### Defence Minister makes aerial survey of Doklam-Nathula area

GANGTOK, OCT 7 (PTI): Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman today made an aerial survey of the Doklam-Nathula area on the Sino-India border, a day after the government said the status quo at the site has not changed since the disen-gagement on August 28.

Sikkim government officials said the defence minister also made a survey of the new Pakyong Airport in East Sikkim and neighbouring areas this afternoon

Improving strate-c infrastructure like border roads in Sikkim. the new airport which is to be inaugurated in November, and develop-ment in areas along the Sino-India border in Sikkim are likely to be discussed, they added.



#### Petroleum dealers on nationwide strike on Oct 13

**Мимваі, Ост 7 (РТІ):** United Petroleum Front (UPF) today announced nationwide strike of dealers on October 13 to press for various demands including better margins and inclusion of petroleum products in the Goods and Ser-

vices Tax.

It warned that if the demands were not met at the earliest, fuel dealers will be forced to stop, indefinitely, purchase and sale operations from Oc-tober 27. UPF represents over

54,000 dealers from the Federation of All-India Petroleum Traders, the All-India Petroleum Dealers Association and the Consortium of Indian Petroleum Dealers.

The strike is to press for long-pending de-mands ignored by the state-run oil marketing companies (OMCs) since an agreement was signed last November, it said.

The demands include upward revision of the dealer margins every six months, better terms for return on investment, resolution of manpower issues, a fresh study of handling losses, and reso-lution of issues related to transportation and etha-

nol blending.

The front alleged that the letters which it wrote to oil marketing companies as well as a letter from the Cabinet Secretariat dated June 28, did not elicit positive re-

sponse.

Dealers also want the government to bring pet-rol and diesel under the GST regime.

Later in the evening. Ms Sitharaman called on the Chief Minister, Pawan Chamling at his official

residence at Mintokgang.
While interacting
with the Chief Minister, Ms Sitharaman sought the State Government's intervention in sorting out issues mostly con-cerning land between the Army and the State Forest



Department. Chief Minister Mr Chamling assured all possible intervention from the Government. The Chief Minister

apprised the Union Min-ister about the constant hardships faced by the State of Sikkim due to the ongoing agitation in the neighbouring Darjeeling hills. He added that due to constant blockade of the National Highway NH10, the State has been suffering for the last 33 years. He reiterated that NH10 is the lifeline connecting Sikkim to rest of India, and its blockade at regular intervals has meant huge economic loss to the State. He re-peated his request to the Central Government for speeding up the process of construction of an al-ternate highway.

Further, the Chief Minister maintained that Sikkim is a peaceful and tranquil State and has been progressing in all spheres and would need continuous guidance and blessings of the Government of India

A press release informs that the Defence Minister also called on the Governor, Shriniwas Patil at Raj Bhawan today. She was accompanied by Lt. GANGTOK, 07 OCT: Sikkim Krantikari Morcha has said that the State Election Commission is 'not fully aware about the provisions of Sikkim Panchayat Act, 1993'.

The party has also accused the SEC of at-tempting to debar the opposition and independent candidates from contesting the elections by 'changing rules and criteria for filing nomi-

In a letter addressed

Commissioner the party has explained how cer-tain rules and criteria for filing nominations have created 'confusion' among the candidates.

Firstly, the party has pointed out that the Commission's notifications regarding the issuing of Sanitation Cer-tificate in order to file a nomination is confusing as the Commission on 06 Oct through a notification had said that Sanitation Certificate was 'not required' to file a nomi-

a Open Defecation Free State. However, today the Commission again issued another notification declaring the submission of Sanitation Certificate mandatory.

The party has also said that the SEC has now issued the supplementa-ry and amended copies of both Gram Panchayat and Territorial electoral rolls, "whereby the contesting candidates are put in utter confusion while filing their nomiturning officers", says the

Brazil beat Spain 2-1 in marauee group match of U-17 World Cup TG BIJU Kochi, Oct 7 (PTI):

Adominant Brazil made a strong state-ment of their top title contender status with a 2-1 victory over Spain in a Group D marquee clash of the FIFA U-17 World Cup here on Saturday.
In a much-anticipat-

ed encounter in front of sell-out crowd, Spain made a flying start and took the lead in the fifth minute through an own goal by Brazil defender Wesley, but soon lost the plot as the Brazilians turned the table on them.

