, Ralph Waldo Emerson and Walt Whitman combined. Born in 1853 in Havana Cuba, Martí wrote the bulk of his 28 volumes of prose, poetry and speeches in late 19th-century New York.

Working as a diplomat, translator, Spanish teacher and journalist, Martí interpreted current events and cultural questions from his office on Front Street, in lower Manhattan's South Street Seaport.

He witnessed immigrants arriving by the boatload to New York – except the Chinese, who were banned in 1882. He knew about the lynching of black Americans and of atrocities against Native Americans. These stories found their way into Martí's thinking about Latin America and its diaspora in the United States.

Martí also wrote dazzling accounts of New York, his adopted hometown, likening the cables of the brand-new Brooklyn Bridge to sated colossal boa constrictors" resting atop towers.

. Upon the unveiling of the Statue of Liberty in 1886, Martí alluded to the fact that his distant island home, Cuba, remained a Spanish colony: "Those who have you, O Liberty, do not know you. Those deprived of you must not merely talk about, they must win you.

Martí died in 1895, fighting for Cuba's independence. In 2018, he was inducted into the New York State Writers Hall of Fame, alongside local luminaries Colson Whitehead and Alexander Hamilton

2. IULIA DE BURGOS (Puerto Rico,

Puerto Rico's greatest poet also migrated from her Caribbean home island, where she was a teacher, to the isle of Manhattan. Julia de Burgos recounts this literary journey in one of her most famous poems, "Yo misma fui mi ruta" – "I was my own route."

De Burgos' inventive, daring po-etry did indeed forge a new path for feminists, Latina and otherwise, in the early 20th century.

Against pressure to identify as

white, the mixed-race de Burgos proclaimed her African heritage, calling herself "Black, of pure tint."

In one experimental 1938 poem, de Burgos addresses the distance be-tween her liberated identity as a writer and her constricted role as a woman.

"You in yourself have no say; ev eryone governs you; your husband, your family," she writes in "To Julia de Burgos." "In me only my heart governs, only my thought; who governs

In 1953, de Burgos was found dead, without identification, in uptown Manhattan and buried anony tan's Hart Island. A month later, her compatriots retrieved her remains and reburied her in Puerto Rico.

The New York Times featured de Burgos – a "poet who helped shape Puerto Rico's identity" – in its over-looked women's obituary series in May. GLORIA ANZALDÚA (Texas,

The poet and essayist Gloria Anzaldúa came from a family of Mexican-American farm laborers.

Her ancestors had for generations

lived in Texas' Rio Grande Valley, near the border that Anzaldúa memorably defined as "an open wound where the Third World grates against the first

Anzaldúa's work often celebrates her community's bilingualism. She portrays it as an act of survival against the "linguistic terrorism" of the U.S. public school system, which required English-only teaching and offered "accent elimination" classes in a part of the U.S. that used to be

Anzaldúa found such insults to her nonstandard way of speaking excruciating. "Until I can take pride in my language," she once wrote, "I can-not take pride in myself."

Anzaldúa is increasingly recognized as one of the 20th century's most influential feminist and an-

SANDRA CISNEROS (Chicago, 1954-present)

No list of Latino authors is complete without Sandra Cisneros, author of the beloved "The House on Mango Street," which has sold nearly 6 million copies and has been translated into over 20 languages.

Why Cisneros has not received the same acclaim as Junot Díaz - a childhood sexual assault survivor who was recently accused of his own sexual impropriety – is perplexing.

My favorite of her novels is "Car-amelo." In this transnational coming-of-age story, a Mexican-American woman digs into her family history.

Learning from her abuela, Sole-dad, she discovers hidden truths about family tensions, border crossings and why her doting migrant papá, Inocencio, is not so innocent

5. CRISTINA HENRÍQUEZ (Delaware, 1971-present)

Cristina Henríquez, who was born in the U.S. after her Panamanian father went there to pursue graduate studies, is the best novelist you've never

Featuring first-person perspectives of Central and South Americans and Caribbean migrants, her books dramatically expand the popular conception of the U.S. Latino, long centered on Mexican-Americans and Puerto Ricans.

