After contempt notice, Defence pays up pending dues of occupied lands and homes in North Sikkim

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 25 JUL:

he Defence Estate Of-The Defence Estate of ficer, Siliguri Circle, today informed the High Court of Sikkim that the army has handed over a cheque for the remaining 50% of the hiring charge dues of land occupied by the Indian Army for the last 44 years in Lachen, Lachung and Chungthang areas of North Sikkim

This, after the division bench of the High Court had opened contempt proceedings against non compliance of the Court's

order directing the same.
The Defence Estate
Officer, Siliguri Circle, Deepak Mohan, through an affidavit, informed that as per the demand placed by District Col-lector, North, in January earlier this year calculating the pending dues at Rs 1.92 crore (for payment for remaining 50% of hiring charges of land occupied by the Indian Army for the last 44 years in Lachen, Lachung and Chungthang area of North Sikkim), the cheque for the same has been handed over to the

District Collector-North.

The bench had taken serious view of non-compliance of the court's di-rections passed way back in the year 2014, and had to Principal Director of Defence Estates, Directorate of Defence Estates, Eastern Command, Kolkata and Defence Estates Officer, Siliguri Circle, Siliguri on 05 May this year.

While passing the order in May earlier this year, the High Court had

observed that "...It is well-settled that unless a direction of the Court is stayed or suspended by a superior court, the operation of the order cannot be arrested on account of administrative difficulties faced by the con-cerned authorities."

However, the Court has only disposed of con-tempt proceeding after compliance report was filed by the Defence Estate officer of the Indian Army.

In the meantime, the Court has also directed the State Government to file a status report within a week on steps taken so far in respect of acquisition of land occupied by Indian Army in accordance with law.

Rainfall damages most roads in South Sikkim

As a consequence of continuous and incessant rainfall since 24 Jul almost all the roads in South district have been blocked and the Roads and Bridges Department has been instructed to clear the road as early as possible, a press communiqué from the South District Office informs.

Mobile networks in the district have also been adversely affected due to power failure. Sub Divisional Magistrates and Block Development Officers of the district have been directed to be alert and ascertain dam-

ages in case of natural calamities and to release ex-gratia/relief immediately without further

In the past few days there have been many reports of property damages. In Kopchey a two-storied building has been severely damaged, in Phalidara, a kutcha house was damaged due to heavy rainfall. Many minor landslides have also been reported in the

district.

The SDM has been directed to visit the site as early as possible and submit the extent of damage caused due to heavy rainfall.

No proposal to form panel to look into **Gorkhaland** demand: Govt New Delhi, Jul 25

(PTI): There was no proposal to constitute a committee to look into the separate state demand of the Gorkhas and others agitating in Dar-jeeling, West Bengal, the government said in the Lok Sabha today.

"There is no proposal appoint a committee look into the merits and demerits of the demands of the Gorkhas, Adivasis and others," Union Minister of State for Home Affairs Hansraj Gangaram Ahir said in a written reply to a ques-tion in the Lower House of Parliament.

The Darjeeling hills have been witnessing an indefinite strike called by the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM), demanding a separate state of

ing a separate state of Gorkhaland, since June 12. "Violence and dam-age to public proper-ty have been reported during the agitations," said Ahir.

He added that according to the Constitution, the states were primarily responsible for the maintenance of law and order.

The Centre, on a request from a state gov-ernment, provided assistance by sending Central Armed Police Forces (CAPFs) personnel, said the minister.

Similarly, CAPF bat-talions were provided to the West Bengal gov-ernment as well for the maintenance of law-andorder in the Darjeeling hills, he added.

The Press Club of Sik-Rim, on behalf of the media fraternity of Sik-kim, is expressed shock

over the sealing of the office of ABN Network, a Nepali TV channel, in Siliguri by the West Bengal

police on 23 July. "The channel has been singled out and targeted for airing the voices of the people especially its extensive reportage of the Gorkhaland statehood agitation. Every channel and newspaper had similar coverage. After curtailing the common people of the Darjeeling hills from mobile and internet services, it is extraordinary that the media is fettered in this manner," a PCS state ment on the issue reads.

