No DA for employees to travel on LTC: Central Govt

New Delhi, Sep 21 (PTI): Central govern-ment employees will not get a daily allowance on Leave Travel Concession (LTC), according to an official order

The LTC allows the grant of leave and ticket reimbursement to employees who are entitled under the rules to travel to their home towns and other places.

Employees were ear-lier entitled to an allowance which varied with

Any incidental expens es and the expenditure incurred on local journeys shall not be admissible under LTC, said the order issued by the Department of Personnel and Training

of Personnel and Training (DoPT) yesterday.
However, travel by premium or suvidha trains and services such as tatkal will now be allowed on LTC, it said.
"Further reimburge."

"Further, reimburse ment of tatkal charges or premium tatkal charges shall also be admissible for the purpose of LTC,"

SpiceJet pilots grounded after plane skids off Mumbai runway

New Delhi, Sep 21 (PTI): Aviation regulatory body DGCA has grounded two Spicelet pilots after a plane carrying 183 pas-sengers overshot a wet runway while landing at the Mumbai airport earli-

er this week.

With the Boeing 737 aircraft, flying from Vara-nasi to Mumbai, stuck in the mud, the main runway had to be closed for over 24 hours leading to nearly 180

hours leading to nearly 180 flights being cancelled.
"The pilots have been grounded pending an inquiry. One of the issues that if the aircraft is not stabilised, then you should do a go-around. The DGCA has also issued The DGCA has also issued a circular informing pilots that there will be no inquiry against them if they do a go-around. All those issues will have to be established," an official a official at the Directorate Concerl of the Directorate General of

Civil Aviation (DGCA) said.
The Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau will probe the incident.

A go-around refers to the procedure when a pi-lot aborts landing, flies the plane to a suitable height and prepares for another landing approach.

This is resorted to in situations like obstruc-tion on the runway, lack of clearance for landing, or when a pilot is unable to

establish a visual reference.

According to DGCA rules, since a go-around is a precautionary measure, it "does not call for any punitive action either by the Air Operator or the DGCA".

The DGCA also doesn't require such an incident to be reported.



Navratri celebrations begin in Mangan

For followers of Shakitism it marks the victory of Goddess Durga over the demon Mahisasura after the epic ten days battle.

Shutdown in Darj hills completes 99 days

Darjeeling (WB), Sep 21 (PTI): Several shops remained open in Darjeeling today even as the situation in the hills remained tensed as the indefinite shutdown called by the GIM for a separate state of

Gorkhaland entered its 99th day.
Although, no incidents of v olence were reported since last night, police and security person-nel have made special security arrangements in the hills and are maintaining a tight vigil to avoid any untoward incident.

The Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) and other hill parties took out rallies demanding that the Centre should immediately intervene and start the dialogue process considering the sentiments of the people of the hills.

Gorkhaland Movement Coordination Committee (GMCC) yesterday urged the Centre to initiate a dialogue with all the stake-holders so that normalcy is re-stored in the Darjeeling hills.

Several shops and markets in the hills remained open braving threats and intimidation by the GIM activists.

However, several shops which opened in Mirik and Kurseong day before yesterday remained closed fearing backlash from the GJM supporters.

For the 12th day in a row, po-

appealed to the locals over public address systems to open shops and restore normalcy in the hills

Peace rallies were taken out by the residents at Kurseong, Darjeeling and Mirik, while the GIM supporters took out rallies in support of a separate Gorkhaland and the ongoing shutdown in sections of Darjeeling, Sonada and Kalimpong, the police said.

Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee had urged the agitators in Darjeeling to withdraw their strike

and restore normalcy.

Internet services remain suspended in the hills since June 18.

Socially boycott those sexually abusing kids: Satyarthi

HYDERABAD, SEP 21 (PTI): People who sexually abuse children should be named and shamed besides being socially boycotted, Nobel Peace Prize winner Kailash Satyarthi said today.

The noted child rights activ-

ist said the law enacted to protect minors from sexual offences is not being properly enforced. "Finally, I would say that people who are responsible, may it be the

family members, may it be an outsider, who turn predators, have to be socially boycotted. They should be named and shamed," he said.

The girls who become victims should get respect as they are not responsible for the abuse against em, the 63-year- old activist said.
"The girls who are the victims

should get respect because they

are not responsible for that. Unfortunately, in our society, the girls are stigmatised and that should not happen," he said.

"Because, no girl, who is a vic-tim, loses her dignity or her honour. It is those people (perpetra-tors of such crimes) who lose their honour and they should be boycot-ted from society," he told PTI on the sidelines of an event.
Satyarthi, who was in Hyder

abad as part of his 'Bharat Yatra' against child sexual abuse and traf-ficking, said the "age old mindset" of victims and their families living in fear should change.

The 2014 Nobel Peace Prize

winner said he is involving faith leaders to promote awareness on the issue as they have a huge fol-

"The laws which are there have to be properly implemented. There is a strong law Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POC-SO). That is not being properly enforced," Satyarthi said.

"Last year, 15,000 cases were

registered (under the Act).

(There was) only 4 per cent conviction, 6 per cent acquittal and 90 per cent pendency. It will take 10 years to 40 years in different states to dispose of those cases. So, that has to be changed," he said.

