Chamling meets PM, requests deployment of Central forces from NJP to Rangpo

GANGTOK, 26 JUL:
Chief Minister, Pawan
Chamling, called on
Prime Minister Narendra Modi today and apprised him of the latest situ-ation in Sikkim due to the agitation in the Darjeeling Hills continuing for about 2 months now resulting in shortage of essential food and oth-er commodities. He said that the State's problems especially with regard to movement along NH 10 have been further compounded by the inconve nience, uncertainty and risk to life and property of the people of Sikkim posed by heavy rainfall

and landslides.

A press release received from the Principal Secretary to CM from New Delhi informs that Mr Chamling informed the PM about how in the last 33 years or so 5000 Sikkim registered vehicles have been vandal-ized and damaged apart from the loss of lives of 50 drivers and passen-



gers during this period along NH 10. The National Highway is the only lifeline for Sikkim without any other land route access to land locked Sik-kim with neither rail or air link, he added.

The release further adds that the CM informed that the State has suffered not less than Rs 60,000 crore financial losses due to these bandhs and disruptions on NH 10 during the aforementioned period.

Presently, with the agitation continuing for more than a month, the situa-tion seems to be aggravated by the unloading of Sikkim bound trucks at the FCI or Oil depots at New Jalpaiguri and Siliguri by miscreants there in full knowledge and vicinity of the Bengal Police. Even ordinary passengers bound for Sikkim buying anything in Siliguri like vegetables and other items have

humiliated

their goods unloaded.

In most of the cases the Sikkim registered trucks and smaller vehicles for carriage of goods have been made to load and thereafter unload. Perishable goods like flowers and vegetables exported on the basis of their movement on NH 10 have already been ruined due to the restriction on movement of vehicles. Tourism in Sikkim has suffered huge losses due to cancellation of

more than one lakh tourist reservations this sea-

PATNA, JUL 26 (PTI): Bi-Kumar resigned today, citing irreconcilable dif-ferences with ally RJD over corruption charges against his deputy Te-jashwi Yadav, snapping an uneasy coalition cobbled together in the af-termath of the 2014 Lok Sabha poll debacle.

Kumar's resignation capped days of stand-off between his party JD(U), which was insisting on Tejashwi defending himself against the allegations, and the RJD, whose chief Lalu Prasad reject-

ed the demand outright.

"In the circumstances that prevail in Bihar, it became difficult to run the grand alliance gov-ernment," Kumar told reporters outside Raj Bhaan after submitting his resignation to Governor Keshri Nath Tripathi.

He did not rule out taking BJP's support for form-

ing a new government.
Prime Minister Narendra Modi praised Kumar for "joining the fight
against corruption" saying the entire nation supports his honesty, a move seen as an effort to reach out to the BIP's former ally. JD(U) had ended its 17-year association with BJP after Modi was nominated the saffron party's campaign committee chief for 2014 Lok Sabha elections.

"Congratulations! Mr Nitish Kumar for joining the fight against corrup-tion. 1.25 crore people are welcoming and sup-porting his honesty," he said in a series of tweets. "For the bright future of the country and espe-

of the country, and espe-cially Bihar, it is the need

of the hour to rise above join the fight against corruption," Modi said.

Kumar, when asked about the chances of his forming a govern-ment with BJP's support, said,"Whatever will be in the interest of Bihar will be done. Wait for the future to unfold.

Whatever had to hap-pen has happened. Now

see what happens next."

Kumar said his resignation was accepted by the governor who asked him to continue as CM till an alternative arrangement has been made.

"I tried to work it out....I did not ask for anybody's resignation...I anybody's resignation...I
just asked Tejashwi to
explain the charges of
corruption," he said.

The sudden devel-

opment has thrown the politics of Bihar into turmoil with no party having a majority in the 243-member Assembly. Kumar's JD(U) has 71 seats, while RJD headed by Tejashwi Yadav's father Lalu Prasad, has 80. The BJP has 53.

If JD(U) and BJP come together, the coalition would have a majority in the Assembly. State BJP president Nityanand Rai had recently spoken about the possibility of his party extending outside support to JD(U) but clarified the decision would be taken by its central leadership.

Tensions simmered between the two alliance partners ever since the CBI registered a case against Lalu Prasad, his wife and former chief min

Refusing to keep pace with everyday politics

SILIGURI, 26 JUL:

The choice was between ideological purity and political goal. The CPI-M has chosen the first, as a consequence of which, the country will miss the succinct reasoning of Sitaram Yechury in Rajya Sabha after August when the term of

the Upper House ends.
Conventionally, no CPI-M
member gets more than two terms in Rajya Sabha. Conventionally, no Marxist general secretary becomes an MP either. Yechury was already a two-time MP when he be-

retary. And that robbed him of a third term as the CPI-M Central Committee rejected his candidature.

