"There will be severofficials and al players, officials and delegates visiting the city from across the world. We need to keep it in mind that the countries they are coming from are less polluted than ours. For that purpose we have designated the area as green zone," he told PTI.

As per new rules, the

streets in these places, mainly around the sta-dium, will be watered twice daily to keep the area dust free.
"We have also direct-

ed to postpone all construction works in the area until the World Cup is over. We have directin the area to keep the smoke emitted by them under control," he said adding that burning anything in open space would not be allowed

Incidentally, vehicu-lar movement has been strictly regulated by the Bidhannagar City police, especially the area surrounding the venue, to keep it pollution free.

Special Drugs and Act court Cosmetics judge Vanlalenmawia ruled that the health Vanlalenmawia condition of the accused should be examined within two days. The bail plea would be heard again after the opinion of the medical experts are available, he said.

State taxation departent officials had seized 10 lakh medicine tablets suspected to be pseudoedrine on February 22 at the Lengpui Airport near here. The consign-ment was allegedly sent by Dehradun-based Cooper Pharma Limited to R and R Medicare, owned by Hrangdawla, officials said.

He was handed over to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) inspectors who booked him under the Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940. Such suspicious consign-ments had been moved through the Lengpui airport several times, the officials said.

The state Excise and Narcotics department officials had attempted to arrest him in October 2015 also for suspected smuggling of pseudo-ephedrine but gave up after learning that he has a drug license to import the drug.

Army wants body bags, caskets lying in warehouse for 17 yrs

NEW DELHI, OCT 11 (PTI): The Army has sought early handing over of 900 body bags handing and 150 caskets procured in 1999 lying in a warehouse for the past 17 years after allegations of kickbacks in the USD 4 lakh deal and subsequent CBI probe into it.

The Army's renewed pitch for getting custody of the body bags and caskets comes at a time when images of bodies of seven military personnel wrapped in plastic sacks and tied up in cardboard triggered outrage last week.

The military person nel were killed in an Mi-17 helicopter crash in Tawang on Friday.

Official sources said the Army has requested the CBI again to facilitate the handing over of the body bags and caskets as the probe into their procurement was over and the case was closed in 2013.

When contacted, CBI sources said they are looking into the matter.

In the aftermath of the Kargil war, the then NDA government had ordered procurement of 3,000 body bags and 500 aluminium caskets.

However, following allegations of kickbacks in the contract, the deal was cancelled but the company which was given the contract had supplied 900 body bags and 150 caskets by then.

The CBI had carried out probe into the allegations. A Delhi court in 2013 had discharged three former Army officials who Army charge sheeted by the CBI.

A senior Army official said CBI had found that a typographical error at a clerical level triggered these allegations. He said the actual weight of each casket should have been mentioned as 55 kg but instead, it was written 18 kg.
The official sources

said, however, an observation by a government auditor favouring scrutiny of the pricing of the body bags and caskets held back their release. They said a city court had issued directions for release of the caskets and body bags.
They said the US

government had also bought body bags and caskets from the same company at almost the same period when India had finalised the deal and the auditor suggested to find out the rates at which the American government had procured

The images of bodies of the seven military personnel personnel wrapped in plastic sacks had triggering outrage prompting the Army to call it an "aberration".

Have issued guidelines to states on safety of kids in school: Centre

NEW DELHI, OCT 11 (PTI): The Centre today apprised the Supreme Court that it has issued guidelines and advisories to all states on safety and security of school chil-dren after brutal killing seven-year-old boy Ryan International School at Gurugram.

The Human Resource Development Ministry, in an affidavit, assured the top court that it was willing to take further measures "in view of emergent requirements" to ensure safety of chil-dren in schools across the nation.

Responding to the PILs including one filed by Barun Chandra Thakur, father of the deceased child, the Centre, however, said it had a limited role as its guidelines are to be enforced by the states.

"It is pertinent to mention that this de-partment has taken cognisance to ensure safety and well-being of children in schools. Guidelines and advisories on safety and security of children have been issued as and when needed," the Centre said.

"The government has also circulated the poli-cy guidelines of National Disaster Management Authority to all the Principal secretaries/Secretaries (Education) of all governments and the government's affidavit said.

It also apprised the court that guidelines were issued to ensure quality, safety and hy-giene under the mid-day meal scheme.

"The role of the answering respondent's department (HRD) is limrespondent's ited to issuance of policy and various guidelines which are required to be enforced by various states and other authorities under which these educational institutions/ schools runs their administration and daily opera-

tions," the affidavit said.

that school management committees would also be empowered with the participation of all stakeholders including par-ents to secure the school campus in all respects.

