Bihar govt approves aid for SC/ST civil services aspirants

PATNA, MAY 8 (PTI): Bihar's Nitish Kumar government today approved a scheme under which it will give Rs 1 lakh as assistance to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes students who crack the civil services preliminary tests conducted by the UPSC, an official said.

The scheme - Anusuchit Iati Evam Anusuchit Janjati Yojana - was approved by the state cabinet during a meeting chaired by Chief Minister Kumar.

Addressing a press meet, Chief Secretary Anjani Kumar Singh said "likewise,

an assistance of Rs 50,000 will be given to SC/ST students who clear the PT (preliminary test) for civil services exams conducted by the Bihar Public Services Commission (BPSC)".

"Preparations for civil services exams, whether those conducted by the UPSC or the BPSC, often require candidates to move away from their home towns to places with better study facilities. The move is aimed at helping bright aspirants concentrate on their studies without worrying about expenses", Singh said. ly into accounts of the eligible candidates and the entire amount will be paid in a sin-gle instalment," the chief secretary, accompanied by Principal Secretary, Cabinet Secretariat Department, Arun Kumar Singh, and Secretary SC/ST Welfare Department Prem Singh Meena, said.

Another measure aimed at helping SC/ ST students approved by the cabinet was an assistance of Rs 1,000 per month to "to all boys and girls from the community who may be studying while putting up in hos-

The aforementioned assistance will be a part of the Mukhyamantri Anusuchit Jati Evam Janjati Chhatravas Yojana, he said.

"Nod was also given for extending the benefits of schemes run under the Bihar Mahadalit Vikas Mission to all SC/ST fami-

lies across the state," Singh said.

The announcement that all SCs and STs would be getting benefits earlier reserved only for Mahadalits (poorest among Dalits) was made by the chief minister at a function organised by Union Minister Ram Vilas Paswan, whose Lok Janshakti Party is an alliance partner in the ruling coalition in the state.

The move had caused anxiety among opponents such as Hindustani Awam Morcha founder Jitan Ram Manjhi, who recently broke away from the NDA to join the Congress-RJD combine.

Manjhi, a former CM of Bihar, had issued a statement alleging the Kumar's pro-Dalit stance was tantamount to shedding "crocodile tears" ahead of the Lok Sabha polls.



Ready to become prime minister, says Rahul

Congress president Rahul Gandhi said today he is ready to occupy the prime minis-ter's post if his party emerges as the "biggest" party in the 2019 Lok Sabha polls, making known his ambition for the topmost executive post.

"Well, it depends...it depends on how well the Congress does in the election....I mean, if it emerges as the big-gest party, yes," Gandhi said, when asked during an interaction here if he would be the next prime minister.

This is not the first time Gandhi has spoken about his prime ministerial ambition.

In an interaction at the Berkley University in the US in September last year, Gandlutely ready" to be the prime ministerial candidate of the Congress in 2019 Lok Sabha

Amid the cut and thrust of the Karnataka Assembly polls, Gandhi said he is "pretty confident" that Narendra Modi would not be the next prime minister, and if the Congress acts as a "platform" (with other parties in a coalition), the BJP does not stand a chance of winning the elections.

"It is highly unlikely that BJP will form the next government, and the second part is that it is close to impossi-ble that Modi will be the next prime minister." Gandhi said. speaking at a function where 'Samruddha launched

He said the oppositio unity would not allow the BJP to remain in power. Gandhi asserted the Congress would win the Assembly polls in Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan.

Referring to the BJP and RSS, Gandhi said the forces hisparty was fighting against were trying to disrupt openmindedatmosphere, peace and the brotherhood that existed in India. Drawing a comparison between the RSS and Muslim Brotherhood, Gandhi said their agenda was to come topower, and then capture institutions.

The BIP and RSS will repeat one more cycle of get-ting elected democratically

and then discard democracy," he alleged.
"The RSS over here and

the Muslim Brotherhood in Egypt,Pakistan, Tunisia, Turkey....they are doing the same thing. The RSS and Muslim Brotherhood do not see elections the way we seethem. We win an election and we are okay with losing anelection," he said.

