Ready for dialogue with Mamata: Bimal Gurung



New Delhi, Jan 11 (PTI): Gorkha Janmukti Morcha leader Bimal Gurung today expressed his willingness to hold dialogue with West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee to defuse the crisis in Darjeeling and asserted that his fight was for Gorkha identity.

was for Gorkha identity.

In his first direct interaction with reporters following a long and violent agitation in Darjeeling last year, Gurung also rejected Banerjee's accusation that he was a separatist, saying his party's demands were within the purview of Indian Constitution and he believed in national integrity.

integrity.

He claimed that the state police had implicated him and his party's workers in false criminal cases and sought an independent enquiry into

His party leaders said Gurung was booked in over 350 cases and had been on a run before the Supreme Court asked the police to not take any coercive measure against him after he filed a plea

there.
Asked if he was willing to hold dialogue with Banerjee, he answered in affirmative.

"I'm ready for dialogue. Dialogue is the way ahead," he said.

Though his party has been demanding a separate state of Gorkhaland to be carved out of West Bengal, he did not touch upon the issue in his today's comments.

"Our agitation is for Gorkha identity," he said.

He said he had nothing against the people of Bengal but the language and culture of Gorkhas were distinct from them and whatever they were demanding was within the ambit of the Constitution.

Gurung accused the state government of acting in an "one-sided" manner following the start of an agitation in Darjeeling in June last year.

Eleven Gorkhas died in police and other violent action, he said.

Gurung also appealed for peace and asked his supporters to stay away from any illegal activity.

'Virtual ID':Sr lawyers opposing Aadhaar in SC refrain from taking stand

New DELHI, JAN 11 (PTI): Senior advocates, who have been leading the challenge against the Aadhaar scheme in the Supreme Court, today refrained from making any commitment on whether they would oppose the Centre's fresh move to introduce the latest concept of 16-digit 'Virtual

"I do not have an opinion on this. I don't know anything," Divan, who has been leading the arguments in the apex court against the 12-digit Aadhaar number, said.

Datar also said he did not know what the Centre was doing and added that he was "clueless" about how a Virtual ID would help address the issue of privacy, especially in rural areas.

Sikkim Organic Day 2018 to celebrate "transforming agriculture for a better world"

SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 11 JAN:

Sikkim Organic Day 2018 will be celebrated with the theme 'Transforming Agriculture for a Better World' with a series of activities on 17 and 18 Jan at Saramsa Garden in Ranipool, East Sikkim. The event will be organized by Food Security & Agriculture Development and Horticulture & Cash Crops Development Department [FSAD&HCCDD] and will have the participation of farmers from different parts of the State along with stakeholders and delegates from in and outside the State.

It has to be mentioned here that the Prime Minister Narendra Modi had declared Sikkim as the first Organic Farming State in the country on 18 Jan in 2016. Following the same, the Chief Minister Pawan Chamling announced that 18 Jan will be celebrated as 'Sik-

kim Organic Day' every year.

The two-day mega event will have display of flowers, fruits, vegetables, roots and tubers, spices, mushrooms, medicinal plants, cereals,



pulses and seeds of the State at the venue. The event will also have competition in cabbage, cauliflowers, tomato and broccoli in vegetable category and in cymbidium orchids in flower category. The department has announced to present the Progressive Farmer Award to eight progressive farmers [two from each district] of the State. The award carries the cash prize

Addressing the press conference, FSAD&HCCDD secretary, Khorlo Bhutia informed that Acharya Bal Krishna from Patanjali Ayurveda, Haridwar is also scheduled to attend the celebration among other dignitaries. He informed that workshops on various topics of Organic Farming will have experts and scientists from the State and Central Departments

and organizations. He added that the workshop will also be attended by 300 progressive farmers of the State on each day. He further appealed to all stakeholders for their participation to encourage farmers and to encourage them to increase the production.

The Secretary mentioned that following the announcement of the state government to ban vegetables from outside the State the departmental officials and field functionaries have been working on a war-footing basis on the field.

"We have been visiting wards and GPUs across the State and interacting with farmers. We have found that farmers are very happy and excited with the announcement of the government and it will provide a better market for their produce," he said.

He added that the department has been running its area expansion programme and providing all necessary technical and other support to farmers.

The present requirement of vegetables in the State is 1.2 metric tons per year with the State presently producing 80,000 metric tons of vegetables per year, he informed.

"We are very positive and with the support of famers and concerned stakeholders we will able to meet the remaining 40,000 metric tons by the end of March this year," he said.

