nation in Sikkim. The PIL raises a host of issues, all of which challenge the separate set of rules imposed on Sikkimese women to establish their Sikkimeseness.

These range from de-nial of inheritance if they are married to non-Sikkimese, disqualification from being entitled to Certificates of Identification is they marry out and the demeaning practise of Sikkimese women with COI's based on the documents of their fathers to keep procuring "unmarried" certificates every six months if they wish to continue using their COIs.

These rules, all inter-linked and interpreted from the Sikkim Subjects Regulation of 1961, have been in practise in Sikkim for a long while. but the petitioners have argued that there is no extant rule which allows for Sikkimese women married to non-locals to lose their COIs after marriage. And yet, such a denial is practised across the board and is at the source of all complaints highlighted in the PIL.

Even though there has often been talk about challenging these rules,

a formal opposition has en put on record. The PIL alleges that

the Sikkim Succession Act of 2008, because it denies this right to women married to non-Sikkimese, is gender dis-criminatory because the same set of rules are not

extended to men.

After hearing both the sides of the case, the division bench headed by Chief Justice Satish Kumar Agnihotri and including Justice Meenakshi Madan Rai, issued notices to the State Government seeking its response within four weeks.

To Switzerland via Mirik: Will Mamata walk the talk?

SILIGURI, 07 JUN:

Please do not let the heading baffle you. There is material behind it.

West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee has an oft spoken desire to turn the Darjeeling hills into Switzerland. How is that relevant here? It sure is for she now has at least a slice

of the Darjeeling hills – Mirik in her kitty. Will she now walk the talk? Turning Kolkata into London, another of her wish, and the Darjeel-ing hills into Switzerland are metaphors. The implicit comparison lies in the spirit the two most symbolically prominent spots in the occident represent. The dual allegories have

been top in Mamata's list of priorities since she became chief minister of Bengal for the first time in 2011.

Switzerland's immaculate urbanization policy without destroying the country's pristine alpine settings is an example the world over. Constructions do come up in Switzer-land all the while, but anything garish is strictly nyet, nyet.

So, in its bid to introduce a touch of Swiss bliss in the Darjeeling hills, the state government took up its maiden venture at a spot equally famous the world over – Tiger Hill, earlier this year. The idea was to renovate some existing edifices and con-struct some new ones. The venture ran into a wall of protest from the locals and the Gorkhaland Territorial

Administration (GTA) custodians.
So unhappy was the GTA with the incident that it approached the Union environment ministry with its objections and threatened to take legal steps to halt construction work. One can well understand the fate of the Tiger Hill initiative.

That was in the month of March. Two months have rolled by since and Mamata Banerjee's Trinamool has made deep inroads in the hills in that time to the extent of winning the Mirik Municipality. Now she has the opportunity to convert Mirik into a genuine tourist hotspot and end its sob story of playing second fiddle to Darjeeling

To be fair, Mirik has the possibility to usher a touch of Switzerland, for the ingredients are already present in the hill station's sylvan settings. All it requires is a push of intent.

As Geneva, Switzerland's most

admired city, sits on the shores of Lake Geneva, Mirik too sits on the shores of the Sumendu Lake (popularly known as the Mirik Lake), a favourite haunt of tourists. As Geneva is surrounded by the Alps and Jura mountains offering fantastic views of Mont Blanc, Mirik too is almost an amphitheatre surrounded by pine-laden mountaintops including the Shingalila range overlooking Mt.

Khanchendzonga.

But, that is where the compari-

son ends. Unlike its western cousin, the Sumendu Lake and its surround ing Savitri Puspaudyan are unkempt. Boating on the lake, horse riding along its shores or strolling on the promenade along the lake are attractive options, but mismanaged.

The hill town's proximity to Ne-pal, Darjeeling, Kurseong and Siliguri makes it easily accessible from different ends and include it in the tour itinerary of all prospective tourists to these parts. Improving its hospitality potential will also boost Mirik's chances to come of age as a full-fledged tourist destination.

So, the possibility to introduce a dollop of Swiss charm in Mirik is real. Over to Mamata Banerjee.

A presentation on the HRVA document was also made by TARU.

Director-TARU. Mahesh Rajashekharan, explained that the project was a detailed investigation with over 2000 households surveyed.

He added that there are analysis, impact and vulnerabilities in the report which can help reduce risks.

