## Organic farming is Sikkim's message to world: CM

Chief Minister Pawan

The CM further informed about the implementation of the scheme of 'Mission Organic Value Chain Development for North Eastern Region' in Sikkim by the state government which aims at the development of cer-tified organic production in a value chain mode, to link growers with con-sumers and support the development of the en-

tire value chain starting from inputs, seeds and certification, to the creation of facilities for collection, aggregation, pro-cessing, marketing and brand building.
Adding that environment protection and

conservation has been a high priority from the beginning of his tenure in 1994, the CM detailed about various 'Green' initiatives undertaken by the state government like the inclusion of the 'Smritivan' concept, declaring the years 2000-2010 as the Green Revo-lution Decade in Sikkim, observing '10 Minutes to Earth', constituting the State Pollution Control Board in 2008 to make Sikkim a pollution free State and enforcement of Sikkim Eco-Tourism Policy in 2012 among others.

In his concluding remarks, the CM said, "The primary qualifying fac-tor for all development it does not harm the en vironment. That should be the top most qualifier for any development ini-tiative. We must protect our forests and take up extensive afforestation measures globally. Annual budgetary allocation should be set aside in every Ministry for all development schemes to undertake measures for the protection of the environment and ecology. Use of chemical agents for ag-riculture must be stopped and we must adopt the organic way of doing agri-culture globally.

Agriculture is an activity that defines the health of a society and it is because of this that we must adopt organic agriculture. For there is no other way but organic agriculture for a healthy, happy and peaceful so-ciety. This is our message from Sikkim to the



## State government asks for 'immediate and unqualified' apology from Priyanka Chopra

14 (IPR): A press conference was held at the Confer-ence Hall of Soochna Bhawan today which had the presence of Tourism and Civil Aviation Department Secretary, Chewang Zangpo along with Cultural Affairs and Heritage Department Secretary, Yasoda Bhandari and Informa-tion and Public Relations Department Special Secretary, Namrata Thapa.

The Secretary also stated that although she has apologized via a written mail to the Tourism Minister, the apology letter is also 'very vague' and a clearer public apology needs to be made by the actress.

Cultural Affairs De-

partment Secretary said that the statements made by the actress are 'highly condemnable' and Sikkim is a peace loving, god fearing and the safest State.

"The image of the State has been tarnished and the actress owes an apology not only to the State Government but also to the people of Sik-kim," she added.

IPR Special Secretary reiterated the fact and said maybe she has not realized the extent of damage caused by her words but it has vastly damaged the image of the State. She also said that Priyanka Chopra should take back her statement and issue a fresh statement through appropriate media as her words have done irreparable damage to the image of the State.

Ms Thapa also said that it is her duty to clear all the doubts created by her statements to the world community and she should clearly spell out the support extended by the state government during the making of the film.

## CBSE asks schools to conduct psychometric evaluation of staff

ing the onus on schools for safety of students on their premises, the CBSE today issued new securi-ty-related guidelines that included a psychometric test for teaching and non-teaching staff.

The board has asked schools to complete the evaluation process within two months and implement

the other guidelines, failing which they would face derecognition. The board's directive comes amid increased concerns about safety of students in school premises following the killing of a seven-year-old student in a Gurgaon school and the rape of a five-year-old girl by a school peon in Delhi.

Such verification and evaluation for non-teaching staff such as bus drivers, conductors, peon, and other support staff may be done very carefully and in a detailed manner. This may be complied and

within two months of receipt of this circular," the CBSE directive states. Safety audits, installation of

CCTV cameras, police verification, constitution of parent-teacher-stu-dents committees to address safety needs of the students and taking regular feedback from parents are among the other measures prescribed by the board.

"The onus for safety and security of children in school campus shall solely lie upon the school authorities. It is a fundamental right of a child to engage and study in an environment where he/she feels safe and is free from any form of physical or emotional abuse or harassment," the directive further says.

It also says that access to the school building by outsiders should be controlled and visitors

responsibilities to protect children from any form of abuse.

"Any violation/lapses with re-

gard to safety and well being of children in school campus would invite appropriate action includ-ing the disaffiliation of the school as per the provisions under affilia-tion by-laws of the board," it adds.

Schools have also been asked to constitute separate committees for redressal of grievances of the public, staff, parents and students. an Internal Complaints committee to deal with sexual harassment, and committees under the POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offence) Act, 2012.



### Rajasthan police give clean chit to six accused in Pehlu Khan lynching case

JAIPUR, SEPT 14 (PTI): The Rajasthan police has given a clean chit to six persons named by 55-year-old Pehlu Khan, who died after being lynched by a mob of cow vigilantes in Alwar dis-trict earlier this year.

Nine other accused in the case, however, continue to face criminal charges officials said

According to the police, the six had been absolved in the case on the oasis of evidence. The victim's son, however, termed it a "betrayal" and assert-ed that the family would seek another probe.