He added that the govern-

making Sikkim a self-sustainable in vegetable production.

"We have been working on war-footing basis and everyone has to work together to provide pure and organic produce to the people of Sikkim. This decision is for the better health of the people of Sikkim," Mr Bhutia said. BJYM commences eight-day motorbike rally in WB

KOLKATA, JAN 11 (PTI): The Bharatiya Janata Yuva Morcha (BJYM), the youth wing of the BJP, to-day kick started its eightday motorbike rally to mark Swami Vivekanan-da's birth anniversary

The BJYM alleged that despite an order from the Calcutta High Court, the police tried to stop the bike rally at New Digha in West Midnapore dis-trict, the southern tip of the state.

"We had requested to stop the rally as we were waiting for the order from the division bench of high court," West Mid-

napore Additional SP (rural) Indrajit Basu said. The high court yes-terday allowed the bike rally, the permission for which was refused by the police saying a large number of police person-nel have been deployed for the Gangasagar Mela.

A division bench of the High Court today rejected an appeal of the state government that pleaded for postpone-ment of the rally that is scheduled to culminate at Coochbehar in the northern part of West Bengal on January 18.

Police sources said many BJYM activists did not have proper docu-ments of the bikes they

are riding, but it was de-nied by the organisation. "The allegations are absurd. The police only tried to stop the rally to prove their loyalties to their masters in the Tri-namool Congress," BJYM state president Debjit Sarkar told PTI. State BJP president

Dilip Ghosh said the TMC is afraid of the growth of BJP in the state and that is why they are resorting

to such cheap politics.

Training session on mushroom cultivation held at Rumtek

GANGTOK. 11 IAN [PIB]: A daylong training session on organic oyster mushroom cultivation was jointly organized by Indian Council of Agricultural Research, National Organic Farming Re-search Institute, Tadong, Gangtok and ICAR Directorate of Mushroom Research, Himachal Pradesh on 10 Jan at Sajong village in Rumtek, East Sikkim under the aegis of Tribal Sub Plan.

Twenty-eight farmers from the village participated in the training. The programme was headed by ICAR-NOFRI Director, Dr. RK Avasthe and ICAR Directorate of Mushroom Research, Solan, Dr VP Sharma

of the participants for their willingness to embrace mushroom cultivation on a commercial scale. He emphasized the nutritional, societal and economic role which

stand they are likely to take in the apex court. The UIDAI had yes-terday introduced the concept of 'Virtual ID', which an Aadhaar card holder can generate from its website and give out for various purposes, including SIM verification, instead of sharing the actual 12-digit biometric

ID. They have the option of not sharing their Aadhaar number at the time

of authentication.

The Virtual ID will be a temporary and revoca-ble 16 digit random number mapped to a person's Aadhaar number and the Aadhaar-issuing body will start accepting it from March 1, 2018.

From June 1, 2018 it will be compulsory for all agencies that undertake au-thentication to accept the Virtual ID from their users.

WB govt asks deptts to plan early to meet projects' deadlines

KOLKATA, JAN 11 (PTI): The West Bengal government today asked all its departments to plan ear-ly for timely execution of various projects.

In a directive, the West Bengal Finance Department said it has been observed that more than 50 per cent of the total expenditure is incurred during the last quarter of a fiscal year.

This happens in spite of 33 per cent and 75 per cent of the Plan Budget being released on April 1 and September 1, respectively, the notification is-

sued yesterday said.

The cause for this "lopsided expenditure is that the main working season of the FY ie; April-June (first quarter) is utilised for planning, iden-tification of schemes, according administrative sanctions, preparations of Detailed Project Reports and completing tender formalities," it

By the time these formalities are completed, the monsoon sets in, the directive said, making it "difficult to start the work till September/October leading to actual expenditure only in the last two quarters" even though funds were made available earlier.

To ensure timely execution of the different projects, advance planning by the departments is essential, it said.

"The departments more or less have a fair idea of their possible allocation in next FY. Therefore, the last quarter of a FY can be utilised for preparatory works including floating of tenders, so that work orders can be issued in the first week of April of the next

"Therefore, the departments should complete advance planning of works to be executed in next FY, including administrative approval and financial sanctions (except release of funds). tender formalities, etc," the directive said.

The state govern-ment has in the recent past expressed its discontent over the manner in which funds allocated to the different departments for development works remained "not spent"

Senior officials of the state secretariat said that Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee was unhappy with the way departments like Agricultural Marketing, among others, failed to utilise funds alloted to them.

