# SBI lowers min balance to Rs 3,000; exempts pensioners, minors

MUMBAI. SEP 25 (PTI): Country's largest lender State Bank of India today lowered the minimum average monthly balance (MAB) requirement in a savings account to Rs 3,000 from Rs 5,000 and also revised downwards penalties for

non-adherence.

The revised MAB requirement and charges will become applica-ble from October, the bank said in a statement.

The public sector lender also decided to exempt pensioners, beneficiaries of social benefits from government and minors from the requirement of minimum balance in savings account.

In April, the bank had re-in-troduced MAB and charges for non-maintenance of balance after a gap of five years.

In metropolitan areas the min-

imum balance requirement was Rs 5,000. For urban and semi-urban branches, it was fixed at Rs 3,000 and Rs 2.000, respectively, and for rural branches it was Rs 1,000. "We have decided to treat the

metro and urban centres in the same category and the requirement of MAB in metro centres stands reduced to Rs 3,000," the

Last week, managing director for national banking group, Ra-jnish Kumar, had said the lender was reviewing the average month-

ly balance requirement.

The lender also revised downwards the penalty for non-maintenance of MAB.

"For non-maintenance of MAB, the charges have also been revised downwards ranging from 20-50 per cent across all population groups and categories," the bank

Now, the charges at semi-urban and rural centres range from Rs 20 to Rs 40 and at urban and metro centres from Rs 30 to Rs 50, the

Earlier, in the metros, the bank was charging Rs 100 plus GST if the balance fell below 75 per cent of the MAB of Rs 5,000. If the shortfall was 50 per cent or less, the penalty charge was Rs 50 plus GST.

Any shortfall in maintaining minimum average balance in rural areas was attracting a penalty in the range of Rs 20 to Rs 50 plus

The bank reiterated that basic vings bank deposit and PM's Jan-Dhan accounts are not required to maintain the minimum balance. The lender has 42 crore savings bank accounts of which 13 crore

belong to this category.

"It has now been decided to exempt the pensioners, beneficiaries of social benefits from government and accounts of minors. The revision is likely to benefit another 5 account holders," the bank

# Health Department meeting discusses Dengue and Scrub Typhus outbreak in Sikkim

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 25 SEPT:

A meeting was held in the chamber of Directorate General of Health Services cum Health Secretary today to discuss the cur-rent situation of Dengue fever and Scrub Typhus in Sikkim and to formulate the plan of activities in the state for prevention, diagnosis and treatment of the same, a press release issued by Health Care, Hu-man Services & Family Welfare Department, Government of Sikkim,

The meeting was chaired by DG cum Health Secretary and attended by Principal Director I & II, Director Health Services I & II, Director Accounts, Mission Di-

rector-National Health Mission, State Programme Officer-National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme, State Surveillance Officer-Integrated Disease Surveil lance Project, Nodal Officer-NHM and Deputy Secretary I & II.

During the meeting, directions have been given to inform the Chief Medical Officers of the hospitals of all four districts of the state regarding the outbreak of Scrub Typhus and increase in number of engue fever cases.

Further, it has been decided that all the suspected fever cases for Dengue fever/Scrub Typhus will be screened while conducting Intensive IEC activities on prevention of the diseases

lance will be enhanced to identify the vectors of Scrub Typhus/ Dengue and fever surveillance will continue and treated accordingly.

It was informed during the neeting that adequate diagnostic kits ELISA based/RD kits for Scrub Typhus are available at State/District surveillance hospitals.

In order to co-ordinate with the concerned department, Ru-ral Management & Development Department, Urban Development & Housing Department, District Administration, Police, Panchayats & Nagar Panchayats and local NGOs have been requested for help as and when required.

The release further adds, "The last of the Dokpas survive under the harshest conditions known to mankind in the Cold Desert of North Sikkim. True nomads, they herd the last of the great Yaks and the indigenous breed of Tibetan Highland Sheep, helped by their Tibetan Ponies and now some motorized vehicles. Facing the enormous hurdles of border security issues and the gauntlet to be run south wards, coupled with the new pressures imposed by tourism in this vulnerable habitat, these noble and gentle nomads forge maintaining the last bits of their unique culture and traditions. They have lost their loyal livestock guardians, their Dokhyis or Tibetan Mastiffs to the growing menace of mongrels now roaming their once-pris-tine grazing lands.

