Darjeeling situation tense on 53rd day of GJM shutdown

AUG DARJEELING, (PTI): The situation in Darjeeling remained tense today, though no incident of violence was reported since last night.

The police and security personnel kept a strict watch on the situation on the 53rd day of the indefinite shutdown in the hills, called by the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha

(GJM) over its demand for a separate state of Gorkhaland. A police contingent

was seen marching to-wards the Singhmari area in Darjeeling and going up to Patlebas, a stronghold of GJM supremo Bimal Gurung, from where a number of incidents of violence involving the GJM activists and police

have been reported in

the last two months.

The GJM and the other hill parties staged a human chain protest near the Darjeeling railway station against po-lice atrocities on their workers and to demand an immediate withdrawal of the forces from the

similar human

chain protest was also held at Sukhna near Siliguri today.
The GJM also took out

rallies demanding resto-ration of the Internet services, which have been banned in the hills since June 18.

The participants in the rallies carried black flags and placards demanding Gorkhaland.

Vijender offers to return title, wants peace with China

MUMBAI, AUG 6 (PTI): In an act of great gesture, Vijender Singh has offered to return his WBO Oriental Super Middleweight title to Chinese Zulpikar Maimaitiali in lieu of peace at the Indo-China border.

Vijender, a double champion in pro boxing, has urged India and Chi-

na to maintain peace at the border.

The 31-year-old Olympic bronze medallist's grew in stature last night by not just outslugging Maimaitiali in a close bout to annex the dual WBO Asia Pacific Super Middleweight and WBO Oriental Super Middleweight title, but by also urging for peace.

"To India-China friendship (I dedicate my title), because tension on the border is not good, because



see on social media, news, it keeps getting on and on and that's not good. I give this title to people, peace, it's all about friendship, Hindi-Chini bhai bhai," Vijender said during a media interaction

Vijender's comments came in the backdrop of the stand-off between India and China.

He won the thrilling 10-round bout by one of the closest unani-mous decisions 96-93 95-94 95-94 to maintain his unbeaten streak at the professional boxing.

The bonhomie between the two boxers was evident as Zulpi-kar hugged Vijender and made him wear his cap. Vijender also returned the gesture by offering his belt to the Chinese boxer.

Vijender said, "He (Zulpikar)

gave me that cap, he said I asked him for the cap and he gave it to me, I simply gave him the belt but he couldn't understand it." The Beijing Games bronze med-

allist admitted that he did not expect the fight to go down the wire. "The fight was really good, I

didn't expect (it will go all the way), it was 10 rounds, at times the Chinese products last a little long, it was an amazing fight and fun! The fight was tough and a lot of blood oozed out, but finally win was ours, it was nice," he said. During the fight, the southpaw hit Vijender below the belt and the Indian said that


he was disturbed by it.

"As you have seen, 3-4 times he (Zulpikar) hit below the belt and that disturbed me, that was a foul and the refree gave him a warning.

"It's painful and it disturbed your game, you have planned in the mind and when you get that kind of below the belt punches, that distracts you. He is young kid, strong kid, but it's all about winning," said Vijender, who was floored on numerous occasions.

Asked if he was confident of winning, the Indian said, "I am a positive person and I never think of losing, it's all about scoring and rounds, the first six rounds were so good, my coach (Lee Beard) was saying it's going round to round and winning every round (was important)." Vijender also said he wants to challenge for the world championship soon.

"Just pray for me, one day I will be a world champion. I would like to thank everyone who came for this fight. It was great to see you all," he signed off.



Demolish Stereotypes From celebrating a mythical event to making new introductions

 $S^{\rm ikkim}$ will celebrate Tendong Lho Rum Faat on Tuesday. The festival, always a very localized event, was almost lost and had become a reduced form of itself until it re-appropriated its position of significance with the declaration of a State Holiday, state-wide celebrations and revival of and patronage for the tradi-tional worship on Mount Tendong itself. Since then, the scale of the celebration has varied, but the mood and momentum it set off, has thankfully sustained This can be counted as one of the developments which set off the snowball of Lepcha nationalism (in a good way, and not the chest-thumping shallow machismo besetting the country at present) which has seen the community grow in confidence and pride over the past decade and a half.