Brazil, the over-whelming favourites of the packed stadium, took control of the match just after conceding the goal with far more possession and attacking. They scored through Lincoln (25th minute) and Paulinho (45+1).

The absence of Vini

cius Junior was not felt as Brazil's attacking trio of Lincoln, Paulinho and Brenner played better than their Spanish coun-terparts. Alan and Marcos Antonio gave the trio enough support.

Spain, who had five

players from the famous La Masia academy and four from Real Madrid academy, were hit hard by the high humidity of Kochi while the Brazilians were able to cope with the situation as they had been in India for more than 10 days.
The fast-paced and

open match between the champion sides of South America and Europe initially promised to be a goal fest but it was not to be. The neat exchange of passes, swift movement in attack and counter-attack were all there to see, though.

Spain began the match brightly, press-ing hard in the attacking third and drew the first blood in the fifth minute. Ferran Torres got the

better of his marker at the right flank and sent an inch-perfect low cross for Mohammed Moukhliss to send the ball in the direction of the post.

The last touch, however, was that of Wesley and an own goal was awarded against his name.

Spain dominated for a few minutes after the first goal but Brazil soon began to impose themselves on the match.

Paulinho drilled in a low shot in the 18th minute, which the Spain goalkeeper Alvaro Fernandez deflected off his hands and Lincoln missed the

target off the rebound.

It was a matter of time before Brazil restored parity as Paulin-ho, Lincoln and Brenner began to have clear looks at the Spain goal which fell in the 25th minute.

A brilliant ground-ed cross from the left by Brenner found Lincoln in the perfect position inside the box and he slotted the ball home in his

# **HC notice for Ministry of Power, State Power Dept** and Power Grid on T&D strengthening project

he High Court issued notice The High Court issued nouce to the Ministry of Power, State Energy & Power Depart-ment, Power Grid Corporation of India along with five other private companies on 29 Sept seeking their response to a Public Interest Litigation filed by Topden Bhutia of Sajong in Central Pendam, East Sikkim for not adhering to the norms to implement the centerally sponsored scheme to strength en transmission and distribu-tion of power in Sikkim.

The Ministry of Power had sanctioned an estimated Rs 1,554.94 crore for the setting up of sub-stations and high tension transmission lines with the objective to improve the power distribution sys tem in Sikkim with a clear direction to complete the same

the date of first installment of the sanctioned project.

Petitioner's counsel Sudesh Joshi argued that the Government of India approved the scheme way back on 10 Oct 2014, earmarking an estimated cost of Rs 4,754.42 crore for Sikkim and

Arunachal Pradesh.

The petitioner understands that without ensuring availability of land for trans-mission and distribution, the Power Grid has awarded the contract to five private respondents with apparently the sole purpose of escalat-ing the cost. Acquisition of the land is a pre-condition to award the contract for strengthening of transmission and distribution system in the State of Sikkim.

Despite the clear direction of the Ministry of Power while

sanctioning the project, the State Energy & Power Depart-ment and Power Grid of India entered into the agreement for overall implementation of the work under which a comprehensive agreement was executed on 18 March.

The petitioner in the PIL

stated that Sikkim is entitled to get its share from proj-ects which are implemented and operational in Sikkim from National Grid and even though having availability of adequate power, it is because of poor, obsolete and nonexistent distribution system that reliable power supply to the consumers in Sikkim is denied mostly in rural areas.

As per the MoU, the State Energy & Power department being nodal implementing agency required to provide environment and forest clear-ance, land acquisition, rescue

&rehabilitation, right of way, security through law & order support, statutory electrical inspector clearance. However, being an implementing agen-cy, State Energy & Power Department have failed to work out any ground work neither has it identified the land for setting up sub-stations and transmission lines till date.
It was also alleged that

without acquiring the land for setting up the sub-sta-tions and transmission line as per the Land Acquisition Act 2013, Power Grid has already floated an NIT and awarded the contract work to five private parties just to escalate the project costs even after

the lapse of three years.