Donkung Nyima and Chingya were the old-est who took with them much of the vast wisdom of survival using age old scientific traditional knowledge. Their children now struggle to fol-low in their fathers' footsteps. One in particular

stands out. Kalden Singhi today is the only nomad, indeed the only person in whole of Sikkim who braving all odds, still maintains a herd of the famous 'Luk' or Bhyanglung, the Tibetan Highland Sheep found only in this unique habitat in the highest reaches of North Sikkim. Sikkimese recognize the vast medicinal properties associated with this sheep, which grazes on a host of medicinal plants in the rarified air of our Cold Desert."

Governor Shriniwas Patil today felicitated Mr Bhutia for being confelicitated ferred with the award in small function at Raj a sınan Bhawan.

## Allow Students to Think

### Open doors, don't spoon-feed

What Sikkim requires its schools to create are sensible citizens who can think for themselves, weigh options and make practical decisions. In these times of fake news and manufactured consent, an open mind willing to learn and analyse will be required to side-step the shackles of time-serving mediocrity. And we would all wish that for the next generation, won't we? The one place where clear thought can be honed into an instinct is the class-room – allow the education system to adopt genuinely learning-friendly practices and future generations will dazzle with their confidence and carry Sikkim forward. Don't do so, and a majority will remain hesitant and unsure, seeking out charlatans to form their beliefs, ideologies and pursuits.

If education was approached with the aim to open

minds, not suppress inquisitiveness, the quality that everyone seeks to infuse into the system will become a reality. What the present system delivers, and this is a national malaise, is infectious indecisiveness. Students are not encouraged to enquire or seek clarifications and every effort is made to drill them into an army of monotony, their uniqueness and differences brushed over by soul-sapping rigour and mind-numbing routine. It is rare to find students with wide-ranging interests any more. In fact, the syllabus and pattern of education does not even allow children the space to develop any meaningful interests any more. Even when these interests are displayed at annual day functions they are mostly hobbies decided for them by the teachers or "talents" singled out by them for display Student projects for interschool competitions are prepared by teachers and every intonation of a poetry recital for competition dictated to them. We just won't allow them to make their mistakes and learn from them or stand by the side in case assistance is required; we believe that we are serving them by hand-holding them through their years in school, college, university,

and if we have the "contact", even their employment.

More and more teachers are so scared that students will "fail" them that they end up spoon-feeding them. At the other extreme are teachers who see no hope in their students so they don't get involved at all. In both scenarios, the student meets the same fate – a confidence stamped down even before it could develop. A good way to start delivering Sikkim a more confident generation would be to allow students to discover more things by themselves and in doing so, they will also discover the confidence required to think and decide for themselves later in life.

# The thin line between electoral credibility and political stability in Kenya

After a Supreme Court ruling that invalidated Kenya's August 8 presidential election, the

country now finds itself in a mor-al predicament between political stability and electoral credibility. On one hand, the ruling that

ordered a fresh presidential elec-tion was a win for the democratic process the world over. The court found that Kenya's Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission was in violation of constitu-tional procedure. It also found that the commission had violated election law and in so doing impugned the credibility of the election.

On the other hand, the court's decision has ushered the country into a period of political instability. Where it would have closed the chapter on the 2017 election cycle, it is now gearing up for a repeat poll slated for October 26.

Kenyans now find themselves in a tight spot made even more uncomfortable by demands being made by Raila Odinga and his National Super Alliance. The opposition is insisting that certain conditions, including re constituting the election commission and reprinting key election documents, must be met before the October 26 election can be held.

The opposition's hard stance could result in a delayed election. This could also happen if OT-Morpho, the French biometrics firm which supplied the electoral commission with its electronic voting system fails to have a new system ready in time. It's indicated that it won't.

If indeed the key issue with the last election was that the voting system was not "simple and verifiable" as demanded by law, then any delays could be interpreted as being in the interests of a free, fair, credible and transparent election.