He informed that a web/ mobile based GIS application is now available for the three towns of Mangan, Gyalshing and Namchi which can lead to dissemination of information across stakeholders.

Secretary-LR secretary-Lk De-partment, Tsegyal Tashi, while addressing the gathering, said, "We should not be compla-cent with the risk that surrounds us."

With global climate change and lives being

affected directly, state has taken measures in view of the present context. However, he added that in order to implement the same, all stakeholders must come

on board. He also added that risk assessment was important which was why UNDP commissioned the work to TARU to prepare a valid

and informed document.

In the absence of risk assessment, plans cannot be fool-proof, he added. He also requested the concerned authorities to expand the GIS service to Gangtok as well.

The results of this study are to assist Sikkim State Disaster Management Authority [SSDMA] and other line departments by enumerating a set of recommendations for the state to mitigate the risks posed by climate induced disasters for the three district headquarters.

Establishing a garbage collection center in the middle of the town is not the way to tackle the al-ready polluted environ-ment. Traffic and garbage are not healthy to anyone," the doctors said.

The dumping center was earlier a food godown until it was relocated to Sangkhola in late 2016. The new dumping center was an initiative taken by the Nagar Panchayats for the dumping and segre-gation of recyclable items like tetra pack milk pouches and other items.
When contacted, the

Singtam Nagar Pancha-yat president, SK Pradhan, said that the authorities have already set out to find a new spot for the dumping center. "We were on the

verge of inaugurating the center, but if the people are dissatisfied and when they put up right reasons to relocate the center we had to reconsider the decision. They are our first priority," he said.

natory but also violates the Fundamental Rights guaranteed to them by the Constitution of India.

The PIL further points out "Un-married Sikkimese Women" are "harassed illegally" when they are forced to retain an "unmarried certificate" for seeking employment, for pursing higher education, for registra-tion of deeds of will, gift and deed of sale, for seeking job on compassionate grounds etc. since these are privileges available only to Sikkimese, which authorities in Sikkim authorities in Sikkim have always linked to men when it comes to verifying the credentials of women here.

The petition alleges that since there is no rule in place which specifies that the COIs of women become invalid when they marry a non-Sik-kimese, this is being perpetuated solely out of gender prejudices and

gender biases. The State, it is argued, has encroached upon the Right of Privacy and Right to life and the right to live with dignity of women here by practising such conditions.

The petitioners, who introduce themselves as Sikkim's Daughters, have pleaded the High Court to pass writ of Mandamus or any other appropriate writ order directing the State respondents to quash and set aside the Sikkim Succession Act in order to stop gender discrimination and also discrimination and also immediately stop seeking "Un-married Certificate" for any purpose from Sikkimese women and appropriate writs, order directing the State Respondents to declare that the COI issued to "all Sikkimese Women. irrespective of their marital status and condition, shall be valid for all purposes as applicable to all other COI holders."



History Lessons for All

Make it interesting by making it relevant

 \mathbf{H} istory, they say is always written by the victor who decides which aspects of the vanquished history suits its greater plans and which bits are best left untold. The same has held true for the history taught in schools in India. The curriculum is embar rassingly North-India-centric, and they are referred to as the "victors" since they dominate the politics of the country. The situation is now such that even though students learn by rote the names of all those who made it emperor in the Slave Dynasty, ask them about what the northeast was up to in the meantime and they draw a blank. It is accepted that prior to the advent of the East India Company, there was no unified India as we know it today. The region was a collection of one big empire and several kingdoms and princely states in the periphery; each with its own intrigues and their own histories. So, is the history we learn in school even close to the composite histories of the areas which came together to form the Union of India in 1947 and later? Well, not really.

The focus is too limited to the areas which either the British researched initially or were studied in detail by later-day historians. Turn the textbooks, and it becomes apparent that only the histories of areas which were on the ascendant in the 19th century and since are taught. Take a close look at the number of MPs each state has and the number of pages devoted to those areas in books teaching Indian History will be directly proportional to that number. But that's not history because it speaks too much in isolation. There can be no sense of history if there is no interplay with what was happening elsewhere and how developments there influenced histories in the area of study. How many of us, for instance, are told of the generals that the East India Company "received" in the form of pro-Crown adventurers of America who left after USA won the war of Independence? One of them proved decisive in winning the Anglo-Gorkha war of the early 19th Century which also brought Sikkim into the Company influence.

