parties NEW DELHI, DEC 1 (PTI): The Supreme Court to-day sought the responses of the government and the Election Commission on a PIL seeking to restrain convicted politicians from running and holding posts in political

parties. A bench comprising Chief Justice Dipak Misra and Justices AM Khanwilkar and DY Chandra-chud agreed to examine the validity and contours of Section 29A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951.

Registration of asso-ciations and bodies as political parties with the Election Commission are dealt under this section.

Senior advocate Siddharth Luthra, appearing for lawyer Ashwini Kumar Upadhyay who has filed the PIL on the issue, said convicted politicians are barred under the law from contesting elections but they can still run a political party and hold posts in them, besides deciding as to who will

become a lawmaker.

The plea has sought directions to the Centre and the Election Com-mission of India to frame guidelines to decriminalise the electoral system and ensure inner-party democracy as proposed by the National Commis-sion to Review the Working of the Constitution (NCRWC).

DHAKA, DEC 1 (PTI): Pope Francis today apologised for the "indifference" of the world towards the plight of Myanmar's persecuted Rohingya community as he referred them by their ethnic name publicly here for the first time during his historic tour to Asia.

Over 620.000 Rohingya Muslims have fled to Bangladesh following a crackdown by the Myanmar military in re-sponse to attacks on security forces by Rohingya militants.

Francis, who is on a three-day visit to Bangla-desh, met a group of 16 Rohingya refugees who

were brought to Dhaka from their makeshift camps in Cox's Bazar, bordering Myanmar.

In a moving encoun-ter, Francis blessed them, held their hands and intently listened to their heart-rending tales of escape from the Buddhist-majority nation, in an apparent show of public solidarity towards Asia's worst refugee crisis in decades.

"The presence of God today is also called Ro-hingya," the the 80-year-

old pontiff told the group.

Limboo group questions inauguration of Sirijunga statue

GANGTOK, 01 DEC:

ust two days before the formal inauguration of the statue of Mahatma Sirijunga at Hee Yumang Thegu at Hee-Bermiok in West Sikkim, some members of the Limboo community have expressed displeasure over the way the construction is being undertaken and questioned the inauguration of the project which is yet to be completed.

SP Subba [former Principal Director and member of the Construction Committee constituted by the state govern-ment on 26 March 2010] slammed the state gov-ernment's decision to inaugurate what he insists is an incomplete project on which only 40% of work has been done.

According to Mr Sub-ba, they were informed by the Cultural Affairs and Heritage Department that total amount of the fund for the project has already been released to the implementing agency, Rural Management & Development Department, and yet the project is still incomplete.

The foundation stone of the said project was laid on 03 Dec 2006 and even after so many years 60% of construction works is

pending, he alleged. The Construction Committee had pointed out several issues in the Joint Inspection carried out on different occasions from March 2011 to 2017 and submitted the same to the state government but they were all ignored, said Mr Subba

The Joint Inspection Committee team had rejected some parts of the bronze castings works done and quality of the metals used for the statue at Ashangthang, Namchi and suggested recasting as per the specification, according to Mr Subba. He alleged that the same rejected parts and inferior metals were used in the statue without approval of the Con-struction Committee.

The court said the matter was of "very grave public interest" and should be addressed seriously.

A number of visually impaired people in the country were "facing problem with these new notes. In our interaction with such people, they told us that they are facing huge difficulty due to the change of size of notes also," a bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Justice C Hari Shankar said.

"I ask for your forgiveness for the indifference of the world," Francis told a group of Rohingyas at the arch-bishop's palace in Dhaka. "In the name of all of

those who have perse-cuted you, hurt you, I ask forgiveness. I appeal to your large hearts to give us the forgiveness that we are asking," he added. "Let us not turn away"

from it, he further said. This is the first time

Francis used the term "Rohingya" during his South Asia tour.