"The Book of Unknown Ameri-s" tells the story of recent arrivals from Paraguay, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Panama, Puerto Rico and Mexico who live in a dingy apartment complex, enduring the back-breaking labor of harvesting mushrooms. Sometimes, after a 12-hour shift in the dark, they eat only oatmeal for dinner.

The teenage love story between the characters Maribel and Mayor – written in prose that The Washington Post says rises "to the level of poetry" – may help American readers appreciate the myriad reasons why Latin Americans migrate north, including dictatorships, a lack of specialized health care and violence.

That is, I think, Henriquez's hope.
As one Mexican character angrily states, in the U.S. he feels both invisible and vilified.

"I want them to see a guy who works hard, or a guy who loves his family," he says. "I wish just one of those people, just one, would actually talk to me. ... But none of them even want to try. We're the unknown Americans.

Coke has promised 'less sugar', but less is still too much

At last count, 28 countries and seven hange and lies in the USA had moved to introduce a tax on sugary drinks. Potential benefits are clear and healthinclude reducing costs from obesity and health-care spending, as well as the potential to increase a healthy life. Health groups in Australia have long called for the same to be done here.

When Britain legislated for a sugary drink tax, graded according to the quantity of sugar used, some manufacturers significantly reduced the mount of sugar in their drinks before the law even came into practice.

Echoing the tactic of some British companies, Coca-Cola in Australia is claiming it has taken action by "reducing sugar in 22 of our drinks since 2015", and is committing to "make all our new Coca-Cola flavours either reduced or no sugar". Their aim is for a 10% reduction across their range by 2020.

Coca-Cola's products with less sugar include: - Coca-Cola with Stevia: 19g of sugar per 375mL, com-

- pared with the classic product with 40g per 375mL - Kirks reduced sugar drinks: now 38g sugar per 375 mL (4-5% reduction)
- Sprite, sugar reduced with added stevia: 40g sug-
- sprite, sugar reduced with added stevia: 40g sugar per 375 mL (14% reduction)
 Raspberry Fanta, sugar reduced with added stevia: 36g sugar per 375 mL (19% reduction)
 Lift hard hitting lemon, sugar reduced: 31.5g sugar per 375 mL (23% reduction)
- Deep spring mineral waters, three orange-based flavours sugar reduced: 28g sugar per 375 mL (26% reduction).

No nutritionist is going to knock reductions in sug ar content, but even a single can of the new Coca-Cola with Stevia has 37% of the World Health Organisation's (WHO) recommended maximum daily intake of

ar for an adult. The other products listed still have 55-78% of the WHO maximum recommendation.

Smaller pack sizes are being introduced and will help. And no-sugar versions of their major products are available, sweetened with intense (artificial) sweeteners such as stevia, acesulphame K, sucralose and aspartame.
SUGAR ALTERNATIVES

Stevia can be made from the leaves of the Stevia rebaudiana plant which contain a variety of steviol compounds. These bypass digestion in the small intestine and are broken down by bacteria in the colon.

Food Standards Australia New Zealand has ap-proved the use of a wide range of different steviol compounds. Labelled either by its name or "additive 960", stevia is marketed by some as a "natural" product. Although what is added to drinks and other foods is a highly purified extract, often blended with a sugar alcohol (usually erythritol) or complex carbohydrates called oligosaccharides

In its favour, stevia has virtually no kilojoules, and can be used by those with diabetes. But its effect on "good" bacteria in the colon may be undesirable.

Arguments continue to rage over whether in-tense sweeteners are beneficial or not. Some studies claim they help with weight loss. Others say they may increase the risk of excess weight and some associated health problems. Their effect on the "good" gut bacteria also needs careful evaluation

The real problem is that sweet drinks maintain a taste for sweet drinks.