But for those who argue that no electoral process can be perfect, and that the August 8th poll was merely dogged by minor and inadvertent errors, then it begs the question: what is more important, electoral credibili-

# ty or political stability? ELECTORAL CREDIBILITY

The Supreme Court prioritised electoral credibility by invalidating the presidential election result on grounds that the election commission had committed illegalities and irregularities

In doing so, it broke ranks with foreign election observer missions which had concluded that the presidential election was credible. By and large the Supreme Court ruling was a win for Kenyans and the rule of law. The court took the opportunity to audit the electoral process for transparency and to define the parameters of a credible election.

But its ruling raised questions of its own. For instance, the court ruled that the electoral commission didn't strictly adhere to election procedure as set out in law. It also held that there had been tampering with the commission's electronic voter management system. But it mandated the same commission to carry out a fresh election within 60 days.

Because the court gave no direc-

tion on the reconstitution of the commission, the petitioner Odinga and the respondent President Uhuru Kenyatta are now at an impasse over who

should remain at the commiss

Giving credence to this argument is the fact that Kenya is viewed as the economic hub of East Africa. If the country does not return to normalcy as quickly as possible there will be a ripple effects, including economic, across the region

On top of this, Kenya finds itself in a precarious situation because the ex-ecutive is at odds with the judiciary. Kenyatta's Jubilee Party has the majority in both houses of Parliament. It is therefore within its capacity to limit the independence of the judiciary should it continue to feel aggrieved by the Supreme Court decision.

This could happen through a par-liamentary referendum as per Article 256 of the Constitution and would involve members of parliament deciding to amend the constitution without a popular vote.

But by far the most pressing threat to Kenya's continued political stability is the possibility that the Supreme Court may have created a situation in which Kenya could remain in election mode ad infinitum. Nothing stops a new petition from being filed should one of the candidates contest the next poll results.

If we look at Kenya's neighbour Rwanda we see an example of a head of state that's arguably prioritised a semblance of political sta-bility over election credibility. Paul Kagame was recently reelected for the third time. Some argue that his rule has benefited Rwandans because the country has shown bet-ter socio-economic outcomes than most African countries.

But there tensions simmer and in the absence of electoral credibility, Rwanda's political sta-

# bility may be skin deep. RETHINKING KENYA'S ELECTION SYSTEM

The Kenya case raises questions about elections in Africa and whether they are a force for political stability or instability. I would posit that Kenya has made great strides to improve electoral credibility since its catastrophic 2007 election.

In conclusion, election credibility and political stability area/t mutually.

and political stability aren't mutually exclusive.

There should be a positive correlation between democracy and the improved well being of a state and its people. But in a country like Kenya with 40-plus tribes, the more populous tribes will always take advantage of their voting might, while the less populous ones struggle to com-pete. The system just does not work in their favour. It would seem therefore that they are locked out – not by choice but by circumstance. So, does a majoritarian, "winner-

takes-all" system suit an ethnically diverse society like Kenya's?

Perhaps, not. I'm persuaded that there needs to be a re-imagination of electoral democratic practices in Africa. Kenya should take recent events as an opportunity to clean up its in-stitutions and electoral system. If it doesn't, future polls will continue to offer up a point of diversion between electoral credibility and a tenuous political stability.

# How Winnie the Pooh teaches us the importance of play

He is famous for his love of honey, and being a bear of "little brain". So Winnie the Pooh might be a little surprised to find himself the subject of a major new museum exhibition.

Winnie the Pooh: Exploring a Classic will explore the creative partnership of writer A.A. Milne and illustrator E.H. Shepard. Together they produced the much-loved whimsical sto-ries featured in Winnie the Pooh (1926) and The House at Pooh Corner (1928).

The decision by the Victoria and Albert museum in London to hold the exhibition proves that the bear and his friends have become establishment figures. As children's literature expert Peter Hunt notes, they are "part of British culture, passing from generation to

the Pooh books is that they reflect ideas about childhood that emerged in what is widely known as the "golden age" of children's literature, spanning from the mid-19th century to World War I.