As per the directive, all the departments "should further ensure that the cost involved in the projects/schemes put to tender is within their expected budget-ary allocation of the next FY."

IIPA and SSDMA kicks off workshop on making Sikkim Climate Smart

GANGTOK, 11 JAN:

To better understand the issue of climate change in Sikkim, Indian Institute of Public Administration (IIPA) and the technical service SEEDS in collaboration with Sikkim State Disaster Management Authority (SSDMA) kicked off two days long training and policy work-shop programme on Capacity Building Strategies for Managing Complex Disasters in the face of Climate Change with the theme "The First Organic State... Now Moving towards being the first Climate Smart State," a

press release informs. The workshop sponsored by National Mission on Himalayan Studies and Ministry of Envi-

ronment, Forests and Climate Change, Government of India had State Relief Commissioner cum Secretary, Land Revenue and Disaster Management Department, Tsegyal Tashi as the chief guest on its inaugural day and former Dean of Jawaharlal Nehru University, Professor CK Varshney as the keynote speaker.

Addressing the inaugural session, Mr Tsegyal said that climate change is a significant and

emerging threat to Sikkim.

"From the last couple of years we are witnessing the extensive increase of temperature and it is a matter of serious concern for Sikkim," he added.

He also expressed his serious concern on the rapid infrastructure development and informed that Sikkim is going to have a building code shortly in order to check the rapid infrastructure development taking place.

"We must be better prepared for unforeseen disasters by ed-ucating ourselves through this kind of capacity building strat-egies for managing complex di-sasters," he informed.

Professor Varshney talked about the global environmental issues and sustainable development by shedding light on the wider environmental issues for sustainability. He also discussed about climate change, complex disaster, flash flood earthquake, importance of biodiversity etc.

Professor Varshney advised the Land Revenue and Disaster Management Department to

sure that homes and infrastructure are not at risk in Sikkim and said that rapid and unplanned urbanization further increases the risks as Sikkim already falls in Seismic Zone IV region.

"Building Codes will need to be strictly enforced and urban planning needs to be done so that the State is prepared for cli-mate-related disasters," he added.

SSDMA vice chairperson, Professor Vinod K Sharma also spoke about climate change and how they are conducting awareness

among Panchayats in rural Sikkim.

The programme was also attended by SSDMA special secretary, Rinzing Chewang, representative from IIPA, UNDP and stake holders.

thing is recorded if you take public transports like flights. What you eat is your personal choice, but if you eat in a restaurant it is recorded by a bill. Therefore, let us not overblow this issue of privacy," he said, adding that "innovations happening in the country as part of digital revolution cannot be killed under the garb of privacy.

"What is strictly private is medical and bank-ing records.

When you talk about privacy, there should be a balance between data availability, data utility. data anonymity and data privacy," he said at the inauguration of the 6th Annual International Com-merce Conference in Delhi.

Prasad also talked about how a number of fake accounts and teachers were identified with the help of Aadhaar cards, thus helping the government save precious resources.

"Aadhaar does not

contain community, reli-gion, medical, educational or income reports. The system instead contains iris and finger prints kept in a safe and secure encrypted form which cannot be broken into even by the billionth of efforts," he said. Speaking at another

event under the aegis of Delhi School of Economics, Prasad showed his Aadhaar card to the audience and said: "The (Aadhaar) system contains my finger print and iris

encrypted form which by billions of efforts. That is an Indian technology."

Stating that Aadhaar is here to stay, Nilekani said the issue of its alleged breach has been blown out of proportion as there are far too many security layers and that it is not possible to randomly pore over it.

"There is hundred per cent an orchestrated campaign to see how Aadhaar gets maligned, yes absolutely," the former chairman of UIAI told ET Now on the side-lines of an Infosys event in Bengaluru.

Further referring to FIR filed in the Tribune case, he said negative views on Aadhaar will have negative reactions and hence, it would be better for people to have a constructive view on it.

"If you are just taking a negative view, and not a constructive view, then you also have other (negative) reactions. I think, everybody has to accept Aadhaar is here to stay," The former UIDAI chief said.

The Aadhaar is here to stay because as many as 119 crore people have it, 550 million have linked the numbers to their bank accounts and Rs 95,000 crore transferred into DBT accounts, he added.