The petitioner prayed that a direction be issued to identify the land for setting up the proposed sub-stations and transmission towers and initisition as per the governing law of the land. He also appealed to the court that a direction be issued to Power Grid for cancellation forthwith of all the tendered worked awarded to the private parties and call for fresh tender after completion

of acquiring the land.

As per the project, seven new 132 KV and 66 KV sub-stations with capacity of 590 MVA, 14 new 66 KV and 11 KV sub-stations having 170 MVA, eight new 132 KV and 22 KV [initially charged at 132 KV] transmission lines covering 118 kilometers and 281 kilometers of 66 KV lines are to be set up.

sub-stations are slated to come up at Dik-chu Pool in East, Legship Pool, Makha, Temi, Khamdong, Kumrek, Namthang, Rorathang, Chungthang, Singmardong, Parbing, Rinchen-pong, Pangthang and Namchi.

Similarly, new transmission lines are proposed to be set up at 27 different plac-es across the state from one sub-station to another con-necting each other to provide the power transmission line.

It was also alleged in the petition that the contract works are awarded to four private parties by the Power Grid. The Department of Energy & Power has not been able to give the line to execute the work due to lack of ground work and complete lack of coordination between the state respondent and Power Grid even after lanse of two and a half years of signing of MoU between the executing agency and nodal department.

### Legal awareness for senior citizens at Jalipool

### Why Have Parties in the Bastis

...and why promote contests over unopposed elevations

There are a total of 183 Gram Panchayat Onto Com-prising 1,038 panchayat wards) in Sikkim and 113 here are a total of 183 Gram Panchayat Units (comraj system in the state. What this means is that any party wishing to join the race to the grassroots across the State would have to find 1,151 community leaders in its ranks to contest on its behalf. The requirement for a pan-Sikkim footprint is further reinforced by the rule that ward-level candidates need to be voters registered in the same GPU. And then there are the reservation patterns which can spring many surprises and derail some plans and ambitions. What all this means is that a political outfit which has distanced itself from the rural majority or operates exclusively out of town-based party offices will have a tough time approaching rural body polls and this is essentially why they shy away from panchayat elections. Losing elections is one thing, not being able to find enough candidates drags political embarrassments to a whole new low.

But first, let's argue out the point on why pancha-yat polls should be contested on party lines. Since the polls are now upon Sikkim, the nomination filing process underway and the list of candidates being prepares, one can deliberate on the virtues of party-based panchayat elections without appearing to be taking sides. Many arguments have been presented by those who have traditionally stayed away from panchayat polls and even though some claims sound justified on first look, they all go against the very grain of democracy. One cannot ignore the fact that the panchayats are the smallest unit of a working democracy. Is it not necessary then that the composition of panchayats be the same as that of the State Assembly and the Parliament, both of which have candidates segregated on party lines and even make space for independents? The argument that panchayat polls on party lines causes avoidable division among the rural folk, although plausible, takes the naiveté of the people for granted. When the same voters are expected to be "intelligent" enough to elect MLAs contesting as party candidates, why is it that they are considered too "immature" or "innocent" to do the same for their panchayats without tearing the social fabric?

When people elect a State Government, they are expected to do so on the basis of ideology, why then should they be called to elect panchayats on the basis of personality? How can divisions caused by several independent candidates in a small ward be any worse than divisions caused if they are wearing party colours? This is not to say that divisions or 'black-listings' do not happen, but that happens because democracy is allowed to be abused and not because the format is intrinsically flawed. Because development is now increasingly being powered from grassroots up, it becomes imperative that the grassroots leaders be decided on the basis of the ideology they subscribe to for development as a collective unit. Development, after all, cannot be achieved in isolation, it has to be a move ment which follows some pattern and grassroots leaders have some consistency in their priorities, something that a political ideology can guarantee. What panchayats wearing party colours also make possible, if adequately demanded by the people, is accountability. If the elections were fought on non-party lines, then it would be too easy for the powers-that-be to ignore non-performance and blame it on the panchayats. They can't afford to do so any more. The same applies for the panchayat leaders. As independents, it would be all too easy for them to claim that the "government" does not listen to them. As members of a political outfit, they cannot do so any more since they have a unified representation which can be more forcefully exerted. A democracy without accountability is an exercise in futility and now that more and more powers are being delegated to the panchayats, it is important that they be made more accountable.

