Earlier a group of ag-grieved assistant lecturers who were working in dif-ferent Colleges of the State on temporary basis and had appeared for the recently held Sikkim Public Service Commission [SPSC] examination for regular appointment to the post had expressed dissatisfaction over the examination process and its results. To register their protest, the group had also announced an indefinite dharna at the District Administrative Centre [East] from Friday.

On behalf of all aggrieved assistant lecturers, Lobsa-ng Chopel Lepcha, Dinesh Adhikari, Sanjay Rai, Sushma Rai, Chuki Bhutia, Karma Ch-oden and Dr Sapna Gurung had expressed their dissatisfaction during a press confer-

The group had raised doubts over the selection process of Assistant Lecturers alleging that there was no transparency in the examination conducted by

ter the deadline for applica-tions ended, it was extended for a week in January this year and those who applied during this period have been selected for the post of Assistant Lecturer. They had also alleged that male candidates have been selected under seats reserved for women while OBC seats have also been occupied by candidates of other categories. "SPSC held viva on

Wednesday and announced the results within less than half an hour of the viva

which also raises questions demanded an investigation into the entire process of the examination.

"A panel constituted by the state government five years back had appointed us as Assistant Lecturers on the basis of our qualification and other parameters. But now another panel of the government has disqualified us for the post of Assistant Lecturers and cancelled our appointment," they said.

Many of these assistant

since the past 10 years and students under them have already passed out.

"Even the Chief Minister and others assured us of regularization but we are now shocked with the recent result of the SPSC examination," stating that they had requested the concerned authority not to give appoint-ment orders to the candidates who have cleared the SPSC examination. They had also decided to approach the court if required.

The group further de-

manded that since they have been appointed on the basis of their qualification they should be regularised.

As per the source information, the Chief Minister Pawan Chamling met the administrative heads of a number of departments today at his residence where in he directed the HRDD to look into the matter and suggested to start the process of regularisation of all assistant lecturers who are working for the government since 5 years and above, sources informed.

Did not pay N Koreans for release of prisoners: Trump

(PTI): The United States did not pay any money to the North Koreans for the release of its citizens held as a prisoners, Pres-ident Donald Trump said as he slammed the previous Obama administra tion for paying USD 1.8 billion in cash after the

Iranian nuclear deal.

The president was addressing his support-ers at a rally in Elkhart,

Indiana, yesterday. "North Korean leader Kim Jong-un did a great service to himself and to his country by doing this. But those hostages came out with respect, we didn't pay for them," he said. "We are going to set the table. We are going to make a great deal, for the world, for North Korea, for South Korea, for Ja-

pan, for China," he added.
The Obama administration had paid USD 1.8 billion for hostages, Trump claimed in an apparent reference to a January 2016 deal between the US and Iran in which the United States agreed to pay USD 1.7 billion to settle a case related to the sale of military equipment before the Iranian revolution. Simultaneously. Iran had released House strongly refuted reports that it was a ransom. Trump said his meeting with Kim Jongun would be a great suc-cess. "I think it's going to be a very big success. But my attitude is: And if it isn't, it isn't," he told his supporters.

"You have to have that because you don't know. We're not going to walk into an Iran deal," Trump added. The Iran deal was one of the most embarrassing agree-ments the United States had ever entered into, he said, adding that the US could not allow Iran to have nuclear weapons.

"We have to be able to go into their military bases to see whether or not they're cheating Now, of course, we're all sure they're not cheating, but

just in case," he said.

"I'll be meeting with Kim Jong-un to pursue a future of peace and security for the world. For the whole world," the president said.
"So the relationship is

good, and hopefully, for all of us, for the world, hopefully something very good is going to happen. And they under-stand it's very important for them. It's important for everybody," he added.

Malaysia king to pardon Anwar, paving way for return to politics

KUALA LUMPUR, MAY 11 (AFP): Malaysia's king has agreed to pardon Anwar Ibrahim immediately, the country's newly installed prime minister said today, paving the way for the jailed leader to return to poli-tics and potentially become premier. It was the latest dramatic development after Ma-

hathir Mohamad's alliance inflicted a shock defeat on the long-ruling Barisan Nasional (BN) coalition, ending the corruption-riddled regime's six-decade stran-

glehold on power.

