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Horticulture Secy clarifies stats on Sikkim's organic vegetable production

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 14 NOV:

Secretary, Horticulture and Cash Crop Development Department, Khorlo Bhutia, while speaking to *Summit*-Times over the phone today, clarified statistical details as published in the PTI report headlined, 'Sikkim produces 80,000 metric tonne of organic vegetables", published in SummitTimes issue dat-ed 14 Nov, 2017.

Making corrections to some of the statistics, the Secretary informed that 100% organic vegetables were being grown on farm area of 15,000 hectares out of the 76,392 hectares certified for organic farming in Sikkim. This area was mentioned as 14,000 hectares in the report.

Another 14,000 hectares are in fact dedicated to grow four main crops cardamom, ginger, turmeric and buckwheat
 under the Mission Organic Value Chain Devel-opment (MOVCD) which is being implemented in all the North Eastern hill states including Sikkim.

The Secretary also corrected that local-ly-produced organic vegetables fall short by 20,000 metric tonnes for local consumption as against the 1,000 metric tonnes shortfall men-tioned in the report.



Debt ridden Lanco looking to sell 500MW HEP in Sikkim

GANGTOK, 14 Nov:

The Lanco Infratech
Ltd is in the process of selling its 500 mega-watt (MW) hydro-electric power plant in Sikkim, as part of an effort to consolidate its businesses and reduce debt. Talks with strategic investors are on with a view to divest its power assets in order to generate cash for its other businesses, it is learnt.

Lanco Teesta Hydro Power has said that it supported a decision by a consortium of nine cred-itors to put the project through a strategic debt restructuring (SDR) exercise, since it was taking a long time to bring investors on board. Under the central bank's SDR norms, released in June banks can convert part of their debt into equity and take majority control of a defaulting firm.

The project developer is also in talks with the Sikkim government to take its stake as one of the first choice stat-ing that the defunct HEP wants to bring new investors and wants to re-duce its debt burden.

Lanco Infratech Ltd's subsidiary Lanco Teesta

is setting up a 500MW hydropower project on the Teesta in Sikkim with the initial project cost estimated at about Rs 3 000 ratio of 80:20, comprising Rs.2,400 crore of debt and Rs.600 crore of equity.

As per the data of investors till end of June earlier this year, the firm had brought in Rs.670 crore as equity and the lenders to the project had advanced Rs.2,260 crore as debt. However, the project was delayed due to multiple reasons beyond its control; Lanco Infratech said adding that the SDR is a direct response to the expanding cost overruns and Lanco's inability to repay debt.

Earlier this week, a national daily had reported that two bankers from the lending consortium confirmed that majority lenders had given their consent to ICICI Bank Ltd. the lead bank in the consortium, to convert Rs.780 crore debt into equity in Lanco Teesta Hydro Power.

ICICI Bank now has 18 months to decide on how to proceed with SDR and also to find a new buyer for the project.





Wildlife Worries

The wildlife numbers might be healthy, but what about their actual health

 $D^{\text{eer stumble into villages along the edge of forests diseased and suffering from open sores. Sometimes, dogs }$ set upon the sick animal and bring her down and at other times people try to care for the animal and make its final hours as comfortable as possible. Elsewhere, farmers are reporting raids by wild boars even in North Sikkim. Even the wilds along Tsomgo now have wild boar populations competing with the wildlife there for the scare resources. Parts of West and South Sikkim have been grappling with increased incidence of wild boar raids for a while now and these packs are clearly now expanding to new terrains Both incidents are playing out due to half-cock policy interventions. It is "proper" to ban hunting, but even the half-educated know that forest dwellers and traditional hunting are allowed even when a strict hunting ban is in place. Not so in Sikkim. What should actually have been a strictly enforced ban on recreational hunting has instead banned this traditional activity altogether from Sikkim. Traditional hunting, apart from providing the much-needed protein supplement for communities living along forest belts, also played the important role of culling the sick and the weak from animal herds before they infected the rest. Accept it, no matter how good a hunter someone is they are only good enough to bring down the weakest of the pack. Rural pragmatism also ensured that such hunting was also regulated and almost honorable in the manner it was carried out and had worked a fine arrangement to maintain the balance. But then Gangtok banned it for all of Sikkim (except the privileged for whom the laws don't apply equally). What this has resulted in is an unbalanced growth. And nature does not like that. Also, in the case of wild boars, it is not just farms that are being dug up, but even bigger, but solitary, animals like the bears being chased out of their traditional haunts. Okay, this last one is speculative, but it is not as far out as some might argue. The point being made is that while it is wonderful that Sikkim's wildlife population is supposedly growing, it is important now to find out whether it is also healthier and whether some informed decisions need to be made to ensure that better health returns to the wildlife.

