Asaram found guilty of raping teenager in 2013, awarded life term

JODHPUR, APR 25 (PTI): A Jodhpur court today awarded life sentence to self-styled godman to self-styled godman Asaram after holding him guilty of raping a teenage girl in his ashram five years ago, the second case of a powerful spiritual leader being convicted of a sexual offence in less than a year after Dera Sa-cha Sauda head Gurmeet

cha Sauda head Gurmeet Ram Rahim last August. Special judge Madhu-sudan Sharma's verdict, which comes as the de-bate over sexual violence, particularly the rape of minors, intensifies across the country, was read out in the Jodhpur Central Jail where 77-year-old Asaram has been kept for over four years. "The court has awarded life imprisonment to Asaram while the two other convicts have been each sentenced to 20 years in jail," a senior police official said.

Arguments for the quantum of sentencing were earlier held inside the heavily fortified jail premises, where the trial court delivered its ver dict in accordance with the directions of the Rajasthan High Court.

Two floors of Kisan Bazaar to open from Sunday for organic farmers

GANGTOK, 25 APR:

Farmers from different parts of Sikkim can now sell their organic produce here at the Kisan Bazaar in Gangtok from the coming Sunday. While the four-sto-ried Bazaar is still under construction, two floors of the building have been exclusive-ly allocated to local farmers of Sikkim for direct sale of their organic produce.

The two floors can accommodate 200 local farmers and has one space for SIMFED. Various facilities like canteen, cold storage, etc, will be pro-vided to the farmers. The Ki-san Bazaar will be inaugurated by Minister for Agriculture, Horticulture & Cash Crops Development Department, Somnath Poudval.

Addressing a press conference here this afternoon, Horticulture & Cash Crop Development Department Director, DK Bhandari, informed



that spaces at the two floors available for local farmers of Sikkim to sell their products throughout the week starting this Sunday.

Farmers can either forward their produce to SIM-

FED or sell them directly to he said further adding that no license will be required for

this space. However, they will need to bring a proof of identification or recommendation from the concerned Pancha-yat only to ensure that other people do not take the space which is meant exclusively for

He informed that Kisan Bazaar will have 85 other stalls for local farmers along with provision of two cold storage facilities. In order to discourage subletting of licenses, the department will cancel the allotment if anyone is found doing so, he added.

"We are encouraging farmers throughout the State to come and sell their produce directly to customers," he said.
Mr Bhandari informed

that such Kisan Bazaars will be coming up in other dis-tricts as well along with number of organic stalls through-out the State for farmers to sell their vegetables.

SIMFED Managing Director, Pawan Awasthy, stated that SIMFED has been giving top priority to growers and even providing better prices to them. He added that SIM-FED vehicles have been picking up vegetables from vari-ous parts of the State for the convenience of farmers and to further motivate them in the organic mission.

Mr Awasthy also refuted various allegations of SIMFED selling non-organic vegetables and selling vegetables at higher rates after procur-ing them at low prices from growers. These are totally growers. These are totally false, SIMFED is a government organisation which has all official records of its procurements and some vested interests are trying to defame the organisation, he stated.

WORLD BANK MISSION REVIEWS IMPLEMENTATION OF NATIONAL HYDROLOGY PROJECT

Minister Poudyal bats for scientific hydropower management in Sikkim

GANGTOK, 25 APR [IPR]: The first phase of the 2nd World Bank Mission was conducted here in the capital today. The three-day mission-cum-conference that aims to review the implementation of the National Hydrology Project [NHP] was inaugurated by Minister for Water Resources & River Development Depart-ment, Somnath Poudyal. The Mission is being

attended by over 60 delegates from across the country including Team Leader, World Bank, Anju Gaur, Senior Joint Commissioners, Ministry of Water Resources & Ganga Rejuvenation, Neer-aj Manglik and Rakesh Kashyap, and senior offi-cials from 12 other States and central agencies from across the country.

The Second Phase of the Mission will be held at Munnar in Kerala in May for other States and Agencies who could not attend the conference in

Gangtok.

Mr Poudyal, in his inaugural address, stressed on the need for proper management of water due to imminent inadequacy of drinking water and water for farming resulting in scarcity of food due to global warming and related challenges.

Speaking about the situation in Sikkim, he shared that Sikkim experiences extreme water shortages and drought prone conditions for about four months during the winters which he said is paradoxical



since Sikkim primarily gets good amount of rainfall during the monsoons and the percolated and surface runoff water runs its course for about six months.

He expressed hope that the NHP will play a pivotal role in the effec-tive management of water resources, especially

during the lean period.

