High Court declares Sikkim Parliamentary Secretaries Act 2010 unconstitutional

he High Court of Sik-The High Court of Sik-kim today quashed the Sikkim Parliamentary Secretaries [Appoint-ment, Salaries, Allow-ances and Miscellaneous Provisions] Act 2010 declaring it unconstitutional. The High Court cited the Supreme Court judgment on the Bi-molangshu Roy (Dead) through LRs vs. State of Assam passed on 26 July

the apex court had said that the State Legislature lacks the competence to appoint Parliamentary Secretaries.
The 2010 Act allowed

appointment of 11 Par-liamentary Secretaries enjoying the ranks and facilities of Cabinet Minister of the State. Two different groups had filed writ petitions in the High Court of Sikkim challeng-ing the appointment of

taries. Following the final hearing on Wednesday, the HC had reserved its judgment.

Today the division bench of the High Court headed by Chief Justice Satish Kumar Agnihotri and Justice Meenakshi Madan Rai observed, "In such view of the matter, without examining further in detail, which is not contended by either parties, we are of the

issue of the constitutionality of the impugned Act is squarely covered by the judicial pronouncement made by the Su-preme Court in Bimolangshu Roy (Dead)1."

The bench said that the Parliamentary Secretaries, partaking character of Ministers is "manifestly impermissible" in the light of mandate enshrined un-der Article 164(1A) of

the Constitution and is unconstitutional.

The appointment of Parliamentary Secretaries under the impugned Act is a pretence to circumvent the provisions of constitutional provision, as incorporated in the Constitution of India by Ninety first amend-

ment, the Court added.

The Court further stated that the Parliamentary Secretaries appointed under the Act

Parliamentary Secretaries and shall also cease to draw and avail salaries, allowances, perks, etc. as admissible under the Act forthwith.

While dealing with the issue of disqualifica-tion, the bench said, "A feeble attempt is made by the learned counsel appearing for the petitioners to submit that on account of quashing of aforestated impugned Act, the respondents, who are Members of the Legislative Assembly, be declared as disqualified to continue as members. Article 192 of the Constitution mandates that the question as to the disqualification of a Mem-ber shall be referred to the decision of the Governor and the decision shall be final. In such view of the matter, we are not inclined to pass any order on the issue."

The British era Pe-shok bridge just out of Teesta Bazaar towards Darjeeling was partially damaged in the blast, police officials here inform.


The police is investigating the matter.

The blast comes just a day after twin blasts shook Darjeeling hills. In yesterday's blast also, there was no report of any casualty or injury.

Today's blast is the third such incident since the indefinite shutdown to press for a separate Gorkhaland state, began over two months ago.

Privacy verdict to have 'some bearing' in beef matters: SC

DELHI, AUG 25 (PTI): The Supreme Court today said its ver-dict declaring right to privacy a fundamental right would have "some bearing" in matters re-lated to the possession of beef in Maharashtra.

The apex court made the observation while hearing a batch of ap-peals filed against the Bombay High Court's May 6, 2016 verdict decriminalising the possession of beef in case of animals slaughtered outside the state.

A bench comprising Justices A K Sikri and Ashok Bhushan was informed by an advocate that yesterday's judgement from a nine-judge Constitution bench, de-claring right to privacy a fundamental right, was important for adjudication of the appeal.

"Yes, that judgement will have some bearing in these matters," the bench said.

The Supreme Court had yesterday said "nobody would like to be told what to eat or how to dress" while ruling that these activities come under the realm of the right to privacy.

Senior advocate Indira Jaising, appearing for referred to the privacy judgement and said the right to eat food of one's choice is now protected

under privacy.
She also told the bench that Maharashtra government's appeal challenging the court verdict was already pending before another bench of the apex court.

The bench, after hearing the submissions posted the matter after two weeks.

government had on August 10 moved the apex court challenging the high court's verdict striking down sections 5(d) and 9(b) of the Maharashtra Animals Preservation (Amendment) Act, 1995, which criminalised and imposed punishment on persons found in posses-sion of beef of animals, slaughtered in or outside the state, on the ground that it infringed upon a person's "right to privacy"

The court had issued notice on the appeal and tagged the matter along with several pending pleas related to the issue.

Better safe than sorry, but several questions follow

Whoever thought that Durga Puja, that mother of all festivals in Bengal would someday become the

object of a political tug-of-war?

But, it has, courtesy the West
Bengal government's decision to suspend immersion of Durga idols on October 1 to accommodate Muharram processions. Predictably, the Left and the saffron brigade are punching holes in the policy and it is likely the issue might roll to court.

Durga Puja mood in this state sets with 'Mahalaya', gathers pace from 'Sasti' and reaches rapturous stage by 'Dashami'. The immersion sequence thereafter, which often stretches for days, is a spectacular show by itself. The Durga Puja mood

is not over till all idols are immersed. All other activities are relegated to the background during this period; such is the impact of the festival. But this year, the West Bengal

government has decided to keep idol immersion at bay on October 1, as the day overlaps with Muharram. No wonder, all sorts of inferences ranging from minority appeasement to vote bank politics are being drawn

over the policy.

Ours is a strange society. If two persons of the same community squabble over an issue, it is mere quarrel. But, if two persons from the majority and minority communities wrangle over a similar issue, it is communal tension.

The state government's decision to suspend Durga idol immersion on

October 1 understandably is a precautionary measure prompted by the logic to avert possible law and order problem that can erupt if immersion pro-cessions and Muharram rallies collide.