The apex court had on October 9 asked all the state governments to ensure that the Centre's guidelines on safety and security of children were implemented in "reali-ty" in every school of the country.

The Centre had earlier told the apex court that it has been issuing guide-lines on safety of children to state governments.

The bench had posted the matter for further hearing on October 30.

Earlier, the CBSE said the gruesome killing of a minor boy of Gurugram's Ryan International School took place due to the "negligence" of institution's administration as drivers, conduc-tors were allowed to use washrooms meant only

Thakur, through his lawyer Sushil Tekriw-al, had sought framing and strict adherence of guidelines to ensure that no other child meets the fate of his son.

Pradyuman, a class II student of the high-profile school, was found dead with his throat slit by a sharp-edged weapon on the morning of September 8. It was al-leged that he was killed by 42-year-old bus conductor Ashok Kumar inside the toilet as the boy resisted a bid to sodomise him.

The boy's father, in his plea, has sought lay-ing down of guidelines by which "liability, responsibility and accountability of the management of the schools" across the country can be fixed in matters relating to safety and security of children at educational institutions.

SC criminalises sexual intercourse with wife below 18 years of age

NEW DELHI, OCT 11 (PTI): Sexual intercourse with a girl below 18 years of age, even by the husband, would now amount to rape, the Supreme Court held today in a historic verdict which criminalised sex with a wife who is not a major.

The apex court read down a provision

in the Indian Penal Code of 1860 exempting males from being tried for rape if the wives were between the age of 15 and 18 years.

The top court also made clear that it had not "dealt with the larger issue of marital rape (sexual intercourse with wife without her consent) of adult women" as it was not raised before it. In an unprecedented decision, the top court amended the wordings of Exception 2 of Section 375 (definition rape) of the IPC, which would now read: "Sexual intercourse or sexual acts by a man with his own wife, the wife not being under eighteen years of age, is not rape."

Earlier, the provision stated that sexual intercourse by a man with his wife is not rape if she is not under 15 years of age. The apex court also made it clear that this judge ment will have a "prospective effect".

"The issue before us is limited but one

of considerable public importance whether sexual intercourse between a man and his wife, being a girl between 15 and 18 years of age, is rape? Exception 2 to Section 375 of the IPC, 1860 answers this in the negative, but in our opinion sexual intercourse with a girl below 18 years of age is rape, regardless of whether she is married or not.

'The exception carved out in IPC creates an unnecessary and artificial distinction between a married girl child and an unmarried girl child and has no rational nexus with any unclear objective sought to be achieved," a two judge bench headed by Justice M B okur said in a path-breaking judgement.

Justice Deepak Gupta, who wrote a sepa-

rate 57-page-long verdict, concurred with the findings of Justice Lokur and said, "I am clearly of the opinion that Exception 2 to Section 375 IPC in so far as it relates to a girl child below 18 years is liable to be struck down...". Justice Gupta said the provision was "ar-

bitrary, capricious, whimsical and violative of the rights of the girl child and not fair, just and reasonable and, therefore, violative of Article 14 15 and 21 of the Constitution

The two separate but concurring verdicts, running into 127 pages, dealt with various aspects, such as the practice of child marriage, indifferent treatment meted out to married children, adverse effects of sexual intercourse, violation of their human rights, anomalies in laws and apathy of Parliament in preventing such a malice.

Both the judges were unanimous that there should be harmonious construction of all pro-child laws -- the Juvenile Justice Act, the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act (POCSO), the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act and the IPC to avoid any conflict among them while dealing with the issue of sexual intercourse involving a girl

below the age of 18.

"There is an apparent conflict or incongruity between the provisions of the IPC and the POCSO Act. The rape of a married girl child (a girl child between 15 and 18 years of age) is not rape under the IPC and therefore not an offence in view of Exception 2 to Section 375 thereof, but it is an offence aggravated penetrative sexual assault under

Section 5(n) of the POCSO Act and punishable under Section 6 of that Act.

"This conflict or incongruity needs to be resolved in the best interest of the girl child and the provisions of various complementary statutes need to be harmonised and read purposively to present an articulate whole,

"The artificial distinction (between a married girl and others between the 15 to 18 years of age group) is arbitrary and discriminatory and is definitely not in the best interest of the girl child. The artificial distinction is contrary to the philosophy and ethos of Article 15(3) of the Constitution as well as contrary to Article 21 of the Constitution and our commitments in internation-

"It is also contrary to the philosophy behind some statutes, the bodily integrity of the girl child and her reproductive choice. What is equally dreadful, the artificial distinction turns a blind eye to trafficking of the girl child and surely each one of us must discourage trafficking which is such a horrible social evil," Justice Lokur said.

