SC rejects Gurung's plea for protection, probe by independent agency

NEW DELHI, MAR 16 (PTI): Former Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) leader Bimal Gurung to-day failed to get any relief from the Supreme Court which dismissed his plea seeking protection against coercive steps by the West Bengal Police in cases lodged against him.

The apex court said the matter cannot be said to be a case of "individual's persecution" by the state authority and it was not a "fit case" where the court may exercise its jurisdiction to transfer the cases to an independent agency for probe, as

pleaded by him.

A bench comprising
Justices A K Sikri and
Ashok Bhushan observed that Gurung was not entitled to any relief and there was no material to substantiate that state functionaries, including the police, was "biased" against him.

Referring to the vio-lence in Darjeeling hills in West Bengal during the agitation for sep-arate Gorkhaland, the bench said, "the state is obliged to maintain law and order and to protect live and property of the citizens. It has to take necessary steps to con-tain such agitation and

restore the peace."

"The cases lodged in the FIR submitted at the instance of the police or other complainants cannot be discarded on the specious pleas that they have been lodged due to bias of the state and with the intent to persecute the petitioner (Gurung)," the bench said in its 60-

page judgement.
The bench referred to Article 19 of the Constitution which relates to freedom of speech and expressions and said that it guarantees some of most "important fundamental rights" to the citizens and protects important attributes of personal liberty. "Freedom to air ones

view is the lifeline of any democratic institution. The word freedom of speech must be broadconstrued to include right to circulate oned view by word or mouth or through audio visual instrument. Right of public speech is one form of expression which is also part of freedom of speech and expression," it said, adding that demonstrations were also a mode of expression of the rights under Article 19(1)(a).

It, however, said that protests "whether politi-cal, religious or social or demonstrations which create public, disturbances or operate as nuisances, or create or manifestly threaten some tangible public or private mischief, are not covered by protection under Article 19(1)".

The apex court said that Article 19(1)(a) and (b) gives constitutional right to all citi-zens regarding freedom of speech and expression but violent public demonstration, during which public and private properties are damaged and people lose their lives, goes beyond the fundamental rights and becomes an offence punishable under law.

The top court also referred to an order passed by the Calcutta High Court in the matter. related to protests in the districts of Darieeling and Kalimpong and said the situation was "deteriorating" and insurgency and violent agitations v continuing unabated.

"The protest no longer remained peaceful and democratic. The allegations made of the offences with regard to which various FIRs have been lodged cannot be

With encouragement from then Commandant of SAP, Akshav Sachdeva, he started working out at SAP gym in 1999 and went on to participate in state, national and international tour-

Addressing a press conference here today, Mr Bhutia thanked ADGP Sikkim Police, Akshay Sachdeva for motivat-

ing and supporting him to join a gym. He expressed his grati-tude to the entire family of SAP for their continuous support and motivation throughout his sports career. He also thanked his family members and well wishers for their continuous

support.
"Age is no bar but just a num ber. I started working out in a gym only in my early 30's and won Mr Sikkim title at the age of 40 years," he shared. He talked about his journey and various achievements in body building

and other disciplines.

A bronze medal in Mr
Pangthang bodybuilding competition in 2000 was the first achievement of Mr Bhutia. In his debut appearance in the Mr Sikkim contest, he stood on the fourth position in his weight in 2002 and then won silver medal

in his weight in Mr Sikkim 2004. Then he continuously won gold medal in his weight category in Mr Sikkim contest from 2005 to 2012. In 2009, along with gold medal in his weight category he also won the title of Mr Sikkim.

Mr Bhutia has also proved mettle in international competitions. In his debut appearance in the international strength lifting championship in Bahrain in 2015, he won 2 gold medals and the title of Champion of Champions in master's cat-egory. He won 2 gold medals and the title of Champion of Champions in 4th edition of the interna-tional championship at Bangkok in 2016 and again 2 gold medals and the title of Champion of Champions in the 5th edition of the international championship in Sri Lanka in 2017.

