Condition of youth on fast-unto-death in Kalimpong worsening

SUMMIT REPORT KALIMPONG, 28 Jul:
The condition of the

The condition of three youth who are sitting on a fast-unto-death for Gorkhaland is deteriorating. Among the three, 42-year-old Ajit Roka's condition is said to be more critical than the others. Today is the eighth day of the fast.

The District Magistrate along with the Sub Divisional Officer and other magistrates visited the spot and had a word with the family members and made an appeal for the trio to be admitted in hospital for treatment.

From drops in sugar level to blood pressure, now the trio is showing symptoms of kidney fail-ure as they are not being able to pass urine.

District Medical Offi-cer, Dr Ankan Simlangdi, who conducts regular check-ups of the trio from the administration's side, said that the symptoms of kidney failure have been observed from the samples of urine and blood collected on Thursday.

The trio declined to

give blood samples today.



"Kidneys will get damaged if there is continuing lack of water. They have been refusing to take water or medicines. We have been advising them to undergo treatment but they are not willing. In the worst case scenario, dialysis is the only option," said Dr Simlangdi. crore Gorkhas residing in

Ajit Roka is a carpenter by profession and stays with his parents, two sisters, brother, wife along with a school going

son and daughter.

Later, the DM briefly spoke to the reporters, "We are sending a medical team on a regular basis from the administration's side. The team gave a suggestion of medical treatment in the morning today. We have asked them to go for a medical check-up and we have also approached their

family to which they have agreed. And according to the medical team, the condition of two of the hunger day, they require medication immediately.

Meanwhile, vice pres-ident of Gorkha Janmukti Yuwa Morcha, central committee, Anil Lop-chan, condemned the statement of the District Magistrate regarding the family of the trio agreeing to medical assistance

Γhe statement which the DM gave is wrong and we condemn it. He is try-ing to bring down their willpower. He is working on the directions of the West Bengal govern-ment," said Mr Lopchan.

Later, Geeta Baraily, Ajit Roka's sister who is an active Gorkhaland supporter and an active member of Nari Morcha [women's wing of GJMM], said, "Ajit is my broth-er. He has been refusing treatment. The family members too are not forcing him to take medication. The DM said that the family has agreed to persuade those fasting but that is not true."

Unstable Pakistan not to India's advantage

SILIGURI, 28 JUL:

Pakistan Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif is down and out on corruption charges. What now? Does a lame duck fill up the post to preserve the Troian horse called democracy in a politically unstable Pakistan or, would martial law prevail?

Pakistan will have to live

through its hour of shame, but what does it mean for India? An unstable Pakistan has every possibility of hurtling towards extremism and plunge into chaos at break-

Most worryingly, terror networks across Pakistan and in the border areas could take advantage of the out of control Pakistani dispensa-tion and increase attacks on India. Notoriously known for providing logistical and other support to the terrorists, the Pakistan army could also intensify the asymmetrical war on India to divert its population's attention.

Although Sharif's ouster as the outcome of proven corrup $tion\, charges\, against\, him\, and\, his$ Pakistani problem, which may manifest in a number of ways an unstable Pakistan is not to the advantage of India militarily or diplomatically.
So, for this country, Paki-

stan's current discomfiture is not an hour to relish, but to raise the guard like never before. The political crisis in Pakistan could very well see its army and by extension the Inter-Services Intelligence aka ISI take over the country's reins. Pervez Musharraf had done so with Sharif earlier. A already gone out to the de-

fence forces from the Centre.
The Pakistani Supreme Court verdict against Sharif could also be the first signal that the Pakistani civil society was dropping its overdepen-dence on the country's army and was coming of age at last. That would be the most positive take from the otherwise embarrassing development.

So what is this 'Panamagate' or 'Panama Papers' that has brought down Sharif and ushered a Constitutional crisis in Pakistan?

On April 3, 2016 the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ) revealed 11.5 million secret documents of the Panamani-an law firm Mossack Fonseca containing confidential attorney-client information for over 2,14,488 off-shore entities.

Of those, eight off-shore companies were reportedly linked with the family of Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and his brother the chief minister of Punjab, Shahbaz Sharif. The PM's children were

owners and had the right to authorize transactions to several of the seedy companies clearly indicating siphoning off the country's wealth.