Nilekani said he was very confident of the Su-preme Court upholding Aadhaar under the fundamental right of privacy because it meets the test of the law being propor

Smells Like a Young Spirit

Allow the young their dreams and pursuits

 $T^{
m here}$ is still hope for Sikkim. And that is always a nice feeling to have. Hope floats here on the shoulders of youngsters who dream to aspire and remain resolute in their resolve to seek a future for themselves beyond the limits of the traditional, the routine or within quotas and reservations. It is with people such as these that the Sikkimese can afford some optimism in the decades to come. Yes, the number youngsters confident and inspired enough to strike out on their own in little charted terrains is still low in Sikkim, but it is still a start, the foundation on which much grander futures can be built. What the "elders" need to ensure is to support ambition in the young, allow them their pursuit of excellence and, if possible, stay out of their way and not make things any more difficult for them. The courage in the young to make professions out of what used earlier be dismissed as "hobbies", and their respect for merit in surroundings which have celebrated mediocrity for far too long are all signs that the graph could still swing upwards for Sikkim... if we allowed it

The go-getting attitude noticeable among more in the younger generation is in stark contrast to the previous one which has time and again proven itself to be self-defeatingly parochial and shortsighted. Maybe it's the young's form of rebellion, but whatever it is, it is a welcome paradigm shift as it is also necessary.

Let us look first at what the previous generation bequeathed the young here. Very little, save a horde of controversies, unresolved issues and almost passionate insularity. They have made corruption a norm and forever shirked accountability – something that is as evident in the lethargy that grips the bureaucracy as it does the society at large in the social problems that plague the families and still remain unaddressed. It is a miracle then that the State still has a generation in the making that is more pragmatic and responsible and hopeful. One only hopes now that the spirit this generation imbibes does not dull under the influence of the seniors who have still not stepped out of the

That corruption of youthful ideals would be an unpardonable disservice to the State and to the future.

The generation next, given half a chance would prefer to carve independent futures for themselves which will undoubtedly combine to give the Sikkimese society a more healthy glow. This, provided we allow them to find their own niche, pursuits and levels. Whether an insecure generation allows such self realization or not remains to be seen. It would surprise few if the generation on the wane tries and makes the coming generation as dependent as it itself is. Just look around, everyone seems to be clamoring for handouts and largesse and even demanding them as a right. The rush for freebies is so energetic that it pushes the deserving category to the end of the line even as the so-called cream of the society continues to masquer ade in its various guises appropriating something that should have trickled down. The gene which triggered the spirit of adventure and hard work which emboldened those who made Sikkim their home at a time when survival itself demanded a daily battle with the elements seems to have skipped a generation or two in this Hidden Land. Thankfully it is expressing itself again. One only hopes that this return of the Spirit sustains itself and takes Sikkim to another level - a very doable possibility.

Why Iran's protests matter this time

Aseries of urban uprisings in Iran that began on Dec. 28 in its second-largest city shocked the country's Islamic regime, as well as much of the world.

Although the Mashhad protests were spearheaded by conservative opponents of President Hassan Rouhani to discredit his economic pol-icies, the organizers lost control of the crowd. Protesters angrily chant-ed slogans – such as "Leave Syria alone, think about us" and "Death to Hezbollah" - that were aimed at not only Rouhani but the entire Islamic

In the days that followed, protests spread to 80 cities, leading to at least 22 deaths and over 1,000 arrests. On Ian, 8. Rouhani, who won a second term last May, said they signaled Ira-nians want not only a stronger economy but also more freedom.

While the government says it now has the situation under control, that doesn't eliminate the significance of the largest protests since 2009, when millions came out to oppose the outcome of that year's presidential election. The government forcefully suppressed that uprising, and two candidates who disputed the results remain under house arrest.

Why have so many Iranians again taken to the streets and will these protests have a larger impact than those eight years ago? As a close observer of Iran, I believe there are several important differences between the protests today and in 2009 that can help us answer both questions.

WHAT'S BEHIND THE UPRISING

Not surprisingly, the conservative faction of the Islamic regime was quick to blame Iran's adversaries, namely the U.S., Israel and Saudi Arabia. In contrast, reformists say that the pro-tests are about economic grievances such as unemployment, inequality and corruption.