PCS has condemned the action arguing that the "restriction shows an emergency like attitude of the West Bengal gov-ernment". "It not only cripples the freedom of expression but also ques tions the very soul of de-

mocracy," it adds.

The Press Club of Sikkim has appealed to the West Bengal administra-tion, Union Information and Broadcasting Ministry and the Press Council of India to ensure that there is free flow of information in the region.

Apetition filed founding mer member of Affected Citizens of Teesta [ACT], Tseten Lepcha, in the National Green Tribunal chal-lenging the Notification of the Ministry of Environment and Forests reducing the Eco-Sensitive Zone around Protected areas has finally completed the process of submissions by all parties. The judgment has been reserved by the Iudicial Member and Expert Member of the NGT-Eastern Zone the in Kolkata, a press re-lease from Mr Lepcha informs.

It may be recalled that the petition was necessitated when the Government of Sikkim, through the Forest, Environment & Wildlife Management Department, in the process of declaring the ESZ in Sikkim, had reduced the Supreme Court man-dated 10 kms as a crow flied distance of ESZ to 25 meters in the State of Sikkim.

Mr Lepcha has maintained in the release that reducing this distance has serious implications conservation of the

most important natural resource for development of the State.

In order to protect the biodiversity, the catchment area for continuous water resources for water-based industries, the luxuriant forest cover to mitigate the threat of climate change & global warming and to protect the National Parks and Sanctuaries, NGT had been approached, he de-

lic Interest Litigation was that their land as well as houses has been occupied by the Indian Army without entering into an agreement to pay rental or hiring charges and without issuing any notification for acquisition of their lands and houses. The army is occupying 860.47 acres of public land in the areas in question since 1976 without

any compensation.

Despite clear directions of the High Court in September 2014, the Army and the State Government have not adhered with the directions for payment of hiring charges and are not even vacating their land, the petitioners had complained afresh. The payment is for a dwell-ing house at Yakthang and private holdings in

In September 2014. the High Court had di-rected to make payment to the landowners of Lachen and directed and directed the state government to make a representation for payment to the Army as they had agreed to pay and that this process be completed no later than three months from the date of receipt of letter from State government.

The High Court had further directed the Central agencies to get further final acquisition approval within six weeks and complete the acquisition proceedings within two months thereafter.

This is second time

that the people of Lachen have taken legal recourse claiming the right to have fair compensation of their property and dwell-ing houses illegally and forcefully occupied by

HAVE A STORY TO SHARE?

Period Leave. Hmm...

 $\mathbf{P}^{ ext{eriod leave-}}$ a great idea [at least it has got us talking about it!]; but is it?

To start with, let's lay down the major arguments against the concept of granting women leave when they are on their periods. Women have forever been struggling to be treated at par with men in this largely patriarchal world, especially when it comes to the workplace. This 'special' leave could jeonardize all the work that has gone

into the equality move ment and legitimize the claim that women are not as 'efficient' as men.
There is also the

view that period leaves bear a dangerously close



resemblance to traditional practices, followed in some Asian countries and especially in India, that prevent women when they are menstruating from living a normal life. Also, if one were to accept the pain and discomfort experienced by women during periods as being debilitating, there is always the sick leave option, say those against period leaves. So these largely sum up the anti-leave arguments.

Now, those arguing for period leave say that

women should not have to prove their competence by working on days when they are undergoing ex-cruciating pain. They can, but they should not have to, is their argument. The monthly dosage of pain is normal and so should be the granting of leave on such days. It does not qualify as sick leave because it is not a disease or physical condition.

Gender equality has sometimes been misconstrued, both by men and women, as gender similarity, of women trying to be like men. In this context, the concept of period leave could be seen as accepting that women are different from men and vet, demanding a level-playing field.