If so, it exposes two very disturbing angles. First, it illustrates that the government machinery is not adequate or capable enough to handle the pressure of two major events occurring simultaneously in the state.

Second and worse still, that the people of the two faiths can observe

festivals responsibly.

The importance of Durga Puja and Muharram is acknowledged across communities. In reality, people of both faiths have for years joyously participated in each other's celebrations. Why should people

suddenly start fighting among them-selves over Durga Puja or Muharram this year? Is foul play being apprehended then?

Strangely, this is not the first time the two festivals have overlapped. They had done so in 1984 as well, but it did not require the incumbent Left Front government then to suspend either festival to maintain law and order. Both communities observed their rituals as usual and everything had gone off smoothly. The question therefore, why now?

There is a third angle to this development. Remember the unprecedented celebrations by the saffron parties over Ram Navami and Mahabir Jayanti on April 5 and 9 respec tively? The demonstrations revealed the growing support base of the BJP in West Bengal. It was also enough to make the Trinamool-run state gov-

ernment to sit up and take notice.

Then came the Bashirhat episode in North 24 Parganas district where a communal riot was narrow ly averted. The dual incidents un-derstandably have turned the state government wary and therefore the decision to suspend one programme. Better safe than sorry.

But, such assessment has instead provided the saffron parties, par-ticularly the BJP, an opportunity to cry foul, level appeasement politics charge against chief minister Mamata Banerjee and go to town with it

with a degree of success too.

Worryingly for the Trinamool, it has in reality invited what it wanted

Deadline for Aadhaar-PAN linkage to stay: **UIDAI CEO**

NEW DELHI, AUG 25 (PTI): Tax payers will have to link their PAN with Aadhaar by the stipulated deadline, which is this month-end, as the Supreme Court verdict on privacy has no bear-ing on the requirement, UIDAI CEO Ajay Bhushan Pandey has said.

The requirement for

Aadhaar being quoted for availing government sub-sidies, welfare schemes and other benefits will also continue unhindered for now, he told PTI. The government had mandated linking of PAN with Aadhaar by the extended

deadline of August 31.

Asked about the implication of the Supreme Court ruling (privacy being a fundamental right) ing a fundamental right) on linking of Aadhaar and PAN, Pandey said: "There also, linking of PAN to Aadhaar is mondered." haar is mandated by an amendment in income tax act...the linking will continue under that act and law. There is no change".

Pandey said various deadlines that have been prescribed, be it under provision of Aadhaar Act, Income Tax Act or money laundering rules will "have to be adhered to" as "those laws are valid".

He exuded confi-dence that Aadhaar Act, with its data protection safeguards, will pass the test of privacy being a fundamental right.

The biometric identifier is currently required for services ranging from getting subsidised cook-ing gas to opening bank account and obtaining a new phone number.
The Supreme Court

"judgement has not said anything about the Aadhaar Act so the Aadhaar Act is a valid Act passed by the Parliament (and) is the law of the land", Pandev said.

Section 7 of the act "prescribes that for getting certain subsidy or benefit the government can insist on an Aadhaar number. That position holds today," he added.

It has to be mentioned here that one of the writ petitions challenging the appoint-ment of Parliamentary Secretaries was filed by Sikkim Krantikari Mor-cha through its general secretary [legal cell], TD Kazi and secretary [headquarters], Kamal Neopaney in November

Addressing a press



conference today, the advocate. petitioner's Raghavendra Kumar stated that SKM took a courageous step to chal-lenge the appointment of Parliamentary Secretaries. These appointments have incurred huge expenditure on the State exchequer, he said.

Mr Kumar stated that

fortunately the recent judgment of the Supreme Court on Parliamentary Secretary appointments in Assam also support-ed this case. Now with the judgment out, all Parliamentary Secretar-ies need to vacate their office immediately and

they will not get any benefits either, he added.

The Governor may take necessary actions for the disqualification of these MLAs by re-specting the judgment of the High Court, he further added.
On other three posts

also challenged by the petitioners, Mr Kumar stated that the High Court has given the liber-ty to file fresh petitions. Petitioner, Mr Kazi

stated that SKM was the aggrieved party as seven MLAs left the party ille-gally for their personal

"We knew that the

appointment of the Parliamentary Secretaries was illegal and unconstitutional so the party moved ahead to file the writ petition," he said.

He added that the appointment of Parliaentary Secretaries was an unnecessary expense on the State exchequer. state would be an offence.

The plea assailed the judgement, saying the restriction imposed by the 1995 Act on possession of flesh of cow, bull or bullock could not be interpreted and concluded to be an infringement of 'right to privacy".

The state government had said the high court "while coming to the


finding that right to privacy forms nnding that right to privacy forms part of the fundamental right to personal liberty guaranteed un-der Article 21 of the Constitution, ought to have appreciated that right to privacy was not yet designated as a fundamental right".

The plea had said that accord-

ing to the verdict, obligation upon the state to prove "conscious possession" of beef would "constitute an unsurmountable circumstance readily available to the wrongdoer to escape sentence"

In its judgement, the high court had upheld the ban on slaughter of bulls and bullocks imposed by the Maharashtra government, but de-criminalised possession of beef in case the animals were slaughtered outside the state.

The judgement had come on a batch of petitions filed in the high court challenging the constitution-al validity of the Act and, in particular, the possession and consumption of beef of animals slaughtered outside Maharashtra.

Ram Rahim travelled to the court from Sirsa, about 260 kms from Chandigarh, in a huge convoy of vehicles which had his security guards and several followers.