About hunting... Has anyone ever heard of anyone reasonably well-heeled ever get picked up for poaching in Sikkim. And yes, since even traditional hunting practices are no longer allowed in Sikkim, all hunting is poaching irrespective of those with bog caliber guns and searchlights on their vehicles might say. For far too long, Sikkim has heard of only lay villagers getting rounded up for wildlife offences and the only confiscations have been primitive guns and even more primitive traps. Hunting by the well-connected was an open secret and conveniently ignored much to Sikkim's dis-

And now, let's return to the wildlife and even turn the initial observation on its head. Even though few people like to admit it, with hardly any predators around, and given the fact that nearly 50% of the land in Sikkim is officially recorded as being under forest cover, the wildlife density, or at least its visibility, is not half teeming as the laws and maps would lead one to believe. The biodiversity hotspot that Sikkim is introduced as, should manifest itself in more obvious dis-plays, on would expect. While the loss of contiguous forest belts to human encroachment could have resulted in some depletion in wildlife numbers, it is unfortunate that even areas where wildlife was abundant even till recent times, have fewer animals left. These numbers, as mentioned earlier, should have multiplied given the anti-hunting laws and absence of predators It is also possible that the animals have been driven deeper into the forests, but even that needs to be authenticated because Sikkim is a very small state and the forests here run only so deep before they start touching a habitation on the other side. By a lay thumb rule, sightings should have been much more frequent.

And, to end with the argument this piece began with- let us have a proper wildlife census commissioned for Sikkim and along with it, also a proper, scientific study on how well the wildlife is keeping.

Science in the home boosts children's academic success

Did you know that children spend just 14 per cent of their waking time between Kindergarten and the end of Grade 12 in school?

Given this startling statistic, it comes as no surprise that much of children's learning happens there" — in the playground, during extracurricular activities, at a museum, on a walk, via the media, and,

perhaps most importantly, at home.

I am the director of the Education Community Outreach Centre at Queen's University and coordinator of Science Rendezvous Kingston. Science Rendezvous is Canada's largest pop-up science, technology and en-gineering and mathematics (STEM) festival. I also develop mathematics content for two educational chil-dren's programs, The Prime Radicals and mathXplosion. I have developed two provincial toolkits for parents about inspiring children to learn, love and choose math and I am the "math talk" consultant for MathStoryTime.

I have worked for decades to engage parents because I believe that families and schools have much to learn from and share with each other. Schools have formal knowledge of teaching and learning, curriculum, assessment and evaluation. And parents know their children's motiva-tions, skills and interests.

The research also shows that in formal environments including the home — also called out-of-schooltime [OST] settings — play an important role in promoting STEM learning. They do this by sparking student interest and providing opportunities to broaden and deepen engagement in STEM content

THE BENEFITS OF

SCIENCE AT HOME Empirical evidence clearly suggests that OST experiences strengthen and enrich school STEM learning by reinforcing scientific concepts and practices introduced during the school day. These experiences can be in museums, after-school programs, science and technology centres, ligardens and at the kitchen table.

OST experiences also promote an appreciation for, and interest in, the rsuit of STEM in school and in daily e. They help learners understand the daily relevance of science to their lives, the depth and breadth of science as a field of inquiry, and what it might be like to choose to do science in the world, either as a professional

It is no surprise then, that informal

outside of class, Brief, high-quality parent-child interactions about STEM can make a profound difference to how children perceive STEM subjects and succeed in them academically.

One study, for example, showed that when caregivers used a mobile app to bring a little bit of math into the home, their elementary school children showed improved math skills within months. Improvements were most dramatic in families where

Here are two very simple experients that can be done at home, using everyday household items.

EXPERIMENT 1: ROLLING. ROLLING, ROLLING

You will need: An empty soda can, an inflated balloon and one head of

Directions: Place the can on its side on a flat surface (a table or a smooth floor will do). Then rub the balloon back and forth through your hair. Hold the balloon close to the can without actually touching the can.