They do have a point. While the

overall economy is growing again, and many indicators have turned positive in the past two years, the gains haven't been shared by all Ira-

The economy grew 13.4 percent in 2016 after oil and financial sanctions were lifted as part of the nuclear agreement with the West, which increased the country's oil and gas

The non-oil sector, however, expanded just 3.3 percent – a clear sign the economy's recovery has been slow in visibly improving people's living standards. Real incomes of many segments of the economy remain weak, and the housing and construc-

tion sector remains in recession.
Unemployment is still high, at 12 percent, particularly among young university graduates. But it is much higher in small towns and peripheral regions of the country, where many of the protests occurred, driven by con-

cerns over inequality and poverty.
Under Iran's Constitution the su preme leader has broad powers, and even Rouhani has a limited ability to influence key policies, including those concerning the economy. Some key policies are entirely off limits, such as Iran's involvement in Syria, Iraq and Lebanon. These campaigns, which are costing Iran billions of dol-lars every year, seem to be driving at least some of the protesters' anger.

KEY DIFFERENCES
There are three key differences between today's uprisings and those in

In 2009, the demands were political. The reformist faction of the ruling regime, which disputed the results of the presidential election, was the main actor in the protests. Current protests do not have a visible political leader and appear to be directed at the entire regime, including reformists. This is best demonstrated by one of the slogans frequently chanted by protesters, which roughly translates as, "It is over for all of you." Another difference is that the

2009 protests were centered around the capital Tehran and other major cities. While the recent demonstrations involve fewer actual protesters, they are spread over a much larger area of the country, including many small cities that suffer from underde velopment and low incomes.

These primarily young protest-ers, including unemployed university graduates and low-income workers, are also outraged by the frequent reports of corruption and unfair accu-mulation of wealth among some government officials. Competing factions of the ruling elite have frequently exposed each others' corruption, revelations that have alienated the marginalized segments of the population

that are struggling with poverty and unemployment. Economic issues are far more important today than they were for the primarily middle-class protesters of 2009.

Finally, the U.S. response to the current uprisings has also been markedly different.

The Obama administration reacted with caution to the 2009 uprisings and refrained from openly cheering on the protesters, motivated by a fear that overt support would provoke a harsher crackdown.

In contrast, President Donald Trump and his State Department have actively supported the protesters, and the U.S. is trying to mobilize an international condemnation of the Iranian government's response. This initiative, however, faces strong resistance from China and Russia in the United Nations.

Concern about a stronger reaction from the Trump administration might explain the cautious and measured approach of Iran's security forces in confronting the current protesters. The response was more violent and brutal in 2009

WHAT MIGHT CHANGE

The protestors' focus on economic rather than political issues enables some moderate members of the regime to meaningfully address their grievances rather than being forced to keep silent or issue outright condemnations, as they did in 2009.

While condemning the acts of vi-olence by some protesters, many of Iran's political leaders, including Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei, have expressed sympathy for their economic

They have also led to some chang-es in fiscal budget and economic reform priorities. Planned increases in prices of fuel and bread, for example, have been suspended.

While it's encouraging that the government is reacting to protester

concerns at all, stalling important economic reforms is not the right way to do it. These steps will surely be welcomed by lower-income Iranians, ensuring they're politically popular, yet they may lead to more hard-ship down the road by worsening the budget deficit and potentially fueling

Instead of keeping prices of essential items artificially low, which leads to considerable waste and inefficiency in the economy, it would be more effective to offer targeted subsidies to the poor while doing more to fight corruption and political nepotism, a primary cause of rising income and wealth disparities in Iran.

WHAT WON'T

Will the recent unrest serve as a wake-up call for the political elite that more needs to be done?

Unfortunately, an inefficient populist response is probably as far as the country's supreme leader will be willing to go – at least for now. Protesters' more political demands, such as tackling corruption, limiting Khamenei's powers or reducing Iran's role in regional conflicts, are unlikely to be addressed anytime soon.

Iran's political system carefully screens candidates for public office and thus remains closed to ordinary citizens, leaving Iranians with few options for influencing government pol-icy besides the streets. And neither political faction, reformist or conser vative, has yet offered any practical solution for how to change that.

For most Iranians, however, corruption, poverty and economic inequality can not be addressed without serious reforms. And that suggests that while the most recent uprising may be winding down, sim-

With apartment living on the rise, how do families and their noisy children fit in?

Agrowing number of Australians (as also people Aaround the world) live in apartments. The compact city model presents many benefits. However, living close to each other also presents challenges.

Rapid growth in apartment developments in re-cent decades has led to a rise in noise-related com-plaints and disputes across urban Australia. Households with children are on the front line of such tensions. They are one of the fastest-growing demographics living in apartments. Analysis of the latest census data show for instance that families with children under the age of 15 comprise 25% of Sydney's apartment population.

Apartment design and cultural acceptance of fam-ilies in the vertical city have not kept pace with this shift in housing forms. Cultural expectations that families with children ought to live in detached houses are persistent. Apartment planners and developers reproduce these expectations by neglecting children in building design and marketing.