This process of recovery should continue. The Lepchas need to rediscover more about themselves as a people because only then will it be possible for them to demolish the many myths created about them that even many of them had started subscribing to. Take the belief that Lepchas lack a scientific temper, for instance. What fallacy! Apart from the fact that hunter-gatherers, because of the very nature of their lifestyles, are among the richest repositories of traditional knowledge, there are also enough recent historical instances which establish the traditional 'scientific temper' that the Lepchas intuitively imbibed. At a time [in the 1840's] when the British were just discovering the botanical treasures that Sikkim contained, the Lepchas had already named all plants here and even fleshed out an exhaustive knowledge base on the virtues of every herb. The information that every Lepcha kid once grew up with could provide enough data for present-day academics to make a career out of. Their understanding of nature was so respected by the British that ever since Dr. Joseph Dalton Hooker endorsed their acumen, Lepchas became essential support staff for every botanical or anthropological expedition launched by the British in regions ranging from nearby South East Asia to distant Africa. And that brings us to the other myth that Lepchas are lost when pulled out of areas and regions they are familiar with, that they are not resourceful enough. Absolute hogwash! British documents record that the only survivors of an ill-fated mission to Congo in end-19th century were the three Lepcha "collectors" accompanying the expedition! Not only did they survive disease and violence that wiped out the rest of the expedition, they also made it back to Darjeeling! And then, the most common myth – that the Lepchas are timid and non-confrontational. The only general to defend Sikkim's frontiers successfully was a Lepcha. Till he was leading Sikkim's defences, even the numerically stronger Gurkhas could not make any substantial inroads into Sikkim. Fickleness is another character trait that is attached to the Lep-cha people. One only needs to ask the State Government and power developers who have had to contend with one of the longest, most consistent, protests in

State, whether this is an accurate description.

The stereotyping probably resulted well-meaning writers trying to romanticize their introduction to the autochthons of Sikkim in a bid to attract more compassion for them. Over time, unfortunately, even the Lepchas started believing these stereotypes about themselves. They have been delivering fresh introductions of late, and the process should continue.

Indian media's treatment of Gorkhaland stir is the latest proof of the tyranny of distance

THE PHRASE 'TYRANNY OF DISTANCE' IS A TOOL FOR THE GOVERNMENT AND MEDIA TO JUSTIFY THE DENIAL OF **DEMOCRACY TO A LARGE** MAJORITY OF INDIANS.

The Media Rumble, held at Delhi, on July 21 and The Media Rulliple, field at Dollar, 22, 2017, was a sort of coming face-to-face with what I assume to be some perceptions and per-spectives of "mainland" India's media vis-à-vis the Northeast. The tyranny of distance was definitely evident during the Rumble - so no, it wasn't by acci-dent that I was a panelist in the session, 'Tyranny of Distance: From Kashmir & Chhattisgarh to Northeast and the South of Vindhyas', on July 21. The session wasn't what I had expected but it wasn't a disappointment either although I had hoped to say much more than what I did, and what I could. And, what I had hoped to say was not about my experience as a media person in Nagaland but draw the attention of the national media to issues confronting Nagaland, the Northeast - particularly the demand for Gorkhaland. What I had hoped to say was to introduce to the national media numerous other issues that are so much larger than insurgencies in my region - about issues that spawn insurgencies and fan the fires of insurgencies. And issues so much more than the spectacular scenic beauty of our hills and dales, or the curse of floods and landslides that visit us every monsoon, or of the deluge of illegal immigrants and few such issues the national media somehow associate the Northeast with.

I had put down my thoughts in 681 words to in-

troduce some of the issues we feel strongly about in the Northeast, which doesn't seem to have occurred to the national media to focus on or highlight, even when it occasionally reports on insurgency-related and/or political events. You see, these do not occur in vacuums; after all, we too have centuries of history (and culture and traditions), which continue to cast their long and dark shadows over us.

And when newer histories, cultures and traditions started casting their long and dark shadows simul-taneously with the old, the result is an inscrutable Northeast - to the rest of the country and evidently to the national media. It is interesting, and signifi cant, that the perceptions and perspectives of the national media à propos the Northeast is strikingly similar to that of the governments at the Centre ince Independence.

This may sound like playing the victim but it

is actually an assertion that the present national and international scenario demand both the central government and the national media unlearn and re-learn about the Northeast. We are not just the gateway to eastern countries for Corporate India to do business with, as envisaged by the Act East Policy ostensibly - more importantly, we are the principal theatre of India's aspirations, and necessity, to be the foremost Asian leader - and, naturally a major global power. Perhaps because of knowledge-deficit about the geography, history, politics, economics, cultures and socio-psychological profiles of this region, Northeast's import to the Indian Union is not fully comprehended therefore in-depth study and analyses of our issues have not

So, what did my 681-word thoughts say? Here

they are:
Somebody came up with this poetic phrase tyranny of distance - and we immured ourselves to it. It became our comfort zone from which we justified our failures to uphold the tenets of democracy, of a free, open, tolerant and forward-looking society so today we find ourselves in the most em-barrassing situation of being the world's largest democracy but jostling each other to get a seat on the cart that would take us back much beyond the times when democracy and the idea of nationhood vere nebulous aspirations of this nation.

The tyranny of distance is a very convenient ra-tionalisation and validation of those in governance and the media to explain why the majority of Indians has been denied and deprived the fruits of democracy - why the majority of Indians still await our "tryst with destiny". It is the tyranny of our minds that creates distance within this country, not distance that creates this tyranny.