As the news spread and his thousands of followers gathered near the Panchkula court went on the rampage, Ram Rahim was taken by a helicopter to a jail in Rohtak.

His followers, ironically called 'premis' (who believe in love), unleashed violence and set afire a large number vehicles, buildings and railway stations in Panchkula, otherwise a peaceful city on the out-skirts of Chandigarh, as main targets of the mobs.

Police and paramili-tary used force, including firing and lobbing teargas shells, to control the volatile situation created by the dera follow-ers who had gathered in thousands defying the prohibitory orders like Section 144 of the CrPC, which bars assembly of more than four people at one place.

'Seventeen people are dead and at least 200 are injured," said Vivek Bhadu, Chief Medical Officer at the civil hospital in Panchkula. He said most of the deaths were due to bullet injuries.

Another seven deaths were recorded at PGIMER hospital in Chandigarh and four at Government Medical College in Chandigarh, officials said. Two deaths were reported from Sirsa where seven were injured.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi condemned the violence, terming it as "deeply distressing" and urged everyone to maintain peace.

"Urged officials to work round the clock to restore normalcy and provide all possible assistance that is required," he tweeted. Harvana Chief Minis-

ter Manohar Lal Khattar, under attack for alleged inaction, said tonight that some perpetrators of violence, including those "who opened fire", have been identified and will be arrested.

At least 32 incidents of violence and arson were reported from Malwa region of Punjab, po-lice said. However, no casualty was reported.

Puniab Chief Minister Amarinder Singh said curfew has been imposed in 10 districts of Malwa region as a precautionary and appealed to the people

to maintain peace.

"The Army is staging flag march in the curfew-bound areas of Punjab to restore the confidence of the people," he said.

The unrest reached even Delhi where two coaches of a stationary train were set ablaze at Anand Vihar Railway Station, after which prohibitory orders were pro-mulgated in 11 districts of the national capital.

In neighbouring Loni in Uttar Pradesh's Gaziabad district, a bus was set afire.

A vehicle was also set on fire by a group of people in Rajasthan's Sriganganagar, the birthplace of the dera chief.

Following large scale destruction by the mobs, curfew was imposed in Panchkula, Sirsa and Kaithal in Haryana and Punjab's Mansa, Bathinda, Ferozepur, Patiala, angrur and Barnala and Faridkot, the areas considered as stronghold of the dera followers.

Six columns of the Army, comprising a total of 500 to 600 soldiers, were deployed in Panchkula

The Punjab and Hary-ana High Court, meanwhile, ruled that the losses caused due to the vi-olence will be recovered from the dera.


Hearing a PIL, the full bench of the court also asked the state to use force and weapons, if needed, to maintain peace. The court will have

further hearing in the matter tomorrow.

Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh called up chief ministers of Haryana and Puniah to take stock of the situation

Singh, who rushed to his office directly from the airport after arriving from Kyrgyz Republic, assured them all assistance in restoring peace.

Singh also held a meeting with top officials and directed the central agencies to monitor the situation and apprise him regularly, said a home ministry official.

Police!

A required force, but ironically also a lesser liked arm

Policing is a tricky issue. Too little and there is an archy on the streets and tricky chy on the streets and too much and the fundamental rights of the people start getting trampled upon. It is a fine balancing act, and it is not always that every thing falls in place to everyone's satisfaction. And it is perhaps because a foot soldier, already over-worked and stressed cannot work out the right balance that officers are trained by experts for two years on the finer points of policing. The policy makers have been working at ways to take the exclamation mark that normally conjoins itself to "Police!" in public conversation. That is a tough task. Sikkim has a reasonably comfortable association with the cops, but not every one is always satisfied with run-ins with the khaki Before one complains too much, a drive to Siliguri will be recommended to get a feel of how offensive people can become once they are cloaked in the power of a police uniform.

Why does a force which is tasked to protect and to serve evoke such negativity among the people? Well, clearly because the force has been the long arm ex tended for centuries by colonial rulers and then by democratic masters to keep an unruly janata in check The feeling of invincibility that such power can inflict is not easy to abandon and the day-to-day grind of policing after all falls on the beat of constables who take

an inflated sense of power as granted.

Let's take Gangtok's case. The most frequent complaints would be voiced by the taxi-drivers against traffic police personnel and home guards. This is understandable at one level because taxi drivers are the lay people who come in contact with police personnel most often and not always in pleasant circumstances. Their experiences can thus not be too much fun. Frankly speaking, if the cops on traffic detail are over-stepping their authority (in the language they use or aggression they display), they are not display ing uncommon traits. Grant too much power to any individual and it does not take long before it goes to the head. Ever wondered why reports of police brutality and human rights violations come only from troubled areas? The answer is simple - it is because the police are granted more powers there. Even in Sikkim, the only instances of human rights violations by local cops were recorded at a time when the police was being excessively used as the enforcer. Thankfully, that time is

many decades in the past now.

Since that is not the situation anymore, one must wonder why we are exposed to an ugly side of the force almost every day. The answer perhaps lies in the fact that the cops have taken it upon themselves to police every aspect of public activity. For example, it would be only logical for cops to check vehicle documents and licenses to curb thefts and dangerous driving. The nitty-gritty's of whether all taxes have been paid or whether a vehicle is environmentally "non-polluting" should be left to motor vehicle inspectors. The local force is already short-staffed and expecting them to implement too many rules at too many places stretches their patience and professionalism. Cops are forced to take the help of home guards and this force is less trained in policing than the career policeman/woman. Their reactions to a situation are thus more emotional than professional. This is a force that is underpaid and

overworked and not even trained properly for the job. What too many rules also lead to is an increased public interaction with police personnel. No one is comfortable around khaki and the cops too are instinctively aggressive. Increased interaction automatically leads to increased attrition and flare-ups occasionally happen.