The governments, media, edu-

cational institutions, industry and others need to come together to raise awareness on the social evils of child sexual abouting, Satyarthi said.

Sonia writes to Modi on Women's bill; Rahul tweets Congress support

NEW DELHI, SEP 21 (PTI): Congress president Sonia Gandhi has written to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, urging him to get the women's reservation bill passed in the Lok Sabha by taking advantage of the BJP's majority in

Gandhi assured him of her party's support to the legisla-tion, which she said would be a significant step forward in the empowerment of women. The Rajya Sabha had passed the bill on March 9, 2010.

"I am writing to request you to take advantage of your

majority in the Lok Sabha to now get the women's reserva-tion bill passed in the Lower House as well," Gandhi said in the letter dated September 20.
Party vice president Rahul

Gandhi later tweeted, "The Congress party has and will continue to support the Wom-en's Reservation Bill."

Speaking to reporters here, Congress women's wing chief Sushmita Dev ques-tioned the alleged delay by the government in ensuring the passage of the bill in the

Lok Sabha.

The ruling BJP should

show that its commitment towards the legislation is not mere "symbolism", she said.

She asked Modi to assure the country's women that the reservations would be implemented before 2019, when the next general elections will be held.
In her letter, Gandhi recalled

that the Congress and its late leader Rajiv Gandhi had first mooted the provision for quotas for women in panchayats and municipal bodies through Constitution amendment bills.

Gandhi said the bills were "thwarted" by the opposition in 1989, but were passed by both the Houses of Parliament in 1993

Dev, who read the letter out to reporters at the brief-ing, said, "The question we ask Modiji after three years of the BJP coming to power) is... why the delay?" The lawmaker said given

the work that will follow once a decision is taken to pass the bill in the Lok Sabha and the time that it will take, the government will have to get going with the business "right now".

To a question by a reporter on why the main opposition party did not take the matter up with the government after the BJP came into power, Dev said the issue was flagged on several occasions including during debates on the floor of the House.

She recalled that Vice President M Venkaiah Naidu, as the Parliamentary Affairs minister, had said the government had received several letters from public representatives and NGOs pressing for passing the bill.

Naidu, Dev said, had also

stated that the government was "discussing and seriously thinking" about the bill.

"Once a Parliamentary Affairs minister makes that statement on the floor of the Lok Sabha and if Sonia Gandhiji gives him time of six months or a year to imple-ment that, I will say it was her faith in the government's mo-tive. But this did not happen,' she said.

Another Congress leader, Shobha Oza, seconded Dev and said the party had collect-ed "lakhs of signatures" from across the country and those would be submitted to President Ram Nath Kovind while pressing for the demand.

Attack on Gangtok businessman was by SDF workers alleges SKM, demands arrests

Sikkim Krantikari Mor-cha has strongly con-demned the attack on a husinessman and the vandalizing of his shop in New Market on Wednesday evening

Alleging that this was the work of Sikkim Democratic Front workers the party has demanded that the administration immediately arrest those involved in the attack and take stringent action against them.

Speaking to media persons here today, SKM spokesperson, Jacob Khaling alleged that social media workers of the SDF party attacked a businessman, Raju Garg at his shop in New Market between 5 to 5:30 p.m last evening and vandal-ized the shop as well. He added that the SKM party workers present in the market during the attack saved the life of Mr Garg.

"The attack by around 35 party workers on a single businessman was an attempt to murder and total hooliganism of the ruling party to create unrest and an environment of fear and terror among businessmen," he alleged.

Mr Khaling informed

that Mr Garg has been admitted in STNM hospi-tal with serious injuries. He alleged that the

ruling party workers not only vandalized the shop but also took around Rs 15,000 cash and other items from the shop. He stated that although the incident took place in the heart of the town in broad daylight, no arrests have been made by

the police so far. Mr Khaling alleged that ruling party workers involved in the attack also getting admitted in STNM hospital is just eyewash.

Responding to media

queries, he mentioned that it has been learnt that the ruling party's workers carried out the attack after derogatory remarks on the Chief Minister posted from Raju

Garg's Facebook account. "It was known that the FB page of Mr Garg

was hacked and the post was made from Gurgaon which Mr Garg reported to Sadar Thana on Wednesday afternoon," he informed further adding that "...even if he did any mistake then the police have to take action, not the party. Even the post was shared by the ruling party's social media workers."

SKM member, Amar

Agarwal, alleged that the attack on a businessman by ruling party workers is a murder of democracy in the State. While strongly condemning the incident, he warned the ruling party not to terrorize the businessmen of Sikkim with such attacks.

Likewise, SKM busissmen cell chief convener, Sajan Agarwal mentioned that the attack was made since Mr Garg is an active SKM supporter and also sat on the recent relay hunger strike of the party demanding CBI investigation in Sikkim.

On the same, he questioned the prevalence of peace and security in the State. He stressed that SKM will pursue the matter until action is taken against the ruling party workers involved in the attack.

SKM working presi-dent, Navin Karki alleged that the attack was very

unfortunate and highly condemnable and mur-der of democracy. He added that the party will

not tolerate such action.
Raju Garg's son, Nitesh Garg said, "FB account of my father was hacked and we immediately reported of the misusing of my father FB account to the police but around 35 persons attacked my father without knowing the fact." He demanded for a strict action by the police.