The court voiced concern over thousands of minor girls being married in mass wedding ceremonies on the occasion of Ak-shaya Tritiya and observed that child marriage cannot go on like this just because this illegal practice was assumed to be legal and going on for ages.

It had earlier also questioned the Centre how Parliament could create an exception in law declaring that intercourse or a sexual act by a man with his wife, aged between 15 and less than 18 years, is not rape when the age of consent is 18.

Trafficking

The Oldest Trade it may be, but it remains a violent offence

To repeat a cliché, prostitution is the oldest trade. While this might be true, it does not make the flesh trade acceptable or even legal. The legalities we can leave to the legal minds to work out, but that still leaves us with the social aspect which continues to demand attention. Of late, there have been many NGOs, some effective ones even in the region, which have been hard at work to rescue and rehabilitate victims of trafficking. They, however, work is isolated silos and have not received the involvement of people at large on a scale that is required to address the problem with any real consequence or rebust enough to effectively rehabilitate all the rescued victims. As things stand, these organizations work with law & order agencies and victims: their engagement with the society limited to press briefings and the occasional sensitization camp. Speak to those working with rehabilitation, and they will be share that the number of victims they see returning to the "trade" is worrving. And this return is not out of choice, but sheer desperation. There are also those who look at this situation and argue that if someone takes up prostitution as a profession by choice, then no one should have any problems with it. This might appear sound on surface, but scratch a bit and an ugly picture emerges. But we digress

What does it say about a society where girls take to prostitution by choice. And this is not about moralizing on the issue either. Prostitution, and there are no two ways about it, is a very demeaning profession. Its workers are sex workers with no choice over who they service. While high-society call girls might still have some iota of control over where to draw the line, even this control is superficial since prostitution is a racket controlled by pimps and slave-keepers. Even when we pass off the induction of more girls into this trade to the lure of easy money and a weakness for luxuries, what we are actually commenting on is the social fibre which makes such decisions easy to take. Each time a police raid breaks into hotel rooms and claims to have found "evidence" of paid sex, the society cannot turn away its nose in disgust to avoid the unsightly reflection, it should instead hang its head in shame. How weak can the societal cushion be when prostitution keeps increasing in the State which does not even have a red light district or any overt presence of an organised mafia involved in this trade? Of course, one does not hear much about such raids nowadays, but that does not mean the problem does not exist. The police on their part, tackle even this social ill with their hands tied behind their backs just as they battle substance abuse. To illustrate this point further while we read often about elaborate sting operations which have busted prostitution rackets all over the country, how often have we read about convictions? The cops cannot, however, go easy on the trade any more. Raids have to be conducted and arrests made, if not for convictions, then just to get the message across that prostitution will not be ignored in Sikkim. This is necessary because if the trade is ignored, it will keep growing in the years to come and when it becomes really big we will have to start living with horror stories of girls being sold and forced into the trade. Even if one were to accept for a moment that girls are not being sold into the trade in Sikkim at present, one cannot discount the coercion part. There is always that person who inducts and lures people into the trade. Given the ever-falling age of induction, isn't that coercion? And, we have not even started talking the attendant health risks involved yet.

Having said all this, we have also got to accept the fact that no society and no police has been success ful in wiping prostitution out. And that is where the NGOs and volunteers come into play. The violence involved in the trade, both physical and psychological, needs to be conveyed to a wider audience and the situations which sucked victims into it need to be made known. Then the social engagement might come about and rescue and rehabilitation become possible and effective.

Indigenous people invented the so-called 'American Dream'

When President Barack Obama created Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), the 2012 program that offered undocumented young people brought to the U.S. as children a path into society, for a moment the ideals of the Am can Dream seemed, at least for this group, real.

Opinion

We call these kids (many of whom are now adults) "Dreamers," because they are chasing the American Dream – a national aspiration for upward economic mobility built on physical mobility. Fulfill-ing your dreams often means following them wher-ever they may lead – even into another country.

The Trump administration's decision to can-cel DACA and build a U.S.-Mexico border wall has endangered those dreams by subjecting 800,000

young people to deportation.

But the notion underlying both the DACA repeal and the wall – which is that "illegal" immigrants, most of them from Mexico, are stealing U.S. jobs and hurting society – reflects a profound misunderstanding of American history.

On Indigenous Peoples Day, it's worth under-scoring something that many archaeologists know: many of the values that inspire the American Dream – liberty, equality and the pursuit of happiness – date back to well before the creation of the U.S.-Mexico border and before freedom-seeking Pilgrim immigrants arrived at Plymouth Rock in 1620. They originate with native North Americans. A NATIVE AMERICAN DREAM

The modern rendition of the American Dream can be traced back to 1774, when Virginia's governor, John Murray, the fourth earl of Dunmore, wrote that even if Americans "attained Paradise, they would move on if they heard of a better place farther west."

