### Countdown begins for India's heaviest satellite launch

CHENNAI, JUN 4 (PTI): down for the launch of India's heavy-lift rock-et GSLV MkIII, carrying communication satellite GSAT-19, from the space port of Sriharikota began today, ISRO said. The GSLV MkIII-D1

rocket is scheduled for lift off at 5.28 pm tomorrow from the second launch pad of the Satish Dhawan Space Centre at Sriharikota, around 120

km from here.

"The 25-and-half hour countdown for the launch of GSLV-Mk
III-D1, carrying the 3,136 GSAT-19 satellite. commenced at 3.58 pm, soon after the Mission Readiness Review Committee and Launch Au-thorisation Board gave clearance." Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) said.

ISRO Chairman A S Kiran Kumar said the mission is important as "it was the heaviest ever rocket and satellite to be launched

from the country".

"All activities for the launch of GSLV Mk III-D1 and GSAT-19 mission is going on. Tomorrow, we are expecting to launch at 5.28 pm," he told reporters at the airport

On the significance of the launch for ISRO, he said, "It is an important event as we are putting our communication sat-ellite from our own soil". Till now, ISRO had

# High Tension lines hum even as affected people are glum

MANGAN, 04 JUN: It is not only people liv-ing in the immediate vicinity of a hydel project

who get affected. Resi-dents of slopes and villages far removed from the project sites also come under the sweep because what is generated at the hydel projects needs to be carried through high transmission lines which feed into the main grid. These transmission lines are humming and buzzing behe-moths of electricity who not only require space for towers, but also leave a footprint of radiation within which habitations and agriculture are fraught with risk. Villagers in East Sikkim falling along these transmission lines are upset and worried because compensa-tion remains due to them for the relocations and abandonments forced on them by these lines.

"I possess a meagre plot of cultivable land here at Lower Rakdong and even this I have not



been able to put to use since the beginning of this year as the land has been marked as falling under the radiation zone of the TPTL High Tension transmission line. I have not been compensated for it so far," shares Khem Lall Neopaney of Lower Rakdong in East Sikkim.

Maya Rai of Kazitar, also in East Sikkim, continues to live her house even though she has been advised to vacate it since this too falls within the "radiation" zone of the transmission line.

The reason she can-

not move out is because

any compensation for her loss.

In fact, most GPUs in East Sikkim through which this transmission line passes, complain of unattended woes and delayed compensations. While similarly affected families in North Sikkim were compensated nearly a year ago, save some new cases in Mangshila, in East district, no one has re-ceived compensation yet.

The affected GPUs East Sikkim are Rakdong-Tintek, Sam-Tumin. dong-Kambal. Pathuk-Chandey Selebung-Singbel.

"We have been ne-glected and dished step motherly treatment as no one is voicing our plight," believes Arjun Pradhan of Kazitar basti. What further irks him and others is that no clear explanations have been given to them to explain the delay.

This, even as the transmission line carries away electricity generated at Teesta Stage III hydel project and the

Dikchu HEP.

The transmission line takes off from Ringdang below Singhik in North Sikkim and then courses through a few GPUs of North Sikkim before hitting the GPUs in East Sikkim and carrying on-wards to feed the national power grid.

The people have been aggrieved for a while and one Tashi Tongden Lepcha even filed an RTI application with the Land Revenue Department in a bid to understand the delay in payment of compensations, but says that the answer was not satisfactory.

The affected people

are question why no ob-jection certificates were taken from them a year earlier if they were to be made to wait this long. Clearly, the only priority for the concerned au-thorities was the interest of the transmission line developers.

# Women to be allowed in combat role in Army, says Gen Bipin Rawat

**NEW DELHI, JUNE 4 (PTI):** In a transformational move, the Indian Army is all set to open up combat positions for women, a gender barrier broken by only a few countries globally.

Army Chief Gen Bipin Rawat said the process to allow women in combat role, currently an exclusive domain of men, is moving fast and initially women will be recruited for positions in military police.

"I am looking at women coming as jawans. I am going to start it soon. Firstly, we will start with women as military police jawans," he said, giving details of the move to allow women in the male-dominated positions in the Army. tions in the Army.
Currently women are allowed in

a number of select areas including in



medical, legal, educational, signals and engineering wings of the Army but combat roles are kept off limit for them due to operational concerns and logistical issues

The Army Chief said he was ready to recruit women as jawans and the matter is being taken up with the

"We have already started the pro cess," Gen Rawat told PTI in an exclusive interaction recently.

He said women will have to show grit and strength in taking up challenges in combat role and shattering

the glass ceiling.

Very few countries including
Germany, Australia, Canada, the US, Britain, Denmark, Finland, France, Norway, Sweden and Israel have allowed women in combat roles.

The roles of military police include policing the cantonments and army establishments, prevent breach of rules and regulations by soldiers, maintaining movement of soldiers as well as logistics during peace and war, handling prisoners of war and extending aid to civil police

whenever required.

Creating history, the Indian Air Force, last year, had inducted three women as fighter pilots, less than a year after the government decided to open the fighter stream for women on an experimental basis.

A decision on having women as fighter pilots will be taken after evaluating performance of the three women -- Avani Chaturvedi, Bhawana Kanth and Mohana Singh who are now part of IAF's fighter

squadron.

The Indian Navy is currently deliberating on a policy on having women onboard the ships. The Navy allows women in various other segments including in legal, logistics, naval architecture and engineering departments.

