## Yeddyurappa does a Vajpayee, quits without facing floor test



New Delhi, May 19 (PTI): Karnataka Chief Minister BS Yeddyurappa today did what Atal Bihari Vajpayee had done over two decades ago --resign without facing a floor test.

Led by Vajpayee, the

BJP had in 1996 formed the government at the Centre and was asked to take a floor test.

Vajpayee -- who was sworn in by then President Shankar Dayal Sharma -- too did not have the numbers to back his claim.

Vajpayee had made an emotional speech in the Parliament before announcing his resignation. Lack of requisite numbers did not mean the BJP had served the motherland less, he had said.
The 13-day Vajpayee

government was later re-placed by the one led by H D Deve Gowda, whose son H D Kumaraswamy is now set to be the next chief minister of Karnataka with the Congress's support.

The three-day-old BIP government in Karnataka collapsed today, minutes before the scheduled trust vote, with Chief Minister Yeddyurappa resigning in a tame anti-climax to what prom ised to be an edge of the seat political thriller.

With defeat staring him in the face, Yed-dyurappa announced his decision to guit on the floor of the Assembly af-ter a brief emotion-laden speech


Though exuding confidence about winexuding ning the trust vote as the D-day loomed, Yed-dyurappa failed to muster the support of 7 additional MLAs required to ensure the longevity of his government.

Yeddyurappa's three day tenure as the chief minister of Karnataka also turned out to be one of the shortest in Indian history.
The 75-year-old BJP

leader was sworn in as the chief minister of Kar-nataka on May 17. He resigned before facing a Supreme Court-mandat-ed floor test today.

The BIP veteran's initiation to the league of chief ministers with tenures of a few days, however, happened over a decade ago. In 2007, Yeddyurappa had to resign as the chief minister of Karnataka after just eight days.

## Ex-diplomat gets 3 yrs in jail for spying for Pak ISI

NEW DELHI, MAY 19 (PTI): Former diplomat Madhuri Gupta, who had served at the Indian High Commission in Islamabad, was today sentenced to three years in jail for passing on sensitive informa-tion to Pakistan's ISI, with a Delhi court saving her actions caused a "severe security threat".

Additional Sessions Judge Sidharth Sharma gave her the maximum sentence for the offences of spying and wrongful com-munication of information protected under the law. bserving that an educated woman like her did not deserve any leniency.

Sixty-one-year-old who was the Second Secretary (Press & Information) at the high commission from 2007 till her arrest on April 22, 2010 during a visit here, was held guilty yesterday under var-ious provisions of the Official Secrets (OS) Act.

After passing the sen-tence, the court granted bail to Gupta to allow her to appeal against the con-viction and the sentence.

She was suspected by Indian intelligence agencies of spying for Pakistan's Inter-Services

Intelligence since 2008.

According to the prosecution, the Minis-

try of External Affairs received information that Gupta had been maintaining unauthorised contacts with Pakistani intelligence officials and was passing on sen-sitive official information personally as well through electronic means from her comput-er at her office and residence in Islamabad.

The prosecution had stated that she passed on the information to the ISI handlers through her e-mail account from October 2009 to April 2010.

The court said that Gupta was a modern ed-

ucated woman who had

served in different embassies and at the time of the offence, she was posted in a very sensitive position in the high com-

"Undoubtedly. from person of her stature, it was expected that she would act in a more responsible manner than an ordinary citizen as she was at a high position of trust but her actions tarnished the image of the country and has caused evere threat to the security of the country.

Therefore, she does not deserve any lenien-cy in punishment," the court said.

While convicting her, the court had said that the e-mails "passed on by the accused were categorically sensitive information which could have been useful to the enemy country... and its secrecy was of utmost importance".

Gupta was convict-ed under Sections 3 and 5 of the Official Secrets Act which attract a maximum sentence of three years and fine or both.

She had sought leni-ency from the court on the ground that she was a senior citizen, a single woman and was a victim of circumstances.

derstanding and cooperative partnership between India and China, the two great civilisations of Asia, he said.

I believe that our job at events like this one today is to expand friendship and understanding between the people of India and China , he said. Through our efforts to re-

Through our efforts to remember Tagore, we are doing our little bit for enhancing understanding and trust between our people. This will stand both our countries in good stead and will contribute in making the 21st century an Asian century , he said.

A large number of Tagore fans specially students of Peking University, which the poet visited during one of his two visits to China in 1924 and 1929, attended the meeting where some of them also sang his poetry in Chinese. A dance performance was also held.

His first visit is described, both in China as well as in India, as a major event in the literary circles of the two countries, Bambawale said.