Given the interpretation of democracy that we practice in India, it is only natural that the parties in government enjoy an advantage when panchayat elec-tions are held during their term in office. Since little can be done to change this, the onus to keep the pan-chayats above the mechanisations of petty politics also lies with those in power. It is important that the re-cord on this account is kept cleaner this time around. It is also important that more panchayats are elected by the people and not ushered into office unopposed. Again, there are those who subscribe to the unanimously-elected (sans contest) panchayats, believing that this averts avoidable divisions in the villages. But this model fails the people in the end because, if elected uncontested, a person who could have earned/won the right to be their "representative" ends up becoming a party nominee who is a panchayat because the party-bosses favoured her/him. Where do you think the loyalties of such nominees lie?

# Blade Runner 2049: How Philip K Dick's classic novel has stood the test of time

The year 2019 must have seemed like a long time in the future 35 years ago, when the original Blade Runner film was set. Based on the US science fiction writer Philip K Dick's 1968 novel Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?, Ridley Scott's dystopian vision tells the story of a hunt for four dangerous "replicant" humans.

At the time of its release, the film was a rich source of predictions about the future world – or Los Angeles to be precise – a place ruined by pollution and lit only by giant floating billboards. But now, in 2017, as the world gets ready for the sequel, we are living in the future – videophones, androids, advances in artificial intelligence, it's all happening. Okay so we don't have the hover car just yet, but time always was always a complex and paradoxical phenomenon in the writings of the Philip K Dick.

The arrival of an update, set in 2049, as well as two teaser prequels, created at the request of the director of Blade Runner 2049, Denis Villeneuve, merely adds to the sense of a "time-slip" that Dick himself would have appreciated – temporal ambiguity being one of the authors favourite themes. These switches in the timeline of Dick's stories produce feelings of uncertainty and paranoia for his characters. They also unsettle the reader and challenge our relationship to time.

THE FUTURE PRESENT

In the book, the protagonist Rick Deckard is a sim-

ple and rather vulnerable character and is certainly no Harrison Ford. Large chunks of the text are also missed out in the film in favour of more cinematic

landscapes and new material.

Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep? shares the basic plotline of the film: the world has been ravaged by World War Terminus, most humans have departed the planet and cities are all but deserted due to the prevalence of radioactive dust. Bounty hunter Deck-ard is hired to retire "replicants" who have returned illegally to Earth. And over the course of a day, he hunts them down through a crumbling Los Angeles. In the book, inhabitants of Earth are mostly "spe-

cials", whose mental capacities have deteriorated as a consequence of contamination. Deckard owns and a consequence of contamination. Deckard owns and cares for android sheep and his ultimate ambition is to own a real animal – the war having caused the mass extinction of many species. Deckard needs to earn money as a bounty hunter to get enough to fi-nance a real animal.

#### TECHNOLOGY AT THE HELM

Part of the success of Dick's stories and very much integral to the success of the first Blade Runner film is their proximity to the present. The technological landscape Dick explores – for which the first Blade Runner film is famous - includes many technological

advances that have come to light since publication.

He prefigured both augmented and virtual reality. He described machines – such as lifts, cars and consum-

er durables – that talk back and argue with humans. Not totally dissimilar to the strange dialogues I have with the voice of an automated self-service till in my lo-

cal supermarket these days. The writer's use of quirky technological artefacts that argue, answer back, joke, intimidate and use sarcasm, have become commonplace in the many interpretations of Dick's output since the release of the original Blade Runner movie. THE RISE OF THE MACHINE

In his writing, Dick often characterised complex human relationships and interactions with technology. This can be seen in the original Blade Runner film, where many of these relationships are seen to be paradoxical and infused with paranoia – portraying many of the existential challenges that our relations to technology give rise to.

But the technological landscape in Dick's novels

were not always their main characteristic – and cer-tainly not as much of an obsession as it was for some of his contemporaries such as Isaac Asimov or Rob-ert Heinlein. That said, a lot of Dick's technological landscape has provided ample inspiration for other cinematic interpretations such as Total Recall, Mi-nority Report as well as of course Blade Runner.