On hearing the case and satisfied with evidential support, the Pakistan Supreme Court unanimously deemed Sharif unfit for holding office and ordered an accountability court to open references against him and his family, and other respondents. Shar-if stepped down following his disqualification by the Supreme Court.

"The latest available statistics of Sectoral Contribution of GSDP of Sikkim for the year 2015-16 pegs the contribution of manufacturing sector in state GSDP at 36.36%, the highest by any sector in the state's GSDP," informed Mr Kumar.

SKM raises concern over

Sikkim Krantikari Mor-cha party has raised concerns over the condition of the Yangang-Rabongla highway which has been causing inconvenience to the people of Rangang-Yangang constituency since the road was shut down in July 2014. The party has alleged that the concerned department this year has shown no signs of ad-dressing the persisting problem

An SKM press release issued by its press & publicity secretary, Bikash Basnet, claims that the said road has been closed for the last three years and has consequently cut off commuters from travelling to commercial towns like Namchi and Rabongla. The only viable option is a long detour via Temi Tarku which is time consuming and also hits hard on the commuter's pocket. Organic farmers and tour-

area have also been deprived of potential economic gains, the release adds.

The release further adds that the landslide at Dojak has been persisting since many years and the department has not addressed the problem till date. The party alleges that the depart-mental attitude has been half hearted with not even a single stone being cleared off the road in

these three years.

The party has, in the release, urged the concerned Roads and Bridges Department and District Administration to find an immediate solution to restore the Yangang-Rabongla road as it is one of the major roads in the constituency. If the concerned authority is unable to reopen the road, they should come up with an effective alternative solution for dai-ly travelers, the release adds.

Rainy season for some means romance and poetry, some curse it for traffic jams, leaking roofs and flooded roads But for those who repair and sell umbrellas, it is the time to earn a bit of

money.

"Most people hate the monsoon season. But our job depends on this sea-son and life without rain would be difficult for us, says umbrella repairman, Mohammad Shrajuli.

hails Mohammad from Bihar and has been residing in Gangtok for many years now. Accompanied by his friend, Ishar Ahmed, the duo sits at one corner of Tibet Road near the Axis Bank ATM in the capital and fixes broken umbrellas.

During off-season, they either go back to Bihar or stay back at Gangtok and set-up temporary abode for making quilts at roadsides. They often tour around in various colonies with cotton thrashing machines in tow in order to earn a livelihood. Come rain and



they get back to repairing umbrellas for people.

The duo says repair-umbrellas is their main source of livelihood.

"Umbrella repairing is not a high paying job but the money we earn from this job is just

enough for our needs. Earning big in this job does not mostly denend on the season but it is determined by the good reputation we have established with our customers in these past years," the duo informed.

They charge their customers Rs 30-40 depending on the damage the umbrella has been through. At the end of the day, after repairing 12-13 umbrellas, they earn approximately Rs 200-500 per day.

Out of the 104 blocks in 11 flood-affected dis-tricts of the state, 13 have been hit badly, he said.

The state government has opened around 2,067 relief camps in the affected districts wherein around 44,542 people have been provided shelter, the official said.

Besides distributing dry food, water pouch-es and tarpaulin, we are also keeping an eye on the districts so that there no epidemic in the flood-affected areas. We have kept enough medi-cines there," he said.

Talking about crop losses, a senior official at the department said, "The estimation can only be done after water re-cedes. It also depends on the number of days the crops or saplings are sub-merged. But it seems that it could be a huge amount."

The official said the state government will definitely look into the losses of the farmers and chalk out a plan to compensate them

Meanwhile,

Minister Mamata Banerjee described the current flood in West Bengal as worse than the one which hit the state in 1978.

"This year's flood condition is worse than that in 1978. There are so many plac-

es where there is so much water ... It's so deep at some places." Baneriee said.

The state did not have so many dams in 1978, she said.

Referring to the project that Bengal has taken up along with the World Bank that will reform the lower basin of the Damodar river, Banerjee said the state government was trying to come up with more dams to address the flood problem.

Blaming the DVC for releasing water during the monsoon leading to the "man-made" flood in West Bengal, she said, "Every year they release water and we have to face the problem. And because West Bengal is shaped like a boat it creates flood here."


