CRPF faux pas has Sikkim aflutter

Sikkim Police was surprised yesterday by a communiqué arriving on its tables from the DIG, Central Reserved Police Force [CRPF], Siliguri Range, informing about deployment of a CRPF battalion in Sikkim because of "impend-ing threat perception in present scenario". This deployment, the rather vague letter explained, was required "to meet the emerging challenges".

Much as the Sikkim Police top-brass must have been caught scratching their collective heads wondering which "competent au-thority" was privy to information on "impending threat perception" or "emerging challenges" that the law & order agency here was unaware of, the letter leaked and trig-gered wild speculations on Social Media.

Urgent" and required Sikkim Police to revert by 5pm on Tuesday itself with details on the Force would be stationed and deployed.

There was clearly a misunder-standing, the kind caused by cen-tral agencies clubbing Sikkim with the rest of the North East and in-cluding it in the bulk mails for the seven northeastern states some of which are going to polls soon and where there is political uncertainty brewing.

While there is no official confirmation on this speculation, what has been confirmed is that the CRPF has since realised its faux pas and withdrawn its "Most Urgent" letter. And this within hours of the first letter.

The follow-up letter is just as vague and states that the earlier letter be "treated as cancelled and

no action is required please".

When contacted Additional
Director General of Police Sudhakar Rao explained that a misconception by a subordinate officer had led to the first letter being despatched and that the same was withdrawn by the CRPF DIG, Siliguri Range, when the mistake

came to light.

The ADGP also reassured that there were no reports of any impending threat perceptions in Sik-kim and underlined that Sikkim remains one of the most peaceful states and was in no need of deploy-ment of central paramilitary forces.



The State Government has decided to depute "pilots" (escort vehicles) to Cabinet Min-isters here. These pilots were seen escorting the vehicles of Ministers today. The decision, it is informed, was taken after security aspects were reviewed. This development was also mentioned by the Chief Min-ister at one of his public addresses recently

The Home Depart-ment green-flagged the provision of escort vehicles to Cabinet Ministers following security updates from the Sikkim Police, sources inform.

The State Govern-

ment had reportedly ac-cepted the recommendation last month and the

Home Department has issued the notification in follow-up.

As many as 12 new

escort vehicles with the prescribed police per-sonnel have been provided to the Ministers, confirmed ADGP (Security), Sikkim Police, who is also the spokesperson for the Sikkim Police. He reiter-ated that after examining all the security aspects the pilots have been pro-vided to the Ministers. Thus far. Sikkim was

the only State where pi-lots were not allotted to Ministers.

ICAR-NOFRI organizes field day and farmers' training on scientific pig production

GANGTOK, 31 JAN [PIB]: Vigyan Kendra of ICAR-NOFRI, Krishi [KVK] East Sikkim organized a field day cum input distribution programme un-der Tribal Sub Plan [TSP] project at Nandok village in East Sikkim on 30 Jan. The programme was attended by more than 30 livestock farmers of Upper and Lower Nandok

Fourteen crossbred grower piglets [Hampshire X Indigenous] were distributed among 07 selected tribal beneficiaries Under the same TSP project, the farmers were provided financial assistance for construction of seven numbers of low cost pig houses under deep litter system.

The programme was

chaired by Joint Director, ICAR- NOFRI, Tadong, Dr RK Avasthe. Addressing the gathering, he emphasized on the importance of the livestock sector for livelihood security of farmers as well as sustainable organic agriculture in Sikkim. He also added that mixed farming combining agriculture and livestock plays an important role in strengthening the overall

rural economy of Sikkim.

Dr Avasthe urged the farmers to adopt scientific pig farming to cater the Dr Islam further ex-

e State and advised to follow the scientific practices of pig husbandry as per the low cost deep litter housing technology of ICAR-NOFRI. He also reiterated the importance of scientific pig production in rural Sikkim for self employment generation.

The participants were trained by team of scien-tists from ICAR-NOFRI on various aspects of scientific pig production and management. Dr Rafiqul Islam [Senior Scientist, Animal Reproduction] elaborated about the housing arrangement of the pigs for rearing them at various age groups. He also discussed about the prevention and control measures of major diseases of pig.

about the comfortable rearing of the livestock in the adverse climatic conditions to produce in a stress free atmosphere. He advised the farmers to avoid breeding the female with males from close relation to avoid

problems of inbreeding. 