Gandhi said the Congress never faced an "existential crisis" on losing an election but the BJP and the RSS "see elections as a way into government, and once they enter, they want to capture every single institution in India".

The Congress leader claimed demonetisation was the BJP's way to tell the coun-

try that there was not a single institution in the country that was "immune" to the saffron party.

He said the BJP praised

Mahatma Gandhi, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel and B R Ambekdar upfront but destroyed their legacy.

"Their method is to praise the leader, praise the icon,worship the icon and destroy every single thing he used todo," Gandhi said.

'Samruddha Bharat Foundation' is a platform to propa-gate liberal, secular and republican values across the country.

Its trustees include veter-an film director Shyam Benegal and noted Supreme Court advocate KTS Tulsi.

Later speaking to re-

norters Gandhi said Modi should explain to the people of Karnataka why a "corrupt person who went to jail" was made the BJP's chief ministerial candidate, "People of Karnataka want to know, why Narendra Modi could not find a non-corrupt chief

ministerial candidate.

They also want to know why Mr Narendra Modi has given eight tickets to the Red-dy brothers who have stolen Rs 35,000 crore of the people of Karnataka," he said. Karnataka BJP chief B S

Lead by Example

To inspire the youth towards self-sufficiency, hold up some examples

The State Government is trying to convince youth to opt for the pride of self-employment and The State Government is trying to convince the becoming producers in what has been a consumer state for a long while. The advice is laudable and the government had begun the initiative many years back with the skill development programme in the hope of equipping the youth with the tools required to make this transition. Almost simultaneously came the CM-SES offer. The government is now reinforcing the commitment with the support for start-ups scheme.

To start at the beginning, the initial two pro-

grammes met with less than glorious results, and one of the reasons why the youth who attended these trainings and awareness programmes returned less than inspired could have been because they did not see too many "examples" worth emulating around them. And since the State is omnipresent here, the youth need to be shown success stories in government undertakings to get convinced that its executive can draft skill de velopment programmes of any real consequence. Instead, what the youth see too much of is funds getting pumped into "development" projects only to deliver failures. Can they be faulted then if they are hesitant to put their scarce resources into similar projects? It is also true that government- run projects fail because of somnolent and corrupt implementation, whereas in the hands of private entrepreneurs, these very investments would have turned profits, but for the youth to accept this, the government will have to set the record straight. This, it can only achieve success by fixing ac-

To flesh out what is suggested here, let's share here the case look at a Comptroller & Auditor General's Report for Sikkim of many years past. The year is not important, because the lesson rings as true today as it did some ten years ago. The Animal Husbandry, Livestock, Fisheries and Veterinary Department received Rs. 45 lakhs in central sponsorship in August 2000 to establish a backyard poultry farm at Chujachen in East Sikkim. The idea was to maintain a breeding stock of poultry birds requiring low input technology and backed by adequate health coverage for the birds. The Department used up Rs. 39.86 lakhs of this outlay and the poultry farm commenced operations in August 2002. It closed down in August 2003 'with no birds and no eggs'! When confronted with a query from the CAG Auditors, the concerned Secretary explained that the farm was struck by 'some' uncontrollable diseases leading to high mortality and, oh yes, there was also a defect in the construction of the building!

When youth learn that poultry can be infected by 'some uncontrollable diseases' which even a Department with a Veterinary wing under it cannot contain and that a poultry farm requires such complicated construction that even government engineers can end up constructing a defective building, how can they be expected to get excited into opening poultry farms even if it carries a non-intimidating tag like "backyard poultry farm"? Of course, the reasons offered for why the farm closed down are lame excuses and even the CAG auditors had rubbished it as 'not tenable.' The farm after all had a Chief Veterinary Officer in charge for it and still the auditors could not come across even a single instance of either the mysterious outbreak being brought to the notice of higher authorities or of the CVO initiating any corrective action himself. It appears that Rs. 39.86 lakhs were wasted not because the poultry was sick or the construction defective, but because the monitoring and implementation were frail. What is probable though is that the official reason will be

accepted and the matter forgotten.