Nor does the dental disaster associated with soft drinks disappear with low or no sugar varieties. This is because much of the damage to dental enamel comes from their inherent acidity. The solution is to confine drinks to water or milk

SUGAR COATING? Those marketing sugary products cannot ignore the public outcry against sugar. But nor can their business stand too strong an anti-sugar movement. The "less sugar" move may be an attempt to tone

down the criticism.

How do we define moderation? It's an issue that has dogged those formulating dietary guidelines. In 1979, one of Australia's dietary goals was to "de-crease refined sugar consumption". Two years later, the first guidelines included advice to "avoid eating

Sugar sales fell, moving the sugar industry to mount a massive seven-year PR and advertising campaign to influence health professionals, the population, health ministers and food companies

that sugar was "a natural part of life".

With every subsequent revision of the guide-lines, the food industry has campaigned strongly for the sugar guideline to be dropped. They succeeded in so far as the wording was changed to 'eat only a moderate amount of sugars and foods

containing added sugars". Sales steadied.

A review for the 2013 guidelines showed even stronger evidence that all added sugars should be limited, especially sugar sweetened soft drinks and cordials, fruit drinks, vitamin waters, energy and sports drinks.

Confectionery, cakes, biscuits and pastries were also specifically added to the list along with advice that for many Australians there was no room in the diet for any of these foods. "Only moderate" amounts may be comfortable for the industry but it was way too vague to fit the evidence

"Less" sugar in sugary drinks is also too vague. Even for those who are not overweight, these drinks remain a hazard for our teeth. The only solution is to stop drinking them.

Nature's vagaries upset mango cart in UP; quality, price hit

Lucknow, Jun 4 (PTI): Nature's wrath has rendered a big blow to mango output in Uttar Pradesh this year, not only hitting the price of the 'king of fruits' but also its quality and the quantum of

Mango production, which was estimated to be around 50 lakh metric tonnes this year, is now expected to reach only 25-30 lakh metric tonnes in the state because of continued thunderstorms, dust storms and untimely

showers this season.

"The flowering of the fruit was very good this year, almost 99 per cent, and we had expected that the production would be around 50 lakh metric tonnes," President of All India Mango Growers Association Insram Ali told PTI.

Uttar Pradesh -- with 14 mango belts -- is among the major producers of the 'king of fruits'.

The mango belts in Saha-ranpur, Bulandshahr, Barabanki, Hardoi, Hasanganj in Unnao, Pratapgarh, Amroha besides

Malihabad produce the best of the succulent varieties of Dussheri, Chausa and Langra. Dussheri and Chausa varieties are exported from the state.

Ali said the temperature required for the fruit was not steady. It kept fluctuating, resulting in the crop getting infested by pests, he said.

The temperature for the fruit to settle has to increase gradually but this time round it kept cooling down very of-ten which created problems and the quality of fruit suffered, he explained.

Another major problem that the mango growers faced was that of pests, for which the farmers had to go for regular sprays.

As per norms, the grow-

ers are advised to use minimum amount of pesticides to ensure that the fruit remains healthy but it becomes necessary to check the pests, he said, adding that this time round the problem was aggravated as duplicate pesti-cides are being commonly sold in the markets.

Unlike the previous years

were sufficient, this time seven to eight sprays had to be used to control the spread of pests, he said.

The matter of duplicate pesticides is also being taken up with the authorities, Ali said.

"All this led to an increase in the cost of the produce and practically the government's aim of doubling the income of farmers by 2020 was blown away," he said.

This will definitely have a toll on the prices in the mar-

kets and the rates right at the starting of the season could be as high as Rs 50 to Rs 60 a kg, he said.

The exports are also likely to be hit because the produce this time round will not be as

good as in the past, he said.

According to the data of Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority (Apeda), India's total exports stood at 52,761 tonnes (worth Rs 443.66 crore) in FY17 compared to 36,779 tonnes (worth Rs 320.64 crore) a

As it is, a lot remains to be done to fully exploit the potential of mango exports which could help the growers in raising their income and popularising the varieties grown in the state, Ali said.