After passing the examina-

tion in 2015, Mr Bhutia is also an international referee in the strength lifting.

"Now after my voluntary re-tirement, I will work harder as a player to maintain my form and title and will more rigorously promote strength lifting mainly in rural parts to bring out national and international products from all corners of the State," he said. He assured to promote strength lifting and fitness among women to take them to national and international levels.

Mr Bhutia has also set up a gym in his native village Mar-tam in East Sikkim to encourage youth of the area in fitness and to live a healthy life. He is also organising strength lifting contest every year at Martam and has already produced national lifters from the area.

rejected as false and concocted as contended by the petitioner. On the record there is sufficient material to indicate the severe damage to live and property," it said.

It also took into ac-

count the number of deaths of several per-sons, including police officials, which was admitted to by both the parties before it.

It noted that over 300 cases were registered after May last year and Gurung was named in 56 such cases.
"Thus, FIR registered

at the instance of police leading serious offences involving petitioner and supporters of GJM, can-not be discarded on the plea that it was police, who has roped in the petitioner and other supporters by lodging the

FIR," the court said.
"No bias or mala fide has been pleaded against any individual State func-tionary or police officer nor any such person has been impleaded in the writ petition so as to

consider the allegation of bias. It is very easy to make allegations of bias against a person but it is difficult to substantiate the same," the bench

The apex court had on November 20 last year restrained the West Bengal police from taking any coercive steps against Gurung, who had claimed that he was being politically persecuted by the West Bengal gov-

However, the Mamata Banerjee government had submitted a list of FIRs lodged against Gurung and said that he was fac-ing trial in several cases. The GJM central com-

mittee had earlier sus-pended Gurung for six months and appointed Binay Tamang as the par-ty's new president. The police had earli-

er claimed that Gurung and some of his aides were absconding after being booked under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act in connec-tion with the violence in Darjeeling hills.

As per the directive, PW1100 engines are classified into two types or series of numbers, 449 and 450 and

The EASA ruled that engines having the serial numbers 450 and beyond had combustion and other safety

It ruled that across the

world, all A320 neo aircraft with both engines having serial numbers 450 or beyond should be grounded, while those with only one engine having serial number 450 and beyond could continue to fly.

However, DGCA's counsel

earlier this month, the DGCA conducted its own independent study and ruled that aircraft with even one 450 and beyond PW1100 engine should be grounded.

Nine aircraft belonging to Indigo and five to Go Air had one or both engines belonging to the flagged serial number, said Sethna.

"Keeping public safety in mind, we grounded all affected aircraft. The issue is being further examined by the DGCA and by authorities in the Unit-ed States where such engines are powered," said Indigo's counsel senior advocate Janak Dwarkadas.

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Sindhu enters All England semifinals after thrilling win over Okuhara

BIRMINGHAM, MAR 16 (PTI): Olympic silver medallist shut-tler P V Sindhu produced a top-notch performance to eke out a thrilling three-game victory over 2016 champion Nozomi Okuhara of Japan to progress to her maiden semi-final at the USD 1000,000 All England Championship here today.

The quarterfinal clash lived

up to its billing as Sindhu and Okuhara strained every sinew to dish out yet another nail-

biting contest at the Arena

It boiled down to finding the right balance of aggression and patience and Sindhu ensured that she had the last laugh as she outwitted Okuhara 20-22 21-18 21-18 in a battle that lasted an hour and 24 minutes

With this victory, Sindhu registered her fifth win over the Nagano-born World No. 6 Japanese, who robbed her of a World Championship gold at Glasgow after a 110 minute marathon battle which went down in history as one of the greatest.

"It was like the World Championship and Dubai Super Series match, not so long may be but it was not easy to play against Okuhara. We know each other's game so there were long rallies. We had to give our best," world no 3 Sindhu said moments after the match.