With children's sounds being difficult to predict

or control, changing apartment demographics are an issue for planners and residents alike.

TRYING TO BE GOOD PARENTS

AND GOOD NEIGHBOURS

My research explores the everyday experiences of families living in apartments in Sydney. It reveals that parents trying to make apartment life work face an

Apartment living often creates an emotional dilemma between being a good parent and being a good neighbour. Parents want to allow children to be children, but are ever anxious about annoying the neighbours

Cities are layered with many different sounds, but the home is framed as a private space of peace and quiet. Sounds that intrude are considered noise. The "good" apartment neighbour avoids sounds that penetrate neighbours' homes

This is near impossible when children are involved (particularly when apartments are poorly designed). Key pressure points include crying at night and play-ing and running during the day.

Parents spoke about the challenges of sleep train-

ing in an apartment. They wanted to be considerate neighbours, so felt anxious and guilty when their children did not comply. Some received angry letters from neighbours, or heard them call out and bang on walls and ceilings in midnight protests. One mother described the difficult juggling act of

unsettled baby and an upset neighbour:
"[The neighbour] called out ... 'Pick up your baby!'

... I was so upset because we are trying our best and we were exhausted ourselves ... [The neighbour] banged on the ceiling really loudly ... I felt it on my feet, like it was shaking ... That just kind of added to my stress ... When I got back into bed after the shriek-ing finished and he [the baby] went back to sleep, and the stomping on the roof finished ... I just said, 'I don't

know if I can do that again' ... knowing that, you know they're hearing it all of course, and we felt terrible."

Parenting anxieties were not limited to night-time.

Monitoring kids' play to minimise noise made parents feel like the "fun police".

"I always feel like I am constantly telling them 'not

in here, not in there, don't do that' ... I'm constantly worried that we are annoying the neighbours. Because they are kids, they are loud. They don't have a volume button"

Parents attempted many strategies for managing noise. These included putting down carpet and foam mats, restricting some activities to rooms without ad-joining walls or to "sociable" hours, closing windows and covering air vents. The expectation that their children's unds do not belong in apartments weighed heavily.
"When he [the neighbour] first started complain-

ing, Harry [son] was crawling. Imagine trying to teach a crawler that they are not allowed to crawl through the house ... You know, he [the neighbour] wanted the impossible and got angry with us when we couldn't deliver that for him, with no kind of seeming effort to understand where we were coming from ..."

This family's neighbour had written notes, aggressively banged on their walls and threateningly con-fronted the parents over their children's noise. The mother described feeling vulnerable and at a loss:

"I feel like we have entered this entirely new area of discrimination that I had no idea existed before, but is actually quite prevalent among our peers. It is common

among the mothers in my mothers' group ... People just don't like children and they don't like children's noise
... And you know parenting is hard ... So to have the 'Oh my God I am pissing loads of people off' in the back of your mind as well ... is really uncomfortable." While not all families reported such negative ex-

periences, almost all felt anxious about noise and had

stories of friends who had experienced problems.

The sounds made by children were always front of mind. Aware of their neighbours' surveillance and (at times overt) moral judgments, they changed their domestic routines and modified their homes as much as possible

PEOPLE NEED APARTMENTS MADE FOR FAMILIES Broader changes are needed. Families living with children in apartments challenge norms that delineate the home as a place of quietude; that define "good neighbours" as tranquil ones; and that position children as belonging elsewhere (detached houses). And they come up against such norms in dwellings that hamper their best efforts to regulate sound.

Families living in apartments actively pursue strategies for making everyday life "work". But there is only so much that individuals can change. The wider problem of apartments' poor acoustic design and performance persists. Both cultural and technical norms must shift if the policy paradigm of urban consolidation is to have any hope of meeting the needs of adjusters population. a diverse population.

bandwidth from tomorrow

SHIRISH B PRADHAN KATHMANDU, JAN 11 (PTI): Nepal will receive internet bandwidth from China from tomorrow, ending the Himalayn na-tion's sole dependence on India for connecting to the cyber space.
State-owned telecom

company Nepal Telecom (NT) said that all the groundwork has been completed to formally connect Nepal with Chi-nese bandwidth from January 12.

"The process of acquiring internet bandwidth from China has been completed. The commercial operation of the Nepal- China optical fibre link will begin from Friday, said Prativa Baidhya, spokesperson for NT.

