Four suicides were reported on a single day

in the State on 15 Jun.
A 63-year-old woman
in South Regu, East Sikkim, a 32-year-old man in Kabirthang, West Sikkim, a 38-year-old woman in Suiram Tanzi in South Sikkim and a 12-year-old girl in Soreng, West Sikkim committed suicide on 15 Jun.

On 14 Jun. a 19-year old girl committed suicide in Upper Cha-lamthang, East Sikkim.

#### Man charged with murder SUMMIT REPORT

GANGTOK, 17 JUN: One 40-year-old man, Mani Kumar Rai, has been arrested on charges of murdering 30-year-old, Krishna Prasad Rai at Upper Wok, South Sik-

kim on 15 Jun.
The dead body of the deceased was found in a forest area at Upper Wok on 16 June with injures on the neck.

During police inves-tigation, the father of the deceased revealed that some days back, the ac-cused had warned of a possible mishap affecting the family.

The accused was then rounded up by the police and during interrogation, he admitted to killing Krishna Prasad Rai with

a machete.

The deceased was a petty contractor who had dismissed the accused, a labourer, from work recently.

#### One booked under POCSO Act

**GANGTOK, 17 Jun:** A 31-year-old man from Pakyong was arrested and booked under Protection of Children from Sexual Offenses Act, 2012 on 16 Jun by Sing-

The man has been accused of sexually assaulting a 05-year-old minor girl.

According to the report filed at Singtam Police Station, the accused was a family friend and used to baby sit when the minor's parents had to run some errands or

to run some errands or attend work. When the minor victim told her parents about what had hap-pened, they registered a case at Singtam Police Station after which the accused was brought under police custody.

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# Battleground Darjeeling reports its first fatalities

SUMMIT REPORT Darjeeling, 17 Jun:

Darjeeling turned into Da battlefield with security forces and the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha supporters locking horns and fighting pitched battles on the streets. The army later brought the situation under control. GIM claimed that three of its supporters died in "police firing". Many security personnel, officials claiming 35, were also in-jured with IRB Assistant Commandant Kiran Tamang's condition being critical.

Situation got out of hand when security forces were trapped in between three rallies. State Security forces along with central police forces were deployed at Singamari and barricades were put up. Three rallies came in from Lebong, Patleybash and the Chowk Bazaar and converged there.
At around 11:30 a.m.,

amidst the slogan-shouting, things suddenly aminst the stogan-snout-ing, things suddenly turned violent with clashes ensuing. While GJM support-ers rained bricks, stones



and bottles and let loose slingshots, the security forces retaliated with baton charging and tear gas shelling. Security forces were clearly outnumbered and were forced to

Many journalists were trapped in between the security forces and the GJM supporters and had to take refuge in the house of locals. Police vehicles were torched as the secu-rity forces retreated. The Singamari town police outpost was vandalised and the police vehicles parked there torched.

Many secu rity personnel injured. IRB Assistant Commandant

Kiran Tamang suffered grievous injuries from a sharp weapon believed to be a khukuri. He was rushed to Sili-guri for treatment. The GJM supporters had the clear advantage of the

Some cases of arson were reported in Kalimpong district today while a massive rally was organized by Gorkha Jan-mukti Morcha supporters here in town. The ral-ly encircled the town and proceeded towards the DM's office where the po-lice stopped the rally. The GIM supporters then sat on a dharna later mov-ing on towards Damber Chowk where use turned into a meeting.

meeting, Samuel Gurung of the GJM said that the state's atrocities will not be tolerated. If farming equipments are arms then we will surrender the so called arms to the police very soon, he added.

Arun Ghatani, of Communist Party of Revolutionary Marxists, which had also joined the rolly addressing the the rally, addressing the gathering said, "We are

being termed as terror-ists by Mamta Banerjee who herself is creating a terror-soaked situation in Darjeeling through her police.

As for the cases of arson in district, at around 3 a.m. today, Kumai GP office under Jaldhaka Thana was set ablaze. The fire was brought under control by the police.

Later in the day, as news of the police firing in Darjeeling spread in Kalimpong, GJM supporters started raising anti-Bengal slogans.

### Bengal writes to Centre for more forces for Darjeeling

KOLKATA, IUN 17 (PTI): The West Bengal govern-ment wrote to the Centre today seeking more forces to contain the current unrest in Darjeeling hills even as Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee termed the requisition

as "routine."