Whether the step was re-gressive and yet another blun-der the CPI-M has committed ever since stopping Jyoti Basu from becoming the country's Prime Minister in 1996 time will tell. But, the fact remains the Left has lost its most eloquent speaker in Rajya Sabha.

Ironically, this comes at a time when the CPI-M is hard pressed to maintain its national party status or recover former jewel in the crown.

Intolerance and divisive politics are tearing the country apart, which makes proessive Left persuasion the more necessary in Par-liament to uphold democracy. Yechury's was one of the tireless voices that had lucidly upheld not just the Left's interest, but the larger opposi-tion's end in Parliament. The CPI-M, however, chose to sacrifice the pragmatic Yechury on the altar of political dogma.

It is this rigidity that isolated the CPI-M from national politics in 2008 when under Prakash Karat it pulled out of the Congress-led UPA-I over the Indo-US nuclear deal. The move cost the CPI-M dear both nationally and particularly in West Bengal.

In the political void thus created in stepped Mamata Banerjee riding the Singur and Nandigram upheavals and with support from the Congress and motley of other organizations ended the Left's 34-year old run in the state in 2011. Left fortunes in the state have been scraping rock-bottom since

was Yechury's in Rajya Sabha? That the Congress had decided to give up its Raiva Sabha candidate claim from West Bengal in favour of Yechury is testimony enough for the CPI-M general secretary's acceptability.

But, that very

weighed against Yechury's candidature beside the ideo-logical angle. Although the Bengal Marxists are amenable towards the Congress and vice versa and was open to Congress support for Ye-chury's candidature, the Keraany truck with the Congress, which finally prevailed.

A dynamic speaker,

chury can speak several lan-guages, is comfortable in both Hindi and English, a prerequisite in current national politics, is media friendly and can resonate with the youth – an ability the CPI-M needs desperately among its leaders to keep the red flag aloft.

Serious internal issues, however, are importing ques-tion marks against the CPI-M's survival as a key player in national politics.



The Ministry of Human Resources has approved certain relaxations as a one-time measure for ensuring that all vacant seats in NITs, IIEST, IIITs and other GFTIs (Except IITs) in North Eastern States are filled on merit basis.

A Special Round of Counseling is being conducted by Central Seat Allocation Board (CSAB) to this effect, registration and fee deposition for which starts from 27 July. With the relaxations in place, candidates who have secured at least 45% (40% for SC/ST/ PwD) in the 12th Class will be eligible for admission in Home State quota in Institutes of North

Eastern States.
The Ministry has also approved the conversion of vacant Home State quota seats to other State seats of same category. In case, any Home State quota seats are left over even after allotment of seats to the candidates of Home State eligibility. such vacant seats will be filled by the candidates of other states having same category on the basis of JEE (Main) rank.

CRPF 'improvises' troop carriers with locally sourced material

DELHI, JUL 26 (PTI): Facing a "tedious" process, the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) has taken to armour plating hundreds of its vehicles and troop carriers in Kashmir by "improvis-ing" with locally available metal sheets, concrete

vision that supports such practice, he has said that

and wooden planks.
The force, which has come under a spate of at-tacks on its convoys in the Valley in the recent past, had decided to ensure a partial or full bullet-proof armour to its four-

wheeled troop carriers.
But, the force faced a glitch, which it is now

resolving with a 'jugaad'.

"We are trying to acquire more bullet-proof vehicles (for deployment in Kashmir). Since, the rate of procurement and procurement suppliers is a through tedious process...we decided to improvise. We have asked our units to use local material and bring in local vendors to do the job," CRPF Director General RR Bhatnagar told reporters on the eve of the 78th Raising Day of

the paramilitary force.

He said that even workshops of the force are trying to do the job of partially bullet proofing the vehicles.

"We are stepping up our efforts so that our buses are partially bullet

the process of getting reg-ular bullet proofing for our buses. The improvisation is a short-term measure that we have taken recourse to," he said.

The DG said after witnessing these procedural issues, the government was "actively considering" to expedite the process, that will go a long way in saving lives of the CRPF men deployed in the state for conducting counter-insurgency op-erations and rendering law and order duties.

Stating an example, Bhatnagar said during a recent militant attack on a convoy in the Pantha lives of eight troops were saved because of a simi-lar improvisation of the vehicle that came under attack.