Ultimately, in his novel, Dick used the future to illuminate the present. But of course these are not optimistic or evangelical visions of the future. In all of these stories, whether in the novel or the films spawned, it is a future that is bleak, dystopian and full of struggles. If anything, this is a cautionary warning of what may actually happen. And given that no one knows yet what the world will look like in 2049, only

time will tell if this is the future to come.

### Blade Runner 2049 - and why eyes are so important in this vision of the future

n a brief glimpse of Blade Runne Even a brief grimpse of 2004 2049 takes you straight into Deckard's world. Denis Villeneuve's sequel to Ridley Scott's sci-fi masterpiece gets the colour palette just right, perfectly capturing the tone of the original.

Achieving the look and feel of the original Blade Runner (1982) is essential because appearances, vision and eyes are key to both the experience and

the story.

Blade Runner was ahead of the AI curve when it made sci-fi arguments about identity and philosophy a main-stream concern. Is Deckard a repli-cant? Do androids have souls? What makes us human?

In the original, seeking answers was all about looking at the eyes. The film's Voight-Kampff "empathy test", used by the Blade Runners to identify replicants, now has its own special place in popular culture. The striking mage of a glorious blue iris reflecting fire and light has become a cinematic icon; and Rutger Hauer's emotional fi-nal lines when his character, Roy Batty, succumbs to death are a sublime moment in film history: I've seen things you people wouldn't believe. Attack ships on fire off the shoulder of Orion. I watched C-beams glitter in the dark near the Tannhäuser Gate. All those moments will be lost in time, like tears

in rain. Time to die.

And now Blade Runner 2049 appears primed to expand the exploration of eyes and identity with mind-bending visuals. In the neon flashes and noirish glimmers, Jared Leto's character, Niander Wallace, muses on the act of creating replicants like a blind god. His white irises have a sinister and mysterious beauty, but they also belie any sense of limitation caused by his lack of sight – even though he can't see, he has the "vision" to create or end life.

David Bowie was actually Ville-neuve's first choice for the Niander Wallace role. Seen as an influence upon Blade Runner "in many ways". the late singer was also well-known for his distinctive mismatched eyes that gave him an otherworldly persona - an affect Leto created in his own way with "custom made contact lenses that turned his eyes totally opaque".

#### EYE SPY

Cinema has often used eyes as a visual code for character and morality. Traditionally, damaged eyes tend to represent "baddies" and corruption - suggesting an off-kilter world seen in a dark and dangerous way. The vicious scar Donald Pleasence has around his right eye as a highly memorable Ernst Blofeld in You Only Live Twice (1967) helps to make him an enduring Bond villain.

The Oscar winning Chinatown (1974), meanwhile, is full of cracked lenses, broken glasses and other

means of distorting vision - ending with the disturbing shot of Faye Dun-away, as Evelyn Mulwray, with her eye socket blown apart by a bullet. And as Carl Fogarty in A History

of Violence (2005), Ed Harris relishes showing his scar tissue to the camera as he recalls his eye being ripped out

with barbed wire.

Cinema also has its fair share of "old crones" with cataracts setting curses (Drag Me to Hell); blind priests who have forsaken their faith (Father Spiletto in The Omen), and "mutants" with unusual eyes spying on unwitting victims (The Hills Have Eyes).

Computers and robots add a different twist to this psychopathology. The calm red lens of HAL 9000 in 2001: A Space Odyssey (1968); Yul Brenner's blank metallic eyes in Westworld (1973), and the persistent red dot shining out of Arnie's silver skull in the original Terminator (1984) all project

fear through a sense of the uncanny.

If the thought of a non-human consciousness glimpsed through the eye as a "window to the soul" is consistently unnerving, it is because instead of a human connection there is something else there entirely: the terror and wonder of the unknown.

By contrast, heroes are more like-to benefit from enhanced vision. ly to benefit from emance.... Christopher Reeve's Superman (1978) famously has X-ray eyes, while Keanu Reeve's "Neo" in The Matrix (1999) realises his destiny as "The One" only when he can visualise the code world and see how to change its rules from within.