The actual term "American Dream" was popularized in 1931 by the businessman and historian Iames Truslow Adams. For him, its realization de pended on not just being able to better oneself but also, through movement and human interaction,

seeing your neighbors bettered as well.

The first peoples to come to the Americas also came in search of a better life. That happened 14,000 years ago in the last Ice Age when nomadic pioneers, ancestors to modern Native Americans and First Nations, arrived from the Asian continent and roamed freely throughout what now comprises Canada, the United States and Mexico. Chasing mammoth, ancient bison and the elephant-like Gomphothere, they moved constantly to secure the health of their communities.

A more recent example of the power of migration reappears about 5,000 years ago, when a large group of people from what is today central Mexico spread into the American Southwest and farther north, settling as far up as western North America. With them they brought corn, which now drives a significant part of the American economy, and a way of speaking that birthed over 30 of the 169 contemporary indigenous languages still spoken in the United States today.

years ago as well when people from what is now northern Arizona fled a decades-long drought and rising authoritarianism under religious leaders. Many migrated hundreds of miles south to southern Arizona, joining the Hohokam (ancestors to modern O'odham nations) who had long thrived in the harsh Sonoran desert by irrigating vast fields of agave, corn, squash, beans and cotton.

When the northern migrants arrived to this

hot stretch of land around the then-nonexistent U.S.-Mexico frontier, Hohokam religious and political life was controlled by a handful of elites. Social mechanisms restricting the accumulation of power by individuals had slowly broken down.

For decades after their arrival, migrants and locals interacted. From that exchange, a Hohokam cultural revolution grew. Together, the two communities created a commoners' religious social movement that archaeologists call Salado, which featured a feasting practice that invited all village members to participate.

As ever more communities adopted this equi-table tradition, political power – which at the time was embedded in religious power - became more equally spread through society. Elites lost their control and, eventually, abandoned their temples. AMERICA'S EGALITARIAN MOUND-BUILDERS

The Hohokam tale unearths another vaunted American ideal that originates in indigenous history: equality, Long before it was codified in the Declaration of Independence, equality was enacted through the building of large mounds.

Massive earthen structures like these are often acts of highly hierarchical societies – think of the pyramids of the ancient Egyptians, constructed by masses of laborers as the final resting place of pow erful pharaohs, or those of the rigid, empire-build-

But great power isn't always top-down. Pover-ty Point, in the lower Mississippi River Valley of what's now Louisiana, is a good example. This massive site, which consists of five mounds, six concentric semi-elliptical ridges and a central plaza, was built some 4,000 years ago by hunter-fisher-gath-

erers with little entrenched hierarchy.
Originally, archaeologists believed that such so cieties without the inequality and authoritarianism that defined the ancient Egyptian, Roman, and Az-tec empires could not have constructed something so significant - and, if so, only over decades or cen-

But excavations in the last 20 years have revealed that large sections of Poverty Point were actually constructed in only a few months. These Native Americans organized in groups to undertake massive projects as a communal cooperative. leaving a built legacy of equality across America's

HAUDENOSAUNEE

The Haudenosaunee, or Iroquois, offer a more modern example of such consensus-based decision-making practices.

These peoples - who've lived on both sides of the St. Lawrence river in modern-day Ontario and

the U.S. Great Lakes states for hundreds, if not thousands, of years – built their society on collec-

tive labor arrangements.

They ostracized people who exhibited "selfish" behavior, and women and men often worked to-gether in large groups. Everyone lived together in communal longhouses. Power was also shifted constantly to prevent hierarchy from forming, and decisions were made by coalitions of kin groups and communities. Many of these participatory political practices continue to this day.

The Haudenosaunee sided with the British

during the 1776 American Revolution and were largely driven off their land after the war. Like many native populations, the Haudenosaunee Dream turned into a nightmare of invasion, plague and genocide as European migrants pursued their American Dream that excluded others.

NATIVE AMERICANS AT STANDING ROCK
The long indigenous history of rejecting authoritarianism continues today, including the 2016 battle for environmental justice at Standing Rock,

There, a resistance movement coalesced around a horizontally organized youth group that rejected the planned Dakota Access oil pipeline.

The movement centered on an environmental cause in part because nature is sacred to the La-kota (and many other indigenous communities), but also because communities of color often bear the brunt of economic and urban development decisions. This was the indigenous fight against repression and for the American Dream, gone 21st

REDEFINING THE NORTH AMERICAN DREAM Anthropologists and historians haven't always rec-

ognized the quintessentially Native American ideals present in the American Dream.