Committees Require Commitment

Their failure in basic tasks snowballs into across the board deficiencies

ne understands that agencies and committees in-One understands that agencies and so much mostituted by the government have only so much most in ratios after other tivation, leeway or even interest in going after other agencies of the same establishment when it comes to fixing accountability. But something needs to be done if such committees are not delivering even on the ba-sic task of keeping track or maintaining at least a semblance of an over-watch. The Annual Technical Report on Panchayati Raj Institutions and Urban Local Bodies for the year ended 31 March 2016 by the Office of the Accountant General (Audit), Sikkim, tabled in the Legislative Assembly during the two-day session which concluded on Tuesday paints a rather dismal picture of the functioning of various committees constituted for smooth function of PRIs. And this is not the first time that such shortcomings have been flagged. In fact, the lethargy enumerated in the latest report have appeared in past reviews as well, but either no one is reading, or more worryingly, no one cares.

So, the State Government has constituted a string of such committees and appointed/ nominated people into them as well, but there is a big slip between the tasked assignments and performance on ground. For instance, anyone who lives in rural Sikkim would be aware of Social Audit-cum-Vigilance Committees which, on paper, are required to ensure that works are executed at Panchayat level as per estimate. They should also monitor the quality of works and are to be comprised of a "wide spectrum" of stakeholders, users and marginalized and vulnerable sections of society including women and senior citizens of the respective Gram Panchayats. The Audit Comment accompanying the report on "position of functioning" of this committee informs that it "simply certified" works executed by the GPs "without exercising any checks". Adequate monitoring was not undertaken, hence quality of work "as envisaged in the estimate" was not ensured. As a result, the "certificate" issued by these committees were a "mere formality" so that payments could be released to the contractors. Then there are the important, but similarly inept Disaster Management Committees which have been found to be "largely ineffective due to lack of training or involvement as a result of which "victims could not be given immediate relief at the time of need". And really, when has anyone heard of the involvement of DMCs in the wake of any disaster in Sikkim. Sure, the district administration responds and delivers relief, but the disaster management committees surface only occasionally in press releases informing about meetings of drills. Then there is the Block Development Committee which might have a wider jurisdiction territorially than the Social Audit committees but that does not make them any more serious or effective. The Audit Comment for them refers to them as "largely non-functional"; this, due to absence of proper coordination among line departments, DPC and Block Office. And this comes at a cost because in its non-functionality, "identification, scrutiny, implementation of schemes and proper monitoring of schemes for overall development of the GP and Block could not be done".

One would have thought that the State Government's flagship CATCH programme and the State's Total Sanitation status would have provided the required impetus to the Village Health Sanitation Committees to be better performing. But even that has not happened for these VHSCs which the Audit has found "not adequately functional". Since these committees did not bother to carry out household surveys or analyse health issues and health conditions of the villages, sanitation facilities were not created adequately and community toilets were not maintained in hygienic condition. Everyone is aware of the result, now we also know why. There are, apparently, also District Technical Support Committees in Sikkim which are required to support the preparation of District Perspective Plans for each sector by coordinating with the PRIs and technical experts. What the Audit discovered was that estimates prepared by the GPs were not technically vetted by the DTSCs and this resulted in "deficiency in preparation of estimate and also execution of a number of works without preparation of estimates". The litter abandoned and/or over-budget projects across the state stand testimony to this. A frequent complaint received from the villages is of the lack of proper drinking water supply. Water Supply & Sanitation Committees exist for preparation of Village Action Plans deliver "source to mouth" water supply proposals. These committees have remained "largely ineffective" the Audit Comment puts on record but that is being polite since records show that preparation of proposal for submission to district authorities has not even been initiated.

In its recommendations to the State Government the auditors have suggested that utilisation certificates be submitted in time to avoid delayed or short release of funds; financial management be strengthened to avoid diversion of funds and/ or extra and avoidable expenses; programme execution be strengthened and dedicated and effective monitoring systems be estab-lished. All of these can be achieved if only the already existing bouquet of committees were somehow convinced to their basic tasks effectively enough.

Achille Mbembe on how to restore the humanity stolen by racism

A frican philosopher, Achille Mbembe, has gained an enviable reputation as a scholar that challenges the tenets of modernity. Some aspects of modernity Mbembe is known to challenge are characterised by the move towards more capitalistic economies, an increase in social stratifications and the universalisation of Western European thought. From "On Private Indirect Government" (2000) to his recent book, "Critique of Black Reason" (2017), his interest has always been on how the world can account for the construction and consequences of race and racism.

In "Critique of Black Reason" Mbembe challenges us to rethink the present with the view of charting a future that, according to Mbembe, will differ from the past and the present.