"We have asked for more forces from the Centre. We have sent an-other request today," a senior official in the state home department told PTI today on condition of anonymity.

The Centre had held back yesterday additional paramilitary personnel meant for Darjeeling until the West Bengal government sent a report on the situation there. Asked whether the state government was ready with its report for the Centre on the situation in the hills, the offi-cial said, "It has been taken care of and it would be sent soon to the Centre. Going by the situation it was realised that current strength of forces in Darjeeling are not enough and we need more."

## And now, people have died. Someone please mediate, soon

he worst fears are confirmed. Three persons, including a security personnel, reportedly died in the violence that escalated anew in the Darjeeling hills on Saturday.

While the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) claimed two of its supporters died in police firing in Darjeeling, the State government rejected the allegation. Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, who briefed the media in Kolkata on the day, refused

to corroborate the GJM claim.

Saturday witnessed renewed violence in the hills. The situation was akin to June 8 or worse. Nine days have passed since the first stone was hurled at the security forces, vehicles and other property torched and the police lathi-charged and lobbed tear gas shells to disperse the agitating GJM activists

The situation has turned worse

While the GJM with moral sup-port from several other hill-based parties on the Gorkhaland agenda has intensified the stir and put the hills to a veritable siege, the state government has increased admin istrative pressure on the agitators to unlock the doors of peace, although how force and peace can juxtapose is puzzling.

Mamata Baneriee on Saturday indicated her government was not averse to talks (with GJM) on the Darieeling situation, but included a rider: "First the bandh will have to be withdrawn and the violence will have to end. Talks are always

possible in a democratic system."

However, Mamata also indicated involvement of terrorist organizations imbroglio and also alleged involvement of foreign nations in the same without naming any country in particular. The dual allegations give the



impression of a sinister move in the making vis a vis the Darjeeling hills.

When the state government seems to have missed the trick on how to put a lid on the Darjeeling

Centre to intervene and bring the warring factions to the table. But, the BJP at this point seems too en-grossed with the forthcoming Pres-

idential election to pay attention to the fuming hills, or displease the Trinamool for fear of upsetting a possible consensus on its Presidential candidate.

It is absolutely necessary to first identify whether the Darjeeling upheaval is a law and order problem or a political issue. The state government and the Centre should come clean on it. If it is a law and order problem, the state government has primacy to deal with it since law and order is a state

But, if the situation is identified as a political issue related to identity

crisis, the Centre should intervene

which it can, for the Centre is a signatory to the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration (GTA). The dithering is costing both in kind and cash, which the people of the region will have to compensate through their collective nose in future.

The WB chief minister on Saturday also had a meeting with officials of the 15 community development boards she has set up across the hills in the past two years. The officials have been entrusted with the tremendous responsibility of brokering peace in the hills.

That indicates the government may not be interested to pursue the hard option any further, but enter negotiations albeit in a roundabout way through the community development boards.

So be it. Peace is the need of the

hour, whichever way possible

cha supporters had taken to the streets. Here too security forces were outnumbered and were forced to retreat with stones, bottles and bricks thrown by GJM supporters. Later however the army came in and drove the GJM supporters back, taking control of the area.
Binay Tamang, GJM

Assistant Secretary claimed that three GJM supporters were killed in police firing.

"Bimal Sashanker of Gok Basti; Sunil Rai of Kainjaley and Mahesh Gurung of Relling died from police firing. We de-mand a judicial enquiry," demanded Mr Tamang. The GJM has called a 12-hour Dooars bandh

for Sunday. CM Mamata Baneriee

Kolkata on Saturday had stated that she had no problems sitting with the Morcha for talks provided they lifted the indefinite bandh.

Reacting to this, Mr Tamang stated, "We will not sit with Bengal and Mamata Banerjee for talks. We will only sit with the Centre and we demand Centre's immediate intervention."

Anuj Sharma, ADG (Law and Order) refut-ing allegations of police firing, stated, "There was no firing from the side of security forces. On the other hand there was fir-

ing from the GJM side. We have more than 35 security personnel who were injured on Saturday."

About the casualty, media reports have quoted the ADG as saying, "We are waiting for the postmortem report, but it seems that the man died of gunshot wound.

"We are trying to identify the person, but going by the preliminary investigation it seems that he is a local."

Some GIM supporters were also rounded up in connection with the attack on security forces on Saturday evening.

