## Trio carrying M16 rifle arrested in Kalimpong



### SUMMIT REPORT

KALIMPONG, 09 FEB:

Karrested three persons from Gorubathan area who were carrying an M16 assault rifle. The three include one driver from Jalpaiguri and two Manipuri youth.

Kalimpong Superintendent of Police, Ajeet Singh Yadav said, "We have arrested two Manipuri youth and one driver from Jalpaiguri

from Gorubathan area on Thursday. They were carrying an M16 rifle, a highly sophisticated weapon which is used by the US Army."

The trio was travelling in a Wagon R when they were stopped at Pan Dara area of Gorubathan.

Minlun Lenthang and Lalchungnung Sinson hail from Manipur while Chandan the driver hails from Jalpaiguri, informed Mr Yadav.

Kalimpong Police today produced all three before the Kalimpong District Court which sent them to four days of police remand.

"We will interrogate the trio on what the motive was behind bringing such a highly sophisticated weapon to Kalimpong District. Whether they have any link with militant groups, we will look into all the aspects," said the Kalimpong SP.

## Govt pursuing "feku federalism" and "arrogance": Oppn in RS

NEW DELHI, FEB 9 (PTI):

Opposition parties in Rajya Sabha on Friday accused the BJP-led government of "feku federalism" and "arrogance", saying the union budget was a "betrayal" of the farmers and warning the ruling party not to mislead the people.

This "feku federalism (of the Centre) won't do", an angry Derek O'Brien of the Trinamool Congress said while referring to the burden imposed on states for railway infrastructure development.

Participating in the resumed debate on the 2018-19 budget, Neeraj Shekhar of the Samajwadi Party said the budget was a "betrayal" of the people, especially farmers who were still committing suicide and being

forced to sell their produce in the market below the minimum support price.

He said there was a "veil of arrogance" shrouding the BJP people which the countrymen will have to recognise.

Shekhar also asked why people were paying Rs 75 per litre of petrol now when the crude prices are USD 68 per barrel and said they were paying the same price when the crude prices had skyrocketed to USD 140 per barrel and sought to know the kind of arithmetic behind this.

On the issue of non-performing assets (NPAs), he sought details on the loans given to big corporates since 2014 when the BJP-led government

## SBI reports Q3 net loss of Rs 1,887 cr

MUMBAI, FEB 9 (PTI): The SBI Group on Friday reported a massive Rs 1,886.57 crore net loss for the December quarter of current fiscal as its bad loans and provisions spiked.

It had, in contrast, reported net profit of Rs 2,152.14 crore for the October-December quarter of the last fiscal, 2016-17.

The nation's largest lender saw its net bad loans ratio spiking to 5.61 per cent of advances, from 4.24 per cent during the third quarter of 2017-18.

The gross dud assets ratio jumped meanwhile from 7.23 per cent to cross the double digits mark at 10.35 per cent during the quarter under review.

In absolute or gross terms, the bank at the standalone level had Rs 1,99,141.43 crore of its assets as non-performing, up from Rs 1,08,172.32 crore in the comparable period in 2016.

Similarly, its net non-performing assets almost doubled to Rs 102,370.12 crore, up from Rs 61,430.45 crore, State Bank of India said in an exchange filing.

The bank saw its non-interest income decline by 29.75 per cent, from Rs 11,507 crore to Rs 8,084 crore, as net interest income plunged due to mark-to-market losses from its treasury operations.

Similarly, non-fee income fell 18.38 per cent from Rs 14,401 crore to Rs 11,755 crore.

Fee income rose from Rs 4,710 crore to Rs 4,979 crore -- a growth of 5.71 per cent.

## Need to take holistic view of people's right to protest: SC

NEW DELHI, FEB 9 (PTI):

The Supreme Court today said it needs to take a holistic view of protecting the fundamental rights of citizens to protest, as well as protection of environment and rights of commuters, while earmarking the space for agitations in Delhi.

The Centre today sought time from the apex court saying deliberations are on to earmark a particular place in Delhi, where the citizens can exercise their right to protest.

A bench of justices A K Sikri and Ashok Bhushan granted two weeks time to the Centre to file

a comprehensive reply after taking a holistic view of the situation and posted the matter for further hearing on March 5.

The counsel appearing for the Centre said that deliberations are being held at the ministry level for arriving at a solution after taking a holistic view and earmark a space in Delhi, where citizens can stage their protest.

On December 4 last year, the apex court had said that proper guidelines should be framed on the issue of right to protest so as to ensure a balance between the fun-

## "Football still my passion"- women's football pioneer Puspa Chettri

Puspa Chettri [Gurung] is synonymous with women's football in Sikkim. She is the first international woman footballer from Sikkim and also the first Asian Football Confederation [AFC] accredited woman coach.

Born in a remote village in Dodak, West Sikkim on 19 Nov, 1972, 45-year-old Ms Puspa got interested in football at a very young age.

Sharing her journey with Summit-Times, Ms Puspa said, "I always loved watching my elders play football. My elder brother was a good footballer. I used to see people dribbling and kicking the ball and a panicked goalkeeper running from one post to another positioning himself to save the goal. When the ball went out of the field during play I was always the first to collect it and kick it back to the players."

"I was fortunate to be born in a big family with three elder brothers and five elder sisters. I had all the liberty to play after school. I watched my brothers play



this beautiful game and learnt from them. The boys used to hesitate to include me in their game initially but they gradually started accepting me in their team," expressed Ms Puspa.

At the age of 11, she got selected in the school team for an inter-school tournament in 1983. She has not looked back

ever since.

"Gradually, interest turned into passion and I dedicated my time to football. In 1985, I represented Sikkim in a national game in Lucknow. Subsequently, in the same year, I represented Sikkim in the VII Federation Cup Women's Football Championship in Assam and Xth National Women's Football Championship in Manipur. The biggest achievement of my football career came in December 1985 when I was selected for the All India Women's Football Camp in Delhi. I was only 15 years old then and played an international tournament in Jakarta, Indonesia in January 1986," informed Ms Puspa.

"It was an extremely proud moment for me coming from a small village in West Sikkim," she added.

Ms Puspa went on to represent West Bengal in March 1986 for India Gold Cup as Sikkim did not participate then. As her passion for football grew, she started playing in various national championships till 1989.

"Unfortunately, football for women in

Sikkim did not offer opportunities back then so as to develop it into a lifelong career. In 1990, I got married and started a family. I hardly had time to think about football again. To my surprise in the late 90s, Soreng Senior Secondary School, my alma mater, felicitated me during its golden jubilee celebration for which I am grateful. A series of felicitations followed from people of Dodak, Gyalshing School, Bhanu Jyanti Samiti, Gyalshing, etc."

Ms Puspa gives credit to Sikkim Football Association for inspiring her to get back to the game of football again.

"I express my gratitude to SFA president, Menla Ethenpa, and SFA executive committee members for motivating me to undergo training in football coaching conducted by Asian Football Confederation in July 2006 where I acquired 'C' coaching license to be the first woman from Sikkim to play international football and the first woman football coach from my State. Football is still my passion and not a livelihood," said Ms Puspa.



## Power supply yet to reach all villages alleges BJP Sikkim

## Opp MPs meet president, ask for SIT into Loya's death

**NEW DELHI, FEB 9 (PTI):**

Opposition MPs today petitioned President Ram Nath Kovind for a court-monitored SIT probe into the death of CBI judge B H Loya and said they have no faith in either the CBI or the NIA.

MPs from several political parties, including the Congress, the Trinamool Congress and the DMK, met the president and presented him a memorandum with the demand.