In the early 19th century, the prominent so-cial philosopher Lewis Henry Morgan called the Native Americans he studied "savages." And for centuries, America's native peoples have seen their cultural heritage attributed to seemingly everyone but their ancestors - even to an invented

"lost" white race.

America's indigenous past was not roman tic. There were petty disputes, bloody intergroup conflicts and slavery (namely along the Northwest Coast and American Southeast).

But the ideals of freedom and equality - and the right that Americans can move across this vast continent to seek it out – survive through the millennia. Societies based on those values have pros-

pered here.
So the next time a politician invokes American values to promote a policy of closed borders or selfish individualism, remember who originally es-poused the American Dream – and first sought to

A ustralia is set to decide whether dit will follow other democratic countries in lifting its prohibition on same-sex marriage. Some 16 million people have received their ballot papers and the results are expected on November 15. While the country looks to be moving forward on this issue, it is hard not to observe the re-gression of LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) rights through-out the world.

The resettlement of homosexual Chechen refugees in France and in other democratic countries. Fleeing persecution because of their sexual orientation, around 30 recently found refuge in Canada. Their plight is a reminder that Chechen President Ramzan Kadyrov is hunting down sexual minorities in his country. But the mass arrests, imprisonment, torture and honor crimes have provoked relatively little international outrage.

EUROPE DEALING WITH TABOOS The contrast is striking at a time when democratic countries hold depoliticised gay pride parades, celebrated with music and the waving of rainbow flags. 120 Beats per Minute, a recently released French hit movie about gay activism in the 1990s, tells how the fight against discrimination alongside safe-sex campaigns changed the way French people per-ceive sexuality today. It reminds how far things have

come: antiretroviral therapies against HIV are much more effective now than they were 20 years ago, and six European countries have recognised same-sex marriage since 2013. Storaised by homosexual parents have increased, pushing for the recognition of nontraditional families

But as in Chechnya, the fate of Russian homosexuals is of relatively little concern to the rest of the world A 2013 law banning "homosexual propaganda" – that is, all public expression in favor of the rights of homosexuals – is fueling endemic ho-mophobia. Yelena Mizulina, a virulent pro-life campaigner, drafted the law in the name of "family values", feeding from the same movements that animate various conservative anti-LGBT ements in Europe.

ASTONISHING VIOLENCE

IN ISLAMIC COUNTRIES

The hanging of 19-year-old Hassan Afshar in Iran reveals the harsh reality in Islamic countries. Even in relatively advanced Tunisia, whose constitution promotes gender equality, the criminal code punishes homo-sexuality with three years' imprisonment, and discriminatory arrests are

In the past few years, from Fez to Beni Mellal, several horrifying lynchings have been reported in Morocco. Sexual minorities there can also be prosecuted. Following the publication of her 2017 essay, Sex and lies: sexual life in Morocco, award-winning Franco-Moroccan author Leïla Slimani stated on radio France Inter:

Everyone condemns us to silence. In your own home, you can be homosexual, have sexual relations outside of marriage, or commit adultery, even though all of it is illegal. This creates a kind of slippery slope. Once you are outside the law, there is nothbat incest and pedophilia? The set of sexual practices that are all illegal are certainly not all equivalent. You are just told to be quiet, to hide, until you become a paragon of hypocrisy.

In December of 2015, around 30 Egyptians were arrested for "de-bauchery" in a Cairo sauna. Humiliated, but acquitted by the courts, they had a lucky escape from the country's remorseless vice squad. In Saudi Arabia, homosexuals were beheaded until 2014, but seeking to rehabilitate the country's image, the Wahhabi kingdom now "only" whips them. And over the last few years, egged

on by enthusiastic crowds, the socalled Islamic State has tortured stoned or thrown to their deaths doz ens of Syrian and Iragi homosexuals.

HARASSMENT AND TORTURE

Widely regarded as unnatural, ho-mosexuality is illegal in 36 African states. Nigeria, Sudan, Somalia and Mauritania apply the death penalty. Introduced in the mid-20th century under British colonial rule, article 377 of the Indian Criminal Code punishes homosexuality with a ten-year prison sentence. While convictions are rare, police harassment persists.

In China, conversion therapies are rife. They subject homosexuals to freezing showers, electric shocks, and brainwashing methods. Promoted by fundamentalist Christians, conversion therapies and exorcisms are still practiced in the US, although outlawed in several states. Earlier this year, several thousand protesters gathered around Stonewall Park in New York to oppose and xenophobic policies. They fear, ties will be next to suffer the stigma-tisation currently aimed at ethnic and religious minorities

WHAT ABOUT FRANCE?
In France, degrading anti-homo ual rhetoric has effortlessly infected

democratic discourse.