## GAC lobbies with MP Udit Raj to expedite seat reservation debate in Parliament

The delegation

thanked the MP for raising the Limboo-Tamang seat reservation issue in the Parliament and submitted a representation appraising him of the current political scenario of Sikkim.

GAC conviction that "current discontentment and resentment prevailing in the state of Sikkim" dates back to 1979 when the Bill which set up the current seat reservation format was first tabled in the Parliament.

"The Black Bill of 1979 was forcefully implemented in Sikkim even though there was con-crete opposition to the bill from the cross section of Sikkimese society," the GAC press release argues while adding that the Parliament of India is yet to debate the Bill which has been pending for the last

40 years. "The failure of bringing a lasting solution to seat reservation issue in Sikkim has fragmented Sikkimese society into pieces. The various de-mands pouring in from the different section of the population have further pushed the political future of Sikkim into uncertainty," GAC further stated to the MP.

GAC has also rued the delay in resolving the issue and the delaying tactics of the Ministry of Home Affairs, which along with the State Government, GAC contends.

instead of tabling a Bill on the seat reservation issue, is delaying it "in one pretext or the other."

Dr. Raj, the release adds, after hearing out the GAC representation, said that justice delayed is justice denied and that he will leave no stone un turned to ensure that justice is done to the people of Sikkim.

## Hong Kong marks 28 years since bloody Tiananmen crackdown

Hong Kong, Jun 4 (AP): Tens of thousands of Hong Kongers held a candlelight vigil today to commemorate victims of the Chinese government's 1989 brutal military crackdown on protesters in Beijing's Tiananmen Square, while Taiwan's president called on Beijing to "face up" to the history. Hundreds if not thousands of

unarmed protesters and onlookers were killed late on June 3 and the early hours of June 4, 1989, after China's communist leaders ordered the military to retake Tiananmen Square from the student-led demonstrators. Commemoration of the events, whether public or private, remains taboo in mainland China.

Taiwanese President Tsai Ingwen said in posts on Facebook and Twitter that 28 years ago, the actions of students and citizens who challenged the political system in China "inspired a generation

She appealed to Beijing to "face up to June 4 with an open mind" and said Taiwan was willing to share its experiences of transition-

ing to democracy in the late 1980s to ease the pains of such a transi tion in the mainland, "For democracy: some are early, others are late, but we will all get there in the end." Tsai wrote on Twitter.

While mainland Chinese are only dimly aware of what happened at Tiananmen Square nearly three decades ago, the subject is openly discussed in Taiwan, a self-governing island, and Hong Kong, a special Chinese region with much autonomy and legally entrenched freedom of speech and other civil rights unseen on the mainland.

The annual evening vigil in Hong Kong is the only large- scale commemoration on Chinese territory of the Tiananmen bloodshed. The organisers, an umbrella group of pro-democracy organisations, estimated that 110,000 people attended.

People held up their lit cell-phones some with pictures of candles showing on the screen as a band played upbeat songs to rally the crowd and activists gave speeches about the importance of

getting young people to attend.
"I don't want this part of his

ry to become blurred," said office worker Emily Yu, 42, who attended the gathering in Victoria Park.

'It was really a massacre of peo ple. Those young people came out and did all they could for freedom and democracy but didn't achieve

Eloise Wu, 36, who works for nongovernmental organisation said: "We don't want to let people think we've forgotten, as if with the passing of time it's like, 'Oh, this never really happened.' No. Every year we remember."

In her posts, Taiwanese President Tsai also called on Beijing to allow a pro-democracy activist from Taiwan who was detained in the mainland in March to "come home." Lee Ming- che, detained on suspicion of conducting activities harming China's national security, has previously conducted online lectures on Taiwan's democratisa-tion and managed a fund for families of political prisoners in China.

Also napkins, mos-quito nets, sacks and bags, life jackets costing below Rs 1,000 would be taxed at 5 per cent.

While those costing above Rs 1,000 will attract a 12 per cent levy.

Silk and jute yarns have been exempt but cotton and natural fibres and all other yarns will be levied a 5 per cent GST rate.

Manmade fibres will,

however, attract 18 per cent rate.

All categories of fab-ric, except khadi yarn which has been exempt, will attract a 5 per cent

rate. Gandhi topi and In-

dia's national flag, however, have been exempt from tax under the GST.

apparel Manmade costing below Rs 1,000 will attract 5 per cent tax, lower than the existing 7 per cent. Those costing above Rs 1,000 will continue to attract 12 per cent.

Besides, match boxes, packed organic fertiliser will face a 5 per cent tax in the new regime.

The GST Council,

comprising Finance Min-ister Arun Jaitley and his state counterparts, has already fitted almost all goods and services in the tax brackets of 5, 12, 18

and 28 per cent.

The tax department has also put up on its website the list of items which would be exempt from the Integrated GST (IGST) under multilateral or bilateral commitments in respect of imports by privileges persons, organisations, authorities and foreigners.

In tomorrow's mission, the vehicle is scheduled to launch the GSAT-19 into the GTO at 16.20 minutes after lift off.

Earlier, ISRO had inched the 3,404 kg GSAT-18 communication satellite from Ariane, French Guiana.