Bimal Gurung, in a

video clip from an undisclosed location, appealed to the Hill people to stand up strongly against police excesses. Dubpolice excesses. Dub-bing it the final battle for Gorkhaland he asked all to come out in support.

In the wee hours of Saturday, GTA media cell

was picked up by the po-lice from his residence in Darieeling. He was however released later during the day. Police also raided the house of GJM Assistant Secretary, Binay Tamang located at Dali, 3 km from Darjeeling town. Family members alleged that as Mr Tamang was not in the house, security forces vandalised the house before leaving.

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

### Reputation is Everything

#### Handle the budget tourists with more care

 $T^{
m he}$  past few tourist seasons have been "bumper" for Sikkim. Everyone associated with the sector has kept long hours and raked in handsome earnings. But it has not all been good. Reports abound about tourists not only being charged usurious amounts for their holidays, but also being stood up by cabbies who landed still higher rates or hotels which over-booked and extended only miserly hospitality. In the rare case, the reasons were genuine, stemming from infrastructural limitations and impossible to resolve logistics. Unfortunately, in most of the cases, it was sheer greed. Travellers realise that arriving in a new place and jacked up on endorphins from the experience leaves them vulnerable to the occasional cheating. In fact, these even form part of the whole touristy experience, but when this becomes the dominant memory, the negativity becomes palpable and the word of mouth can prove damaging. No one will blame the destination or its people for flights missed due to landslides or traffic jams, but if a holiday is spoiled by stakeholders driven purely by profit margins, the word will spread.

Harrowing tales of tourists ill-treated and unat-tended are not rare aberrations any more. Tourists, especially those travelling on a tight budget, are snared in cons with embarrassing regularity and this is not something that the State should take lightly. For all its hopes of roping in the dollar tourists, fact remains that tourism in Sikkim is sustained by those who love Sikkim so much that they scrimp and save to get here. They may be loud, they may drive a hard bargain, but they are the ones who come to Sikkim in the largest numbers and who pay higher fares and sit through a bumpy five-hour ride [one way] to get their half an hour with Tsomgo. They are the backbone of the tourism industry here. They are the bird in the hand for Sikkim Tourism while other prospects are

They need to be handled with greater care. It is all too easy to dismiss reports of their harassment as one meted out by agents in their own backyards and hotels being operated on lease by their 'own' people. Fact remains that it is Sikkim's image that takes a beating. Reputation is everything in this business. The best example can be seen in neighbouring Darjeeling. In the wake of its two Aandolans, tourism had reduced to a trickle. It had just about resuscitated, that the current Aandolan 3.0 has arrived and will derail some future seasons. Although Darjeeling still attracted more tourists than Gangtok, the numbers have fallen and peak season days reduced. Even through the lull, tourists avoided the neighbouring hills if they could because of the reputation it has earned. Sikkim, which is just about finding its feet as far as tourism is considered, cannot afford such blacklisting.

The industry has to remember that for every tourist complaint filed, there are at least ten that go unreported to the authorities. It is another matter that many find release in social media which, let's accept it, can do as much for promotion as it can do for ru-ining carefully cultivated images. Every complaint should thus be taken seriously and some examples set to convince tourists and those in the tourism business that Sikkim is serious about proving itself to be a tourist-friendly destination. Tourism is a thrust sector of the Sikkimese economy and yet it is allowed to wander about unregulated. There appears to be yawning gap between the industry, its players and its policy makers. Policies are framed with a particular audience in mind while the ground realities on tourist arrivals are different. Associations are granted many privileges and yet internal monitoring of services remains muddled. For a State so particular about local protection, it is ironic how a significant portion of the hospitality industry [especially those catering to the budget tourists] operates on lease. This ambiguity has to be done away with so that regulation of the industry becomes more meaningful. Every time a tourist is duped in Sikkim, it is not the establishment that suffers, it is Sikkim's reputation that takes a beating. And, as mentioned earlier, reputation is everything in this business.

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# Fanon on Soccer: Radically anti-capitalist, anti-commercial and and anti-bourgeois

ike a lot of kids, the great Martinican/ Algerian revolutionary Frantz Fanon loved playing soccer as a youngster. Returning to Martinique in 1945 after fighting in Europe and North Africa in World War II, Fanon continued to play soccer on a local team.

Soccer was always part of Fanon's life. Nearly a

decade after the war, he attempted to create a therapeutic community at Blida-Joinville Psychiatric Hospital in Algeria. He organised a soccer team in the institution and arranged for matches with other teams in the community.