"Six persons have been given a clean chit in the investigation into the Pehlu Khan case. Nine others, however, will face criminal charges," ADG (CID-CB), Pankaj Kumar Singh said.

The clean chit was given on the basis of statements of those present at the scene of the crime, photographs and mobile phone location records, he said. Those absolved were Hukum Chand, Om Prakash, Sudhir Yaday, Rahul Saini, Navin Sharma and Jag-mal Yadav, Singh told PTI.

The 'Pehlu Khan lynching case', which triggered a massive furore, was handed over to the crime investigabranch (CID-CB) in July. The CB-CID had on September 1, handed over its report to the Alwar police, officials said.

Expressing shock at the development, Khan's son Irshad, who was with him at the time of the assault, said that the family would fight till the last

breath to get justice.
"This is betrayal. We heard the names (of the accused) when they attacked. How can they be given clean chit? We will seek an inquiry again,"

Of the nine persons, who continue to face charges in connection with Khan's murder, the police, so far, has arrested seven. Five of these later got bail, officials said.

Khan and others were allegedly attacked by cow vigilantes in Alwar on April 1 while they were on their way to Haryana after purchasing cattle in Rajasthan. Khan, a dairy farmer, succumbed to injuries two days later.

Khan and those along with him were attacked as the mob suspected them of illegally smug-gling cattle. Following the incident the police registered a naming some persons and also against scores of unidentified persons.

A fter facing backlash on After racing buch.... comment about Sikkim being 'troubled with in-surgency', Bollywood and now Hollywood actress, Priyanka Chopra, sent an e-mail to Tourism Minister, Ugen Gyatso Bhu-tia, today clarifying her 'stance' on 'the situation'.

In the mail, the ac-tress has said that her comment was 'misconstrued' and that she had meant Sikkim was troubled by insurgencies in 'neighbouring countries'.

However, she goes on to add that, "I'm fully aware that Sikkim is an incredible host nation to so many refugees and our film shows exactly that through the children's point of view.

Priyanka has offered an apology if her comments have offended or hurt people's sentiments and also acknowledged the support extended by the state government and the people here.

The mail does not talk about her statements on her soon to release film Pahuna being the first film from Sikkim which many in the State have

also objected to.

It may be recalled that this controversy arose after Priyanka's comments on Sikkim in an interview with ET Canada a day ago. Her film Pahuna, shot mostly in Sikkim, debuted at the Toronto International Film Festival.

## "Paid" news: DAVP bars publications from getting govt ads

**New Delhi, Sep 14 (PTI):** The Directorate of Advertising and Visual Publicity (DAVP), the nodal agency for central government's advertisements, has suspended over 20 newspapers from its panel for a twomonth period for publishing "paid" news, according

to an advisory issued by it.

Around 30 more newspapers, which were not on the panel, would also not be allowed to get empan-

elled during the period, the advisory said.

This means these publications will not receive any central government advertisement for this period.

The development comes in the wake of the Press Council of India (PCI) censuring 52 newspapers for

various reasons, mostly for publishing "paid" news. "The publications, which are already on the panel, have been suspended for two months -- from September 13, 2017 to November 12, 2017," DAVP Director R

C Joshi said in the advisory.

He added that it had also been decided by the Director General, DAVP that the publications, which were not on the panel and had been censured by the PCI, would not be empanelled or re-empanelled for

the period.

Of the 52 newspapers, 37 were censured by the PCI for publishing "paid" news, three were censured for breach of journalistic norms, including one for publishing "obscene" photographs.

## **Steering Committee** on Intensified Mission Indradhanush meets



GANGTOK, 14 SEPT [IPR]: The State Steering Committee Meeting on Intensified Mission Indradhanush [IMI] was held today at the conference hall of Manan Kendra in Gangtok. The meeting was chaired by Chief Secretary, AK Shrivastava who is also the Chairperson of the Steering Committee.

Also present were Additional Chief Secretary-Human Resource Development Department, GP Upadhyay. Director General-cum-Secadnya, Director General-cum-sec-retary [Health] & Convenor-State Steering Committee, Dr K Bhan-dari, Secretary-Labour Depart-ment, LP Chettri, and senior offi-cers of all the line departments.

A detailed presentation was made on the stages of the IMI campaign by State Immunization Offi-

cer, Dr Phumzay Denzongpa.

It may be mentioned here, IMI is a strategic initiative for improving vaccination coverage in identi-fied districts, and is personally reviewed by Prime Minister of India. The IMI entails intensive training and planning before the campaign, intensive monitoring during the campaign, and integration of IMI sessions into routine immunization after the campaign.