This visit to China left a very strong impression on Rabindranath Tagore, and he made friendships here, especially with the young Chinese poet Xu Zhimo, who was his official translator during the trip, he said.

Upon his return to India, he established the world famous Cheena Bhawan at Shantiniketan with the idea that it would be a bridge for intellectual exchanges between our two coun-

tries. He appointed Professor Tan Yunshan as the first Director of Cheena Bhawan, who in turn did yeoman service for closer understanding between India and China, he said.

Professor Dong Youchen of Centre for South Asian Studies of the Beijing Foreign Studies University made an elaborate presentation about the impact made by Tagore and his poetry on China.

often in denial of their problems. Sometimes just talking to someone away from your family or friends and who is trained in listening and supporting young people

can be easier," he adds.
Addressing substance abuse problems
and mental health issues
among students, Dr Rasaily stressed that sending them to a rehab centre will not only hamper
their studies but will also
lower their self-esteem.

"With proper counseling and timely checkups, young patients can recover better in a more confidential manner," Dr Rasaily adds. It may be mentioned

## Disaster Mitigation: Informed Response Better Than Jerking Knees

Yes, it's that time of the year again

The pre-monsoon rains opened strong earlier last month and have already started scratching at the hill sides. The monsoon is scheduled to hit Kerala before this month is out and should officially debut in Sikkim by the World Environment Day on 05 June next month. And, if the nor'wester showers coursing through the State are any indication of what the mon-soon months will bring, Sikkim would be well advised to do much more by way of preparedness than the occasional preparedness meetings.

The State, in fact the entire region, needs no reminding of how fragile its hills are. The slopes here have a long history of slips and slides and if anyone bothered to spend time with some of the village elders, they could also learn of how settlements came to be settled along safer zones and more stable locations. That traditional knowledge was honed over generations of living here, but now "development" has been added to this organic lifestyle mix. Roads, projects, constructions and expansions are disruptors too powerful for even rural pragmatism to manage, hence the need for more informed preparedness and quicker, more organized responses.

Unfortunately for the cause of disaster manage ment awareness, the monsoon-opening landslips and road-blocks have bypassed Gangtok thus far in their severity if one were to ignore the sewage sinks and overflowing storm drains which mostly manifest after dark and are invariably cleared by the Gangtok Beautifiers before Gangtok wakes up. That, however, cannot be said for the districts, their roads and their habitations. The reason this is referred to as 'unfortunate' for disaster management awareness is because while areas beyond Gangtok are the ones which require better warning systems, more effective responses and more elaborate community-based training to minimize the destruction caused by monsoon calamities, the people who can influence decisions rarely see beyond Gangtok. Even the media has not effectively highlighted the problem of areas beyond the capital, in as much as rainfed disruptions are concerned. To understand how locational reactions work, take the case of two incidents. The 1997 landslides in Gangtok were unfortunate and the scale unprecedented. They rightfully led to the creation of a Civil Defence programme, formalization of new building bylaws and the no construction during monsoons rule. In the year 2004, Gyalshing and areas around Namchi were ravaged by severe landslides, mud-slips and flashfloods. And two years back, there was the Mantam hillside collapse, which, even though not monsoon-induced, was more evidence of the fragility of the slopes here and the need to save the hills. One still does not know what really caused it, or what policy course-corrections that incident has resulted in. Ditto for the flashfloods and glacial lakes-threat reported from North Sikkim over the recent years. In all these cases, the administration responded to a natural calamity, carried out rescue and relief operations, but, as mentioned, one is yet to hear of any policy decisions which could effectively mitigate such devastations in the future.

Every time a landslide occurs or a road-widening work collapses, as is commonly reported from West Sikkim, one hears complaints against unplanned constructions, irresponsible drainage and unsafe worksites. There is nothing new in these observations. Still, after all these years, the districts remain kneejerk in their response to the annual monsoons.

All this, despite the fact that just about everybody, everywhere, is participating in disaster risk management committee meetings all over Sikkim, and yet when the first chance arrives to display their training and commitment, they are found wanting. The problem is neither with the training nor with the individuals, it is with motivation. Sikkim is speaking of disaster risk management committees not because the people demanded it or even knew of it, these are being set up only because a central directive ordered it and UNDP funds it. That said, Sikkim could genuinely use some scientific and organized response to natural calamities. Instead of just making a token presence in such committees, the members should realize that every village in the State needs to work out a coherent and rehearsed response to calamities and set up a working advance warning system. If Sikkim continues to drag its feet, the State will continue paying the price for it every year.