The party threatened to gherao Sadar Thana and take other action if the ruling party workers involved in the incident would not be arrested immediately.

Addressing a press conference here today, SYA executive member, Tika Hang Subba, alleged that the present gov-ernment has given service extensions to all heads of departments of the State, which is totally unjustifiable and anti-people. He alleged that these high ranking officials were enjoying fat salaries and perks burdening the State exchequer.



Such unnecessary expenditure can instead be used to provide employment oppor tunities to local youth, he said further alleging that service extension of one person defers promotion of around seven

employees.

Now, PIB to verify newspaper circulation

NEW DELHI, SEP 21 (PTI): The Information and Broadcasting Ministry has entrusted the ss Information Bureau (PIB) with the task of verifving the circulation of newspapers, a responsi-bility which earlier with the Registrar of Newspapers of India (RNI), according to sources.

Recently, the ministry issued an order in this regard which also mentioned the names of the designated PIB officers alongside the publica-tions whose circulation they will have to verify, one of the sources said.

Newspapers need to nish circulation verification certificate get empanelled with the Directorate of Advertis-ing and Visual Publicity (DAVP), a nodal agency for allocation of central government advertisements.


This is the first time that PIB has been tasked with verifying circulation of newspapers, the source said, adding that there was a long list of pending applications from newspapers which had applied for verification of their circulation.

The source said the decision may have been taken considering short-age of manpower in RNI to timely process the applications.

The RNI, however, would continue to issue

registration certificate, the source said, adding RNI personnel would also handhold the PIB officers in conducting the verification.

Another source confirmed the development. saying the ministry's de-cision is an "administrative arrangement" after taking into "consideration all the pros and cons".

applicable from July 1,

2017, it said. "Flexi fare (dynam fare) applicable in Raj-dhani/ Shatabdi/Duronto trains shall be admissible for the journey(s) per-formed by these trains on LTC. This dynamic fare component shall not be admissible in cases where a non-entitled government servant travels by air and claims reimbursement for the entitled class of Rajdhani/Shatabdi/Duronto trains," it clarified. the purpose of LTC shall be admissible for jour-neys performed in vehi-cles operated by the government or any corpora-tion in the public sector run by the central or state government or a local body, the DoPT order said.

In case of a journey be een places not connect ed by any public means of transport, the government employee will be allowed reimbursement for journev on transfer for a maximum limit of 100km covered by the private/per sonal transport based on self-certification, it said.

"Beyond this, the ex-penditure shall be borne by the government servant." the order said.

The move follows the implementation of recommendations of the seventh Central pay commission relating to Travelling Allowance (TA) entitlements of central govern-

package under one roof.

A press release received from Sikkim Manipal University informs that this is an initiative of CRH, Tadong to join the efforts of the state government towards a drug and alcohol addiction free Sikkim.

The Residential Pro-

gramme Center offers a short-term two weeks programme with scientific state-of-the-art services, private and confidential treatment and other exclusive facilities. The programme also in-

cludes residential stay, food and refreshments, individual counseling, group therapy, family counseling and post discharge follow-up for 6 months. The 15-day programme includes residential stay, food and refreshments.
The Centre is under

the Department of Psychiatry, CRH with consul-tants from various concerned medical departments of the hospital. The detox, rehab and recovery programme at the Centre follows the suc-cessful Minnesota Model of Addiction Treatment for the first time in the State of Sikkim.

The Minnesota Model, also known as the abstinence model, of addiction treatment was created in a state mental hospital in the 1950s by two young men. A destination still awaiting professional packaging

Sikkim's tourism graph has been on a consistent upward swing over the past two decades. Those in the sector will recall times when tourist arrivals used to be in the mere hundreds and of how it grew to thousands, broke the one lakh mark (this in the past two decades) and now, when, despite lean seasons, the state hosts more tourists than it has people. There was the hiccup of the 2011 Earthquake which spoiled about a season and a half and now there is the Darjeeling situation and the disrupted rail network which has thus far upset about half a season. On the average though, Sikkim has grown substantially from a destination that people stumbled upon when left with free days on an itinerary for Darjeeling to now becoming a stand-alone destination with its own clientele and with a whole array of tourist spots, most with their own niche visitors.

This has been a praiseworthy transition and those in the travel trade should pat themselves on the back. What one cannot lose sight of here is that there were many outside factors which led to Sikkim's growth as a tourist destination. The turmoil in the neighbouring Darjeeling hills and Sikkim's presence as a ready alternative, the closing down of Jammu & Kashmir for tourist traffic, the congestion on other tourist destina-tions like Nepal and Himachal Pradesh and the ever inquisitive zeal of inveterate travellers to seek out new destinations; all these are the real factors which contributed to the tourism boom in Sikkim. As far as pro-fessional packaging goes though, Sikkim still has more to learn and implement. And that is a good thing really because adding that to the mix will take the sector to the next level. In this age of information and marketing, for instance, Sikkim has still not worked out that one element of the Sikkim experience that it wants to promote and sell over everything else. No event/ destination/ experience is yet synonymous with Sikkim when every tourist destination has at least one special week in the year when tourists know they are assured of a special treat. And it is not as if Sikkim does not have enough events happening which would excite tourists. But it has wasted most of the events with unprofessional planning and bureaucratic organization, so much so that most 'tourist festivals' are not even organized anymore. The traditional events and occasions have also lacked coherent projections and still await professional packaging. Tourist festivals, even when they are held, are hastily put together and inadequately promoted. These are not events that are targeted to attract only locals. But if it is tourists that the organizers seek, then the events should be worked out much more in advance and publicised more widely giving prospective visitors enough time to plan their vacations. Even when flawlessly planned, tourist festivals take several years to become mega-events as word of mouth and mass media publicity catches on.