There is no doubt that these are strong arguments put forth by both camps, however, gender equality is yet to be realized fully and the concept of period leave puts at risk all the progress made on the equality front so far. That is too great a risk to take. Hence, a brilliant idea it may be, but period leave could perhaps wait a little, at least till the world can reconcile the differences between a man and a woman without putting any one gender

Dereliction and Maladministration

he recent incident in Rhenock, where an accident The recent incident in Rhenock, where an accuse in victim died without receiving the emergency medical assistance she should have had access to and the injured could not immediately be evacuated because of a missing ambulance driver, is more than a dereliction of duty issue it is currently being discussed as. Also at play here are issues of lackadaisical manpower resource management, disinterested over-watch by the concerned agencies and representatives and the typical knee-jerkism where action appears to be taken in the wake of public outcry, but the larger worries of management and accountability are sidestepped.
On 22 July, a carjacker plowed the truck he had sto-

len into a car and group of people in Rhenock. Four people were injured, and when rushed to the Rhenock Community Health Centre, the only CHC is East district, the distraught family realized that the sole doctor posted at the CHC was not in station and the ambulance driver could not be traced to safely evacuate the injured to wherever proper medical assistance could be provided to them. A teenager among the injured succumbed to her injuries, and with this, the despair of the people turned to anger. The people, even as they held a funeral for a child who should have been enjoying her weekend, took to the streets in protest. Every unnatural death is shocking, even more so when a child dies without having received any medical attention in her final moments. People have let many instances of maladministration slide, and this must have been the case of Rhenock as well, but this trauma was clearly too overwhelming for them to ignore.

On Monday, a "high-level" team of officials arrived in Rhenock and apart from transferring the sole doctor posted at the CHC also decided that the doctor and the ambulance driver would be served show-cause notices in what appears to be the opening of disciplinary action against them. They also announced that two Medical Officers (doctors) will now be posted to the Rhenock PHC. And this is the knee-jerk administration which was alluded to earlier. To begin with, if the department had two doctors to spare, why were they not already posted to Rhenock? And then, two doctors for a CHC is still two doctors fewer than the prescribed strength for a Community Health Centre, A CHC should have four medical specialists. Had the concerned department even provided half this prescribed strength to the CHC, even if the child's injuries were too grievous, she would have at least received the best possible care in her dying moments.

So yes, there was dereliction of duty - in Rhenock on Saturday but at the Department since much longer before that. And while the Department is straddled with a lion's share of the blame, some needs to also fall on the shoulders of everyone else who needs to look out for the area and its people. Should this short-staff-ing not have been raised by administrative heads, political leaders and society elders before the disinterested manpower management actually hit home with the Saturday horror? How many of these "leaders" and "heads" bothered with crosschecking prescribed staffing requirements with actual deployment of personnel on ground? Isn't that part of their jobs and responsibilities? The expected rejoinder from the Department would be that they are short-staffed, to which the follow-up would be – why then have no Medical Officers been recruited for the past nine years?

Violence has plagued India's Northeast since colonial times

'PAHAR HASCHEY" (The hills are smiling) is the slogan used by West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Ba-nerjee to describe the peace and prosperity of Darjeeling under her regime. That is a difficult smile to manage given the region's history of colonisation and poverty, and the current agitation that has been going on for a month.

Violence and repressive gover-nance have been an integral part of the history of the Darjeeling hills in the Eastern Himalayas. Beginning with British colonisation in the early 19th century, this colonial legacy has been continued faithfully by the extractive, neo-colonial political and financial institutions of successive West Bengal governments. Poverty, inequality between Darjeeling and other parts of West Bengal, and repression are some of the forms of violence experienced by the people of the Darjeeling hills every day.

However, a generation of young hill people has grown up in the shadow of a more sinister form of violence that is perpetuated, controlled and used by the state as well as different groups: the homeland movement.

The movement for a separate homeland for the Gorkhas of India is being spearheaded by the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha party (GJM). Since June 8, 2017, the Darjeeling hills have been engulfed in a series of violence and counterviolence - indiscrimicounterviolence nate killing of unarmed civilians by the state police, arson by members of different political parties - all of which are obviously denied by the respective groups. As accusations and denials continue, so does the violence. There have been a number of civilian deaths while many more are still smarting from the lacerations caused by the "lathis" (batons) of the West Bengal police. In retaliation, police stations and public property have been set ablaze by homeland supporters.