You should see the can roll towards the balloon without touching

Why does it work? When you rub the balloon through your hair, tiny, invisible particles called electrons (which have a negative charge) build up on the surface of the balloon, cre-ating static electricity. They electrons have the power to pull very light objects (like the soda can) towards

EXPERIMENT 2: BLOWING UP A BALLOON WITHOUT BLOWING

You will need: A balloon, about 40 ml of water (a cup is about 250 ml so you don't need much), a soft drink bottle, a drinking straw, the juice from a lemon (or two tablespoons of vinegar) and three teaspoons of baking soda.

Directions: Stretch out the balloon. Pour 40 ml of water into the soft drink bottle. Add the baking soda, stirring with the straw until it is dis-solved. Pour the lemon juice (or vinegar) in and quickly put the stretched balloon over the mouth of the bottle.

If all goes well then your balloon should inflate!

Why does it work? Adding the lemon juice to the baking soda creates a chemical reaction. The baking soda is a base, while the lemon juice is an acid, when the two combine they create carbon dioxide gas (CO₂). The gas rises and travels up through the neck of soft drink bottle, where it is trapped inside the balloon and

Why Lebanon faces another crisis- and what Saudi Arabia stands to lose

The Twitter account of Lebanon's prime minister, Sa'ad Hariri has been inactive since November 6. just after he announced his resignation in the Saudi Arabian capital, Riyadh. Hariri justified his decision as a move to escape an assassination plot. So far, both Lebanon's Internal Security Forces and Ministry of the Interior have declared that they were not aware of any such attempt.

Rumours continue, however, that Hariri's absence was not voluntary but instead imposed by the Saudi government, in particular Crown Prince Mohammad Bin Salman, Riyadh's newly empow-ered strongman. Despite Hariri's protests to the contrary, the theory that this was a Saudi intervention is certainly plausible.

As some onlookers pointed out, Hariri's speech

used expressions and terms that are typical of Saudi public rhetoric against Iran. He explicitly accused Iran of interfering in Lebanon's domestic affairs and in disrupting Arab politics, and referred to Hezbollah, the militarised Lebanese Shia move-ment, as an Iranian proxy force – even though he became prime minister partly thanks to Hezbollah's tactical support. Lebanon's president, the Christian Maronite Michel Aoun, even called on Saudi authorities to immediately "release" Hariri.

FEELING THE HEAT

Relevant to all this is that the Saudi government is under serious internal and external pressure. The day before Hariri resigned, the Shia-led Yemeni rebel government fired a long-range missile aimed at the International Airport of Riyadh. And two days later, Crown Prince Mohammad ordered the arrest of dozens of leading Saudi political and business personalities, in what he termed a campaign against corruption. In practice, this seems a strategy to give way to his uncontested leadership in the country.

This clampdown on Saudi Arabia's opposition

and civil society groups started a few months ago, and the wealthy businessmen now under arrest are just the tip of the iceberg. The rich princes' fate is, it seems, not too grim: they reside in the five-star Ritz Carlton Hotel in the capital. Opposition members, meanwhile, are held in prison.

The Saudis' moves are pushing the Middle East

ever closer to the outbreak of a major international conflict at an already tumultuous time. While the so-called Islamic State has lost almost all its territory in Syria and Iraq, the liberation of Mosul and Raqqa by Iraqi and Syrian forces – backed by a pluralistic coalition of Russian, Iranian, Kurdish, and popular resistance groups – has shifted the regional balance of power.

From a Saudi viewpoint, the new geopolitical calculus strengthens Syria's president, Bashar al-Assad, and his erstwhile allies Iran and Hezbollah. Riyadh, which for many years supported insurgent groups in Syria and Iraq, could soon be left

TIPPING THE BALANCE

At the root of it all is the deadly, long-running rivalry between Saudi Arabia and Iran, which has its roots not in the sectarian divide between Sun-ni and Shia Islam, but in the Islamic Revolution in Iran in 1979. Since then, the two countries have confronted each other multiple times, but never directly; Lebanon has been one of their main proxy battlegrounds.