Mahathir -- who had retired in 2003 as premier but made a comeback in a bid to oust the coalition he once headed -- was sworn in Thursday, becoming the world's oldest elected leader at 92.

Mahathir, who had ruled with an iron fist for over two decades, cut ties with BN due to allegations that the coalition's leader and his ex-protege Najib Razak oversaw the pillaging of sovereign wealth fund 1MDB.

The elderly politician joined forces with opposition parties that opposed him while in power and agreed that if elected, he would hand over the premiership to Anwar, his former nemesis and leading member of the People's Justice Party.

The party is part of the alliance that won power at

the hard-fought poll.

Mahathir has previously said he would likely remain prime minister for two to three years, before transferring power to Anwar.

One of Malaysia's most charismatic politicians, An-

war was heir-apparent to the premiership until Mahathir sacked him in 1998 and he was subsequently jailed for sodomy and abuse of power.

Anwar and Mahathir's stormy relationship has loomed large over Malaysia's political landscape for

But in a remarkable turnaround, the pair reconciled and joined forces as allegations mounted over 1MDB and Najib became increasingly authoritarian jailing opponents and introducing laws to stifle dis-

Anwar, now 70, was jailed again in 2015 during Najib's rule -- after making historic gains as the head of the opposition at the 2013 elections -- and had

een due to be released next month.

But Mahathir told a press conference that King

Datuk Sri Anwar immediately," Mahathir told a press conference, using a Malay honorific to refer to Anwar.

Sultan Muhammad V, in a meeting with opposition leaders, had agreed to grant Anwar a royal pardon. "The (king) has indicated he is willing to pardon

The royal pardon would mean he could return to

politics straight away. Without it, he would be banned from political life for five years.

"He should be released immediately when he is

pardoned," Mahathir added. Wan Azizah Wan Ismail, president of Anwar's par-and his wife, told AFP "steps have already been ini-

tiated" for his immediate release. "We pray it will be as soon as possible." Anwar is rrently in hospital for treatment to his shoulder,

which was operated on last year.

Mahathir also announced that 10 cabinet positions would be filled on Saturday, including finance, defence and foreign affairs.

Asked about 1MDB, he accused Attorney-General Mohamed Ali Apandi -- who cleared Najib over the scandal -- of having "undermined his own credibility".

"He in fact has hidden evidence of wrongdoing and that is wrong in law," he said. "Our intention is to go for people who have shown a tendency to be corrupt or who had committed known corrupt crimes." In 2016, Apandi said the Saudi royal family was the source of 681 million that mysteriously appeared in Najib's bank accounts, and closed the 1MDB probe. Apandi came to office after Najib sacked the previ-

ous attorney general, who was believed to be aggressively investigating the matter.

Mahathir also said there was widespread fraud

during the election campaign, and raised concerns about irregularities in the Borneo state of Sabah, where BN suffered heavy losses.

"In the last two days, for example, there were no speeches made, only money distributed," he said, adding allegations of fraud would be investigated.

His comments might raise eyebrows however.

Critics say there was much electoral fraud during Mahathir's time in power, while corruption and cronyism flourished, and his government pushed policies that favoured the Muslim Malay majority and exacerbated racial tensions. Still, analysts say the attempted cheating at Wednesday's poll was worse than anything

BN was accused of gerrymandering while activists said the coalition hurled cash and gifts at voters and there was a litany of problems with the electoral roll,

including dead people appearing on the list.

But voters turned out in droves, determined to push out the government, with the opposition boosted by the presence of standard-bearer Mahathir, who has a huge following among the country's Muslim Malay majority.

Canada Sikh minister asked to remove turban at US airport

TORONTO, MAY 11 (PTI): was asked to take off his turban at a Detroit airport during a security check despite passing through the metal detector without any problem, prompting senior US officials to apologise, media reports have said

Navdeep Bains, Can-ada's Minister of In-novation, Science and Economic Development, described the incident in an interview with the French-language paper La Presse yesterday.

Bains was returning to Toronto after meetings with Michigan state leaders in April 2017 and had already passed through regular security checks at the Detroit Metro Airport, but because he was wearing a turban, a security agent told him that he would have to undergo additional checks, according to La Presse

"He told me to take off my turban. I asked him why I would have to take off my turban when the metal detector had worked properly," the minister said. The US amended its travel policy in 2007, allowing Sikhs to keep turbans on while passing during the secu-rity inspection process.