The Pope had been criticised by rights groups for not using the term in Myanmar, whose military has been accused of ethnic cleansing by the UN. He had used the term before his visit.

Myanmar's govern-ment rejects the term Rohingya, labelling the community "Bengalis". It says they migrated illegally from Bangladesh so should not be listed as one of the country's ethnic groups.

Francis also Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at the Vatican embassy in the capital while the premier s press secretary Ihsanul Karim said they held a 20-minute private conversation. Hasina was accompanied by her family members.

Francis also joined the interfaith conference of Muslim majority Bangladesh's Islamic schol-ars alongside Hindu, ars alongside Hindu, Buddhist and Christian clerics and civil society figures on the second day of his three-day tour

ing appeared significant as Francis frequently used such events to demand that religion must never be used to justify violence as Bangladesh, which has experienced a series of attacks blamed on Muslim militants in recent years.

Earlier in the morn-ing, Francis traded his popemobile for a rick-shaw and waved to shaw and waved to crowds from the passenger seat of the pedicab to go to a park where he led an open air mass.

In fact, it is now that the real work on formulating and implementing policy improvements begins. The year was mostly taken up with routine administrative works and now that the routine of schools in session is no longer the more pressing concern, more time and planning can be invested on addressing the recurring challenges of educating Sikkim. And while it is expected for government schools to receive special attention since most of the students are enrolled in them, it is also important for private schools to take stock and plan improvements because they carry an inspirational veneer with most parents wanting their wards in them if possible. Sikkim has routinely performed well in all indica-

tors for school education, and by that count the Human Resource Development Department has a reputation to live up to. At policy level and when it comes to funds commitments and policy intents on paper, Sikkim has proven is that it is focused on providing better education. What we also know, however, is that this focus is not always backed by the required diligence at the administrative level. Let's looks at some aspects that are wrong with the way Sikkim seeks to educate in its schools. Routine matters which should have been streamlined a long time back continue to get stalled and delayed. Textbooks still take a longer time to reach schools should be acceptable any more It is also not uncommon for some schools to hold the first term examinations for students who have not received teachers for some of the subjects. Why this continues to happen is difficult to understand. Then there is the unique situation of understaffed rural schools and still bursting-at-their-seams urban and suburban

Both these aspects have received some attention in the recent years, and every new academic year should see this process further refined and less influenced by political pressure and other influences. The winter pause is now being used for advanced teacher training sessions and workshops, and one hopes that this will now graduate to a level where the teachers are also invited to participate in the policy-refining initiatives. Teachers, after all, know best what the students still require and how their learning experience can be made more meaningful. For far too long, teachers have received directions and orders, but no concerted efforts have been made to take their counsel or even take them into confidence. That is a wealth of experience and understanding that Sikkim is not tapping into and should make an effort to source. Also left out from preparations for the next academic year is feedback from students. There might still be time to begin this process to inform at least some of the initiatives for the next session. A simple offer like inviting school clusters to send in recommendations for what the Department could do for them before schools reopen and for student clubs to send in wish-lists would be a good place to begin. Such a move would not only establish a better connect between the department and the schools, between officials and teachers and between the State and the students, but also seed a stronger sense of belonging and reinforce the urge to participate. That would be a good feeling to end an academic vear and look forward to a new one.

Sikkim has a lot to do before it can plate exclusively local veggies on tables here

The recent announcement of the Chief Minister to ban import of vegetables from next year is a decision which appears to be not based on ground realities. The organic fever that has enveloped the State appears to have given effect to a decision based on illusions. To begin with, the impression that only Sikkim is doing organic farming is misleading because many states in India are implementing organic farming on much larger areas and some started much before Sikkim.

As per data from the Ministry of Agriculture, Government of India, the use of chemical fertilizers in Sikkim in 2003-04 was barely 3.5 kg per hectare against the all-India average of 89.8 kg and use of pesticides was negligible. It can thus be said that Sik-kim was already organic before the SDF government started the organic movement and what the present gov-ernment has achieved has been the branding of the movement as organic which has been very successful and must be commended.