Unfortunately, we lost a sub-inspector in that attack, but the partial bullet proofing of the vehicle using a three-laver plating of metallic sheet, concrete and wood saved the day for us and there were no more causalities, the DG said.

The Central Reserve Police Force was raised on July 27, 1939 as the Crown Representative's Police (CRP) and at present, is the largest paramilitary of the world with a strength of about three lakh personnel.

 $U^{nemployment\ has\ a\ habit\ of\ remaining\ in\ the\ news.}_{0r\ maybe\ because\ it\ is\ on\ everyone's\ minds,\ that\ it\ appears\ to\ be\ in\ frequent\ discussion\ as\ well\ and$ through that affiliation, also getting mentioned often in press releases and becoming standard fare in political pronouncements. Meanwhile, the State Government started with a youth-empowerment year a little over a decade ago and has since developed the initiative into skill development which now has a directorate of capacity building dedicated to it, an institute and livelihood schools in all territorial constituencies. Scholarships are on offer, as are attractive student loans. In a scenar io such as this, the focus of those wishing to address the challenge of unemployment should be expending more energy on ensuring that the skill development initiative, the effort which makes the job-seekers employable, are more effectively carried out. Unfortunately, more energy has traditionally been directed at embarrassing the clutch of officers serving on service extensions. The aspiration for government employment is still so strong that these "extensions" still irk many even though their retirement will only open up a sliver of positions. But can one really blame the unemployed who still aspire for government employment at the cost of compromising their chances in private sector advancement or self-employment options? The salary differential is so staggering and the work ethic requirements so relaxed, that it is really unfair to shoo the youth away from government employment and have them pursue opportunities in the private sector.

But this, in a way, is a lost pursuit. There can never be enough government jobs for the youth hoping for employment and it is only a matter of time before government offices are slimmed down and openings shut even tighter. It goes without saying that when the crunch comes, the survival instinct will kick in and the youth of Sikkim will explore and attain new options and livelihoods. But why wait for resoluteness to evolve only when the going gets tough. Sikkim is undoubtedly among the few places which are lucky enough to have the chance of staving off tough times if they "get going" while the going is still good. Few regions have been as pampered and are as blessed with lucky breaks and opportunities as Sikkim is. For a State that has no politi-cal clout by way of parliamentarian strength in Delhi, Sikkim has had a good run with the powers-that-be in getting its demands met and problems resolved even in these times of absolute "sevaks" when larger states have been cold shouldered. Many opportunities have been created and continue to be offered. Even a cursory listing of new investments in Sikkim will bear out that opportunities abound in a diverse range of activities, from trading to academics to white-collar jobs. What is now required is for these opportunities to be seized.

Unfortunately, this is where Sikkim is found lacking. Opportunities require hard work for success. It is this drive that Sikkim needs more of. The technical qualifications apart, every job requires only a few more qualities from prospective candidates - diligence, commitment to quality and a tenacity to compete. The faster Sikkim re-discovers these strengths, the sooner the opportunities will start delivering. The Livelihood Schools, apart from the subject-specific trainings they impart, should also include sessions on work-culture and introduce trainees to real achievers from around them and from elsewhere so that they complete their courses inspired to sweat it out, compete, stumble and stand up again.

Is cancer just a question of 'bad luck'?

"DOCTOR, what caused my cancer?" For doctors, this question is often perplexing. Some of the population risk factors are known, but when it comes to specific cases, only assumptions can be made. However, scientists have a growing understanding of the mechanisms underlying tumour develop-

ment. Although some of these are rather polemical.

Two US researchers recently sparked controversy with their work on the role of "luck" in cancer. Their latest article was published in the March issue of the prestigious journal Science. The researchers, Christian Tomasetti and Bert Vogelstein of John Hopkins University in Baltimore, showed that the disease is less dependent on hereditary (a genetic predisposition) and environmental risks (such as smoking, or asbestos exposure) than on random mutations (such as DNA replication errors) arising spontaneously in cells as they divide and reproduce over the course of our lifetimes.

In other words, "luck" has a lot to do with it. In a

2015 article, also in Science, they had already studied the frequency of cancers in different tissues of the human body. For example, the lifetime risk of lung cancer is 6.9%, as compared to 1.08% for thyroid cancer, and even less for brain and other

CANCER IS MORE FREQUENT IN THE CO-LON THAN THE SMALL INTESTINE

These differences are generally ascribed to the greater exposure of specific tissues to risk factors, such as tobacco, alcohol, and ultraviolet rays. But this does not explain why in the diges-tive system, for instance, the colon is more often affected than other organs. In fact, the small intestine (between the stomach and the colon) is far more exposed to mutation-causing substances than brain cells, yet cerebral tumours are

three times more common.