Bains said that when he travels, he rarely dis-closes his identity as a cabinet minister, in order to better understand the travel experiences and frustrations of people not afforded similar privileges.

No Country for Women They continue to be at risk because

the predators continue to get away exual assaults are not a new crime in our coun-Sexual assaults are not a new crime in the complete lack of try; unfortunately, neither is the complete lack of the violent crime is adanything substantive in how this violent crime is addressed. This must be why the victim of one of the more gruesome rapes is now immortalized in our memories as "Nirbhaya". Women need to be "fearless" in our country to get by because we remain distress-

ingly impotent in providing them with them an environment without fear. For all the Beti Bachao-Beti Padhao sloganeering, we remain a country which has become flawlessly effective in protecting its VIPs but remain clueless about how to keep the women safe. The Kathua and Unnao monstrosities remained unaddressed for a long while and then saw some follow-up in the wake of the public outrage. That news cycle appears to have run its course, and now the follow-up is at risk of being subverted again, even as the dominant politics threatens to divert the discourse and along with it the investigations, which, one must bear in mind, have only just begun and not been completed yet. There is a lot that could be compromised to save the leaders and cohorts

of the hypocrisy that is in power. The two incidents mentioned here have also brought home the fact that is not just the Rape Capital. Delhi, which has too many predators roaming around unchecked, but even the rural parts have more than their share of rapists and criminals. Of course, the crime statistics always suggested this, but it was the Kathua and Unnao horrors which reiterated it for those who live their India in the metros and who have thus far been "shocked" only by crimes in urban areas, having inexplicably bought into the fiction of rural idylls being safe for women. Not even homes or families are safe environments for most women in India, so the sooner we dispel these notions the faster we can begin the process of securing safety and access to justice for women.

It is worrying that so many predators roam without worry in our country. What is even more worrying is that sexually deviant people feel neither fear in roaming the streets for prey nor hesitation in unleashing rape to settle scores or exploit situations. They obviously gather this courage from the fact that policing, investigation and prosecution remain weak and easily compromised except in the rare case that manages to remain in the news. And the Kathua and Unnao cases have established this beyond doubt.

There has to also be something clinically wrong with us that we groom so many rapists in our country, and in the long run, that is a failing we need to address and correct.

In the meanwhile, what we need to do as a country is present a united sense of outrage to demand better of ourselves, our societies and our governments. We have to be better than a society where a woman, even a child, risks rape at every turn in most parts of the country. And they remain at risk because our systems, by and large, continue to fail the victims and survivors It took nationwide displays of outrage for the accused in the Kathua and Unnao cases to even be booked, and even though some of the suspects are now behind bars, the power of influence and the macabre dance of caste and political ideology which kept them above the law for so long must have encouraged those of their ilk and deviation to continue with their assaults so long as they had a leader on speed-dial or money in their pockets to compromise investigations.

Admittedly, arrests or even convictions are only part of the required commitments the nation needs to make its women. Since we are nowhere close to resolving that collective failing which births so many rapists in the country, we have to find ways and means to ensure that no case of rape remains unsolved and no accused let off. Since we cannot groom our men better, let us at least resolve to bring down the entire weight of law on every perpetrator. A rapist is invariably a person dealing with his inadequacies and uses sexual assault to claim some sense of power by taking possession of a woman's body. They continue to do so because too many of them are allowed to get away with it. One way to beat them is to convince them that something more powerful will slam down hard on them if they rape. And we have to ensure that the Law presents itself as that powerful deterrent.

School uniforms: what Australian schools can do to promote acceptance of gender diversity

Earlier in the year, the principal of a private girls' school in Sydney's west was criticised by some media for promoting "gender fluidity" and "boasting" that a change in the school's uniform was enabling a "variety of gender expression". The school had given students the option of wearing shorts

and long pants.

This criticism was ill informed and potentially harmful to gender diverse young people. Leaders, such as the school's principal should be supported

not pilloried. CONCERNS ABOUT THE FRAGILITY

Underpinning criticisms of changes in the school's uniform policy is the assumption clothing is an essential element of gender identity. For people who hold this view, the uniform worn by girls should be distinctly different from that worn by boys in order to prevent individual and collective notions of gen-der from being undermined, lest children lose their sense of gender all together.