This is but an example of how, if the government is serious about wanting to inspire the youth to strike their own futures, it will have to do more than just train - it will have to lead by example. It will have to make success stories out of poultry farms like the failed one at Chujachen for the youth to believe in the promise of alternative careers. But since that is not happening any time soon, it is reassuring that the start-up programme has arrived for those who have still not started out to watch and learn from those who have already taken the plunge. Apart from just supporting start-up ideas, it would serve Sikkim well if these ideas were more widely shared among the young and the success stories reached to them to inspire and give confidence.

'A time of anxiety': The depressing new reality for local journalists in conflict zones

heconversation For journalists who cover Afghanistan, the bombing that killed nine

local reporters last week in Kabul was a sober reminder of the dangers the media continue to face in the country's seemingly endless conflict.

The victims were not well-known foreign correspondents, but a group of courageous Afghan photographers, reporters and cameramen who had gone to report on another bomb blast that had exploded about 40 minutes earlier. They included a photogra-pher from the French news agency Agence France-Presse (AFP), as well as contributors to Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty and several local media companies. Elsewhere on the same day, a 10th journalist was shot dead - a reporter for the BBC's Pashto service, Ahmad Shah.

According to Reporters Without Borders, it was the deadliest single day for journalists in the country since

the overthrow of the Taliban in 2001.

The principal way we receive news from conflict zones like Afghanistan. Syria and Iraq is via eyewitnesses on social media and the global news agencies - AFP, Associated Press and Reuters. Agency reporters are often the first "media responders" to deadly incidents like suicide bombings and terror attacks. They also negotiate with local reporters on the ground to secure the best pictures, which then get relayed to the thousands of me-dia companies around the world who subscribe to their services. To feed this beast of global 24/7 news coverage, there is still an expectation that agency journalists will dare to tread where others will not.

IOURNALISTS AS TARGETS

Increasingly, this has become even more dangerous, as extremist groups like the Islamic State have shifted tactics to specifically target journalists. The Afghan Journalists Safety Committee warned of "an unprecedented increase in threats and violence against journalists" in a 2017 report:

Increased threats from DAESH to media and journalists have created a new wave of concerns about the security of journalists and media. What seriously worrying is the group's direct attacks against media, which in 2017 is responsible for the vast majority of journalists' deaths.

Reporters Without Borders says

34 journalists and media workers have died in attacks by the Islam-ic State and Taliban in Afghanistan since the start of 2016. The situation



has called on the United Nations to appoint a special representative dedicated to protecting the lives of journalists. The proposal has been backed by French President Emmanuel Macron and the German parliament.

Without adequate security provisions, journalists have also been abandoning countries that have become too dangerous, Reporters Without Borders notes in its 2017 annual re-port on reporters killed in the line of duty. AFP continues to operate with a team of two or three foreign journalists in Kabul, backed up by seven fulltime Afghan journalists and various stringers working across the country. Reuters employs just one foreign correspondent and one local journalist in Kabul, and AP has two local reporters and two local photographers.

Former BBC journalist Bilal Sar-wary, who now works as a freelancer, tells me there are very few Western journalists left in Afghanistan because "Iraq and then Syria have commanded their attention" in recent years. He said The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post still have reporters based in the country, but now rely almost entirely on freelance photographers.

RESPONDING TO THE

NEW REALITY Under global news director Michèle Léridon, AFP has been highly innovative at adapting to news gathering challenges, but also strict in its policy of not being made stooges by ter-rorists. According to Phil Chetwynd, AFP's global editor-in-chief, the com-

pany is constantly evaluating its security procedures.