A key interest of the book is on how race and racism have played a role in how the modern world is organised. However much the world might have benefited from moderni-ty, what is unavoidable is the integral role of race and racism in the construction of modernity. This is why for Mbembe it is of utmost importance that we examine this aspect of modernity as it continues to exclude subjects and create new and old victims that are "the wretched of the

He writes: "race, operating over the past centuries as a fundamental category that is at once material and phantasmic, has been at the root of catastrophe, the course of extraordinary psychic destruction and of innumerable crimes and massacres."

For Mhembe, the construction of race emanates from the symbolic. It accounts for the ways in which subjects live and where they live. It explains the kinds of debates that prohibit - or allow them - to lead meaningful lives

AGE OF REASON

The book focuses more on how discourses of race and other differences emerged in the eighteenth century



during what is popularly known as the

Age of Reason or the Enlightenment.
This was a period in which a period in which philosophy and disciplines, and social debates, constructed differences between between people. This was driven by two factors: material interests and an unwillingness to live with the unfamiliar. Mbembe's book takes to task this idea of Enlightenment to show how it is responsible for the construction of race and racism:

"The Black Man is the one (or the thing) that one sees when one sees nothing, when one understands nothing, and above all, when one wishes to understand nothing."

This, for Mbembe, is not coincidental. This is because, "the term 'Black' was the product of a social and technological machine tightly linked to the emergence and globalisation of capitalism. It was invented to signify exclusion, brutalisation, and degra-dation, to point to a limit constantly conjured and abhorred."

Capitalism, from this perspective, is only possible because it's exclusionary. For much of our contempo rary history, this has been through

HISTORY OF AFRICA

Africa is the continent where most "black" people live. Mbembe's book therefore looks into the history of Africa and how it has been used, and abused, as the antithesis of Western modernity. Since the West depends on the "rest" in order to construct

itself, it is not surprising, Mbembe writes, that, "when Africa comes up, correspondence between words, images, and the thing itself matters very little. It is not necessary for the name to correspond to the thing, or for the thing to respond to its name."

This is because, "when one says the word 'Africa' one generally abdicates all responsibility."

And it is in this abdication of re-sponsibility that Mbembe argues for a different way of being in the world, and of living with others that are dif-ferent from oneself.

While, then, the word Africa might speak to a historical and pres-ent suffering, there is also something in the word, Mbembe writes, "that judges the world and calls for rep-aration, restitution, and justice. Its spectral presence in the world can be understood only as part of a critique

Mhembe argues that while race Mbembe argues that while race and racism still play an important role in the present, it is also clear that there is a "Becoming Black of the world" that has to do with the numerous forms of exclusion and violence that haunt the contemporary.

For instance, Mbembe writes, "If

yesterday's drama of the subject was exploitation by capital, the tragedy of the multitude today is that they are unable to be exploited at all. They are abandoned subjects relegated to the role of a 'superfluous humanity."

TO BE HOPEFUL

and to be hopeful, when it seems as though the history of the world is a history of depredation and cruelty? To answer this question, Mbembe turns to philosopher Frantz Fanon (as he does in much of the book) and writes that one of the important lessons that he taught us is, "the idea that in every human subject there is something indomitable and fundamentally intangible that no domination - no matter what form it takes can eliminate, contain, or suppress, at

least not completely."

It is here that the possibility of a

different future is possible.

This is because for Mbembe, "until we have eliminated racism from our current lives and imagination, we will have to continue to struggle for the creation of a world beyond - race. But to achieve it, to sit down at a table to which everyone has been invited, we must undertake an exacting political and ethical critique of racism and of the ideologies of difference..."

And that is precisely what this

In bringing together thinkers us such as Fanon, Aime Cesaire, Friedrich Nietzsche, Marcus Garvey, Nelson Mandela, Michel Foucault and many others, "Critique of Black Reason" is an impressive book. It offers readers insight into how the construction of race and racism underpins our understanding of modernity and there-fore of the world we inhabit.

More than this though, it challenges readers to undo forms of exclu-sionary thinking that still haunt the ways we live. It is only in doing this, according to Mbembe, that we can, "restore the humanity stolen from those who have historically been subjected to processes of abstraction and objectification.'

"Critique of Black Reason" is an illuminating and brilliant addition to Mbembe's corpus. It is the kind of book, I suspect, that will become compulsory reading for undergraduate and graduate classes worldwide.