The blind-spotting of areas that got cut off with partition is also unfortunate. The Muslim League for example was a part of the Indian Freedom Struggle and the demand for the creation of Pakistan came much after the movement had gathered the required momentum. We, however, read very little of the role played by this group. Icons like Subhas Chandra Bose and Bhagat Singh too are glossed over. But that's for another debate.

Before progressing further it is important to make clear why we study history at all. The main reason is to get a better understanding of where we belong where we fit into the larger scheme of things, where we come from. There has been much talk about making Sikkim join the mainstream which is why it is not enough to just study Sikkimese history in schools in Sikkim. Sikkim needs to figure in the history books studied elsewhere in the country as well. In junior school, students learn of what Confucius meant to China even before they are taught (if ever they are taught) when and how Sikkim joined India. One is not suggesting going parochial here, but Sikkim does have a history that's worth learning. Few dynasties have ruled for the three hundred years that the Namgyal dynasty has to its credit. The British rule, for instance, which hogs the history books lasted less than a hundred years. Surely the British intrigues with Tibet should make for interesting reading as should the Nepali adventures in Sikkim under the generals who followed Prithvi Narayan Shah's unification of Nepal. It might not be out of place to even suggest here that Sikkim should prepare two chapters on Sikkimese history to fit into text books for schools all over the country and take it to the Centre for whetting by the text book boards for inclusion in the syllabi. Everyone is talking about rewriting the History textbooks anyway, why not slip Sikkim in too.

Saudi rift with Qatar exposes growing division in the anti-Iran alliance

m his}$ is the worst diplomatic crisis in the Gulf region in decades.

On June 5, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt decided to break off ties with Qatar, accusing the Gulf state of supporting terrorism and of destabilising the whole region.

Qatar had fired the opening shot by what emed to be open criticism of the Saudi-led and US-assisted anti-Iran alliance pushed by Donald Trump after his visit to Riyadh on May 21. On May 24, Emir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al

Thani, the ruler of Qatar, allegedly criticised the US-Saudi move and described Iran as an "Islamic power". The Qatar News Agency quoted the emir as saying, "There is no wisdom in harbouring hostility towards Iran". This infuriated Saudi Arabia and the UAE.

Qatar then questioned the veracity of the comments and said its news agency was hacked. Never-theless, the diplomatic rift been deepening, culminating in the current crisis.

NOT THE FIRST DIPLOMATIC IMBROGLIO

This is not the first time that Qatar, a thumb-shaped emirate of the size of the US state of Connecticut, has become embroiled a diplomatic imbroglio with its Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) partners Bahrain. Saudi Arabia and the UAE.

These three Gulf Arab states withdrew their nbassadors from Qatar's capital Doha in early 2014, on the pretext that the country had links to the Muslim Brotherhood and gave refuge to its leaders after the fall of Egypt's first democratically

elected government in July 2013. Saudi Arabia declared the Muslim Brotherhood, which it views as an alternative source of authority that's opposed to hereditary monarchical rule, a terrorist organisation in early March 2014.

But the current crisis is much more serious

than the 2014 diplomatic spat, which was resolved after eight months, with Saudi, Emirati and Bah-raini ambassadors returning to Doha in November of the same year on the condition that Qatar would never allow the Muslim Brotherhood to operate from its territory

IRAN IN THE CENTRE

Unlike the 2014 crisis, the current Qatari–Saudi rift is not just an intra-GCC falling out, as it involves

Saudi Arabia's regional rival Iran.

Qatar is seen by the Saudi government and its Emirati and Bahraini counterparts as a spoiler of efforts to forge a unified Arab–Muslim position, undergirded by the Trump administration, against Iran's so-called "terrorist agenda" in Arab coun-

A week before US President Donald Trump visited Riyadh to consolidate the anti-Iran alliance, the Saudi Arabic-language daily newspaper Okaz reported a secret meeting between the Qatari Foreign Minister Sheikh Mohammad Bin Abdul Rahman Al Thani, who was officially visiting Baghdad at the time, and the Iranian Quds Force Command-

The newspaper accused Qatar of exiting "early from the Arab-Islamic consensus" on Iran, adding "its defence of the Iranian terrorist regime shows the secret Doha-Tehran alliance intends to strike at

Arab and Islamic solidarity."