The memorandum has been signed by 114 MPs from 15 parties, including the TMC, SP, NCP, DMK, RJD and AAP as well as the Left parties. The BSP is not a signatory to the letter.

"To uphold the majesty of law, we request you to intervene in the matter. What is required is a thorough investigation through a team of independent officers selected and monitored by the Supreme Court," the memorandum stated.

The investigation should not be entrusted to either the Central Bureau of Investigation or the National Investigation Agency, given their track record, the MPs said.



"Such a procedure will ensure the credibility of the institution in the eyes of the public. We sincerely hope you will use your good offices to serve the cause of justice," they told the president.

Loya, who was hearing the sensitive Sohrabuddin Sheikh fake encounter case, died of a cardiac arrest in Nagpur on December 1, 2014, when he had gone to attend the wedding of a colleague's daughter.

Rahul Gandhi, who led the opposition charge, said a large number of MPs felt that there is something suspicious in the death of Loya and two more that took place thereafter.

"A large number of MPs feel suspicious and

uneasy over the death of judge Loya and two others. They wanted an independent probe and did not want the investigation to be handed over to the CBI," Gandhi said after the meeting.

He said the president gave a positive response and has assured them that he would look into the matter.

"Two of judge Loya's alleged confidants have also subsequently died under suspicious circumstances. Srikanth Khandalkar, a public-spirited lawyer in Nagpur, allegedly fell from a high-rise building in the District Court on November 29, 2015 and Prakash Thombre, a retired District Judge, allegedly died on May 16, 2016 falling

from the upper berth in a train," according to the memorandum.

The leaders have also written in the memorandum that they believe that if "lives of judges and lawyers are jeopardised for doing their duty, then democracy is under grave threat.

Recently four senior most judges of the Supreme Court also expressed the sentiment that democracy was in peril."

Stating that they have no faith in either the CBI or the NIA, Gandhi said they wanted an independent SIT, like in the 2G case.

"Because we know what CBI officers do. In the case of Sohrabuddin (Sheikh fake encounter), CBI officers did not appeal (against the discharge of BJP president Amit Shah). We do not have any faith in them," Congress leader Kapil Sibal said.

The issue came under the spotlight in November last year after media reports quoting his sister fuelled suspicion about the circumstances surrounding his death and its link to the Sohrabuddin case.

## Indian Army chief to visit Nepal on Feb 13

**KATHMANDU, FEB 9 (PTI):** Indian Army chief Gen Bipin Rawat will embark on a three-day visit to Nepal next week to attend the Himalayan nation's Army Day and Maha Shivaratri celebrations, according to Army sources here.

The Indian Army chief and Nepal Army chief Gen Rajendra Chhetri will hold bilateral talks at Nepal Army headquarters during the visit beginning February 13,

said Nepal Army sources without giving further details.

Rawat's trip is a regular visit and there is a tradition of exchange of visits between the chiefs of the two armies.

Rawat's visit comes days after External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj visited Nepal.

Swaraj visited Nepal on February 1 where she called on President Bidya Devi Bhandari, Prime

Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba and held talks with CPN-Maoist Centre chairman 'Prachanda'.

Meanwhile, US Army Pacific Commanding General Robert B Brown held bilateral talks with Chhetri at the Army Headquarters.

During the meeting they discussed matters relating to bilateral interest and mutual cooperation, according to a statement by the Nepal Army

Kolkata to spend weekend with Gaelic music

KOLKATA, FEB 9 (PTI): The British Council and the Indian Museum, Kolkata, have joined hands with Scotland arts centre ‘An Lanntair’ for a live music concert in the city tomorrow.

‘Yatra; Journey, a live music concert’ will be a tribute to Scottish army officer Colin Mackenzie, who travelled from the Isle of Lewis to Indian shores in 1783 to study about the culture and languages of the country, De-

banjan Chakrabarti, the director of British Council East and North East India, told PTI today.

“The programme will see a confluence of Indian classical music and Gaelic songs from Scotland. There is an eclectic mix of musicians involved in this project,” he said.

This year marks the 70th anniversary of British Council in India, Chakrabarti said, adding that the concert is musical hom-

age to the epic journey Mackenzie made to India.

UK-based Tabla player Dalbir Singh Rattan, one of the participants of the concert, said the 12 ‘Sur’ (musical notes) is the same for both western and Indian music.

“No matter what the country, music speaks the same language everywhere,” he said.

Catherine Maclean of An Lanntair said, “We worked on this project for five years. There

is a huge collection of Mackenzie’s souvenirs at Indian Museum and Asiatic Society.”

The museum has also organised a Colin Mackenzie exhibition on this occasion, Maclean said.

Mackenzie, a Scottish army officer in the British East India Company, became the first Surveyor General of India in 1810. He was an orientalist and a collector of antiquities.

Assam Assembly adjourned as no minister present in House

GUWAHATI, FEB 9 (PTI): The Assam Assembly was today adjourned as no minister was present in the House when it assembled for the afternoon session.

The opposition Congress and AIUDF claimed that this is a “shameful episode” in the history of Assam Assembly that never occurred earlier.

This prompted the Deputy Speaker Dilip Kumar Paul, who was running the House at that time, to warn everyone so that it never takes place again.

“We all are respected members. I request all to maintain dignity. There was no quorum

for 4-5 minutes. Then there was no minister. We should be careful from next time so that no such things happen again,” he said as soon as the House reassembled after the adjournment.

After the House assembled in the afternoon at 3 pm post the lunch break, business did not start because of lack of quorum, which requires presence of 21 members out of the 126 MLAs.

The House bell kept on ringing for almost seven minutes, following which the quorum was achieved with few more members entering.

However, as soon as the Deputy Speaker wanted to start the

business with the scheduled discussion on Motion of Thanks of the Governor’s Speech, the opposition pointed out that no minister was present in the House.

“If the ministers are such irresponsible, then how can the House run?” Congress MLA Abdul Khaleque said and requested the shouting BJP members to ask their alliance partner AGP’s senior leaders Prafulla Kumar Mahanta and Pabindra Dekha about the rules.

AIUDF member Aminul Islam asked who will listen to the grievances of the people if there is no government representative.

With no minister present even after 10 minutes, the Deputy Speaker adjourned the House for 15 minutes.

Congress MLA Rupiyoti Kurmi said: “It’s a day of shame. Assam Assembly never witnessed such a shameful incident in its entire history.”

After that, Parliamentary Affairs Minister Chandra Mohan Patowary entered the House and sat in his position without uttering anything, although some ruling party MLAs were seen whispering in his ears.

The ongoing Budget Session began on February 6 this week and will continue till April 6.

damental right of the citizens to protest and the maintenance of law and order.

The apex court’s observation had come as it issued notice to the Centre and the Delhi Police on a plea seeking to declare as illegal the banning of all assemblies and protests in central Delhi and the New Delhi area.

The plea had said that continuous imposition of prohibitory orders under section 144 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) was an “arbitrary and unreasonable restriction” on the fundamental rights of citizens to hold peaceful protest.

The plea, filed by NGO Mazdoor Kisan Shakti Sangathan, had challenged the “repeated imposition” of orders by Delhi Police under section 144 of the CrPC, saying it virtually declared the entire central Delhi as a prohibited area for holding any public meeting, dharna or peaceful protest.

The petition, filed through advocate Prashant Bhushan, has sought directions to formulate guidelines for holding public meetings, dharnas, peaceful demonstrations in parts of New Delhi.