Asked whether she would write to the Centre regarding the DVC problem, the chief minister said, "I have been writing to them for so many years, but the problem has not been

addressed."

Referring to the IAF helicopter deployed to rescue a family from a house in West Midnapore district's Ghatal, Banerjee said, "Because the area has so many trees they (the IAF helicopter) could not rescue them today. They will resume the rescue operation tomor-row morning. A NDRF team is already there."

An Indian Air Force Mi17 V5 helicopter was sent from the Barrackpore air force station to rescue a family stuck at a house in Ghatal, a De-

fence spokesperson said. Several areas in West Midnapore, Howrah, Bankura and West Burdwan districts of the state have been flooded due to incessant rains and the release of water by the DVC from its barrages owing to heavy precipitation in upper catchment areas in Jharkhand.

It's Not Always Literal

Indefinite is not forever and fastunto-death does not actually require people to die

 $T^{\rm he}$ indefinite strikes underway in the neighbouring Darjeeling Hills is now the longest that the region, and by "general strike" yardsticks, any place has ever seen. Of course, one will need to Google to verify whether this is the case, but the veracity of the statement is not important, its message is. Or is it?

The impromptu indefinite strike call was obvious-

ly not to set records, but to power the long-held and deeply-desired aspiration for statehood. Everyone involved should however realize that the tag of "indefi-nite" is not to be taken literally because once the indefiniteness of a general strike stays on too long, it be-comes the new normal and with that it loses the moral pressure it seeks to exert on those who are refusing to address the demand of the people. On the same note, promoters of the fast-unto-death underway at three venues in the neighbouring hills should also be told that it is not really a hunger strike in which the satyagrahis are expected to actually die if no response is forthcoming. The youth sitting on the fast-unto-death are obviously motivated and willing to lay down their lives for Gorkhaland; that is no longer in question because even after their bodies started feeding on its own organs and long term damage to their health became a reality, they still refuse to receive medical aid. But that does not mean that their leaders and the society at large wait on them to become "martyrs". The leaders have to insist that the youth accept medical attention, and even if they do not break their hunger strike, receive every medical assistance that will keep them alive. One needs only to look at Irom Sharmila's protest or the sacrifice of Dawa and Tenzing of ACT in ikkim to realize that the purity of their protest is not blemished one bit if they are force-fed through nasal tubes. The hunger strikers are too deep into their protest to accept such assistance, which is why their leaders need to take the decision for them and convince them and their supporters let the doctors save them. something that can be done without them technically ending their hunger strike.

And while records are being broken, it also be comes important to take stock of what has been achieved. Unfortunately, nothing really that could have been achieved without losing lives, livelihoods and futures. Of the three agencies which can begin the process of resolution, one is pretending that nothing has happened while the other two talk only to their constituencies or across each other; none of the three is engaging the other in a dialogue about the situation. This, after 44 days of an indefinite general strike! The obdurateness has cemented hard and needs to be smashed. That too will eventually happen, and one hopes without asking for more blood. The problem is refusing to unravel primarily from the urge, nay obsession, to lump all the blame on someone else. Has anyone noticed, no one has admitted to any, repeat any, mistake for anything that has transpired over the past one and a half months. Do the actors calling the shots in the neighbouring state not realize that blame and responsibility cannot be as neatly packaged out as they see it in their heads? If one were to speak of the WB CM and the GTA chief executive, they are in offices where the buck stops. They have a moral obligation to take responsibility for the intractable collapse in the region. This is the bare minimum expected of leaders, and in these times of whataboutery and projections, even this tokenism could maybe help ease the knots enough to begin getting somewhere. Look at it, the Hills were literally instigated into protesting by the WB Govt, and then the people, for all practical purposes, ambushed into staying shut. Since then, lives have been lost with not even agreement on how many have died as a result of the situation. This is the scale of miscommunication and mutual distrust, and people seriously expect talks to work out just like that, without even lip-service level confidence building measures!

Accept it, the political map, media priorities and ground realities have changed since this latest agitation began. Has the movement adapted or taken these into consideration while planning the next move? An agitation should ideally be about active engagement, not reactive bluster alone, but that is essentially all that has been delivered. Yes, the WB Government has been mean to the point of provocation; the aloofness of the Centre has slapped home a rude awakening but the Hill leaders have also been stiff to the point of paralysis. Now that the milestone of a new record has been reached, maybe it is finally time for some stock-taking and some hard questions all around.