In "The Wretched of the Earth", perhaps

Fanon's most famous book which was written in 1961, he reflects on the anti-colonial struggles in Africa and warns of upcoming challenges. The book was prescient and still remains relevant. But Fanon's remarks on sport, which come in the central chapter "Pitfalls of National Consciousness", have been little discussed.

Fanon writes, "The youth of Africa should not be oriented toward the stadiums but toward the fields, the fields and the schools. The stadium is not an urban showpiece but a rural space that is cleared, worked, and offered to the nation. The capitalist notion of sports is fundamentally different from that which should exist in an underdeveloped country."

The context and framing of

Fanon's remarks is important. Remember, this was a period of epochal transformation. The end of formal colonial rule marked by of formal co.c.
independence.
Imagine the possibility

Imagine the possibility of building solidarity and sociality in the midst of such turmoil? The idea

that all are equal and the future is possible only together was one of Fanon's guiding principles.

#### FOUR BILLION FOLLOWERS

One can only imagine what Fanon would have made of soccer today, especially that it has become so incredibly popular and so driven by money. Soccer has four billion followers worldwide. Ac-

cording to the sport's controlling body, FIFA, 270 million people (4% of the world's population) are actively involved in the game.

Where it comes to professional soccer, obscene amounts of money are made. English Premier League team, Manchester United, rated as the most valuable team in the world, is worth \$3.69 billion.

In the pyramid of global soccer, with its players owned and managed by agents, third parties, management companies and so on, local football leagues are often very small cogs in hierarchical system. In Europe the English Premier League, Spain's La Liga the Bundesliga in Germany, followed by Serie A and Ligue 1, in Italy and France respectively, vie for the best players.

The European war of the clubs is played out in the highly mediated Champions League. Fans support clubs which use all sorts of illegal and semi-le gal means to extract players from the global South often through systems that mirrors the move from periphery to semi-periphery to centre (from Brazil to Portugal to Spain, or from West Africa to France and England and so on).

Everyone is aware of the transfer sagas. They include the valuations of humans, with transfer fees having already exceeded \$110 million for some top players (and likely to go even higher now with transfer season open again), the scouting for young talent, the clubs' rhetoric of "war chests", the endless TV sport shows speculation about signings, and the school yard banter "we've got ..." and "you've got f... all"

#### LAYING OF WREATHS

The culture industry was wonderfully reproduced at Wembley Stadium in May when Arsenal won the FA Cup, beating Chelsea 2-1. The event was introduced not only by the national anthem, standard fare at these things, but also a minute's silence for the victims of the bombing in Manchester, the lay-ing of wreaths, black armbands, and "I love MCR" aware of this hyper-capitalist story but the outrage is usually directed elsewhere. Fans want rich owners and often turn a blind eye to how they've got these riches.

It is all about money, of course.

Sport is also bigger than politics; people talk and argue about sports minutiae all the time. It is a space where ordinary people are allowed to be passionate and knowledgeable. Politics is elitist, technocratic and its discourse is typically opaque — very often couched in masculine terms

#### CHALLENGING THE ALIENATION

Soccer is a social game, a team game. And we can imagine how Fanon considered it therapeutic with everything centred on his "patients" taking charge from creating the pitch and fielding a team, to finding "opponents" and developing schedules. All this was part of the social therapy that Fanon envisaged would help break down institutional hierarchies in the psy-chiatric hospital and foster social relations and chal-

lenging the alienation that was part of the institution.

When Fanon writes of sport "expanding minds" and the task of "humanising" he is concerned with a mental and psychological liberation, namely freeing the mind from the nervous conditions induced by colonialism and war and the unthinkingly reproduction that Europe be looked to for models.

Fanon here sounds a bit schoolmasterly telling the youth what they should do. But the larger question in these days of corporate global football dominated by European leagues and its teams, with each a "brand" most likely owned by multinational capital, is how can this model possibly be followed in the global south?

Fanon answer is unequivocal:
"Comrade, the European game is finally over."

"The African politician should not be concerned with producing professional sportspeople, but con-

scious individuals who also practice sports."
But today, one would be hard pressed to find an African politician who would advocate this perspective. Politics is a dirty and corrupt game for personal game. The pragmatic African politician dismisses Fanon's notions as Utopian. They are not concerned with social transformation but adaption to becoming cogs in the machine of global capital by any means.

What can we make of Fanon's notion of what sport could be?