And it is not even as if tourist festivals are necessary. Sikkim, with its Khangchendzonga, Buddhist heritage, new pilgrimage destinations like the Char Dham. border trade haat, lakes and trekking routes is already cast in the perfect foil for a tourist destination of much bigger potential than what it receives at present

German elections could bring a new wave of extremism

N ot with a bang, but a whimper. T.S. Eliot's famous line could apply to the end of most German election campaigns. There are campaign posters and some rallies and one or two rhetorical flourishes which reflect a disquieting undercurrent of xenophobia, but on the whole these elections are

The action heats up once campaigning stops. Since German elections rarely produce a majority government, the end of the campaign marks the start of negotiations between the largest faction in the Bundestag (federal parliament) and other parties willing to join a coalition government. Newcomer party, Alternative for Germany, (AfD), running on an anti-immigration platform, could be come the major opposition party - and an obstacle to Angela Merkel's CDU.

The jockeving will begin the same evening the elec-tion results are announced. In a peculiar German tradi-tion, leaders of all major parties will appear together on TV to discuss the outcome.

This Elefantenrunde (elephants' roundtable) is something to behold, and impossible to imagine in North America. The leaders usually just rehash the campaign, but sometimes it's a ittle more exciting.

To grasp the significance of the right-wing AfD party's potential influence, one must first understand the context

NEGOTIATIONS BEGIN AFTER THE ELECTIONS

In 2005, then-chancellor Gerhard Schröder of the Social Democrats (SPD) was bested by Christian Democratic Union (CDU) leader Angela Merkel. Her margin of victory was minute, but still a victory. Even so the Elefantenrunde was treated to the sight of Schröder futilely claiming that he had, in fact, won the election.

This year's elephants' roundtable won't be that sensational, but the negotiations afterwards will be more important for Germany's future than the election campaign that preceded them.

All polls predict Chancellor Merkel's parties

(the CDU and its Bavarian sister party, the Christian Social Union - CSU) will win the most seats, though not enough for a majority. Merkel will have to find a

coalition partner, or partners.

From 2006 to 2009, and again since 2013,
Merkel has governed in a "Grand Coalition" with the SPD, the country's second-largest party. Ironically, while the CDU/CSU have based their entire campaign on the steadiness of Merkel and her government, the SPD have had to criticize a gov ernment they've helped run. That tends to take the wind out of one's rhetorical sails. The SDP party was buoyed by the early positive response to the naming of former European Parliament president Martin Schulz as their candidate for chancellor, but

the joy was short-lived.

The impact of globalization and the labour market reforms of Schröder's government have weak-

ened the SPD's grip on the worker vote. To halt the decline, members of Germany's oldest political party argue that the SPD must return to the opposition, otherwise it will continue to be boxed in by Merkel's unerring political tactics.

If a coalition with the SPD proves impossible,

Merkel can look to two other parties: the Free Democrats (FDP), a right-of-centre party; and the Greens, the environment party that governed with the SPD under Schröder.

GREEN PARTY'S PLATFORM NOW A UNIVERSAL ONE

In one way, the Greens have been very successful. Climate change is accepted as fact in Germany. After the Fukushima catastrophe of 2011, Merkel reversed course and began phasing out nuclear pow-er. The "green consciousness" is now widely shared by Germans, making it difficult for the party to deelop a platform that is uniquely theirs.

Merkel could partner with the FDP. In the last

election they failed to obtain the 5 per cent of the vote required to enter parliament. For years the party was criticized as having no other platform

than to be the junior coalition partner for either the CDU/CSU or the SPD. That and poor leadership

This time round they will return to the Bund-estag. Their improved standing is almost entirely thanks to leader Christian Lindner's charisma. An

untraditional marketing campaign featured Lindner in a photo that would be at home in a fashion mag-

azine. The tagline "impatience is also a virtue" was

tantalizing. But what did it mean in political terms?
Unfortunately for Merkel, neither the Greens nor

the FDP is polling spectacularly well, so their parliamentary factions might be too small to help her form a government. She could try to work with both

of them, but Lindner has said that he can't imagine participating in a government with the Greens and their more relaxed policy on immigration.

EXTREME POLITICS POSE CHAL-

LENGES TO GERMANY

solid core of support in the former East Germany, where it channels eastern disgruntlement with the loss of socialism.

But the Left Party's attacks on capitalism have become a lot more respectable, or a lot less no-ticed, since a new kid arrived on the block: the Alternative for Germany (AfD). Originally focused on euroskepticism, the party has seen success by embracing German fears about immigration.