The mango belt farmers have also been facing problems of insufficient power and water supply and they have not got any special advantage, Ali said, adding that these issues are being constantly taken up with the central and state governments.

India flouting global laws by taxing international air tickets: IATA

Air Transport Association (IATA) today castigated India for taxing international tickets, as it asked governments to facili-tate the growth of worldwide connectivity by avoiding creeping re-regulation, maintaining the integrity of global standards and addressing a capacity crisis.

We must take governments to task. It is unacceptable that global standards are being ignored by the very governments that created them, IATA's Director General and

Asserting that India was taxing international tickets in contravention of the resolutions of the UN body International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO), de Juniac said, India helped develop ICAO resolutions prohibiting tax on international al travel, he said, apparently referring to the imposition of Goods and Services Tax (GST) and enhancement of its rates on international air tickets, especially business

Indian government had an nounced the implementation of the GST from July 1, 2017. The tax covers airline products and services including tickets, ancillary, change, refund and other products and fees.

De Juniac was presenting a report on the air transport industry at the opening session of the 74th IATA Annual General Meeting and World Air Transport Summit, which began here today.

On aviation's core mission to deliver safe, secure, accessible and sustainable connectivity, the state of our industry is

mal' levels of profitability we are spreading aviation's benefits even more widely.

But there are challenges. Smarter regulation needs to counter the trend of creeping re-regulation. Global standards must be maintained by the states that agreed (upon) them. And we need to find efficient solutions to the looming capacity

Pretoria, Jun 4 (PTI): External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj today underlined that multilateralism, international trade and rules based world order was facing "strong head-winds" as she called for joint ac-tion by the BRICS nations against money launder-ing, terrorist-financing ing, terrorist-tinanc and de-radicalisation.

Swaraj, who is on a five-day trip to South Af rica, was attending BRICS (Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa) Foreign Ministers' meeting. The meeting is expected to lay the foundation for the annual summit of the grouping in Johannes-burg next month.

"Our deliberations here will contribute to-wards enriching intra BRICS cooperation fur-

ther," Swaraj said.
India attaches importance to the role of BRICS in consolidating intra-BRICS cooperation and in international affairs, she was quoted as saying by a statement by the Ministry of External

Swaraj called for joint action of the BRICS nations against challenges to long-term growth.

"Our meeting today takes place at a time multilateralism, when international trade, and rules based world order face strong head-winds, Swaraj said. "Though, the glob

al growth has exhibited signs of recovery, the challenges to long-term growth continue to persist. Ensuring that the benefits of globalisation are shared widely remains a challenge," she added.

"Prime Minister Modi had given a call for a BRICS Counter-Terrorism Strategy for joint-action with a focus on money

with a focus on money laundering, terrorist-finance, cyber-space and de-radicalization as our priorities," Swaraj said.

"Our leaders have also called for making UN Counter Terrorism framework efficient and our commitment to implement our Leaders' mandate on counter terrorism under South Africa's BRICS Chairship," she

The other foreign ministers attending the meeting were China's Wang Yi, South Africa's Lindiwe Sisulu, Brazil's Marcos Bezerra Abbott and Russia's Sergey Lavrov.

China welcomes Modi's remarks on bilateral ties at Shangri-La Dialogue

BEIJING, JUN 4 (PTI): China today welcomed Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "positive remarks" on India-China relations at the Shangri-La Dialogue and expressed willingness to work with India to follow the consensus between the leadership of the two countries to maintain the momentum in the bilateral ties.

Prime Minister Modi in his keynote address at the Shangri-La Dia-logue in Singapore, Asia's premier defence and strategic affairs conference, last week had said that Asia and the world will have a better future when India and China work together with trust and confidence while being sensitive to each other's interests.