As per the directions of the PM, IMI aims to rapidly build up immunization coverage by December 2018 and sustain thereafter

through Routine Immunization. Further, all children should receive all vaccines due for the age as per the national immunization schedule in the geographic area. Special focus should be on children up to two years of age and pregnant women who have missed out routine vaccination. Vaccination would be on demand to children up to five years of age.

Dr Phumzay, in her presenta-

tion, explained how the Mission Indradhanush has been upgraded to IMI with focus on better convergence with other departments. steering committee chaired by the State Chief Secretary, intensive monitoring by MoHFW, special focus on urban areas, intensive monitoring and support by partners before, during and post campaign, provision of proposing for additional fund in supplementary PIP, and reward on achievement of target. She also explained the activities to be carried out during the preparation phase, the implementation phase, and post campaign phase, and highlighted the areas where the campaign would

She further explained the structure of the committees formed at the state, district and corporation level to ensure accountability in the planning, implementation and post campaign stages.

The areas of support from all the line departments were also discussed in detail. Officers representing various line departments namely HRDD, Social Justice, Urban Development & Housing, Rural Management & Development, Sports & Youth Affairs, Information & Public Relations and Labour Department gave inputs on how their respective departments will converge their existing pro-grammes with the IMI. Chief Secretary, Mr Shrivas-

tava, called for active involvement of officers and staff of each line de-partment. He stated that the campaign provides immense scope for effective partnership between agencies of the government and

non-governmental organisations to achieve a common target. Dr Bhandari said that the State is already doing well in terms of immunization coverage, and called for active support from line departments and non-governmental organizations like the Rotary Club to further the mission. He solicited support from all line departments to furnish adequate data of the population to be immunized so

that 100% coverage is achieved.

The meeting also had the presence of president-Rotary Club Gangtok, Dr RN Deokota.

## Don't Burden Education with Employability

There is already too much confusion in the classrooms

In an aping of a national obsession, one gets to hear a lot about how the education system and the syllabus in schools need to be made more job-oriented. While there is no denying that the education system, like any other System, could do with an overhaul, the clamour to make education 'job-oriented' is perhaps not as advisable as it appears convincing on first look.

As a nation, we already suffer an education sys-

tem drafted by the British to keep a people subservient, and to consciously start grooming people for jobs right from school would be a regressively disturbing pursuit of a colonial model, albeit for a different master. Of course, it would be wonderful to have education which also made students 'employable', but employability is too dispersed a spectrum to lend itself to any easy packaging into a curriculum. Since it is not possible to fashion an 'employable' curriculum, it makes sense to let that aspect be left alone and concentrate instead on working towards an education that returns to its true purpose – grooming confident people who can apply themselves to learning and who have a thirst for knowledge. If we can pull this off, the schools will automatically churn out well rounded graduates who can adapt to the challenges and requirements of the job market, even in these fickle times of post-demonetization recession.

The best way to ensure that education does not lose its focus would be to divorce it from any overt responsibilities of feeding into employment. That should be an independent pursuit. Sikkim has made the right start by setting up an independent Directorate of Capacity Building which has thankfully not been clubbed with the Human Resource Development Department which looks after education in the State. The task for this Directorate is straightforward and it is required to groom the young for job openings within and outside the State. The focus for the planners of Education should thus solely be on education. If education is delivered efficiently, then even the skill development trainings will end up being more effective, because it would be taken by youth who are inquisitive, willing and who respect knowledge. One does not get to see enough of that in the skill development programmes being dispensed across the State at present and that is probably because the schools are not successfully inspiring true learning. Deliver in the latter aspect and everything will fall in place, do not address this issue and burden classrooms with vocational learning as well and the already stressed classrooms will prepare an even more confused generation

## Our unique development-deficit

aland's overall development-deficit Nagaland's overan ucyclop...
is unique ~ as most things are here. The reasons are also unique. The simplest explanation for this deficit is, of course, corruption  $\sim$  but the corruption here is

I always hesitate to invite people to Nagaland because even I don't want to travel on what has been passing off as our roads for almost over two decades. Yes, cosmetic repairs are done particularly before the famed Hornbill Festival but soon the rains and the heavy vehicles wipe away the cosmetics of our roads unceremoniously. What exactly is the problem here since it doesn't rain only in Nagaland? You see, the same reasons pertain to almost all other ectors such as health, education, etc.