And so let us talk of the tyranny of economics, politics and the culture of classism and casteism that define and dictate the fundamental interface in this nation. Let us talk of the tyranny of the culture of building walls on the foundations of our belief-systems, which have set the trajectories of our economics and politics, our systems, struc-tures and quality of governance and the biases and prejudices thereof. Let us talk of the tyranny of this culture of majoritarianism permeating into every structure and system of democracy - not least the media, which unfortunately we have reinforced and perpetuated by being followers, not leaders of thoughts, ideas, concepts, ideologies and opinions.

Let us also talk about the tyranny of ignorance of the politics, the economics, the cultures, the ag-ony and the ecstasies of Indians living in the peripheries of the nation - and delve into the tyranny of disinterest to know us. Yes, let us talk about the tyranny of the politics and economics of our disenfranchisement, the tyranny of fringing us and the tyranny of not acknowledging our existence, our personhood. Let's talk about the tyranny of disallowing, thus disowning us from the table of governance and development. Let us talk about the tyranny of the abandonment of our peripheralised citizens to the tyranny of small town economic and political tyrants, who not surprisingly also double up as the repositories and custodians of regressive and repressive cultures, customs and traditions. Let us talk about the tyranny of the gun that threatens, kills and silences, and is empowered to rape the human spirit, brutally and repeatedly, in the name of national interest - which must necessarily make us talk of the tyranny of racism and the tyranny of corruption that breed in the polluted waters of unaddressed discrepancies and discrimination, as also in the contaminated stagnant swamps of

unresolved discords.

These are some of the tyrannies that the comfort zone of the tyranny of distance distance us from - to conveniently situate our justifications for our failures to uphold the tenets of democracy, of a free, open, tolerant and forward-looking society and to enable and empower all Indians have their "trysts with destiny". If we are talking of the tyranny of distance from the geographical perspective. with the technology at our disposal today, we really have no case - unless we are now looking at creat-

ing the tyranny of technology.

All travelers, to and fro Dimapur-Kohima, are forced to divert from the highway to the byways passing through numerous little villages where no

rice fields and what passes off for roads. Popping up and down like popcorn in my vehicle on these pretend-roads on my way down from Kohima the other day, while I drank in the elegantly insolent feral Nagaland, the theme of this session hit me. It then occurred to me that distance is not the tyranny but our fear, reluctance, refusal, cowardice and our lack of the courage of conviction to believe in the infinite possibilities to build roads to bridge this distance. These are the real tyrannies and ty-rants we need to vanquish.

While each Northeastern state has its own set

of seemingly unbridgeable "tyrannies of distance" that are so much more than the few issues we are identified and associated with by the central government and, unfortunately, the national media, perhaps at the moment what requires the national media's undivided attention is the "tyranny of distance" the movement for Gorkhaland is confronting. History, politics, economics, culture and plain common sense side with and support the move-ment of the people who live in the entire Darjeeling-Kalimpong-Dooars region, which history has tragically tied to the state of Bengal since Indepen-dence. Lives have been lost and life has come to a standstill because of the desire for a homeland - which must be underscored "within the Indian Union". Yet, neither the central government nor the national media has paid the attention this move-ment deserves. Yes, understandably, in the larger scheme of national power-politics, we the periph-eralised, we the disenfranchised, do not matter but in the larger interest of the Indian Union, we the peripheralised, we the disenfranchised, must matter for we stand in the first line of fire, literally and otherwise. Perhaps, more so the desired, the demanded, Gorkhaland - a land which has no medical and engineering schools, no central university, no institutes to impart scientific knowledge and expertise to develop agriculture and allied activities - in short, a land infrastructure and human development has circumvented. A land and a people, whose desire and demand for a homeland has been reduced to a mere law and order problem, whose issues and grievances are being dealt with the gun, like all issues of the Northeastern regions are inevitably reduced to and dealt with.

It is very easy, most convenient – normal – for state political dispensations to cite "foreign hands" when their inefficiency and ineffectiveness in governance are exposed - consequently development-deficit, resulting in protests against the var-ious dimensions of the "tyrannies of distance". It is also very normal for electoral politics to take precedence over constitutional guarantees, safeguards and obligations - for such has become the characteristic of the Indian polity. But these are the very "normals" that are the critical threats to the Indian Union - not peoples' movements and demands for homelands, which are upshots of disregarding constitutional guarantees, safeguards and obligations. India is a huge country, a nation that must contin-ually keep its tryst with destiny, which can be done only by bridging the tyranny of distance in the form of the tyrannies of insensitivity and majoritarian machismo. The national media must rumble to vanguish these tyrannies because the small people the little people in the country's peripheries need their voices to be amplified by and through the national media.

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How does a country become a country? An expert explains

Within the space of a week this autumn, the people of Catalonia and Kurdistan will be asked if they want to live in an independent country. If these two referendums result in declarations of independence, what happens next? It may seem straightforward that Kurdistan, Catalonia, or even both would become the world's newest countries. But it's

International law states that people have the right to determine their own destiny, including political status. Our right of self-de-termination is enshrined in the UN Charter, and clarified in the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights. This could be taken as the right to have sovereign statehood recognised by the international community. However, it's most often interpreted as the right of a population to determine how they are governed and who governs them. In oth-er words, self-determination in today's world most often pertains to choices within an existing country rather than as a path to new

This is partly because the laws on self-determination were mostly written during the period of decolonisation. That historical context cannot be ignored when interpreting their purpose. During that time, colonial powers were taking steps towards dismantling their empires. They had become expensive to

maintain and political pressure was growing

within the colonies themselves.