## Palestinian Women: a history of female resistance in Gaza and the West Bank

utside observers tend to imagine the face of Gaza as resolutely male: the bearded Hamas "militant", or the young man hurling stones across the border fence. But Palestinian women, both in Gaza and the West Bank, have a significant presence as activists, protesting against an unjust occupation, but also as the backbone of a fragment-

ed and demoralised society.

Women have been active in the Palestinian struggle since its early days. In the 1920s, they protested side by side with men against British control of their country. They formed charitable organisations and expressed themselves politically.

After the state of Israel was created in 1948, the majority of Palestinians were forced to flee into exile, and here too women played a key role as protectors of their families, and repositories of the "national story". It was vital that Palestinians, wherever they were in the world, did not forget what had happened and continued to insist on their right of return to their homeland. Women passed their memories of Palestine down to subse-

#### PARTICIPATING IN POLITICS

In the 1960s, with the emergence of a Palestinian liberation movement, dedicated to regaining the lost homeland, some women turned to more militant activities. Leila Khalid, for example, hijacked several airliners on behalf of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine and became a familiar face in the Western media.

Gradually, women also started to engage in formal politics, through membership of the main Palestinian political factions. Although Palestinians tend to be socially conservative and are anxious to shield women and girls from what might be considered "dishonourable" or nontraditional behaviour, many younger women found a new kind of freedom through education and political mobilisation.

A largely non-violent intifada (or "uprising") be-gan in 1987. Women, men and children combined efforts to resist the 20-year occupation of their land. They did so in innovative ways, for example by establishing alternative educational facilities for children after all the schools were closed, creating an alternative economy based on home produce, as well as engaging in large-scale protests.

There were also attempts at dialogue between Palestinian and Israeli women. For example, in July 2006, members of the International Women's Commission for a Just and Sustainable Palestinian-Israeli Peace (IWC) convened an emergency meeting in Athens. They urged the international community to intervene. In their words:

"Civilians, mainly women and children, are pay-ing the price daily for this vicious cycle of retaliation and counter-retaliation. This is a time of great danger ... If no action is taken today, tomorrow will be too late."





Although no resolution came out of this or sim ilar calls, initiatives involving women from the two sides were judged to have been among the most promising.

#### TELLING THE WORLD

Such activities ended in 2000, with the start of the second intifada. The resistance was no longer a shared endeavour involving all sectors of society

– it was an armed confrontation. Women suffered greatly from rising levels of violence and decreas-

ing security for civilians.

No one felt safe. Girls travelling from their homes to university were likely to experience harassment at Israeli army checkpoints and, as a result, many parents started to keep their daughters at home, and even to marry them off at the earliest possible opportunity; the age of marriage began to fall.

As the economic situation deteriorated, wom-

en had fewer opportunities for employment. Incidences of mental illness rose and women exhibited deep anxiety about the safety of their children.

Many Palestinians feel that they have no control over their own lives. Under a harsh Israeli regime, it has been very difficult to exercise agency and Palestinian political parties have seemed weak and ineffectual. The Islamist party Hamas seemed to offer a more assertive form of op-position, and many women were attracted by its grass-roots organising and evident ability to confront the Israeli occupation. Some became militants.

While it may be tempting

to argue that the participa-tion of women in violence is a sign of a society that has

lost its way, the reality is more complex. Many Palestinian women point out that their community is powerless; it has neither the political leadership nor the weapons to fight a conventional war. Instead, it relies on all its members to participate and "tell the world" what is happening to them

By protesting at the Gaza-Israel border to mark the anniversary of al-nakbah ("the catastrophe"), Palestinians are reminding the world that they were dispossessed 70 years ago and this injustice has still not been remedied. Palestinian women, as much as men, have a vital stake in finding a solution to the conflict, that will provide safety and certainty for the next generation.

## When did the lights first come on in the universe? A galaxy close to the dawn of time gives a clue

It is springtime in the Northern hemisphere. Countless buds that have been waiting patiently on the stems and branches of trees and shrubs are now blossoming into life. The cosmic equivalent of this season is the time between a few hundred million and a billion years after the Big Bang. This is when the first stars and galaxies ignited, spewing light into the dark universe.

It is a time in the history of the universe that we are desperate to chart, because it represents part of the cos-mological story that we have yet to un-derstand. Now astronomers have de-tected oxygen in a galaxy further away than ever before – and it existed just 500m years after the Big Bang. The results, published in Nature, are huge-ly important as they provide new insights into when the first stars formed.

The period of this "cosmic dawn" is important not only because this is when the first galaxies were born, but a crucial cosmic transition also took place. In this process, atoms in the electrically neutral intergalactic medium – a wide sea of hydrogen gas surrounding galaxies – were bombard-ed with ultraviolet radiation escaping from the first galaxies. This stripped away electrons from atoms and made

the gas charged, or "ionised".