These latest skirmishes gave rise

to a sense of deia vu. Entrenched in the collective memory of Darjeeling hills is the trauma of the homeland agitation of 1986, which brought violence on a scale and intensity that had never been experienced previously. Those who experienced this agitation first-hand still recall painful memories of being terrorised by the police, countless family tragedies, disappearances, extrajudicial killings, arson, inter-party violence and counterviolence

This agitation concluded in 1988

Gorkha Hill Council (DCHC). The de mand for a separate homeland re-mained latent, only to resurface in 2007 and in 2011 with the formation of Gorkha Territorial Administration (GTA). But this second administrative set-up also failed to bring lasting peace and prosperity to the region. peace and prosperity to the region. While both DCHC and GTA were supposed representations of a regional devolution of power, in reality, they were mere tokens of appeasement as every aspect of hill administration was still controlled by Kolkata.

REPRESSION AND DISSENT

More than three decades after the two-year long, violent Gorkhaland struggle that began in 1986, in June this year, the state government proposed a law that would make the Bengali language compulsory in the predominantly Nepali-speaking hills. Though withdrawn, this policy of cultural imperialism has been enough of a catalyst to galvanise the local population for another homeland movement.

Although there are layers of local and regional political machinations behind the last wave of protests, the state's attempt to repress dissent with violence played a crucial role in the latest escalation.

Paranoid about losing territory and resources, the West Bengal government refuses to acknowledge the demand for Gorkhaland as a political issue. It has always viewed homeland movements as law and order prob-lems, which can best be resolved by beating the hill people into submission. This neocolonial attitude, while evident in different policies pertaining to the hills, has been most prominent during the agitations of 1986 and 2007, as it is again in 2017.

'TAMING THE NATIVE'

On June 15, 2017, a police raid on the house of the GJM leader Bimal Gurung led to the discovery of a cache of items that, according to state authoria "khukuri", a machete shaped knife used as a domestic implement by the Gorkha, agricultural tools, as well as bows and arrows - items which are common in Himalayan households.

The underlying assumption that justifies labelling these common and culturally significant items as dangerous is the age-old colonial discourse that classifies hill people as inherent-ly irrational, sentimental, and prone to violence. Owing to popular public narratives around bravery, loyalty and sacrifice for India, there is an expectation from the hill community that their contributions will be politically acknowledged through the formation of a separate state. Instead, their agricultural tools, which are apparently a confirmation of violence latent within hill people, are confiscated.
Unfortunately, these recent in-

stances of violence involving local citizens and political leaders have proven that colonial narratives will continue to dictate how the Darieeling hills and its people are romanti-cised, governed or repressed. When the stereotypical, docile hill person protests against years of subjuga-tion, status quo must be established

through violence.

In India, state violence has become the language of politics for silencing the poor, the lower castes, minorities, and the disenfranchised. In different spaces of such confrontation are additionally the state of the stat tion around the country, state brutali-ty that includes excessive use of force and torture remains constant.

Cycles of state-led violence, ceasefires and counterviolence have established a framework of violence which has penetrated local political insti-tutions and communities and transformed Darjeeling into an exception-

The tactics of repression that was at its height during the Gorkhaland movement in the 1980s - intimida-tion, disappearances, threats and Darjeeling and are once again shaping the political terrain of the region. The hills may not have descended into complete chaos yet, but the fear of violence is affecting everyday decision-making and making it impossi-ble for conflicting parties to reach an agreement for lasting peace.

Regarding the current violence, GJM leader Gurung has said that all the protests so far are a trailer. The real violence is yet to begin. The anxiety continues as the Kolkata High Court has asked for extra security forces to be sent to the hills and the Supreme Court of India have appealed to all citizens for peace.