After the events of 1979, the Iranian Revolutionary Guards helped to establish a local resistance movement against the Israeli Occupation of Lebanese territory. This became Hezbollah, which today is a powerful political and military force, boasting elected MPs and government positions. Thanks to the group a primary target for the Saudis, and by extension Israel and the US.

Just as the Saudi authorities' hysterical invective against Iran in recent weeks has dramatic implications for the Middle East at large, Hariri's resignation is a crisis in itself. The collapse of the Lebanese government, the fourth since 2005, could undo critical progress towards political reform and stability. Lebanon faces a massive humanitarian crisis; it's now host to well over 1m Syrian refugees, who make up around a quarter of the total population. It also relies heavily on remittances from Persian Gulf countries.

Added to that, Saudi Arabia's strange Lebanese ventures might pave the way for a more overt in-tervention by Israel, which last took action there in July 2006. That war left Lebanon, especially the southern region, in total infrastructural disarray. A reprise would do little good for Saudi interests; after the kingdom's recent debacles in Yemen and Qatar, the last thing it needs is a conflict that would galvanise support for Hezbollah – and by extension, further embolden a resurgent Iran.

Heavy rains affected tea production

Kolkata, Nov 14 (PTI): Tea production in north India has been severe-ly affected due to heavy rains especially during the month of September, an official of Indian Tea Association (ITA) said.

Quoting Tea Board fig-ures, the official said production in Assam during September this year was down by 31 million kilograms, while for Dooars and Terai in the West Bengal, there was a decline of around nine million kilograms due to adverse climatic conditions.

Overall crop produc-tion upto September 2017 in Assam, which accounted for 50 per cent of total production, was down by 23 million kilograms.

He said, although, there had been slight recovery in production in

October.
The advent of an early winter also held the prospect of further decline in production this year, the official said, adding that the industry was appre-hensive of the recoevry of the crop in the current production cycle.

MNF workers try to stop CM from attending assembly session

AIZAWL, NOV 14 (PTI): The workers of Opposition Mizo National Front (MNF) today tried to prevent Chief Minister Lal Thanhawla from attending the first day of assembly winter session today, police said.

The police, however, managed to disperse the protesters without using force, the SP said.

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MILAN, Nov 14 (AFP): Italy failed to reach the World Cup for the first time since 1958 as they were held to a 0-0 draw in the second leg of their play-off at the San Siro by Sweden, who qualified with a 1-0 aggregate victory.

The four-time champions dom-inated possession but struggled to create enough clear-cut chances, as Sweden secured a first appearance at the finals since 2006 courtesy of Jakob Johansson's first-leg strike in

Despite the support of 74,000 fans in a white-hot atmosphere at the San Siro the 2006 World Cup winners could not find a way through.

It is the third time that the Italians will not compete at the World Cup, after not going to the first edition in 1930 and not qualifying for the 1958 finals in Sweden.

It marks the end of an era for iconic goalkeeper Gianluigi Buffon who will not be able to compete in a record sixth World Cup.

At 39, the 175-times capped Buf-fon had announced that the finals in Russia would be his last as a player for the national side.

'I'm sorry, sorry, sorry," a tearful Buffon told Rai television as he confirmed he was ending his interna-

"I'm not sorry for myself but all of Italian football, because we failed at something which also means something on a social level.



"It's the only regret I have. Not stopping, because time passes and it's normal. I regret just that my final match with the national side coincides with an elimination.

"I leave a squad of talent that will have their say, including (Gianluigi) Donnarumma and (Mattia) Perin. I ed me.

Without star Zlatan Ibrahimovic who retired from the national team after Euro 2016, Sweden sealed a return to the world stage after failing to reach the last two editions. The last time the Scandinavians participated was in 2006.

"I'm emotional and very happy, said Sweden coach Janne Anderss This match showed our collective

"With Ibrahimovic we played differently. He's retired and he's a great champion. So we adapted and we play in another way now."

It was a mediocre performance by the hosts with Antonio Candreva firing over and Sweden goalkeeper Robin Olsen denying Alessandro Flo-

renzi and Ciro Immobile.

Mikael Lustig almost scored an own goal when his deflection hit

Marco Verratti sat out a ban with zola both injured, with Daniele De Rossi and Andrea Belotti not fully fit.

Brazil-born Jorginho his first competitive appearance for Italy with Florenzi and Manolo Gabbiadini also handed starts. Napoli's in-form winger Lorenzo Insigne however was once again left on the bench

Sweden's Lustig was back from suspension, with Johansson starting in place of the injured Albin Ekdal.