He further shared that Sikkim has harnessed a lot of its hydro power potential over the vears and the time has now come to undertake its management along scientific lines for equitable use as well as sustainability. "Now, with the NHP.

the State will be estab-lishing data measuring stations to a certain extent, five automatic weather stations, and ten manual rain gauge stations and few other gauge stations, and many more to come in future, the Minister stated.

He also shared with

the delegates some of the green initiatives of the State of Sikkim including the Organic Mission. He attributed the development to the consistent leadership and political will to propel the State to new heights.

In conclusion, Mr audyal stated that the NHP will have collection and analyzing wa-ter related data as one of the major outcomes. This will ultimately help in reducing the effects of global warming and climate change for the people of this country as also its flora and fauna and the environment as a whole, he added.

He congratulated the Ministry of Water Re-sources, Government of India for having successfully engaged the World Bank in availing the financial support for the Project and also thanked the World Bank for their support. After

He further urged the officials, adminis-police department, health youth and the public to lead by example to make Sikkim a disease-free state.

Resource person for the day, National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme (NVBDCP) Director, Dr Pramila Giri, made a power-point presentation on NVBDCP which she said is the central nodal agency for the preven-tion and control of vector borne diseases like malaria, dengue, kala-azar, japanese encephalitis and chikungunia in the country.

She also spoke about medical cases of vector borne diseases in Sikkim and discussed various measures to prevent and control them.

CM trying to alienate LT community: SPA

GANGTOK, 25 APR: Cikkim People's Sikkim reopie :
ance [SPA] has strongly refuted the recent statements of the Chief Minister regarding the Limboo Tamang [LT] seat reservation issue and the consequent expansion of Sikkim Legislative seats [SLA] from 32 to 40.

In a press release issued by SPA chief con-venor, MK Subba, the SPA has argued that the LT community, on being recognized as Schedule Tribe in 2002, were enti-tled to seat reservation in the SLA and consequently, the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India had given three options vide Letter No – D.O.
No IV/11015/1/2005-CSR II dated 30 July 2005 to the Government of Sik-kim where the first option was to reserve five seats from the existing 17 still unreserved seats

The release further informs that the second option was to increase the SLA seats from the existing 32 to 40 seats and give reservation to the LT community leaving the remaining 20 seats as Unreserved while the third option was to increase the SLA seats from existing 32 to 60 seats in conformity

with Article 171 [1] of the Indian Constitution.
"Out of the three op-

tions proposed by the MHA [GoI], the Sikkim Democratic Front led State government cleverly chose to go with the 2nd option of increasing the SLA seats from existing 32 to 40 seats, consciously aware of the fact that the Delimitation of Parliamentary and Assembly seats has been frozen till 2026 vide the 84th Constitu-tional Amendment Act of 2002, which was ap-proved and passed as an Act in both houses of the Indian Parliament when the SDF led government had two MPs in both the houses.
Subsequently, the 4th

Delimitation Commission chaired by retired Supreme Court Judge, Kuldeep Singh, had given an opportunity for Limited Delimitation to the GoS to accommodate the LT seats within the existing 32 SLA seats in 2006. However, the proposal was declined by the SDF led government, which further deprived the LT community of their constitutional rights.

In the same context, we would like to ques-tion the Chief Minister as to how he will pro-vide the LT seats before 2019 as claimed by him within the framework of the Indian Constitution, knowing that the next Census-based Delimita-tion exercise is expected only in 2031, after the 2026 vide the 84th Constitutional Amendment Act of 2001. Hence, the SDF led government is very much aware of the Constitutional obligation and that they will not be able to provide LT seats before 2019," the SPA has stated in the release.

The SPA has alleged that the CM is trying to alienate the LT community from the rest of the Nepali community by stating that LT seat reservation is eating into the share of the majority community thereby inciting divisive communal propaganda.

The SPA has further alleged in the release that the CM has failed to deliver on the burning issues of the State and has been building up "hate politics" since he is running out of options to face the General Elections of 2019.

"We would like to caution the CM to refrain from double standard and divisive propagandas and work sincerely for the people of Sikkim, the SPA adds.

agement institutions in India. The project envisages expanding the hydrological information platform and institutional capacity, improved infrastructure for water resources data collection, management and sharing, develop tools to ver-ify water resources data, and develop tools for water resources planning and for management of water.

The NHP will seek integrate the water resources information across state and central agencies. The focus will be on using the information generated, for water planning and management. The expectation

is that knowledge, open access and stronger in-stitutional capacity will contribute to a shift towards integrated water resources management at the basin scale. The resulting improved water allocation and improved management of drought and flood risks will bring substantial socio-economic benefits.

The activity under the project envisages improving the extent and reliability of water resources data through automated/digitized and real-time communica-tion systems. Hydro met networks will encompass meteorological, hy-drological [surface and groundwater] and water quality measurements. The emphasis will be on real-time data collection and telemetric transmission for use in water resources planning, reser voir operations and flood management.