The event, called the Epoch of Reionisation, is still mysterious. We'd like to know - or better yet, see - when this process started. Part of that quest involves finding the most distant galaxies. - when this

When we look out into the universe we detect light that has taken some appreciable time to traverse the gulf that separates us from other stars and galaxies. The light from the screen you are reading this on has taken about a third of a nanosecond to reach your eyes. Light from the nearest star beyond our sun takes four years to reach us. Amazingly, light from the galaxy at the centre of the new study, called MACS1149-JD1, has taken 13 billion years to be detected here on Earth. That means we see MACS1149-JD1 as it was 13 billion years in the past, around 500m years after the Big Bang.

POWERFUL GAZE

Using a telescope called the Atacama Large Millimetre/sub-millimetre Array (ALMA), the scientists detected a strong signal (an emission line) within the dis signal (all emission line) within the dis-tant galaxy. Just as a prism disperses the light of the sun into a rainbow spectrum, we can disperse the light of distant gal-axies, too. This is called spectroscopy. Emission lines are bright spikes in the spectra of galaxies that originate from different elements that can each release

light of a very specific energy.

This particular emission line came from ionised oxygen gas. Its presence tells us that the galaxy was forming stars at the time, because the energy required to ionise it must have come from massive, hot, young stars.

If we measured the same type of gas here on Earth, we would detect it at a wavelength of 0.088 millimetres. But other galaxies are receding away from us due to cosmic expansion, and this causes the light they emit to increase in wavelength during the time it takes for the photons to reach us. The more distant a galaxy is, the larger the increase in wavelength.

This is called redshift, and it ulti-

mately tells us the ratio between the size of the universe when the light was first emitted and the size of the universe today. The oxygen emission line observed in MACS1149-JD1 is actually detected at 0.88 millimetres its wavelength has been stretched by a factor of 10. This means that at the time the light was emitted, the uni-verse was a factor of 10 times smaller than it is today, and just four per cent of its present age.

In this way, the ability to detect

emission lines in distant galaxies allows us to pinpoint at what stage in cosmic history we are seeing them. But of course, the most distant galaxies are also the faintest – you need ever more powerful telescopes if you want to peer back further.

ALMA (consisting of 66 individual telescopes working together) is an in-credibly powerful telescope – it is rev-olutionising our view of the early universe. Not only is it providing exquisite sensitivity, but operates in part of the electromagnetic spectrum that gives access to a wide range of emission lines.

To help matters, the team also exploited a natural telescope: a massive cluster of galaxies. Light from MACS1149-JD1 has had to pass through this intervening cluster on its journey to ALMA. This is so massive that it significantly warps spacetime, meaning that the light is "bent" in a process called gravitational lensing. Gravitational lensing amplifies the brightness of MACS1149-JD1, making

INDIRECT GLIMPSE OF FIRST STARS MACS1149-JD1 is not the most distant galaxy on record, but what this new study adds to our understanding is an insight into the history of the formation of the galaxy. This happened hundreds of millions of years before the current observation, and much further back than even the most distant galaxy known.

In fact, the presence of oxygen in the galaxy tells us that star formation

must have been going on for some time in MACS1149-JD1. That's because oxvgen can only be formed within stars in a process called stellar nucleosynthesis. But what we don't know is when those stars first ignited.

By combining data from the Hubble Space Telescope, the European South ern Observatory's Very Large Telescope and the Spitzer Space Telescope, the au-thors made a model of the "stellar pop-ulation" within MACS1149-JD1. This allowed them to estimate the mixture of stars that give rise to the emission from the galaxy observed in certain bands of the electromagnetic spectrum.

The model involves estimating the "star formation history" of the galaxy, describing the rate of production of stars in the past. The modelling suggests that, in order to produce the observed emission, stars must have started forming just 250m years after the Big Bang, when the universe was just two per cent of its present age. In oth-er words, MACS1149-JD1 was already a fairly well established galaxy, even at

this early time.

This is a huge scientific accomplishment as it is currently impossible years after the Big Bang. However, the new James Webb Space Telescope, which is due for launch in 2020, may be able to do so.

But until then, thanks to the new study, we now have a way of indirect-ly studying when stars first formed in ancient galaxies like MACS1149-JD1. In effect, by observing the blossom, astronomers have estimated when the bud first opened.

## Nadal, Djokovic to meet for 51st time in Rome

Rome, May 19 (AFP): Novak Djokovic set up an Italian Open semi-final blockbuster against old rival Rafael Nadal after both former world number one play-ers battled back in thrilling lasteight clashes.