“As per sub-section 4 of Section 144 CrPC, an order can be issued for a maximum period of two months. Therefore, the Delhi Police has adopted the tactic of issuing the same order repeatedly,” the plea said.

It also sought to quash several orders passed by police from January to October last year by which the entire Central or New Delhi areas were declared prohibited areas.

The National Green Tribunal had on October 5 entirely banned protests at Jantar Mantar near Connaught Place on the ground that it created nuisance for the local residents and violated environment protection statutes.

The plea before the apex court has claimed that, “With the NGT order banning protests at Jantar Mantar, it is evident that distancing a protest site from where it is most visible to the government and concerned authorities, will have the effect of diluting the impact that the protest seeks to gain.

“Besides the cost of using Ramlila Maidan for protests is Rs 50,000 per day which would make protests at the site practically impossible for the common citizens,” it said.

On claims over Rs 71,000 crore being deposited into Jan Dhan accounts, Shekhar asked how much was deposited in these accounts after November 8 when demonetisation was announced.

“I appeal to the Government not to misguide the farmers, youth and the minorities,” Shekhar said.

With BJP ally TDP members holding placards inside the Well demanding special status for Andhra Pradesh, YSRC MP V Vijayasai Reddy asked Basawaraj Patil, who was in the Chair, how come the TDP was protesting without resigning from the Union Cabinet.

When some members including those from TDP began shouting slogans as Trinamool Congress member Derek O’Brien stood up to speak, he assured the protestors that he completely sympathised with their cause.

“We know you are deprived.. We are with you Andhra, you (TDP) have to move now from that (Treasury benches) side to this (Opposition) side,” O’Brien said.

Observing that Congress leader P Chidambaram had sought answers to 12 questions on the budget from the Finance Minister, O’Brien solicited replies from Railway Minister Piyush Goyal on 12 queries relating to his ministry.

Asking if railways was a union subject, why were the states being asked to bear the expenditure for its infrastructure creation, he said “this feku federalism (of the Centre) won’t do” and the states should not be cheated.

O’Brien asked why the Depreciation Reserve Fund provi-

sion was slashed to Rs 500 crore in the Railway Budget from Rs 5,000 crore. He said the compounded annual growth rate (CAGR) of the Railways which was 6 per cent earlier had come down to 2 per cent in the last 3.5 years in the NDA regime.

The TMC leader also questioned the commercial viability policy of the government, saying there was talk of 8 railway routes in Bengal being shut.

To this, Railway Minister Piyush Goyal said the Public Accounts Committee of Parliament had suggested it, but the issue was resolved after Minister of State for Railways Manoj Sinha’s intervention.

O’Brien also questioned the government over job creation, saying 1.25 lakh safety job posts in Railways were lying vacant.

“We told you (Government) not to implement GST in July.

You have kept a provision of Rs 55,000 crore for compensation to states in the Budget but the compensation during the first six months alone was Rs 40,000 crore, which implies it will be Rs 80,000 crore for the entire year. From where will you bring the remaining Rs 55,000 crore,” he asked.

CP Narayanan of the CPI(M) said the Centre’s share has reduced in the centrally sponsored schemes whereas the states were being burdened. He also raised the issue of farmers’ suicides, and said unless the mistakes are rectified, the future is bleak.

S Muthukaruppan (AIADMK) said “We were an ally when J Jayalalithaa was alive and our party has supported the BJP at crucial times,” but funds have not been given to the state.

Referring to the devastation caused by cyclone Vardah,

Muthukaruppan said “We had requested Rs 25,000 crore from the Centre for rehabilitation but not a single rupee has been given”. He also sought a drought package for the south eastern state of Tamil Nadu.

He demanded nationalisation and inter-linking of all rivers in South India, so that water from Cauvery river can be distributed to all parts of the state. He alleged that there was politicisation of the Cauvery Water dispute.

Vandana Chavan (NCP) raised issues relating to nursery, primary and secondary education and said one million teaching posts are lying vacant and the training programmes for them have failed to take off.

Stating that this year’s budget was most challenging one since government came to power, SAD leader Naresh Gujral urged the government to fulfill the promise of providing MSP 50 per cent more than the cost of production.

“The next crop will come in the next two months. Farmers are expecting a good deal. Don’t let them down. I will not get into the formula (of fixing the MSP). I hope they will get a good deal,” he said.

Farmers commit suicides due to debt caused because of inadequate returns, health problem and marriage expenses. The government has announced steps to take care of first two problems. “It must be honoured in letter and spirit.”

N Gokulakrishnan (AIADMK) sought 20 per cent increase in the central assistance to Puducherry as the Union Territory is facing tight budget. He also asked the government to implement pending demand of providing a rail link from Dindi-

gal.

Rajeev Shukla (Cong) sought to know the formula on which basis the cost of production of agri-produce will be decided while fixing higher MSP as promised in the budget.

He however lauded the Health Insurance scheme but asked the government to be cautious as nursing homes might end up taking advantage of it.

While raising concern about lack of jobs, slowing exports and rising inflation and widening fiscal deficit, Shukla emphasised that the government should also look at undertaking judicial reforms.

D Raja (CPI) said the government suffered from “ideological and psychological bankruptcy and hypocrisy” as it does not have any strategy to generate revenues.

Rather generating revenues, it has forgone revenue to the tune of Rs 2.45 lakh crore by giving concessions to corporates, he alleged and said the government is also disinvesting PSUs and privatising firms like Air India.

Warning the government of facing an alarming job crisis next year, Raja said the International Labour Organisation in its report has projected that 77 per cent of workers will have vulnerable jobs in 2019 and 18.9 million will be unemployed.

He also talked about economic inequality and concentration of 73 per cent of wealth with one per cent corporates and said the budget was anti-poor and not growth oriented.

Sanjay Seth (SP) said it was a disappointing budget. Ram Kumar Kashyap (INLD) and Rajeev Chandrasekhar (IND) also spoke.

## Converts and Support

*The people will be soon important again*

Politicians in our country, as also in Sikkim, have lived in the make-believe world of sycophants and appearances for far too long to be able to see realities unless strained through the reassuring filters that suit and surround them. In their defence, it is not just politicians who take on such imagined sense of power, significance and influence, and one sees such attitudes among government officials, social and religious organisations, and yes, even in the media. It is however only the politicians who need to routinely lobby for direct endorsement of the people to remain of consequence and also stand a chance of deciding policy, hence it becomes important for their priorities to be aligned properly and political-speak nuanced with a better sense of proportions and pragmatism.

One could argue that selective perceptions would affect only individual fates and political careers, but it becomes important to marshal the debate on the right course when these impressions begin hogging public engagement. Take for instance the trend of claiming turncoats, a gimmick which gains currency every time elections come calling. These are fine as campaign-trail asides, but rankle when they become the centrepiece of announcements. One speaks here of the frequent claims and counterclaims of number of supporters gained and weaned away that compete for headlines on pg02 nowadays. While these displays may be necessary to send out a signal of increasing popularity or resurgence, they are not ladders on which political futures can be reached. To begin with, commitments so fickle that they the whiff of elections can signal an ideological shift can hardly be considered endorsement strong enough to power change. Anyone who has followed campaign politics in Sikkim long enough will know how these inductions are managed and of how routinely such claims are announced. At best, these are interesting sideshows to the circus of elections, not the essence of the election itself. Agreed, there are some crossovers which are politically significant in that they help open some unreached pockets, but to believe these to have the potency of changing political fortunes is misplaced and in fact demeaning to the intelligence of the electorate.