In 2014, the space agency successfully un-

dertook the first experimental flight of the GSLV MkIII from Sriharikota.

in The vehicle two stage flight (with a non-functional cryogenic upper stage) carried the Crew Module Atmospheric Re-Entry Experiment to the intended height of 126 km and re-entered the atmosphere

The GSLV-Mk III-D1 is a three-stage vehicle with indigenous crvogenic upper stage engine designed to carry heavier communication satellites into the GTO. Apart from the cryo-

genic engine, designated

C25, carrying about 28 tonnes of propellants, it has two solid strap-on motors (S200) and a core

liquid booster (L110).

a letter to Bihar Chief

Stating that plot number 208 was allotted to Lalu Prasad in the capacity of being an MLA in 1992, Modi charged that Prasad got the plot (number 207) registered from Badshah Azad in 2010 at Rs 37,000 for giving him (Azad) another term in the Legislative Council

"As per the bye-laws of the Society, no mem-ber of the society will be allowed to have more than one plot. When the bye-laws prohibit the allotment of more than one plot, then how Prasad got allotted two plots in his name and that too at 1992 rate (Rs 37,000)," Modi said adding that the value of single plot will be around Rs 1 crore.

### On Environment Day, begin by not littering

t's Environment Day today and while the observa-protecting the environment, one thing is certain, as the crowd disperses from the official functions, left behind in its wake will be a litter (no styrofoam cups anymore in Sikkim, thankfully), used wrappers and other such articles which go into putting up an official show. One would have grimaced through such ungainly ironies, had the deliberations at the event been of consequence and if undertakings of the day had left some lasting impressions. We've been through too many WED observations to harbor any such hopes. But we pray to be proven wrong, because these are the times of shallow nationalism and frighteningly environmentally-disrespectful leaders (eg. Trump and the USA's climate change denial mode) which will require the agencies of the lay people to measure up stronger.

Meanwhile, to make a prediction of what could happen for WED here. Students force-marched to the rallies which mark the observation of such days will mark their trail with litter unique to school uniform pockets, and after the usual speeches, banners and awareness drives, the initiative will drive away too. It is also possible that the Day will receive plantation and cleanliness drives, but what use is tree plantation if no plan exists for post-plantation care? Cleanliness, in our Swachh Bharat should also be daily routine and not a special occasion photo-op.

Moving on, while some might argue that littering is perhaps the smallest of all environmental concerns, it is perhaps because this first step is not taken purposefully enough that we still need to remind people that the environment needs to be protected. Before a society can even start comprehending the demands of the environment, it has to express itself first as a genuinely concerned body. The amount of garbage that still makes it to the jhoras everyday and the distant noncha-lance with which people walk home everyday past heaps of inconsiderately dumped household rubbish are all pointers to how ignorant the peo-ple are to the need for community participation in handling environmental concerns. Does anyone seriously expect a person who rolls down the car window and tosses out a bottle of coke or beer, to understand and feel for the cracks that have developed on the Zemu Glacier? Will a person who shops for plastic bags in Siliguri [the item being banned in Sikkiml so that the Sunday shopping is more convenient be more than passingly inter ested in the drying up of Sikkim's largest brackish water lake, Gyamtsona?

It is because this is where Sikkim stands at present that the proposal to convert the capital to a litter and spit free zone, no matter how trivial, superficial or impossible the task may sound, was welcome. Since the people are not taking that first step on their own, they need to be forced to take it.
Once people put that toffee wrapper back in their pockets to throw it into a segregated bin later, they will also be able to comprehend environmental concerns better.

# **Idi Amin and Donald Trump-strong** men with unlikely parallels

President Donald Trump's norm-breaking campaign and early reign has been compared to several other divisive historical figures, espe cially previous American presidents.

But when it comes to the style in which he communicates, there's an uncanny resemblance to a notorious African dictator from the 1970s, For those that lived during Idi Amin's vi cious reign in Uganda between 1971 and 1979, there are clear echoes four decades later in Trump's speeches and press conferences, or when he fires off his notorious tweets

Let me say up front, Trump, who was democratically elected, can in no way be compared to Amin when it comes to how the so-called "Butcher of Uganda" came to power or the brutal way he dealt with dissent during his eight-year regime. One of the most barbaric military dictators in post-independence Africa, the death toll of his own citizens under his rule, is put at 500,000.

The comparison I am looking at is the similarity of styles and tone of communication. Even though Trump and Amin are from completely differ-ent eras with different modes of communication, there are clear parallels between the two telegenic moderness WITH FLOURISH

Amin's numerous decrees were an-nounced on radio and television and carried in newspapers with flourish. One such decree was the expulsion of the Asian/Indian community from Uganda.

In front of international television cameras and newspaper journalists Amin accused the Indians of being 'smugglers who carried five passports". He blamed Britain for bringing them to Uganda during the colonial rule. Amin claimed that the expulsion decision was taken in the national economic interests of Uganda:

"I took this decision for the economy of Uganda and I must make sure that every Ugandan gets the fruit of independence. I want to see the whole Kampala street is not full of

Fast forward 44 years. At a cam paign rally Trump promised to deport illegal immigrants from Mexico, some of whom he called "rapists". Trump also announced that he was going to build a wall barring them from entry into the United States which Mexico

was going to pay for.

"Mark my words," he said. Afterwards he proclaimed that he "loved

In similar style Amin said "it's not my responsibility to offer them (expelled British Asians) transit camps!



The British High Commissioner is here and it is his responsibility". Re marking afterwards that the British

"are my great friends".

For Amin's Uganda, it was a devastating decision. The expelled Asians/Indians were the entrepreneurs, bankers, professional class who had formed the country's middle class since colonial times. Six months after their departure the country's hitherto promising African economy spiralled into recession.

Trump's America may not suffer the expulsion of unwanted foreign-ers but its regional entrepreneurs such as potato and vegetable growers will suffer from the absence of cheap available labour from across the border in Mexico.