All of this while Qatar signed the anti-Iran Riyadh Declaration issued after the Arab-Islam-

ic-America summit on May 21 2017.

But why would Qatar, a country that hosts the largest US air force base in the Middle East (Al-Udeid), veer off the Saudi-led GCC military and diplomatic track?

Gulf watchers know that Qatar is suspicious of Saudi goals under the GCC umbrella, and it was an independent foreign policy, free from Saudi or Iranian influence.

Qatar hardly sees Saudi Arabia as a harmless neighbour. Tensions in Saudi-Qatar relations started right after the former emir Sheikh Hamad Bin thaifa Al Thani (1995-2013) came to power via a bloodless coup in 1995 by overthrowing his father Sheikh Khalifa Bin Hamad Al Thani. Sheikh Khalifa was visiting Saudi Arabia at the time, which embarrassed the Saudi government.

Sheikh Hamad's takeover in 1995 was preceded by a Saudi attack on a Qatari border security post in September 1992, in violation of a mutual defence treaty the two states had signed in 1982.

Riyadh also thwarted Qatari initiatives to ex-

port liquefied gas to other GCC member states in the 1990s. Emir Sheikh Hamad began to pull Qatar out of the Saudi shadow, a policy that Emir Sheikh

Tamim is also pursuing. Qatari satellite news channel Al Jazeera occa-sionally broadcasts programs criticising Saudi Arabia and, much to the anger of Rivadh, it hosted Saudi dissidents in a popular talk show in June 2002.

The incident led to Saudi Arabia recalling its

ambassador from Doha in September 2002. Full diplomatic relations between the two countries were restored five years later, in September 2007, on Qatari assurance that Al Jazeera would refrain from broadcasting anti-Saudi programs.

A BIG PUSH IN THE REGION

At the same time, Qatar, with the massive amount of oil and gas-generated income in its coffers (US\$191 billion GDP in 2012), has been pushing for a bigger

foreign policy and diplomatic profile in the region.

Doha successfully mediated a series of conflicts in the 2000s. It broke the political impasse in Lebanon by persuading the Sunni-led Lebanese gov-ernment and the opposition Hezbollah to sign the May 2008 Doha Agreement; it mediated the conflict between the Yemeni government and Houthis in February 2008 (though it failed subsequently to find a permanent solution to the conflict); and, in February 2010, it facilitated a ceasefire agreement between the Sudanese government and the opposition Justice and Equality Movement.

These successful mediations brought the tiny country enviable diplomatic plaudits from home

In 2011, to the surprise of many regional states, the Qatar military participated in the NATO-led in-tervention to dislodge the Gaddafi government in Libya. It wanted to achieve a similar goal in Syria - to topple the Bashar Al-Assad government - but did not succeed primarily due to Iranian and Russian opposition.

Despite being an autocracy, Qatar presented itself as a frontline Arab state for politically transforming the Arab world, under the rubric of the Arab Spring movements.

Its objective was to strengthen Qatari national security and foreign policy autonomy in the Gulf region, a neighbourhood dominated by giants such as Iran and Saudi Arabia.

WHAT NEXT?

Nonetheless, the diplomatic spat with Saudi Arabia does not bode well for Qatar. The Saudi-led diplomatic offensive has isolated it from the rest of GCC and the Middle East region by cutting off air, land and sea routes to Doha.

Doha has been accused again of supporting re-onal terror groups – al-Qaeda and ISIL in Iraq and

Syria - and cooperating with Iran. Qatar has always denied funding extremist groups, but the small country has been accused in

the last few years of allowing terrorist financiers to operate within its territory with impunity.

The Qatari government has also pledged support for Hamas, the Palestinian group regarded as a liberation force against Israeli occupation by most Muslim countries, but as a terrorist organisation by

Qatar can expect no serious help from Iran ei-ther, as any possible Iranian political or diplomatic help runs the risk of further embittering Saudi-Qatar relations and permanently subject Doha to Sau-

The Trump administration is definitely not on Qatar's side, as Secretary of State Rex Tillerson, speaking in Australia, indirectly hoped to resolve the intra-GCC irritants and put Qatar back in the Saudi-driven GCC orbit.

Cracks in the Saudi-Qatar relationship would

undercut the joint Arab-US fight against regional terror and extremist groups. It's difficult to say how long Qatar would be in the position to resist the Saudi diplomatic offensive.