He offers a wholly different conception and

imagination of sport, decolonisation, and the nation. Can we imagine a different notion of sport? Not

necessarily non-competitive but competitive in a different way: A decolonised notion that is radi-cally anti-capitalist, radically anti-commercial and anti-bourgeois. This is what Fanon is asking us to

ditional" sporting event as an act of nostalgia and modernity. Here, globally networked, televised for a fee based international viewership, is "England"

After they won, Arsenal played The Clash's 1979 punk-rock anthem, "London Calling", to celebrate the "Emirates Cup" win at Wembley. The iconic English cup, branded as the oldest association football competition in the world, is now named after an airline.

One element of Premiership football is its international cast of star players. Only a minority of English players play in the "Premier League" – the most branded, most watched league in the world. The Emirates (Arsenal's branded stadium), whose name also evokes the shining lights of Abu Dhabi neoliberal turbo-capitalism and the super-rich, was opened by the royal right-winger Prince Phillip.

Sepp Blatter, formerly the head-crook at the sports controlling body FIFA, ranked the Queen of England as having more football knowledge than former Italian Prime Minister, AC Milan owner and fraudster, Silvio Berlusconi.

All in all, these are the types of nasty people who own the clubs and run a game. Everyone is

# India's wells are running dry, fast

Over the past three years, the mon-soon – the rainy season that runs from June through September, depend-ing on the region – has been weak or delayed across much of India, causing widespread water shortages.

With the onset of summer this year,

southern India, particularly Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu states, are already wilting under a blistering sun and repeated heatwaves. Drought is expected to affect at least eight states in 2017, which is a devastating possibility in a country where agriculture accounted for 17.5% of GDP in 2015 and provides the livelihood for nearly half the population

Across rural India, water bodies, including man-made lakes and reservoirs, are fast disappearing after decades of neglect and pollution.

"They have drained out the water and

converted the land into a plot for schools, dispensaries, and other construction ac-tivities," Manoj Misra of the NGO Yamuna Jiye Abhiyan warned in The Hindu newspaper as far back as 2012.

## NOT A DROP TO DRINK wasn't always this way. For the past

2,500 years, India has managed its wa-

Prior to industrialisation and the accompanying global "green revolution" in the 1960s, which saw the development of high-yield variety crops using new technologies, India's water availability was plentiful. Households, industries and farmers freely extracted

groundwater and dumped untreated waste into waterways without a second thought.

But such practices are now increasingly untenable in this rapidly growing country. Per capita availability of water has been steadily falling for over a decade, dropping from 1,816 cubic metres per person in 2001 to 1,545 cubic tres in 2011.

The decline is projected to deep-

en in coming years as the population grows. India, which currently has 1.3 billion people, is set to overtake China by 2022 and reach 1.7 billion in 2050.

Water scarcity is also exacerbated by a growth in water-intensive indus-tries, such as thermal power production, extraction and mining, as India seeks to feed and power its growing population. In addition to affecting biodiversity, these activities also alter

Still, successive governments have pursued the same old supply-centric policies, paying little heed to the coun-

For nearly 50 years, a misguided groundwater policy has sucked India dry; water tables have declined by an average of one metre every three years in some parts of the Indus basin, turning it into the second most over-stressed aguifer in the world, according to NASA

Across nearly the whole country, basic sewage management is also lacking. According to the Third World Centre for Water Management, only about 10% of waste water in the country is collected and properly treated. As a result, all water bodies in and around urban centres are seriously polluted.

Today, the country is struggling to provide safe drinking water to every

#### WHAT CONSERVATION?

Even so, residents of New Delhi or Kolkata today use more than twice as much water, on average, than people in Singapore, Leipzig, Barcelona or Zara-goza, according to data compiled by the Third World Research Centre.

The water use in Delhi is 220 litres per capita per day (lpcd), while some Europe-an cities boast figures of 95 to 120 lpcd.

Excess consumption is attributable in part to citizen indifference about conserving water after so many years of plentiful supply. Since large swaths of many Indian megacities lack piped supply of clean water, leaks and theft are common. Cities in India lose 40% to 50% due to leakages and non-authorised connections.

At this point, the only viable option for India would seem to be managing de-

mand and using water more efficiently. The country is making tentative steps in that direction. The 2016 new National Water Framework, passed emphasises the need for conservation

and more efficient water use.