Asia is set for a difficult year in 2018much of it centred around China

In 2017 we finally realised that the four decades of geopolitical stability enjoyed by Asian countries and societies had come to an end. In 2018, the major patterns that will come to dominate the region will become increasingly clear.

China and the United States

worked out a way to live with one another in the 1970s, and that paved the way for the region's remarkable economic growth. The US actively sought to engage China in the belief that Chinese economic

integration with the world would eventually lead to the liberalisation of China's political system.

But as Xi Jinping's first five years in office have made clear, that optimism was misplaced. A more affluent China has become more authoritarian, more nationalistic, and increasingly intent on changing the international environment to one it perceives better reflects its interests.

In his first year in office, US President Donald Trump surprisingly played a gentle hand with China. In contrast to this campaign rhetoric, his administration approached China with moderation, focusing principally on establishing a good personal relationship with Xi and trying to garner Chinese help to manage North Korea's nuclear ambitions. That is likely to change in 2018. As signalled

in the National Security Strategy and the National Defence Strategy, the US sees strategic competition among major powers as the most important feature of the country's security environment.

The active engagement of China by the US, even one tempered by a degree of containment, is coming to an end. China is viewed now as a country that seeks to mould the international environment in its own image. Expect the US to increasingly contest China's power and influence, both in the region and globally.

This is likely to take both military and economic forms, as China is increasingly viewed by the US as a full-spectrum adversary. This will mean some kind of action on what the US perceives as China's predatory trade policy, as well as a ratcheting up of military steps to push back on Chinese activities, particularly at sea.

China will not respond to the likely increase

in American pressure with equanimity. Indeed,



one real risk in 2018 is that China will overplay its hand. Its lesson from 2017 is that Trump is a paper tiger. Trump is perceived as being neither able nor willing to match his bombastic words with deeds. China could be emboldened to act provocatively because it miscalculates how the US might respond.

The disputed islands in the East China Sea are probably the most likely place for this to happen. The South China Sea disputes have a slightly lower risk in 2018, as China has largely achieved its objectives in that area, and while the US would prefer that this hadn't occurred, it can live with the consequences for the time being.

While Sino-American competition will increase the

regional temperature, it is by no means the only way in which great power rivalry will shape the region.

Last year's Doklam crisis reminds us that the

extensive border between China and India is highly contested. Expect India's ambitions and China's confidence to lead to further tensions in the Himalayas.

China was slightly surprised by India's response in Doklam, and will have learned from that occasion. When, and not if, China next tests India, it will probably involve a higher level of military risk.

In late 2017, senior officials from the US, Japan, India and Australia met, reviving the "quadrilateral initiative" of a decade ago.

The move is publicly framed as efforts to co-ordinate policies of countries that value an open and free Indo-Pacific. In substance, it is about collaborating to limit Chinese influence and sustain the liberal order. The "new quad" will take further steps in 2018 and China will respond in ways that will further heighten regional tensions.

This year will also see a further decline in the

stock of liberalism in Asia. For a period in the early

2000s, liberalism seemed ascendant. China joined the World Trade Organisation, democracy was on the march in Southeast Asia, and economic globalisation was seen as an unalloyed good thing.

No longer. There are no democracies in continental Southeast Asia. Rodrigo Duterte is undermining liberalism in the Philippines, shutting down a vibrant news website, and some fear that the martial law he imposed in the restive south may be expanded across the country in 2018.

Cambodia has stripped away its thin democratic veneer, while Myanmar's democratisation process remains highly limited. Even in Japan and India, liberal ideas are under challenge from thin-skinned nationalists.

In 2018, liberal ideas in Asia will face an in-

creasingly difficult environment, particularly as the geopolitical competition will encourage erstwhile champions of liberal ideas to put interests ahead of

values in order to manage that contest.

This year will sadly see the Rohingya crisis linger on, with insufficient political incentives for international actors to help end the crisis. The alignment of interests between the military and the government in Naypidaw will mean the region's worst humanitarian crisis in decades will continue

There is also a good chance that in 2018 we will work out how to live with a nuclear North Korea. The US will ultimately realise that it has no options for managing the crisis – or at least none that carry acceptable costs – and that a nuclear north can be managed. Indeed, a North Korea that feels secure may finally undertake the kind of economic reforms that its populace needs, and which could integrate the isolated country into the regional

Contested Asia has become a geopolitical and geo-economic reality. In 2018 we will see just how sharp the contests will become. The wounded nationalism of China, the erratic and unpredictable US, and the weak political leadership in many re-gional powers mean the coming year in Asia is going to be even more challenging than 2017.