"We can't expect easy points, we have to strategies our game

focusing on each point. I was down in the decider and she was leading 16-12 like yesterday against (Nitchaon) Jindapol. So I am just happy I could fight back and win. It feels really great to be at the semifinal.

Slogans and documents do not make travel safer, better driving does

m ountain}$ roads are rarely safe roads, but that should not mean that consistent efforts are not made to make them safer.

Sikkim's roads are notoriously accident-prone, and not because the roads are treacherous, but more so because the hands that control the wheels are not always the surest. The State Government had moved a legislation some years ago which aspired to ensure that those driving passenger vehicles on Sikkim roads have the skills required to justify the task of ferrying lives from destination to destination. This proposal had sought to reconfirm the skills of people with taxi driving licences procured from outside the State. It is unclear whether this rule was ever notified or implemented, but had such an over-watch been undertaken, the roads could have become safer. This approach appears to be returning at the policy level again and the coming times will bear out how effectively it is imple-

mented and abided by.

For now, all that Sikkim can do is join the nation in observing Road Safety Weeks and play with newer models of breath analysers and more frequent checking of vehicle documents. What it should actually do instead is re-initiate a practice attempted for too short a time - also several years ago – involving the passengers. The focus here is on taxi services although even private driving needs special attention. Some years ago, following a slew of accidents triggered by rash driving, the cops had started a massive highway checking routine in which, apart from checking on the health of the vehicles, like the brakes and general engine road-worthiness, they enquired on the driving habits of the drivers. Passengers were encouraged to lodge complaints if the driving was rash.

Admittedly, Sikkim Police is too understaffed and

too busy with keeping city roads jam free to make such patrolling a regular affair, but it could use the surprise element to its benefit by springing it every now and

The monsoons will soon be upon us and although the landslide zones along the highways do not witness accidents unless slopes collapse unannounced, the delay caused while waiting the turn to cross troublespots and the anxiety of completing the to-and-fro runs or making good time over diversions can make driving on the rest of the stretch dangerous. All it takes for disaster to strike on a hill road is for the concentration to slacken for a split second. It could happen to the best of drivers on the safest of roads. If passengers are encouraged to keep the driving safe, the roads will automatically become safer.

With the tourist season and its tremendous demand for vehicles already upon Sikkim, what the drivers associations and the traffic police should also perhaps work on is a guideline which ensures that the drivers are not overworked. It is not rare for drivers to make multiple trips, stretching both, the engine and their own faculties, to dangerous levels. They would not do this if the rules did not allow it. A tired driver operating a tired vehicle is a combination that does not lend itself too well to safe roads.

These are some initiatives one hopes will be

SummitTIMES Hawking tackled the biggest question of all: how did the universe begin?

With the death of Stephen
Hawking, the world has lost an adventurer.

I was one of the many who first encountered the deep ideas of cosmology through Hawking's book A Brief History of Time, and found myself inspired. To his read-ers Hawking revealed a whole new world — showing how physics can address some of the deep questions of our existence, all the way to the deepest of all: how did the universe

Physics is often perceived to be dry and devoid of imagination, but as researchers we realise that could not be further from the truth. In research, we routinely throw assump-

tions in the bin, play with "what if" scenarios, and rely on insight and creativity to explore new ideas that could take us beyond the bounds of the physics we already know. Stephen Hawking was a master at this.

THEORY OF EVERYTHING

What made Hawking such a trailblazer were his attempts to merge quantum physics and general relativity.

The situation in modern physics is both pow

erful and dire. We have two incredibly strong theories that have passed every test we can throw at them, and yet we can't unify them.

General relativity is our theory of gravity, with thanks to Einstein, and quantum physics is our theory of everything else – in particular, how particles interact. Both have been tested to incredible precision and have become everyday tools. We use general relativity to make our GPS system accurate, and quantum physics is used to design key elements of all high technology.

However, we still have no theory that combines

the two, and this has perplexed physicists for a century. Merging the two theories engaged Einstein for the latter half of his life to no avail.