CREATING A COUNTRY

Another complicating factor in setting up a country is the fact that, for one territory to become a new state, another already existing sovereign state must lose some of its territory. That would violate the laws and norms of territorial integrity. These are some of the oldest and most steadfast rules underpinning the international system.

Recognition of a new state essentially means legally recognising the transfer of sov-ereignty over a territory from one authority to another. An international body, including the UN, cannot just take away territory without the permission of the original "host" state. To do so would be a violation of one of the de-

fining rules of the system of states.

Kosovo, for example, declared independence from Serbia in 2008 but even to this day it doesn't have sovereign statehood -despite more than half of the UN's member states recognising its independence. This is largely because Serbia still claims sovereign control over the territory, although other factors are certainly also at play. In the same way, Iraq would have to relinquish sovereign control over territory in order for Kurdistan to become a state.

There are obvious competing and contra-dicting legal principles here. In at least one instance, these contradictions appear together within the same law. Indeed, what we find is that there is no clear legal path to obtaining sovereign statehood. There is also no legally established mechanism for who determines whether a territory becomes a sovereign state. So we have to look at previous examples to work out how it's done.

The world's most recent states are South Sudan, which was recognised in 2011 and East Timor, which was recognised in 2002. In the early 1990s, there was a wave of new states due to the collapse of the Soviet Union and the breakup of Yugoslavia. In 1993, Eritrea also became a state after a decades-long war with Ethiopia, which had annexed Eritrea in 1962 Prior to that, the world's new states emerged out of the shifting or collapse of empires, most notable with the end of colonialism

For East Timor and South Sudan, and in many ways Eritrea, statehood was part of attempts to resolve another problem: violent conflict. In all three cases, the host state (In-donesia for East Timor; Sudan for South Sudan; Ethiopia for Eritrea) agreed to relinquish control of the territory as part of negotiated peace agreements.

All of these new states obtained sovereignty after the disappearance of their former sovereign power, or with the permission of their former sovereign power. What they all have in common is that they became states in order to resolve some kind of problem, meaning there was some international bene-

fit to their recognition. For the world's newest states, their recognition was more of a politi-cal act than a legally defined process.

WHEN IS A STATE RECOGNISED

AS INDEPENDENT?
Although it's not clearly laid out in law, a territory essentially becomes a sovereign state when its independence is recognised by the United Nations. As the largest and most inclusive multilateral organisation, its sanctioning of sovereign statehood makes sense.

of sovereign statehood makes sense.

But while procedures for admitting new members are clearly laid out in the Charter and in the rules of the UN, these rules pertain to new members that are already sovereign states. Yet again there is ambiguity in the process that aspiring states must go through in order to become sovereign.

Becoming an internationally recognised sovereign country is not a clear or straightforward process. In many ways, it is determined by power and the international political climate of the day. And a surprising number of entities exist as unrecognised states, many for

decades, without recognition of sovereignty.

If Catalonia or Kurdistan declare their independence this autumn, they may get sovereign statehood if their host states agree. If not, though, they could choose to declare their independence, and to exist as an unrec-

ognised state indefinitely.

UNESCO worried about world heritage **Darjeeling Himalayan Railwa**

New Delhi, Aug 6 (PTI): The UNESCO has cautioned that the damage caused to the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway (DHR) due to the Gorkhaland agitation may put in peril the World Heritage tag it earned in 1999.

Two prime stations Gayabari and nada were torched while an arson attempt was made on Elysia Building -- the headquarters of the DHR during the pro-Gorkhaland bandh that entered its 54th day today.

"The DHR heritage toy train is al-ready very vulnerable given the natural environmental surrounding and landslide and other disaster threats it faces. And, now this social turmoil has added another layer of vulnerability to it," said Section Chief and Programme Specialist for Culture at UNESCO New Delhi Office Moe Chiba.

"We are very worried about the DHR as after the UNESCO tag, it is a heritage symbol of outstanding universal value.

And with all the damage caused

to it during the strike, the World Heritage status enjoyed by it, may come up for review in the next World Her-

Indian Railways and UNESCO are currently working on preparing a Com-prehensive Conservation Management Plan (CCMP) for the DHR, work on

An office for the CCMP, with a team of experts, was set up in June last year in a room of the 1896-built Kurseong Station that falls midway on the 88-km-long narrow-gauge railway network between New Jalpaiguri and Darieeling.

The ongoing agitation for a separate Gorkhaland has halted the project operation in the hill town and UNESCO has opened a temporary of-fice for it in its headquarters premises in Delhi.