CBI registers 30 more FIRs in Manipur fake encounter case

New Delhi, Jan 31 (PTI): A Special Investigation Team of the CBI, probing the alleged extra-judicial killings and fake encoun-

ters in Manipur, has taken over probe in 30 pending cases in adherence to the apex court's January 31

deadline.

The Supreme Court had on January 16 chided the investigative agency for not registering the required number of cases in the matter, as directed

by it earlier.

It had directed the SIT to lodge 30 more FIRs on or before January 31 this year, after the SIT informed the court that it had registered 12 Information ports (FIRs) till date in

The agency has now registered 30 more FIRs in the Manipur fake encounter case, taking the total number of cases to 42.

The top court had on July 14 last set up an SIT comprising five CBI officers, and ordered registration of FIRs and probe into the alleged extra-judicial killings in Manipur.

It had asked the CBI director to lodge the necessary FIRs and complete the investigation by December 31 last year.

The apex court, which is hearing a PIL seeking probe into 1,528 alleged extra-judicial killings in the north eastern state, had ordered registration of FIRs in 81 cases, but the CBI could not find enough material to register the same in large number of cases.

After going through the agency's status re-port, the apex court had on January 16 ordered to file 30 more FIRs in addition to the 12 cases already filed by the CBI.

Review workshop held on budget preparation of North GPs

MANGAN, 31 IAN [IPR]: A district-level Review Workshop on Budget Preparation of Gram Panchavats of North Sikkim was organised today at Zilla Bhawan by the State Institute of Rural Development in collaboration with Finance and Accounts Cell of RM&DD.

ADC (Development), while welcoming the participants, said that the first phase of the workshop on budget preparation has been completed wherein the Panchayats Accounts Assistants and other functionaries were given detailed training on the procedure to prepare GPU level

Today's workshop is the second phase and was organised to review the progress made so far and gauge the difficulties faced and see if the budgets made are in consonance with the prescribed guidelines.

The workshop held special significance as budget prepara-tion and timely submission by Gram Panchayat Units have been made mandatory and a prerequisite for receiving Performance Grants from the Government.

The workshop was attended by Principal Director RM&DD Kuber Bhandari, Additional

Kumar ADC Dev Tashi Chopel Lepcha and BDOs Accounts Officers and officials from SIRD and PAAs (Panchayat Accounts Assistants), PDAs (Panchayat Assistants) and VAAs (Village Admin Assistants) from various GPUs of North Sikkim.

Two GPUs from each development block made a presentation on the Gram Panchayat Budget estimates Receipts and Expenditure for the past three years and the present FY 17-18. The resource person pointed out deviations and suggested corrective steps to be

taken before final submission of the Budget.
Panchayat Account Assis-

tants were asked to present de-tailed descriptions of all receipts from various sources and expenditures incurred in various

schemes in the Budget.

Mr Dug Tshering Bhutia also gave presentation on the budget of North District Zilla Parishad.

Addressing the workshop, Mr Bhandari stated that Panchayat Account Assistants should work in coordination with other field functionaries and submit the final budget in the first week

India slips to 42nd place on EIU Democracy Index

slipped to 42nd place on an annual Global Democracy Index amid "rise of conserva-tive religious ideologies" and increase in vigilantism and violence against minori-

ties as well as other dissenting voices.

While Norway has again topped the list, followed by Iceland and Sweden, compiled by the Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU), India has moved down from 32nd place last year and remains classified among "flawed democracies". The index ranks 165 independent

states and two territories on the basis of five categories: electoral process and pluralism, civil liberties, the functioning of government, political participation and political culture. The list has been divided into four broad categories -- full democracy, flawed democracy, hybrid regime and

authoritarian regime.

The US (ranked 21), Japan, Italy,

France, Israel, Singapore, and Hong Kong have also been named among 'flawed de ocracies'

The EIU is the research and analysis division of the UK- based media behemoth The Economist Group. Created in 1946, the EIU describes itself as having over 70 years of experience "in helping businesses, financial firms and governments to under-stand how the world is changing and how that creates opportunities to be seized and risks to be managed".

The top three positions on the list are occupied by Nordic countries -- Norway, Iceland and Sweden. New Zealand is at fourth and Denmark at fifth place, while others in top-ten include Ireland, Canada, Australia, Finland and Switzerland.