But backing down from the fight with Riyadh looks set to produce two outcomes. First, Doha would be obliged to downgrade its support to rebel groups in Syria, linked to either Muslim Brotherhood or al-Qaeda. And second, it must be willing to shed some degree of its foreign policy autonomy to participate in the Saudi-led offensive against Iran.

In either case, Qatar has undermined the anti-Iran alliance, giving Tehran more time to reassess the situation and consider its options.

Meet the villagers who protect biodiversity on the top of the world

econversation.com

t was a chilly February day. Dangwen and his wildlife monitoring team patrolled along the upper reaches of the Yangtze River. The river was frozen solid, easy for poachers to walk over

That day, they encountered 220 blue sheep, five white-lipped deer, and a line of otter footprints. On the infrared camera traps that they had set up throughout the valley, three snow leopards appeared, a mother and two cubs – and the cubs had grown much bigger than three months earlier.

Dangwen comes from Yunta, a village located in Sanjiangyuan, Qinghai Province on the Tibetan Plateau. Saniiangvuan, is a 400.000 km² area that serves as an important habitat for rich and unique biodiversity and a watershed of the three largest rivers in Asia, the Yellow, Yangtze and Mekong, which serve a billion people downstream.

Dangwen isn't officially a re-searcher or an activist. But he has taken upon himself the task of montoring local wildlife with a team of other villagers, as part of a conservation project driven by the Shanshui Conservation Center, a Beijing-based non-governmental organisation

A PILOT VILLAGE FOR CONSERVATION

A mining company attempted to prospect the area almost a year before wildlife monitoring in the region started. The villagers were deeply disturbed because mining the mountains would go against the spiritual values of Tibetan Buddhism and

threaten their safety.

So when the Shanshui NGO proposed in 2013 the idea of organis-ing villagers to monitor wildlife and protect their lands, Dangwen volun-teered without hesitation. Having grown up in the village, he is very familiar with the land, the river and the wildlife, and he is especially proud of the sacred mountains that surround all of them. This is the fourth year that Yunta villagers have carried out this monitoring, patrolled the village to spot poachers, and managed rubbish to keep the land and rivers clean.

Monitoring data shows that local wildlife populations, including snow leopards, are increasing. The villagers' conservation conduct is officially

authorised by the local government - their stories have been reported by China Central Television – and the mining company never returned

AN INSPIRATION FOR THE TIBETAN PLATEAU

Inspired by Yunta, four neighbouring villages began their own wildlife monitoring and anti-poaching patrols. With encouragement from local authorities, a village-based conserva-tion network is being formed along the Tongtianhe Valley.

Recognised as a conservation riority in China, the Sanjiangyuan National Nature Reserve was set up in 2003 and designated a national park in 2016. But the area faces big conservation challenges: government

agencies have limited manpower to manage this vast area and grazing rights to all its grasslands were given to households in the 1990s.

This means that conservation in Sanjiangyuan would not be possible without support from local Tibetan communities. As Buddhists, these communities embrace the value of re-specting nature and caring for other living beings. Their system of sacred lands is very similar to modern pro-

That makes them natural allies for conservation. Yunta's experience has proven that, with proper training, villagers can become very qualified conservationists. Essentially, they are providers of ecological services and should receive benefits from conser-

vation in return.

Based on this experience, a policy recommendation was made to the government, and the newly designated Sanjiangyuan National Park quickly responded.

A total of 16,400 jobs as guards, with monthly salaries of 1,800 yuan (about US\$260), are to be offered to villagers living inside the park (one per household). The next step is to explore the possibility of reducing grazing in key habitats to allow wildlife – especially large carnivores such as snow leopards – to increase, and to slow down grassland degradation. PROTECTING ANIMALS

AND HUMANS

The Tibetan Plateau is the last place in Asia that still maintains a relatively intact ecosystem where large carni-vores and ungulates, many unique to

the region – such as the snow leopard, the Tibetan brown bear, the Tibetan antelope, the wild yak, the Tibetan wild ass, the Tibetan gazelle, and the blue sheep – roam freely.

Maintaining this vast ecosystem is challenging because its population of pastoralists is rapidly increasing. The hu man population of San iiangvuan has doubled

since 1980.