That, perhaps, is where the problem lies for Sikkim. Too much policing; policing to an extent that it starts intruding on a person's privacy. No one wants anarchy, but there does not seem to be too much public support for a police state either. Someone has to strike the right balance

Amplifying the voices of Indigenous People through the Lens of Women - Biodiversity, Livelihoods & Climate Change

 Γ he word "Indigenous" basically means native, original, aboriginal, home-grown, local, etc., and is the antonym of foreign or alien. For centuries, peoples and communities have either been born to certain lands and areas or have marked out lands and areas for themselves after migrations and became the "indigenous" peoples and communities of such marked land. Till today we are witness to disputes arising of two or more peoples or communities claiming to being indigenous to such lands and areas ~ not least us Nagas ~ and wars have been waged and lives and limbs lost to such claims. The very word "indigenous" itself has assumed multi-dimensional political, economic, social and cultural connotations and implications over the decades and this has unfortunately given rise to not only polarizing ideologies and politics but such ideologies and politics have also dictated and determined the quality of life of those on both side of the debate. However, because life has never stopped being "short, nasty and brutish" increasingly more so now, since neo-colonialism, liberalization and globalization have become the hallmarks of our increasingly unrecognizable world, perhaps time has come for us to re-look at the word "indigenous" and look at it from more and much wider perspectives than we used to. So then, is it possible for us to look at the word "indigenous" from the perspective that all human beings are indigenous to Mother Earth? That when Mother Earth unleashes her furies, they leave no indigenous and non-indigenous unscathed; and that her bounties are meant for all?

Let's look at the word "indigenous" from the perspectives of the civil wars, terrorism, wars on terrorism and communal conflicts in their most virulent and violent forms across the globe, which are not only rooted in power politics and economics but in discords related to cultures, belief-systems, traditions, customs, etc. Yes, the word "indigenous" also has very negative, disruptive and dis-abling connotations, which we must also at all cost prevent to become the lait motif of our discourses on matters indigenous ~ particularly the indigenity of our political, social, economic, cultural and religious intercourses and interfaces. So, today as ve observe the International Indigenous Peoples Day, let us do so keeping in mind and truly believing that every human being on earth is indigenous to the earth.

Unless we do so, we marginalize half the

world's population, which is us, women. It is ironic that while we observe and celebrate indigenous people across the globe, indigenous people across the globe do not even count women as full-fledge human beings, much less celebrate us as indige-nous persons ~ to Mother Earth, to community and to society. Unfortunately, even women do not realize this most unjust status we are consigned to and forced to live with. In an article titled A Field of her own, published in the Indian Express recently, an MBA student at the Yale School of Management, who is currently an Intern in the agriculture programme at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation India Country Office, wrote: "The stereotypical image of an Indian farmer is a mustachioed man, clad in a white dhoti with farming tools in hand. The reali-ty is the Indian agricultural landscape is fast being

feminised. Already, women constitute close to 65% of all agricultural workers. An even greater share, 74% of the rural workforce, is female. Despite their hard labour in the field, women are not officially counted as farmers, and are either labelled "agri-cultural labourers" or "cultivators". This is because the Government does not recognise as farmers those who do not have a claim to land under their name in official records." I wonder whether Naga women, and women in the Northeast, irrespective of race and religion, urban or rural, recognize ourselves in these statistics, in this picture of our reality, as we observe and celebrate the International Indigenous Peoples Day? When we are so marginalized by and from our indigenity, what are we really observing and celebrating?

The same article further says: "As many as 87%

of women do not own their land; only 12.7% of them do. There are two primary reasons for the alarmingly low number: One, land being a state subject is not governed by the Constitution under a uniform law that applies equally to all citizens but rather is governed by personal religious laws, which tend to discriminate against women when it comes to land inheritance. Second, the cultural aspect of the deep-rooted biases that hinder women's ownership of land in patriarchal societies cannot be discount ed." Does this not resonate in perfect harmony with Article 371 (A), which is the fountainhead of the State of Nagaland? The question we must ask today is: while we observe and celebrate the International Indigenous Peoples Day, are we also celebrating the indigenous women in our state, our region, our country and our globe, who are the principal main stay of the home, the family and as a natural corollary, the mainstay of the state, the region, the country and the globe? You know, what we must take very serious note of is the fact that whenever we talk of "people" and/or "peoples", women are inevitably excluded from the discourse and the interface. This you might have noticed in the discourse of both "Naga sovereignty" and now the "Naga Peace process" besides so many other issues ~ unfortunately, women have also have marginalized ourselves from the these discourses and interfaces. This basically means that women have peripheralized ourselves from our own societal existence.

Yet I concede that our over-all societal existence is incomplete without women being and providing the main prop. Women's problem is that we tend to take the backset and to assume the role of the sup-porting cast to the lead roles seemingly played by men ~ while in reality it is women who are the lead players in this drama called life, more so in "indigenous" communities and societies like ours. My suggestion would be to acknowledge, claim and own for ourselves the lead roles women play to keep ourselves in Mother Earth's good books. Who, after all, sacrifices and slaves to protect and promote our bio-diversity by way of feminizing the landscape and spacescape of our agriculture and allied activities, even though we do not own the land in the technically legal sense? Women do it because in-herently we know that Mother Earth owns us and we owe it to her to acknowledge and respect her ownership of us human beings. This has then created livelihoods for both women and men, which translates into food on our tables. This is what has

~ please never make the mistake of thinking that jobs in the Government and public sectors sustain human beings, particularly women's sustenance relationships with Mother Earth. As long as women till the land, secure seeds and plant them, there will always be food on the table \sim all the money in the world cannot be a substitute for food.