The quest for a quantum theory of gravity that an also explain the whole universe, is known as the search for a "theory of everything", or "ToE".

Hawking's most famous insight was to take seri-ously the question of what would happen if you took a quantum system and put it near the event horizon of a black hole. Even without a final theory of quantum gravity, he revealed that in some special circumstances you can calculate solutions anyway.

THE 'MIND OF GOD'

Hawking famously described the quest for a theory of everything in analogy to God: "If we do discover a theory of everything... it would be the ultimate triumph of human reason — for then we would truly know the mind of God."

He was forced to explain this line many times.

As a devout atheist he made it clear that he didn't mean we would understand a deity, but rather that we would be able to explain, using physics, the birth of the universe itself, and all of the processes within it, thus demonstrating there is no need for a god. In his own words:



God may exist, but science can explain the universe without the need for a creator

HOW THE BIG BANG BANGED

that nothing, not even light, can escape a black hole's gravitational pull. Nevertheless, Hawking discovered that black holes should "glow". The light they emit is now known as "Hawking radiation"

But if light can't escape from black holes, how

The event horizon of a black hole is the point of no return. Once you are within the event horizon you can never escape, and no light you emit will ever be seen outside. The reason black holes can glow is because no light actually emerges from inside the event horizon. The light gets created just outside of it, thanks to the black hole's interaction with the quantum vacuum.

This leads to another question, because another important rule of physics is conservation of energy; you can't create something from nothing. So in order to glow, the black hole has to pay a price, and it pays with the only currency it has –

As the black hole emits light it gets lighter, and the lighter the black hole the more dramatically it shines, which accelerates its demise, until it evap orates into nothing in an intense flash of radiation

As spectacular as that may be, it may seem a trifle esoteric: why should we care how black holes behave? Well, the theories Hawking was developing also have implications for the question of how the universe began. Hawking proposed a mechanism, through quantum physics, by which a universe could be born. In other words, he proposed an answer to how the big bang banged.

THE SYMPHONY OF SPACE

Hawking became one of the world's most recognisable physicists. His fame saw him appear frequent-ly in popular culture including on the Simpsons and Star Trek (where he played himself). Not only a superb researcher, he was a brilliant communicator, and this set him apart from his peers. His A Brief History of Time sold more than 10 million copies nd was translated into at least 35 languages.

One of the fantastic things about A Brief Histo-

ry of Time was that it made complex ideas simple, but also didn't shy away from giving the gory de-tails. Hawking showed respect to his readers and to haps having higher expectations of them than they had of themselves. As a result, he was able to convey a great feeling of the depth of thought behind the theories.

Millions of readers engrossed in his book left with a sense of wonder, even if they fell short of full understanding. Like listening to a symphony, you can appreciate the beauty and complexity of the music without knowing how to play any of the instruments.

Hawking played the symphony of space into words on a page, which left people with the feeling they had experienced something profound, even if they hadn't fully understood

BE CURIOUS

That Hawking survived until age 76 is truly remarkable

Diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) as a 22 year old, he was given only two years

Rather than being defeated by such a diagnosis he dove into research with an urgency perhaps inspired by his limited time. He determined to do something significant with his time remaining, and thus attacked some of the most profound and challenging questions in physics.

To the benefit of humankind he did not suc-cumb to the disease and was able to continue researching for another half-century. That he refused to let physical difficulties deter him from his life's work is an inspiration to us all.

He was also a real character, and is famous for placing high-profile bets on big physics questions (which he usually lost). In 1974 he bet that the x-ray source at the centre of our galaxy, Cygnus X-1, was not a black hole, but conceded the loss due to overwhelming evidence by 1990.

From our modern perspective it's astonishing to realise that all of his early research on black holes was done before we were even sure they existed.

One of Hawking's most fascinating bets was about the "information paradox". The fact that black holes can evaporate turned out to be extremely perplexing, because all the information about what went into them is lost as the black hole vanishes. In quantum physics you can't destroy information,

thus the paradox.
Although Hawking conceded this bet very publicly in 2004, most physicists would still argue that the answer is unresolved. Recently it has seen a resurgence of interest with the "firewall paradox" and Hawking himself was adding new ideas to the debate even in his last few years.