### IMPULSIVE USE OF TECHNOLOGY

The two presidents have similarities in their impulsive use of quick communication technology. Trump is a compulsive tweeter while Amin loved

dispatching telegrams.

Amin telegraphed disgraced
American President Richard Nixon wishing him a "quick recovery from Watergate" and to Tanzanian Presi-dent Julius Nyerere, his erstwhile foe, a peculiar message in lieu of peace talks at the height of a war between the true countries:

"If you were a woman I would re married you ... although your head is full of grey hairs.'

There were even more bizarre ones to the Queen of England, saying he expected her to send him "her 25-year-old knickers" in celebration of the silver anniversary of her coronation. There was an offer of assistance to Edward Heath, the British Prime Minister to save the British economy,

"If you would let me know the ex-

act position of the mess."

A Trump tweet to Iowa voters who voted against him in the prima-

ries had similar condescending tones:
"Too much Monsanto in the corn

creates issues in the brain? It was later deleted.

There was another tweet about James Comey, the FBI Director he fired:

"FBI Director Comey was the best thing that ever happened to Hillary Clinton in that he gave her a free pass for many bad deeds! The phony..."

And then there's this tweet about a topic that has often occupied his mind, namely his predecessor Barack Obama's legacy:
"The first 90 days of my presiden-

cy has exposed the total failure of the last eight years of foreign policy!" So true. @foxandfriends" BEING FIRED ON TELEVISION

Amin loved firing his officials on radio and television. A minister of culture, Yekosofat Engur, attended a public function as guest of honour not knowing that his junior had just been appointed in his place on Uganda's broadcast media.
Former FBI chief Comey learned

in a similar fashion of his fate. He learned of his firing while addressing agents at a field office in Los Angeles breaking news flashes on television of Trump sacking him, was the first Comey heard of it.

There are also parallels in their sabre rattling. Amin threatened to invade Israel, not holding back:

"If am to prepare the war against Israel completely, I don't want very many Army, Air force and Navy, just very few and strike inside..."

"I love war," Trump declared his

passion for violence during a campaign speech in Iowa in late 2015. He added: "I'm good at war. I've had a lot of

wars of my own. I'm really good at war. I love war in a certain way, but only when we win."

LOW OPINION

The two presidents both have a low opinion of women and not shy to express that. Amin remarked that he was a "good marksman" (with wom-en) while showing off his numerous children. He had four wives and more than 30 children

Trump has had a long trial of sexist comments such as this one:

"You know, it doesn't really mat-ter what [the media] write as long as you've got a young and beautiful piece of ass..

What the two share most is their sense of self importance.

In 1977, after Britain broke diplo-matic relations with his regime, Amin declared he had beaten the British. He titled himself "Conqueror of the British Empire", short for, "His Excel-lency President for Life, Field Marshal Alhaji Dr Idi Amin Dada, VC, DSO, MC, CBE". He said he would be happy to accept the Scots "secret wish" to have him as their monarch, hence the Hollywood movie title "The Last King of Scotland".

Amin also wrenched a Doctorate of Law from Uganda's Makerere University and henceforth considered himself in the same league with medical doctors.

As Salon wrote, the only two words former reality show host Trump has uttered more frequently than "vou're fired" are "I'm smart". He aid about Wharton, the University of Pennsylvania's business school:

"Look, I went to the best school, as a good student and all of this stuff. I mean, I'm a smart person.

They both share a passion for control and love to be loved. The New Yorker's Jeff Seshol reckons that Trump's chief complaint about his own yes-men seems to be that they don't say yes energetically enough.

It's easier when you're a dictator.

"As minister, governor, high-ranking people and the people of the country, they must love their leader. This is the point number one.

TURNING INTO AMIN
Respected East African commentator Charles Onvango Obbo believes that,

"The genius of Trump is that he understands what adept guerrilla leaders figured out ages ago – do that which the opponent thinks is impossible or so unthinkable, they have not planned how to defend it."

The same went for Amin who for a long time was considered a comic buffoon while he terrorised a whole country and fanned international terrorism.
Some may think it's alarmist, but

Onyango Obbo has warned that with all the similarities,

"Trump – or indeed any leader in an "advanced" democracy - can turn

# Mainstream media outlets are dropping the ball with terrorism coverage

News coverage of the Manchester terrorist attack was sadly familiar: cellphone videos of screaming victims; details of first responders' hectic efforts; "Was it terrorism?" guesswork; speculation about the perpetrator. In this case, the horror was amplified by so many of the killed and wounded

being young people.
Since the 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States, covering the type of violence inspired by al-Qaeda or the Islamic State (IS) has become a staple of the news media's repertoire. Collectively, this reporting increases the public's sense of vulnerability: An evil is out there, unpredictable and fe-rocious, sure to strike again. But what's behind that evil? When

I watch or read mainstream news coverage of the attacks, they tend to treat them as distinct events, much like a train wreck or bank robbery.

As I worked on my forthcoming book, "As Terrorism Evolves: Media, Religion, and Governance," it became clear that for all the breathless headlines about IS-inspired terror attacks, many know little about the complexities of terrorism and Islam. Who are these people who murder so wantonly? Why do they do it? And, most importantly, how might such attacks be stopped?