Meanwhile global climate change may have added to pressures on the grassland. Is it possible, under these conditions, to protect the ecosystem successfully while sup-porting the cultural and economic well-being of

Tibetan communities? After three decades of fast economic devel-opment, and demands by the Chinese people and government, a better environment is becoming a higher priority. Several large ecological programs have been initiated – perhaps among the largest financial schemes in the world - to pay for protecting and restoring forests, grasslands and wetlands, though their effectiveness could be improved by more scientific planning and participation

The call for nature education from citizens, especially parents, is rapidly growing, and this has generated broad concerns over ongoing ecological degradation. Public participation in conservation is now protected by environmental laws. Political will, the interests of society, and traditional values are all

coming together. This makes us believe that co-existence between humans and nature is not just wishful thinking. Yunta offers a strong starting point.

Deuba takes oath of office as new Nepal PM

KATHMANDU, IUN 7 (PTI): Veteran Nepalese politi-cian Sher Bahadur Deuba was today sworn in as the new prime minister of Nepal by President Bidva Devi Bhandari.

The 70-year-old leader, who became Nepal's prime minister for the fourth time, succeeded Maoist leader Pushpa Kamal Dahal Prachanda who had resigned after nine months to honour a power-sharing deal and proposed Deuba's name.

Deuba, the president of Nepal's oldest party - the Nepali Congress, was elected the 40th prime minister yesterday, following a voting in the parliament. He secured 388 votes out of a total of 558 votes cast in the 601-member legislative parliament. He was the only contender in the election.

Prime Minister Deuba formed an eight-member cabinet comprising three deputy prime ministers and four ministers.

Senior Nepali Con-gress leader Gopal Man

Shrestha was appointed as the Deputy Prime Min-ister and Minister for Education and Gyanendra Bahadur Karki as Minister for Finance.

Krishna Bahadur Mahara of CPN (Maoist Centre) was appointed as the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs, while Nepali Congress leader Farmullah Mansoor was appointed as Minister for Labour and Employment.

CPN (MC) leader Ja-

nardan Sharma has been appointed as Minister for Home Affairs and Prabhu Sah of the same party as minister without portfolio. Nepal Loktantrik Fo-

rum Chairman Bijay Kumar Gachhadar has been appointed as the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Federal Affairs and Local Development.

LONDON, JUN 7 (PTI): A near flawless demolition of Pakistan achieved, India will eye another dominant performance to seal a semifinal berth when they take on Sr Lanka in the ICC Champions Trophy here tomorrow.

Having pulverised Pakistan

by 124 runs, India will start as overwhelming favourites against Sri Lanka, who looked in total disarray during their 96-run defeat at the hands of South Africa. The only worry is the fickle London weather, with forecasts of 40 percent chance of heavy rainfall.

Contrasting performances aside, the sheer difference in quality also puts India a few notches ahead of the cricketers from the island nation.
On paper, the two sides are a

While India ticked almost all the boxes in their victory against Pakistan, the Sri Lankans, in their opening fixture, looked as if they have only entered the tournament to add numbers.
The winners of the last edi-

tion have a formidable batting line-up, which is being backed very well by a potent bowling attack.

And therein lies the problem with Sri Lanka, which is a side that is going through a rebuilding phase for the longest time now.

Tribal women in Attapady fight odds to make umbrellas

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, JUN 7(PTI): They may be reeling under scorching summer heat in this rain-shadow region.

But, fighting all odds to empower themselves, a group of tribal women in Attappady, the most back-ward tribal hamlets in Kerala, is busy making umbrellas for city dwellers.

Quality umbrellas of multi-colour and designs, made by around 60 women from various settlements in the region notorious for infant deaths due to mal-nutrition, and other health issues, are on high demand in the local market.

Tilted 'Karthumbi,' the Attappady-brand umbrel-las have many high-profile takers including IT hubs, Technopark and Infopark, Kochi Metro Rail Corporation, Cochin University and a number of schools and colleges across the state. These colourful umbrellas, born in remote settle-

ments, are now not only ensuring financial security to these poverty-stricken women and their families, but also helping them empower themselves.

'Thambu,' a tribal voluntary outfit, has launched the initiative to help the tribal folk make a livelihood

The outfit not only has imparted training for the women in umbrella-making, but also helped them



market the product outside their settlements

Though the project was started on an experimental basis last year with a modest production, now they were finding it difficult to meet the overflowing demands, President of 'Thambu', Rajendra Prasad said.