The AfD has no chance of winning, but has gained outsized media attention with little provocations. It currently trails only Merkel's CDU/CSU and Schulz's SPD in voter surveys. Its leaders have made racist and anti-Semitic statements. Like other populist movements, it has challenged the usual campaign norms, making other campaigns look stale by comparison.

One AfD campaign poster shows a pregnant woman with the caption "New Germans?" We'll make them ourselves." Another, picturing women

from behind wearing skimpy bathing suits, reads: "Bur-qas?" We're more into biki-nis." For the anti-Islamist AfD, women are merely baby machines and sex objects.

The AfD's xenophobic nationalism has struck a chord, and this hasn't gone unnoticed by Merkel. She has tried to block further gains by the AfD by hardening her party's stance on immigration. She called for a burqa ban, and has continued to resist calls that asy-lum seekers be permitted to have their immediate family

members join them in Germany.

Whatever its make-up, the new government will face multiple challenges. Germany's automobile industry is in the doghouse over its reluctance to part with eco-unfriendly diesel motors. The country's relationship with Turkey is on the brink of collapse. The impact of Brexit on the European Union is still uncertain.

But two issues will predominate. The first is German identity. The presence of the AfD in the Bundestag will challenge Germany's sense of itself. If Schulz's SPD rejoins the government, the AfD could well be the largest opposition party. It will not forego any chance to hammer home its displeasure at the changing make-up of German society.

The other issue is Merkel herself. No other politician in Germany today has her knack for straddling the political centre and neutralizing the opposition. Only Merkel could have convinced Germans to welcome upwards of one million asylum seekers, and then still be praised for that openness while

supporting a burqa ban.

But many think this will be her last election. Her eventual exit from the political scene will create a vacuum in her party and the country as a whole. Will extremism fill the void if the strength of

Merkel's centrism can't be duplicated? Yes, the 2017 campaign was bland. Nothing new there. But the resulting political atmosphere will be

Although widespread evacuations prevented a higher death toll, the impact on the region's most vulnerable people will be extensive and lasting.

Government sources report that more than 193,000 properties have been damaged, including 11,000 that were flooded. The storm also caused widespread damage to farmland, roads, and water and electricity infrastructure. Quang Binh and Ha Tinh provinces bore the brunt of the damage

Central Vietnam is often in the path of tropical storms and depressions that form in the East Sea, which can intensify to form tropical cyclones known as typhoons (the Pacific equivalent of an Atlantic hurricane).

Typhoon Doksuri developed and tracked exactly as forecast, meaning that

the plight of its poorest people

evacuations were relatively effective in saving lives. What's more, the storm moved quickly over the affected area, de-livering only 200-300 mm of rainfall and sparing the region the severe flooding now being experienced in Thailand. Doksuri is just one of a spate of severe

tropical cyclones that have formed in recent weeks, in both the Pacific and Atlantic regions. Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and, most recently. Maria have attracted global media coverage, much of it focused on rarely considered angles such as urban planning, poverty, poor development, politics, the media coverage of disasters – as well as the perennial question of climate change.

Vietnam's typhoon disaster highlights

In Vietnam, the root causes of disasters exist below the surface. The focus remains on

the natural hazards that trigger disasters, rather than on the vulnerable conditions in which many people are forced to live.

Unfortunately, the limited national disaster data in Vietnam does not allow an extensive analysis of risk. Our research in central Vietnam is working towards filling this gap and the development of more comprehensive flood mitigation measures.

Central Vietnam has a long and exposed coastline. It consists of 14 coastal provinces and five provinces in the Central Highlands. The Truong Son mountain range rises to the west and the plains that

stretch to the coast are fragmented and narrow. River systems are dense, short and steep, with rap-

These physical characteristics often combine with widespread human vulnerability, to deadly effect. We can see this in the impact of Typhoon Doksuri, but also to a lesser extent in the region's annual floods.

growth, industrial development and agricultural ex-pansion have all increased flood risk, especially in cially marginalised people often have to live in the most flood-prone places, son as a result of forced displacement.

Floods and storms therefore have a disproportionately large effect on poorer communities. Most people in central Vietnam depend on their natural environment for their livelihood, and a disaster like Doksuri can bring lasting suffering to a region where 30-50% of people are already

in poverty.

When disaster does strike, marginalised groups face even more difficulty be-cause they typically lack access to public resources such as emergency relief and insurance.

The rural poor will be particularly vul-nerable after this storm. Affected households have received limited financial support from the local government, and many will depend entirely on charity for their recovery.

BETTER RESEARCH, LESS

BUREAUCRACY
This is not to say that Vietnam's government did not mount a significant effect to prepare and respond to Typhoon Doksuri. But typically for Vietnam, where only the highest levels of government are trusted with important decisions, the response was bureaucratic and centralised.

This approach can overlook the input of qualified experts, and lead to decisions being taken without enough data about disaster risk.

Our research has generated a more detailed picture of disaster risk (focused

on flood hazard) in the region. We have looked beyond historical loss statistics and collected data on hazards, exposure and vulnerability in Quang Nam province.