To believe that the voters cannot see through the political opportunism at the root of such election-time fluctuations in allegiance reflects an inexcusable disconnect with how and what the people think. The media might play along and ignore the obvious sour grapes/ bountiful opportunism syndrome which defines a bulk of political positions in Sikkim, but that does not mean that the people do not see through things. Induction ceremonies and claims of winning new members, hence, are at best stepping stones to catch the attention of the people, an attention span that should then be held with policy and programme commitments to make voters seriously consider the options on offer.

At the end of the day, it is for the political parties in the fray and then leaders to decide where their priorities rest – whether it is to believe their own PR or work along with and among the people to expand their support base. The Opposition has often made the mistake of buying into the anti-incumbency fiction and the silent wave hallucination because anti-incumbency does not translate into votes by itself and the ruling front would be mistaken to believe that anti-incumbency is not a factor at all in Sikkim. At varying degrees, Elections 2014 proved the previous point rather effectively.

Also, given how small Sikkim is, all parties and leaders need to approach the people as a starting-from-scratch effort; past experience has shown that only those groups which reach out in earnest, and not on the crutches of past record or existing fatigue, win favour with the people. For those watching the “politics” from the sidelines, a wonderful experience will arrive soon when people will be able to twist the weak ears of leaders to make them listen; that is when the people also get to ‘play’ some ‘politics’. It is not rare in these times to find groups of 10, or even less, come together and claim to speak for all the people of their constituency or community or section of society and communicate either support or condemnation of the sitting representative. In normal times, they would just be scoffed away, but in the uncertainty of an approaching election year, they will be cajoled, pampered, instigated, approached and placated. Counter groups are sponsored to offset the embarrassment that these groups might have caused and either way, it’s the people who win because they become important again.

For the next few months, who knows, maybe even a year or more, the people will wrest for themselves the opportunity to talk down to elected leaders and leaders wanting to be elected. In a setting where hierarchical protocols continue to be observed, this is a welcome, albeit brief, change. But then again, like the misplaced perception of new members meaning stronger influence, even this flicker of a more vociferous electorate is far from the realities that remain.

# An international plastics treaty could avert a “Silent Spring” for our seas

Global problems — like our plastic-choked seas — need global solutions.

It was welcome news when Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced that Canada will use its year-long G7 presidency to turn the global spotlight on ocean plastics and pollution.

Environment Minister Catherine McKenna has said plastics will be a main theme of June’s summit when leaders from Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Japan and the United States join Trudeau in Charlevoix, Quebec.

But can Canada move these nations to establish enforceable rules?

The G7 has raised the plastics issue before. The Germans launched an action plan to combat marine litter in 2015 and Japan reaffirmed the commitment to address the problem in 2016.

During the World Economic Forum meeting in Davos later that year, headlines blared “More Plastic than Fish in the Sea by 2050” after the release of a report on global plastic waste. In 2017, Italy held a workshop on marine litter during its G7 presidency.

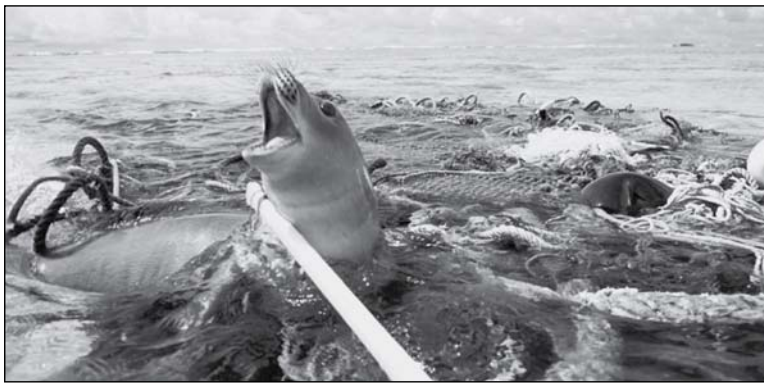
## PROMISES PROLIFERATE WHILE PLASTIC WASTE PILES UP

But despite these promises, plastic production and waste continues to grow.

Globally, millions of metric tonnes of plastic waste enter the ocean each year. In 2010, for example, between 4.8 million and 12.7 million metric tonnes of plastic hit the water. That’s equivalent to dumping a garbage truck of plastic into marine waters every minute.

Alarmingly, production of single-use plastic, like grocery bags, contributed nearly 40 per cent of total plastic production in 2015. Many end up in our oceans.

Boris Worm, a marine scientist at the Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, has warned that if current trends continue, we’ll face a new “Silent Spring” of the seas. Today, close to 90 per cent of seabirds have plastics in their guts, similar to the ubiquitous presence of the toxic chemical DDT in the 1960s, the focus of Rachel Carson’s book *Silent Spring*.



These voluntary international pledges are failing to stem the plastic tide.

Most of the plastic in the sea comes from land. Most of it is not abandoned fishing gear, but plastic bags, milk and water bottles, and consumer goods like flip-flops dumped into waterways and washed out to sea. We’ve recognized this for years — more than 100 countries have endorsed efforts to reduce the impacts of marine litter worldwide since 1995. But that was also a non-binding agreement.

Since then, promises to cut ocean plastics have proliferated, including the 2011 Honolulu Strategy and “The Future We Want” agreement at the 2012 Rio+20 conference.

The 2015 Oceans Goal, one of the UN’s 20 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), repeats the target of significant marine pollution reduction.

And last year, the United Nations Environmental Programme launched its “war on plastic” with the Clean Seas campaign, which aims to eliminate microplastics in cosmetics and the wasteful usage of single-use plastic by the year 2022.

## LAW RULES

What we lack are binding rules for land-based sources of plastic pollution that apply to countries around the world. As the Center for International Environmental Law (CIEL) noted: “Current initiatives to tackle plastic pollution focus on the symptoms but not the root of the problem.”

At home, Trudeau can support the development of a coordinated national strategy to combat plastics pollution, backed up by law.

There’s plenty of evidence that voluntary actions aren’t enough. In 2000, Canada was the first country to act with a National Plan of Action

on land-based sources of marine pollution. But with no legal mechanism to compel action, the national plan to keep plastic pollution from entering the sea has languished.

It would be a step forward even if the G7 only acknowledged the need for binding laws.

## G7 TO THE RESCUE?

Still more can be done. Canada can start a race to the top to see who can put the best laws in place, and who can reap the gains from a new plastic economy.

Trudeau can convince his fellow G7 leaders to emulate Canada’s new regulations that prohibit the manufacture, import and sale of personal toiletry products that contain plastic microbeads. The G7 leaders can share their experiences on what’s worked well for them, whether it’s the European Union’s new Plastics Strategy and legislative initiative on single-use plastics, France’s ban on plastic cups and plates, or the U.S. initiative called Save Our Seas Act.

Canada could plan a “Plastic-Free Day” during the meeting, or host an ocean plastics art competition at the Charlevoix venue with entries from all G7 nations. It could help to bring industry on side by showcasing promising initiatives like the New Plastics Economy, focused on increasing recapture, reuse and recycling of plastics. And it could screen a heart-wrenching film like *Blue* for the world leaders.

A bold step forward would be a G7 agreement to fast-track an international plastics treaty.

## END GAME: A PLASTIC POLLUTION TREATY

Canada can build on its past leadership on environmental treaties, such as the Montreal Protocol that

eliminated more than 99 per cent of ozone-depleting substances globally, to tackle marine plastic pollution.

During the G7 presidency, Trudeau can take the lead to initiate an international treaty that sets global reduction targets for the production and consumption of plastics, and regulates their production, consumption, disposal and clean-up.