The Serb fought back against Kei Nishikori to earn a 2-6, 6-1, 6-3 win while top seed Nadal continued his clay court dom-ination with a 4-6, 6-1, 6-2 defeat of Italy's Fabio Fognini.

On a dramatic and exhausting day in the Italian capital, there were also quarter-final wins for three-time winner Maria Shara-pova and defending men's champion Alexander Zverev

Djokovic, seeded 11th after his elbow injury problems, beat nis elbow injury problems, beat Japan's top player for the 12th time in succession.

"It was a fantastic match, we went toe-to-toe all the way to last shot. He started, he was flawless from both ends," said Djokovic who will face Nadal for the 51st time, holding a narrow 26-24 advantage.

Nadal beat Djokovic in their last meeting in May in 2017 in a Madrid semi-final and the Serb will be out for revenge after winning seven in a row prior to that.
"We will see tomorrow. I've

not played so many matches in the last six months," said Djokovic whose last semi-final spot was in Eastbourne on the eve of Wimbledon in 2017.

"Physically, I'm OK. I just need some rest now and then go out and give it everything I've got." Second-ranked Nadal needs to lift an eighth career ti-tle at the Foro Italico on Sunday to return to the top of the rankings after losing that position to Roger Federer last week. #### 8 killed in blasts at cricket match in Afghanistan

#### North Korea military officer defects to S. Korea: Yonhap

SEOUL, MAY 19 (AFP): A North Korean militar officer, accompanied by a civilian, defected to the South across the Yellow Sea today, a South Korean news report said, citing a government source.

"A small boat was spotted in waters off the north of Baengnyeong Island" near the inter-Korean border, the source told Yonhan news agency, adding that the officer, who holds the rank of major, and a civilian

were aboard the vessel.

"They expressed willingness to defect," he said. A Korea Coast Guard

official said relevant au-thorities were investigat-ing the case, declining to give details.

The defection was the 14th involving a North Korean soldier since 2000.

The last defection by a North Korean military officer took place in 2008, YTN TV said.

It is the first defection by any North Korean since a historic summit between the two Koreas which saw their leaders agree to pursue the denuclearization of the peninsula and a per-

manent peace. In November last year, North Korean soldier drove to the heavily-guard-ed border at speed and ran across under a hail of bullets from his own side.

He was hit multiple times in the dramatic de-fection at Panmunjom truce village.

In 2012 a North Korean soldier walked unchecked through rows of electrified fencing and surveillance cameras prompting Seoul to sack three field commanders for a security lapse.

More than 30,000 North Korean civilians have fled their homeland but it is very rare for them to cross the closely guard-

## No decision about H4 visas is final until rulemaking process is completed: USCIS

WASHINGTON, MAY 19 (PTI): No decision about H-4 visas is final until the rulemaking process is completed, a senior US official has said, days after over 100 lawmakers urged the Trump administration to continue granting work authorisation to certain dependent spouses of non-immigrant workers holding H-1B visas, the most sought-after among Indian IT professionals.

The Trump administration is planning to revoke a rule that makes spouses of thousands of immigrant workers

eligible to work while in the US, a move that could have a devastating impact on tens of thousands of Indians

H-4 is issued to the spouse of H-1B visa holders, a significantly large number of whom are high-skilled professionals from India. They had obtained work permits under a special order issued by the previous

Obama administration.

The move to end the Obama-era rule could have an impact on more than 70,000 H-4 visas holders, who have work permits.

"No decision about H-4 vi-

sas is final until the rulemaking process is completed," Philip Smith, a US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS)

spokesperson told PTI.
This comes days after more than 130 influential lawmak ers wrote a letter to the US Homeland Security Secretary not to rescind the Obama administration's decision to provide work authorisation to certain categories of H-4 visas, which are mainly spouses of H-1B visas.

All indications so far, including the Spring Agenda, reveal that the Trump admin-

istration is planning to end the Obama-era rule allowing spouses of H1-B visa holders

to work legally in the US.

Smith said the agency is considering a number of policy and regulatory changes to carry out the President's Buy American, Hire American Executive Order, including a thorough review of employment-based visa programmes.

The USCIS is focused on en-

suring the integrity of the immigration system and protecting the interests of the US workers, and is committed to reforming employment-based immigration programmes so they benefit the American people to the greatest extent possible, he said.

"USCIS continues reviewing the employment-based visa programmes which includes a new economic analysis. USCIS anticipates any proposed rule would be published in June 2018," Smith told PTI. He was responding to

questions on the letter to the Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen signed by more than 130 lawmakers in this regard.
"The opportunity for H-4 visa holders to work has made

our economy stronger, while providing relief and economic support to thousands of spouses, mostly women, who have resided in the United States for the letter said.