The golden age view of a child's world was one that was close to nature - the child an innocent before the imposed horrors of school and education, and a figure of loss and nostalgia for the adult. This was very much the landscape of Winnie's home in Hundred Acre

As cultural theorist Stefan Herbrechter said: "Children are supposed to live in a world of their own, which is clearly defined and marked out as the space and time for play and in which toys are the main objects and controlling devices of socialisation."

However, Milne's books are more poignant and have a slightly different flavour, than other examples, such as Wind in the Willows (of which Milne was a great fan, writing a stage adaptation). They came after World War I, when many illusions about innocence, the upper class, Englishness and patriotism had

reached breaking point.

They contain traces of the experiences in the trenches that marked both Milne and Shepard, whose



illustrations of carnage at the Somme and Paschendale were the subject of a separate recent exhibition.

The pastoral paradise of Hundred Acre Wood was one that Milne, who wrote passionately in favour of pacifism, conjured from his own childhood memories back to a time before the terrifying intrusion and de-

ruction of the war.

As such, Milne's invented world is also saturated with loss, poignantly embodied in the depressed donkey character of Eyore, who sees no reasons to be cheerful. It is also haunted by the threat of leaving the safe space of the wood for places over the horizon that can't yet be seen. When Christopher Robin and Pooh organise an "expotition" to the North Pole, they find a

large pole in the woods and label it accordingly

Toys, argues Herbrechter, are intimately con-cerned with storytelling. They are "like little story machines, narrative catalysers, objects that help make sense of the world".

This idea is addressed with humour and com-plexity in Milne's writing, and beautifully rendered in Shepard's illustrations that always emphasise the "toyness" of the animals. It explains much about why these books have remained so loved.

### POOH THE SATIRIST

Milne shows his real life son Christopher (whom Christopher Robin was named after) how playing

with his toys is a kind of writing, just as the playwright makes scenes for his charac-ters. Before he wrote the Pooh stories, Milne worked as a playwright and as a satirist at

We can detect the specific pleasures of introducing the craft of storytelling to his son from a man who made a living from writing. Milne's stories gently teach the young credulous reader, who reads literally, that they may be other more rewarding ways of interpreting the world, and what the difference is between

what people say and what they mean.
Milne offers the pleasures of word play. The
narrator explains that "Winnie the Pooh lived in the forest all by himself under the name of Sanders", which meant "he had the name over the door in gold letters and lived under it".

The non-literal reader is invited to find this funny. Similarly, if Piglet says anything "carelessly" he is probably concealing a very important wish. He will say he isn't afraid when

he wants to appear brave.

Although the Pooh books were famously dismissed by fellow satirist Dorothy Parker, who wrote a dismayed and withering review of Winnie-the-Pooh, the success of Milne's works suggests that he managed to translate his love of making stories into a form that beguiled the child reader. Stories which showed how they too might make an imaginative life for them-selves in the world of storytelling and understand how to master words and meanings

In one notable scene Pooh finds himself stuck on the doorway to Rabbit's house, and must wait for a week until he is thin enough to be pulled free. Chris-topher Robin sits down with him and reads him a "sustaining book", such as would help and comfort a Wedged Bear in Great Tightness.

The comforting presence and companionship of a

good book is something all readers of Pooh take away with them. And it is perhaps this which explains the enduring popularity of these stories, which taught us how to read and write in our own way.

# State level consultation meeting on decentralized planning

state consultation meeting to deliberate on the structures and systems to support decentralized planning and the way forward was held at Janta Bhawan today. The meeting was jointly organized by NITI Aayog, Government of India, in consonance with the Rural Management & Development Department Sikkim and PRIA [Participatory Research in Asia], New Delhi.

Additional Secretary Management Development Department, Cheden Ladingpa, in her welcome address, gave a brief overview of the expectations from the meeting. She in-formed that the meeting was an attempt to deepen democracy and local self-governance by strengthening the Pan-chayati Raj Institution in the State. She put on record the role of PRIA as a crucial partner for development of PRI and capacity building of func-tionaries at all levels. Director-PRIA. New

Delhi, Manoj Rai, presented the findings from the Action Research carried out in the last one year in the State to understand the status of progress of local self governance in the State, along with the issues, challenges and recommendations. He explained why the research was carried out in Sikkim, the methodologies used and the find-

Chairperson-Sikkim Co-operative Union, Ganesh Rai, in his brief ad-dress, maintained that the Panchavat in Sikkim is empowered to the core through a steady progress in the devolution of power. He added that with the initiation of Gram Panchavat Development Plan, the Pan-chayat is well aware of the resource envelope allocated for development of PRI. He however suggested that there is still room for improvement through strengthening of the District Planning Committees by encouraging participation of pubic and stakeholders in

the planning processes.