NEW LOOK

But our changing perception of eyes and how we see them is also visible onscreen. We now have popular blind superheroes like Daredevil, on film (2003) and TV (2015 onwards), and (2015 onwards) who "sees differently" due to a strange combination of dissociative identity disorder and next-level hacker skills. Rami Malek's starring eyes, somewhere between the unblinking focus of a screen addict and the wide-eyed paranoia of a drug addict, add a mesmeric qual-ity to his performance of Mr Robot's complex persona.

Back in Deckard's increasingly toxic world, it looks like Niander Wallace is set to become an iconic cinematic villain in a film already seen by some as a masterpiece. His cloudy eyes feel well suited to the shadowy undertones of Blade Runner 2049, while his ability to create artificial intelligence offer a dark vision of the future. However bleak an outlook Blade Runner 2049 might visualise, films that look as good as this make it hard to take your eyes off the screen – and offer a glimpse of our future.

At the 17th BIMSTEC Senior Officials Meeting held in Kathmandu, Nepal on February 7, 2017, it was decided that India would organize the first annual Disaster Management Ex-

ercise for the region. This Exercise will be a platform for sharing Best Practices on all aspects of Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR), strengthening regional response and coordination for Disaster Management among the BIMSTEC member coun-

BIMSTEC DMEx-2017 will be on testing the region's preparedness and resilience towards effective activation of inter-Governmental interaction, interaction/ dialogue/agreements for immediate deployment of regional resources for disaster response. It will help create synergy and synchronize efforts to institutionalize regional cooperation among the member countries. The exercise will help strengthen the effective utilization of the Search & Rescue Teams for Disaster Relief Emergency Response, cluding Emergency including Rapid Assessment Teams and Management of mass casualties especially in situations involving break-down of infrastructure

seven nations of the 'Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic Cooperation' (BIMSTEC) grouping, - namely Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Myanmar, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Thailand, representatives Embassies/High Commissions of BIMSTEC nations in Delhi, National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), and Senior Officers from the Nodal Ministries will participate in the event.

Earlier, the first phase comprising a Preparatory Meeting and field visit of site selected for FTX during the main exercise, was held in Delhi NCR on

August 8-9, 2017.

India has been at the forefront of DRR efforts by hosting the South Asian Annual Disaster

Asian Ministerial Conference for Disaster Risk Re-duction (AMCDRR). India has also offered its expertise and capabilities in DRR such as the South Asia satellite, GSAT-9, and the Tsunami Early Warning Centre to other countries. Disaster Management was one of the important Agenda items the BIMSTEC leaders deliberated upon during the Goa BRICS Summit in October last year where BIMSTEC leaders were the Special Invitees.

The BIMSTEC region is home to around billion people, constituting around 22% of the global population with a combined GDP of US \$2.7 trillion economy.
Majority of the BIMSTEC countries are situated in the South Asian Region (SAR), prone to natural disasters such as floods,

### TMC stages protests accusing BJP of fomenting trouble in hills

KOLKATA, OCT 7 (PTI): The Trinamool Congress (TMC) took to the streets today blaming the BJP for stirring up fresh trouble in the Darjeeling hills where peace was returning after months of unrest.

The party took out rallies across the state and burnt effigies of Prime Minister Narendra Modi in a tit-for-tat protest. The BJP had yester-day burnt effigies of Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee for keeping mum on the recent attack on the party's state unit chief

Dilip Ghosh in the hills.
"We took out rallies across the state and burnt Narendra Modi's effigy to

counter the saffron party's attempt to create disturbance in the Darjeeling hills," state Power Minister Sobhandeb Chattopadhyay told reporters.

Leading the protest in Behala in south Kolkata, TMC Secretary General Partha Chatterjee accused the BJP of trying to dis-turb the peace in the hills.

Chatterjee also alleged that the Centre was helping the divisive forces in the hills.

"When peace has re-turned to the hills, the BJP is trying to disturb it. It is helping a person (Bimal Gurung), who has cases under the UAPA (Unlawful Activities Prevention

Act) lodged against him. If it (BIP) tries to disturb the peace, the people of Bengal will never forgive it," Chatterjee said.