"Around June 8, the stir began in Darjeeling and we continued for a few days but finally, the situation became difficult and on June 12, we closed our CCMP project office in Kurseong.

"We evacuated our staff and asked them to go back to their hometowns and work from there and later set up a CCMP office at the UNESCO Office in Chanakyapuri," Chiba said, adding, "as soon as the area is made age caused to this World Heritage"

tect Aishwarya Tipnis, part of the CCMP project team, said DHR was inscribed in the UNESCO list nearly 20 years ago, and it is "Asia's first industrial heritage site to earn the coveted tag".

"DHR is a complex cultural land-

scape, which impacts the everyday life of a large population. And, the unfortunate events of deliberate damage caused by arson attacks on Sonada, Gayabari stations and 'Elvsia' brings to light an important question regarding the protection of world heritage sites in conflict situations in our country," Tipnis told PTI.

"We are very hopeful that the situa tion normalises soon enough," she said.

After DHR, the Nilgiri Mountain Railway (NMR) and the Kalka-Shimla Railway (KSR) were successively accorded the UNESCO tag, and the three have been collectively designated as the Mountain Railways of India.

The only other railway property which enjoys the World Heritage sta-tus in India is colonial-era Victoria

Terminus) station in Mumbai.

"The objective of the CCMP is to provide a framework for management of the world heritage site with the various stakeholders -- the railways, local administration, civic bodies, NGOs, tour operators -- and people in general and an idea to collaboratively work towards its preservation and development by defining roles and responsibilities," Tipnis said.

According to the architect, if the

DHR model of preservation goes as it is being planned, it will become a "yardstick of conservation" for various other projects in the field.

Chiba said proper guidelines will be prepared for maintenance of DHR, its vintage steam locomotives, machinery and historic stations and other buildings, and other conserva-

tion-related aspects.

Tipnis, who is a heritage consultation expert in the multi-disciplinary team said the CCMP is also preparing a conservation strategy for restoration of Ghoom Station, which house a museum.

"The work includes documenta-tion, mapping, condition assessment

and conservation strategy. The DHR is country's pride, and a proper conservation plan will go a long away in preserving it for posterity," she said. Set up in 1881, the DHR is ad-

ministered by the Guwahati-based Northeast Frontier Railway (NFR). The Darjeeling Himalayan Railway Co. remained effective until it was taken over by the Government of India on October 20, 1948.

Throughout that period, Gil-nders Artbuthnot & Co., one of the oldest managing houses in Calcutta, handled its financial, legal and purchasing interests, according to official website of the DHR.

Asked if the damaged stations and buildings of the DHR can be restored, Tipnis said, "Yes we have all the drawings and data and we should be able to restore them. However we need to make an assessment

of the damage as soon as we can."

The indefinite strike has para lysed normal life in Darieeling and cries for separate Gorkhaland have replaced the whistling sound of the chugging steam engines that other-wise echo through the picturesque hills and tea gardens.

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Ivory skeleton for **Travancore** king to study anatomy

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, AUG 6 (PTI): At a time when western treatment methods were not popular here, a ruler of the erstwhile princely state of Travancore got a human skeleton carved out of ivory to study anatomy and osteology over a century ago.

social customs barred him from "touching" corpses and bones, Uthram Thirunal Mar-thanda Varma, the then King, who had a great affinity for English medi-cines and treatment system, got the replica of human skeleton made from ivory in 1853.

Created by a craftsman from Travancore, the skeleton, having astonishing similarity with original human skeleton and impeccable perfection in its measures, is now kept on display at the Natural History Museum on the zoo campus

here. Museum authorities say that a research is underway to ascertain the identity of the skilled craftsman who carved the ivory skeleton with "so much precision and still remains an unsung hero in the

annals of history".

The museum's records showed that the model was "executed in 1853 by local workmen under commands of His Highness Uthram Thirunal Marthanda Var-ma Maharaja for scientific study".

The younger brother of visionary King Swathy Thirunal, Uthram Thirunal, who had ruled Travancore during AD 1846-60, had a great fancy for the European style, fashion, dress, occupation, furniture, amuse treatment system since

infancy.

According to historian Malayinkeezhu Gonalakrishnan the ivory skeleton can be viewed as a monument of the evolution and spread of the English treatment system and medicines in

the tiny princely state.

It can also be viewed as a fine example of Travancore's exemplary legacy in ivory craftsmanship which had even amused the British, he said.

No hooray in Bolt's last hurrah! winner Gatlin booed

LONDON, AUG 6 (PTI): The immortalised Usain Bolt left the scene a mortal after all. When the world was about to exhaust its stock of superlatives of all manner to adorn the Jamaican sprint king, athletics' greatest pantomime villain, Justin Gatlin, came to its 'rescue' by gatecrashing Bolt's farewell competitive dash in 100m.