"Around 60 women belonging to various settlements are making umbrellas under the initiative... Women jointly make umbrellas at the community halls in their respective settlements," Prasad told PTI.

The local marketing of the product is also done by

tribal youths, which helps them earn income of their

"The initiative is not just to ensure income for the tribal folk but to empower them and instill self confidence and pride in their minds and to make them feel that they are not marginalised but very much part of the mainstream society," he added.

Though fund crunch was a major hurdle in the initial days, well wishers have helped the outfit collect interest-free loans from individuals to meet the production cost.

"We have collected a total of Rs 6.60 lakh with the support of our well wishers.. Now, the state Scheduled Tribes Department has allotted Rs 16 lakh for making 10,000 umbrellas," Prasad noted. A total of 1212 umbrellas, ordered by Technopark

here, have already been supplied.

The black colour 'Karthumbi' umbrella costs Rs

350, while the colourful one (12 different shades are available) are priced Rs 360.

Printed umbrellas are charged Rs 370 while those

with frilled ones are priced at Rs 390.

Women, belonging to the age group of 20-40, are wolved in umbrella making under the initiative.

They are working as five units, comprising 12 members each.

"A woman makes an average of 10-15 umbrellas in banks will not only ensure transparency but also make them aware about the bank dealings," he said. Peace Collective, a social media group, has helped

RBI lowers growth forecast to 7.3% for FY18

The Reserve Bank today marginally lowered the economic growth fore-cast for the current fiscal to 7.3 per cent even as it hoped that remonetisation would enable pick-up in consumer spending, especially in the cash-intensive segments.
The Central Statistics

Office (CSO) has pegged Office (CSO) has pegged the growth of real gross value added (GVA) for 2016-17 at 6.6 per cent, 0.1 percentage point lower than the second advance estimates released in February 2017.

"With the CSO's provisional estimates for 2016-17, the projection 2017-18 has accordingly been revised 10 bps downwards from the April 2017 projection to 7.3 per cent, with risks evenly balanced," the central bank said in its second bi-monthly monetary policy, 2017-18.

It said however that the continuing remonetisation "should enable" a pick-up in discretionary consumer spending, especially in cash-intensive segments of the economy.

Also, the reductions in banks' lending rates post-demonetisation 'should support both consumption and investment demand of households and stress-free

corporates", it said. government spending continues to be robust, cushioning the impact of a slowdown in other constituents.
"The implementation

of proposals in the Union Budget should crowd in private investment as the business environment improves with structur-al reforms, including the GST, the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, and the abolition of the Foreign Investment Promotion Board," it said.

The resolution of the Monetary Policy Commit-tee (MPC) also said rising input costs and wage pressures may prove a drag on the profitability of firms, pulling down overall GVA growth. Further, the twin bal-

ance sheet problem -over-leveraged corporate sector and stressed banking sector -- may delay the revival in private investment demand, it said.

As per the RBI, gold imports surged in vol-ume terms, initially driven by seasonal and festival demand but subsequently by stockpiling in anticipation of the roll out of the goods and services tax (GST).

Hit hard by demon-etisation, India lost the

tag of the fastest growing economy to China in the March quarter with a GDP growth of 6.1 per cent, pulling down the 2016-17 expansion to a three-year low of 7.1 per cent. Meanwhile, RBI left lending rates unchanged

citing risks to inflation due to spurt in farm loan waivers by states but raised lending capacity of banks to support economic growth.

The government has been pressing for a cut in interest rates to increase private investment and sought a meeting with the members of the Monetary Policy Com-mittee, but RBI Governor

The move is expected to raise buoyancy in the loans market as banks would have slightly high-er funds for lending.

"The current state of the economy underscores the need to revive private investment, restore banking sector health and remove infrastructural bottlenecks. Monetary policy can play a more effective role only when these factors are in place, it said.

RBI raised concerns over the possibility of fiscal slippages due to the farm loan waivers.

Meanwhile, Union minister M Venkaiah Naidu has blamed the Congress for "instigat-ing" protesters in Mad-hya Pradesh's Mandsaur, where five farmers were killed vesterday.