Stating that the TMC was not involved in the attack on Ghosh in Darjeeling, Chatterjee said that it was an outburst of the hill people who agitated against the BJP team's visit.

State Panchayat Min-ister Subrata Mukherjee also led a protest demonstration at Gariahat in South Kolkata. "The BJP is also trying

to disturb the develop-ment programmes, initiated by the Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, in the state. But they will never succeed." Mukheriee said. Demonstrations were also held in different districts.

The BJP yesterday took out rallies, burnt effigies of the Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee in various parts of the state and staged a sit-in here protesting against the attack on its state President Dilip Ghosh in Dar-

jeeling recently.

During Ghosh's visit to the hills, agitators waved black flags and de-manded that Ghosh along with his team should leave the hills immediately and refrain from disturbing the "peace and stability" in the region.

was also a change in American administration, and Trump's ideas about Afghanistan were different from those of Obama's. So flux was inevitable. That made up my mind. The result was a story that has never been told before," he says.

The research part was tough, he says. "I do not have the training of a historian. Whereas, this was a mysterious chapter of history which the British wanted people to forget," he says.

"There was nothing to help me

in the process of research because no one had so far written a book on this subject. So it was back-breaking work of 15 to 16 hours a day for months together. But in the end, my persistence paid off. I am happy that I have been able to present the truth to Afghans and to the world,"

According to him, he had to combine the skills of a diplomat with the curiosity of an investigator to look for clues about what actually happened on that winter day of November 1893 in Kabul.

The Durand Line, he says, was

an artificial imposition.

"It was never meant to be a boundary as I have proved in my book. The Afghans have never accepted it. And every Afghan gov-ernment has rejected this line." Ideally speaking, the Afghan

territory should begin at the Indus, he says.

"That is the natural and geo

graphical boundary between India and Afghanistan because the culture, the language, the social mores and indeed the DNA of the people west of Indus are different from ours on this side of the Indus.

"But the British had a pho-bia of Russia. Consequently, they forced the artificial construct of a Durand Line on an unwilling and resentful population. Some call the Durand Line the biggest British crime of the 19th century.'

Asked what is the way out for Afghanistan now, Dogra says it should be left alone to manage its affairs. "But that seems unlikely. If Afghanistan continues to be treat ed like a vast chess game, then someday its people's frustrations could boil over. All Pathans could rally in its support then," he warns. There are no easy answers to

a very complex situation, he says. "It was bad enough when Pakistan was pushing for strategic depth. Now the US, Iran, Russia and China are also competing for

Taliban, al Qaeda, IS and sundry other terrorist organisations seek to shape Afghanistan to their radical image. The result is a dead end tunnel," he rues.
On India's role, he says New Delhi has been a steadying influence; not just in recent years but almost ever since independence. "We have built schools, hos-

pitals, hydroelectric dams, highways and most importantly a sense of confidence among the people that India is a friend for all seasons and all reasons."

Dogra has a wish list for the future. "I would like to give greater emphasis to people-to-people contact. To do that meaningfully, a radio and a TV channel beaming programmes in Pashto is a must," he suggests.

step towards next year's finals.
Pulisic opened the scoring on eight minutes and beauti fully set up strike partner Jozy Altidore to make it two and compound a nightmare start for Panama, who now look destined to settle for a play-off match against either Syria or Australia to land a World Cup place for the first time in their history.

### CRPF sends 21k new AK plastic bullets to Kashmir to reduce pellets usage

The CRPF has sent 21,000 rounds of newly-developed and "less lethal" plastic bullets to the Kashmir Valley to tackle street protests, says a top offi-cer of the force.

The bullets, developed by the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) and manufactured by the Ordnance factory based in Pune, can be fitted in the AK se-

ries of assault rifles and will be Pak prepares to file plea in ICI in Jadhav case

SAJJAD HUSSAIN ISLAMABAD, OCT 7 (PTI): Pakistan has started the process to file its plea in response to India's memorial submitted in the International Court of Justice (ICJ) against the death sentence of Indian national Kulbhushan Jadhav.