We have always been cautious

about rushing to the scene of attacks. We have moved our office several times in Kabul to find a better location as the threat level has changed. We have sent security experts to review our procedures and to recommend physical reinforcements and measures to our buildings. We have also sent reporters on hostile environment courses and sent trainers to Kabul to train all staff including non-journalists. The message to all our reporters remains that security comes first.

Chetwynd notes the suicide bomber who killed the nine Afghan iournalists in Kahul last week - a Journalists in Kabul last week - a group that included AFP photogra-pher Shah Marai - had apparently been posing as a fellow reporter, a new tactic by terror groups. "We are already changing and reacting to this appalling new reality," he says.

It's clear that all media organisa-

tions need to constantly rethink their strategies when it comes to reporting in conflict zones. Media scholars, too, are tackling the issue. At the upcoming International Communications Association conference in Prague later this month, I will be joining other academics on a panel titled "Voices in Journalism: Local News Staff Producing International News" to discuss the latest research examining the working conditions of stringers, fixers and local journalists.

One of the panellists, Saumava Mitra, has researched the work of photojournalists in Afghanistan and co-authored an essay last week of the challenges they face.

We have seen that local journalists usually have much poorer access to hostile-environment training, work-hazard insurance or even medical benefits from their employers. They face different threats and risks than those who parachute into the conflict and have nowhere to go if the situation escalates. They are also much more prone to reprisals. The first step to help prevent their deaths is to acknowledge that the news we consume is often produced by jour-nalists working under precarious conditions in hostile places.

Marai, for one, always knew the dangers of working in Kabul, as his blog on the AFP website so devastatingly shows. In it, he recounts how life changed for the worse when the Taliban returned to stage attacks in

Kabul in the mid-2000s:
"I don't dare to take my children for a walk," he says. "I have five and they spend their time cooped up inside the house. Every morning as I go to the office and every evening when I return home, all I think of are cars that can be booby-trapped, or of suicide bombers coming out of a crowd. I can't take the risk. So we don't go out.

"I have never felt life to have so

In the Family Court, children say they want the process explained and their views heard. It's time we listened

Where will I live? Who will look after me? Can I stay at my school? Do I be stay at my school? Do I have to move house? Can I keep my dog?

When parents separate, children are full of

burning questions.

In most cases, separating parents work out the arrangements for their children between themselves. But when parents cannot resolve their disputes they can end up in the Family Court or the Federal Circuit Court. Most cases are eventually settled, but about

7% of these cases have to be decided by a judge. The children may or may not have any say in what happens. Among the issues under consideration in a review into the family law system presently underway at the Australian Law Reform Com mission is how children can be better supported to participate in family dispute resolution processes.
Research provides some clues. Our study, un-

dertaken by the Centre for Children and Young Peo ple at Southern Cross University for Legal Aid NSW, included a survey of 54 children and young people (aged 7-16 years) accessing the services of Legal Aid NSW. We focused on children's understanding and experiences of family law processes.

We found children placed most emphasis on be-

- ing able to: understand the role of the Independent Children's Lawyer (ICL), a representative that the court may appoint to represent their best interests and ensure the court hears the child's views (if that's what the child wants).
- trust the ICL have clear explanations about who will know
- what they tell the ICL
- be listened to and be heard
 check with the ICL about what's OK for them to

 be able to talk to the ICL when they need to GOOD PRACTICE FOR INDEPEN DENT CHILDREN'S LAWYERS

We've used these findings to develop a good practice guide for ICLs (Independent Children's Lawyers) who are tasked with representing the views of children in the legal process.

- It's important that ICLs:

 Consider logistics of the meetings they have with children (How easy is it for the child to get to? Will
- the parent wait outside the door?)

 Take time to build rapport with children

- Explain the legal process and key players in terms the child can understand, with analogies
 Explain the limits of confidentiality that the ICL can keep some things to him/herself, but not all
 Address common concerns of children (Will I have to go to court? Will the ICL tell my parents what I have said? Who is making the decision? When will all of this be over?

A DÉLICATE BALANCE

In the family law context, balancing children's rights to protection while affording them their participation rights can be delicate.