At the U.N. Environment Assembly in December, nations failed to include any reductions targets or a timetable in their resolution on marine litter and microplastics. They did, however, establish a group to “further examine the barriers to, and options for, combating marine plastic litter and microplastics from all sources, especially land-based sources.”

This group can recommend the formation of a treaty. If the G7 were to endorse this idea, it might get the international treaty-making machinery moving even more quickly. There are many proposals at hand.

One based on the Montreal Protocol — widely regarded as one of the world’s most successful environmental agreements — would impose caps on plastics production and trade bans.

Another points to the climate treaty, with countries setting a binding plastics goal and then developing national action plans.

Alternatively, others call for an agreement that institutes a waste hierarchy, where plastics are first reduced, then reused, re-purposed and finally recycled, and creates a global fund to help pay for better waste management practices and infrastructure.

But successful treaties need industry involvement — and commitment to change. A recent CIEL report traces industry awareness of the ocean plastics problem back to the 1970s. There is no time for the kind of industry denial we’ve seen regarding climate change.

It’s an opportune time for Canada to use its G7 leadership to avert another Silent Spring and begin tackling the problem of plastics in the oceans.

# What did Jesus wear?

Over the past few decades, the question of what Jesus looked like has cropped up again and again. Much has been made of a digital reconstruction of a Judean man created for a BBC documentary, *Son of God*, in 2001. This was based on an ancient skull and, using the latest technology (as it was), shows the head of a stocky fellow with a somewhat worried expression.

Rightly, the skin tone is olive, and the hair and beard black and shortish, but the nose, lips, neck, eyes, eyelids, eyebrows, fat cover and expression are all totally conjectural. Putting flesh on ancient skulls is not an exact science, because the soft tissue and cartilage are unknown.

Nevertheless, for me as a historian, trying to visualise Jesus accurately is a way to understand Jesus more accurately, too.

The Jesus we’ve inherited from centuries of Christian art is not accurate, but it is a powerful brand. A man with long hair parted in the middle and a long beard – often with fair skin, light brown hair and blue eyes – has become the widely accepted likeness. We imagine Jesus in long robes with baggy sleeves, as he is most often depicted in artworks over the centuries. In contemporary films, from Zeffirelli’s *Jesus of Nazareth* (1977) onwards, this styling prevails, even when Jesus’ clothing is considered poorly made.

There were many reasons why Jesus was portrayed in what has become the worldwide standard, and none of them were to do with preserving historical accuracy. I explore these in my new book *What did Jesus look like?*, but ultimately I look to clues in early texts and archaeology for the real Jesus.

For me, Jesus’ appearance is not all about flesh and bones. After all, our bodies are not just bodies. As the sociologist Chris Shilling argues, they are “both personal resources and social symbols that ‘give off’ messages about identity”. We can be old,

young, tall, short, weighty, thin, dark-skinned, light-skinned, frizzy-haired, straight-haired, and so on, but our appearance does not begin and end with our physical bodies. In a crowd, we may look for a friend’s scarf rather than their hair or nose. What we do with our bodies creates an appearance.

And so Jesus’ appearance would have had much to do with what he was wearing. Once we’ve got the palette for his colouring right, given he was a Jewish man of the Middle East, how do we dress him? How did he seem to people of the time?

## DRESSED IN BASICS

There is no neat physical description of Jesus in the Gospels or in ancient Christian literature. But there are incidental details. From the Bible (for example, Mark 6:56) you can discover that he wore a mantle – a large shawl (“himation” in Greek) – which had tassels, described as “edges”; a distinctively Jewish tallith in a form it was in antiquity. Usually made of wool, a mantle could be large or small, thick or fine, coloured or natural, but for men there was a preference for undyed types.

He walked in sandals, as implied in multiple Biblical passages (see Matthew 3:11; Mark 1:7, 6:9; John 1:27), and we now know what ancient Judean sandals were like as they have been preserved in dry caves by the Dead Sea.

He wore a tunic (chitōn), which for men normally finished slightly below the knees, not at the ankles. Among men, only the very rich wore long tunics. Indeed, Jesus specifically identifies men who dress in long tunics (“stolai”, Mark 12:38) as wrongly receiving honour from people who are impressed by their fine attire, when in fact they unjustly devour widows’ houses.

Jesus’s tunic was also made of one piece of cloth only (John 19:23-24). That’s strange, because mostly tunics were made of two pieces sewn at the shoulders and sides. One-piece tunics in first-century Judea were normally thin undergarments or children’s wear. We shouldn’t think of contemporary underwear, but wearing a one-piece on its

own was probably not good form. It was extremely basic.

## ‘SHAMEFULLY’ SHABBY?

Perhaps it is unsurprising, then, that Jesus was remembered as looking shabby by a scholar named Celsus, writing in the mid second century, in a treatise against the Christians. Celsus did his homework. He interviewed people, and he – like us – was quite interested in what Jesus looked like. From Jews and others he questioned, he heard that Jesus “wandered about most shamefully in the sight of all”. He “obtained his means of livelihood in a disgraceful and importunate way” – by begging or receiving donations.

From the perspective of respectable people, we can surmise then that Jesus looked relatively rough. When the Christian writer Origen argued against Celsus, he rejected many of his assertions, but he did not dispute this.

And so while Jesus wore similar clothes to other Jewish men in many respects, his “look” was scruffy. I doubt his hair was particularly long as depicted in most artwork, given male norms of the time, but it was surely not well-tended. Wearing a basic tunic that other people wore as an undergarment would fit with Jesus’ detachment regarding material things (Matthew 6:19-21, 28-29; Luke 6:34-35, 12:22-28) and concern for the poor (Luke 6:20-23).

This, to me, is the beginning of a different way of seeing Jesus, and one very relevant for our times of massive inequality between rich and poor, as in the Roman Empire. Jesus aligned himself with the poor and this would have been obvious from how he looked.

The appearance of Jesus matters because it cuts to the heart of his message. However he is depicted in film and art today, he needs to be shown as one of the have-nots; his teaching can only be truly understood from this perspective.

Releasing the manifesto here, Syiem said the PDF has identified key areas which include the administration of the tribal land and safeguarding the culture and traditions of the tribals as its agendas to work on when it comes to power.

Also listed in the manifesto of the party are the intention of the party to come up with 15 policies for agriculture, the youths, labour and a proper forest and mining policy.

Syiem was elected on a Congress ticket in 2013 but was later suspended by the party. He then formed the PDP.

# 'Coal Vision 2030' forecasts demand at 900 1,000 mtpa by 2020

**KOLKATA, FEB 9 (PTI):** A forward-looking document floated by Coal India Ltd pegs coal demand at 900 1,000 mtpa by 2020, an estimate that might not be favourable for the mining behemoth's ambitious production targets.

The state-run miner aims to produce 1,000 million ton per annum of coal by fiscal 2020.

According to the 'Coal Vision 2030', 33 per cent of the

capacity is at risk of delay and hence, coal production in the short-term in FY20 22 is estimated to be 1,050 mtpa.

Coal demand is projected to rise to 1,300 1,900 mtpa by 2030, of which thermal coal is likely to be 1,150-1,750 mtpa.

The document, prepared by consultant KPMG, also forecast a lower CAGR of just three per cent against six per cent growth achieved in the last five years.

The report, seeking stakeholders' comments, said based on the current status of the captive/commercial blocks, it is estimated their contribution to the overall production could be 90 170 mtpa by the fiscal year 2019-20. Around 100 blocks for captive/commercial use has been allocated or auctioned so far.