Shadows and silhouettes

To comprehend what is happening politically in Nagaland, especially since early July, we need to look much beyond party and electoral politics because the State of Nagaland is a political creation and the shadows of the politics that led to its creation have never dissipated despite almost fif-ty-four years of statehood.

While at one level, the imbroglio within the Naga People's Forum looks like a simple case of dissent within the party spilling over to a contest in the state Assembly, several other political levels also co-exist and entwine here, which are not merely corollaries of the seemingly soundless shadows of Nagaland's political past but are also indelible silhouettes continuously predominant on party and state politics.

So, while ostensibly the accusations of nepo-tism has been hurled at Nagaland Chief Minister Dr Shurhozelie Liezietsu when he appointed his son as Advisor, his style of functioning, etc., which his supporters refute, there appears to be much more than meets the eve.

Recently, in an interview to a news agency, Dr. Liezietsu too has conceded that he heads a minority Government but he also insists that those opposing his leadership are from within his own party there-fore the issue is party-related, not a constitutional issue. His perspective may have prompted him to go to court vis-à-vis Nagaland Governor's call for a floor test. Further, his supporters maintain that Dr. Liezietsu's fight against the rampant corruption in the state has turned some of his party's Legislators against him. But that is also hard to swallow because this explanation attempts to reduce the NPF imbroglio to a corrupt versus anti-corrupt battle \sim untenable considering corruption has always been an indelible stamp of governance in Nagaland. Moreover, being the NPF President, Dr. Surhozelie Liezietsu has also been a part of the NFP-led DAN Government since 2003 and it is hard to believe that he just woke up to the rampant corruption in Nagaland only now.

So while much attention is focused on the numbers game in this imbroglio, there is no or little attention focused on what Dr. Surhozelie Liezietsu and his supporters stand for, and what TR Zeliang and his supporters stand for ideologically \sim although ideology is one word very difficult to asso-

ciate with Nagaland politics and politicians.

While, Nagaland's politics and politicians have the reputation of being more focused on power and pelf, there is also the issue of muscle power that has become an integral part of our politics, perhaps as



the main stairway to power ~ paving the way to pelf.

Now, who provides the muscle power is another issue that cannot be separated from who gets elected ~ because muscle power does not come without strings attached. And, it would be naïve to believe that the lumpen elements are the only ones available for a fee. Despite disavowing the Indian Constitution, all sections of what we now call Naga Political Groups (NPGs) have always "participated" in Nagaland's electoral politics however the nature of such "participation" has changed since the Assembly 1998 elections. No longer is cash the main consideration for "participation" in electoral politics ~ the fee apparently also includes a greater say in government formation and portfolio allocation.

Then there has always been a "middle-ground", hob-nobbing within the parameters of our elector-al politics, which also has its own price. The middle-ground is generally perceived to consist of our NGOs and civil societies, which are sometimes even daubed as frontal organizations of one or another of our NPGs, as also the "socio-cultural wings" of political parties. Particularly since the late 1990s, the middle-ground has been mainstreamed into the state's governance and since 2003 governance was more or less out-sourced to them so they also have an imprint on electoral politics, perhaps government formation too ~ all elections to the Nagaland Assembly since 2003 point to that.

So no, the revolt within the NFP is not a sim-

ple matter of numbers and dissatisfaction with the Chief Minister. There are numerous compulsions that have already existed all these decades and newer ones that continuously emerge, especially with a changed political dispensation in the country, as well as compulsions of forces that seek a dominant role in Nagaland's all levels of state politics.