However, NT did not disclose the actual vol-ume of Chinese internet bandwidth that Nepal

will receive.

The details will be made public after a formal inauguration tomorrow, she added.

In December 2016, NT had reached an agree-ment with China Telecom to acquire internet bandwidth. NT had begun the test transmission of the project from the first week of September last vear.



With successful test transmission, Nepal will now be commercially connected with Chinese bandwidth, according to the official.

Chinese internet will be supplied via Rasuwagadhi gateway, according to sources at NT.
As the use of Internet

has been increasing rapidly in the country, Chinese internet bandwidth is taken as an alternative source for Nepal to meet the ever-increasing bandwidth demand, she

The commercial operation of the Chinese bandwidth project will end Nepal s sole dependence on India for internet bandwidth.

Nepal is current-

ly linked to the global internet connectivity through Indian telecom operators via different optical fibre connections in Biratnagar, Bhairahawa and Birgunj, among others, the Himalayn Times reported.

Besides ending the monopoly of bandwidth supply, the Chinese Internet gateway is also expected to facilitate service providers in Nepal to establish bandwidth connection with other countries via China.

Though NT is pur-asing limited volume of Internet from China in the first phase, the com-pany will increase the volume of Chinese internet gradually in the coming days.

KOLKATA, JAN 11 (PTI): The Calcutta University today conferred an hon-orary D Litt on West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee in recognition of her social service, amid a public interest litigation in the high court challenging the varsity's decision.

The hearing on the PIL remained inconclusive today and the plea would be taken up by the court tomorrow. "The Calcutta Univer-

sity is conferring D Litt on Banerjee, an alum-nus of the university, in recognition of her social service," Vice-Chancellor Sonali Chakraborty Baneriee said.

In an obvious reference to the PIL filed in the Calcutta High Court,



she said, in her convocation address, "I had faced disrespect from some quarters since my early days and was wondering whether I should be attending the convocation."

The 63-year-old chief minister said, "I would have made a mistake had I not attended this func-tion at Nazrul Manch. I feel humbled to be honoured by an institution such as the Calcutta University, which has gifted

many luminaries to Bengal and the country over

the years."

She said, "I was persuaded by Higher Edu-cation Minister Partha Chatterjee and the uni-versity authorities. You have honoured me and I feel deeply humbled."

Banerjee said, "I can assure you that I will keep this honour on a high pedestal till my last days...I will never use this D Litt for professional reasons."

In his speech, state Governor and university Chancellor K N Tripathi, who conferred the D Litt on Banerjee, said, "The university is honouring personalities for their contributions in various fields."

Petitioner Ranjugopal

Mukherjee, a former pro-

fessor of the university has claimed that the decision to confer the award arbitrary and opaque.

His counsel, Bikas Bhattacharya had yesterday submitted that the issues relating to the uni-versity and education itself were of public interest and as such the petition was justified to be a PIL.

State Advocate General Kishore Dutta had told a division bench comprising Acting Chief Justice J Bhattacharya and Justice Arijit Baneriee that the decision to confer the honorary de-gree was taken by the syndicate and senate of the university and there was no sufferance of public interest.

Iranian oil tanker partially explodes in East China Sea

BEIJING, JAN 11 (PTI): The front section of an Iranian oil tanker that has been on fire for days off the east China coast has exploded, forcing rescue boats searching for 31 missing sailors to retreat and sparking en-vironmental concerns.

Thirty-two crew members, including 30 Iranians and two Bangladeshis, went missing after the tanker carrying 136,000 tonnes of oil condensate from Iran to South Korea collided with a Hong Kong-registered bulk freighter and caught fire on Saturday in waters about 160 sea miles east of the Yangtze River's estuary.

Since then, the Pan-ama-registered tanker Sanchi has been ablaze and drifting in the waters between Shanghai and

southern Japan.
So far, no survivors from the tanker have been found and only one body has been recovered. All 21 crew members aboard the Chinese ship were rescued. The front section of the tanker exploded yesterday.

"Vessels at the scene have to stop putting out the fire and withdraw back to (a safe distance)," China's Ministry of Transport said.

"The fire extinguishing operation did not achieve the desired effect," it said. China's largest patrol ship Haixun 01 is fighting the fire after the explosion while organising other vessels to move away, the ministry said.

According to the min-

istry, Japanese sea police arrived at the scene an hour before the explo-sion and established contact with Haixun 01.

China's Ministry of Foreign affairs said yes-terday that 12 vessels were searching for the missing sailors in the tanker's vicinity before the explosion, and efforts were continuing to clean up any spilled light crude.