It was not immediately known whether the world's

largest miner will consider revising its production target downward, based on the vision document.

In the current fiscal, CIL has missed its production target of 600 mtpa by 29.2 mtpa till January this year.

The document, however, remained upbeat about the demand for coal as a source of primary energy.

"Even in the most adverse scenario, as of Q2 FY17, it

appears that the demand for coal in India, as a source of primary energy shall expand until 2030 and perhaps beyond," the report said.

The vision document said lower price predictions for imported coal may drive imports to 200 mtpa by 2030.

Explaining the import estimates, it pointed out that most analysts expect Australian coal prices to soften to USD 60 per ton by FY30, and the corre-

sponding price for Indonesian Ecocoal to USD 30 40 per ton (on the basis of the historical gap between high grade and medium grade coal).

Renewables will have an impact on the fossil fuel-based power generation, as huge capacities are being planned, the 'Coal Vision 2030' said, adding, no new coal mines need to be allocated or auctioned beyond the current pipeline.

## Bird flu alert sounded in Bhitarkanika National Park

**KENDRAPARA (ODISHA), FEB 9 (PTI):** Forest officials have sounded a bird flu alert at the habitats of migratory birds in Bhitarkanika National Park here following detection of flu infection in Karnataka.

Precautionary measures have been initiated to find out possible flu infection of avian species here, forest officials said.

"A joint field survey by wildlife personnel and state veterinary wing officials is currently under way within the bird-infested pockets of the national park," said Forest



Range Officer (FRO) A K Nayak.

The team is yet to sight sickness symptoms in the birds, Nayak said.

The forest department and veterinary experts are on the alert and are keeping close watch on avian species, he added.

The forest officials have also been instructed to keep a watch on birds inhabiting in the park, said Chief District Veterinary Officer (CDVO) Sumant Kumar Mohapatra.

Leaflets and booklets are being distributed among the villagers living near the national park to create awareness, Mohapatra said.

No death of bird has been reported as yet, he said, adding, instructions were on to segregate the birds found drooping from other birds and

conduct blood sample test check.

A Rapid Response Team (RRT) has been constituted in all nine blocks of the district, Mohapatra said.

Forest and veterinary officials are also keeping a close watch on the migratory birds and other species since they are prone to carry the H5N1 strain of avian influenza, he said.

We have already started examining some avian species in Bhitarkanika but could not find any sick birds, he added.

## Centre 'politicising' budgetary allocation for Railways: TMC

**NEW DELHI, FEB 9 (PTI):** Trinamool Congress (TMC) leader Derek O'Brien today accused the Centre of "politicising" the budgetary allocation for the Railways and favouring BJP-ruled states.

He also alleged that the government was deliberately trying to muzzle the voice of the opposition as the ruling dispensation had no answers to the questions raised by it.

"Can the government answer why BJP-ruled states got increased share of budgetary allocation for railways? Uttarakhnad got a raise of 165 per cent, Rajasthan 30 per cent raise and



Gujarat 20 per cent from the last year's budgetary allocation," he said.

Meanwhile, the share for states such as Delhi, Kerala, West Bengal was brought down by 14, 23

and 15 per cent respectively, O'Brien claimed.

"They have always accused non-BJP railway ministers of politicising the Railway Budget, but now, it is the government

that is politicising the budget," the TMC leader told reporters.

He accused the government of propagating hollow promises of providing employment, saying even though there were 1.75 lakh vacant posts in the Railways' safety sector, the government was ignoring the issue.

"Safety of railways has been compromised. People can get employment in railways. But this government is not even thinking about it," O'Brien said.

He also attacked the government of deliberately shutting down non-profitable routes in West Bengal to corner

the state which is being ruled by an opposition party -- the TMC.

"Can you stop all non-profitable routes in all states? the railway ministry has a social responsibility," the leader asked.

He also questioned the priority of the ministry, alleging that it had ignored the freight corridor for the bullet train in Gujarat.

The Rajya Sabha member claimed that he was advised by his party supremo Mamata Banerjee, who was Railway minister in the UPA government, to raise the issues in the House to expose the government in Parliament.

# Meghalaya CM Mukul Sangma contesting from two seats

**SHILLONG, FEB 9 (PTI):** Meghalaya Chief Minister Mukul Sangma, who is making effort to enter assembly for the fifth time, has filed nominations from a second constituency too in addition to his traditional seat of Ampati.

The Congress strongman is in the fray from Ampati in South West Garo Hills district as well Songsak in East Garo Hills district for February 27 state elections.

This is for the first time that Sangma, who is Chief Minister of Meghalaya for past 10 years, is also contesting from a second seat.

After end of scrutiny of nomination papers, Ampati has only three contestants, including the CM.

Songsak has seven candidates including Sangma in the fray.

At Ampati, Sangma



would face a triangular contest after the BJP fielded former bureaucrat Bakul Hajong from the seat.

Independent candidate Joyanto Marak is also a strong contender from the constituency.

Altogether 374 candidates have been cleared for fighting the state poll after scrutiny of nominations. Out of this, there are 33 women and 85 Independent candidates, chief electoral officer F R Kharkongor told PTI today.

Rongjeng constituency in East Garo Hills district has maximum number of 11 candidates in the field for the poll for 60 constituencies of Meghalaya.

Tirikilla and North Tura constituencies have 10 candidates each. The CEO said the last day of withdrawal of nominations is February 12. The date of counting will be on March 3, three days before the tenure of the current assembly ends.

Besides, Ampati seat,

two other constituencies-- Sohiong and Bajengdoba--also have only three candidates in the fray.

Chief Minister's colleague and close confidant H Donkumar Roy Lyngdoh, who was given plump portfolios in charge of Home and Transport in the last re-shuffling, will also face a triangular contest at his Sohiong constituency in East Khasi Hills district.

Samling Malngiang, a candidate of the Hills State Peoples Democrat-

ic Party (HSPDP) is the regional parties best bet against the Donkumar whose eldest son was defeated in the autonomous district council elections over a year ago.

Judah J M Wahlang put up by the Peoples Democratic Front, a new political party floated last year, may crack in either of the vote banks spoiling any of the top runner's votes.

The third triangular contest in this election will be in Bajengdoba constituency where the Congress, the National Peoples Party and the BJP will put in their best bet against each other.

Brigaddy Marak who joined the Congress last month will contest against the former MLA and BJP's candidate John Manner Marak and the NPP's candidate Pongseng Marak from Bajengdoba seat.







# India eye milestone win, South Africa hope for revival

**JOHANNESBURG, FEB 9 (PTI):** India's indomitable cricket team looks set for a landmark series triumph but an injury- ravaged South Africa would hope for some A B de Villiers magic to halt the visitors' charge in the fourth one-dayer, here on Saturday.

With an unassailable 3-0 lead in hand, India need just one more win to claim their maiden ODI series triumph on the South African soil.

The closest they came was in 2010-11, when under Mahendra Singh Dhoni, they shot into a 2-1 lead only to lose the five- match series 3-2.

India had previously broken into uncharted territory at Newlands when, for the first time since they began touring here in 1992-93, they won three matches in a bilateral ODI engagement in South Africa.

A fourth consecutive win will also cement their spot as the no.1 side in ICC ODI Rankings.

Before the third ODI, Shikhar Dhawan had highlighted that the team wants to win every game ahead of them, building on victory in the third Test here, and there would be no complacency in the dressing room.

Indeed then, Virat Kohli lifted his side to another dominant win with an immaculate 34th ODI century and later spoke of replicating the same intensity to wrap up the series with two matches remaining.