Then there are comparatively newer entrants, e.g. the BJP, to "conquer" all states, which with just four MLAs, is already a part of the NPF-led DAN



Government. It also wants a greater say both in the state Assembly and the larger political discourse in the state \sim keeping its sights firmly on the 2018 Assembly elections with the hope of changing equations with the NPF in Government formation So, if the BJP is on the course to remove hurdles, it shouldn't be surprising. And possibly Dr. Liezietsu is perceived as a hurdle ~ his staunch regionalist credentials could be a factor although him having recently said that the NPF and the BJP are "natural allies" is a mystery, and portentous, for such a die-hard regionalist. Now, with the NPF severing ties with the BJP on July 18, the shadows and silhou-

ettes of Nagaland politics are likely to be reshaped. Then there is the Framework Agreement of August 3, 2015. During his recent visit to Nagaland, the Centre's Interlocutor for the talks with the NSCN-IM reportedly said that the Government of India wants to arrive at a settlement before the 2018 Nagaland Assembly elections. Now, this is another compulsion that would definitely impact on politics in Nagaland \sim considering that Nagaland NGOs and civil societies have demanded that details of the said Agreement be disclosed and all sections of Naga society, including all NPGs, be included in the talks with the Centre to settle issues pertaining to Nagaland.

Under the circumstances, two questions arise: what and how much would be the NPF imbroglio's impact on the Central Government's wish for a settlement before the 2018 Assembly elections? And, is the same wish impacting on the NPF now? There is much more than meets the eye here and to clearly see through the opaqueness and ambiguity of politics in Nagaland, much more than conventional political analyses is required.

What's Brewing in Darjeeling

COLLECTIVE

The Darjeeling hills are in crisis. A resurgent Gorkhaland movement and subsequent state crackdown have infused life with violent uncertainty. Visitors to the 'queen of the hills' will be hard-pressed to find the idyllic tea plantations, mountain views, and quaint footpaths that characterise Darjeeling. Challenging these figments of the postcolonial imagination has always been another side to Darjeeling, now undeniably visi-ble in the tear gas, burning vehicles, crippling strikes, tourist evacuations, foreboding police and military presence, and deaths at the hands of both state forces and political activists.

The current crisis was born of a perfect storm. In May, the West Bengal government announced Bengali as a compulsory language in schools across the State. By June, this triggered protests and claims of 'linguis tic imperialism' in the Darjeeling and Kalimpong districts (where the lingua franca is Nepali). Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee then decided to hold a Cabinet meeting in Darjeeling for the first time in over 40 years. Little effort was made to include representatives of the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration (GTA) or the three hill MLAs, eliciting protests. The ensuing clash with police left government property destroyed and many protesters injured. The Army was brought in to staunch unrest, but it escalated instead. Subsequent pro-tests and crackdowns have led to further destruction and deaths. With 'Iai Gorkha, Iai Gorkhaland'

reverberating through the hills, Darjeeling has plunged again into the throes of agitation. Internet and ca-ble television have remained sus-pended since June 18. Strikes and security threats have devastated the local economy at the peak of tourist season. While fear is rampant, so is a darity. Uncertainty notwithstanding. the crisis has made clear: Darjeeling is not what it's often made out to be.

The time has come to take a deeper look at the histories undergirding Darjeeling's latest crisis. This requires asking: What is Gorkhaland? And why is it deemed necessary by those who call the region home?

THE CRUX OF THE MOVEMENT

The Gorkhaland movement is a long-standing quest for a separate of Gorkhalandwithin India for Nepali-speaking Indian citize (often known as 'Gorkhas'). With roots dating back over a century, Gorkhaland is a classic subnationalist movement, not unlike those that have produced other States, most recently Telangana, Uttarakhand, Jharkhand, and Chhattisgarh. Beyond all else, Gorkhaland is a desire for the recognition, respect, and integration of Gorkha peoples in the Indian nation-state. Contra popular misunder-standing, the movement is neither separatist nor anti-nationalist: it is about inclusion and belonging in In-dia. As Gorkha National Liberation Front founder Subash Ghisingh explained during the first Gorkhaland agitation in the 1980s, "We Nepali-Indians who have nothing to do with Nepal are constantly confused with 'Nepalis', that is, citizens of Nepalis', th pal, a foreign country. But if there is Gorkhaland then our belonging to an Indian State, just like your identity, will be clear."