The prime minister said both India and China have displayed "maturity and wisdom" in managing issues and ensuring a peaceful border, adding cooperation between the world's two populous countries was expanding.

Welcoming Modi's remarks at a media briefing, Chinese Foreign Minis-



try spokesperson, Hua Chunying said, 'We have noted the positive remarks made by Prime Minister Modi on China-India relations. We highly appreciate such kind of positive remarks."

Recalling the informal summit between Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping at Wuhan in April this

year, Hua said, "They had in-depth exchange of views on the international landscape and bilateral rela-tions and reached many consensus."

"The two sides agreed to adopt a mature and wise way to properly handle differences," she said.

"China is willing to work with the Indian side to follow the guidance of this consensus to maintain the positive momentum of the development of bilateral relations, to promote mutually beneficial cooperation, properly handle differences, maintain peace tranquillity along the border areas and thus move forward the China-India relations," she said.

Modi and President Xi had met

in April in an unprecedented two-day 'heart-to-heart' summit in the central Chinese city of Wuhan to 'solidify" the India-China relation ship after the Dokalam standoff last

Troops of India and China were locked in the 73-day standoff in Dokalam after the Indian side stopped the construction of a road by the Chinese army in the disputed area.



Paris police today began evacuating around 1,000 migrants from two makeshift camps in the city five days after another 1,000 were taken to temporary lodgings. The operation began at dawn at a camp along the Canal St Martin northeast of the city centre where an estimated 550 mainly Afghan migrants were staying, an AFP reporter said. Another 450 people were being evacuated from a camp to the north at Porte de la Chapelle, police and city authorities said in a joint statement. The St Martin Canal is near the site of a sprawling former camp by the Stalingrad Metro stop, which was cleared only to spring up again several times last year. Today's operation comes less than a week after the dismantling of a camp along the Canal St Denis, north of the St Martin canal, where around 1,000 migrants mainly from Eritrea and Sudan had sheltered. France received a record 100,000 asylum applications last year and offered refugee status to around 30,000 people, official figures show. Forced expulsions numbered 14,900.

Trump pardoning himself would be 'almost self-executing impeachment': Preet Bharara

WASHINGTON, JUN 4 (PTI): It "would be outrageous" for a sitting US president to pardon himself, former attorney Preet Bharara has asserted after Donald Trump's lawyer said proba-bly the President has the power to pardon himself in the Russia collusion affair.

The question of self-pardon arose after the New York Times published a 20-page letter to the special counsel Robert Mueller from Trump's lawyers.
In the letter, they say the

president has absolute power as US legal chief to end investigations, or "even exercise his power to pardon".

Asked about the letter of Trump's attorney Jay Sekulow and then-Trump lawyer John Dowd, Trump's attorney Rudy Giuliani said yesterday that the President is not going to pardon himself but "probably does" have the power to do it.

"He has no intention of pardoning himself," Giuliani told ABC's "This Week." He added, "It would be an open question.
I think it would probably get answered by gosh, that's what the Constitution says, and if you want to change it, change it. But

Reacting to the letter as well as Giuliani's explanation, Bharara, the Indian-origin attorney, who was fired by Presi-dent Trump last year, said that it "would be outrageous" for a



sitting president to pardon him-

self.
"I think (if) the President decided he was going to pardon himself, I think that's almost self-executing impeachment," Bharara, a CNN legal analyst, said on CNN's "State of the

"Whether or not there is a minor legal argument that some law professor somewhere in a legal journal can make that the President can pardon, that's not what the framers could have intended. That's not what the American people, I think, would be able to stand for," he said.

Bharara, who served as the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York from 2009 to 2017, said that he doesn't believe Giuliani's assertion that the President is not considering granting himself a

"Rudy, just like Jay Sekulow, keeps coming up with things that end up being false. When he says the President is not contemplating something, I have no faith in that whatsoever" he

The case stems from the investigation by special counsel Mueller into alleged collusion between the Trump team and Russian officials in the 2016 election campaign that brought the Republican billionaire to

Trump has always maintained there was no collusion and that the investigation is a "witch hunt".