Claims that our identity as male or female is cologically determined and fixed were expressed forcefully in the lead up to the same-sex marriage survey in 2017. Some people opposed to marriage equality attempted to shift the terms of reference of the public debate by suggesting legalising same-sex marriage would also result in acceptance of gender fluidity and diversity in sport, employment, velfare and violence prevention initiatives

In essence, changing the marriage laws presented a danger to the stability of gender as a binary concept, and this danger was an increasing accep tance of gender fluidity or variance in Australian society. At the heart of these concerns is a rejection of gender diversity as a legitimate, lived reality. Instead, sex and gender are conflated and viewed as biologically determined. Research conducted at the Gendered Innovations centre for medical research at Stanford University, shows when the difference between sex and gender is ignored the results of research can be incorrect and possibly dangerous.

While sex is biologically determined, gender is a social and cultural construct that shifts and

changes across time and place.
Importantly, neither sex nor gender are binary but instead operate along a continuum. People who are transgender or gender diverse are people who don't identify with the sex or gender norms assigned to them due to their physiology. People can experience this in many different ways. While it may sometimes include transitioning by taking medication, hormones or undergoing surgery, this is not always the case

WHY THE DISTINCTION BETWEEN SEX AND GENDER IS IMPORTANT

Let's be clear, distinguishing between gender and sex is not a radical gender theory. Those researching and investigating gender across a range of disciplines have recognised for decades gender and sex are separate and different constructs, and that they're not always fixed.



The American Psychological Association also ovides resources and advice about the difference between sex and gender, as well as the reality of multiple identities across the transgender spec-trum. In line with these, the Australian Psychological Association recently produced guidelines to recognise the benefits of affirming transgender identities in mental health settings. This can help to relieve distress and reduce suicidal ideation.

These guidelines would also benefit trans and nder diverse young people within schools and align with the recommendations of a recent study

of trans young people and their parents and carers.

These include recommendations to affirm a person's gender, challenge negative attitudes to-ward gender diversity, and advocate for the sup-port needs of transgender people.

DESPITE YES VOTE, LGBTQI PEOPLE

STILL FACE ADVERSITY
Despite the 7.8 million yes-voting Australians, ongoing and vicious attacks on trans and gender diverse young people (and those who advocate for them) have escalated in the media. These attacks suggest to school leaders any attempt to support this group of young people may be heavily and publicly scrutinised.

Even more concerning, these attacks convey to young people (and adults) there is something undesirable or dangerous about gender diversity. This is damaging not only to those who are trans and gender diverse but also those around them. It suggests there's only one correct way to be male or female, and that way is strictly and linearly aligned with fixed ideas of masculinity or femininity. AUSTRALIAN SCHOOL ENVIRON-

MENTS ARE NOT SUPPORTIVE
A review of Australian and international literature on bullying shows many school environments are unsupportive, if not prejudicial, towards students from minority groups in Australia. This is particularly the case for those students who identify or are perceived as being from sexuality or gender minorities. They often experience higher rates of violence, and subsequent emotional, social and physical health inequalities.

A recent study of over 700 sexuality and gender diverse young people found 94% of participants heard homophobic language at school. Some 54% of this happened daily. Almost half of the participants had witnessed school-based physical harassment of classmates that were perceived to be sexuality or gender diverse.

School climates can make a big difference to these young peoples' lives. But escalating policing of gender expression is likely to prevent or limit school leaders from taking action.

WHAT CAN WE DO TO MAKE

SCHOOLS SUPPORTIVE?
Our society needs leaders who will support and defend the right of young people to express their gender as they wish - whether gender diverse or not. The principal at the centre of this recent "crisis" demonstrated this kind of leadership

The success of the marriage equality survey re minds us we can be a tolerant, accepting, and safe place for all Australians. But it takes constant work.

The safety and well-being of young people

should not be compromised. Responsible adults, especially leaders in our community such as princi-pals and politicians, must have the courage to challenge negative attitudes toward gender diversity and support the needs of trans and gender diverse people. Relaxing the rules on school uniforms is a small but positive step in this direction.

Malaysians celebrate the return of Mahathir and hope for a brighter future

When Malaysians woke up on May 10, the world looked and felt different. For the first time in years, many Malaysians feel a sense of optimism that was missing in their lives. For the past six decades, Malaysians have been living under the rule of the United Malays Na-tional Organisation (UMNO).