It is now widely acknowledged that children have legitimate views and important things to say about what matters to them - for example, which school they attend, whether they can play sport on the weekend if their living arrangements change, how much time they spend with the parent's new partner (whom they may not like).

While they want their views to be taken into ac-

count, most children do not want responsibility for decisions, and they do not want to upset their parents.
When disputes are ongoing, and involve serious

conflict, allegations of family violence, abuse, and parental incapacity to provide safe care, children are likely to see a person appointed to write a family report for the court, and have an ICL appointed.

In these circumstances, children are likely to be unsure about talking to a lawyer and what they should and should not say. They may be concerned about the repercussions, and even their safety, if they go against a parent's claims. This can mean that children may not share information that could help determine what would be in their best interests.

'YOU REALISE THEY DO CARE'
Respecting what matters to children is crucial. It can help determine how sustainable and workable the arrangements are, and whether children feel recognised. As one child told us:

I think it's important they've asked us our opin-ion before they've made a decision. And they've made us feel like they actually do care about us, whereas before ... when it first happened you felt like you were nothing ... and then once they start involving you in it you realise that they do care, they want to know our opinion, they want to make sure that we're okay with it before they do it.

We now have good evidence and promising practice that could help to make family law processes a more positive, inclusive experience for children. Best for Kids is also a great resource for children and families, with a video explaining what an ICL does, and also other age appropriate information for children under 10 and those who are older.

But legislative reform and policy change won't make a difference while we carry assumptions that children can't or shouldn't contribute meaningfully to post-separation decisions. This requires a different kind of change – one of mind and heart in the way we view and treat children, including how we support them to adjust to major change.

A medical examination has been conducted on the girl and the report is awaited, Singh said, adding that some of those accused in the case were minors.

The Godda incident came days after two more cases of rape in the state drew media attention worldwide

Bangladesh Supreme Court defers Zia's bail hearing

DHAKA, MAY 8 (PTI): Bangladesh's Supreme Court today deferred until tomorrow the hearing on a plea by the country's Anti-Corruption Commission challenging the bail granted to former prime minister and opposition BNP chief Khaleda Zia in a corruption case.

Zia, 72, was sentenced to

Lia, 72, was sentenced to five years in jail in February by a lower court in connection with the embezzlement of 21 million taka (about USD 250,000) in foreign donations meant for the Zia Orphanage Trust, named after her late husband Ziaur Rahman, a military ruler-turned-politician, during her 2001-2006 premiership.

The High Court on March 12 granted bail to Zia considering her age and health issues but the ex-premier continues to serve the term at the old



jailhouse of Dhaka Central Jail as the apex court stayed the court's order.

The Supreme Court's Appellate Division bench, led by Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain, was scheduled to pass the order today, but it deferred the hearing until tomorrow.

Attorney General Mahbubey Alam and main appellant Anti-Corruption Commission's lawyers had appeared with their plea seeking to overturn the March 12 High Court order. Top pro-BNP lawyers includ-

ing former law minister Moudud Ahmed stood as Zia's counsels to free her on bail.

BNP secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir and other senior party leaders were present in the courtroom while party activists rallied around the Supreme Court complex prompting an extra security vigil in the neighbourhood as the hearing was underway.

He killed them apparently after an altercation with his wife at around 8:00 am. The jawan shot

himself dead with the rifle shortly afterwards.

Kathua rape and murder: Accused to file fresh petition in SC, seeking CBI probe

JAMMU, MAY 8 (PTI): The accused in the Kathua rape-and-murder case will file a fresh petition in the Supreme Court (SC) in the next few days, seeking handing over of the probe to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI).

The apex court had yesterday directed that the trial in the case of alleged gangrape and murder of an eight-year-old girl, which had led to a nationwide outrage, be moved to Pathankot in periphboring Punish

neighbouring Punjab.
"A fresh petition seeking a CBI probe is ready. It shall be filed within a few days (in the Supreme Court)," Ankur Sharma, the lawyer of five of the accused in the case, said today.