In a multiethnic space like Dar-jeeling, where every call for an ethnic homeland stokes fires of interethnic conflict between the Nepali/Gorkha and the Bengali communities, it is important to acknowledge the culture of violence that has become a part of political institutions. To achieve sustainable peace, state actors and local community representatives should have a dialogue bereft of mutual suspicion and they should work towards stemming the culture of violence locally.
In the 1980s, after the Gorkhaland

Agreement was signed, the West Bengal state broadcaster started beaming a half-an-hour cultural show called "Nepali Programme" on television every evening at 5:30pm. For Darjeeling to breathe easy, in 2017 the state has to think beyond the tokenism of a 30-minute cultural inclusion on state TV and a smile from the chief minister's imagination.

Rising carbon dioxide is making the world's plants more water-wise

Equally extraordinarily, our study also shows that the vegetation is hardly using any extra water to do it, suggesting that global change is causing the world's plants to grow in a more water-efficient way.

Water is the most precious resource needed for plants to grow, and our research suggests that vegetation is becoming much better at using it in a world in which CO₂ levels continue to rise.

The ratio of carbon uptake to water loss by eco-

systems is what we call "water use efficiency", and it is one of the most important variables when studying these ecosystems.

Our confirmation of a global trend of increasing water use efficiency is a rare piece of good news when it comes to the consequences of global environmental change. It will strengthen plants' vital role as global carbon sinks, improve food production, and might boost water availability for the well-being of society and the natural world.

Yet more efficient water use by the world's plants will not solve our current or future water scarcity

BOOSTING CARBON UPTAKE

Plants growing in today's higher- CO_2 conditions can take up more carbon – the so-called CO_2 fertilisation

effect. This is the main reason why the terrestrial biohere has taken up 17% more carbon over the past

The enhanced carbon uptake is consistent with the global greening trend observed by satellites, and the growing global land carbon sink which removes about one-third of all CO2 emissions generated by human activities.

Increasing carbon uptake typically comes at a cost. To let CO_2 in, plants have to open up pores called stomata in their leaves, which in turn allows water to sneak out. Plants thus need to strike a balance between taking up carbon to build new leaves, stems and roots, while minimising water loss in the process. This has led to sophisticated adaptations that has allowed many plant species to conquer a range of arid

One such adaptation is to close the stomata slightly to allow CO_2 to enter with less water getting out. Under increasing atmospheric CO_2 , the overall result is that CO2 uptake increases while water consumption does not. This is exactly what we have found on a global scale in our new study. In fact, we found that rising CO₂ levels are causing the world's plants to become more water-wise, almost everywhere, whether in dry places or wet ones.

GROWTH HOTSPOTS

We used a combination of plot-scale water flux and atmospheric measurements, and satellite observations of leaf properties, to develop and test a new water use efficiency model. The model enables us to scale up from leaf water use efficiency anywhere in the world

We found that across the globe, boreal and tropical forests are particularly good at increasing ecosystem water use efficiency and uptake of CO₂. That is due in large part to the CO₂ fertilisation effect and the increase in the total amount of leaf

Importantly, both types of forests are critical in limiting the rise in atmospheric CO₂ levels. Intact tropical forest removes more atmospheric CO₂ than any other type of forest, and the boreal forests of the planet's far north hold vast amounts of carbon particularly in their organic soils.

Meanwhile, for the semi-arid ecosystems of the

world, increased water savings are a big deal. We found that Australian ecosystems, for example, are increasing their carbon uptake, especially in the northern savannas. This trend may not have been ossible without an increase in ecosystem water use efficiency.

Previous studies have also shown how increased water efficiency is greening semi-arid regions and may have contributed to an increase in carbon capture in semi-arid ecosystems in Australia, Africa and

IT'S NOT ALL GOOD NEWS

These trends will have largely positive outcomes for the plants and the animals (and humans) consuming them. Wood production, bioenergy and crop growth are (and will be) less water-intensive under climate

change than they would be without increased vegeta-

tion water use efficiency.

But despite these trends, water scarcity will nev ertheless continue to constrain carbon sinks, food

production and socioeconomic development.

Some studies have suggested that the water sav ings could also lead to increased runoff and therefore excess water availability. For dry Australia, however, more than half (64%) of the rainfall returning to the atmosphere does not go through vegetation, but

through direct soil evaporation.