The hosts had penalty appeals in

the opening few minutes as Marco Parolo appeared to be tripped from behind by Ludwig Augustinsson. but the referee waved play on and booked Giorgio Chiellini for dissent.

Sweden lost first-leg goalscorer Johansson after 15 minutes when his left knee buckled badly and he was stretchered off to make way for Gus-

tav Svensson. Jorginho's through ball found Immobile to pull back from the byline for Candreva to blast over, but Leonardo Bonucci, wearing a protective mask after breaking his nose on Friday, got a knock to the knee and was limping badly.

Florenzi thought he had scored on 53 minutes with a flying volley from Matteo Darmian's cross, but it went wide.

Bonucci got down to business taking off his protective mask on the hour mark, with Ventura bringing on Stephan El Shaarawy and Torino striker Belotti.

Federico Bernardeschi was the final Italy substitution and Olsen turned away a Parolo header.

As the clock ticked the crowd at the San Siro began to sing the national anthem.

An El Shaarawy shot was kept out by Olsen and Parolo's header went wide, then Buffon came up for a corner in a final desperate gamble as Italy fell short of reaching the World Cup for the first time in 60 years

Italy keeper Buffon ends international career

MILAN, NOV 14 (AFP): Italy goalkeeper Gianlu-igi Buffon confirmed he was ending his international career after the four-time champions failed to reach the World Cup for the first time in

Buffon, 39, played his 175th and final game for Italy as they were beaten 1-0 on aggregate in a play-off by Sweden after a 0-0 second-leg draw at the San Siro, bringing an end to a 20-year international career that included winning the 2006 World Cup.

"I'm not sorry for my-self but all of Italian football." Buffon told Italian broadcaster Rai.

"We failed at something which also means something on a social level. There's regret at finishing like that, not because time passes."

Andrea Barzagli and 34-year-old midfielder Daniele de Rossi, the other two members of Italy's squad on Monday who lifted the 2006 World Cup, also retired from inmath of the shock defeat.

"It's the biggest dis-appointment of my life from a sporting point of view... I can't find my words," said 36- year-old defender Barzagli.

Midfielder De Rossi, who won 117 caps, said: 'To think that I took off this jersey for the last time, it hurts. After the match, there was a funeral-like atmosphere."

Buffon made his de-

but for the Azzurri as a 19-year-old in a 1998 World Cup play-off victory over Russia, but his last match saw him fail in his bid to become the first man to play in six World Cups.

The Juventus captain, who has already said he will likely retire from all football at the end of this season, said Italy fans still have plenty to look forward to, with AC Milan's 18 -year-old keeper Gianluigi Donnarumma set to take the interna-tional number one shirt.

"There is certainly a future for Italian football. as we have pride, ability, determination and after bad tumbles, we always find a way to get back on our feet," he added.



WPI inflation at 6-mth high of 3.59%; onion, veggies costlier



NEW DELHI, NOV 14 (PTI): Inflation at the wholesale level rose to 6-month high of 3.59 per cent in October as the prices of food articles, led by onions and vegetables, rose sharply.

Inflation, based on the Wholesale Price Index (WPI), was 2.60 per cent in September.

In October last year, it was 1.27 per cent. Last month's inflation was

the highest since April, when it was 3.85 per cent. The government data released on Tuesday showed that inflation in food articles more

than doubled to 4.30 per cent

in October. For vegetables, it soared to 36.61 per cent last month as against 15.48 per cent in September.

In case of onions, inflation skyrocketed to 127.04 per cent, while for the eggs, meat and fish segment the rate of price rise was 5.76 per cent.

Inflation in manufactured products saw a slight dip to 2.62 per cent, as against 2.72 per cent in September. In the fuel and power segment, inflation rose to 10.52 per cent, as against 9.01

per cent in September.
Fuel inflation has remained $high \ for \ the \ past \ three \ months$ as petrol and diesel prices continued to rule high tracking global crude oil rates. Power tariffs shot through the roof on lower domestic production.

Pulses continued to witness deflation at 31.05 per cent.

Likewise, in potato deflation was at 44.29 per cent and wheat at 1.99 per cent. The final print of August WPI

inflation remained unchanged

at 3.24 per cent.