Jadhav, a 46-year-old retired Indian Navy officer, was captured in Balochistan in March, 2016 by Pa kistani security forces and tried in a military court which sentenced him to death for "espionage and subversive activities". The ICJ had asked Pa-

kistan to submit its written response or memorial by December 13 before the court could start fur-

ther proceedings.
According to Foreign
Office sources, Attorney
General Ashtar Ausaf Ali yesterday presided over a meeting of law experts and officials of the ministry of foreign affairs and other relevant depart-ments to discuss the line of arguments in the ICJ.

'We will forcefully de fend our position which is based on the fact that Jadhav is a serving Indian spy tasked to carry out sub-versive activities in Paki-stan," the sources said.

Meanwhile, Ausaf told the Dawn that they had decided to hold weekly meetings in order to review the situation and "to finalise Islamabad's point of view and convert it into an appropriate rejoinder

to India's allegations".

He said they were in touch with relevant stakeholders, including Khawar Qureshi who had pleaded Pakistan's case at the initial stage, to formalise a robust reply refuting all allegations levelled against Pakistan.

The daily reported that the attorney general's office is also busy documenting the case and collecting instances of the "atrocities and human rights violations committed by India" in Jammu and Kashmir.

On Thursday, the Pakistan Army said it is close to a decision on the mercy petition of Jadhav.

"Kulbhushan Jadhav's mercy petition has come to the army chief. There is a process, everything goes through a process but I can assure that it is near finalisation and we will give you news about this very soon," army spokes-man Major General Asif Ghafoor said.

provision for free birth control WASHINGTON, OCT 7 (AFP): US President Don-ald Trump's administration annulled yesterday an Obamacare provision that obliged employer health

plans to pay for contraception, potentially stripping free birth control from millions of women. The move extends to all commercial enterprises an exemption already given to religious institutions.

Rights groups, physicians, Democrats and ordinary citizens were outraged, and #HandsOffMyBC was a top trending hashtag on Twitter while the American Civil Liberties Union threatened a lawsuit.

But the White House insisted it was a matter of religious freedom. The ruling expands "exemptions to pro-tect moral convictions for certain entities and individuals whose health plans are subject to a mandate of contrathe US Department of Health and Human Services said.

Millions of American women who had the cost of

contraception reimbursed could be affected by the decision, which conservative groups had been seeking since Obamacare began.

Challenges to Obamacare had reached the US Suoreme Court, which in 2014 ruled that family-owned private companies could choose not to provide contracep-tive coverage to female employees on religious grounds.

In May, Trump signed a decree on religious liberty ions of conscience on matters of contraception.

Moscow, Oct 7 (AFP) Some 120 Islamic State fighters and 60 foreign mercenaries were killed in a series of Russian air strikes in Syria over the past 24 hours, the de-fence ministry in Moscow said today.

Puzzlingly, the minis-try also said three senior IS commanders including al-Shishani had confirmed dead as a result of an earlier Russian strike. Moscow reported al-Shishani's death despite the fact that the Pentagon said in 2016 the notorious fighter had been killed by American troops in Iraq.

"A command post of the terrorists and up to 80 (IS) fighters including nine natives of the Northern Caucasus were destroyed in the area of Mayadeen," the ministry said, adding that another 40 IS fighters were killed the town of Albu Kamal. Mayadeen is one of the Islamic State group's last bastions in Syria.

Moscow reported their deaths after taking "several days" to confirm the results of an earlier strike on the northern outskirts of Albu

Kamal which destroyed an IS command post with more than 30 fighters including the natives of the Northern Caucasus.

The Pentagon an-nounced in March 2016 that American forces had killed Shishani, one of the most notorious faces of IS known for his thick red beard. Shishani, whose nom de guerre means "Omar the Chechen." came from the former Soviet state of Georgia's Pankisi Gorge region, which is populated main-ly by ethnic Chechens.

He fought as a Chechen rebel against Russian ist groups in the west of Aleppo province. He is a famous commander, and his jihadist group is allied with the jihadists of the Al-Nusra front but only in their fight against the regime," he said. "He has no links with IS." The advances against

IS in Deir Ezzor have resulted in a heavy civilian death toll through Russian and coalition air raids.

The Observatory said Russian air strikes on Thursday night killed 14 people, including three children, fleeing across the Euphrates on rafts near Mayadeen.