The project will also develop web-based water resources informa-tion systems [WRIS] at State and Central levels. Building on protocols developed by central agencies, information sharing amongst agen-cies will be facilitated. The knowledge portals will provide easy access and analysis of water data. Public access will be developed by a mobile-based app, and disaster-related infor-

mation will be rapidly disseminated through mobile services. Stream flow forecasting and reservoir operation sys-tems will support integration of real time data, weather forecast and hydrological models for water resource management and improved alert systems for disaster management.

Need to Always be All Ready

Monsoon preparedness should be a year-round effort

Here are the basics, in Geographical terms - the South-East quadrant of Sikkim, its footprint spreading across the alignment from Mangan to Dikchu, also sweeping through Rabong, and then to Gang-tok up to Rongli, is the maximum rainfall zone of the State. The South-West corner around Hilley in West Sikkim is the other wetter zone and between the two sits the dry-to-the-extent-of drought-prone spread of Namchi and its immediate surroundings.

This much, anyone who has lived in Sikkim for a decent stretch of years will know instinctively. Ironically, this obvious fact has remained blindsided for far too long in the State, catching its people and planners on the wrong foot every time the skies open up, which is very often. Readers of this newspaper would have noticed that all four districts have been going through the motions of monsoon preparedness, but most of these have been limited to clearing jhoras and drains, with the connectivity and supplies situation receiving only nominal attention. Perhaps the reasonably tame monsoons of the past few years have inflicted some somnolence, but then again as any resident will point out, monsoons play in cycles of three years in Sikkim - three years of normal or less than normal rains and then three years of ferocity. The last monsoon was normal, and if past trends, also recognized by experts are any indication, Sikkim is being set up for a strong wave of rains this year. News reports about monsoon preparedness are included in the paper as much to inform people of the preparedness plans as for them to check back when the slides begin.

The concerned departments getting into monsoon readiness mode is a welcome sign, but what cannot be ignored is that monsoons become a challenge essentially because the drier months are allowed to pass without enough preparedness work getting done. For instance, meteorological data informs that Sikkim has an average of $160\,\mathrm{days}$ of rainfall every year (for Gangtok, this is $184\,\mathrm{days!}$). That is a staggering number of wet days, but the data also reveals that the capital has almost as many days without rain and for a region kept on tenterhooks with what the clouds bear, the dry months need to be used well – to reinforce, repair, rebuild and restore. And yet, planners in the various civil works agencies of the State and Central governments refuse to make use of the dry months to get done with their digging and scrapping. It goes without saying that any work which, in any way, weakens slopes and alignments should be banned safely ahead of the monsoons because Sikkim's slopes have a tendency to come down like dominos at the slightest disruption once the mon soon sets in. With slightly over half the year spent with rainfall [albeit of varying intensities], planning here should be with the wet weather in mind. In these days of climate change, this becomes even more important because while the number of days with rainfall might come down, the intensity is projected to increase and that is even more destructive.

One needs to also bear in mind is that the rash of freak weather that Sikkim has been experiencing in recent years is no longer 'freakish' because it is consistent with climate change patterns. Sikkim now has a Department of Science & Technology with a longer name which includes "Climate Change". The policy-makers should realign the focus of this department to counsel other arms of the government on climate change adjustments and preparedness. Any student who has prepared for an essay/ debate competition on climate change will tell you that the intensity of climatic phenomenon is projected to reach extreme levels with climate change. Sikkim is already experiencing this. There might be fewer days of rainfall, but the days when it rains, it will pour. Departments working on civil projects like roads, hydel projects or construction should be the ones who get briefed on what to expect in the coming years and adjust their designs and work schedules accordingly. Storm drains, for example, should not be designed to just receive 8 cm of rain over an entire day in May, but to evacuate this inundation within an hour. Having been caught offguard should not be accepted as an excuse anymore. Water conservation, an important issue around the word as in Sikkim, needs to be approached in a more pragmatic and interdisciplinary manner with intelligent and informed plantation efforts because a hill/ slope which conserves water well is also less prone to slip away. Done right, the spring rejuvenation mission should not only address the future needs of water supply, but also stabilise the slopes of Sikkim which have been debased by too much 'development' and too little respect for traditional knowledge..

The biggest clash of heroes and villains in Avengers: Infinity War - but can science survive?

Ten years of the Mar-vel Cinematic Universe (MCU) comes to a head with the release of Avengers: Infinity War, the 19th Marvel Studios film to date.

The biggest Marvel movie ever brings with it the largest cast of superheroes (and villains) ever and the biggest stakes ever to be fought over.