The fact that Kuldeep Yadav and Yuzvendra Chahal have now accounted for 21 out of 30 available wickets is also a driving force behind this confidence.

Despite practicing with at least five different local wrist spinners at Newlands, the Proteas' batting line-up still couldn't contend with India's first-choice spin duo.

Whether this will change on

Saturday remains to be seen.

South Africa may have slight cause for optimism as de Villiers was, on Thursday, added to their ODI squad for the remainder three matches.

The star batsman was ruled out of the first three ODIs owing to a finger injury he had sustained during the third Test.

However, the hosts are still circumspect about his chances of playing and as such Cricket South Africa didn't send out any official media information ahead of this game. De Villiers will be assessed Friday afternoon -- 24 hours before the game -- and a call will then be made on his availability for the match.

If he is fit and available, it is expected that de Villiers will bat at no.3 with JP Duminy dropping down to no.4 thus. One of David Miller or Khaya Zondo will make way for him in the playing eleven.

Unsurprisingly, despite the downturn, Aiden Markram will continue leading the side.

This match is of vital importance for South Africa in their home season. It is the 'Pink ODI', played for the awareness against breast cancer and for the benefit of those suffering from the disease.

It was first held in 2011, and this will be the sixth such occasion. In fact, the Proteas have never lost when playing in their unique pink jersey.

De Villiers has a handsome record on Pink Days. In 2015, he had smashed 149 off just 44 balls against the West Indies.

In 2013, when India were first part of this Pink Day celebration, de Villiers had scored 77 off 47 balls.

South Africa had amassed 358/4 on a Wanderers' wicket full of pace and bounce, and India had lost by 141 runs.

That day Rohit Sharma had struggled against the likes of Dale

Steyn and Morne Morkel, scoring just 18 off 43 balls. The opener's travails have extended to this tour as well.

In 11 ODIs now in South Africa, the three-time double centurion averages a paltry 12.10. His form is the only pressing concern for the Indian team, yet not so much that he will be left out of the playing eleven.

With the Men in Blue looking to wrap up the series, Kohli is expected to field an unchanged line-up once again.

India have an average record at this ground. In seven ODIs here, they have won three and lost four, including the infamous 2003 World Cup final against Australia.

Also, as opposed to their unbeaten Test record against South Africa here, India have lost 3 out of 4 ODIs they have played against the hosts at Wanderers.

Their only cause for cheer against the Proteas here came in January 2011, when Munaf Patel took 4-29 to lead India to a thrilling one-run win.

Thanks to Kohli's imperious consistency and the terrorising form of their wrist spinners, that lopsided record might just be about to change.

# Karman puts India ahead with win over Eudice Chong

NEW DELHI, FEB 9 (PTI):

Ankita Raina continued her red-hot form with a fluent win after Karman Kaur Thandi's erratic victory as India blanked Hong Kong 3-0 in the Fed Cup here on Friday.

Karman struggled to contain her unforced errors but prevailed 6-3 6-4 over Eudice Chong to give India a 1-0 lead in the Asia/Oceania Group I matches.

Up against a lower-ranked opponent, placed a humble 761 in the WTA list, Karman snapped a four-match losing streak.

The last time she won a Fed Cup match was exactly a year back when she travelled to Astana, Kazakhstan.

Ankita, who has impressed with her inspirational performance



against higher-ranked players, then overcame Ling Zhang 6-3 6-2 to seal India's first win of the 2018 season.

In the inconsequential doubles, Prarthana Thombare and Pranjala Yadlapalli defeated Kwan Yau Ng and Ching Hu Wu 6-2 6-4.

The last time India won a tie 3-0 was in February 2016, against Kazakhstan in Thailand.

Tomorrow, India will play Chinese Taipei, the fourth-placed team in Pool B in the relegation Play-off. The winner will remain in Group I and the loser will be relegated to Group II.

The last time India played Chinese Taipei was in February 2011 in Thailand and lost 1-2.

Despite playing some energy-sapping matches in the last two days, Ankita did not let the intensity drop as she kept grinding from the baseline and found some delightful winners.

She did not lose a single point on her serve in the first two games and after breaking Zhang in the fourth game, Ankita staved off four breakpoints in the fifth to take a 4-1 lead.

The break stayed

with her as she closed the set in the ninth.

To Zhang's credit, she did play intelligent tennis, often catching Ankita by surprise with her well-calculated drop shots.

Zhang, ranked 331, also returned well.

Ankita hit a service return winner to earn two breakpoints and converted the first when Zhang hit a backhand wide to take an early lead in the second set.

She had as many as nine breakpoints to open up a huge lead but a dogged Zhang saved all of them. Ankita created opportunities with several winners at deuce points but every time Zhang came out with deep, angled returns to deny Ankita conversion.

# Indra Nooyi appointed ICC's first independent female director

**Dubai, Feb 9 (PTI):** PepsiCo Chairman and CEO Indra Nooyi has been appointed to the International Cricket Council (ICC) Board as the governing body's first independent female director.

Nooyi will join the Board in June 2018 to align with the term of the ICC Independent Chairman, following the unanimous confirmation of her appointment at today's meeting, an ICC release said.



"I am thrilled to join the ICC as the first person to be appointed to this role. I look forward to working with my col-

leagues on the board, ICC's partners, and cricketers around the world to grow our sport responsibly and give our fans a new reason to follow every ball and shot," Nooyi said.

ICC Chairman, Shashank Manohar, said: "Adding another independent director particularly a female is such an important step forward in improving our governance. To have someone of Indra's calibre is fantastic news for the global game."

The introduction of an Independent Director, who must be female, was approved by the ICC Full Council in June last year as part of wide ranging constitutional change aimed at improving the governance of the sport.

The Independent Director will be appointed for a two-year term although she may be re-appointed for two further terms with a maximum six-year consecutive period of service.

# N Korea delegation led by Kim's sister arrives for Olympics

**SEOUL, FEB 9 (AP):** The sister of the North Korean leader today became the first member of her family to visit South Korea since the 1950-53 Korean War as part of a high-level delegation attending the opening ceremony of the Pyeongchang Winter Olympics.

Arriving on her brother Kim Jong Un's white private jet for a three-day visit, Kim Yo Jong and the country's 90-year-old nominal head of state Kim Yong Nam are scheduled to meet with South Korean President Moon Jae-in tomorrow in a luncheon at Seoul's presidential palace.

Dressed in a black coat, carrying a black shoulder bag and hit with a barrage of camera flashes, Kim Yo Jong smiled as a group of South Korean officials, including Unification Minister Cho Myoung-gyon, greeted her and the rest of the delegates at a meeting room at Incheon International Airport.

The North Koreans, also including Choe Hwi, chairman of the country's National Sports Guidance Committee, and Ri Son Gwon, chairman of the North's agency that deals with inter-Korean affairs then moved down a floor on an es-



calator to board a high-speed train to Pyeongchang.

Moon has been trying to use the games as an opportunity to revive meaningful communication with North Korea after a period of diplomatic stalemate and eventually pull it into talks over resolving the international standoff over its nuclear program.

The last time a South Korean president invited North Korean officials to the presidential Blue House was in November 2007, when late liberal President Roh Moo-hyun, the political mentor of Moon, host-

ed then-North Korean premier Kim Yong Il for a luncheon following a meeting between the countries' senior officials.

Skeptics say North Korea, which is unlikely to give up its nukes under any deal, is just using the Olympics to poke holes at the US-led international sanctions against the country and buy more time to further advance its strategic weaponry.