This paradox also holds for hereditary cancers While the same genetic mutation is responsible for both colorectal and intestinal tumours, the latter remain far rarer. However, in mice with the mutation, the trend is reversed: they develop tumours in the small-intestine more frequently than in the

Tomasetti and Vogelstein therefore hypothesised that the cause for this may lie in the spon-taneous mutations occurring during stem cell division (undifferentiated cells). In humans, stem cells renew at a higher rate in the large intestine compared to the small, while the opposite is true in mice. The more often cells divide, the higher the risk of errors in the DNA copying process. This could explain the differences in the frequency of cancers in organs similarly exposed to hereditary and environmental risks.

TISSUE RENEWAL RATE IS LINKED

TO HIGHER CANCER RISK
Their investigation of the presumed link between the known number of stem cell divisions in a given tissue over the course of a lifetime and the risk of cancer in that area revealed a strong correlation. The higher the rate of stem cell re-newal, the higher the risk of cancer in that par-ticular tissue. This initial result, based on data from the American population, was backed by a second study published in March of this year, which found the same average correlation across 69 countries.

The researchers then proceeded to isolate the effects of spontaneous mutations from those of ronmental. They demonstrated that the majority of cancers are caused by "bad luck" – in other words, by random, spontaneous mutations. "Luck" even plays a significant part in cancers for which envi-ronmental causes have been firmly established,

like those linked to smoking.

Because these results might lead us to believe that encouraging citizens to adopt healthy behaviours, such as quitting smoking and eating more fruit and vegetables, is not as important as once thought, they generated considerable controversy. The researchers' data was even reviewed by a separate team, who found luck did not play such a significant role after all.

THE EFFECTS OF OXIDATIVE STRESS ON DNA


It's worth noting the scientific literature in microbiology, whether or not directly connected to cancer research, offers numerous articles on mutations and DNA damage. In an article published in 2000, American scientist Lawrence Marnett analysed the effects of oxidative stress (attacks on our cells by reactive oxygen species, or "free radicals") and found they were even more significant than those linked to carcinogenic substances. And, oxidative stress is not the only cause of DNA damage, as can be seen in Roel De Bont and Nicolas Van Larebeke's 2004 summary.

In an article published early this year, An-

thony Tubbs and Andre Nussenzweig highlighted that each human cell DNA suffers around 70,000 lesions per day. We would not live long if the body didn't have ways of correcting these errors, especially if they all led to us developing tumours. It's important to remember tumours only appear after several control mechanisms have failed.

First of all, the normal repair process of defective cell DNA must have failed. Then, the cell must be allowed to reproduce in a chaotic fashion, meaning the problem must principally affect the genes responsible for cell duplication, or those regulating it. The defective cell also has to escape its naturally programmed self-destruction (known as apoptosis) and the vigilance of the body's immune system, whose work is to eliminate foreign bodies and other dysfunctional elements.

Cell exposure to external or internal mutagens is therefore only one step in a long chain of failures



THE ROLE OF STRESS

At this stage in the discussion on the role of "bad luck" in cancer occurrence, it is worth looking at the particular part played by individual stress, the subject of my work Stress and Cancer: When Our Attachment Plays Tricks on Us (De Boeck). Each of the steps towards a cell becoming cancerous is sensitive to stress and stress hormones. Therefore, chronic physiological stress, which these days is mainly caused by psychological stress, can be considered a direct cause of cancer, I must add, however, there is still open disagreement on the subject. Chronic psychological stress does in fact accel-

erate cell reproduction, inducing telomere short-ening, the "caps" that protect our chromosomes from wear. This phenomenon was uncovered by the work of Elizabeth Blackburn, who won the Nobel prize in medicine for discovering telomerase. The more these differentiated cells multiply, the higher the risk of random mutations in their DNA In addition, the more differentiated cells age and die, the more stem cells will divide to make new cells, heightening the risk of cancer development.
But that's not all. Through neuroendocrine pro-

cesses, psychological stress also affects the oxidative metabolism, DNA repair, oncogene expression and growth factor production. It results in gener-alised problems linked to chronic inflammation and a loss of effective immune function, as can be seen in the studies cited in my book. The "bad luck" controversy surrounding Toma-

setti and Vogelstein's research provides new food for thought. They point out that, according to the British organisation Cancer Research UK, 42% of cancers can be avoided by changes in environment and lifestyle. In France, the national cancer institute reported a similar ratio of preventable cancers. The figures are both high and disappointingly low. Does this mean there is nothing to be done about the other 60% of cases?