The movie also pushes our boundaries on what you think could happen in a Mar-vel movie - with set pieces and some pretty good pathos mixed with humour The Iron Man and Spider-Man suit technology is cooler than we've seen before. It also has, by a fair margin, the most fulfilling Marvel villain so far in Thanos, played by Josh

My colleague and I had a great time reviewing the sci-ence in Marvel movies such as Thor: Ragnarok, Guardians of the Galaxy Volume 2 and Spider-Man: Homecoming, but I think we can resolve unfinished scientific enquiry with Infinity War.

Obligatory warning: some minor spoilers follow, with one incredibly big plot revealing spoiler at the end of

IRON MAN'S POOR BRAIN

Iron Man best protect his brainy asset. (Marvel) There's a lot of flying in

Infinity War, and Iron Man's flying was one of the coolest things about the original Iron Man movie where the MCU began in 2008.

Now if the physics of propulsion and fuel can be solved, then parts of Iron Man's suit abilities are plausible. But one challenge that has no immediately obvious solution is sustaining the G forces required to accelerate like Iron Man is shown to do in the movies, especially when he has his suit's turbo propulsion mode activated.

Remember that Iron Man



is a very fit but otherwise normal human, apart from the generator in his chest. His suit can probably stop his legs from buckling under the acceleration, but his brain is another matter.

Under ideal conditions. fighter pilots can stay conscious up to about 10Gs. But what is Tony's acceleration?

but never a moon in a Marvel movie. What exactly would it

take to pull this off?
One way to do this would be to instantaneously stop the moon dead in its tracks.

We can assume that Thanos is sufficiently powerful to do so, but then I guess we need to allow some dramatic license for that same Thanos struggling to put down Captain America, who is just an amped up normal human, later in the movie.

Verdict: Thanos - titan one moment, terribly weak the next.

WHAT ARE THE CHANC-ES? (MAJOR SPOILER)

You have been warned, so do not read on if you don't want

The massive, incredibly dramatic ending of the mov-ie involves Thanos enacting his promise to kill one half of the universe's population, completely at random. And boy, do the closing scenes of the movie pack a punch. I've rarely seen or heard an audience reaction like that at the end of a movie, as character after character dies.

While no-one can fault the screenwriters for an unprecedented move, a cynic might wonder what the chances

were of the original big name (and presumably big box office draws) Avenger actors surviving the cull (although the Black Panther movie put a pretty compelling case for a new set of actors).

It also seems like waaaav more than 50% of the on screen characters still alive at the climax of the movie meet a tragic fate in Tha-nos's purge (including in an end credits scene not to be

missed).
So to help you make up your own mind, see the handy Thanos 50% genocide chart alongside.

It shows the distribution of likelihoods for a percent-age of characters dying, under a 50% purge (based on a count of 20 on screen characters at the end of the movie).

The most likely outcome is about 50% of the characters dying, as shown in the centre of the graph. But if you move to the left you can see that although the odds drop, there's still some chance of as small a fraction as 25% dving, and at the other side of

the graph of up to 75% dying. Verdict: Plausible enough, although contracts could be althou₆..
revealing.

Avengers: Infinity War is Marvel's biggest movie to date and in many ways its most dramatic. Long story and character arcs have all led to this point, meaning the movie's (frankly incredible) events are all the more powerful for the viewer.

The action scenes are bigger and better than ever before, and we're treated to an ending and super villain like no Marvel movie before it. Upping the stakes, action and epic scenes means an expect-ed further departure from "conventional" scientific reality, but that can be forgiven for the sake of an incredibly entertaining and engaging film.

Yes, your kids can run all day - they've got muscles like endurance athletes

ost of us know children who can run and play Most of us know cinician who short rests.

As a parent or carer, it can be exhausting. For scientists, why this is the case has long been the source of debate - is it due to fitness? Or something

Our study published today looked at performance and recovery of children and adults doing strenuous cycling. It shows children not only out-perform most adults, but can perform as well as highly-trained adult endurance athletes, and then recover even faster afterwards.

CHILDREN'S MUSCLES ARE DIFFERENT

Repeated experiments have shown that the muscles of children tend to fatigue more slowly than adults

These results seem to fly in the face of what science would predict. For example, children have shorter limbs, so they have to take more steps and should therefore theoretically use more energy.

Children are also less able to make use of ten-don energy return systems – that is, they store less energy in their tendons so they can't reuse this energy to propel themselves during movement.

And children show greater activity in muscles that oppose or control movement, a reflection of the fact that typically they are less skillful, and therefore use more energy.

So how do their muscles stay fresh? AEROBIC AND ANAEROBIC EXERCISE

One possible explanation for the remarkable muscle endurance of children could be their different use of energy pathways.