This reduces the potential benefit from increased vegetation water use efficiency and the possibility for more water flowing to rivers and reservoirs. In fact, a recent study shows that while semi-arid regions in Australia are greening, they are also consuming more water, causing river flows to fall by 24-28%.

Our research confirms that plants all over the world are likely to benefit from these increased water savings. However, the question of whether this will translate to more water availability for conservation or for human consumption is much less clear, and will probably vary widely from re-

Court no to CBI plea for arrest warrant against Gurung, others

KOLKATA, JUL 25 (PTI): A city court today turned down the CBI's plea for an arrest war-rant against GJM president Bimal Gurung and 21 others who did not appear in court for hearing on framing of charges in the Madan Tamang murder case.

Chief Judge, City Sessions Court, Kundan Kumar Kumai refused the CBI's plea that ar-rest warrant be issued against the accused persons who did not appear before the court in contravention of the Calcutta High Court order.

CBI counsel Arun Bhagat had prayed for arrest war rant against Gurung, his wife Asha and 20 others including



senior GJM leaders when they failed to appear before the court yesterday for hearing on framing of charges

The judge fixed the peri-od between August one and four for day-to-day hearings for framing of charge against

the accused persons, as also for hearing of discharge peti-tions filed by those accused in the killing of All India Gorkha League leader Madan Tamang

The judge also directed Bidhanagar Police and Kolkata Police authorities to file reports before the court on allegations that some of the accused were questioned and followed after they left the court premises yesterday.

Their counsel Sayan De claimed before the court that some of his clients were questioned and followed by policemen after they left the court premises here and went to Gorkha Bhayan in Bidhannagar, where they were stay ing for the night.

Of the 48 accused in the case against whom CBI has sought framing of charges for murder of Tamang in the rt of Darjeeling in May 2010, 26 accused were present.

The Calcutta High Court

had on July 19 asked all the accused, against whom CBI has sought framing of charges, to be present before the court of the chief judge of City Sessions Court.

A division bench presided over by acting Chief Justice Nishita Mhatre had directed the trial court to hold day-to-day hearing and conclude framing of charges by August 17.

Noting that several ac-

cused were not present during the hearing for fram-ing of charges on earlier occasions also, the division bench had directed the CBI to ensure their presence in court.

Among the 26 accused present before the court were

former GJM MLA Harka Baha-dur Chetri, Ramesh Allay and Rabin Subba.

Apart from Bimal Gurung, senior GJM leaders Asha Gurung, Roshan Giri, Binay Tamang and Devendra Sharma were among those absent.

Those accused who were absent in the court made written prayer before the court seeking to be represented by their lawyers.

CBI counsel Arun Bhagat had opposed the prayers, sub-mitting that the high court had expressly ordered their presence before the trial court for the hearing. He sought arrest warrants against them for being absent.

Ban on internet in Dari to continue

DARJEELING (WB), JULY 25 (PTI): The ban on internet services in the Darjeeling Hills, facing indefinite shutdown for the last 41 days for carving out a separate state of Gorkhaland out of West Bengal, was extended to-day till August 4.

"Draft guidelines on the proposal to set up sex offenders registry in India are under prepara-tion in consultation with relevant ministries and organisations, before they sultation with state governments and the public." Minister of State for Home Hansraj Ahir said.

In a written reply, Ahir said the initial consultation draft includes the registration of individuals convicted for offences like rape, voyeurism, stalking and aggravated sexual assault.

It also includes pos-sibility of registration of offenders below and above 18 years, the minister said.



India's 1st individual Olympic medal up for auction for funds

MUMBAI, JUL 25 (PTI): The family of Khashaba Jadhav, who won India's first individual Olympic medal, has put it up auction to garner funds for building a wrestling acad-emy named after him.

The decision to auc tion the bronze medal is a painful one but we are left with few options as the state government has reneged on its promise to build the academy." Raniit Jadhav, son of the famous wrestler, told PTI over phone from Satara district in western Maharashtra.