Answering such questions requires daily news coverage that consists of more than depictions of scattered chaos. A holistic approach to reporting about terrorism might better explain this phenomenon that's reshaping our lives, much as the Cold War did 50

A JOURNALISTIC VOID
Western reporting about IS-inspired terrorist attacks almost always, explicitly or implicitly, notes a connection to Islam. But it often ends there. Many journalists shy away from religious topics, and this creates a vacuum of public knowledge that terrorists and anti-Muslim activists and politicians

The result? A religion of 1.6 billion people is being defined in public discourse by the acts of the few who spill blood in a Manchester arena or a Baghdad market-place. And because there is such limited understanding of Islam in the non-Muslim world - 55 percent of Americans say they know little or nothing at all about Islam – many news consumers are prone to accept the idea that "Is-lam-equals-terrorism." Results of a 2015 Pew Research Center study underscored the pervasiveness of stereotypes and the tensions underlying them, with significant numbers of Americans viewing Muslims as anti-American and vi-

When political figures de-nounce Muslims, or when there is anti-Muslim backlash following an attack, terrorist organizations chalk up a victory. Because some Muslims will inevitably see their religion as being under siege, they become susceptible to recruitment by the likes of al-Qaida and IS, who portray themselves as defenders of the religion.

Following terror attacks, anti-extremism responses from Muslim communities might receive some coverage. For example, an antiterrorism message produced in Kuwait and broadcast soon after the Manchester bombing quick-ly went viral on social media and received coverage from Western news media.

Nonetheless, Islam usually dis-

appears from the news until the next tragedy, even though approximately 80 percent of Muslims live outside the Arab world in countries of rising importance such as Indonesia, Pakistan and Nigeria. The global political clout of Islam is, in some ways, like that of Ca-tholicism centuries ago. If the role of Islam in world affairs were to receive continuing coverage, per-haps news consumers would realize that there is far more to Islam than violence. And if antipathy to-ward Islam were to diminish, terrorists would lose a recruiting tool.

## HONESTLY ADDRESSING THE THREAT

That said, this coverage should also address state-sponsored extremism, most notably Saudi Arabia's well-funded promotion of Wahabbist Muslim ideology. This fundamentalist doctrine is intrinsically separatist and lends itself to militancy. It provides a purported theological rationale for treating moderate Muslims - as well as non-Muslims – as well as non-Muslims – as enemies. While Western politicians are

geopolitics, the news media could play a more forceful role in de-scribing how even purported allies help terrorism take root.

Journalists could also more thoroughly examine the sophistication of terrorist operations. Islamic State, for example, has deftly used social media to inspire terrorist attackers, even those with whom it has no direct contact.

The perpetrators of the Decem-

ber 2015 terror attack in San Bernardino, California had received no training or orders from Islamic State, but they pledged allegiance to IS and launched the attack based on what they had gleaned from IS online content.

Ayman al-Zawahiri, the current leader of al-Qaida, recognized the power of media when he wrote, back in 2004, that "more than half of this battle is taking place in the battlefield of the media...we are in a media battle in a race for the hearts and minds of our Umma

[Muslim people]."

IS has used social media to spread its message, recruit followers, train fighters and raise funds. Governments and nongovernmental groups have recently become more adept at pushing back against this - the U.S. State Department has

"My serious problem of Free Basics is you get free only when you enter through my gate... To get free service you have to enter through Facebook gate... That is plainly not acceptable," he said.

"India is too big a coun-

"India is too big a country... India is too open a country and our digital ecosystem today is the top of the world. We have talked of digital access without hindrance. In Parliament, I have spoken when I was the communications minister. I said no and we don't propose to permit Free Basics in the present form at all," Prasad said.

# GJM marches against WB Govt's 3-language policy

Despite anticipation of clashes, the first day of GJM's protest rallies against the three-language policy of the West Bengal Government, passed off peacefully on Sunday throughout the Hills.

Rallies were held in Darjeeling, Kurseong, Kalimpong and Mirik. GJM president Bimal Gurung took part in the rally from Ghoom to Darjeeling, an 8 KM stretch. Thousands joined in the rally sporting black badges and black armbands raising slogans.

"We have lined up rallies throughout the Hills till 08 June. On Monday, the rally will be from Singamari to Chowk Bazar via Gandhi Road and Kak Jhora. On Tuesday, the rally will commence from Gorkha Ranga Mancha Bhawan and end at Chowk Bazar via Kak Jhora. We will announce the route for the Wednesday rally later," stated Roshan Giri, the GJM general secretary.

"We have given permission for rallies on Monday also. However, from 06 to 09 June, permissions will not be given for rallies in Darjeeling and Kurseong owing to VIP movement including that of Ministers," informed a

WB Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee will be arriving in Mirik on Monday on a 4-day visit to the Hills.

The CM is scheduled to attend a programme in Mirik at 4pm on Monday and then proceed to Darjeeling.

On 08 June, a Cabinet meet-

On 08 June, a Cabinet meeting is scheduled to be held at the Raj Bhawan here. She will be returning on June 9th.

The GJM has lined up a series of agitation programmes during the CM's stay in the Hills protesting the alleged "forceful imposition of the Bengali language in the Hills, Terai and Dooars."

"We have appealed to the general public of Mirik to switch off their lights from 6pm to 8pm in Mirik on Monday as a mark of protest," stated Binay Tamang, assistant general secretary, GJM.

Meanwhile, a GJM press release issued by Mr Giri claims that BJP leader Vijayavargia has stated that with public mandate, Gorkhaland can be created

Gorkhaland can be created.

"The people of West Bengal are fed up with the Mamata Banerjee Government. In 2019 the BJP will definitely form the Government in Bengal. # Deuba becomes sole candidate in Nepal prime ministerial race

Deuba is set to become

to take place later today.

Deuba, President of the Nepali Congress party, became the sole candidate in the prime ministerial race, after the main opposition CPN-UML decided not to field its candidate.