The ground reality VIEWPOINT

of achieving full veg-etable self sufficiency, however, is a mirage still in the horizon. The land use pattern in the State clearly indicates that the net sown has significantly diminished over the years and no program to either reclaim waste lands or expand cultivable lands has been implemented thus far. Various studies have shown that

the only way to increase production of vegetables in Sikkim is by bringing more land under vegetable cultiva-tion. It has been scientifically proven that production under organic farming tends to be lower than the fertilizer supported methods. The fact that soil fertility of the State is poor needs to also be borne in mind.

Manpower in agriculture has also been diminishing over the years, which is a worldwide phenomenon due to the low economic returns from this sector. The exodus of cultivators

The weakest link in promoting organic farming in the state is the lack of funds. The state government has

which is already high compared to all India levels, will go up further and the cost of food here is already one of the

highest in the country.

Sikkim still suffers from under nourishment and the ban on import will give rise to possible malnourish-ment since vegetables could go out of reach for most people depriving them of essential nutrients and vitamins.

Decisions based on whims and

fancies could harm the economic growth of the state, the consequences of which will be irreversible.

To be fully sustainable in vegetable production, the government will have to take action on several fronts and allocate funds for well laid out plans. Indiscriminate banning will lead to benefit for a few like was the case of poultry and eggs. A holistic approach must be taken if organic farming is to really succeed in Sikkim.

There's an insidious strategy behind **Donald Trump's retweets**

On Nov. 29, President Trump retweeted a series of videos that purported to depict violence committed by Muslims. They had originated from the ac count of a far-right British ultranationalist who had been convicted for harassing a Muslim. The backlash was swift, with British Prime Minister Theresa May saying "the President is wrong to have done

But Trump's retweeting of controversial (some

times outright false) content is part of a pattern.
For example, during the 2016 campaign, George Stephanopoulos asked Donald Trump about his retweet of a follower who insisted that both Marco Rubio and Ted Cruz were ineligible for the presi-

dency.

Trump dismissed Stephanopoulos' question with "it was a retweet" – as if to say that retweeting someone else's claim meant that he wasn't respon

When pressed, Trump continued:

"I mean, let people make their own determi-nation. I've never looked at it, George. I honestly have never looked at it. As somebody said, he's not [eligible]...and I retweet things and we start dialogue and it's very interesting."

It's a response that can be reduced to I'm not saying it, I'm just saying it.

As a scholar of American political rhetoric, I've

previously written about the ways that Donald Trump's rhetorical style mirrors that of polarizing figures like George Wallace and Joseph McCarthy.

But it's becoming increasingly clear that what sets Trump apart is his reliance upon paralipsis, a device that enables him to publicly say things that he can later disavow - without ever having to take esponsibility for his words. Just saying...

The art of rhetoric - or persuasive communica-In a art of rhetoric – or persuasive communica-tion – can include any number of forms: speeches, essays, tweets, images, films and more. Paralipsis (para, "side" and leipein, "to leave") is a Greek term that translates to "leave to the side."

It's thought to be an ironic way for a speaker to say two things at once.

For example, say you wanted to imply that you

coworker takes too many coffee breaks without actually accusing him wasting time at work. You might say something like, "I'm not saying that he drinks more coffee than anyone else in the office,

but every time I go to the break room, he's in there." You might also shrug and make a "something seems kind of off" facial expression.

Paralipsis is a powerful rhetorical device be-

cause it can also allow someone to make a false accusation - or spread a false rumor - while skirting consequences

And Trump has become a master at wielding

this tool.