It is becoming increasingly hard to secure seeds, plant them and harvest food for the table with the unpredictable and drastic climate change every day of our live. It is tragically ironic that in the recent month or so when heavy and incessant rains descended down on us, some of the human casualties were that of women farmers in their rice and vegetable fields in Nagaland. This must have also been the case in other Northeastern and Hi-malayan states. Clearly, this further accentuates women's lead role in sustaining agriculture, sustaining the family and providing food on the table.
Unfortunately, no indigenous people, community and society will ever concede and acknowledge the centrality of women's roles and contributions to people, community and society's sustenance. This is so very crystal clear in most indigenous people community and society's cultural, customary and traditional discourse and interface, even belief-systems, which totally disenfranchise women as fullfledged human beings hence women's peripheral-ization from the political and economic discourses and interfaces of indigenous communities and societies. A prime example is what happened when the ULB elections were slated to be held with 33% women reservation.

Today I am extremely happy and proud that women have documented issues of Biodiversity, Livelihoods and Climate Change ~ issues women have been dealing with for centuries, no let me say "since time immemorial", and bring such documentations to the notice of an uncaring, insensitive and egoistic world ~ to register our existence, our strength and our gratitude to Mother Earth for sustaining us ~ the human race, indigenous to Mother Earth. Today as we observe and celebrate indigenous peoples across the globe, our voices must be amplified through women's lens because these are the only lens that gives the most rational and credible picture of how the most peripheralized half of earth holds up the sky.

While what I have said may not have been what

you had expected me to say ~ for which I apologise I also would like to convey my gratitude to the North East Network for inviting me to this celebration and giving me the platform and the opportunity to ex-press my opinions, however ill-informed they are, and to all of you who have worked tirelessly to underscore that women too have our lens through which we speak and register our existence. I want to say a very special "Thank You" to North East Network for creating in women, especially in our rural areas, the awareness that "We Can" and building the capacity to say so in no uncertain terms ~ and emphatically.

Facing disasters: lessons from a Bangladeshi island

theconversation.com he death toll of Bangladesh's brutal

monsoon season keeps growing. Authorities estimate that flooding has killed at least 120 people and affected some 5 million others since mid-July.

Disasters are common in Bangla-desh. The fertile country is situated on the Ganges-Brahmaputra delta and irrigated by the Meghna river, which enables it to sustain a dense population but also exposes it to floods, cyclones and other hazards.

These days, climate change is making such events both more frequent and more intense for Bangladeshis. Loss of life and property during the monsoon is a near-daily occurrence in most parts of the country.

In a global effort to reduce such

hazards, the United Nations has crafted the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction and Resilience, a 15year plan to reduce the human, social

d economic impacts of disasters.

Adopted in 2015, this international strategy aims to help countries that are particularly vulnerable to climate change prepare for the challenges they face. However, as our research in Bangladesh reveals, critical knowledge gaps remain. Though there are systems to warn people about impending hazards, officials have found that they do not necessarily evacuate

before danger arrives.
Our ongoing study, which began in 2013, offers some insight into

LIFE ON MAZER CHAR

In examining evacuation behaviour and decision-making in the face of environmental threats to Bangladesh, it quickly becomes clear how important it is for climate-change adaptation plans to include local inputs. Talking to the people about their experiences and perceptions of disaster risks can

uncover unexpected views.

One study site from our nationwide research painfully demonstrates this point: Mazer Char, a delta island in Pirojpur district, is located about 330 kilometres southwest of Dhaka, Bangladesh's capital. When I arrived there with my research team, curious residents greeted us, asking why we had we chosen to study their island.

As we began to explain our re-

search subject, they instantly started onnecting it with their own struggles.

On Mazer Char, the land is rich in

vegetation and the waters are full of fish. Most residents of the forest-covered is-land, which is home to about 800 people spread across 180 households, make a

living from fishing and livestock.

When disasters hit this low-lying island, they hit hard. "Four people died in this village during Sidr", a 2007 cyclone that killed about 10,000 people across the country, one woman told me. At that moment, a man passed by, carrying wood for his kitchen stove.

"He lost his wife", she whispered. The man overheard the exchange. He invited us to his house later that day to tell us his story, which is cap-

tured in the video belo NURMIA'S STORY

When we arrived the man, Nurmia, welcomed us. We sat down on the bamboo carpet. "I was born about 70 years ago", he said, on the mainland, in a place called Ogolbadi. Nurmia left home after a dispute with his brothers over the family's land, so he crossed the river to Mazer Char, hoping to build a new life.

Nurmia spends most of his time fishing, though because his boat is currently broken, he hasn't been out on the water for a while.

"The wood here on the island is not very good, so I end up repairing it every year", he sighed, adding that in the meantime he has been net fishing from the shore to put food on the table.

Nurmia then recounted the November night when Cyclone Sidr struck the island.

RIDING OUT THE STORM

Although the residents of Mazer Char were warned about the cyclone approaching, Nurmia did not evacuate, nor did many other islanders, who could not bear to leave their homes

could not bear to leave their nomes and belongings behind.

People face complex and careful considerations in deciding whether to stay or to go during a cyclone. Some may want to evacuate but lack the financial means to do so, or feel constrained to simply abandon everything they own.