The voting is said to be a mere formality to pave his way for the post, Kathmandu Post reported.

Outgoing Prime Minister Pushpa Kamal Dahal of the CPN (Maoist Centre) proposed Deuba's candidacy while senior NC leader Ram Chandra Poudel seconded the proposal at the Parliament Secretariat which on Friday published the schedule to elect the new prime minister on majority basis.

Deuba, 70, needs to secure 297 votes in the 593-strong Parliament to prove his majority during today's election, and with the NC-Maoist Centre alliance enjoying 287 seats in Parliament and four other parties supporting the alliance having 21 seats, it looks plain sailing for Deuba, the report said. Deuba served as the prime minister from 1995 to 1997, from 2001 to 2002, and from 2004 to 2005.

However, the election process may get postponed as the main opposition CPN (Maoist Centre) has been protesting against the Election Commission's decision to conduct re-election in a ward. The EC called for re-election after the CPN (Maoist Centre) representatives allegedly tore ballot papers when vote

The House meeting summoned for 11 am to-day was postponed to 3 pm today after the CPN-UML's protest.

Controlled explosions were also carried out at the flat in Barking this morning, the BBC reported.

According to neighbours, the dead attacker had lived there for about three years and was married with two children.

The spokesman said "searches of a number of addresses in Barking are continuing." Three knife-wielding attackers wearing fake sui-

Three knife-wielding attackers wearing fake suicide vests unleashed a terror rampage in the British capital last night, plowing a van into pedestrians on the iconic London Bridge before stabbing revellers in nearby Borough market, killing seven people and injuring 48 others.

The three attackers were shot dead just eight minutes after police received a 999 call about the incident.

The attack was the third deadly terror attack in Britain in three months and came just days ahead of the UK general election to be held on June 8.

# Anu Rani smashes own national record, books Worlds berth

PATIALA, JUN 4 (PTI): Javelin thrower Anu Rani stole the limelight as she smashed her own national record en route to winning the gold medal on the fourth and final day of the 21st Federation Cup National Senior Athletics Championships here.

Rani, representing Uttar Pradesh, threw the spear to a distance of 61.86m to better her own earlier national mark of 60.01m in the last event of the competition at the NIS Patiala.

In the process, she also qualified for the World Championships to be held in London in August. The qualifying mark for the World Championships stands at 61.40m.

Suman Devi, also of Uttar Pradesh, took the silver with a best throw of 55.03m, while K Rashmi of Karnataka won the bronze with 51.12m.

Rio Olympian Nirmala Devi of Haryana also qualified for the World Championships as she won the gold in women's 400m race with a meet record timing of 51.28 seconds.

The World Championships qualifying mark for women's 400m stands at 52.10 seconds.

Seasoned M R Poova-

Seasoned M R Poovama of Karnataka came a distant second in 52.70 seconds while Debashree Mazumdar of West Bengal claimed the bronze in 53.59 seconds.

"I was expecting to make a national record here but I am satisfied with the meet record. I will target the national record at the Asian Championships," said Nirmala.

Meanwhile, four athletes took home their second gold of the meet. G Lakshmanan and his sister L Suriya added the 10000m crowns to the 5000m titles they had won on the first day of the competition.

Today, Lakshmanan claimed the men's 10000m gold with a time of 29:23.46. He finished ahead of Kerala's Gopi Thonakal who clocked 29:55.67 and Kalidas Hirave of Maharashtra (29:57.94).

Suriya bagged the women's 10000m crown with a time of 33.12.67. She finished ahead of Maharashtra's Sanjivani Jadhav (33.15.77) while Delhi's Meenu finished third in 34:17.11.

They were joined by Nayana James of Andhra Pradesh, who claimed the women's 100m hurdles gold in 13.96 seconds, to go along with her long jump title earlier in the competition. Among the double

Among the double gold winners was Amoj Jacob, only 19, who completed both 400m and 800m and won the men's single lap race today.

Jacob, a student of New Delhi's Khalsa college, ran a personal best of 46.26m to claim the 400m men's title. He edged Arokia Rajiv of Tamil Nadu, who clocked 46.64m and Sachin Roby of Kerala, who took the bronze with a time of 46.87 seconds.

released over 300 YouTube videos to counter the messaging of extremist groups – but the news media still tend to understate the organizational and military capabilities of terrorist groups.

of terrorist groups.

Consider the long-running story of efforts to liberate Mosul, Iraq's second-largest city, which Islamic State has held since 2014. Iraqi and American sources provide vaguely optimistic updates, which are duly reported. But this battle has been underway since October 2016. Despite the U.S.-backed onslaught, parts of Mosul remain under Islamic State control. What does this portend for

future Islamic State military efforts and its far-ranging terrorist attacks? Relying on daily combat bulletins obscures the long-term realities that journalists should be analyzing.

More broadly, counterterror-

ism efforts by the United States and other countries deserve greater scrutiny. The public needs to know what's working and what isn't. Defeating terrorism will require a mix of hard and soft power. Shutting down terrorists' recruiting pipelines is crucial. That requires innovative programs to reach those who are vulnerable to extremist appeals.

Terrorism is a pervasive enough part of our lives to merit more con-

sistent news coverage, and journalists on the terrorism beat must develop expertise about this multidimensional topic. (Among the best are Joby Warrick of The Washington Post and Rukmini Callimachi of The New York Times.) But overall, terrorism-related journalism remains episodic and simplistic.

Since the rude awakening of 9/11, journalism, in my view, hasn't kept pace with the bloody growth of terrorism. It needs to catch up.