Anaerobic ("oxygen-independent") pathways produce large amounts of energy without the need for oxygen - but tend to cause rapid fatigue. For example, sprinters rely on anaerobic metabolism to run fast over short distances.

Aerobic ("oxygen-dependent") pathways tend to produce energy at a slower rate but allow us to work for many hours without muscle shut down, like in a well-run marathon.

We know from existing research that children

seem to be able to get more of their energy from aerobic pathways than adults, minimising the fatiguing anaerobic contribution. Their aerobic machinery also kicks into gear faster than adults, so they don't need to rely as much on anaerobic metabolism when exercise first starts.

These benefits are believed to partly result from children having a greater proportion of so-called "slow-twitch" muscle fibres, which have a greater activity of important enzymes that drive release of energy from aerobic pathways.

Such findings prompted us to speculate that

children's muscles might actually respond to exercise in a similar way to adult endurance athletes, since they too show these characteristics.

LET'S GO CYCLING

We tested our speculation in a study run by researchers at Université Clermont Auvergne, in France.

Children (average age 10.5 years), young adults (21.2 years) with a similar physical activity level as the children, and age- and height-matched endurance-trained male athletes (21.5 years) were asked to complete two cycling tests on a stationary

In the first test, power output was continually increased until exhaustion. In the second test, the subject completed a 30-second all-out cycle sprint. These tests allowed us to measure numerous physiological responses to exercise, and to assess both the rate of fatigue and then recovery specifically during brief, maximal-intensity exercise

We found that the children fatigued as much in the all-out cycle as the endurance-trained athletes (about 40% loss of power), and much less than the untrained adults (about 50% loss).

Data also show that the proportion of energy

derived from aerobic pathways in the 30-second cycle sprint was similar in the children and atheres are specified to the control of the contr letes, and more than in untrained adults.

These results clearly show that fatigue rates in response to high-intensity exercise may be the same in children as they are in highly-trained adult endurance athletes, and that this is associated with an incredible generation of energy from aerobic energy pathways.

But data collected during recovery from the exercise also revealed startling outcomes. The rate at which oxygen use declined after the exercise was the same in children and athletes. The rates at which heart rate returned to normal and lactate (a compound associated with muscle fatigue) cleared from the blood were even faster in the children,

and again much faster than in untrained adults.

These data show that children's muscles recover rapidly from high-intensity exercise, and possibly reveal why children are able to produce repeat-ed exercise efforts when most of us adults continue to feel exhausted.

HOW CHILDREN'S MUSCLES WORK

Such data provide strong hints as to how to optimise exercise and sporting performance in children.

Children might benefit from short, high-intensity exercise bouts to boost anaerobic capacity, and a focus on movement skill, muscular strength, and other physical attributes more than in adults.

Adults (and adolescents), on the other hand,

may need to place a greater emphasis on improving their muscle aerobic capacity.

There may also be important health implica-

tions. Metabolic diseases, including diabetes and many forms of cancer, are increasing in prevalence in adolescents and younger adults but are still rarely seen in children

It might be the case that the loss of muscle aer-obic capacity between childhood and early adulthood is a key maturation step that allows metabolic diseases to take hold.

It will be interesting in future to examine the link between muscle maturation and disease, and test whether the maintenance of our childhood muscles through exercise training might be the best medicine to prevent disease.

Either way, at least we now have some idea as

to why children are able to play, and play, and play, when we adults need to take a break. Kids are already elite

Exhibition on **Parliamentary Democracy** in India at Chintan Bhawan



Asaram: the man who moved from hut to Rs 10,000 crore empire to jail

AHMEDABAD, APR 25 meditat-(PTI): From ing in a small hut on the banks of the Sa-barmati River to commanding a sprawling Rs 10,000-crore business 10,000-crore business empire, self-styled guru Bapu Asaram soared high -- only to plunge into ignominy after his conviction today for rap-ing a teenaged minor.

School dropout Asaram, once called Asumal Sirumalani, is believed to own 400 ashrams spread across India and abroad and has a legion of followers, many of whom still revere the controversial preacher, sentenced to life by a Jodhpur court.
When he was arrest-

ed in 2013, investigators had said the 77-year-old guru owed his immense wealth to buildings, stocks and shares, a lu-crative money-lending practice and by selling Ayurvedic products and religious booklets.

Documents seized by the police from Asaram's ashram in Motera area here had revealed that he also owned vast tracts of land.

The grey-haired and bearded guru, who studied till Class 4, started attracting attention when he began meditating by a modest hut near the Sabarmati River back in the

Soon, people were flocking to his hut and he

had begun gaining popularity as Sant Asaramji Bapu. His official website

states that he was born in 1941 in Berani village of the Sindh province in Pakistan.