Rather, Tomasetti and Vogelstein suggest ways to fight "bad luck". They advise, among other things, the use of antioxidants in cancer prevention. Given the deleterious processes set in motion by stress, protecting one's psychological well-being could

In Philippines, climate change and conflict both conspire against rural women

Heavily exposed to increasing incidence of extreme weather events, the Philip-

pines is among one of the countries most vulnerable to climate change in the world. Climate-induced disasters in the Philippines frequently disrupt fruit and cash-crop production, resulting in income loss and higher food prices. Over the past four years, weather events have cost the Philippine economy an annual average of 0.3%

Typhoon Haiyaan alone caused crop loss of 1.1 million tonnes and destroyed 600,000 hectares of farmland in 2013. costing the Filipino agriculture industry and small farmers an estimated US\$724 million

MIGRATION AS A COPING STRATEGY FOR WOMEN

Losses in rural areas, especially where there's ongoing armed conflict, are not just financial. Across the world, climate and conflict are deeply intertwined and their negative effects mutually reinforcing.

In the Philippines, this relationship is evident in Mindanao, a farming communi-ty on the country's southernmost island. Despite peace efforts to end over 40 years of social and ethnic conflict there, hostili-

According to research conducted by the

University of Queensland and Oxfam, the violence has particularly marginalised wom-en, from female farmers to the widows of those killed in combat. In parallel, the area has also seen an increase in both typhoons and droughts over the past decade.

Conflict and extreme weather have triggered social and economic upheaval in Mindanao in recent years. Studies show that a 12 increase in growing season night-time temperature in the Philippines can cause a loss of rice yield and biomass

Facing limited land availability and persistent poverty, agricultural productivity in Mindanao undergoing long periods of low production and food insecurity is

Because young women, wives and wid-ows can find seasonal employment in urban areas more easily the men, many women find themselves compelled to leave the area in quest of jobs that can help stabilise family income and mitigate poverty.

The outcomes are not always positive. In times of conflict and disasters, women and children are particularly susceptible to trafficking, sexual abuse, prostitution and what locals in areas facing scarcity call isang gabi, isang salop, exchanging sexual rs for food

In Mindanao and elsewhere in southern Philippines, the transit and trade of

underage girls and young Filipino children for the purpose of sexual exploitation, forced labour and use as human shields is on the rise, with an estimated 60,000 to 100,000 children linked to com

exploitation. NON-ECONOMIC LOSS AND DAMAGE

FROM CLIMATE CHANGE
Female migration is just one of many coping mechanisms that rural Filipinos employ to adapt to the effects of their changing climate.

When faced with prolonged droughts or typhoons, farmers in Mindanao also make difficult choices, such as skipping meals, selling livestock and taking out loans. Many families decide to restrict consumption of food by adults in favour of feeding small children and the elderly.

As the chair of the Climate Vulnerable Forum, the Philippines has pushed international partners to develop mechanisms that would address the kind of non-economic loss and damage that can result from climate change.

There is now growing acceptance that

extreme weather does not just impact tangible economic products that are traded on the market but also affects other, less tangible goods.

Recurring crop failures, for instance, have forced farmers into long-term lease arrangements and agreements with the private sector and traders, often at exorbitant interest rates. Other farmers have seen themselves compelled to give up their land, abandoning farming entirely

and moving to the city.

In Mindanao, people told the University of Queensland and Oxfam researchers that they now associate annual extreme climatic events with the loss of belongings, death of family members, increased hardship, famine and hunger and loss of livelihood and income.

For women, these community-level neerns are compounded by the specific risks they face during seasonal migration to cities. Fear and psychological distress are a growing presence in their lives. According to the research findings, all of these climate- and conflict-related

changes have fundamentally shifted values, lifestyles and gender relations in Mindanao. Such social and cultural loss often goes unnoticed or unaddressed in climate change policies and disaster assessments.

FOCUS ON GENDER
To help rural communities in the Philippines adapt to climate change and mitigate its negative effects, aid and develop-ment efforts should focus on improving the lot of women, particularly female combatants, widows and poor female smallholder farmers, many of whom face land-tenure problems.

That means stabilising the agricultural sector and fostering agricultural invest-ments, which in conflict-prone parts of rural Philippines cannot be done without accompanying long-term peace and rec-onciliation processes.