One of the primary reasons for such deplor-

able development-deficit here is administrative-and-governance-deficit. But obviously this is not really an issue with our people because the same people are elected over and over again. If one looks at the sharp divisions in the ruling party, which has been in power for almost fifteen vears, it's the same old same old. With a few exeptions, the same old people have been elected in the past three consecutive state Assembly elections ~ despite non-performance. How do we explain this phenomenon? It would be too simplistic again to cite factors such as tribe, clan, etc. While these factors are very real, I would also cite fac-tors such as the low level of awareness and education of our people ~ never mind that we have one of the highest literacy rates in the country. As a sub-category, I would cite the proclivity of our people to talk and believe all kinds of things without studying and analyzing whether there is any grain of truth or logic in the talks, especially about politics. We live on the rich diet of rumours, suspicions, assumptions, presumptions, accusations and allegations, which are all taken as the Gospel truths. In this atmosphere, clearly persons with social standing by way of having been elected before or now, or serving/having served in Government service, even a driver or peon, card-carrying members of political parties, NGOs, members of constitutionally-recognized traditional bodies, moneyed people, non-state players, etc., have the advantage of totally colonizing the minds of the people. Then, there is the sub-category of most of our people becoming politicians, political analysts and commentators, even political scientists come elections. As history has proved, it is very difficult not to be swayed by persuasive tongues, especially of those who hold office or have a high status at any level of society. But, I'm not sure whether

being simple is the same as being gullible.

Another factor is the complicity of voters in corruption. It is very difficult to anyone to say no



to a politician or bureaucrat, who has helped get you or a member of your family jobs in Government service through the backdoor. In fact, backdoor appointments, a huge issue here in the last couple of years, are done with the sole objective of political returns. Nepotism inevitably transcends to the political domain. So yes, it is often the refrain here that because we sell our votes, our elected repre-sentatives are corrupt and get away with murder While this true, it doesn't explain why our politicians forget their oath on the Constitution. But being unique, who amongst voters remember and remind our elected representatives of the Indian

The other factor is our skewed perceptions and perspectives of development. As far as we are con-cerned, as long as we get what we want in terms of education, jobs and make enough money to better the Jones, we are not bothered about our neighbours, much less about our roads or the state of health and education. The very practice of proxy teachers and nurses and the increasingly growing private practice of doctors underscore self-prioritizing at the cost of the greater good of the greatest number of people. This is actually astounding considering that as a tribal community Nagas had prioritized the collective over the individual ~ at least in our foreparents' days. What has made us so individualistic and self-absorbed? What has made us stop being our brothers' keepers? The forced transition from a subsistence economy to an alien form of capitalism ~ and now liberalization and globalization? Or have these merely provided the latitude for us to be our natural selves - individual-istic, self-absorbed, now that capitalism, liberalization and globalization have contributed to weakening tribal bonds?

Nagaland is also perhaps the only state in India that is totally politics-and-Government-centric. Without political and Government patronage, nothing can happen here  $\sim$  not even a concert, a fashion show, a beauty contest, a student union's or a church programme. Politicians and bureaucrats have total financial control over all spheres of hu-

man activities, which is one explanation for the almost non-existence private se tor and non-flow of investment into the state and the non-existence of tourism one of the most revenue-earning sectors in states like Meghalaya and Sikkim. True, these states don't have insurgency issues or ILP, etc. But see how cleverly these issues are used and abused to justify Nagaland's overall development-deficit? De-spite worse insurgency issues in Assam and Manipur, development activities to a certain extent have not stopped in these states. Manipur has an international airport, while we have just two flights a day. Nagaland is the only state that has no di-rect flights to Guwahati in the Northeast. What of the Act East Policy then ~ how far

can this Policy be realized without smooth commu-nications within the Northeast?

One major factor for the development-deficit here that has been regurgitated endlessly over the decades is the insurgency issue. Our powers-thatbe repeatedly "exhort" that peace is a precursor to development  $\sim$  the connotations being: once the Naga issue is honourably settled, development will inevitably ensue. This does not explain where funds from the Centre have disappeared, the emer-gence of crony capitalism, emergence of the small but very fabulously affluent and powerful class that indubitably controls the maximum wealth of Nagaland and the increasing impoverishment of the ordinary citizen. Our unique concept of democracy is another factor that must be addressed especially because evidently dissent of "mainstream narratives" is still not tolerated

Perhaps the most unique reason for Nagaland's development-deficit is the absence of a value-system in our society. We have erased the line between right and wrong, true and false, good and bad worse still, successfully defeating right with might, now we live by the axiom "wrong is right". Surpris-ing for a state that proclaims "Nagaland for Christ" ~ but then as we no longer seek wisdom in the "fear of the Lord", development-deficit is inevitable. A value-system and wisdom are intrinsically linked ~ because we have abandoned both, we cite numerous political, economic, social, cultural, sociological factors and analyze them through the prism of local, regional, national and global trends at an intellectual level so while change is our favourite top-ic, it certainly isn't our favourite action. Salvation comes only with change ~ based on a value-system and informed by wisdom. Change comes only when we concede we are human ~ and our inability to be human like everyone else on this planet is another unique factor for our development-deficit. ## This old Catholic ritual is giving Brazil's economy a small boost, one Virgin Mary statuette at a time

Brazilians are moving away from Catholicism. Today, fewer than 50 percent of Brazilians identify as Roman Catholic, down from 92 percent in 1970. But after 500 years in South America, the Catholic Church remains deeply enmeshed Brazil's economy and society.