After the partition of India in 1947, he came to Ahmedabad with his parents and studied in a school in the Maninagar area, but dropped out when he was 10 after the death of his father, Thaumal.

He did odd jobs in his early youth, including a reported stint as a ton-gawallah in Ajmer, and then, the website states, went towards the Himalayas on a spiritual quest, where he met his Guru, Lilashah Bapu.

Asaram came to Ahmedabad in the early 70s and set up 'Moksha Kutir', a small hut on the banks of river, in 1972.

It wasn't long before the hut had spawned into a full-fledged ashram. Soon, new ashrams had

ne up in various parts of the country, including a sprawling complex in Delhi's protected Ridge

Asaram is married to Laxmi Devi and they have two children - son Narayan Sai, who is also behind bars, and daughter Bharti Devi.

The guru first ran into trouble in 2008,

when two pre-teenaged -- cousins Dipesh and Abhishek Vaghela who lived in Asaram's gurukul in Motera -- were found dead on the riverbed near his ashram.

The two cousins' alleged that they were killed in Asaram's ashram where they claimed black magic was practised.

The state CID had in

2009 booked seven followers of Asaram in the

But Asaram fell from public grace in 2013, af-ter he was arrested for a minor teenager's rape in

After that, two Surat-based sisters also accused him and his son of sexual exploitation.

The police on Octo-ber 6, 2013, registered complaints filed by the two sisters - one against Asaram and another against Narayan Sai - of rape, sexual assault, illegal confinement and other charges.

The case is being tried in the Gandhinagar

He was also accused of grabbing land for building his ashrams in Surat and Ahmedabad.

His followers were held for threatening and assaulting witnesses in rape cases against him and his son after they

were arrested.

Asaram has also courted controversy in recent years with his out-spoken -- and debatable views -- on issues such as Valentine's Day and the Nirbhaya killing.

Valentine's should be marked as the day for worshipping parents, he had said a few vears ago

In 2013, he had told a gathering in Rajasthan that if Nirbhava had

chanted the 'Saraswati mantra', she would not have boarded the bus where she was brutally raped and assaulted by a

"She should have taken God's name and could have held the hand of one of the men and said, I consider you two, brother, I am helpless, you are my brother, my religious brother," the media had quoted

ULAANBAATAR, APR 25 (PTI): India and Mon-golia today discussed economic cooperation in areas such as infrastructure development, energy, services and IT and agreed to explore possi-bility of launching direct air connectivity between New Delhi and the Mongolian capital.

External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj during a joint media briefing with Mongolian Foreign Minister D Tsogtbaatar after the 6th Session of the Indian-Mon-golia Joint Committee on Cooperation here said the two countries agreed to explore ways to identify new areas of cooperation in all sectors of mutual interest and to enhance bilateral trade and investments.
Swaraj, the first In-

dian foreign minister to visit the resource-rich country in 42 years, said India sees Mongolia as a factor of stability in East Asia and believes that Mongolia's social and economic development is important for peace and

prosperity in the region.

During the Indian-Mongolia Joint Committee on Cooperation, the two sides discussed pressing global challenges, particularly the scourge of terrorism and agreed to collaborate bilaterally and in inter-national arena to thwart the designs of those who extend support to terrorist outfits.

The two sides also reviewed the progress in the ongoing collaborative projects, including the refinery project selected by the Government of Mongolia for implemen-tation with the support of USD one billion Indian Line of Credit.

"We directed our officials to coordinate follow up action on each side for the expeditious implementation of these projects. Our strong political ties must be comple-mented by commensurate levels of trade, econ-omy and investment," she said.

"Today, India has emerged as one of the fastest growing large economies in the world. With its rich natural resources and strong aspiration for development, Mongolia can be an important partner in India's growth story," she said. Swaraj, who arrive

here yesterday on a two-day visit, said collabo-ration for the ongoing refinery project is in recognition of this fact.
She said Mongolia is

not only India's strategic partner but also a spiritual neighbour.

Trump's tariffs risk jobs and profits in working-class areas

WASHINGTON, APR 25 (AP): President Donald Trump's escalating dispute with China over trade and technology is threatening jobs and profits in working-class communities where his "America First" agenda hit home.

The Commerce Department has received more than 2,400 applications from companies seeking waivers from the administration's tariffs on steel and aluminum imports, which may result in duty payments of millions of dollars for larger businesses.

The department has begun posting the requests online for public comment; several of the applications released so far suggest deep misgivings with Trump's protectionist strategy, especially in areas where he won strong support during the 2016 election.

The tariffs are aimed primarily at

China for flooding the global market with cheap steel and aluminum. But they've also led to confusion and uncertainty, according to Associated Press interviews and a review of records. In Oklahoma, Texas and Wisconsin, for example, businesses operating in the furniture, energy and food sectors have outlined the financial difficulties they'd face if they're not excused from the



steel tariff.