Given the local sociocultural issues

that must be navigated, the national gov-ernment is likely better positioned than international aid agencies to spearhead programs that would link peace, security and reconciliation programs to agriculture and economic reforms.

It is the national government, too, that must integrate risk-transfer mechanisms, such as weather-index insurance policies, into the Phillipines' existing public safety nets, subsidies and compensation

NGOs and international organisations do have a role in breaking the cycle of conflict, climate and gender inequality in Philippines. Access to micro-credit can play an important role in refinancing rural farming activities after disasters, and there's some evidence that such programs work particularly well to build community resilience when they're aimed at women.

New Delhi, Jul 26 (PTI): The Supreme Court today held as "unconstitutional" a 2004 legislation in Assam on parliamentary secretar-ies saying the then Congress-led government lacked the competence to

A bench headed by Justice J Chelameswar allowed the plea challenging validity of the Assam Parliamentary Secretaries (Appointment, Sala-ries, Allowances and Mis-cellaneous Provisions) Act, 2004 on the ground that it violated the man-date under Article 164 (1A) which stipulates an upper limit of 15 per cent as the strength of the council of ministers.

On January 1, 2004, the Constitution 91st Amendment Bill, 2003 was passed by both the Houses of the Parliament and after the President's assent, it became an act with modifications made to articles 75 and 164 of

Article 164(1A) of the Act stipulated that the size of the council of ministers in the state should not exceed 15 per cent of the total strength of the assembly.

"We are of the opin-ion that the Legislature of Assam lacks the competence to make the impugned Act. In view of the above conclusion, we do not see it necessary to examine the various other issues identified by us earlier in this judgment.

The writ petition is allowed. The impugned Act is declared unconstitutional," the bench, also comprising justices R K Agrawal and A M Sapre, said.

The bench noted in its judgement that at the time of the coming into force of 91st Con-stitutional Amendment Act, 2003, the strength of the council of minis ters in Assam was at 36 out of a total 126 members which amounted to 28.57 per cent of the strength of the Legisla-

in view of the mandate contained in Article 164(1A), the strength of the council of ministers was to be brought down to 19 as per the 15 per

mentary Secretaries (Appointment, Salaries, Allowances and Miscellaneous Provisions) Ordinance, 2004 was promulgated on November 3, 2004 and on December 29, 2004, the Act was passed and published in Assam's official gazette.

The petitioners had challenged the validity of the Act contending that the state was not competent to enact it and it was intended to "over-reach the mandate of the Constitution Amendment Act". However, Assam gov

ernment had contended before the apex court that it has the legislative competence to enact the Act and functions of parliamentary secretary were different from the functions of a minister and therefore neither the principle of collective responsibility nor the man-date of the Constitution was violated

New Delhi, Jul 25 (PTI): The future of Hockey India League (HIL) looks jeopardised after only five seaons with the organisers post-poning the next edition of the cash-rich tournament to 2019.

Hockey India claimed that the move to not hold the HIL next year was taken to review the five seasons of the league.

But sources aware of the development said the decision was taken after some cash-strapped franchises decided to withdraw from the event.

According to sources present during Hi's Annual General Meeting (AGM) on Tuesday, atleast three franchises were unhappy with the organizers and ex-pressed their inability to be a part of the league any further due to finan-cial issues.

"We don't know what is in store for the future. But some franchises were



sues and one more fran-chise has also threatened to discontinue participa-tion if there isn't a relax-ation," a HI official, who can't come on record told PTI on Tuesday.

"HI said that the

league will return in 2019 but the future looks bleak," he added.

HI, however, claimed that tournament will re-turn in 2019 with a fresh

organisers said that the tournament's Governing Committee, comprising representatives of HI and other stakeholders. have unanimously de-cided to schedule the next edition of HIL in 2019 instead of 2018 January and February.

Sister Nivedita's UK home to be honoured with special plaque

LONDON, JUL 26 (PTI): Sister Nivedita's family home in London, where she lived before moving to India in 1898 to set up a girls' school and help the poor is to be commemorated with a special plaque on her 150th birth anniversary.

"Sister Nivedita, the educationalist and campaigner for Indian Independence," is the inscription confirmed by English Heritage for the blue plaque to be unveiled on October 28.

The London Blue Plaque Scheme, run by English Heritage, celebrates the link between important historical figures and the buildings in which they lived or worked. Founded in 1866, it is believed to be the oldest scheme of its kind.

The Scottish-Irish social worker and disciple of Swami Vivekananda

began her professional life as a school teacher in southwest London and set up the Ruskin School in the area.