As per the Consumer Price Index (CPI) data released on Monday, retail inflation for October rose to a 7-month high of 3.58 per cent on costlier food

items, especially vegetables

Besides, industrial produc-tion for September expanded at 3.8 per cent, on poor showing by the manufacturing sector coupled with decline in consumer

durables output.

Last month, the Reserve
Bank kept benchmark interest rate unchanged on fears of rising inflation while lowering growth forecast to 6.7 per cent for the current fiscal.

RBI also raised its inflation forecast to the 4.2-4.6 per cent range for the rest of the current fiscal as against 4-4.5 per cent previously.

China launches world's first fully electric cargo ship

BEIJING, NOV 14 (PTI): China has launched the world's first all-electric ship, which can travel up to 80 km with 2000-tonnes cargo after a two-hour charge, state

media reports said.

The 70.5-metre-long which weighs about 600 tonnes, was launched in Guangzhou in South China's Guangdong Province, the Peo-ple's Daily reported.

The vessel, manufactured by the Guangzhou Shipyard International Company Ltd, is powered by a 26-tonne lithium battery. It can cruise at the top speed of 12.8 km per hour.
As the ship do not use

fossil fuels, it has zero emission, including car bon, sulphur and PM2.5 and it could be used as a passenger liner or a working ship, state-run

Global Times reported.
On its inaugural run vessel was loaded with thermal coal mainly for areas around the Pearl River in Guangdong Province, the report added.

"This kind of ship

takes into consideration the harmony between humans and nature and can protect water quality and marine life, and should be copied by other ships sailing on local rivers," Wang Yongchen, a Beijing environmentalist, was quoted as saying in the report.

ISLAMABAD, Nov 14 (PTI): A Pakistani accountability court today inched closer to declare the London-based sons of ousted premier Nawaz Sharif as proclaimed of-fenders in the Panama

Papers case.

Three cases were filed against Sharif, his two sons Hassan and Husain, daughter Maryam and son-in-law Muhammad Safdar on September 8 by the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) following July 28 verdict by the Supreme Court in the Panam Papers case. Another case was filed against finance minister Ishaq Dar based

Accountability Court
Judge Muhammad Bashir last month separated the case of Sharif's sons from rest of the family and also initiated proceeding to de-clare them proclaimed offenders as the two brothers, currently in London, have not appeared in the court even once. The court also declared them absconders on October 10 and set a deadline of 30 days for them to appear in the court which has al-

ready expired.

The NAB prosecutor today presented implementation report on de-claring them proclaimed offenders. They also urged the court to declare them proclaimed offenders. However, the judge adjourned the proceeding till tomorrow without announcing his decision.

'Trump's visit one of most embarrassing foreign trips taken by US president'

Trump's visit to Asia has been on of the most "embarrassing" foreign trips taken by a US president as h could not demand concessions from China on trade and failed to highlight Beijing's "unfair" trade practices, a senior Democrat leader has alleged.

Trump, who is on a two-week it to Asia, said in China that he felt US-Chinese trade relations were 'very unfair and one-sided". But he blamed his own predecessors rather than China for the uneven dynamic.

The comments by Trump stands in stark contrast to his previous rhetoric on the campaign trail, where he singled out China as the world's greatest threat to American workers.

Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer called Trump's Asia visit "embarrassing", asserting that the president is not ready for "primetime".

"Without exaggeration, the president's trip to Asia has been one of the most embarrassing foreign trips esident has taken in my memory.

It shows that when it comes to foreign policy, President Trump is not ready for primetime," Schumer said on the Senate floor yesterday.

Trump's five-nation tour of Asia include stops in Japan, South Korea, China, Vietnam and the Philippines. He would return to the White House



routinely criticised China, for pacious trading practices that have

Variety's report also states that there will be an option for a spinoff, meaning a story separate from the main saga could arrive if the main series is a hit. Knowing that, there's a good chance the flagship series will touch on familiar plots and characters while also setting up a separate story for the spinoff.

While Jackson's Lord of the Rings films had their de-tractors, The Hobbit movies were far less well-received by comparison. Given that, Amazon will need to tread carefully when it comes to fleshing out Tolkien's world. Amazon doesn't quite have the track record of Netflix, but they're certainly an encouraging fit when it comes

to translating Lord of the Rings to television.