For example, after he was widely condemned for retweeting a graphic of homicide data delineated by race, FactCheck.org found that "almost every figure in the graphic is wrong." His response on the Bill O'Reilly Show was:

Bill, I didn't tweet, I retweeted somebody that was supposedly an expert, and it was also a radio show...am I gonna check every statistic? ...All it was is a retweet. And it wasn't from me. It came out of a radio show, and other places...This was a retweet. And it comes from sources that are very credible, what can I tell you?

In other words: I'm not saying, I'm just saying. Meanwhile, Trump has repeatedly used par-alipsis to deflect criticism that he's courting white supremacists.

In January 2016, Trump retweeted a photo-shopped image of Jeb Bush from a user with the handle WhiteGenocideTM. In response to the backlash he received for retweeting a white supremacist, Trump simply shrugged: "I don't know about retweeting. You retweet somebody and they turn out to be white supremacists. I know nothing about these groups that are supporting me

Likewise, he blamed a faulty earpiece for his unwillingness to disavow David Duke and the KKK in a CNN interview:

I don't know anything about what you're even talking about with white supremacy or white su-premacists. So I don't know. I don't know – did he endorse me, or what's going on? Because I know nothing about David Duke; I know nothing about white supremacists.

I'm not saying, I'm just saying. And when Gawker tricked Trump into retweet-ing a quote from Benito Mussolini during the campaign, his response was "What difference does it make whether it's Mussolini or somebody else? It's certainly a very interesting quote.

Accountability and responsibility
Certainly it's a good thing to "start dialogue." Trump knows that "interesting" content attracts

retweets, followers, audiences and media attention

However, there's danger in circulating accusations and rumors, even if the purpose is to "start dialogue." Research shows that once an accusation or a rumor begins to circulate, it's very difficult to retract. Often, a retraction or clarification doesn't receive as much attention as the initial accusation. Meanwhile, the mere act of retracting misinformation can reaffirm the deceptive assertions as facts, even after the clarification.

So what does it mean when a political figure gains a devoted following and rises to promi yet consistently avoids taking responsibility for

the content of his public messages?

Political theorists, rhetoricians and historians have grappled with this exact problem since the rise of the "demagogue" in Athens in 429 B.C., when Pericles' death created a vacuum for "unofficial" leaders of the people to rise to power.

The danger, according to political scientist Er-nest Barker, was that "such a leader – having no official executive position - could exercise initiative and determine policy without incurring political responsibility, since it was not his duty to execute the policy which he had induced the assembly to

In the Greek context, Barker described the danger of demagogues who weren't tasked with implementing the policies for which they advocated. In our current political context, Trump can argue that he can't be held accountable because he wasn't the one who originally posted the tweet. He can shrug and claim that he's simply giving a voice to an idea.

In both cases, the defining feature of demagogues is their refusal to accept responsibility for their actions.

Yet Donald Trump (the television star) routinely fired people on his show "The Apprentice" for failing to take responsibility for their team's failures. And he's often given lectures on "responsibility" to his Twitter followers, like on February 14, 2013 when he invited his followers to "take responsibility for yourself – it's a very empowering

To use the President's brand of paralipsis: I'm not saying that Trump's a hypocrite and a demagogue. I'm just saying that he doesn't exactly follow his own advice

HC asks Arnab, Republic TV to respect Tharoor's silence

New Delhi, Dec 1 (PTI):

journalist Arnab Goswami

Shashi Tharoor's wife Sunanda Pushkar's death
case but asked them to
respect the Congress MP's
"right to silence".

Justice Manmohan

Justice Manmohan said the right to air the story cannot be taken away but a balance has to be maintained.

The high court also asked Goswami and Republic TV to send an advance notice to Tharoor for his views before airing any news in connection with his wife's death case.

"Every individual has a right to silence. He cannot be forced or compelled to speak on the issue" the judge said

The court's order came on three different applications filed by Tharoror in his Rs two crore defamation suit against Goswami and the channel for allegedly making defamatory remarks against him while airing news relating to the mysterious death of his wife.