With those demands unrequited, a second Gorkhaland movement emerged in 2007 under the leadership ofBimal Gurung of the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) and has flared intermittently. Heralding self-governance, recognition, and be-longing in India, Gorkhaland remains the dream for Darjeeling citizens and many Nepali-speaking Indians across the country. It stands as a key means

tory of discrimination, misconception, and marginalisation in India. Herein lies the rub — and primary antagonism with West Bengal. By demanding Gorkhaland, the people of Darjeeling-Kalimpong are opting

or Darjeeing-Raimpong are opting out of West Bengal's domination, and opting in to the democratic frame-works of India writ large. Understanding Gorkhaland re-quires understanding its underlying histories. In many ways, the Gorkhal of Darjeeling have yet to taste the liberation of India's Independence. The local economy illustrates the continuities between the colonial and post-colonial eras: Gorkhas remain pegged to the lowest levels of employment, while outsiders own the tea industry, meaning its profits flow out of the hills. These economic constraints are exacerbated by the misunderstand-ings Gorkhas face when they seek education and work in places like Kolkata, Bengaluru, and New Delhi. Called (foreigners', 'outsiders' and 'chinkys', racial discrimination affects aspiring

Gorkhas at every turn.

REASONS FOR RESURGENCE The political circumstances are equal-

ly frustrating. Since 1947, the Darjeeling-Kalimpong region has remained under the thumb of West Bengal. despite no substantive pre-Partition evidence to support West Bengal's territorial claims to this region. Conciliatory set-ups like the Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Council (1988-2012) and the GTA (2012-present) have failed to provide meaningful autonomy. These problems don't emanate solely from the hands of Bengalis, yet much of the marginalisation coalesces under the shadow of West Bengal's domination. Thus, when Ms. Banerjee and others stridently lay claim to Darjeeling, insisting that Bengal will never be divided, it strikes a nerve for the Gorkha peoples of India, evoking painful, yet ever-present, histories.

Instances like the attempted imposition of compulsory Bengali are not read as one-off events or mere slights in Darjeeling. They are seen as extensions of precisely the histories of domination that the Gorkhas are trying to escape. Ms. Banerjee's Trinamool Congress (TMC) has lately made significant inroads into the hills. West Bengal's recent creation of the Kalimpong district (2017) and the State's doling out of Tribal Development Boards to ethnicities within the Gorkha conglomerate (Tamang, Sherpa, etc.) might appear well-intended gestures but in paving the way for the TMC's electoral gains, they appear to many as clear examples of 'divide and - causing splits in the Gorkha electorate and undermining the al-ready-limited authority of the GTA. Indeed, the GIM's instigation of the current agitation was at least partly in response to TMC encroachment. GTA elections were imminent, but the GJM's popularity was waning in the face of considerable rewards flowing from West Bengal's coffers. By summoning thousands to the streets, the GJM demonstrated its ability to evoke the emotional force of Gorkhaland, But then violence took hold, and the Gorkhaland movement once again became something else — somet bigger than any one party. The sudden resurgence

Gorkhaland has caught many by surprise. But today's turmoil mustn't obscure deeper histories. For Gorkhas, the troubling realities of colonial and present-day Darjeeling are eerily similar: linguistic chauvinism, ethnic and racial discrimination, resource extraction, unilateral territorial extraction, unilateral territorial claims, the denial of self-governance, political suppression; and ultimately, an unwillingness to respect the 'na-tive point of view'. This double bind of colonial nostalgia and neocolonial regional domination produces a sense

Each Friday Field Day team visits schools nominated for Best School award



Gopalkrishna Gandhi seeks televised discussion with Naidu

New Delhi, Jul 28 (PTI): Opposition's vice presidential nominee Gopalkrishna Gandhi today pitched for a tele-vised discussion with NDA candidate Venkaiah Naidu, and said he has approached the Rajya Sabha TV to arrange such

a dialogue.
In an interview to PTI, Gandhi said such a discussion on issues of na-tional importance would make people aware of their perspectives and al-low the MPs to consider their suitability.

The 71-year-old for-mer ambassador, who also served as the West Bengal governor be-tween 2004-2009, said he believes that the vice presidential election is about the "safeguarding of our republican values", above and beyond party politics.

"I therefore welcome the opportunity to share the ballot paper with Naidu and I look forward to discuss important national issues from the constitutional perspective with him.

"I have requested the Rajya Sabha TV to ar-range a joint discussion, not a debate, between us two on RS TV so that our perspectives can be shared not just with the electors but with the public at large in an at-mosphere of cordiality and frankness," he said.

Asked why he chose

to contest despite the numbers stacked against him, Gandhi said he did so as a "united opposi-tion" made an "earnest request, overcoming their own regional and political differences for re-affirming the country's republican values and democratic ethos.