UMNO had won every election since 1955. In the May 9 general elections, Naiib Razak, UMNO's leader and prime minister, was not only confident, he was telling close aides that he was aim ing for two-thirds of the seats in the 222-seat parliament. By the time the final vote was counted, UMNO had only 79 seats and lost power.

What happened? This will be the question preoccupying political scientists for years to come

Suffice to say, Najib lost due to three main reasons.

First, his personal brand had become synonymous with kleptocracy. He was alleged to have received close to US\$1 billion from a Malaysian sovereign fund via complex international transactions. It did not help that Najib's wife, Rosman Mansor, was widely regarded as a spendthrift with a pas-sion for diamonds and designer bags. Second, Dr Mahathir Mohamad

was no ordinary opponent. Mahathir was Malaysia's longest-serving prime minister, from 1981 to 2003, and had



me out of retirement to fight Najib

Third, and perhaps most important, UMNO was simply seen as an organisa tion for political patronage, and a pur-veyor of racism and crony capitalism. It was no longer seen as a Malay nanalist party. In the past few decades, UMNO has been regarded as vehicle for making big money, government cor-ruption and spreading hate towards the Chinese community in Malaysia.

The rural Malays, the mainstay of UMNO political power, could not stomach Najib's toxic reputation as "Mr Kleptocrat". They could see that under continued UMNO rule, their lives would be economically ruined. The GST brought in by the Najib administration was the last straw. Prices of basic necessities went up across the

oard despite Najib's insistence that the GST would bring down prices.

There is tremendous goodwill to-wards Mahathir. Yes, he was dictatorial when he was prime minister the first time around. But most Malaysians I spoke to say this time it will be different. Mahathir is 92, and it is obvious he is a transitional leader.

He has said many times that once his jailed former deputy, Anwar Ibrahim, can get a royal pardon and a seat in parliament, he will hand over pow-er to Anwar. Many Malaysians believe he will keep his word: after all, he cannot be going for re-election when

Mahathir will also be constrained by the opposition's organisational structure. His party, Pribumi Bersatu, has the third-smallest number of MPs of the four parties in Pakatan Harapan (PH) (Al-liance of Hope). He is not in a

position to bully. Finally, what will happen to Najib Razak? Will he go to jail for 1MDB and the missing billions? In the short term, the answer is "no". The new government will not immediately arrest Najib, or his wife. It will instead likely establish committee to look into the 1MDB affair and get a definitive answer as to where the

US\$5billion disappeared to.

If the investigation panel shows Najib is behind the scam, then, ves. Najib will probably end up in jail. But this is a long process. It is more likely that any prosecution against Najib will start outside Malaysia

Several governments, notably the US, are interested in sorting out the 1MBD issue. Thus far they could not complete their investigations because Najib used his position to stop Malaysian institutions from cooperating with the US Department of Jus-

tice probe into 1MDB.

There is a potential new angle to 1MDB, which is related to Australia. The bank account Najib used to launder 1MDB's money is actually partowned by ANZ Australia. Many believe some of the money from 1MDB passed through the Australian financial system.

Railways working on key project in Manipur amid threat of militant groups

NONEY (MANIPUR), MAY 11 (PTI): The Railways is working on a key project that would provide rail connectivity to the capital of land-locked Manipur despite the threat of several militant outfits operating in the area, of-

ficials said today.

As many as 14 cases of shootings, kidnapping and violence targeting supervisors and engineers working on the Ji-ribam-Tupul-Imphal rail project have been reported in the last 12 months. resulting in delays.

Jiribam-Tu-The pul-Imphal rail line is essential as it will connect the western-most boundary of Manipur, Jiribam, adjoining the Cachar district of Assam, to the state capital, Imphal, which as of now has no rail connectivity.

Delays in the project have also been caused by the difficult terrain.

"Presence of several militant outfits in Manipur is a major security concern to the site engineers in the form of frequent threat calls, attacks, firing and kidnapping for ran som. Engineers and supervisors get threat calls, messages, there is firing in

"Outsiders visiting the area are given armed escorts and advised to move in groups. Just two days ago, an engineer was abducted. It is a real challenge to ensure the safety and security of the work force as well as the assets," said A Saibaba, Chief Engineer Construction, the Northeast Frontier Railway (NFR), in-charge of the project.