Pushkar was found dead in a suite of a fivestar hotel in south Delhi on the night of January 17, 2014 under mysterious circumstances.

Tharoor has alleged that they continued to engage in "defaming and maligning" him despite an assurance given by their counsel in the court on May 29.

The court had on May 29 said the journalist and his news channel could put out stories stating the facts related to the investigation of Pushkar's death but could not call the Lok Sabha MP from Thiruvananthapuram "a criminal".

The Congress leader has sought a direction to them that they should not mention the expression "murder of Sunanda Pushkar" anywhere, since it is yet to established by a competent court whether her death was a "murder".

Mary Kom resigns as boxing's national observer

NEW DELHI, DEC 1 (PTI): Five-time world champion M C Mary Kom has resigned as the national observer for Indian boxing after Sports Minister Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore made it clear that active sportspersons will not be considered for the position.

"I resigned as national observer 10 days ago after having a word with Mr Rathore. I had been requested to take up the position, it was not something I had asked for," Mary Kom, who claimed her fifth Asian Championships gold medal last month, told PTI today.

"I had inquired about

"I had inquired about the rule on not having active athletes as observers with the then Sports Secretary Injeti Srini-



vas when it was offered to me," she explained, reacting to insinuation that her appointment smacked of conflict of interest given that she is still an active national

"But at that time, I was told that I should nonetheless accept the

position. I did so on insistence of the Ministry and I don't want unnecessary controversies about something that I had not asked for."

The 35-year-old Olympic bronze-medallist was among 12 national observers appointed by the then Sports Minister Vijay Goel in March.

The list also includes the likes of Olympic-gold-medallist shooter Abhinav Bindra, double Olympic-medallist Sushil Kumar and former Commonwealth Games gold-medallist Akhil Kumar among others.

Happy opening dilemma as India brace up for another big win

New Delhi, Dec 1 (PTI): An infinitely superior India will be eager to carry out yet another demolition act on a below- par Sri Lanka when the two teams clash in the third and final Test starting here tomorrow.

India's dominance has made the series a lopsided affair and the aspect which will be most interesting to observe tomorrow is the opening combination that the home team would pick.

After the batting debacle in the first innings of the first Test, Indian openers Shikhar Dhawan and KL Rahul enjoyed a fruitful second innings with scores of 94 and 79 respectively.

Murali Vijay, who was surprisingly kept out of playing XI for the first Test, came into the side in the second game in Dhawan's absence to score 128.

Now with Dhawan back in the squad, it is indeed a happy problem for skipper Virat Kohli, who has to choose two quality openers among three. Had Kohli himself opted out

Had Kohli himself opted out of the third Test, then it would have been easier to fit in all three knowing that Rahul can

also play at the No.4 position.

But with Kohli playing, it would mean that one of the openers will have to sit out. If Karun Nair's example is taken, he had to sit out because first-choice middle-order batsman Ajinkya Rahane was making a comeback to the side.

If that policy is followed, then Dhawan and Rahul have a better chance but Vijay's tighter technique also makes him a strong contender.

A bold decision could have been to drop an out-of-form Rahane from the playing XI and accommodate all three but that could be detrimental to the In-



dian vice-captain's confidence as he will be a vital cog in the wheel for India in overseas conditions.

India are 1-0 up in the series which could have easily been 2-0 had Kohli and his men got an extra 45 minutes on the final day of the rain-curtailed first Test that ended in a draw.

With skipper Kohli himself questioning the need for such series in a roundabout manner, the unequal balance between the sides has been all too evident

No wonder, India would be ideally hoping to put up another dominant show, aiming for a finish inside four days.

One aspect of this encounter which could be of some relevance is the fact that this will be India's last Test match at home for quite some time as the young team would embark on the toughest journey of their cricketing careers come 2018.

Starting with three Tests against South Africa followed by the two marquee away series

-- five matches against England and four against Australia at the back-end of 2018 will define the character of Kohli as a leader and also the ability of his team.