Only top-19 countries have been classified as 'full democracies', while the hybrid regimes include Pakistan (110th), Bangladesh (92nd), Nepal (94th) and BhuThose named as 'authoritarian re-

gimes' include China (139th), Myanmar (120th), Russia (135th) and Vietnam (140th). North Korea is ranked the lowest at

167th, while Syria is a notch better at 166th place.

Top-ranked Norway has been given an overall score of 9.87 with perfect-ten scores for Electoral process and pluralism; Political participation; and Political

India's overall score has fallen to 7.23 oints, even as it scored well on elector al process and pluralism (9.17). It has not managed to score so well on other four parameters -- political culture, functioning of government, political participation and civil liberties.

"The rise of conservative religious ideologies also affected India. The strengthotherwise secular country led to a rise of vigilantism and violence against minority communities, particularly Muslims, as well as other dissenting voices," the EIU

This year's report which also measured the state of media freedom around the world noted that in India, media is 'partially free'.

Moreover, journalists are at risk from government, military and non-state actors and radical groups, and the threat of violence has a chilling effect on media cover-

age.

"India has also become a more dangerous place for journalists, especially the central state of Chhattisgarh and the northern state of Jammu and Kashmir. The authorities there have restricted freedom of the press, closed down several newspapers and heavily controlled mobile inter-

In the 2017 Democracy Index, the average global score fell from 5.52 in 2016 to 5.48 (on a scale of 0 to 10). Some 89 countries experienced a decline in their total score compared with 2016. 27 recorded an improvement. The other 51 countries stagnated, as their scores remained unchanged compared with 2016.

Almost one-half (49.3 per cent) of the world's population lives in a democracy of some sort, although only 4.5 per cent re-side in a "full democracy", down from 8.9 per cent in 2015 as a result of the US being demoted from a "full democracy" to a "flawed democracy" in 2016.

Around one-third of the world's population lives under authoritarian rule, with a large share being in China, EIU noted.

While the visa categorv used by numerous IT professionals from India among others was dis-continued in 2010, the applicants are eligible to apply for permanent residency in Britain if they meet the necessary re-

"Skilled migrants with excellent educational and professional skills are being refused ILR on the ground of 'tax error rectification' because of errors they have made in their tax returns in the past, which they have long ago rectified and paid off," claims Aditi Bhardwaj, one of the organisers of the protest.

Most protesting professionals, who are from countries outside the European Union (EU), claim to no longer have any ties to their country of origin as they have made their lives in the UK over the past many years. They are also protesting against the long delays in processing of these ILR or permanent residency documents.

The LIK Home Office claims it resolves all visa applications "as quickly as possible".

"It is vital, however,

that the correct decisions are made, particularly with complex Tier-1 applications that require detailed consideration and verification of evidence with HMRC. These robust checks are essential to avoid the potential abuse of our immigration or tax system. Where such abuse is identified, we will act accordingly," a spokesperson said.

He said America needed unmatched power to tackle these challenges.

"In confronting these dangers, we know that weakness is the surest path to conflict,



and unmatched power is the surest means of our defence," he said and asked the Congress to end the dangerous defence sequester and fully fund the

"As part of our defence, w must modernise and rebuild our nuclear arsenal, hopefully never having to use it, but making it so strong and powerful

that it will deter any acts of aggression," he said.

Trump also asked lawmakers to "end the dangerous defence sequester and fully fund our great military".

Sequestration is a procedure in United States law that limits the size of the federal budget.

The president expressed

hope that in the future there would be a magical moment when the countries of the world will get together to eliminate their nuclear weapons.

"Unfortunately, we are not there yet," he said.

Trump said last year he pledged that he would work with US allies to extinguish ISIS from the face of the Earth.

"One year later, I am proud to report that the coalition to defeat ISIS has liberated almost 100 per cent of the territory once held by these killers in Iraq and Syria. But there is much more work to be done. We will continue our fight until ISIS is defeated." he

He said the era of America's "economic surrender" was over and the US was seeking to enter into new trade agree ments with nations that commit to fair and reciprocal trade, apparently referring to China.

"We will protect American workers and American intellectual property, through strong enforcement of our trade rules, he said.

"The era of economic surrender is over. From now on, we expect trading relationships to be fair and to be reciprocal.

We will work to fix bad trade deals and negotiate new ones, Trump said.

Trump had earlier criticised the one-sided and unfair trade relationship between the US and China and asserted that America must address the un fair trade practices that drive the trade deficit.

Trump said his economic policies is resulting in new confidence in the country.

Despite his old age, the music leg-


end said his desire for sex has not gone away: 'Not to me. Hell no. Never. Uh-uh.