President-PRIA, New Delhi, Dr Rajesh Tandon, facilitated an open discussion on the issues and ways forward, and particularly convergence of all line departments for integrated develop-ment of local self gov-ernment. Officers of the State RM&DD and from line departments placed wide range of suggestions based on their experiences at the implementation level. They also referred to pertinent issues and points which could be incorporated in the Action Research doc ument prepared by PRIA.

Mayor-Gangtok Mu-cipal Corporation, Shakti Singh Choudhary, in his address, called for active convergence be tween the Panchayati Raj Institution and the Urban Local Self Government right from the planning process. He added that stringency in the allocation of 14th Commission and the 4th FC has re stricted the development process in the urban ar-eas. He also pointed out

and demographic burden of the urban areas is slowly shifting to the peri urban areas, which calls for streamlining the planning process. The floating population has to be considered while planning and the guide-lines of the Finance Commissions should be made flexible and state specific to ease out the imple-

mentation process.
Secretary-RM&DD
Sikkim, DR Nepal, in his address, thanked the officers from PRIA New Delhi for organizing and participating in this state level consultancy meeting and for their valued suggestions to strength-en Panchayati Raj Insti-tution and Urban Local Self Government in Sik-kim. He called for active participation, ownership and convergence from all line departments to ensure that their programmes are carried through participation of the PRIs and the urban local bodies. He stressed that PRIs and ULBs should not be looked at as entities confined to the RM&DD and the UD&HD and should be viewed as a collective re-sponsibility of all the line

Mr Nepal shed light on the development of PRI in the last five years through capacity build-ing and empowerment at various levels. He attributed the progress made by the PRI to the strong political will to devolve and decentral-ize power right upto the village level. He cited the numerous awards and accolades received by the PRI in Sikkim for aspects like transparency and accountability and overall performance. He added that the Directorate of Panchayati Raj is taking concrete steps to guide and train the Panchayats on documentation.

The Secretary wel-comed the suggestion made by PRIA to have one nodal department, preferably the Planning & Development Department, to head the Decentralized Planning of the PRI & ULB.

In conclusion, he requested the PRIA to revisit the Action Research Document with the in-puts and suggestions suggestions made in today's meeting and come out with a revised document and submit the same to NITI Aayog. The document would be vital and would have the potential to bring about a paradigm shift in local self governance in the State, he

Dr Tandon, in his closing remarks, hailed

the coming together of the Mayor and Deputy Mayor and the officials of RM&DD on a common platform to discuss decentralized planning as something very unique to Sikkim and something exemplary. He observed that the process of local self governance in Sikkim is far more progressive and effective com-pared to other states. He stressed that participative planning can beco a very important vehicle for development. He sug-gested creating a culture of planning the activities and subsequent review to assess the progress. Planning and review should go hand in hand to achieve the desired results, he explained. He called for making the planning process more participatory by involving all the stakeholders.

The meeting conclud ed with vote of thanks address by Gautam Mazumdar from PRIA, Sikkim.

The event had the participation of Depu-ty Mayor-GMC, Lassey Doma Bhutia. senior officers of RM&DD, senior officers of Human Resource Development Department and Animal Husbandry Department, Professor of Political Science from Sikkim University, and officers from PRIA. New Delhi.

It was during his managerial stint when the club signed Uruguay-an star Diego Forlan. During his time in Japan, young players who went on to receive debut call-ups for the national team.


In 2014-15, he went to Spain to coach Segunda Division club Real Zaragoza where he led the team to finals of the La Liga play-offs.