Therefore it will be a good chance for the likes of Kohli, Cheteshwar Pujara and Ravichandran Ashwin to rack up some more enviable numbers which will do a world of good to their confidence.

Facing a Sri Lankan side, which has been nothing short of an embarrassment, is not the greatest of challenges but for world's No 1 Test side, it will be an opportunity to get some much required match practice, which they unfortunately won't get in South Africa save a two-

Add to it, the absence of their injured veteran left-arm spinner Rangana Herath has left the island nation look like a rudderless ship.

Herath, with figures of 1/81 in 39 overs, was the only bowler who the Indians treated with respect during their innings and

at Nagpur. Even worse, Angelo

Mathews, who was supposed to take Sri Lanka cricket to the next level, has been woefully out of form.

The Feroz Shah Kotla track

may not be as flat as the one at Jamtha, where India scored 610/6 declared but it also won't be a green top like the one they got at the Eden Gardens.

Ishant Sharma, who had

a match-haul of five wickets, would like to retain his place in the side even if Mohammed Shami gets injured.

The last time a Test match was held at the Kotla in 2015, it was rated as the best pitch as the match against South Africa went deep into the fifth day.

But the current Sri Lanka side does not possess the kind of guts and gumption that Hashim Amla, Temba Bavuma and AB de Villiers displayed, which precisely is the reason that all and sundry are bracing for a quick finish.

Kerala woman breaks gender stereotype to turn snake catcher

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, DEC 1 (PTI): Watching a snake slither close by can be scary for many but not for 33-year old J R Raji for whom catching

Be it a hissing Cobra or poisonous viper or deadly python, Raji is never in fear as she is known to handle them with aplomb.

Hailing from Nanniyode village in nearby Palode located at the foothills of Western Ghats, catching snakes is more of a social service for her.

The woman, who grew up nurturing a passion to become a snake catcher, has rescued 119 snakes in the last nine months from various parts of Thiruvananthapuram and Kollam districts,



breaking the gender stereotype in snake-catching.

Cobras used to hiss ferociously, with their hoods spread and flicking their slip-

pery tongue out, when she tries to catch them. Many deadly pythons and

poisonous vipers have even tried to bite her as she held

them in her hands

However, all these have not stopped the homemaker from continuing as a snake-catcher.

The woman, who took to snake-catching out of curiosity and a liking towards the reptile, has now become a saviour of serpents in the region which come out of its traditional habitat and stray into human settlements due to various reasons including climate change.

She has come to pro-

She has come to provide solace to local people who get jittery after seeing a snake in their backyard or room as they can call her for immediate help any time.

Over 70 cobras, 11 vipers, seven pythons, a handful of

kraits and other local varieties are among the serpents, which she rescued from human habitations and released into forest.

A degree drop-out, Raji said said catching a king cobra, one of the most dangerous and venomous snake variety, is still a dream for her.

"Ours is a forest fringe village and we have been seeing many types of snakes from early days. So I never had any fear of snake since my childhood," Raji told PTI.

"Instead, I was curious to touch it. That intense desire was the first urge to become a snake-catcher. Snake catching is more like a passion for me," the home-maker said after one of her missions during which she caught a viper.

Except attending an oneday coaching class some time back, she does not have any professional training in snake catching.

A mother of two school-going girls, Raji rides her scooter to each place from where she gets calls seeking help to remove snakes from their area.

Her husband accompanies her if she gets calls late at night, she said.

After catching each snake, Raji pats it on its back, kisses its hood and puts it in tiny sacks or plastic containers with holes.

If it is ferocious and venomous, she hands it over to the nearest Forest office and if non-poisonous, she releases it at a safe place as per direction of Forest department personnel.

"I never ask for money to catch snakes. If people offer some donation, I accept it and never bargain. If those seeking help are poor and elderly, I never accept money even if they offer," she said.