Among its many footholds is a little-known tradi-

tion called the Movimento das Capelinhas, or "small chapel movement." This phenomenon, which takes place in hundreds of cities and towns across Brazil, centers on the circulation among Catholic households of small sanctuaries containing a Virgin Mary statuette.

ALTERNATIVE ECONOMIES ON THE RISE

The Movimento das Capelinhas is an example of a circulation-based collaborative network, a kind of hyper-local economy that is popping up across the globe, from one London district's alternative currency to the time banks of New Zealand.

Such systems appeal because they exchange a nar-row focus on economic value (only money matters) for a broader definition of what has value to people. By circulating dear objects in a certain pattern, these collaborative networks distribute their benefits to all involved, and the "profit" goes well beyond the small economic bump communities may see

The small chapel movement forms part of a long history of Roman Catholic rituals involving sacred rel-

its and statues sent out to tour the world's parishes.

Protected by their wooden homes, Brazil's moving Marys pay one-day "visits" to various parishioners' homes in a semi-formal process determined by neighbors, parishes and lay volunteers. Most chapel groups include about 30 families, such that each family received to the part of the second of the ly receives one visit a month. Local clergy oversee the Marys' progress around town.

In doing their rounds, our research found, these peripatetic chapels do more than just physically circulate – their travels actually create profit and value for participants. The end result is a de facto local Catholic "economy," one based on shared values rather than money.

### RITUALS AND RELICS

To understand the economic impact of the popular small chapel tradition, we spent two years studying the Marys' circulation in two southern Brazilian cities: Curitiba, which has 1.76 million residents; and



ampos Novos, a small town southwest of there. Our study, which was published in February in the

Journal of Macromarketing, found differences in the size and organizational level of each city's small chapel movements. But in both places, everyone in this ritual receives some kind of benefit, be it economic, spiritual social - creating what's called "hybrid value systems."

Curitiba's system is well-coordinated by the church, with approximately 100 volunteer mensage-iras (messengers) who steward an estimated 10,000 small chapels from household to household.

In Campos Novos, which has 32,800 inhabitants, the market was less robust. Approximately 100 Marys circulate among local Catholics, overseen by about the same number of mensageiras.

For participating communities in both cities, the

effect of the moving chapels is to create an alternative economy, one based not on traditional capitalist values but on participation, community and faith.

Money does, of course, play some role. Households

make monetary donations to the Catholic Church for the honor of hosting a chapel. Some small capelinhas

even come equipped with their own coin slot. In Curitiba, we found that these small contributions earn the church about 1.5 million Brazilian reals (approximately US\$500,000) per year. In Campos Novos, the church's profit was significantly less, likely garner-

MONEY CAN'T BUY YOU FAITH

Host families and community members see less tangible but equally valuable benefits from the traveling Marys.

For lay mensageiras, it's social status: Working as your neighborhood's representative of the church is a prestigious role. Likewise for the families, parishes and communities interconnected by the regular visitation of these small chapels.

There is a spiritual value, too. For Catholics, Mary, as the mother of Jesus Christ, is one of the most pow-erful holy figures, and recipients of the small chapels that house her feel blessed by their access to divinity,

The Brazilian Catholic church carefully manages this aspect of the chapel visits, presenting them as a source of comfort. The Marys "move," says Church doctrine, and in doing so sustain their devotees emotionally.

The capelinhas often become a favored local symbol of their family group, transcending their religious significance to be, quite simply, beloved and familiar objects.

The Curitiba archdioscese's Movimento das Capelinhas Facebook page and blog reveals host families, messengers and priests celebrate the traveling Marys. After one family posts about a chapel's arrival to their home, other commentators excitedly retell their visitation stories.

The church also takes to Facebook and to the pulpit to recognize the volunteers who help to circulate the chapels, even honoring them in special Masses. Lauding participants in the small chapel movement gives them a special social status, or what we call "reputational value" – another benefit created by this alternative economy.

The church actively promotes the social and reputa-tional value of the Marys. When a new church opens in town, for example, the small chapels will be given new

circulation routes as a welcome to new parishioners.

Priests in Curitiba train and mentor the small chapel messengers, helping to ensure that the Marys circulate in ways that mutually benefit all participants, either economically, spiritually, socially or on multiple levels

One type of value often translates into another. Spiritual value becomes economic whenever someone donates to a small chapel, for example. Then, when this money, in turn, is used to educate an ap-prentice priest or to introduce a new route for a small chapel, the value again changes, becoming social or

Brazil's "Marys that move" may not be able to pull Brazil out of its deep recession, but our research reveals that these hybrid systems do hold the potential to combat economic malaise, albeit on the local level, by reminding Catholics that even if money is in short supply right now, friends, family and faith are not. ## Darjeeling limps back to normalcy, Gurung wants bandh intensified

DARIEELING (WB), SEP 14 (PTI): The Darjeeling hills were limping back to normalcy as several shops markets, government offices and some government-aided schools reopened today, while GJM chief Bimal Gurung asked his partymen to intensify the bandh that started

92 days ago.