The reactionary section of the French population behind the "Demon for All" movement is deeply hostile to equal rights for LGBT people. Many of its members were supporters of former prime minister and failed presidential candidate François Fillon, who was against same-sex marriage. Many were opposed to the decriminalisation of homosexuality back in 1982.

Abhorring the idea of gay parents and revolted by the fact that many homosexuals wish to start their own families, such movements' conser vative statements have resurrected the stereotype of homosexuals as perverted people, moved by an unnatural desire to have children with a member of the same sex. It also seems that several attacks directly targeting homosexual bars or clubs by alleged terrorists have been prevented in France; the last one was thwarted on August 22.

Recently, France's Constitution-al Council ruled out a proposition to ban from office for ten years anyone practicing hate speech, whether rac-ist, sexist of homophobic, invoking an intolerable violation of freedom of

(PTI): West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee today held the Centre responsible for the Dar-jeeling unrest and said the state government would not tolerate any rumour-mongering that might endanger peace. Speaking at an ad-

ministrative meeting held here this afternoon she requested the people in the hills and the former Maoist stronghold of Jangalmahal not to pay heed to any form of instigation or rumours.

"There was peace in the (Darjeeling) hills. Due to Delhi's instigation, the peace was disturbed for a few days but peace has returned to the hills again," Banerjee alleged.

"I will request everybody not to pay heed to any form of rumours. You people have to protect



the peace of Jangalmahal, I'm with you as your friend," she added.

In an apparent reference to the BJP, she accused the saffron party of creating differences in the country.

"In India a new nolitical party with saffron flags has evolved. It is trying to create differ-ences among people. ences among people. It is fomenting trouble other...also trying to create division among the Hindus and Muslims, Sikhs and Christians,"

she alleged.

Referring to amendments in laws made by the Jharkhand govern-ment for tribal lands, Baneriee alleged the "saffron party" was also try-ing to create differences among the tribals by taking away their land.

"It (saffron party) is creating differences among tribals. And in their regime, tribals are the most troubled

Their land are being taken away. This has recently happened in Jharkhand," she alleged. She described West

Bengal as a land where people of all religions were living happily and

in Gujarat where a Dalit man was allegedly beaten to death by a group of men belonging to the up-per caste Patel community for attending a garba event. "A Dalit was lynched

when he went to witness a Dandiya dance in Guja-rat. These incidents happen in Rajasthan, in Madhya Pradesh and also in some parts of Bihar," she

"But in West Bengal, we keep Dalits close to our heart, we protect tribals, we protect the minorities...This is the culture of West Bengal,"

She said in West Bengal people work as per their will, follow the religion they prefer and there was no discrimination or misunderstanding among them.

New Delhi, Oct 11 (PTI): Petrol pump dealers today called off their proposed day-long strike on Friday after stateon Friday after state-owned oil firms warned them of strict action, including cancelling their contracts.

Various associations of petrol pump dealers had called the 24-hour strike against new Marketing Discipline Guide-lines which impose stringent penalties for short-selling, operating automated pumps in manual mode without authorisation, non- pro-vision of clean toilet and not paying minimum wages to employees.

The director marketing of the three oil companies had appealed to us not to go on strike and so we are withdrawing the strike on their appeal," said Ajay Bansal, Presi-dent of All India Petroleum Dealers Association.

The United Petroleum Front, an umbrel-la organisation for the Federation of All-India Petroleum Traders, the All-India Petroleum Dealers Association and the Consortium of Indi-an Petroleum Dealers, also threatened indefinite stoppage of purchase and sale operations from October 27.

While the oil compa nies did appeal for calling off the strike, they also warned petrol pump operators of strict action.

including facing the prospect of cancellation of dealership contract.

Sanjiv Singh, Chairman of Indian Oil Corp (IOC), the country's largest fuel retailer, vesterday stated that the strike call was totally unjustified as the oil firms have accepted all demands and raised dealers commission only a few weeks ago.

Sinking Kiribati looking to India for help: former prez

BENGALURU, OCT 11 (PTI): Former Kiribati president Anote Tong has said he is looking to India for technological assistance to save the tiny island nation from sinking due to global warming.

"India has the technology and skill to save our island nation from sinking due to climate change. I would be very happy to write a let-ter to your Prime Minister (Naren-dra Modi) and meet him too," he told PTI here.

The island nation comprising 33 atolls (ring-shaped islands formed by corals) and one raised island in the Pacific Ocean has a population of over 110,000. It is gradually sinking as sea levels rise across the world at 3.4 millimetres per year.

Tong was here to attend the "Roundglass Samsara Festival", a global environment and sustain-ability event organised by Grammy Award winner Ricky Kej in the city recently.