That was the case with Nurmia's

family. At the time, they had saved enough money to send their eldest son to Saudi Arabia for work. Sidr changed all of that. That night in 2007, the cyclone took nearly all of Nurmia's possessions, and claimed the life of his wife.

Nurmia explained to us how riding out a cyclone at home can be much more costly than dropping everything and evacuating to a shelter. "We survived the cyclone once and this is what it taught us," he concluded.

LIFE AND DEATH DECISIONS

For researchers, Nurmia's tale offers other lessons, too, which is that there is no right way to face a disaster. People dealing with environmental shocks in Bangladesh confront an impossible reality and a set of unthinkable choices.

Climate action strategies are a crucial tool to support populations living under extremely vulnerable circumstances. Yet it is our assessment that for such policies to be effective, closer attention must be paid to the differing local approaches that people take to climatic risk.

Some people are simply more vulnerable to disasters than others. While certain families may be able to afford to leave everything behind, the survival of others depends on their homes, livestock or property. To save their livelihoods, they may put their lives in danger.

PV Sindhu assured of bronze at World Championship; Srikanth bows out

GLASGOW, Aug 25 (PTI): PV Sindhu today completed a hattrick of medals at the World Badminton Championship as she stormed into the semifinals, lifting India's spirit after Kidambi Srikanth's quarterfinal exit here.

Sindhu, a silver medallist at the Rio Olympics, assured her-self of at least a bronze with a clinical display against world number six Chinese Sun Yu. The 22-year-old, who has

won a bronze at the 2013 and 2014 editions, disposed off Sun Yu 21-14 21-9 in 39 minutes at the Emirates Arena.

The world No. 4 Indian will next take on another Chinese world No. 10 Chen Yufei, who saw off former world champion Ratchanok Intanon of Thailand. Earlier, Srikanth went down fighting 14-21 18-21 to world No. 1 Son Wan Ho of Korea in

men's singles competition.
Srikanth had emerged as India's best bet at the event after clinching back-to-back ti-tles at Indonesia and Australia and a final finish at the Singapore Open. The 24-year-old from Gun-

tur had come into the match with twin victories over Son Wan in June at the Indonesia Super Series Premier and Australia Super Series but it counted for little as the Korean dished out a near-perfect game to outclass the Indian in a 49-minute clash.

Among other top shuttlers, Denmark's Viktor Axelsen, five-time champion Lin Dan also reached the semifinals in

men's singles.
Sindhu dished out an aggressive game and never



looked in doubt as she led from start to finish during the 39-minute lop-sided Sun, on the other hand, looked

out of sorts and nervous.
In the first game, Sindhu led 5-4, which she extended to 8-4. The duo then engaged in one of the longest rallies that had 39 shots. Sindhu eventually sealed it with a half cross court smash and quickly grabbed a 11-4 lead at the break when Sun made a wrong judgement at the baseline.

Playing the faster side of the court, Sindhu tried to make her opponent bend and move across the court with her acute-angled strokes. She sometimes used her deception and changed her pace to out-wit the Chinese.

The result was Sindhu

quickly moved to 15-5 lead. Sun reduced the margin to 10-16 but Sindhu eventually earned seven game points with a smart return at the forecourt that left her opponent stranded.

Sindhu faltered with a return before sealing the first game with a lovely drop shot.

The second game started with another long rally which Sindhu won with an onrushing body smash. The Indian conied to pile on the pressure to lead 11-4 at the interval.

The breather didn't bring any respite for Sun as Sindhu moved to 18-8. Frustration was clear on the face of Sun, who tried her bit to upstage the Indian but Sindhu seemed to have all the answers as she reached 11 match points with a low cross court flick. She

sealed the contest when Sun

went long once again.

Srikanth, on the other hand, made a nervy start to the quarterfinals, allowing Son Wan to open up a 6-1 lead early on but the Indian slowly got his bearing as he made it 5-6. His movement improved and his trade mark smashes helped him to make it 8-8. However, Son Wan managed

to move ahead and a return from Srikanth going to net helped the Korean to have the 11-8 advantage at the first break.

The duo looked to outwit each other by changing the angles and pace of their strokes during the rallies. Srikanth reduced the margin to 12-13 but the Korean once again managed to move up to a 15-12 lead with a deceptive back

Son Wan to move to 19-13. The Korean grabbed six game point opportunity and sealed it when the Indian hit the net twice.

After the change of sides, Srikanth struggled to get his length right and his returns missed the baseline twice. The Indian even lost his left shoe during one of the rallies.

Srikanth struggle with his precision and placement of strokes and it helped Son Wan to eventually enter the breather with a handsome seven-point advantage.

After the break, Srikanth played a good rally with patience and it helped him to win the point but he seemed to go back to his power game, which backfired as the Korean kept moving ahead to 13-5.

Srikanth changed gears then and strengthened his de-fence to reel off seven straight points, making it 12-16 but Son Wan managed to break the streak with a return that found the Indian short at the forecourt. The Indian missed the line again and also hit the net to allow Son Wan move to 19-14 advantage.

The Korean misjudged a

shuttle to gift a point to Sri-kanth, who replied with a cross court smash to reduce the deficit to 17-19. Another smash from Srikanth and it was 18- 19. However, Son Wan grabbed

the match point when Srikanth rushed into a shot and hit the net. The Indian once again found the net to hand over the match to the Korean and see his 13-match winning streak lay in tatters.