"It is a very sad turn of events in a state that is the most peaceful state in India. The Congress is trying to politicise farmers' problems after they failed to counter (Chief Minister) Shivraj Singh Chouhan politically in the state," Naidu said on the side lines of a function

UN chief warns of serious clean water shortages by 2050

UNITED NATIONS, JUN 7 (AP): Secretary-General Antonio Guterres warned that by 2050 global de-mand for fresh water is projected to grow by more than 40 per cent and at least a quarter of the world's population will live in countries with a "chronic or recurrent" lack

of clean water.

He told the Security Council that "strains on water access are already rising in all regions," not-ing that three- quarters of the 193 UN member states share rivers or lake basins with their neighbors.

'Water, peace and security are inextricably linked," Guterres said.
"Without effective management of our water resources, we risk intensified disputes between communi-ties and sectors and increased tensions among nations."

The secretary-general said the United Nations is ready to engage

in preventive diplomacy to keep the competition for water from sparking conflicts.

Bolivian President Evo Mo-

rales, whose country currently

holds the council presidency, not-ed that since 1947, some 37 conflicts have taken place between countries related to water.

"Our planet, the human family

and life in all its myriad forms on Earth are in the throes of a water crisis that will only get worse over the coming decades," he said. "If current patterns of consump-

tion continue unabated, two-thirds of the world's population will be facing water shortages as a daily reality by 2025," Morales added.

Right now, he said, more than 800 million people lack access to safe drinking water and more than 2.5 billion don't have basic sanitation

Morales, who presided over

the meeting, said the limited availability of fresh water underscores the importance of tackling the issue and ensuring that access to clean water is shared and doesn't become "a pretext for domestic or international conflict."

British Ambassador Matthew Rycroft said the world has already seen what can happen "when the waters run dry," pointing to drought in Somalia that is driving acute food shortages and threatening famine and a lack of clean water that is acerbating the crisis sparked by Boko Haram in northeast Nigeria

and sickening thousands.

He said the world currently is not on track to meet UN goals for 2030 calling for improved water security, access to drinking water and sanitation, as well as stronger management of water resources shared by countries.

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60 per cent of world's diabetes will come from Asia: US expert

diabetes projected to affect 380 million by 2030, there's some bad news for Asia with a noted American physician and researcher warning that 60 per cent of the world's diabetes will eventually come from the continent because of its population, dietary habits of people and weaker environmental laws.

"The number of individuals with impaired glucose tolerance or pre-diabetes will in-crease substantially because of increased genetic susceptibility to the harmful effects of sugar nd processed food," says Mark

Hyman, MD, founder and medical director of The Ul-traWellness Centre and director of the Cleveland Clinic Center for Functional Medicine, has come out with a book "The Blood SugProgram for Losing Weight, Preventing Disease, and Feeling Great Now!" in which he tells how to lose weight and prevent not just diabetes but also heart disease, stroke, dementia, and cancer is balanced insulin levels.

"Interestingly, people in this Asian population (who are uniquely susceptible to diabetes even though they may not be obese) are increasingly affected as they adopt a more Western diet. Weaker environmental laws and regulations also expose them to increasing levels of toxins, which are a significant cause of diabesity," he writes.

Hyman describes the seven keys to achieving wellness: boosting nutrition, regulating hormones, reducing inflamma-tion, improving digestion, maximising detoxification, enhancing

ing the mind in the book, published by Hachette.

With advice on diet, green

living, supplements and medicaexercise, and personalising the plan for optimal results, the book also teaches readers how to maintain lifelong health.

Diabesity, the continuum of

health problems ranging from mild insulin resistance and over-weight to obesity and diabetes, is the single biggest global health epidemic of our time, he says.

"It is one of the leading caus-

es of heart disease, dementia. cancer and premature death and is almost entirely caused by environmental and lifestyle factors. This means that it is almost 100 per cent preventable and curable," Hyman writes.

He also suggests a six-week action plan: eat medicines, optimise metabolism with nutritional supplements, relax mind and heal body, fun and smart exercise, living clean and green, and personalising the programme.

"The six-week action plan is a practical six-step, six- week programme vou can do on vour own, or in partnership with your healthcare provider. It also shows you how to create a community of support for yourself," According to Hyman, insulin

"Ten years ago, he was the one saying he was never going to get married, never going to have children, never going to settle down. Amal is the one who changed all that.'


The couple had kept a low profile during the pregnancy, but news they were expecting was confirmed back in February by the actor's close friend Matt Damon. People magazine reports that former president