The school was to later becom the inspiration for her girls' school in Kolkata, then Calcutta, she set up in 1898 after accompanying Swami Vivekananda to India that year.

Born Margaret Elizabeth Noble, the name Nivedita or 'the dedicated one', was given to her by Swami Vivekananda.

In India, she served the poor in Bengal during the times of flood, plague and famine and was a very vocal cam-paigner against the partition of Bengal proposed by the British in 1905.

'We are happy that English Heritage is recognising her contribution in the areas of education and as a campaigner of Indian Independence on her 150th birth anniversary for the first time on English soil," said Sarada Sarkar, a London- based teacher who led the campaign for installing the plaque.

Later. Sister Nivedita briefly travelled back to London with Swami Vivekananda, arriving at the 21 High Street in Wimbledon on July 31, 1899. He stayed there for a couple of days while Sister Nivedita's family found him an accommodation nearby.

The house remained Sister Nivedita's family home until January 1902, though she had permanently moved to India.

The Ramakrishna Mission and Sister Nivedita's followers have invited West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee to deliver the keynote address at the unveiling of the plaque



Sikh man asked to take off kirpan in Aus bus

MELBOURNE, JUL 26 (PTI): A Sikh man in Australia was asked to take off his kirpan and "get out" of a bus when a passenger called police in panic after seeing the ceremonial knife, a media report said today. Po-lice boarded a busy commuter bus in Auckland yesterday after a passenger was seen carrying a ceremonial knife, traditionally worn by Sikhs

"We looked out the window and we could see and the police car behind us with sirens blaring and armed men all around us. One policeman stormed into the bus with a gun in his hand and said to the guy, 'Get your hands up so we can see them and get out of the bus'," New Zealand Herald quoted a witness as saying.

thought to be in his 20s. was wearing a turban and had a long, curved "swordlike" kirpan strapped behind his back on the left side, which the police removed, said the witness.

A police spokeswom-said officers were called after a member of the public reported see-ing a kirpan. She said the armed offenders squad was not sent and the officers were not armed.

Withdrawal of Indian troops precondition for dialogue: China

BEIJING, JUL 26 (PTI): China today reiterated that no mean ingful dialogue can be held with India until it "unconditionally" withdraws troops from the dis-puted Dokalam area and said Foreign Minister Wang Yi has authoritatively made Beijing's position clear on the issue.

Wang, who is the first top Chinese leader to have com-mented so far on the Dokalam impasse, yesterday claimed that India "admitted" to entering Chinese territory. He said that India should "conscientiously withdraw" its troops from the

area.

"The remarks of Foreign Minister Wang Yi are authorita-tive and has made our position clear. I don't have anything to explain," Chinese Foreign Min-istry spokesman Lu Kang told a media briefing.

Lu, however, declined to react to reports that both sides

China claimed it was constructing the road within its ter-ritory, and has been demanding immediate pull-out of the Indian

troops.

But External Affairs Minister Sushma Swarai told Parliament last Thursday that both sides should first pull back their troops for any talks to take place. favoring a peaceful resolution of the border standoff.



PM Modi unlikely to attend UNGA session in September

United Nations, Jul 26 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi is unlike ly to attend the annual UN General Assembly session here in Septem-ber and External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj will address the high-lev el session, according to the provisional agenda released by the UN.

According to the first provisional list of speakers for the General De-bate of the 72nd session of the General Assembly, Swaraj will address the high-level session on the morning of September 23. She had addressed the General Debate last year as well. The General De-bate will open on September 19 and run through September 25. All eyes will be on US President Donald Trump, who will deliver his first address to global leaders from the General Assembly hall's iconic green podium on September 19. The US is traditionally the second speaker on the opening day of the General Debate, after Brazil.

According to the list

of speakers, Pakistan s Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif is scheduled to address global leaders on September 21. Modi had visited Washington late last month for his first bilateral meeting with Trump. Modi had given his maiden address to the UN General Assembly as Prime Minister in

In 2015, he had attended the high-level UN Sustainable Devel-opment Summit ahead of the General Debate when the world leaders had adopted the ambitious 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Develop-ment, an intergovernmental set of aspiration Goals with 169 targets. He had also attended the UN Peacekeeping Sum-mit hosted by President Barack Obama when he had announced that In-dia will contribute an additional battalion of 850 troops for UN peacekeeping operation. The summit was the only forum when Modi and Sharif had come face to face during their visit for the UN General Assembly.