AITA gets back recognition from **Sports Ministry**

New Delhi, Aug 25 (PTI): The Sports Ministry has granted recogni-tion to the All India Tennis Association (AITA) almost a year after the tennis body's renewal as a National Sports Federation (NSF) was put on hold due to non-compliance with the contentious Sports Code.

The ministry on Thursday sent a communication in this regard to the AITA, which elected a new president early this year after Anil Khanna was forced to quit in 2016.

Threatened with de-recognition, AITA had elected se-

nior bureaucrat Praveen Mahajan as the new chief of the body at its Executive Committee meeting On December 1 last year.

However, the government insisted that AITA holds proper election, hence, a Special General Meeting (SGM) was held on February 3 in Pune and Mahajan was elected president till 2020. "We had just kept

their recognition in abevance, pending a verifica-tion with regards to new AITA President, After Mr Anil Khanna quit, they elected Ms Mahajan but we had to see if there's approval from the competent authority," a senior ministry official told PTI.

"It was a routine ver-

ification process and nothing else.

After receiving doc

uments (from CAT), we see no reason to delay it. Actually we should have clarified earlier that we never derecognised AITA. So this recognition is outcome of a verification process and it was not an issue which re-quired any adjudication," the official added.

Mahajan, who was the

first woman to be chief of

and Customs (CBEC), is now posted in Jodhpur as administrative member of the Central Administrative Tribunal (CAT)

The ministry had asked Khanna to quit, arguing that his election as president in 2012 after serving two consecutive terms as general sec-



retary, was against the Sports Code that bars officials from re-election after serving two con-secutive terms of four years.

A cooling off period of four years is required be-fore being eligible for the post again.

After offering to quit,

Khanna was re-elected AITA president for a four-year term till 2020 but he refused to accept it unless the issue was re-solved. Eventually he de-

cided to quit the position.
"We now figure in priority list," said AITA secretary general Hironmoy Chatterjee.
"Our election for post

of President was in accordance of the Code af-ter Mr Anil Khanna quit."

The secretary gen-eral said they will soon introduce grants system for state associations for hosting tournaments.

It has been learnt that the ministry has asked the AITA to fund one third of the cost of the tournaments.

One third of the total

cost will be provided by the government and one third has to be raised by the host association.

Assam flood situation improves; Brahmaputra flowing below red mark

GUWAHATI, AUG 25 (PTI): The flood situation in Assam improved considerably today with waters of the Brahmaputra river and many of its tributaries flowing below the red mark, even as seven districts in the state were still inundated.

Around 2.67 lakh people in 472 villages of the state are still affected by the deluge. Dhemaji, Lakhimpur, Barpeta, Chirang, Morigaon, Nagaon and Golaghat districts are flood- hit, an Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA) report said.

Nearly 36.000 hectares of farmland are still inundated, it said, adding only the Dhansiri river at Num-aligarh in Golaghat is flowing above the danger level.

With people returning to their homes, only 62 relief camps were operating in Lakhim-pur, Morigaon, Chirang and Nagaon districts where 25,253 people were taking shelter.

There were reports that roads in Jorhat district, a bridge in Morigaon and a school in Dibrugarh district have been damaged.

The third wave of the devastating flood has so far claimed the lives of 72 persons across Assam. In total, 156 people have died in this year's flood-related incidents in the state.

Govt restricts import of gold, silver items from S Korea

New Delhi, Aug 25 (PTI): The government on Friday restricted imports of gold and silver items from South Korea in a bid to check spurt in inbound shipments of pre-

cious metals from that country.

The importers will now have to obtain a license from the Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) for importing gold and silver from South Korea

These restrictions are being imposed against the backdrop of sudden surge in imports of pre-cious metal from South Korea, with which India has a free trade

agreement since January 2010.
Gold imports from South Korea has jumped to USD 338.6 million etween July 1 and August 3 this

year. The import in 2016-17 stood GST. at USD 70.46 million.

"Imports from South Korea of articles of jewellery and parts thereof, of precious metal or of metal clad with precious met-al...;articles of goldsmiths' and silversmiths' wares and parts thereof...and coins are restricted," the DGFT said in a notification.

Would you like to wind up NGT: HC asks government

NEW DELHI, AUG 25 (PTI): Expressing concern over the posts of judicial and expert members in the National Green Tribunal (NGT) falling vacant shortly, the Delhi High Court today asked the government if it wanted to wind up the environmental protecenvironmental tion body.

A bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Justice C Hari Shankar raised the question after it was informed that after December, only three judicial and two ex-pert members would remain in the tribunal.

"Would you like to nd up the National "Wound y wind up the National Green Tribunal?," the bench asked the govern-ment, while directing it to file a status report within two weeks.

The matter will now

be heard on September

The court was hear ing a petition filed by lawyer Gaurav Kumar Bansal, seeking filling up of vacancies in the NGT.

Bansal, who was represented by advocate Su-meer Sodhi, said, "Due to the red-tapism involved in bureaucracy, a fine in-stitution like the NGT is heading towards a premature death."

The court was also informed that on account of retirement of most of its members, two zonal benches of the NGT would stop functioning by October.

The petition said currently, there were eight judicial members and six expert members in the NGT and with retirements due, after December 9, the number of expert members would come down to two and after February 13, 2018, only three judicial members would be left in the panel. "The lackadaisical at-

titude and apathy of the government in not filling up the vacancies in the posts of judicial and expert members is intrigu-ing and appalling," the petition said.