The shops and markets opened, defying the indefinite bandh, sponsored by the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) for a separate Gorkhaland

The state-run North Bengal State Transport Corporation plied a few buses, which were escorted

by the security forces.

The buses plied from Siliguri to Darjeeling and back via Kurseong, besides between Siliguri and Mirik in Darjeeling district, official sources said.

Several government and government-aided schools have started functioning and teachers have been asked to join immediately.

Government sources said the

situation in the hills remained tense but incident-free despite threats and intimidation by the GIM.

For the sixth day in a row, the police, along with the administration, appealed to the locals via public address systems to open shops and restore normalcy in the hills.

Expelled GIM leader Binay Tang said that normalcy was returning in the hills.

Tamang is one of the key GJM leaders who had represented the party in the two rounds of dialogues with the state government to discuss the Darjeeling issue.

Chief Minister Mamata Banerhad appealed to the hill parties to withdraw the bandh and restore peace and normalcv.

Gurung, who is in hiding, had rejected Banerjee's appeal and said that the bandh will continue till the Centre holds a tripartite meeting on the Gorkhaland issue.

He threatened that if the tripartite meeting is not called soon the situation will worsen in the

In an audio statement released from an undisclosed location, Gurung said if something untoward happens in future, the state govern-

ment would be responsible for it.

He also asked the GJM cadre to intensify the bandh in the hills and ensure that no one made an attempt to break it. Peace rallies were taken out by residents in

Kurseong, Darjeeling and Mirik.
The GJM supporters took out rallies in some parts of Darjeeling, creation of Gorkhaland and the on going shutdown, the sources said.

Internet services remain suspended in the hills since June 18.

Meanwhile, unidentified mis-creants raided 'Roy Villa', a heritage house in Darjeeling last night where Sister Nivedita, social worker and disciple of Swami Vivekananda, had died.

The miscreants damaged it and took away some cash, police said, adding that investigation is on.

## India sends relief materials for Rohingya refugees in B'desh

The first consign-ment of India's assistance comes days after Dhaka briefed New Delhi about the problems faced by it due to the influx of these refugees.
Bangladesh High Com-

missioner in New Delhi Syed Muazzem Ali had met Foreign Secretary S Jaishankar last week and discussed the issue of Rohingyas in detail.

"In response to the umanitarian crisis being faced on account of the large influx of refugees into Bangladesh, Government of India has decided to extend assistance to Bangladesh," External Affairs Ministry in New Delhi said in a statement.

The relief material consists of items required urgently by the affected people, namely rice, pulses, sugar, salt, cooking oil, tea, ready to eat noodles, biscuits, mosquito nets etc, it said.

## NPAs to touch 10.5% by March as banks recognise entire stress

Mumbai, Sep 14 (PTI): Crisil Ratings today said banks have only recognised two-thirds of their stressed loans as -performing assets, and estimated the bad loan ratio to rise by 1 percent age point to 10.5 per cent by March 2018.

The 9.5 per cent NPA figure for March 2017 includes only two-thirds of the overall stressed assets, it said.

The agency said it estimates the total amount of stressed loans which includes NPAs and standard assets that are under pressure currently and could deteriorate into NPAs, to be at Rs 11.5 trillion or 14 per cent of the system.

Assets under pressure comprise the not-yet-recognised bad loans, which are recognised as NPAs in one bank, but not in others, restructured standard accounts, and stressed assets structured under schemes, such as the strategic debt restructuring, the 5/25 and the S4A, it said.

Gross NPAs will be 10.5 per cent o advances by March 2018, up from 9.5 per cent in March 2017," it said adding that infrastructure, power, engineering, and construction sectors contribute

bulk of the stressed assets.
Faster resolution of stressed accounts through the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code and various structuring schemes, is critical to improving the asset quality of banks, the agency said.

The report, however, said over the medium-term, a big increase in stressed loans is unlikely on factors like higher commodity prices, lower inter est rates, improved capital structure, and efficiency gains for corporates.
"With the majority of stressed as-

sets now recognised as NPAs, rest of the corporate loan portfolio of banks can be expected to perform better over the medium-term," Crisil president Gurnreet Chhatwal said

He said there will be asset quality deterioration in loans to small businesses and farmers, which are impacted due to introduction of the goods and services tax and demonetisation, and debt waivers, respectively.
But Chhatwal said this is unlikely to

put pressure on bank balance-sheets the way large exposures are doing. Fresh NPA creation will decelerate this fiscal, but the overall stock would continue to rise because slippages would still outpace recoveries.