## **Praneeth wins Thailand** Grand Prix Gold title

tler B Sai Praneeth lifted his maiden Grand Prix gold title by posting a come-from-behind victory over Indonesian Jonatan Christie in the men's singles final of the USD 1,20,000 Thailand Open here on Sunday.

The third seeded Indian prevailed 17-21 21-18 21-19 over the fourth seeded Indonesian in a contest that lasted an hour and 11 minutes.

This is Praneeth's second consecutive title win, following the Singapore Open victory. He had reached the finals of Syed Modi International in January at Hyder-abad, where he lost to Sameer Verma.

Praneeth, ranked 24 in the world did not have an ideal start in the final as he went down in the opening game.

"I was just focusing on the rallies. It was a difficult match. The rallies were going too long. But I tried to slowly and slowly build up and I am happy I could win. I thank everyone who supported me," said Praneeth after the match.

The Indonesian opened up a 3-0 lead but Praneeth soon caught up with him at 4-4 and it was a close battle till 7-7 before Christie broke free to maintain a slender edge.

At one stage, the Indonesian shut-

tler was leading 14-11 but Praneeth kept breathing down his neck and made it 14-14 with three straight points.

Christie found himself 18-17 up and quickly sealed off the opening game with three points on the trot.

Making a brilliant comeback in the second game, Praneeth surged ahead 5-0 and then 9-3 but failed to maintain his huge lead as his opponent won six successive points to make it 9-9. Thereafter, it was a neck-and-neck

battle till 15-15 before the Indian took

a slight two-point lead at 17-15.

Leading 17-16, Praneeth managed to bag three more points to move ahead 20-16. Although he wasted two game points, he eventually won it 21-18.

In the decider, Christie broke away at 2-2 to open up a 7-2 lead and then to 8-3. However, the Indian slowly made his way up with five consecutive points to reduce the margin to 7 -8.

Finally Praneeth caught up with him at 9-9 and what followed was a keenly contested affair with none of the shuttlers sparing an inch to each other.

At 17-17, Praneeth won two crucial points to take a 19-17 lead but only to concede the advantage.

## Lost temple discovered after 1,000 years in China

BEIJING, JUN 4 (PTI): Chinese archaeologists have found a famous temple that remained hidden for nearly a millennium in China's southwestern Sichuan province.

The Fugan Temple, located in downtown Chengdu, was a famous temple that lasted from the Eastern Jin Dynasty (317- 420) to the Southern Song Dynasty (1127-

Daoxuan, a famous Tang Dynasty (618-907) monk, once wrote that an official rite to pray for rain to end a persistent drought was held in front of the temple, and it rained as if the prayers had been

heard in heaven.

The story was the record of how the temple got its name, Fugan, which means "perceive the blessing."

The popular Tang Dynasty poet Liu Yuxi left a poem to commem-orate the temple's renovation, describing its heavenly appearance.

The poem further noted the temple's important role at that time, state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

However, the building was worn down during the later peri-od of the Tang and Song dynasties, with all traces of the temple disap-

pearing during wars.

Archaeologists unearthed more than 1,000 tablets inscribed with



pieces of stone sculpture as well as glazed tiles with inscriptions

'We have only excavated a part of the temple's area, but already have a glimpse of its past glory," said Yi Li, who led the excavation project.

He said they have found the temple's foundation, ruins of surrounding buildings, wells, roads and ditches.

During the excavation, chaeologists found some 80 ancient tombs scattered near the temple, dating back to Shang and

the temple's surroundings, they have unearthed large amounts of household tools and utensils and building materials dating back to various periods from the Song to Ming dynasties.

Chengdu became an economic and cultural centre in western China during the Sui and

Tang dynasties.

The temple's discovery could greatly contribute to the study of the spread of Buddhism in China during that time, said Wang Yi, di rector of the Chengdu Cultural Rel-

## Six killed, 48 injured in terror attack in London

LONDON, JUN 4 (PTI): Three knife-wielding attackers wearing fake suicide vests unleashed a terror rampage through central London, plowing a van into pedestrians on the iconic London Bridge and then running to a nearby market where they randomly stabbed multiple people, killing six and injuring 48.

eight-minutelong terror attack at the two key London landmarks last night came just days before the gen eral election on June 8. The three attackers were shot dead, police said.

The first incident was reported at the London Bridge when a van swerved off the road into

a crowd of pedestrians.

A white van driver came speeding veered off the road into the crowds of people who were walking along the pavement, an eye-witness was quoted as saying by BBC.

Within minutes, there were reports of a second attack at Borough Market on the south bank of the Thames where three men wielding knives 10 inches long began attack-ing passersby, even en-tering one restaurant to attack night diners.

Six people were killed in the attack, and at least 48 were taken to hospital, the Metropolitan police said.

"We took 48 patients to five hospitals across



London and treated a number of others at the scene for minor injuries, London Ambulance Service said in a statement.

'We declared a major incident and continue to work closely with other members of the emergency services at the scene," it said.

There was no immediate claim of responsi-bility. The British Transport Police said one of its officers was seriously injured after being stabbed as he responded to the incident, but his condition was not said to be life-threatening.

The three assailants shot dead by police were wearing fake suicide vests, police said today.

"The suspects were vearing what looked like explosive vests but these were later established to be hoaxes," Britain's head counter-terrorism

Mark Rowley said.

A large area of central London remained cordoned off and police told people to avoid the area, leaving tourists and revellers struggling to get home.

The investigation into the latest attack is being led by the Met Police s mand and Britain's Special Air Service (SAS) offi-cers have been deployed in central London.