A driver by profession, Raji drives a jeep and pick-up van to make both ends meet.

Though she has rescued over 100 snakes risking life, the woman said she has never suffered a snake bite so far adding no snake was also hurt. "I consider snake-catch-

ing as a humble social service. It is helping people, risking life. I will continue it," a proud Raji added.

12 killed, 32 injured in terrorist attack in Pakistan

PESHAWAR, DEC 1 [PTI]: Burqa-clad Taliban mil itants today stormed an agriculture training insti-tute in Pakistan's northwestern city of Peshawar and opened indiscrimi-nate fire, killing at least 12 people, half of them students, before being shot dead by security forces

The three heavily armed militants, who arrived on an auto rickshaw, attacked the stu-dents' hostel of the Directorate of Agriculture Extension on the University Road in the city, the capital of the restive Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa province.

The institute was closed for the Eid-e-Milad holiday, but about 70 students were present in the hostel.

militants The stormed the building by firing automatic weapons, creating panic, officials said

The Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan claimed responsibility for the attack.

Police chief of Khy-

ber Pakhtunkhwa province Salahuddin Mehsud said 12 people including six students, a security guard and five civilians, were killed and 32 others injured in the attack.

Aerial surveillance of the operation was carried out by the army aviation division whereas armoured vehicles of security forces were also called on site.

He said three terror-

ists were killed by securi-ty forces after a gunfight which lasted for an hour. Police are trying to ascer-tain the identity of a dead

Bullets holes in building walls, broken glass scattered and blood stains could be seen on TV footage.

A huge cache of arms, including three unex-ploded suicide vests, 20 hand grenades. Klashnikovs have been recovered from the possession of terrorists.

The eyewitness, a stu-dent, said he and his colleagues ran as fast as they could but two of them were injured in the firing.

"We took them out with us and admitted them to the hospital," said Ariful Hag, adding that around 120 students live in the hostel but most had gone home due to the long weekend.

Japan emperor to abdicate in April 2019

TOKYO, DEC 1 [AFP]: Japan's Emperor Akihito will step down on April 30, 2019, the prime minister announced today, the first retirement in more than two centuries in world's oldest imperial

Shinzo Abe said he was "deeply moved" at the "smooth decision" taken at a special meeting of the Imperial Council to decide on the date for the popular 83-yearold to step down for health

"The government will make utmost efforts to ensure that the Japanese people can celebrate the emperor's abdication and the succession of the crown prince," added Abe.

Akihito's eldest son, 57-year-old Crown Prince Naruhito, is expected to as-cend the Chrysanthemum Throne the next day.

The news was splashed

across the front pages of the evening papers, with the Sankei Shimbun distributing a special abdication edition.

The abdication will bring to an end the current Heisei era which has lasted the 30 years Akihito has been on the

The emperor shocked the country last year when he signalled his desire to take a



back seat after nearly three decades, citing his age and health problems.

There have been abdications in Japan's long imperial history dating back more than 2.600 years but the last one was

re than two centuries ago.

Akihito is the 125th person to sit on the Chrysanthemum Throne since Emperor Jimmu, said to be a descendant of the legendary sun goddess Amaterasu.

Emperors have played a

crucial role in the country's native Shinto religion, ducting various annual rites and prayers for the prosperity of the nation.

There is no republican movement to speak of in Ja-pan and the emperor and the royal family enjoy the admiration of the vast majority of the country.

The emperor and his wife

Empress Michiko are seen as being the more accessible face of a monarchy that largely re-

mains in the shadows, unlike the British royals.

But Akihito's unexpected

move presented a challenge since there was no law to deal with an emperor retiring from what is usually a job for life -and it reignited debate about allowing women to ascend the traditionally male-only throne.

In June, the parliament passed a one-off rule allowing the ageing emperor to step down.

The abdication must take

place within three years and applies only to Akihito, who has been treated for prostrate cancer and has also had heart surgery.