At the end of one of the most anticipated World Championships 100m final, the scoreboard at the Olympic Stadium flashed that Gatlin had taken gold in 9.92sec 0.02 clear of American Christian Coleman, who took silver, and Bolt who claimed bronze a further 0.01sec behind

Albeit a bit late, it was a sort of 'proof' that Bolt, who have produced superhuman feats that the world had come to take for granted, is, human after all, having once prompt-ing scientists to claim, after studies, that he ran faster

than a speeding bullet train.

At the end of it, Gatlin won, was booed: Bolt did not lose: chants of 'Usain Bolt Usain Bolt' reverberated across the stadium as he quit a sport

in peril for long.
Running in his last individual competitive race, the 30- year-old Bolt could not recover from a poor start as he crossed the finishing line



ning silence of a full capacity stadium on the second day of the competitions.

Bolt, who is expected to be nart of the Jamaican defence of the 4x100m relay title on August 12, was the second worse off the blocks in the eight-man field at 0.183 seconds while Coleman had the best at 0.123 seconds and second best at 0.123 seconds.

The towering Bolt was un-usually too far behind Gatlin and Coleman.

He never had a great start throughout his illustrious career, but athletics fans around the world got used to watch-ing him close in on the more explosive starters before pulling away from them race after race for nearly a decade.

But this time, in his farewell race, the moment of blinding light was missing.

It was not a perfect ending for Bolt, the greatest sprinter of all time, at a venue where he had won three gold medals in the 2012 Olympics as Gatlin tore apart his farewell script.

The 35-year-old American, who was banned twice early in his career for doping offences, is not among the fans' favourites.

Bolt had never previously lost a World Championships 100m final he had started, with the only blemish being his false start in Daegu in

As he got beaten, the facial expression told everything and he was seen gesturing to the crowd that he could not win this time. Once the timings flashed at the giant scoreboard, he regained his composure and clapped towards the crowd. He hugged Gatlin, Coleman, and then headed for a lap of honour to thank the

"This place is wonderful and I appreciate this crowd so much. It is just one of those things. Thank you to London for all your love and appreciation." Bolt said.

"It (the atmosphere) was wonderful. I knew they would come out. I'm just disappoint-ed I couldn't do better for them but that's how it goes sometimes. The support has been outstanding throughout the years."

Talking about the poor start, Bolt said, "My start is killing me. Normally it gets better during the rounds but it didn't come together. And that is what killed me. I felt it was there.

"It was rough. A little bit stressed. But I came out like at any other championships and I did my best. Thanks for the support. I could never expect this from any other crowd. They are what pushed me to do my best."

Despite struggling for fitness and form in his valedictory season. Bolt had still been favourite to secure his 20th global gold. He has already won eight Olympic and 11 World Championships gold. He has been grappling with a back problem this

ond only once this year before London -- in the Monaco leg of Diamond League Meeting series on July 21.

Gatlin was booed all through the championships -- in the heat, in the semifinal and again in the final, his doping past making him the villain of a troubled sport. But, after taking his revenge on Bolt in a spectacular fashion, he, for once, put a finger to his

Bolt took a lap of honour with crowd chanting 'Usain Bolt! Usain Bolt!' while Gatlin lied down the track. The American seemed to be laugh ing and crying at the same

After removing the run-ning shoes, he draped himself with the American flag and quietly disappeared.
Gatlin, Olympic

Gatlin, Olympic 100m champion in 2004 and double world champion in 2005, had served two doping bans. After his second positive test, for testosterone in 2006, he avoided a life ban after cooperating with the authorities, accepting an eight- year sus pension that was reduced to

four on appeal.

"It's just so surreal right now - I jumped in the crowd and went wild. Usain has accomplished so much in our sport and inspired others like Coleman to come out and

On Bolt, he said, "We're rivals on the track and we've had a rivalry on the track throughout the years but in the warm-up area we were joking and having a good time and he said to me 'congrat-ulations, you work hard for this, and you don't deserve all

"So I think for all that and inspiring throughout my career he's an amazing man."

Blue Whale: Underground, unknown and dangerous

New Delhi, Aug 6 (PTI): Despite demands for a ban on a game that is believed to have pushed a 14-year-old Mumbai boy to suicide, it may not be possible to bar the Blue Whale Challenge, an Internet expert said.

The ban issue was recently raised in the Maharashtra assembly and in the Rajya Sabha by members who called for provisions to remove such games from websites.

But the Challenge is not a

game that can be downloaded on a phone or a website and therefore banned, Udbhav Tiwari from Centre of Internet and Society here said.

"Since there is no application or one specific website for the challenge, it can't really be banned -- not unless you completely ban the internet,

Tiwari told PTI.

Efforts by PTI to locate the game -- on Play Store and a series of websites -- yield-ed no results. The challenge can only be undertaken when its creators get in touch with would- be users.

All downloads for Blue Whale led to children's games that require an ani-mated whale to cross various

Another Blue Whale challenge game, the link for which was provided to PTI by a cvber security expert, turned out to be a positive alternative for the notorious challenge. with players being asked to take part in motivational tasks such as doing push ups. The game ends with a message telling players that their life is precious.