At least 10,000 people have been forced to flee campsites and homes after a new fire broke out along the French Riviera. Wildfires have already consumed swathes of forest in tourist-packed southeastern France in recent days, as well as on the island of Corsica. The new blaze, in the middle of the holiday season, is raging near Bormes-les-Mimosas, southwest of the popular resort Saint-Tropez on the Mediterranean coast. The fire broke out just before 11pm on Tuesday and burned 800 hectares of forest by Wednesday morning, with 540 firefighters sent to tackle the blaze. Around 3,000 campers were among those evacuated from La Londe, La Lavandou and Borme-les-Mimosas.

26 Afghan soldiers killed in Taliban attack on Kandahar base

KANDAHAR, JUL 26 (PTI): At least 26 Afghan soldiers have been killed and 13 wounded in a Taliban attack on a military base in Kandahar prov-ince, the defence ministry said today, the latest blow to struggling security forces.

The militants "at-tacked an army camp in Karzali area of Khakrez district of Kandahar last night," MoD spokesman General Dawlat Wazi-ri said. Afghan soldiers "bravely resisted", he said, killing more than 80 insurgents.

Residents in the area



described an hours-long attack launched by a 30-strong convoy carrying "hundreds" of Taliban who assaulted the base from multiple directions. Air support was called in, several residents told AFP, though that was not immediately confirmed by officials. The insurgents claimed the attack via their Twitter account.

The resurgent Tal-

iban have been ramping up their campaign

against beleaguered government forces, underscoring rising insecurity in the war-torn country throughout the warmer weather fighting season. Afghan security forces, beset by killings, desertions and non-existent ghost soldiers" on the payroll, have been struggling to beat back insurgents since US-led NATO troops ended their combat mission in December 2014.

According to US watchdog SIGAR, casu-alties among Afghan security forces soared by 35 percent in 2016, with

6,800 soldiers and police killed. The insurgents have carried out more complex attacks against security forces in 2017.

In April more than 140 soldiers are believed to have been killed on a hase outside the northern city of Mazar-i-Sharif, one of the deadliest ever Taliban attacks on a military installation. While in early March gunmen disguised as doctors stormed the Sardar Daud Khan hospital -- the country's largest military hospital -- in Kabul, killing dozens. (AFP)

Russia says US sanctions vote hits chance of better ties

Moscow, Jul 26 (PTI): An overwhelming vote by the US House of Representatives to slap tough new sanctions on Mos-cow is a "serious step" towards wrecking chances of improving ties, Russia's deputy foreign minister said today.

"What has happened goes beyond the realms of common sense," Sergei Ry-

abkov told state-run TASS news agency.
"The authors and sponsors of this bill are taking a very serious step towards destroying the possibilities for normalising relations with Russia."

The sanctions package -- which also contains measures aimed at Iran and North Korea -- passed 419 to three on Tuesday after weeks of negotiations, It now heads to the Senate before President Donald Trump will face the tricky choice of whether to veto the legislation, which has been opposed by the White House and considerably constrains his ability to lift the penalties.

If Trump does sign off on the bill then Russia looks likely to retaliate,

with Ryabkov insisting Moscow has warned Washington "dozens of times" that any new sanctions would "not go unanswered." But for now Moscow appears to be keeping its powder dry as it waits to see how Trump reacts.
"We are not giving in to emotions,"

Ryabkov said.

"We will work to look for ways to move ahead, persistently and consistently searching for ways to compromise of issues important to Russia and

Ties between Russia and the US plummeted to their lowest point since the Cold War after the Kremlin's seizure of Crimea from Ukraine in 2014 saw Washington impose sanctions on Moscow. Trump repeatedly pledged during his campaign to try to boost re-lations with Russia, but allegations that the Kremlin meddled in the vote to get him to the White House have made any signs of going soft on Moscow political-

Doval to meet Chinese President Xi along with BRICS NSAs

BEIJING, JUL 26 (PTI): Amid the Sikkim standoff, National Security Advisor Ajit Doval will call on Chi-nese President Xi Jinping on Friday along with fellow top security officials of the BRICS countries.

Officials here confirmed that Doval who will be taking part in the Brazil, Russia, India, China, South Africa (BRICS) NSAs meeting in Beijing will be meeting President Xi.

The group of NSAs would call on the Chinese President for an interaction on security issues relating to BRICS countries.

China currently holds the Presidency of the BRICS and is due to hold 2017

summit of the five-mem ber group in September at Xiamen city.

Ahead of his meet-ing with Xi, Doval is expected to hold separate talks with China's State Councilor Yang Jiechi to discuss resolution of the standoff at Doklam in Sikkim sector.