Some worried that changing the rule to allow any em-peror to abdicate could put Janan's future monarchs at risk of political manipulation.

The status of the emperor is sensitive in Japan given its 20th century history of war waged in the name of Akihito's father Hirohito, who died

Akihito was born in 1933 just as Japan was embark-ing on its militaristic sweep across Asia, and was 11 when

the war ended in defeat. His father was allowed to remain on the throne after Japan's defeat, but his status was downgraded from semi-divine sovereign to a figurehead with no political power.

Akihito embraced the role

and tried to use it to help heal the scars of the war while re-moulding one of the world's oldest monarchies for a democratic age.

Even before he assumed

the throne. Akihito broke with tradition when he married the daughter of a wealthy flour magnate in 1959, becoming the first imperial heir to wed Akihito is barred from commenting on politics, but he has over the years hinted at his

n anti-nationalist views Speaking at a memorial marking the 70th anniversary of Japan's surrender, Akihito expressed "deep remorse" for

the country's actions in World The looming abdication has reignited concerns about a potential succession crisis.



Japan's centuries-old succession would be broken if that son, Hisahito, does not have a male child.

In response, Japan's parliament has called for a debate on giving women a bigger role in the male-dominated monarchy.

The idea -- including the possibility of letting women ascend the throne -- is popular with ordinary Japar but it is vehemently opposed by traditionalists.

"His decision to donate his salary is a tribute to his compassion, to his patriotism his and sense of duty to the American people. But it's his compassion above all that drives his interest in the issue to which HHS is going to devote his donation, America's devastating



opioid crisis," HHS Acting Secretary Eric Hargan, told reporters at the White House.

Hargan said since day one of this administration, Trump's leadership on this issue has driven action on it

across federal government.
"The opioid epidemic kills 175 Americans every day. That means we'll lose seven of our fellow Americans to drug overdoses

during this press briefing alone. That kind of urgency is why President Trump delivered a speech back in October calling for HHS to declare an unprecedented nationwide public health emergency regarding the crisis," he said.

During his presidential cam-

paign. Trump had announced that he will not take salary from the government. But as per the US laws, he cannot reject the salary due to him in his capacity as the President. As such he decided to

donate his salary every quarter. Trump donated his first-quarter salary to the National Park Service and the second-quarter to the

Suu Kyi visits China as crackdown criticism grows

BEIJING, DEC 1 [AP]: Myanmar civilian leader Aung San Suu Kvi was set to meet President Xi Jinping on a visit to friendly neighbor China starting Friday as international criticism over her country's persecution of Rohingya Muslims continues to

China has studiously avoided criticizing the crisis and Suu Kyi can be expected to receive a warm welcome when she meets with Xi. China will also likely push for Myanmar to restart a dam project suspended after overwhelming local opposition.

Suu Kyi is in Beijing to attend a gathering of delegates from



more than 200 political parties by China's ruling Communist Party. It wasn't clear whether the Nobel Peace Prize laureate would speak at the gathering or when she would meet with Xi, who was reappointed last month to a second five-year term as Communist Party general secretary.

China was a longstanding friend of Myanmar during the Southeast Asian country's isolation from the West, and has been helping shield it from criticism over the crisis that has seen more than 620,000 Rohingya flee Myanmar over the last few months.

Myanmar's military has conducted a scorched earth campaign against the Rohing-ya that the United Nations and United States describe as "ethnic cleansing." Refugees living in squalid conditions in camps in Bangladesh have described indiscriminate attacks by Myan-mar security forces and Buddhist mobs, including killings, rapes and the torching of entire villages.

Suu Kyi, who spent 15 years under house arrest during the nation's long era of military rule, has come under widespread criticism for not speaking out against the violence, with some calling for her Nobel prize to be revoked. While Myanmar elected a new civilian government in 2015 led by Suu Kyi, the military continues to wield ultimate