"In the past couple of years, recoveries have been poor and the bulk of the reduction in gross NPAs has been because of higher write-offs," senior di-

rector Krishnan Sitaraman said.

He blamed sluggish economic growth, continued stress in some sectors, and slow place of resolution pro-ceedings as the factors hindering the recovery efforts.

## India out of top-100, placed 107 in FIFA ranking

New Delhi, Sep 14 (PTI): The Indian football team has dropped 10 places to be placed 107 in the latest FIFA ranking

released on Thursday. The Sunil Chhetri-led side notched up two victories and a draw in three matches after they were placed 97th last month.

India beat Mauritius and held Saint Kitts and Nevis to a draw to clinch the Tri-nation football series before defeating Macau in an away fixture in the 2019 AFC Asian Cup Qualification third round.

India have dropped below the 100th spot for the first time since May.

The Blue Tigers had achieved one of their best rankings in recent history when they climbed to the 96th spot in July.

## Fitch has negative outlook on banks, raises capital concerns

MUMBAI, SEP 14 (PTI): Fitch Rating today held out a negative outlook on the country's banking sector, citing weak capi-tal position and financial performance.

The global rating agency said banks look vulnerable with poor capitalisation and with-out adequate support from the state and capital

"The negative outlook is based on our assess-ment that the banking sector's weak core capitalisation continues to pose downside risks to standalone credit profiles amid expectations of continued poor loan growth, weak earnings, volatile asset quality and elevated credit costs," the agency said in a report.

Banks will need USD 65 billion in additional capital to meet Basel III requirements by March 2019 with the state-run banks alone requiring more than 90 per cent of this, it said.

Some of the state-run banks are planning to raise fresh equity from the markets this financial year but it will not be easy due to low inves tor confidence and bleak

earnings prospects.
"Government have to pump in significantly more even on a bare minimum basis if it is to address the system- related risks of huge NPAs, weak provision cover and poor loan

growth," the report said.

However, the report said, private sector banks

are well-placed although they have been under pressure due to deterio-

ration in asset quality.

The agency believes the asset-quality outlook could remain challenging in the next 12 months due to incipient stress in the power sector and concerns about farm loan waivers and SMEs.

Gross NPA ratio touched 9.7 per cent in FY17.

The report said sat-isfactory resolution of large stressed loans is going on under the RBI's oversight and it can have a positive effect on NPAs.

Provisions are likely

to rise in the interim as NPA cover is moderate at 40-50 per cent, it said.

"Banks will find it difficult to manage elevated credit cost pressures as income generation will suffer due to the income loss from NPAs and the weak growth outlook," it said. Treasury gains and

slumped to 4.4 per cent in FY17, lowest in several decades, is expected to remain subdued for the foreseeable near-term, the report concluded.

The Chinese analysts The Chinese analysts also referred to report that India and Japan were embarking on multiple infrastructure projects across Africa, Iran, Sri Lanka and Southeast Asia in what could be viewed as pushback against China's unilateral infrastructure initiatives connecting it with Europe and Africa.

India boycotted the Belt and Road Forum (BRF) held this year due to its sovereignty concerns over the USD 50 billion China-Pakistan Economic Corridor which passes through Pakistan-occupied Kashmir.

"Though India objects to CPEC, India's real reason is that it doesn't want to see China's influence in South Asia and refuses to open its domestic market to China," Ye Hailin, direc-tor of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences' National Institute of In-ternational Strategy, said.

Also the Global Times tabloid, in an editorial ti-tled 'India-Japan intimacy no threat to China' said "in a changing world, the India-Japan intimacy is more like a contrivance".

It said Japan is unlikely to challenge China as it has strong bilateral trade relations with Beijing.

YANGON, SEP 14 (AFP): Rohingya militants, whose raids in western Myan-mar provoked an army crackdown that spurred a humanitarian crisis, denied any links to global terror groups today, days after Al-Qaeda urged Muslims to rally to their cause.

The Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army (ARSA) says it is trying to defend the minority group from a long cam-paign of persecution in Buddhist-ma-jority Myanmar, where the Rohingya are denied citizenship. But its actions have plunged a region, already a crucible of religious and ethnic tension, deeper into crisis.

Around 380,000 Rohingya have

sought sanctuary in Bangladesh since the outbreak of violence three weeks fleeing burning villages and alleged army atrocities, joining what has ome one of the world's largest refugee camps in Cox's Bazar. Nearly 30,000 Buddhists and Hindus have also been displaced inside Rakhine.