India in Afghanistan poses "no direct threat" to Pakistan: US

WASHINGTON, Aug 25 (PTI): India's economic activities in Afghanistan pose "no direct threat" to Pakistan, a senior US official has said, asserting that Islamabad needs to change some of its "un-helpful behaviour" by cooperating with America to achieve the counter-terrorism goals in the

region.
US President Donald Trump has sought an enhanced role for India in bringing peace in Afghanistan as he ruled out a hasty withdrawal of troops while announcing his Afghanistan and South Asia policy on Monday.

Trump had said that a critical part of his South Asia policy was to further develop America's strategic partnership with India. He also sternly warned Pakistan for providing safe havens to terrorists.

"While we welcome India's role in Afghanistan, it has a lot of goodwill, they are doing developmental projects. They have given USD 3 billion in aid and US appreciates that and wants that to continue. But again we do not see that a direct threat to Pa-kistan," the White House official said on condition

of anonymity.

"I am not going to discuss the steps and measures that the US is considering considering pursuing with Pakistan," a White House official said when asked about the critical statements coming from Pakistan after Trump's South Asia strategy announcement

"There is some frus tration in Pakistan. We just want to emphasise that Pakistan really has the choice here. It can choose to cooperate with the US and change some of the unhelpful behaviours. That is very much in its interest. The US is not taking a tougher approach just to make Pakistani lives more difficult," the official said vesterday.

Samsung chief Lee Jae-yong jailed

SEOUL, AUG 25 (AP): Samsung heir Lee Jae-yong, the de facto leader of South Korea's successful group, was sentenced today to five years prison for offering bribes and other crimes

Lee, 49, was groomed to lead the conglomerate that was founded by his grandfather and became such a dominating force in South Korea that it's mockingly called "Republic of Samsung" by the

He took a higher profile role at the world's largest maker of smartphones, televi-sion sets and microchips that power consumer electronics after his father suffered a heart attack in 2014 and was poised to cement control.

Instead, at the end of last year Lee was implicated in a massive political scandal that culminated in President Park

Geun-hye's ouster.

The court said he was guilty of offering bribes to the former president and her close friend Choi Soon-sil to facilitate a smooth handover of power at Samsung, which is a publicly traded compa-ny. Park and Choi are also on



trial. A Samsung lawyer said the guilty verdict would be appealed.

It's almost a rite of passage for the bosses of familycontrolled South Korean conglomerates known as chaebol to go to prison for white collar crimes only to later make a comeback. Some were par-doned and others got sentences reduced on appeal.

Lee's own father was

twice convicted for tax eva-sion but received a special presidential pardon so he could help South Korea win its bid to host the Winter

But the princeling's case may be different because the public is increasingly un-willing to indulge the double standards long enjoyed by families who were lionized a generation ago for helping to

"It's an entirely different world now," said Park Sang-in, a professor at Seoul Na-

Perceptions of Lee's business competency have also been damaged by the trial. To insist on his innocence he gave testimony that made him appear clueless and not in charge.

"He was stumbling, stam-

mering, unsure of the basic functions of his own company and its offices," said Geoffrey Cain, the author of an upcoming book on Samsung.

Many expected Lee would

get a prison sentence because the judiciary has been criticised for past leniency toward major white collar crime. Lee's sentence is among the longest prison terms ever handed out in South Korea to a member of a prominent business family. Usually they get suspended sentences or pardons

Civic groups said sentencing Lee to prison time was a meaningful step toward justice. But others thought the punishment was too light.

"I think the court should have accepted prosecutors' request for 12 years in prison," said Choi Sukun, a 37-year- old teacher in Seoul, "Given the gravity of the case, I think the ruling is too generous."

Business lobby groups, while refraining from openly criticising the verdict, expressed concerns that Lee's absence from the helm of Samsung would take a toll on the South Korean economy, given Samsung accounts for about one fifth of the nation's exports.

"Samsung Electronics represents South Korea as a global company so we are deeply worried about the fallout from his long absence," said a spokesman at the Ko-rea Employers Federation, a pro-business lobby group. "It will be a disaster not just to an individual company but to the nation's economy."

But South Korea's presidential office took the verdict as a step forward, issuing an unusual commentary on a court ruling. "We hope that it would pave the way to end persistent government-busi-ness collusion," a presidential spokesman said, according to Yonhap.

Pak may call Parliament joint session over Trump threat: report

(PTI): Pakistan government is planning to summon a joint session of Parliament to discuss and finalise the way forward in the wake of US President Donald Trump's remarks warning Islamabad against providing safe havens to terrorists, according to a Dawn News reported

Rabbani indicated that after adoption of the draft by the Senate, it would be taken to the joint session of Parliament. it said. Earlier. taking part in the discussion on Trump's remarks. Senators said the US must remember that Pakistan was a frontline state in the war on ter

ror and had suffered the

TAYLOR SWIFT RELEASES FIRST SINGLE FROM UPCOMING ALBUM 'REPUTATION'

The "old" Taylor Swift is dead, the sing-er proclaims in her new single "Look What You Made Me Do."

After a week filled with cryptic teasers and an album announcement, the 27-year-old pop star returned Friday with an angsty new jam, the first single from her upcoming sixth album, Reputation.

"I don't like your little games/ Like your tilted stage," Swift begins in the tune, which she co-wrote with 1989 collaborator Jack Antonoff and includes an interpo-lation of "I'm Too Sexy" by Right Said Fred. 'The role you make me play, the fool/ No, I don't like you."

Clearly addressing her public image and the spotlight shone on her public feuds and relationships since her first country leased in 2006, Swift is tongue-incheek about the changes in her life "I'm sorry, the old Taylor can't come to the phone right now," she says near the end of the song. 