Part of Mueller's investigation is looking at whether Trump sought to criminally obstruct it, especially with the sacking of ex-National Security Adviser Michael Flynn and former FBI director James Comey, and with his reaction to Attorney General Jeff Sessions' recusal from the investigation.

In the letter to Mueller, which was sent in January, Sekulow and Dowd has acknowledged for the first time that Trump tated" a statement put out about

controversial 2016 meeting with Russians at Trump Tower, CNN reported.

It also says that the letter contradicts several public state-ments by Sekulow and also by White House Press Secretary White House Fress Seesers Sarah Sanders, who said Trump "cortainly didn't dictate," but certainly didn't dictate," rather "weighed in, offered suggestion like any father would

House Majority Leader Kevin McCarthy said he does not think a president should pardon himself or herself.

"I don't believe that would be a legal question," McCarthy, a Republican lawmaker from California, said.
"The President is not saying

he is going to pardon himself. I don't know why we're walking through hypotheticals here in this process. The President has never said he pardoned himself. I don't know where the President would go forward pardoning himself. But I don't think a president should pardon them-

selves," McCarthy added.

Mueller has so far indicted 19 people as part of his probe, including four members of the Trump campaign team or administration.

A total of 13 Russians have been charged over their links to the Internet Research Agency, a Russian "troll factory" accused of spreading fake news stories through US social media.

At least seven dead in Kabul suicide blast near clerics' gathering

KABUL, JUN 4 (AFP): At least seven people were killed today when a suicide bomber detonated near a gathering of top clerics in Afghanistan's capital Kabul, roughly one hour after the group proclaimed such attacks a sin, police said.

The blast in the western part of the city, near universities and a police academy, is the latest demonstration of the militants' chilling ability to carry out attacks in the heart of Kabul, which is now the deadliest place in the country for civilians.

The bomber deto-

nated at about 11.30 am [0700 GMT] at the gates of Kabul's Polytechnic University, police and of-ficials said. The Loya Jir-ga tent where thousands of clerics from across Afghanistan were meeting is on the campus.

The tent is a huge venue often used for top religious or government gatherings. "Loya Jirga" means "grand assembly" in Pashto. Most of the casualties were civilians.

"According to our initial information, seven people have been killed including a policeman. Nine others have been injured, including two po-licemen," police spokes-man Hashmat Stanikzai

told media. Interior spokesman Najib Danish confirmed it was a sui-cide attack, and said the bomber had been on foot when he detonated his explosives at the university gate.

Police spokesman Stanikzai said the blast was outside the tent.

No group has claimed

the attack, but the Taliban issued a statement on Twitter saying its fighters had "nothing to do" with the bombing.

Both the Taliban and the Islamic State group have stepped up their headline-grabbing assaults on the heavily fortified capital in recent

media Local thousands of clerics had gathered at the Loya Jirga tent for the meeting of the Ulema Council, Afghanistan's top religious leaders.

Earlier, they issued a fatwa against the ongoing conflict in Afghanistan, where the Taliban have been fighting an insurgency against government forces for near-ly 17 years, while other militant groups have also been carrying out

attacks.
The Ulema Council seen by the militants as having some links to the government -- termed sui-cide attacks a sin against Islam. They have issued

such fatwas in the past.

"The ongoing war in Afghanistan does not have a legal basis, only Afghans are the victims of this war... [it] does not have religious, na or human value," national said, according to government officials.

Roads around the university were quick-ly blocked by security officials after the blast, with heavy traffic jams building in the city as many commuters headed home due to Ramadan. the holy Islamic fasting month, during which government offices close early.

Rajjnikanth's Kaala is one of the most anticipated film of 2018. Prior to its release, the movie is facing its fair share of controversy. After being banned in Karna


taka, a defamation suit has been slapped on the film by a journalist who goes by the name – Jawahar Nadar.