The North Korean delegation's arrival came a day after Kim Jong Un presided over a massive military parade in Pyongyang that was highlight-

ed by the country's developmental intercontinental ballistic missiles, which in three flight tests last year showed potential ability to reach deep into the US mainland when perfected.

South Korean media have been speculating about whether Kim will send a personal message to Moon through his sister and, if so, whether it would include a proposal for a summit between the two leaders.

Kim Yo Jong, believed to be around 30, is the first member of North Korea's ruling family

to visit the South since the Korean War.

As first vice director of the Central Committee of North Korea's ruling Workers' Party, Kim has been an increasingly prominent figure in North Korea's leadership and is considered one of the few people who has earned her brother's absolute trust.

Analysts say the North's decision to send her to the Olympics shows an ambition to break out from diplomatic isolation and pressure by improving relations with the South, which it could use as a bridge for approaching the United States.

By sending a youthful, photogenic person who will undoubtedly attract international attention during the games, North Korea may also be trying to craft a fresher public image and defang any U.S. effort to use the Olympics to highlight the North's brutal human rights record.

South Korea has yet to announce a confirmed schedule for the North Korean delegates aside of their participation in the opening ceremony and tomorrow's luncheon with Moon.



## Raj Shah makes White House press briefing debut

**WASHINGTON, FEB 9 (PTI):** Raj Shah, the Principal Deputy Press Secretary of US President Donald Trump, has made his daily press briefing debut at the White House, becoming the first Indian-American to do so.

Ahead of his debut behind press briefing podium, his boss Sarah Sanders, the White House Press Secretary, described him as one of the best and the brightest in the Trump Administration.

In his capacity as the White House Principal Deputy Press Secretary, Shah is the highest rank-

ing Indian-American in the White House press shop. Shah, 33, has held this position since September last year.

"So proud to work with @RajShah45! One of the best and brightest in the administration," Sanders said in a tweet before Shah took the podium in the historic James S Brady press briefing room of the White House.

Shah held his first press briefing following the resignation of White House staff secretary Rob Porter over domestic abuse allegations, US media reported.

## PM Modi to have packed schedule during UAE visit

**ABU DHABI, FEB 9 (PTI):** Prime Minister Narendra Modi will have a busy schedule in the UAE, with meetings lined up with the country's leaders, the Indian community and businessmen, India's envoy here has said.

Modi will reach here tomorrow from Palestine and then will have bilateral engagements in Abu Dhabi followed by a banquet, India's ambassador to the UAE Navdeep Singh Suri said.

This would be Modi's second visit to the country. He had visited the UAE in 2015.

On Sunday, the prime minister will go to Dubai where he will watch the live streaming of a Hindu temple inauguration ceremony and then address the

Indian community gathered at the Opera House.

The UAE is home to over three million people of Indian origin.

He will proceed to the venue of the World Government Summit where to deliver keynote address.

He has meetings lined up with Gulf business leaders. He will also meeting the Ruler of Dubai and Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid and also visit a paintings exhibition by Ramesh Shukla, Suri said.

Modi had said energy security and infrastructural investments in India would be the key topics that he will discuss with the UAE's leadership.

The investment from UAE to India exceeds USD 11 billion.



**P**resident Jacob Zuma's resignation date could be announced next Monday, a leading figure in South African politics has said. The former deputy president of South Africa and key member of the ruling African National Congress, Baleka Mbete, said pressure was being applied by "interested parties" to bring about a resolution to the country's current crisis. "I think that it is the issue that is going to be behind us quite soon... I think early in this coming week it should be clearer, after more consultations that will happen over the weekend," Ms Mbete, who currently serves as speaker of South Africa's sometimes-raucous National Assembly, said. "Hopefully early in the week we should be utterly able to indicate we're moving on."

## Trump's immigration framework will end green card backlog: House

**WASHINGTON, FEB 9 (PTI):** US President Donald Trump's immigration framework will end the diversity lottery visa to help reduce green card backlog of high-skilled workers, the White House said today amid growing demands by Indian H-1B visa holders to remove the per country-limit on its allotment.

Indian-Americans, most of whom are highly skilled and come to the US mainly on H-1B work visas are the worst sufferers of the current immigration system which imposes a seven per cent per country quota on allotment of green cards or permanent legal residency.

As a result, the current wait period for Indian skilled



immigrants for green card can be as long as 70 years.

Over the last one week, many Indian skilled immigrants gathered in Washington DC from various parts of the US to ask the Trump Administration and Congress to remove this major anomaly in the immigration system.

"President Trump's framework would end the visa lot-

tery programme and reallocate some of the visas to help reduce backlog of high-skilled, employment-based immigrant cases," the White House said in a fact sheet titled 'ending the economic harm caused by our immigration system'.

Later in the evening, Trump called for ending the visa lottery system.

"Time to end the visa lot-

tery. Congress must secure the immigration system and protect Americans," he tweeted.

The White House said Trump favoured a merit-based immigration system, which attracts the best and the brightest from across the world.

"I think the president wants to see legal immigration reform. He wants to see us move from a process that currently exists in law of extended family-chain migration toward merit-based immigration reforms," White House Deputy Press Secretary Raj Shah told reporters during his first ever White House press conference.

He said the Trump administration wanted to ensure

that people coming into the country are the best and the brightest, regardless of nationality, creed, religion, or anything else in between.

"We want to look at the educational backgrounds, ability to contribute to the workforce in a way that helps American workers. So the president wants to see reforms that improve America's economy," Shah said.

According to Senate Republican Policy Committee, every year the US on an average allocates some 50,000 green cards through lottery for people from countries who do not get an opportunity to come to the US through the merit-based employment visas.

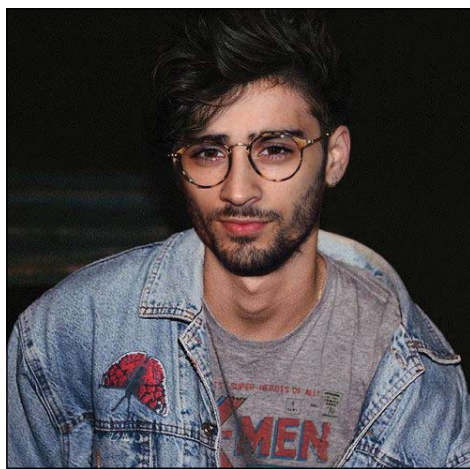

the same name. She'd later edit the caption after some considered it a jab toward Taylor. So is there actually any truth to Taylor and Karlise's falling out?

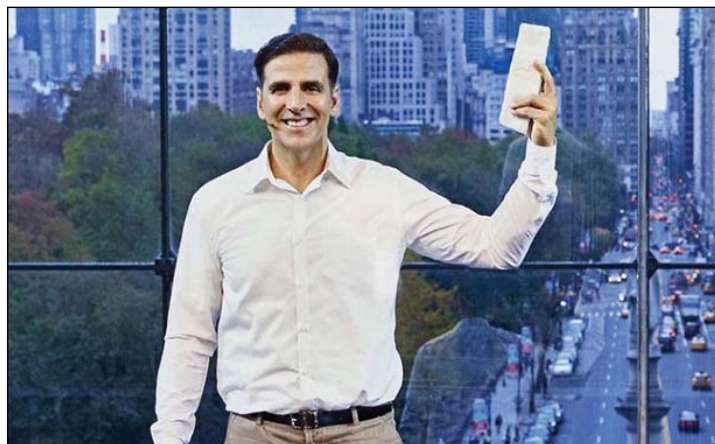