In Okmulgee, Oklahoma, dozens of jobs hang in the balance as office furniture giant Steelcase waits to hear back

from the Commerce Department.
A Steelcase subsidiary, PolyVision, operates a plant in Okmulgee that uses a special type of steel from Japan to manufacture a durable glass-like sur-face for whiteboards and architectural purposes. PolyVision "cannot and will not be able to procure" from US companies the cold-rolled steel it requires "in a sufficient and reasonably available amount or of a satisfactory quality," Steelcase said.

Trump won most of the votes cast for president in Okmulgee County. Without a waiver. Steelcase warned, the

economic viability of PolyVision (and) the small town of Okmulgee" would be jeopardized.

The waiver request also indicates that a USD 15 million plant expansion may be at risk. Steelcase and PolyVi-sion are on the verge of making the investment, which would create new construction and manufacturing jobs, according to the request.

Roger Ballenger, Okmulgee's city manager, said he and other local officials are "very concerned about the situation with PolyVision." The tariffs 25 percent on imported steel and 10 percent on imported aluminum are designed to protect and rebuild the U.S. companies that manufacture the metals. The U.S. temporarily exempted several major trading

partners, including the European Union, Mexico and Canada.

China, which was left on the target list, retaliated by imposing tariffs on USD 3 billion in US products, including apples, pork and ginseng.

Trump responded by adding more protectionist measures as punishment for Chinese theft of US intellectual property. And Beijing punched back by proposing tariffs on 50 billion in U.S. products including small aircraft and soybeans a direct threat to rural areas that were key to Trump's victory.

Economists Joseph Francois and

Laura Baughman estimated last month that the tariffs would increase employment in the U.S. steel and aluminum industries by more than 26,000 jobs but also lead to the loss of 495,000 other jobs throughout the rest of the American economy

John Hritz, CEO of ISW Steel USA in Baytown, Texas, said his company is in lockstep with Trump's approach.

"We're in favor of growing the steel industry in this country," Hritz said. JSW Steel, owned by Indian conglomerate JSW Group, is embarking on a USD 500 million overhaul of the plant that it says will create hundreds of jobs

T he death toll from an illegal oil well blaze in Indonesia has jumped to 15 with dozens injured, authorities said today, warning that there could be more victims of the explosion. Images from the accident showed a towering flame shooting some 70 metres (230 feet) in the air above homes and palm trees dotting a small community in Sumatra island's Aceh province. The fire reportedly broke out in the east Aceh district in the early hours of Wednesday, after a well of depth 250 metres (820 ft) overflowed and residents gathered to collect the oil. The head of police in east Aceh said the oil well might have been drilled illegally and the fire might have been started when someone was smoking a cigarette.

Iran's Rouhani questions 'right' to seek new nuclear deal

TABRIZ, APR 25 (AFP): Iran's President Hassan Rouhani today ques tioned the legitimacy of demands for a fresh nuclear agreement with Tehran, after the leaders of the US

and France called for a "new" deal. "Together with a leader of a European country they say: 'We want to decide on an agreement reached by seven parties'. What for? With what right?" Rouhani said in a speech.
US President Donald Trump

has fiercely criticised a three-year-old deal reached by world powers to curb Iran's nuclear programme, and threatened to pull the US out of the agreement.

Trump is eyeing a broader pact

that also limits Iran's ballistic missile programme and support for armed groups across the Middle

European signatories to the 2015 deal have been scrambling to salvage it, with French President



Emmanuel Macron saying Tuesday after talks with Trump that he wished "for now to work on a new

Iran has repeatedly insisted it is sticking to the nuclear deal and will not negotiate over its missile programme.

Rouhani took aim at Trump a former real estate mogul and TV reality star -- and accused him of lacking in experience.

"You are just a businessman.. have no experience in politics or law or international agreements," he said. "How can he pass judgements on international affairs?" Rouhani insisted that by agreeing to the nuclear accord in 2015 Tehran "showed goodwill to the world". "We wanted to prove to the world that Iran does not seek to acquire weapons of mass destruction."

er the weekend BTS Over the weekend, ____ new milestone: The band's "DNA" is now the most-viewed YouTube video by a K-pop group of all time.

On Sunday, the septet's "DNA" surpassed BIGBANG's "Fantastic Baby," which had long since been the most-viewed video from a K-pop group since its release in March 2012. At press time, "DNA" -- which was released on Sept. 17 -- has exceeded 349 million views, compared to 348.1 million of "Fantastic

Baby."