He said that most of those who are kidnapped are staff of the private contractors and not rail-

way officials.

At the project site, around 1,500 security personnel from across security forces, including from Assam Rifles, Manipur Rifles, Indian Reserve Batallion, state police and the Railway Police Force, are present.

The project was sanctioned in 2008 and has 2020 to be operational.

dia and Nepal have stood together. We have been there for each other in the most difficult of times," said Modi, whose voice appeared hoarse apparently due to his hectic campaign in Karnataka assembly elections.

Modi assured Nepal that it is at the top

1,904 pigs die of 2 diseases in Mizoram since March

AIZAWL, MAY 11 (PTI): piglets have died in Mizoram since March due to outbreak of Por-cine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS) and Classical Swine Fever (CSF), a senior official today said.

Joint director of the

state Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Depart ment Dr Hmarkunga told PTI that the figure was based on data collected from officials of the department in all the eight districts of the state.

He said that at least 4,064 pigs were found infected with the two diseases in 91 villages spread across six dis-

Except for southern Mizoram's Lunglei dis-trict and Mamit district on the Mizoram-Tripu-ra-Bangladesh border, all the other districts have been affected by the outbreak, he added.

Around 8,000 pigs died of PRRS in the state in 2013 and 2016 and it was suspected to have been propagated by pigs and piglets imported and smuggled from Myan-mar where the dreaded disease was reported to have been prevalent.

Indian journalist held in custody in Australia on people smuggling charges

MELBOURNE, MAY 11 (PTI): An Indian journalist charged with an aggravated people smuggling offence by Australian authorities for facili-tating the travel of a "fake media contingent" to attend the Commonwealth Games will stay in custody for six more weeks, a

media report said today. Rakesh Kumar Sharma. 46. was detained ma, 46, was uctained along with eight others by Australian Border Force (ABF) officers at the Brisbane Airport in March because his companions' accreditations were not genuine.

The Commonwealth Games were held on the Gold Coast south of Brisbane from April 4-15.

The eight, aged between 20 and 37, were allegedly holding temporary activity visas and claiming to be accredited media representatives, Brisbane Times reported. Sharma is described

in court documentation as a journalist. Prosecu-tors claim his accreditation was genuine but he 'facilitated" the group's travel, the report said

Sharma, who is from Haryana, appeared in Brisbane Magistrates Court and charged with an aggravated people smuggling offence, which carries a minimum five-year sentence if convicted

The charge applies to anyone accused of smug-gling five or more people and carries a maximum

sentence of 20 years.

Sharma is also accused of causing "false or forged" documents to be presented on behalf of his eight fellow travellers in relation to a visa appli-cation, between December 2017 and March this

Legal Aid solicitor Axel Beard used Google Translate to communicate with the accused as he stood in the dock during the first brief

Sharma was remanded in custody in Brisbane Magistrates Court on Friday, with his matter adjourned to June 22 at the request of commonwealth prosecutors.

In another blow to his legal cause, he will no longer be represented by private law firm Legal Guru after failing to satisfy the terms of his retainer.

He will instead by

represented by Legal Aid. His case has been delayed as Australian Federal Police continue preparing their brief of evidence, with time being taken to examine a laptop and nine mobile phones. The ABF confirmed the other eight had been taken into immigration detention.

Local authorities had been tipped off by officials in Bangkok that the group might not be gen-uine, the ABF had said in a statement describing the group as a "fake media contingent". All nine people were found to be carrying 'false or forged' documents.

Australian Border Force Queensland re-gional commander Terry Price said any attempts to exploit the Commonwealth Games and Australia's visa program would not be tolerated.

"Anyone wishing to enter Australia, including athletes, team officials, spectators and the media, must hold a valid visa and accreditation and must be deemed to be a legitimate visitor," he said in a statement.

Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games Corporation chairman Peter Beattie had said there was no concern despite the security scare.

"There should be no issue in relation to security at these Commonwealth Games. None at all," he said.

Trump to seek complete irreversible denuclearisation of Korean Peninsula: White House

WASHINGTON, MAY 11 (PTI): President Donald Trump would seek a "complete, irreversible and verifiable" denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula during his summit with North Korean leader Kim Jongun in Singapore on June 12, the White House has said.