"Many are on the path to permanent residency and would already be permanent residents if not for the decades-long employment backlogs. Rescinding the rule will hurt the compet itiveness of US employers the US economy, as well as H-4 accompanying spouses and their families. We strongly urge you to reconsider this action," the lawmakers wrote.

## More than 100 killed in Cuba airliner crash

HAVANA, MAY 19 (AFP): A Cuban state airways plane with 110 passengers and crew on board crashed shortly after taking off from Havana, killing all but three people on board in a mass of twisted and smoldering fuselage.

Cuban state media reported that three women had been pulled alive from the mangled wreckage and were in critical

condition in hospital.

They were the only known survivors from the nearly 40-year-old Boeing 737, operated by Cubana de Aviacion. It crashed into a field close to a wooded area near Jose Marti airport, sending a thick column of acrid smoke into the air.

The 110 people aboard included six Mexican crew, said the Mexico-based company that leased the plane, Global Air, also known as Aeroliness Pampith lineas Damojh.

Two victims were Argentine, the country's for-eign ministry said. Most of the others were Cuban. according to state media.

The plane -- carrying

104 passengers -- was almost completely destroyed in the crash and subsequent fire. Firefighters raced to the scene along with a fleet of am-bulances to put out the blaze, as emergency per-



sonnel combed through the wreckage.

What appeared to be one of the wings of the plane was wedged among scorched tree trunks, but the main fuselage was al-

most entirely destroyed. Cuba's President Miguel Diaz-Canel, who visited the scene, said an investigation has been opened into the disaster, and that its findings would be made public as soon as possible. A press conference was scheduled for 1900 GMT on Saturday.

The 58-year-old president, who succeeded Raul Castro as the communist island's leader only last month, appeared aghast as he surveyed the recovery efforts, wearing a shortsleeved green shirt and surrounded by officials.

He said an investigation into the cause of the

accident was underway.

Cuba declared two
days of national mourning.

Raul Castro sent con dolences to families of the victims of the "catastrophic accident," a statement read, as Russian President Vladimir Putin and a string of Latin American leaders also expressed sympathy.

Airport sources said the plane took off at 12:08 pm (1608 GMT) heading for the eastern city of Hol-guin, 670 kilometers (415

miles) away. From the supermarket where he works near the airport, Jose Luis, 49, said he could see the plane taking off before it banked and plunged to

the ground.
"I saw it taking off. All of a sudden, it made a turn, and went down. We were all amazed," he said.

Yasniel Diaz, a 21-yearold musician, said the pilot appeared to attempt an emergency landing, but crashed instead.

"The explosion shook everything," he said.

"I started running, I was so afraid"

Images from Cuban television showed rescue workers at the scene removing what appeared to be a survivor on a stretcher as rain began to fall.

Global Air said the plane was flying with a crew of six Mexicans -- the pilot, co-pilot, three flight attendants and a mainte

nance technician. In Mexico City, anguished relatives and colleagues of the crew gathered outside the company's offices demanding information -- some of them hugging and crying. "I was friends with the

captain, with the co-pilot, rith the head flight dant," said a former Global Air employee, 44-year-old Ana Marlene Covarrubias.

"When I heard the news on the phone, I thought it was one of those jokes people play," she told AFP.

SANTA FE, MAY 19 (AP): The Texas student charged in the shooting at Santa Fe High School described planning the attack in pri-vate journals, including a plan to kill himself, posted an image on Facebook of a "Born to Kill" shirt and used his father's shotgun and pistol in the rampage that left 10 dead and 10 wounded, authorities said.

A motive wasn't immediately clear, but Gov. Greg Abbott said Dimitrios Pagourtzis, 17, wrote about planning the attack in journals on his computer and in his cellphone that police obtained. That was inconsistent with the portrait painted by his friends a reserved young man, an athlete who had discussed wanting to own guns but didn't talk of killing people.

It may have been what Pagourtzis hoped would happen, as according to an affidavit filed Friday when he was charged with capital murder, he told investi-gators that he didn't shoot students he liked "so he could have his story told."

"Not only did he want commit the shooting but he wanted to commit suicide after the shooting." Abbott said, adding that Pagourtzis told authorities he "didn't have the cour-

age" to take his own life.
Pagourtzis was held
without bond in the Galveston County jail on the capital murder charges, said the county sheriff, Henry Trochesset. Abbott said the two guns used in the at-tack were owned legally by his father. It was not clear whether the father knew his son had taken them.

The governor also said explosive devices including a Molotov cocktail had been found in the suspect-ed shooter's home and a vehicle as well as around the school and nearby.