As we say farewell to one of the greatest thinkers

of our time. I leave you with some of his best advice: "Look up at the stars and not down at your feet. Try to make sense of what you see, and wonder about what makes the universe exist. Be curious."

With Stephen Hawking's passing, humanity has lost a brilliant mind and an inspirational human

How investigative journalists helped turn the tide against corruption in South Africa

Every year South African investigative journalists are recognised for their hard work when the winners of the Taco Kuiper Award for Investigative Journalism are announced. This year has provided a chance to assess the highs and the lows of our investigative reporting after an extraordinary year.

For the last few years, it seemed that the country was facing an impervious cul-ture of impunity. Many state institutions of accountability faltered, and corruption appeared to be undermining democracy and destroying the economy. But small groups of investigative journalists beavered away. They pieced together the elements of what grew into a remarkable story of a systematic attempt to control the machinery of state for personal gain - what has become known as state capture.

For some time it had been a back-and-forth of allegation and counter-allegation, charge and denial. But in the last few months things turned around with the emergence of a trove of leaked emails. These provided the hard evidence of the depth and breadth of the attempt to take control of elements of the state. Teams of journalists did meticulous and highly skilled work to mine the emails and weave together a full picture.

South Africa now appears to have



started - only started, as there is a long way to go - the process of forcing accountability and transparency on those who were responsible, and can appreciate how central journalists have been to this apparent turnaround.

I know of only a few times in the histo-

ry of a nation when journalists have played such a clear and crucial role in bringing a country back from the brink. South Africa's journalists were not alone in this. They worked side-by-side with civil society and the judiciary in particular. But never has it been clearer how important

a free press, skilled investigative reporters and the support of brave editors is to a democracy, its economy and the people who live in it.

IMPORTANT TRENDS

Some important trends can be seen from this year's Taco Kuiper Awards.

The major one was how much of this work has become collaborative. The collaboration has not only been in the form of teams of people working together. What's different is that the teams have cut across media outlets and types. This is an international pattern, as the scale and complex

too much for one journalist or even one

newsroom to handle.

What's also notable about the South African experience is that journalists from different newsrooms didn't just cooperate, but helped, promoted and protected each

Print and online journalists led the charge with the power of the broadcast media only occasionally being brought to bear. And most of the best work was done with the support of philanthro-pists and foundations, rather than in commercial newsrooms. This is a major signal of where South Africa's journalism is headed.

Interesting too is that although there was one big story, there was also a remarkable array of other investigative work. A science writer used mortality data to expose the problem that one in 10 bodies in the country's mortuaries are un-claimed and get pauper' burials. Another used sophisticated tools to uncover who lay behind fake news websites. And one journalist went in search of former mineworkers who could not be found to give them their pensions. He showed that they were easily found, and their lives would be radically changed by getting the money

owed to them.

This is work that changed the lives of ordinary people

RISE IN HARASSMENT

The last year also saw a rise in the intimidation and harassment of journalists in the country. This included violent attacks on reporters at work, threats to those covering contentious issues and the "weaponisation" of social media – the use of robots and fake news to target critical

Thuggish protesters threatened an editor in his home, and disrupted a public meeting of journalists. Fake news perpetrators targeted editors, and for the first time that I know of journalists took out a restraining order against organisations and individuals that were responsible for some of this activity. Veteran muckraker Jacques Pauw was pursued by authorities who wanted to stop him publishing and

The other negative trend was that a few news outlets were accused of promoting or supporting state capture, where journalists allowed themselves to be used by those who wanted to cover up what they were doing. This drives home, the award judges said: "the need for vigilance and the utmost professionalism to ensure that journalists build trust and credibility and serve the public interest – rather than narrow, personal or factional interests.