BEIJING, JAN 11 (PTI): China today objected to Vietnam's invitation to India to invest in oil and natural gas sector in the disputed South China Sea, saying it is firmly opposed to infringement of its rights using develop-ment of bilateral ties as an "excuse".

Vietnam's sador to India Ton Sinh Thanh on Tuesday had told an Indian news channel that his country would welcome Indian investments in the South China Sea.

Responding to re-marks, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Lu Kang said: "China does not object to the development of normal bilateral relations of relevant countries in our neighbourhood".

"But China firmly oppose relevant party to use it as an excuse to infringe upon China's le-gitimate rights and interests in the South China Sea and impair regional peace and stability," Lu

Ton had also said defence cooperation is one of the important

cooperation India and Vietnam and India can be helpful in expanding Vietnam s defence capabilities.

China has been opposing India's Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC) exploring oil in wells claimed by Viet-nam in the South China Sea (SCS) for years. India has been asserting that the ONGC's exploration is a commercial operation and not connected with

the dispute.

China claims almost all of the SCS while Viet-nam, the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Taiwan have counter

Oil exploration in the SCS is a sensitive issue in the Vietnam-China relations. There were anti-China riots in Vietnam when China tried to deploy oil rigs in an areas claimed by Vietnam few years ago.

India, which is ramping up ties with Vietnam, calls for freedom of navigation in the SCS through which trillions of dollars of trade happens every

PUTRAJAYA, JAN 11 (AP): Malaysia's government said it will pay US company Ocean Infinity up to USD 70 million if it can find the wreckage or black boxes of Malaysia Airlines Flight 370 within three months, in a renewed bid to solve the disappearance

nearly four years ago.

Transport Minister
Liow Tiong Lai said there
was an 85 percent chance of finding the debris in a new 25,000 square ki-lometer (9,650 square mile) area roughly the size of Vermont identified by experts.

The government signed a "no cure, no fee" deal with the Houston, Texas-based company to resume the hunt for the plane, a year after the official search by Malay-sia, Australia and China in the southern Indian Ocean was called off.

The plane vanished on March 8, 2014, while flying from Kuala Lum-pur to Beijing with 239 people on board.

"The primary mission by Ocean Infinity is

to identify the location of the wreckage and/or both of the flight recorders ... and present a considerable and credible evidence to confirm the exact location of the two main items," he told a news conference.

If the mission is successful within three months, payment will be made based on the size of area searched. Liow said the government will pay Ocean Infinity USD 20 million for 5,000 square kilometers (1,930 square mile) of a successful search, USD 30 million for 15,000 square kilometers (5,790 sq.miles), USD 50 million for 25,000 square kilometers (9653 sq. miles) and USD 70 million if the plane or recorders are found beyond the identified area.

Executive Oliver Plunkett said the search ves-sel Seabed Constuctor, which left the South African port of Durban last week, is expected to reach the southern Indian Ocean by January 17 to begin the hunt.

YOUTUBE CUTS TIES WITH INTERNET STAR LOGAN PAUL OVER 'SUICIDE FOREST' VIDEO

ogan Paul, who has 15 million Lisubscribers, was criticized for posting footage of a man's body hanging in a Japanese forest.
YouTube has cut ties with US

internet star Logan Paul following his controversial video showing the body of a suicide victim.

The company said it had suspended its original projects with the 22-year-old vlogger, who has more than 15 million subscribers, and he would no longer appear in its comedy series Foursome.

Paul's channels have also been removed from YouTube's Google Pre-ferred platform, which features its most popular content in packages for sale to

advertisers.

It follows the huge backlash over Paul's video entitled "We found a dead body in the Japanese suicide forest",



which showed him and his friends laughing at the body of a man hanging in Japan's Aokigahara forest.

Paul later apologised for the clip, which was viewed more than a million times before it was taken down, saying it was "wrong" and "misguided".

A YouTube spokesman said: "In light of recent events, we have decided to remove Logan Paul's channels from Google Preferred.

"Additionally, we will not feature Logan in season four of Foursome and his new originals are on hold."

In an open letter earlier this week, YouTube said "suicide is not a joke, nor should it ever be a driving force for

The site added that Paul's video violated its guidelines and it was "looking at further consequences".

Paul has not posted any videos in the past week, saying he was "taking time to

He posted an apology following criticism of the controversial video, saying he "should have put the cameras down and stopped recording what we were going through".

The vlogger added: "For my fans who