But the deadly Blue Whale is a 50-day-challenge, which is believed to have originated Russia and claimed over 130 lives across Russia and the Central Asian countries of Kazakhstan and Kyrgyzstan, where it is said to be trending.

Mumbai boy Manpreet Sa-hani, who allegedly jumped from the terrace of his seven-storey building on July 30, could be the challenge's first victim in India.

The game gives a task a y -- each one potentially fatal -- to the player for 50 days.

The tasks range from "carve with a razor 'f57' on your hand", and "wake up at 4.20 am and watch psychedelic and scary videos that the curator sends" in the initial days, to going to the "rail



tracks at 4.20 am", "not talking to anyone else", and finally "jumping off a high building to take your own life" on the 50th day.

Driven by a series of hashtags connected with the game, the curators apparentspot their victims based on their posts on different online

"The administrators of the challenge use different online forums to reach out to their victims. It can be Instagram, Facebook, WhatsApp or any other online forum," Tiwari

For instance, a journalist from NB Bishkek news (Kvrgystan) writes in a personal account on the website about registering on Instagram as a teenage girl, and then making

"a couple of naive posts, depressive photos" and specific tags.

"After a day, they knocked on my face. - Are you in Game? Yes," the journalist writes on NB Bishkek news.

What would make a teenager seek out this challenge in the first place? Psychiatrist Sameer Malhotra explained that they were at an "impressionable" age, where "valida-tion from the world around" seemed imperative to them.

"For them, the external environment becomes a source of inspiration, which is why they are willing to do any thing to prove/justify/live up to a certain image," he said.

There was also an increase in risk taking behaviour during adolescence. Dr Malhotra from

Health and Behavioural Sciences at Max Super Speciality Hospital here said. "People in such situations

and with such vulnerable behavioural patterns often lose control, resulting in self harm," he said.

Those participants who might have expressed a desire to quit the "game" midway were apparently threatened.

A February report by Ra-dio Free Europe/Radio Liberty, a US government-funded broadcasting organisation, said one of their correspondents who had signed up for the challenge as a 15-year old asked what would happen if she wanted to get out.

The curator replied, "I ve all your information. They will come after you."

Tiwari advised parents to use online tools to regulate surfing to keep an eye on chil-

dren's Internet activities.

"It's not possible to keep children away from the internet today. The best thing to do is keep an eye on the websites they surf, the content they are

looking up on Google," he said. Mumbai-based psychologist Harish Shetty called for "gadget hygiene".

"There should be rationing of the gadget time by keeping a watch on what children do and don't. Parents should ask the children to play with their hands and legs and not with their fingers," he said.

Instagram and Facebook have come up with measures where a user is directed to a help page when they search for hashtags related to the blue whale challenge.

"Posts with words or tags you're searching for often encourage behavior that can cause harm and even lead to death. If you're going through something difficult, we'd like to help," reads the page on Instagram.

It gives a user three options -- "Talk to a friend", "Contact a helpline" and "Get tips and support".

Investigators in the West are hoping to zero in on the people behind the game.

One of its founders is believed to be a 22-year-old Russian, Filipp Budeikin, who was arrested last November for allegedly inciting teenagers to take their lives.

He had reportedly said the challenge aimed at "cleansing society" by eliminating "people who are worthless".

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New Venezuela assembly fires dissenting attorney general

CARACAS, AUG 5 (AFP): A new assembly loval to President Nicolas Maduro fired Venezuela's attorney general, a vociferous crit-ic, in its first working ses-sion today, bolstering criticism it is acting to create a "dictatorship." The body, the Constit-

uent Assembly, made the sacking its first order of business since a widely condemned election week ago. It also said the ousted chief prosecutor, Luisa Ortega, will face trial for "irregularities" while in office.

"This is not a person-al, political lynching, just carrying out the law," said of the assembly's t prominent members. Diosdado Cabello.

Earlier, dozens of soldiers had roughly barred Ortega, 59, from entering her offices, prompting her to say "this is a dic-tatorship." She left as a passenger on a motor-bike before she could be arrested and later said did not recognise dismissal. Ortega was a thorn in President Nicolas Maduro's side for months, after breaking ranks with him over the legality of the Constituent Assembly.

Her sacking was widely expected, but its swiftness -- and the fact it was a unanimous vote
-- showed the assembly was keen on taking the gate. Mexico and Peru immediately condemned

Ortega's dismissal.
Argentina, Uruguay,
Paraguay and Brazil also took action over the new assembly, declaring Venezuela was indefinitely suspended from the South American trading

South American trading bloc Mercosur for its "rupture of the democratic order."

Maduro responded in an interview with an Argentine radio station that "Venezuela will not be taken out of Mercosur never!"

He accused his Argencounterpart, Mauricio Macri, of trying to impose a "blockade" on Venezuela. He also railed against US President Donald Trump's "imperialist" administration, which slapped sanctions on him over the new assembly.