A detailed counter on behalf of accused Sanjhi Ram, Vishal Jangotra and Parvesh Kumar was filed in the apex court, along with an additional affidavit seeking a CBI probe, he added.

Sharma said in yes-

terday's hearing, only a notice could have been issued if a fresh petition seeking a CBI probe was filed. "The fastest way of

getting a CBI probe in yesterday's hearing was through our counter and additional affidavit," he said, adding that their main concern was not the shifting of the case, but the CBI probe.

The lawyer denied that yesterday's court order, shifting the trial of the case to Pathankot, was a setback for them. "It was a loss for

the state government as it wanted the case to remain in Jammu and Kashmir, preferably in Ramban district," he said, adding that it was a loss for the victim's family also as it had wanted the case to be shifted to Chandigarh.

"The court has called for a fast trial of the case on a day-to-day basis. We are hopeful that the trial will be completed in a year." Sharma said. The state government's "plot" of introducing 221 witnesses to cause a delay in the trial was busted by the apex court, he said, adding that the case would now be heard on a daily basis.

the case will be transferred to the CBI," Sharma said.

The body of the eightyear-old victim was recovered from a forest area in Kathua on January 17, a week after she had gone missing while grazing horses in the area.

The Jammu and Kashmir government had handed over the case to the crime branch, which had formed a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to probe it.

The crime branch had subsequently filed two separate chargesheets in the case, one against the seven adult accused on April 9 and another against the sole juvenile accused on April 10

Sergi Roberto had been sent off at the end of the first period after Luis Suarez opened the scoring in a pulsating, and highly controversial, Clasico.

But Ronaldo's injury will be the key talking point, with the Portugese now facing a fight to recover in time for the Champions League final against Liverpool on May 26.

"How long he will need I cannot tell you but for him, it is a small problem," Zidane said afterwards.

"We'll see tomorrow after the tests, what we have to do is see the damage done to the ankle. He is a little worried because his ankle is a bit swollen

but he said it was only minor."

Ronaldo's injury, coupled with Barcelona avoiding defeat



despite playing half the contest with 10 men, meant it was the Catalans who left the more sat-


Langer, who has been entrusted with restoring Australia's battered reputation, was widely expected to select Paine in his first major decision as coach.

benefit, India and Guatemala agreed to support each other's candidature for the non-perma-nent membership in the United

US Congressional committee seeks conditions on USD 350 mn aid to Pak

Sun Zhengcai, a former Polit-

buro member and party chief of Chongqing Municipal Committee of the Communist Party of China (CPC), was once tipped for a top leadership post. He was abruptly removed from office ahead of the party Congress in October last

The First Intermediate People's Court of Tianjin Municipality today sentenced him to life in prison for taking bribes of over 170 million yuan (USD 26.7 million), state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

Announcing the verdict, the



court also deprived him of his political rights for life and all his personal property was confiscated.Sun, 54, is the latest senior cadre to fall in President Xi Jinping's sweeping anti-corruption campaign.

During the CPC Congress in October, Liu Shiyu, chairman of the China Securities Regulatory Commission had alleged that Sun was part of coup attempt against Xi.

The Congress had confirmed

the second five-year tenure for Xi, regarded as the most powerful leader of China heading the party, the Presidency and the military.

China's parliament also removed the two-term limit for the president paving the way for Xi to continue in power for life

Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post quoted Liu as saying on October 20 that Xi foiled the coup plot by former political heavy weights who were at the receiving end of his high-profile anti-graft campaign.
Sun had been accused of take

ing advantage of his position to seek profits for others and illegally accepting money and property during several positions held by him including as Minister for Agriculture, according to previous court statements.

RAMBO 5 TEASER POSTER CONFIRMS TITLE & FALL 2019 RELEASE



Sylvester Stallone confirms Rambo 5 is in the works, and its first teaser poster has now confirmed that the movie will release in fall 2019. Rumors about Rambo 5 have been circulating for some time. The fairly lackluster critical and box-office reception that was given to the fourth film (Rambo) didn't exactly set the studios running for another action movie starring the Vietnam War veteran.