He said Modi had resulted in him changing his perception on India's stand on climate change when he met him during one of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summits.
"I had met your current prime



minister. We had a meeting with him before the Paris Climate Change Accord. It was a wonderful one. He changed my perception of the position of India because he was very positive. He has maintained it ever since," Tong said.

Modi is a very practical leader of the world and India can make a contribution to train Kiribati's peo-

ple to develop skills of international standards to earn their livelihood in whichever country they would want to migrate to, he said.

"I have been advocating the concept of 'migration with dignity' for I know, many of my people will not stay in Kiribati. So, this concept is something which would provide training to our people to earn their livelihood if they want to migrate or prefer to stay on in the island," he

About a solution to save his nation, Tong said he wanted to create new land masses through dredging and create a new society to help Kirihati sustain itself economically

"Kiribati now earns just 10 per cent of its revenue from fishing. We

"If we could mop up 30 to 40 per cent revenue from fishing, we can raise one billion dollars, which will be enough to sustain our country

economically," he added.

Portugal and France clinch World Cup spots

PARIS, OCT 11 (AFP): Cristiano Ronaldo's Portugal and Antoine Griezmann's booked spots at the 2018 World Cup finals on Tuesday while the Netherlands crashed out.

Portugal beat Swit-

zerland 2-0 in Lisbon thanks to a Johan Djourou own goal and an Andre Silva strike.

France needed goals from Griezmann and Olivier Giroud in a hard-fought 2-1 win over Belarus at the Stade de France.

After a stuttering campaign, France's achievement in beating Bulgaria and Belarus in their final two qualifiers means they avoid the playoffs having had to go through that route for the last two finals.

"We have had a dif-ficult route and tonight wasn't easy either but we've achieved our aim," coach Didier Deschamps said. "We are happy, even if qualifying is logical given the quality of the players I have."



Messi, Messi, Messi; his 3 goals lift Argentina to World Cup

QUITO (ECUADOR), OCT 11 (AP): When it really mattered and when the pressure was most intense, Lionel Messi delivered for Argentina.

On the brink of being eliminat-ed from World Cup qualifying for the first time in almost five decades. Messi scored all three goals in Argentina's comeback 3-1 victory Tuesday at Ecuador overcoming the thin air in the Andes.
"It would've been crazy if Argen-

tina didn't play the World Cup," said Messi, adding that the team "will change, will grow a lot, will be stronger after this."

But there's still work to do for Argentina, the two-time champions, who lost the final three years ago to

Messi has yet to hoist a major trophy for his country of birth, a contrast to the laurels he's brought Barcelona.

He'll turn 31 during the World Cup in Russia, so this may be his last

"Messi does not owe Argentina a World Cup, but rather football owes him a World Cup," Argentine coach Jorge Sampaoli said.

The top four teams in South

America get automatic spots at next year's tournament in Russia.
Brazil has 41 points and clinched

months ago. The other three advancing Tuesday went in this order: Uruguay (31), Argentina (28) and Colombia (27).

Uruguay beat Bolivia 4-2, Argentina won 3-1, Colombia drew 1-1 with Peru and last-place Venezuela beat Paraguay 1-0. Peru (26) placed fifth and will



keep alive its bid for a first World Cup appearance since 1982 after edging Chile for the South American spot in the inter-continental playoff next month against Oceania representative New Zealand.

On a dramatic last day of continental qualifying tournaments, six South American teams separated by only four points over 17 matches had shots at the World Cup entering

play.
Chile, after a 3-0 loss to Brazil, and Paraguay missed out. Venezuela, Bolivia and Ecuador were already out of contention.

There was a major shock further north in the Americas with the US slipping from third spot to fifth in CONCACAF qualifying for teams in North and Central America and the Caribbean with a loss in Trinidad and missing out on the World Cup.

Panama secured the third automatic direct entry behind Mexico and Costa Rica, and Honduras finished fourth and secured a spot in a playoff against Australia.

High-spirited India brace for tough Ghana challenge

PHILEM DIPAK SINGH NEW DELHI, OCT 11 (PTI): Their transformation from rank outsiders to valiant fighters draw-ing all-round praise, India face another test of character against former champions Ghana in their final group A game of the FIFA Under-17 World

Cup, here tomorrow. Not many had given India any chance against Colombia after their 0-3 loss to United States in their opening match but the home side put up an inspired performance, showing that the country can compete against the best in the world.

Coach Luis Norton de Matos' defensive gameplan was executed to near perfection by his players against Colombia and the tournament debutants would have eked out a win had a bit

of luck gone their way.
Colombia largely
dominated the match but as de Matos later assert-ed, the outcome of that game could have been different had India taken the lead in the first half. It could have happened if Rahul Kannoly's first half stoppage time volley had

not hit the post.
With the expectations now rising, de Matos and his boys would be aiming to show that the performance against Colombia was no fluke and they were worthy competitors in this global showpiece,

for them as Ghana are the most physical side in the group. No doubt, the two-time former cham-pions Ghana will start as clear favourites in tomorrow's final Group A match at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium.