Abbott said at a news conference that "unlike Parkland, unlike Sutherland Springs, there were not those types of warning signs." He was referring to the February 14 school shooting in Flori-da and one in November inside a church in a town near San Antonio.

Abbott said the early investigation showed no prior criminal history for Pagourtzis no arrests and confrontations with law enforcement.

That same Facebook profile that included pic-tures of the "Born to Kill" shirt which one classmate records and found no one a recruit or a person in their delayed entry pool.

A woman who answered the phone at a number associated with the Pagourtzis family deed to speak with the AP. "Please don't call us.

Give us our time right now, thank you," she said. Classmates described

Pagourtzis as quiet, an avid video game play-er who routinely wore a black trench coat and black boots to class. He had played football on the school's junior varsity squad and danced as part of a church group. Those who know him expressed shock he might be involved in the killings.

Branden Auzston, 17, a junior at Santa Fe High School, said he was sitting in his history class watching a movie when he heard the fire alarm. At that moment, he thought it was just a fire drill, so he and his girlfriend, Daisy Sullivan, walked outside the building with other students. But Auzston said he thought it was odd the school was having another fire drill after having had

one about two weeks ago.
"We go outside like
normal. We're told to get in the grass," he said.

Auzston said once he was outside, he heard two bangs but thought it was either a door slamming or the lid of a dumpster slamming down.

"Then I see Mr. Vaughn run hysterically and screaming, 'Just run.' At that point you have 500 students just running off to get as far off as possible."

Daniel Vaughn is a history teacher at the high school.

Tristen Patterson, a 16-year-old junior at Sante Fe, considered Pagourtzis a friend. He said Pagourtzis was into video games that simulated war, and that he sometimes talked about guns firearms that he liked or wanted to get. But he never talked about killing people or anything like that," Patterson said.

He said Pagourtzis didn't show signs of being bullied but also rarely talked about himself. In one of their classes, Pagourtzis would sometimes enter the room "acting a little bit down or sad. A little bit sluggish," Patterson said

But he never talked

about why," he said.
"You would never think he would do anything like this." Michael Farina, 17, said he grew up with Pagourtzis. He said Pagourtzis knew a lot about guns and remembered him asking which one he should get when he was older.

## China lands strategic bombers in SCS for 1st time; US sees red Logan, called the exercise an act of

BEILING, MAY 19 (PTI): China has for the first time landed strategic bombers on an island in the disputed South China Sea, drawing sharp reaction from the US which said that the move will "raise tensions and destabilise the region".

China's air force said that its fighter jets, including an H-6K bomber, had recently conducted take-off and landing training on an island reef in the resource-rich South China Sea (SCS).

The training had elevated the

air force's abilities of "reaching its full territory, assaulting in full time and space, and striking in full scope", the Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post quoted the People's Liberation Air Force

(PLAF) as saying.

Wang Minliang, a military expert, was quoted as saying that the bombers' take-off and landing training was "beneficial to enhance the real combat abil-ity against all kinds of security threats in the sea".

People's Daily, the Chinese Communist Party's official newspaper, yesterday posted a video on its Twitter account featuring a series of the H-6K's training including take-off programmes, including and flying.

The Chinese move invoked sharp reaction from the US which said that it will "raise tensions and destabilise the region".

A spokesman at the Pentagon, Lieutenant Colonel Christopher

"China's continued militarisation of disputed features in the South China Sea", the Post report said. Bonnie Glaser, a China secu-

rity expert at the Centre for Stra-tegic and International Studies in Washington, said the location of the H-6K landing was believed to be Woody Island Yongxing island in Chinese on which China's Sansha city government is located.

China had established Sansha City, a prefecture-level city of Hain-an Province, in 2012 to administer the South China Sea islands identified by China as Xisha, Zhongsha and Nansha island groups and their surrounding waters.

"I believe this is the first time a bomber has landed in the South

China Sea. No doubt the H-6K will soon land on an island in Spratly (Islands) since hangers there are built to accommodate bombers," the Post quoted Glaser as saying.

In early May, the US said that it was prepared to take mea-sures against militarisation of the South China Sea, after Beijing reportedly installed new missiles on outposts in the Spratly Islands known in China as the Nansha Islands that are also claimed by

Vietnam and the Philippines.
China claims almost all of the
South China Sea but Vietnam, the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and

The US is periodically deploying its naval ships and fighter planes to assert freedom of navigation.

## Malaysia's Najib summoned to anti-corruption agency: report

Kuala Lumpur, May 19 (AFP): Scandal-tainted former Malaysian leader Najib Razak has been summoned to appear before the country's anti-corruption authorities next week as part of an anti-graft investigations, state media has reported.