The single is one of two BTS videos along with "Fire" to exceed the 300 million view milestone, while three others -- "Blood Sweat & others -- "Blood Sweat & Tears," "Mic Drop (Steve Aoki Remix)," "Not Today" and "Save Me"-- have surpassed 200 million views.

'DNA" landed at No. 67 on the Hot 100 last year

TWICE's "TT" is the next most-viewed music video by a K-pop group, and currently has just under 347 17 million views. Videos from BIGBANG

and BlackPink have also surpassed the 300 million views milestone.

Psy remains the Korean solo artist with the mostviewed video on YouTube, with "Gangnam Style" currently sitting at over 3.14 billion views.

The accomplishment precedes the release of Love Yourself: Tear next month. The LP will be BTS' third full-length album since 2013.

It is highly anticipated, and has already become a bestseller on Amazon's CD & Vinyl list through pre orders despite it not being released until May 18. Tear will be the group's first album since September's Love Yourself: Her, which preceded the boy band's performances at the AMAs and Dick Clark's Rock-in' New Year's Eve last year.

BTS will also become the first-ever K-pop group to perform at the Billboard Music Awards next month, where Top Social Artist award.

The news was announced on social media and on top of it all, BTS will be giving fans the world television premiere of their new single when they take the stage. The group will also release their Love Yourself: Tear album just two days before their appearance at the awards show

ROBERT DOWNEY JR. GIVES EMOTIONAL SPEECH AT INFINITY WAR PREMIERE

m obert\ Downey\ Jr.\ delivered\ an\ emotional\ speech}$ at the Avengers: Infinity War premiere last night. The 19th film in the Marvel Cinematic Universe, Infinity War brings the franchise's many superheroes together to battle their most dangerous adversary yet, Thanos. Given that he's been saving the world for almost a decade now, it makes sense that Tony Stark aka. Iron Man is at the forefront of the looming battle against this intergalactic villain.

Since launching the MCU in 2008 with Iron Man, RDJ has reprised his iconic superhero role eight times (with another one coming in next year's Avengers 4). There's been talk about the actor walking away from his Marvel gig for years now, and Downey Jr. has candidly said that he wants to rative form that he wants to retire from the MCU "before it's embarrassing." Many feel that Stark biting the bullet for the greater good in either Infinity War or the still-untitled Avengers 4 is perhaps the best way to cap off the character's tremendous personal narrative.

Taking the stage just be-

fore the first full screening of Infinity War went down last night, RDJ got the audience both laughing and tearing up a bit as he looked back at last 10 years of the MCU, and reflect on what the fu-



ture will bring. During his speech, the actor also subtly reflected on the difficult journev he had before landing his career-changing role as Tony Stark/Iron Man in the MCU more than a decade ago:

"I want to talk about the past, present, and future. The past for me was 30 years of dependency, depravity, and despair ... otherwise known as 'An Actor Prepares!' The present is this moment of glory for all of us. And the future...? That is always uncertain. But looking at these friends behind me, it seems like things might brighten up after all. None of us are in competition with each other. We are all competing for each other – and for you."

After (respectfully) chastising Marvel Studios' lack of diversity, especially behind the camera. RDI went on to laud the company for changing its ways starting with the up-coming Captain Marvel mov-ie. He also acknowledge Black Panther's impressive success and even did the now-iconic Wakandan salute. The actor's tone got more serious when he started talking about how these films can actually make a difference in the real world:

"This is the MCU, right in front of you. It's all about fighting for equality. The whole idea is to make space for others to succeed, and exceed our expectations. [The movies] are inviting us to surrender and love and be of service. They are metaphors for how our world should be – or could be one day, if we fight for it."

But before he handed the icrophone to Infinity War directors, Joe and Anthony Russo, the actor didn't forget to thank those who havr been with him since the beginning of the MCU - Iron Man director

Jon Favreau, who was a major proponent of his casting, and Gwyneth Paltrow, who plays Stark's romantic interest, Pepper Potts. The three of them (including Favreau who also stars in the MCU as Happy Hogan) are set to appear on screen together for the fifth time in next year's Avengers 4. Depending on how everything pans out, it may be the last time fans will see all of them in a MCU film together.

RDJ was naturally emo-nal during the speech, considering that he's part of the original team that kick started the franchise. And since he's the godfather of the MCU, it's his job to ush-er in new talents joining the film series and hype people up for what's to come. But it can't also be helped thinking that this may very well be his farewell speech before he officially retires as the genius, billionaire, playboy, and philanthropist. It's no secret that Tony Stark, alongside Thor and Steve Rogers. are the top three characters poised to die in the forthcoming films because of the emotional impact that their deaths would have. Fans won't have to worry yet, however, as regardless of what goes down in Avengers: Infinity War, all aforemen-tioned heroes are still set to appear in Avengers 4.