Textiles ministry pitches for GI tag for more Bengali sarees

KOLKATA, MAR 16 (PTI): The textiles committee of the union ministry of textiles has asked the various weaving com-munities of West Bengal to go for the Geographical Indication (GI) tag for Intellectual Property

Rights (IPR) protection.
So far, only three
types of sarees from
West Bengal - Baluchari,
Santipur and Dhaniakhali have obtained the GI

tags.
"We are asking the different weaving communities of West Bengal to go GI registration. Some of them are the weavers of Bengali Jamdani, Begumpuri and Bengali Tangail sarees which have huge export markets", deputy director of the Textiles Committee of the textiles ministry T K Rout

The weavers scarves and stoles of Fulia should also apply for GI registration, he said.

Rout said that once these weaving communi ties get the GI tag, there IPR would be protected and le-gal action could be initiated against those who were not bonafide claimaints of these textile products.

"Even the export markets of these products would be protected", he said. Rout said "GI is IPR which provides protec-tion to the products which have origins in a particu-lar geographical location and different from patents and trademarks".

It also gives protec-tion to those weaving communities from counterfeit claims by others, he said adding that the ministry was working to facilitate this process.

Nagaland seeks to have own land laws: minister

Court orders Pak govt to explain JuD, charity ban

LAHORE, MAR 16 (PTI): The Lahore High Court today gave a deadline of 15 days to the Pakistan government explain why Mumbai attack mastermind Hafiz Saeed's outfit JuD and its charity wing had been banned and their accounts frozen.

The court order came during a petition filed by Jamaat-ud-Dawah (JuD) chief Saeed yes-

terday, challenging a notification of the interior ministry of Pakistan to ban his social welfare activities.

Saeed filed the petition through his counsel Advocate A K Dogar. He submitted to the Lahore High

Court (LHC) that the interior ministry on February 10 had issued the notification related to freezing bank accounts and taking over assets associated with the JuD and Falah-i-Insaaniyat Foundation (FIF) under the Anti-Terrorism (amendment) Ordinance 2018.

The LHC today ordered the federal

government to submit its reply in court by March 29 on why the organisation and its charity wing had been banned and their accounts frozen, Dawn News reported.

The petitioner alleged that the gov-

ernment of Pakistan had acted under the pressure of foreign powers, includ-ing the US and India, the report said. He contended that Pakistan is a sov-

ereign independent state and makes its n laws to govern its citizens. He added that if there was a conflict

between the laws of the land and any provision of the United Nations Security Council Act, 1948, the law of the land

shall prevail, it added.

The FIF owns 369 ambulances,



helped 72,000 persons to charity hospitals and treated 600,000 patients

only in 2017, Saeed said.

He pleaded the court to declare the impugned notification of the interior ministry null and void with regard to taking over the assets of the organisa-

Separately, Saeed last week chal-lenged the presidential ordinance un-der which his group has been banned for being on the watch-list of the United Nations in the Islamabad High Court.

President Mamnoon Hussain last month promulgated an ordinance amending the Anti-Terrorism Act, 1997 with regards to proscription of terror-ist individuals and organisations to include entities listed by the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) - in a move to declare Hafiz Saeed-linked JuD and FIF as proscribed groups.

Saeed, who in November last year

was set free from a 300-day-long house arrest, has been repeatedly accused by the US and India of masterminding the 2008 Mumbai attacks that killed 166

Saeed was declared a global terrorist by the US and UN over his alleged role in the Mumbai attacks.

JuD is considered by the US and India to be a front for LeT, the militant group blamed for the attacks.

Age no barrier for Japan's grandpa goaltender

PYEONGCHANG, MAR 16 (AFP): At 61, Shinobu Fukushima is the oldest ice hockey player at the Winter Paralympics -- but the Japanese goaltender laughs off the suggestion that he might retire any time soon.