Rights group say Myanmar's army has used the ARSA's attacks as cover to try to push out the estimated 1.1 million Rohingya population. Myanmar's government, led by Aung San Suu Kvi. has denied the allegations. It labels the militants as "extremist terrorists" who want to impose Islamic rule over a portion of Rakhine state.

They have also previously described the group as harbouring fighters who have trained with the Pakistani Taliban, ideas that have become the currency of arguments among the mainly Buddhist public for why the crackdown is justified.
Al-Qaeda on Tuesday urged Mus-

lims around the world to support the Rohingya cause and "make the neces-sary preparations -- training and the like -- to resist this oppression" in a

ARSA has repeatedly distanced itself rom the agenda of international jihad, instead insisting its claims are local and in defence of major state repression.

"ARSA feels that it is necessary to

make it clear that it has no links with Al Qaeda, the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria (ISIS), Lashkar-e-Taiba or any transnational terrorist group," the group said in a statement posted on its Twitter account.

"We do not welcome the involvement of these groups in the Arakan (Rakhine) conflict. ARSA calls on states in the region to intercept and prevent terrorists from entering Arakan and making a bad situation worse."

According to the International Crisis group, ARSA is steered by Rohingya emigres in Saudi Arabia and commanded in the field by overseas-trained gue-rilla fighters. But most of its recruits are armed with crude weapons like machetes and sticks

Analysts warn the treatment of the Rohingya -- and the huge number of new angry and dispossessed refugees in Ban-gladesh -- is rich pickings for militant Islamist recruiters. The refugee camps in Bangladesh are bursting at the seams, with aid groups and authorities scrambling to erect new shelters and provide food and medical support to an endless tide of hungry and traumatised arrivals.

More than 100 Rohingya have died while making the perilous boat cross-ing over to Bangladesh, with two more bodies, including a one-month old baby, washing up on shore on Thursday. Two thirds of the Rohingya refugees are children, according to the UN, hundreds of whom have arrived in Bangladesh alone after being split from their families in the swirl of violence.

### Malaysia school fire kills 24 children and teachers

KUALA LUMPUR, SEP 14 (AFP): Twenty-four peoole, mostly children, were killed today when a blaze tore through a Malaysian religious school, trapped in their dormitory by metal grilles on the windows. Pupils and teachers inside the Islamic study centre in downtown Kuala Lumpur screamed for help as help-less neighbours looked on.

Many of the bodies of the victims -- who included 22 boys aged between 13 and 17 -- were found piled on top of one anoth-er, indicating there may have been a stampede as the students sought to escape the blaze which erupted before dawn.

Firefighters rushed to the scene and the fire was out within an hour but it wreaked terrible devasta-tion. Pictures in local media showed ash-covered, fire-blackened beds in the students' sleeping quarters.
"The building was on

fire as the (morning call to prayer) was sounding," Norhayati Abdul Halim, 46, who lives opposite the school, told AFP. 'I could hear scream-

ing, I thought there were people fighting. I opened the window to my house and I could see the school on fire -- they cried for help but I couldn't do anything."

By the time firefighters arrived at the Darul Quran Ittifaqiyah religious school in the heart of the capital, "the screams had stopped", she added. Federal Territories Minister Tengku Adnan Tengku Mansor said the children, who were boarders at the school, were "desper-ately trying to escape the

flames" but metal security grilles covering the windows of their dormitory prevented them.

Officials said they were

unable to leave through the as it was on fire. Khirudin Drahman, director of Kuala Lumpur's fire and rescue department, told AFP it was one of the country's worst fire tragedies in 20 years. Fire officials said they suspected the blaze was caused by an electrical short circuit, or a mosquito repelling device.

Officials initially said

23 students and two teachers were killed in the blaze. Police later revised down the death toll to 22 students and two teachers. Six children were also in critical condition in hospital. Only a handful escaped unhurt.

She continued: "And finally, there aren't words to describe how I can possibly thank my beautiful friend Francia Raisa. She gave me the ulti-mate gift and sacrifice by donating her kidney to me. I am incredibly blessed. I love you so much sis."Selena first opened up about having Lupus in 2015 and last year she was forced to take a break from the limelight after

suffering from anxiety, panic attacks and depression – stemming from the disease.

She told fans at the time: "As many of you know, around a year ago I revealed that I have lupus, an illness that can affect people in different ways. I've discovered that anxiety, panic attacks and depression can be side-effects of lupus, which can present their own challenges. "I want to be proactive and focus on maintaining my health and happiness and have decided that the best way forward is to take some time off."

After opening up about her Lupus she admitted the support had been 'overwhelming' and revealed why she had waited to speak about it publicly. She told Billboard: "It has been overwhelming and the response has been very supportive, which is nice -- but it still makes me a little uncomfortable.

"I waited for the right time to talk about it because I am in a great place and I'm very healthy. I'm not trying to be loud about it: It was time to use my platform to help."