Najib, 64, unexpectedly lost a May 9 election to a political coalition that had focused on allegations that he oversaw the looting of billions of dollars from sov-ereign wealth fund 1MDB in a vast conspiracy of fraud and money-laundering stretching around the world

Najib was already barred from leav-ing Malaysia in the wake of the election, and police seized large amounts of cash, jewels and luxury items from his home



and other sites last week.

State-run Bernama news agency said Najib had been ordered to appear before the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC) next Tuesday.

"So far, he is asked to turn up next Tuesday to enable us to record his state-ment relating to SRC International," Bernama quoted an MACC source as saying

in the report issued late Friday.

SRC International was a subsidiary
of 1MDB before being placed directly under the finance ministry in 2012. Najib was both prime minister and finance minister at the time.

Hundreds of millions of dollars

missing, in just one compo wide-ranging 1MDB affair.

## Navy's all-women crew to reach Goa after sailing around globe

PANAJI, MAY 19 (PTI): Over eight months after it set sail from Goa, the all-women crew of the Indian Navy on board the naval vessel INSV Tarini, will return to the state on Monday after the historic circumnavigation of the globe.

Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman will welcome the all-women crew when it arrives near Panaii from where they had embarked on the journey on September 10

"The Defence Minister and Navy Chief Admiral Sunil Lanba will be present for the flag-in ceremony of the ship near Panaji on Monday," a Navy spokesperson said.

The expedition named 'Navika Sagar Parikrama' is led by Lieutenant Commander Vartika Joshi and it is the first-ever Indian circumnavigation of the globe by an all-women crew, the spokesperson added.

The crew also included Lt-Commanders Pratibha Jamwal and Swati P, and Lieutenants Aishwarya Boddapati, S Vijaya Devi and Payal Gupta.

The six women officers trained under Captain Dilip Donde, the first Indian to solo-circumnavigate the globe in 2009-2010, the Navy offi-

The expedition was sailed in six legs, with stopovers at



## Bohemian Rhapsody trailer criticized for ignoring Freddie Mercury's sexuality

This year's release of Bohemian Rhapsody describes the end of a tumultuous production, but the drama around the Freddie Mercury/Queen biopic is not yet over. Television producer and scriptwrit-er Bryan Fuller (Hannibal, American Gods) took to Twitter after this week's release of the first Bohemian Rhapsody trailer, calling out what he saw as an overt erasure of Mercury's queer identity, demonstrating scenes of the singer flirting with women but making no mention of his same

"Anyone else mildly an-noyed that the Bohemian Rhapsody trailer features gay/ bi superstar Freddie Mercury flirting with and twirling with a woman but no indication of his love of men?" he wrote.

Fuller argues that the trail-er favours Mercury's relationship with women as opposed to his ones with men while also highlighting the absence of the singer's AIDS diagnosis from the synopsis. Instead, it's simply referred to as "a life-threatening illness." Fuller is an openly gay



credits throughout his ca-reer, and his work has often emphasized sexual themes and imagery. Starz Network's 2017 series American Gods featured an intricate same-sex encounter between an Omani businessman and his Ifrit cab-driver, leading to one of the year's most soulful, memorable, and explicitly erotic television moments.

While Fuller's mentions

on Twitter erupted with both support and derision, he articulated that his criticisms were fixated on 20th Century Fox's marketing, and on the general awareness of Mercury's sexual orientation among Americans. Somewhat ironically, Queen's music has become tive part of American sports leitmotifs, with "We Will Rock You" a favorite standard among stadium crowds.

Bohemian Rhansody's production has been fraught from the start, including the eventual addition of a new director. with Dexter Fletcher stepping in to complete production and post-production after the termination of disgraced filmmaker Bryan Singer from the project late last year. Fletcher may or may not receive full director's credit when the film releases on November 2. Fuller's criticisms seem

especially poignant in light of this directorial switch; re-placing an openly bisexual director - though, it should be

minor - with a straight director may give some Queen fans immediate pause. Choosing to describe the singer's terminal battle with AIDS as a "life-threatening illness" in the YouTube description, which is likely pulled from Fox's official synopsis, does little to rally comprehension of the historically devastating and discriminatory syndrome. While Rami Malek - a straight actor - plays Mercury in the film, all ac-counts indicate that same-sex relationships will be featured in the script, with Aaron Mc-Cusker cast to play Mercury's long-term partner Jim Hutton.

Even if the film shapes up as a successful draw at the box office, the audience for the Bo-hemian Rhapsody trailer on YouTube will arguably exceed that of the finished film. Fuller made it clear that 20th Century Fox had an opportunity to circulate important details and educate audiences about a creative individual who was both an inspirational rock star and queer icon, but chose, in the end, to #HetWash their marketing.