Para-ice hockey sees players with leg

impairments strapped into double-bladed sledges, and they then use two short sticks to zip around the rink and shoot. It is one of the toughest sports -- and

most popular among spectators -- at the Paralympics, and players are kitted out in helmets and padding to avoid injury in


But Fukushima, who is competing in his fourth Paralympics in Pyeongchang, shrugs off the suggestion that his age is an impediment to playing at the highest level.

"I don't really think about it," he told

AFP, after the Japan team lost 6-1 to Norway earlier this week. "I am just a player." He admitted however he tried to retire

on one occasion in recent years.
"I thought I wanted leave it to younger guys," he said.

Ageing athletes often opt for slow-er-paced Paralympic sports, in particular wheelchair curling, rather than the fast and furious form of hockey played at the



Still, Fukushima is not the only ice hockey player in Pyeongchang getting on a bit. At least four other players -- three in the Swedish team and one in the Czech -are over 50, highlighting a difficulty to interest the younger generation in the sport With only about 30 dedicated para-ice

hockey players to pick from in the whole tirement to come to Pyeongchang.

Now when asked how long he plans t keep playing, he replies with laugh -- until 101. His advancing years have made him mething of a star back home in Japan.

Fukushima lost the use of his legs due

to a spine injury sustained in a traffic accident aged 24. He first tried wheelchair basketball, before later taking up para-ice

He first competed at the 2002 Paralympics in Salt Lake City, and he has since appeared for Japan at three other editions of

His crowning glory was helping the side to win a silver medal in the Vancouver Games in 2010.

Still, Japan's ice hockey team have not done well in Pyeongchang. They have lost all four of their matches so far, including a 10-0 drubbing to reigning Paralympic champions the United States.

Player Wataru Horie said the disap-pointing performance was a sign that Japan needed some fresh blood in its para-ice hockey team, noting the average age of the side was around 42.

"Our average is very high, I am 38 years old, and I am one of the youngest," he said. 'We definitely need young players.'

Still there is no ill feeling towards Fukushia, who is regarded as a pillar of strength and support for the younger players.

Asked whether he gets teased about his age, he replied with a loud laugh: "Other players call me 'grandpa'.

Over the past year, US and Indian militaries participated together in three major exercises, executed more than 50 other military exchanges, and operationalized the 2016 Logistics Exchange Memoran-dum of Agreement (LEMOA).

Queen consents to Prince Harry, Markle wedding

LONDON, MAR 15 (AFP): Britain's Queen Elizabeth II has given her formal consent for her grandson Prince Harry to marry US actress Meghan Markle, according to a transcript of a meeting with her advisers re-

leased on Thursday. "I declare My Consent to a Contract of Matrinony between My Most Dearly Beloved Grandson Prince Henry Charles Albert David of Wales and Rachel Meghan Markle," the Queen said at a meet-ing of her Privy Council in Buckingham Palace on

Wednesday.
She said her consent would be "signified under the Great Seal" and entered into the register of the Privy Council, an ancient body of council-lors that dates back hundreds of years.

Prince Harry and Markle, who starred in the US television drama 'Suits", will marry on May 19 at St George's Chapel in Windsor Castle, a royal residence located west of London.

British law states that the monarch must give their consent for the marriage of the six peo-ple next in line for the throne.

Harry is fifth in line after his father Prince Charles, brother Prince William and William's children George and Charlotte.

He will be bumped down to sixth place when William's wife Kate, the Duchess of Cambridge, gives birth next month.

The Privy Council is a kind of royal advisory body and has around 400 members, including religious and political leaders.

Markle was bap-tised by the leader of the Church of England earlier this month ahead of her marriage to Harry out of respect for the Queen's role as head of the denomination.



Hope of finding any more survivors in the rubble of a collapsed pedestrian bridge in Florida has faded, officials have said. Four people were killed and nine injured when the newly installed 950-ton bridge at the Florida International University collapsed on Thursday afternoon. Rescuers worked through the night, using high-tech listening devices, trained sniffing dogs and search cameras in a race to find anyone still alive in the rubble. But they found no sign of life.