Even a win for India, which is unlikely though not improbable, is not expected to take them to the knock-out stage as USA have already booked a round of 16 berth while Colombia and Ghana are

on three points each.

Without any point so far, India have conceded five goals and scored once to have a goal difference -- which will decide the group rankings if two or more teams have



equal points -- of minus four, the least among the four teams in the group.

With a nearly non-existent youth development system in the country and hence a small pool of talented youngsters, de Matos built a team in seven months after he took

Anwar, who has been praised profusely by the USA and Colombian coaches, got a few knocks in the previous match but played the whole 90 minutes without any problem.

backs respectively.

Boris, who returned to the side after missing out the match against USA, did a good job against Colombia and he was the supplier of the Rahul Konnoly volley that

thudded the goalpost.

Stalin was the one who took the corner kick from which Jeakson Singh scored India's first World Cup goal.

De Matos has a lot of options in the midfield as he has packed the squad with players who can play in these positions.

Defensive midfield-

er Jeakson is expected to continue in the first eleven as his six feet two inches frame will be needed against a physically superior Ghanaians.

Ghana, who beat Colombia but lost to USA, would be looking for a win to be assured of an automatic slot in the round of 16 as that will ensure them a top two

WASHINGTON, OCT 11 (PTI): President Donald Trump has discussed a "range of options" with his top military advisors to respond to North Korea's provocative mis-sile and nuclear tests as two American heavy bombers flew over the Korean peninsula in a show of force against

Spain vows "all options" open in Catalonia crisis talks

MADRID, OCT 11 (AFP): Spain's government vowed to examine "all options" today in a crisis cabinet meeting hours after Catalonia's leaders said they had a mandate to declare independence but put it on hold, plunging the country into uncertainty. Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy has

vowed to do everything in his power to prevent the region's independence in a dispute that has hurled Spain into its

deepest political crisis in decades.

He has refused to rule out imposing direct rule over the semi-autonomous region - a move many fear could lead to

Rajoy called an emergency meeting after Catalonia's president Carles Puigdemont announced yesterday that he had accepted the mandate for "Catalonia to become an independent state" following a banned referendum earlier this month

But in a parliamentary speech that left many confused, Puigdemont immediately called for Catalonia's independence to be suspended to allow for ne-gotiations with the central government.

Today, a government source who refused to be named said "all options" were on the table as the crisis talks were under way.

At stake is the future of a region of 7.5 million people deeply divided over independence, one of Spain's econom ic powerhouses, whose drive to break



away has raised concern for stability in the European Union.

Crowds of thousands gathered outside the parliament building in Barcelona yesterday evening, waving Catalan flags and banners screaming "democra-cy" in the hope of witnessing a historic night in a region that remains deeply divided over independence.

But Spain's political establishment

rounded on Puigdemont following his declaration, and support among separatists in Catalonia was mixed. The government stuck to its stance that would not accept mediation or any talks until Catalan leaders drop their independence bid.

'Mr Puigdemont - no one - can expect to impose mediation without returning to legality or democracy," Dep-uty Prime Minister Soraya Saenz de Santamaria told reporters.

She said Puigdemont was "a person who doesn't know where he is, where he's going or with whom he wants to go". Barcelona resident Maria Rosa Bertran said she was against a delayed se-

"I find it even worse because it is suffering a longer agony. Indecision and uncertainty is the worst thing that can

Following his declaration to parliament, Puigdemont and his allies signed an independence declaration outside the chamber, but its legal validity was unclear.

Spain and Catalonia now enter into the unknown, as Madrid has repeatedly said independence is not up for dis-cussion. Catalonia pressed ahead with an independence referendum on October 1 that the central government said breached Spain's constitution.

Spanish police cracked down on

the polls, beating some voters as they closed down polling stations.

"I did not expect independence to be declared today because of all the processes that the government of Spain has begun, both with police actions and with threats," Marc Cazes, a student in Barcelona, said yesterday.

Around 90 per cent of those who cast ballots voted for independence but the poll was poorly monitored and many Catalans opposed to secession boycotted it. The crisis has caused deep uncertainty for businesses in one of the wealthiest regions in the eurozone's

fourth-largest economy.

A string of companies have already moved their legal headquarters - but not their employees - from Catalonia to other parts of the country. But today morning, the Spanish stockmarket was up 1.16 percent on hopes for a breakthrough in the crisis.