But under India's Constitution, states are responsible for managing water, so central policies have little resonance. Neither the 1987 and 2012 National Water Policy documents, which contained similar recommendations to the 2016 policy, had any real

impact on water use.

And after millennia of exclusive focus on expanding the water supply, the idea of curbing water consumption and increase reuse remains a mostly alien concept in India.

## Nepal Madhesis' meeting with PM ends inconclusively

Ameeting between Nepal Prime Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba and a key Madhesi party over the current crisis today failed to yield any results as the minority party insisted on amending the Constitution before the local body polls on June 28.

Deuba had invited leaders of the Rastri-ya Janata Party Nepal (RJP-N) to his residence in Budhanilkantha, 10 kms from Kathmandu, for informal consultation on the current crisis, ac-cording to sources close to the Prime Minister.

During the talks, the Prime Minister sought cooperation from the agitat-ing Madhesi leaders for the smooth conduct of the

second phase of elections.
"The people of the southern plains also want local level elections for the development of the region and it would help implement the constitution," the Prime Minister said.

Deuba also reiterated the government's stance that once the second phase of elections are held the Constitution

would be amended to address the key demands of the agitating parties.

Madhesi lead

however, told the Prime Minister that they will not take part in the second phase of elections until the Constitution is amended and urged government to fulfil their demands at the earliest.

The government has decided to defer the local body polls in the Province 2, the disputed Madhesi-stronghold, to September 18.

The RJP-N will hold rallies in all district headquarters of the Te-rai region as part of its pre-announced protest programmes to disrupt the elections process.

Some Madhes-centric parties have opposed the elections until the Constitution is amended to accommodate their de-mands like more representation in parliament and redrawing of provincial boundaries.

Madhesis, mostly of In-dian-origin, launched a prolonged agitation between September 2015 and February last year against the implementation of the new Constitution.

Consistent supply-centric thinking has also resulted in competition for water as states negotiate the allocation of river water based on local needs.

The century-long conflict over the Cauvery River, for example, involves Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka – three major south Indian states. With each state demanding ever more water, the river sim-ply cannot keep up.

In Karnataka, where agricultur-

al policies are heavily skewed towards water-guzzling commercial crops, such as sugarcane, mismanaged ground and surface water are dying a slow death. Still the state continues to petition the Cauvery Water Dispute Tribunal for an increase in its share.

Water scarcity in Karnataka is aggravated by non-existent water quality management. Its rivers are choked with toxic pollutants, and oil-suffused lakes in Bengaluru, the

capital, are reportedly catching fire.

Meanwhile, in the northern part of the country, the Ravi-Beas River is causing conflict between Punjab

and Haryana states.

In India's water wars, rivers are a resource to be harnessed and extracted for each riparian party's maximum benefit. Very little emphasis has been placed on conserving and protecting existing water sources. And not one inter-state negotiation has prioritised pollution abatement or demand management.

Even policies from the national government, which claims to target water conservation and demand management, remain reliant on supply-side solutions. Big infrastructure programs, such as the Indian river-linking plan, envision large-scale water transfer from one river basin to another, again seeking to augment supply rather than conserve water and reduce consumption.

For inspiration on managing de-

mand. India could look to Berlin in Germany, Singapore and California, all of which have designed and implemented such policies in recent years. Successful measures include raising public awareness, recycling water, fixing leaks, preventing theft and implementing conservation measures such as water harvesting and stormwater management. Between rapidly disappearing

fresh water, unchecked pollution and so many thirsty citizens, India is facing an impending water crisis unlike anything prior generations have seen. If the nation does not be-gin aggressively conserving water, the faucets will run soon dry. There is simply no more supply to misuse. [Asit K. In Havana, Cuba's government criticised the new restrictions on ties with the US that were announced by Trump, but reiterated its willingness to hold a "respectful dia-logue" with Washington. Trump's speech, which

came as the president signed a directive outlining his posture toward Cuba, is the latest attempt by

the Trump administration to chip away at Obama's legacy, of which the Cuba policy of starting a historic detente was a major part.

Obama had pushed for expanding commerce and travel between the two countries, However, Trump. in a complete reversal, asserted that he will not lift sanctions on Cuba unless it releases all political prison-ers and respects freedoms. "We will not lift sanc-

tions on the Cuban regime until all political prisoners are freed, freedoms of assembly and expression are respected, all political parties are legalised and free and internationally supervised elections are sched-

Katy Perry beat her own 2016 record of 90 million followers by reaching 100 million Twitter followers on Friday,