Hours after Trump announced the location and date of what is being billed as the historic US-N Korea summit, White House cautioned against any new provocative behaviour by Pyongyang. Such a move might force the US to halt the meeting, a presidential

spokesman said yesterday.
"Our policy is to ensure the complete, irreversible and verifiable denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula. And that's what he's going to be seeking," White House Deputy Press Secretary Raj Shah told reporters aboard the Air Force One

travelling to Indiana.

"We have a month and several days. And there are a number of things -- provoca-tive actions, for example, from North Korea would not be re-



ceived well. All I'll say is that the meeting has been agreed to, but obviously it could be halted for any number of rea-sons," Shah said with a note of caution to the North Koreans.

The main issue under dis-cussion at the Trump-Kim summit will be North Korea's nuclear weapons, which the US is demanding Pyongyang give up.

Shah added that Singapore was selected as the venue for the historic meeting because it had political ties with both the

ship with both the United



States and North Korea. They can ensure both the Presi-dent's and Kim Jong-un's security, as well as provide neutrality," he added.

"Singaporeans have been gracious up until now and also in the past. In fact, on a historical note, the first meeting between the leaders of China and Taiwan took place in Singapore some years back," Shah noted.

As of now, only one day has been kept for the meeting between Trump and Kim Jong un, he said, adding that planning was still in progress.

Shah told reporters that

accepted, the North Koreans had agreed to halt their ballistic missile testing, their nuclear testing, and not publicly oppose joint US-South Korean military exercises.

"So those were the initial steps that the North Koreans took. We'll hold them to those steps. And then, obviously, there have been subsequent conversations," he said.

On being asked if anything else was to happen between now and the summit, Shah replied, "I'm not setting additional pre-conditions. It's now been set."

Victoria Coates, Senior Director for International Negotiations at the National Security Council, the White House, told reporters that the meeting could be scuttled if Kim Jong un did something unacceptable to the US.

It is possible that leaders from South Korea and China could also be present in Singa-

pore at that time, she added.

"If he can end the standoff that has prevailed since the 1950-53 Korean War, he will have won a place in history that may offer redemption in posterity even if his presidency ends in ignominy," CNN commented.

A new CNN poll shows that after rattling the nation and the world last year by threatening to wipe North Korea off the map, his turn to diplomacy is winning increasing public approval.

Some 53 per cent of Americans approve of his handling of North Korea policy and 77 per cent back his decision to meet Kim at a summit in Singapore next month.

That means Trump's stewardship of the nuclear crisis is now far more popular than the President himself, the network

Israel and Iran have long fought each oth-er through proxies, and with the new exchange each seemed to be send-ing a warning that a direct clash between them could swiftly escalate.



US Geological Survey geophysicist Ingrid Johanson said movement of the molten rock opened space for lava to drain underground which reduced the height of a lava lake at the summit.

Putin, Merkel reaffirm commitment to Iran nuclear deal: Kremlin

Moscow, May 11 (AFP): Russian President Vladimir Putin and German Chancellor Angela Merkel in a telephone conversa-tion today reaffirmed their commitment to preserving the Iran nuclear deal after the US pulled out of it, the Kremlin said.

"The situation around the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action following the unilateral withdrawal of the US was discussed. The importance of pre-serving the deal from a point of view of international and regional stability was highlighted," the Kremlin said in a statement following the call.

The two leaders also discussed the situation in Syria as well as Merkel's planned work-ing visit to Russia next week, the Kremlin said.

US President Donald Trump this week defied the wishes of world powers when he announced that Washington would withdraw from the historic nuclear accord and impose new



nctions on Tehran.

Merkel has previously said Germany and its European part-ners would "do everything" to ensure Iran remains in the landmark 2015 nuclear deal, while Putin has voiced "deep concern" at the US decision.

The Russian president also

spoke with his Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan earlier today, with the pair saying Trump was "wrong" to pull out of the accord, according to a Turkish presidential

After long negotiations, Iran agreed in July 2015 to freeze its

nuclear programme in return for the lifting of punishing international sanctions

The deal had been negotiated between Iran and the five permanent members of the UN Security Council -- Britain, Chi na, France, Russia and the United States -- plus Germany.