### Seventh man arrested over terror attack on London Tube

LONDON, SEP 25 [PTI]: A seventh man was today arrested by British Police's counter-terrorism in connection with the bomb attack on a London underground train that injured 30 people earlier this month.

The 20-year old man was arrested at an ad-dress in Cardiff, Wales, early this morning under Section 41 of the UK s Terrorism Act.

He has been taken to a south London police station where he remains in custody, Scotland Yard

said in a statement.
The arrests were carried out by officers from the Metropolitan Police's Counter-Terrorism Command, supported by col-leagues from the Welsh Extremism and Counter Terrorism Unit [WECTU] and South Wales Police. It was Britain s fifth

major militant attack so far this year.
"So far, seven people

have been arrested as part of the investigation being carried out by the Met s Counter-Terrorism Command; one person has been charged in relation to the attack, three people remain in police custody and three people have been released with no further action, the Met Police said.

Ahmed Hassan, believed to be of Middle Eastern origin, the first suspect to be formally named Scotland Yard last week as officers produced him before Westminster Magistrates Court in London on Friday.

The 18-year-old, ar-

rested a day after the London Tube bombing on September 15, was remanded in custody and is due to appear at the Old Bailey court in London on October 13.

The police had also revealed the explosive used by the prime sus-pect in the terror attack as triacetone triper-oxide [TATP], similar to ingredients used in some of the previous terror attacks in Europe such Paris in November

ethnic cleansing.
But tens of thousands of ethnic Rakhine Buddhists, and the region's small population of Hin-



dus, have also been internally displaced, saving they were attacked by Rohingya militants.

Yesterday. Myanmar's army said it had discovered two mud pits filled with 28 Hindu corpses, including women and including women and children, outside a vil-

lage in northern Rakhine. Hindu villagers from

the area told AFP last week Rohingya militants stormed into their communities on August 25, killing many and taking others into the forest.

# Japan's Abe triggers snap election amid N Korea crisis

TOKYO, SEP 25 [AFP]: Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe today called a snap elec-tion, seeking a fresh term at the helm of the world's third-largest economy as tensions with nearby North Korea reach fever-pitch.

Abe hopes to capitalise on a weak and

fractured opposition to sweep back into ower, as polls show him regaining ground after a series of scandals.

"I will dissolve the House of Representatives on the 28th" of September, Abe told reporters, a precursor to a general election.

The prime minister did not give a date for the election but it will reportedly be on October 22. Surveys suggest voters approve of the hardline stance taken by the nationalist Abe on North Korea, which fired two missiles

over the country in the space of a month and has threatened to "sink" Japan. According to a weekend poll in business daily Nikkei, 44 per cent of voters plan to vote for Abe's conservative Liberal Demo-cratic Party (LDP), while only eight per cent favoured the main opposition Democratic

Nevertheless, one fifth of those polled said they were still undecided, potentially opening the door for gains by a new party formed by allies of the popular mayor of Tokyo Yuriko Koike, which will field dozens of

Koike's Tomin First no Kai (Tokyo Residents First) party humiliated Abe and the LDP in local elections in July, but analysts say the new grouping has not had time to lay a national foundation to mount a serious challenge to the prime minister.

In an apparent bid to steal Abe's limelight, Koike went before the cameras just

# Obama personally warned Zuckberberg over fake news report

WASHINGTON, SEPT 25 [AFP]: Former US President Barack Obama personally urged Facebook founder Mark Zucker-berg to counter the rise of fake news on the social network during a meeting held shortly after last ar's election, the Washington Post reported.

The encounter reportedly took place on the sidelines of a meeting of global leaders in Lima, Peru on November 19, two months before Trump's inauguration and days after Zucker-berg had dismissed as "crazy" the idea that misleading stories driven by Russian operatives had made a major impact on the outcome of the vote. "Zuckerberg

knowledged the problem posed by fake news.

But he told Obama

those messages weren't widespread on Facebook and that there was no easy remedy," the newspaper said, quoting people it said had knowledge of the exchange.

The report comes days after Facebook announced it would be handing over to Congress advertisements it discovered were bought by Russia-linked fake accounts, aimed at inflaming political tensions ahead of and following the election

The Kremlin has denied any involvement.