Our findings show that much more accurate, sensitive and targeted flood protection is possible. The challenge is to provide it on a much wider scale, particularly

or regions of the world. REDUCE RISK, AND AVOID CREATING NEW RISK

An effective risk management approach can help to reduce the impacts of flooding in central Vietnam, Before a disaster ever materialises, we can work to reduce risk -and avoid activities that exacerbate it - for example land grabbing for development, displacing the poor, environmental degradation, discrimination against minorities.

It is critical that subject experts, par-ticularly scientists, are involved in deci-sions about disaster risk - in Vietnam and around the world. There must be a shift to more proactive approaches, guided by deep knowledge both of the local context and of the latest scientific advances

Our maps will help planners and politicians to recognise high-risk areas, prepare flood risk plans, and set priorities for both flood defences and responses to vulnerability. The maps are also valuable tools for

communication.

But at the same time as emphasising data-driven decisions, we also need to advocate for a humanising approach in dealing with some of the most oppressed, marginalised, poor and disadvantaged members of the global community. [Chinh Luu is PhD candidate in Di-

nior police officer had said. Later, the scribe was found with serious stab injuries and rushed to

Agartala Medical College and Hospital where doctors declared him 'brought dead', he said.

"We demand an impartial and swift probe into the murder of the so that culprits can be booked and brought to justice. We also express our solidarity and support to the Tripura Jour-nalists' Union in their protest against the murder," the statement said.

Mizoram Govt holds peace talks with HPC(D)

Bengal gets \$300 mn ADB loan to carry forward fiscal reforms

NEW DELHI, SEP 21 (PTI): Multilateral funding agency ADB on Thursday said it has sanctioned a USD 300 million loan facility for carrying forward fiscal reforms in West Bengal.

The board of Asian Development Bank (ADB) approved a loan of USD 300 million to continue a comprehensive series of fiscal reforms in West Bengal to bring about more accessible, affordable, and high quality public services, ADB said in a release. West Bengal, for the first time

in 2012 had received a USD 400 million from ADB -- its first policy based lending -- with an aim to create a fiscal space necessary to sustain higher public investment in the eastern India.

"We entered into a successful partnership through a first pro-gramme in 2012 with the West

Bengal government to bring about fiscal reforms that could put the state s finances on a balanced and sustainable path," said Navendu Karan, an ADB Senior Public Management Economist.

Karan said ADB recognised that a full effect of reforms would require at least 5 year to materialise alongside a follow on programme to carry these forward. In West Bengal, public invest-

ment as a percentage of gross state domestic product reached almost 1.3 per cent in 2015-16 from 0.5 per cent in 2011-12.

While, fiscal deficit reduced to 2.2 per cent from 3.4 per cent in

the same period, ADB stated.
Under new loan programme to be carried out over two years, linking medium term expenditure plans to actual budgets supported by strengthening internal audit system and enhancements in the integrated financial management system (IFMS) are part of the reform process.

Other activities under the programme include improved tax monitoring and continued support for information technology sys-tems in strengthening tax and land administration, ADB said.

The capital outlay as a percentage of gross state domestic product is expected to rise to 2.2 per cent by 2021- 22 under the second programme, with improved budget allocations geared toward development expenditure, it said.

"Accompanying the loan is technical assistance grant of USD 500,000 to strengthen key institutions responsible for carrying out fiscal management reforms in the Indian state," ADB said further.

Bhartrihari's iconic Sanskrit verses now in English

NEW DELHI, SEP 21 (PTI): Over 300 iconic verses of Bhartrihari, one of the greatest Sanskrit poets of all time, in which he expounds on the most enduring concerns and dilemmas like living, loving and leaving have now been translated into English.

The book "Three Hundred Verses: Musings On Life, Love and Renu tion", having the verses translated by A N D Haksar, captures the verve, acuity and erotic charge of Bhartrihari's most significant works, the publishers Penguin Books said

Although composed centuries ago, the full force of Bhartrihari's genius is apparently evident in these poems, bursting with lush imagery and brim-

ming with deep philosophical musings.

Covering a wide range of themes from the first stirrings of young love to the challenges of accepting life's trannate with contemporary readers.

Bhartrihari's poetry is frequently toted in ancient anthologies and lauded in old commentaries. Although very little is known about his life and origins scholarly consensus places him roughly around 450-500 CE.

The "Shataka Trayam" or "Trishati" of Bhartrihari is among the best kno and most quoted works of Sanskrit lit-

The translation aims to preserve the verses of "Shataka Trayam" in contemporary language for modern-day read-ers, says Haksar.

"The verses are replete with succinct thoughts and sharp images. Their tone ranges from cynical to wishful. From erotic to didactic, from pensive to completely detached. Their language is simple and clear," he says, adding he has attempted to reflect all the qualities in free-verse form

Report flags debt bondage, child labour in brick kiln industry

New Delhi, Sep 21 (PTI): Millions of workers are employed in brick kilns in India, only to be found in endemic levels of debt bondage and the worst forms of child labour, according to a

new report by an anti-slavery group.

The study by the London-based Anti-Slavery International noted that women were "invisible workers" in the kilns and were deprived of all employment benefits.