"In 2009, at a wres-

tling event in Jalgaon, then state sports minis-ter Dilip Deshmukh had announced that the government would set up a national-level wrestling academy, named after my late father, in Satara district," Ranjit said.

"After eight years, nothing has materialised. In December 2013, Rs 1.58 crore were sanctioned for the project. But the project has failed

to take shape," he said.
In the 1952 Helsinki Olympics, Khashaba Jadhav, then 27, went on to create history by becoming the first Indian to win an Olympic medal (bronze) in an individual sport.

The hockey team led by Balbir Singh had won India its first gold in the 1948 London Olympics. "My father was an in-trovert and never marketed

his achievements. He was alive till 1984 but the gov ernment didn't felicitate him with an Arjuna Award, which came his way 16 years after his death. Why can't we honour accom-plished people when they are alive?" asked Ranjit.

AFC approves ISL, terms it "temporary solution"

New Delhi, July 25 (PTI): The Asian Football Confederation (AFC) today approved the In-dian Super League to be played alongside the I-League in 2017 and 2018, terming it a "temporary short-term bridg-ing solution".

Following a recom-mendation from All In-

dian Football Federation (AIFF), the sport's Asian governing body today gave green light. AIFF's recommendation to the AFC was that the ISL will replace the Federation Cup, whose winner is currently allocated an AFC Cup preliminary stage place.

Therefore, the AFC Committee approved that the I-League champions will play in the AFC Cham-pions League Play-off round and the ISL Champions will play in the AFC Cup preliminary stage as as all clubs adhere to the AFC rules and reg-ulations, particularly club licensing, from 2018.

From mud house to Rashtrapati Bhavan, it's been a long journey for President Ram Nath Kovind

childhood spent in a mud house in a small village, Ram Nath Kovind moved into the palatial Rashtrapati Bhayan today as the 14th President of India, under-scoring his strong belief in the Constitution which promises

equality to every citizen.

As Kovind, the second Dalit to hold the highest constitutional post, said in his first address as the president today, the journey of his life has been a long

one.
A lawyer, politician and longtime advocate of integrity and an egalitarian society, Kovind, 71, served as the 36th governor of Bihar -- from August 16, 2015, to June 20, 2017 -- before the ruling NDA selected him as their presidential candidate.


Born on October 1, 1945, in Paraunkh, near Kanpur in Uttar Pradesh, he finished his schooling in the UP city before earning a BCom degree as well an LLB from Kanpur University.

Kovind, who enrolled as an

advocate with the Bar Council of Delhi was the Union government advocate in the Delhi High Court from 1977 to 1979 and its standing counsel in the Supreme Court from 1980 to 1993.

He became an cate-on-Record of the Supreme Court in 1978, and practised at the Delhi High Court and the Supreme Court for 16 years till 1993.

But his political journey



began when Kovind joined then Prime Minister Morarji Desai's office after the Janata Party came to power in 1977. That was when the articulate lawyer came to the notice of the Jan Sangh, the precursor to the BJP.

Selected to head the party's Dalit Morcha, Kovind was elected member of the Raiva Sabha from UP in April 1994. He served for two consecutive terms of six years each till March 2006.

He joined a stir by SC/ST employees in 1997 when Dalits and others protested against Central

Hockey India League to return in 2019 with a fresh outlook

NEW DELHI, III. 25 (PTI): After five successful editions, there will be no Hockey India League (HIL) next year and the cash-rich domestic tourmament will only return in 2019 with a fresh outlook, Hockey India said on Tuesday.

tournament's Governing Committee, comprising representa-tives of Hockey India and other stakeholders, have unanimously decided to schedule the next edition of Hockey India League in 2019 instead of 2018 January and February.

"After five years of successfully organizing the Hockey India League, we felt that it is time to review the League, evaluate its success and comeback with a fresh outlook that will benefit the development of the sport," said Mohd Mushaque Ahmad, Chairman Hockey India League and Secretary General, Hock-ey India.

"This decision was made after consultation with all our commercial partners and meeting the contractual obligations of all parties involved,"

he added.

There were reports that unhappy franchises and financial concerns may see the end of the Hockey India League after just five seasons.