The incidents, just four days before the general election on June 8, come less that two weeks after a suicide bomber targeted a Manchester concert on May 22, killing 22 victims.
On May 22, 22 people

were killed and 116 in-jured in a suicide bombing at Manchester Arena.

The attacker, identified as 22-year-old Salman Abedi, detonated a home-made bomb in the arena's foyer as crowds were leaving a performance by US sing-er Ariana Grande late in the evening. That terror attack stopped election campaigning for three days as troops were de-ployed to the streets and the UK's terror threat level was raised to "crit ical", meaning an attack was "imminent'

On March 22, six people died, including the attacker, and at least 50 people were injured in an attack near the Houses of Parliament.

Attacker Khalid Masood first drove his car at pedestrians on the pavement on West-minster Bridge before crashing into a perimeter fence. Masood, armed with a knife, then left the vehicle and ran towards Parliament, where he was shot dead by police.

### Vehicle numbers cross one crore mark in Delhi

New Delhi, Jun 4 (PTI): The number of registered vehicles in the national capital has crossed the one crore mark, amid growing concerns over rising pollution levels and poor traffic conditions in the city.

Data accessed from the transport department of Delhi government puts the total number of registered vehicles at 1,05,67,712 till May 25. There are 31,72,842 registered cars in the city.

The biggest chunk of the registered vehicles - 66,48,730 - in the city is, however, motor cycles and scooters that are known as major air polluters due to poor emission standards.

Other major categories of registered vehicles in the national capital include goods carriers (2,25,438), motor cab (1,18,424), moped (1,16,092), passenger three wheelers (1,06,082), goods three wheelers (68,692), buses (35,332), e-rickshaws (31,555) and maxi cabs (30,207), the data

Several reports suggest that vehicular pollution is one of the major contributors in polluting the air in the national capital.

Concerned over the increasing level of air pollution in Delhi, the National Green Tribunal had on November 26, 2014 barred all vehicles private cars, bikes, commercial vehicles, buses and trucks over 15 years old from plying in the capital.

In its recent audit study, EPCA (Environmental Pollution - Prevention and Control) had also found that Delhi has lakhs of vehicles plying without the man-datory 'pollution under control certificates.

The blatant violations, that potentially imperil the health of millions, have put the spotlight on around 970 centres in the city, that are certified to check the emission content of around 70 lakh vehicles in the city, the report had stated.

New Delhi, Jun 4 (PTI): The Aadhaar card has now been made mandatory for govern-ment subsidy on purchase of kerosene and benefits of Atal Pension Yojana.

Those availing kerosene subsidy or contributing for the pension scheme will now be required to furnish proof of possession of Aadhaar number or undergo the enrolment process to get the benefits, officials said

The last date to get the Aad-haar or enrolment for getting it will be September 30, in case of Kerosene subsidy.

For the Atal Pension Yoja-

na, the deadline for getting the Aadhaar is June 15, they said, quoting an official order.

However, till an Aadhaar card is obtained, ration card, driving licence, voter identity card, Kisan passbook with photo, job card issued under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS) and a cer tificate issued by a gazetted officer or a tehsildar will be considered as proof of identity for

the benefits. It has been also decided to link the Aadhaar number with the ration card issued to house-



holds availing the benefits or with the bank account for cash transfer benefit.

The Ministry of Oil and Natural Gas has introduced Direct Benefit Transfer through which subsidy is transferred directly to the bank accounts of the beneficiaries, who purchase the PDS kerosene at non-subsi-

The decision to make Aadhaar mandatory for these two schemes will prevent leakages of subsidies and ensure that the

beneficiaries get their due. For this, the central government has invoked Section 7 of the Aadhaar Act, 2016, which mandates that when the government gives subsidy, benefit or service from the Consolidated Fund of India (CFI), an individual can be asked to undergo authentication or furnish proof of possession of Aadhaar. The Centre allocates subsi-

dised kerosene to the states and Union Territories as affordable cooking fuel for domestic use, mainly to those living below the poverty line.

Under the Atal Pension Yo-

iana, which is available to all the citizens in the age group of 18-40 years, a subscriber would receive a minimum guaranteed pension of Rs 1,000 to Rs 5,000 per month, depending upon his contribution, from the age of 60

The same pension would be paid to the spouse of the subscriber and on the demise of both the subscriber and the spouse, the accumulated pension wealth is returned to the

## Victims not informed of developments in POCSO cases: PIL in HC

NEW DELHI, JUN 4 (PTI): Families of child victims of sexual assault are not being informed about the accused walking out on bail despite the law mandating that such information be con-veyed, a PIL in Delhi

High Court has said.

A bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Justice C Hari Shan-kar sought the stand of the Ministry of Law and Justice, the Delhi Police, and the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCP-CR) on the allegation made in the petition.

The plea, moved by the mothers of two vic-tims of sexual abuse, claimed that under the Protection of Children From Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act and Rules, the Special Juvenile Po-lice Unit (SJPU) or the local police "must keep the child or the parent or the guardian as the case may be, informed about the developments in the case".

The women alleged

that in the cases pertaining to their children, the provisions of the POCSO Act and Rules were not followed by the authorities as they were not informed when the accused persons had moved bail pleas or when they had been granted the relief.

The victims' families came to know that the accused persons were out on bail much later, the petition, filed through advocate Gautam Khazanchi, said.

The mothers claimed that they had informed the police, much before the accused had sought bail, that they were getting death threats, but this information was not placed before the trial court by the police.