Workers are hired as a family unit, and wages are exclusively paid to the male head of the household unit," the study said. The report focuses on brick kiln mould-

ers, who form the majority of the workforce at brick kilns in Punjab which was the focal point of the research.

Another finding was that one-third of the total workforce in brick kilns were children, of whom a staggering 65 to 80 per cent were be-

tween the ages of five and 14 years.

"Children reported working an average of nine hours a day in the summer months and seven hours a day in the winter months, regardless of whether they worked as a 'main worker' or 'support worker'," the study said.

These children are deprived of education and other "early childhood service".

Those between the ages of 14 and 18 years

were found to be working "on average 12 hours a day in summer months and 10 hours a day during the winter months".

"Seventy-seven per cent of this age group

reported working as a main worker and 23 per cent as a support worker."

Anti-Slavery International said this was in violation of international laws, under which children under 18 should not be working in slavery or practices similar to slavery, includ-

ing debt bondage, or in work

that is likely to harm health.

The bonded nature of labour, according to the report, is a manifestation of workers -- 96 per cent -- taking an advance or loan before starting work in the kilns.

"The provision of an advance/loan is a key part of the bonded labour system, and is used in the kilns, along with

withholding of wages and other measures to control workers," the study noted.

It also brought to light practices such as

payment of workers according to a piece rate, withholding of wages and payment below minimum wage, resulting in constant poverty and marginalisation, which in turn leads to ex-



The findings of the report are based on two primary data sources -- a 2016 research that interviewed brick kiln workers from Chhattisgarh, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh, and a baseline study conducted in 2015-16 in Punjab, where over 3,000 workers were interviewed and 208 brick kilns were surveyed.



All parties agree to accept Lanka unitary state: PM Ranil COLOMBO, SEP 21 (РТІ): All political groups in Sri Lanka, including the main Tamil party, have agreed to accept the untry as an indivisible state in the new Consti-tution, Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe

Wickremesinghe's remarks came as he pre-sented a report of the all party steering committee on formulating the Con-stitution in Parliament. The new Constitution was a key promise of Sri Lankan President Mai-thripala Sirisena during the 2015 elections and is primarily meant to address the grievances of minorities.

The report will be debated both within and outside Parliament before the final bill is passed through a two-third majority followed by referendum.

"The Tamil National Alliance (TNA) has taken the unprecedented position that they would agree to the content of this interim report provided the two main po-litical parties accept it," Wickremesinghe said.

The interim report has replaced the word 'unitary' with 'unified' but has refrained from proposing a federal status for country which Tamil political groups have been demanding. The TNA has been press-ing for a federal solution to address political as-pirations of the Tamil community, claiming dis-crimination by the majority Sinhalese

The federal solution is being viewed as the moderate stance as opposed to the LTTE s separatist campaign of over three decades to create a separate Tamil state in north and east.

Wickremesinghe said the interim report was the result of the formulation of the Constitutional Assembly with the par-ticipation of all political parties in March 2016. "This is only a draft,

not a legally binding doc-

The final draft (constitution) would be done only after subjecting this report for public debate," Wickremesinghe said.
The TNA's R Sam-

panthan, who is also the main opposition leader, said this opportunity should not be missed and all parties must come together to bring in a new Constitution.

The proposal to end executive Presidency has not been agreed upon by major parties and Prime minister hoped that they will soon arrive at a consensus. The Marxist JVP, stressed the need to abolish the presidency while the Joint Opposi-tion backing the former President Mahinda Rajapaksa said the report would dilute the island s unitary character and reduce the foremost place accorded Buddhism in previous constitutions

50 nations ink UN nuclear ban treaty opposed by big powers

Fifty countries have signed a treaty to ban nuclear weapons, a pact that the world's nuclear powers spurned but support-ers hailed as a historic agreement nonetheless.

"You are the states that are showing moral leadership in a world that desperately needs such moral leadership today," Beatrice Fihn, executive director of the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, said as a signing ceremony began.

Before the day was out, 50 states as different as Indone-sia and Ireland had put their names to the treaty; others can sign later if they like.
Guyana, Thailand and the

Vatican also have already rat-ified the treaty, which needs 50 ratifications to take effect among the nations that back

Under its terms, non-nuclear nations agreed not to pursue nukes in exchange for a commitment by the fi original nuclear powers -- the US, Russia, Britain, France and China -- to move toward nuclear disarmament and to guarantee other states' access to peaceful nuclear technolo gy for producing energy.

More than 120 countries approved the new nuclear weapons ban treaty in July over opposition from nuclear-armed countries and their allies, who boycotted negotiations. US, Britain and France said the prohibition wouldn't work and would end up disarming their nations while emboldening "bad actors," in US Ambassador Nikki Haley's words.

French Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian has called the treaty "wishful thinking" that is "close to irresponsible."

The nuclear powers have suggested instead strengthening the nonproliferation treaty, which they say has made significant dent in atomic arsenals. Brazil was the first country to sign onto the ban vesterday, followed by nations from Algeria to Venezuela.