Rambo earned \$113 million worldwide from a budget of \$50 million. That puts it as the lowest-earning entry in the franchise, with Rambo: First Blood Part II easily be ing the biggest earner by far. There was talk about a TV series that focused on Rambo's son in 2015, with Stallone reportedly set to make regular appearances. This project supposedly halted the development of further sequels, but the show was never given the green light, and Stallone even hinted that he was retir-ing the character. But it seems Stallone is ready to give John Rambo one more shot.

The most recent reports on Rambo 5 indicated that Sylvester Stallone will reprise his role as John Rambo and possibly direct. The script is apparently undergoing final revisions by the actor/director, and it would see the character trying to rescue the daughter of a friend, leading him to go up "against the full might of one of Mexico's most violent cartels". While the story hasn't been confirmed yet, the film's first teaser poster is now on display at the Cannes Film Festival, which confirms a fall 2019 release for Rambo 5, now titled Rambo V. Stallone later shared the poster on his Instagram account to-day, with the caption reading: 'Something wicked is coming

With Stallone still heavily involved with Creed 2 and reprising his iconic role as Rocky Balboa, it remains to be seen if he will indeed assume directorial duties or not. And with the current high turnaround on big stu-

dio productions, it's very likely that we can expect to hear more about the casting and crew on this project very soon, especially if Millennium Films hope to adhere to that projected release frame. Beyond that very basic synopsis, the involvement of Stallone, and that just-released date, nothing else is known about the film.

Stallone has always been very vocal in his intentions to continue the Rambo franchise and explore more facets of the character. The fourth film is regarded by some as a misstep, for it mostly concentrated on pure firepower and violence than further developing the character and story. With the standard of today's action films, it will be interesting to see how the original action hero intends to bring the older John Rambo to the screen again. After all, franchises like Fast and Furious and Stallone's own The Expendables have upped the ante in terms of scale and explosions.

DEADPOOL 2 POSTER HYPES SEQUEL 'FROM THE STUDIO THAT KILLED WOLVERINE'

A brand new poster for Deadpool 2 Areminds fans that the movie comes from the same studio that killed off Wolverine, one of Marvel's most iconic superheroes. The original Deadpool proved to be one of the biggest cinematic surprises of 2016 and a post-credits sequence confirmed that a sequel featuring Cable was already in the works. After intense casting speculation, Josh Brolin was cast in the role and Zazie Beetz joined the team as Domino, with most faces from the original movie including Colossus, Negasonic Teenage Warhead and Morena Baccarin's Vanessa also returning for the second installment.

Unfortunately, original director Tim Miller left the project due to creative differences and was replaced by David Leitch. Ahead of Deadpool 2's release later this month, 20th Century Fox's marketing campaign is in full swing and a collection of promotional trailers have put Wade Wilson's edgy, fourth-wall breaking humor front and center, taking snipes at the DCEU's dark tone, Henry Cavill's facial hair and Brolin's dual superhero

facial hair and Brolin's dual superhero duty as Thanos in Avengers: Infinity War. The footage released thus far has also confirmed the introduction of the X-Force with Deadpool leading a new super-team that includes Bedlam, Shatterstar and crucially, Peter.Popular Mechanics released a brand new Deadpool 2 poster that includes the tagline "From The Studio That Killed Wolverine" in reference to Fox's 2017 Wolverine solo movie, Logan, which saw the death of Hugh Jackman's incarnation of the character.

In a knowing wink of self-aware humor, the poster also features a pedalo-riding Deadpool cruising past a kitchen sink. Aside from the jokey references, it's also worth noting that the poster includes a parachute with what appears to be an invisible person attached. Eagle-eyed fans saw a similar unmanned parachute in a recent trailer, suggesting that the X-Force will include an invisible hero from the Marvel canon such as ForgetMeNot.