However, clarified that this will only be a temporary dis-continuation and that the Hockey India League will return in 2019. "Due to a conflict in

dates of the schedule of Hockey India League 2018 and a major international tournament which was likely to re strict the participation of international players, it was decided that the best solution was to postpone the conduct of the sixth season of the League, Ahmad said.

"I want to emphasize that we want to resume the League in 2019 albeit with greater prospects to make it more viable financially not only for the stakeholders but also for the players," he added.



India should 'conscientiously withdraw' to end standoff: Wang

BEIJING, JUL 25 (PTI): China's Foreign Minister
Wang Yi has claimed that "admitted" to entering Chinese territory and said the solution to the standoff was for its troops to "conscientious-ly withdraw" from the Doklam area in the Sik-

kim sector.

"The rights and wrongs are very clear and even senior Indian officials have openly stated that Chinese troops did not enter into the In-dian territory," Wang said yesterday in Bangkok, commenting for the first time over the standoff between the troops from the two countries.

"In other words, the Indian side admitted to entering the Chinese territory. The solution to this problem is very simple: conscientiously withdraw," he said in a brief quote in Chinese posted on China's Foreign Ministry's website

The standoff has happened in the southernmost part of Tibet in an area also claimed by Indian ally Bhutan after the Chinese army tried to build a road in the disputed area.

India has said the "unilateral" Chinese action to change the status quo near the Bhutan tri-junction poses a challenge to India's security.

In her address to the Rajya Sabha last week, External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj accused China of building roads using bulldozers and excavators, which has been protested by Bhutan in

writing to Beijing.
She also said India
was not "unreasonable" on the issue and all nations were with it.

The issues is expected to be discussed during the visit of Indian National Security Adviser Ajit Doval to Beijing for a meeting of the NSAs of BRICS countries - Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa - on July 27-28.

Yesterday, the Chi-nese Defence Ministry said its military will safeguard China's security in-terests at "any cost".

Tomato prices soar to Rs 100 per kg in Delhi-NCR on low supply

New Delhi, July 25 (PTI): Tomato prices have risen to around Rs 100 per kg in the national capital market as supplies from major producing states have been disrupted because of heavy

Mother Dairy is selling tomatoes at Rs 96 per kg here through its 300 retail stores 'Safal', while online grocery platforms like Big Basket and Grofers are offering this key vegetable at nearly Rs

100 per kg.
Local vendors are selling tomatoes in the Rs 80-100 per kg range depending on the quality.

Prices have shot up

about four times since the beginning of June when tomatoes were being sold at about Rs 25 per kg in the Delhi-Na-tional Capital Region market.

As per the consumer affairs ministry's data, the average price of to-matoes stood at Rs 80 per kg vesterday across major cities in the country while the maximum price was Rs 95.

Price of tomatoes in Delhi was Rs 83 per kg, while in Mumbai it was Rs 88, Chennai Rs 80 and Kolkata Rs 95, the government data showed.

Karnataka, Andhra adesh, Telangana, Pradesh, Telangana, Madhya Pradesh, West Bengal and Odisha are the major tomato growing states. The country produces around 18 million tonnes of tomatoes.

When contacted. senior official from Mother Dairy said the supply has almost dried up from states like Karnataka, Ma harashtra and Gujarat, while arrival from Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand too have fallen

leading to a price surge.

Last week, Agriculture Secretary Shobhana K Pattanayak had said that "this is a lean season for tomato. The price rise is a temporary phenom-enon and it will faze out

The bills would pave the way for the continuation of undergradu-ate medical admissions on the basis of Class 12 marks, exempting Tamil Nadu from the ambit of

Yesterday, a group of state ministers accom-panied by senior party leader and Lok Sabha Deputy Speaker M Thambidurai called on Home Minister Rajnath Singh and Finance Minister Arun Jaitley in Delhi and took up the issue.

said today. Red sanders, a pro-hibited item for export, is banned under the Convention on Internation al Trade in Endangered Species (CITES), However, it is traded illegally in the international market

as it is used in manufac turing of medicinal products and aphrodisiacs.