"Those who still hold nu-

clear arsenals, we call upon them to join this date with history," Costa Rican President Luis Guillermo Solis said as he



Hassan Rouhani has used his speech at the United Nations General Assembly to slam the United States and present Iran as a moderate and measured international player. Speaking on Wednesday morning in New York, the Iranian President said his regime strives "to build peace and promote the human rights of people and nations". He responded to Donald Trump's Tuesday address, which fiercely criticised Iran, calling it "ignorant, absurd and hateful rhetoric" that was "unfit to be heard at the United Nations". Mr Rouhani also defended the 2015 nuclear deal made between Western states and his country, warning that if the United States abandoned the agreement they would lose the international community's trust.

Japan PM says time for North Korea dialogue is over la, Japan," Lofven told reporters.

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 20 (AFP): Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe today declared the time for dialogue with North Korea is over and rallied behind a US warning that "all options" are on the table

Addressing the UN General Assembly, Abe said "there is not much time left" to take action on North Korea which in recent weeks has detonated another nuclear bomb and fired a series

of missiles over or near Japan.
A day after US President
Donald Trump threatened to
"totally destroy" North Korea if
it attacks, Abe said: "We consistently support the stance of the United States: that 'all options are on the table."

Abe said that the world has already tried exhaustively to reach a negotiated settlement with North Korea, starting with the US- backed 1994 Agreed Framework

which collapsed a decade later.

"Again and again, attempts to resolve issues through dialogue have all come to naught. In what hope of success are we now repeating the very same failure a third time?" he said. "What is needed to do that is

not dialogue, but pressure," he said. He voiced alarm at North Korea's military progress, which he said had brought the regime to the threshold of mastering hydrogen bombs and intercontinental ballistic missiles, which would be able to strike the United States.

Abe demanded the strict imelementation of UN sanctions on Kim Jong-Un's regime, the latest round of which includes a ban on the country's textile exports and a freeze on work permits to North Korean guest workers. But years of sanctions have had limited effects on North Korea, which follows a "juche" ideology of self-reliance and counts on neighboring China as its economic lifeline.

China -- which has grown frustrated by Kim's actions but also fears the consequences of his regime's collapse -- has re-peatedly urged dialogue, with Foreign Minister Wang Yi yes-terday urging an end to the "current deepening vicious cycle."

Swedish Prime Minister Stefan Lofven, responding to Trump's bellicose speech, called for dialogue in tandem with implementation of sanctions.


"There is no military solution because that would be a disaster, not only for North Korea but for South Korea, the whole peninsu-

But Abe warned that global credibility was on the line, saying that only North Korea has been "allowed such self- indul-gence" in its defiance of the Security Council.

North Korea is attempting to dismiss with a smirk the efforts towards disarmament we have assiduously undertaken over the years," Abe said.

Abe, Japan's longest-serving post-World War II prime minister, rose to political prominence on his calls for a tough line on North Korea over its past abductions of Japanese civilians. He has also pressed for a shed-ding of defense taboos in Japan, whose US-imposed constitution forbids the country from ever again waging war.

Nepal to re-measure Mt Everest height

For the first time, Nepal will re-measure the height of the Mt Everest on its own, amid reports that the height of the world's highest peak has changed after the deadly 2015 earthquake in the Himalayan nation.

The height of the peak was last determined at 8,848 metres in 1955, by

an Indian survey.

"The Department of Survey, government of Nepal will re- measure the height of Mt Everest very soon," said Depu-ty Director General of the Department Neeraj Manandhar, who is directly involved in the task of conducting the survey.

"There are reports that changes are noticed in the height of the Everest due to the recent earthquakes. We are conducting the survey of the Everest on our own," he said.

The department is currently working on preparing infrastructure such as acquiring equipment for the survey, he told PTI

After the necessary infrastructure becomes ready the survey work will begin within the current fiscal year, he informed.

Various internation-

al experts have claimed that the height of the Everest has changed over

the time. The US and Chi nese teams have given different heights of the Everest, sparking controversy. This has necessi-tated the task of re- measuring the height so as to ascertain the correct height, Manandhar said.

In 2005, Chinese team concluded that the height of the Everest is 8.844 metres on the basis of the rock without taking into account the snow covering the mountain peak. However, Nepal government has taken the snow as the basis for measuring the height.

Another important reason for re-measuring the height is that we wanted to know if the devastating earthquake of April 2015 made any significant change in the

height, he pointed out.
"The Department of Survey possesses all the technical know-how for measuring the height of the mountain and we will bear the cost on our own," he said.

The department has estimated two years' time period for completing the survey and a budget of 250 million Nep-alese rupees has been allocated for the purpose.

"Nepal has not mea-sured the height of the Everest on its own and this time we are doing so," he added. The base of measuring the height will be Indian mean sea level,

S&P cuts China's debt rating over 'financial risks Debt-fuelled invest-

BEIJING, SEP 21 (AFP): Standard & Poor's slashed China's credit rating today, warning that a pro-longed period of debt growth had raised "economic and financial risks".

S&P, which downaded China's debt from AA-minus to A- plus, is the second major credit ratings agency to slash the Asian giant's rating after Moody's made the same decision in May. "The downgrade reflects our as sessment that a prolonged period of strong credit growth has increased Chi-na's economic and finan-cial risks," New York-based S&P said in a statement

While the credit growth has fuelled China's economic expansion and high asset prices, "we be-lieve it has also diminished financial stability to some extent", the agency said.