America, he charged,

wanted to get its hands on Venezuela's oil re-serves, the largest in the world. But in Washington, Trump's national security advisor, H.R. Mc-Master, ruled out foreign military intervention, and said Washington did not want to give Mad-uro a pretext for blaming Washington for his

mounting woes.

The country's nomic and political crisis he said, is "on Maduro's shoulders -- he is the one who has caused it, and he's the one who's per-petuating it."

Japan marks 72 years since Hiroshima Atomic Bomb

day marked 72 years since the world's first nuclear attack on Hiroshima, with the nation's traditional contradictions over atomic weapons again coming

The anniversary came after Japan sided last month with nuclear powers Britain, France and the US to dismiss a UN treaty banning atomic weapons, which was rejected by critics for ignoring the reality of security threats such as North Korea. Japan is the only country to have suffered atomic attacks, in 1945.
Prime Minister Shinzo Abe,

speaking at the annual ceremony at Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park near the ground zero, said Japan hoped to push



weapons in a way that all coun-

tries can agree.

"For us to truly pursue a world without nuclear weapons, we need participation from both nuclear-weapons and non- nuclear weapons states," Abe said in his speech

at the annual ceremony.

"Our country is committed to leading the international community by encouraging both sides" to make progress toward abolishing nuclear arms, Abe added without directly referring to the UN treaty.

Japanese officials have criticised the UN Nuclear Weapon Ban Treaty as deepening a divide between countries with and without nuclear arms. None of the nine countries that possess nuclear weapons took part in the negotiations or vote on the treaty. Japanese officials routinely argue that they abhor nuclear weapons, but the nation's defence is firmly set under the US nuclear umbrella. Japan suffered two nuclear

attacks at the end of the World War II by the United States - in Hiroshima on August 6 1945 and in Nagasaki three days later.

The bombings claimed the lives of 140,000 people in Hiroshima and 74,000 people in Nagasaki, Some died immediately while others succumbed to injuries or radiation-related illnesses weeks, months and

years later.

Japan announced its surrender in World War II on Au-

Many in Japan feel the attacks amount to war crimes and atrocities because they targeted civilians and due to the unprecedented destruc-tive nature of the weapons. But many Americans believe they hastened the end of a bloody conflict, and ultimately saved lives, thus justifying the bombings. Barack Obama became the first sitting US president to visit Hiroshima in May last year, paying moving trib-ute to victims of the devastat-



The UN Security Council has unanimously backed a new resolution imposing fresh sanctions on North Korea in retaliation for its controversial nuclear programme. Among the sweeping measures is an export ban aimed at depriving Pyongyang of \$1bn (£767m) in annual revenue - around a third of its export earnings. Kim Jong Un's regime will be banned from selling coal, iron and iron ore, lead and lead ore, fish and seafood. It will also be prevented from increasing the number of workers it sends overseas - whose earnings are another source of revenue for the regime. President Trump said the move would have a "very big financial impact" on

UNSC adopts tougher sanctions on N Korea over missile launches

YOSHITA SINGH UNITED NATIONS, AUG 6 (PTI): The UN Security Council unanimously backed a US-drafted resolution to strengthen sanctions on North Korean exports in response to Pyongyang's intercon-tinental ballistic missile tests The 15-member body yesterday strongly condemned North Korea s hallistic missile launches on July 3 and 28 which the country has stated were of "intercontinen-tal" range.

The US-drafted resolution includes the strongest sanctions ever imposed in response to a North Korean ballistic missile test and targets its main exports, slashing their annual revenue by USD 1 billion.
"The Security Coun-



cil increased the penalty of North Korea's ballistic missile activity to a whole new level. North Korea s irresponsible and careless acts have just proved to be quite costly to the regime.

This resolution is the Korean regime. The price the North Korean lead-ership will pay for its

single largest economic sanctions package ever leveled against the North

missile development will be the loss of one-third of its exports and hard cur-rency. This is the most stringent set of sanctions on any country in a gen-eration," US Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador Nikki Haley

said.

The Council reaffirmed previous Council decisions that North Korea not conduct further launches using ballistic missile technology, nuclear tests, or any other provocation. The UNSC moved to significantly strengthen the sanctions on North Korea, impos-ing a full ban on the export of coal, iron and iron ore from the country. Previously these items could be exported for livelihood purposes, for a limited amount. The Council also

nrohibited countries from increasing the total number of work authorisations for North Korean nationals. It banned new joint ventures or cooperative en-tities with North Korean entities or individuals as well as additional investments in existing joint ventures.

Member States are requested to report to

the UNSC, within 90 days of the adoption of this resolution, on concrete measures they have taken to effectively implement this resolu-tion. The Council also designated several additional individuals for a travel ban and assets freeze, as well as designating entities for an assets freeze.

On the political front, the Council calls for re-sumption of the Six-Party Talks and reiterated its support for the commitments set forth in the Joint Statement of September 2005 issued by China, North Korea, Japan, south Korea, Russia and the United States.