Eighteen parties, in-

cluding the JD(U) which has just entered into an alliance with the BJP in Bihar, had supported the candidature of the Ma-hatma's grandson.
"I would like to be-

lieve there is no change in the JD(U) decision to support my candida-ture," Gandhi said, when queried about the recent political churning that saw Nitish Kumar resign-ing and then taking oath as Bihar chief minister with the BJP's support.

Political experts be-

lieve Kumar's decision has exposed the fragility of unity among the non-BJP forces, but Gandhi feels the unity has already been projected to the masses, even during the presidential poll.

"And the fact that

(opposition presidential candidate) Meira Kumar got the largest number of votes that any opposition candidate in presidential election has ever got, is a very welcome sign for democracy. "That coming togeth-

er is for me in itself a very welcome sign, a welcome initiative, for democracy and for the unity of sec-ular, republican forces. And as a person who belongs to no party, as an independent candidate I look to all the MPs to consider my suitability

and vote as autonomous electors," he said.

If elected, Gandhi said, his endeavour would be to follow the examples of Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan Zakir Radhakrishnan, Husain, Justice Hidayat-ullah, R Venkataraman, K R Narayanan, Bhairon Singhji Shekhawat and the incumbent vice president Hamid Ansari in discharging his duties, including as the chairman of the Rajya Sabha.



Mixing of liquid nitrogen with drinks, food banned in Har

Chandigarh, Jul 28 (PTI):

The Haryana government has banned liquid nitrogen in drinks and food items after a Delhi man burnt a hole in his stomach by drinking a cocktail containing the chemical at a Gurgaon pub.

Commissioner (Food Safety) in Haryana's Food and Drugs Administration Department, Dr Sa-ket Kumar, said any drink or food whose preparation involves the flushing or mixing of liquid nitro gen is harmful for people.

"Due to its low tem-perature, liquid nitro-gen could be extremely damaging to body tis-sue, causing frostbite and cryogenic burning on contact. Moreover, if ingested, it could lead to severe internal damage, destroying tissue in the mouth and intestinal tract." he added.

The 30-year-old Del-hi man had ended up in a hospital with his stomach "open like a book". It was reported that he apparently did not wait for the chemical, that creates a white smoke, to dissi-

pate before consuming it.

After the gory episode, he underwent a surgery and was hospi-talised for several days.

The FDA official said liquid nitrogen releases a large volume of gas as it evaporates, which could "burst the stomach" if ingested in a sufficiently large quantity.

He said the ban has been issued under the provisions of the Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006 (Central Act 34 of 2006).

Liquid nitrogen is used at bars to quickly chill glasses, freeze ingredients or provide a smoky effect to drinks.



Sc disqualifies Sharif, orders filing of graft cases against him

ISLAMABAD, JUL (PTI): Pakistan's Su-Court today or-Prime Minister Sharif to step Nawaz down and ruled that graft cases be filed against him and his children over the

Panama Papers scandal.

It is the third time the 67-year-old veteran politician's term as premier has been cut short. As the unanimous verdict by the five-judge bench was read out by Justice Eiaz Afzal Khan inside the packed court-room 1 of the Supreme Court, a large number of opposition Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf workers celebrated outside.

The Imran Khan-led Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf, in a swipe at Sharif, tweeted, "Godfather's Rule has ended for good! Truth & Justice have pre-vailed!" The prime minwas disqualified from holding his office as the judges ruled that he had been dishonest to Parliament and the courts and could not be



deemed fit for his office.

Finance Minister Ishaq Dar and Captain Safdar, who is an Member of National Assembly (MNA), also stood disqualified from office, Jusice Khan said. This is the third time the prime minister has been unable to complete his term as premier. However, it was unclear as to who will take over the post till the next general elections, which are scheduled for 2018.

"He is disqualified as a

member of the parliament so he has ceased to be holding the office of Prime Minister," Justice Khan said. The court ordered Election Commission to issue a notification for Sharif's disqualification.

The court also ordered the National Accountability Court to start a corruption case against Sharif, his children -- Hus-sain and Hassan -- and his daughter Maryam.

The Supreme Court ordered that the cases

against them be registered within six weeks and trial be completed within six months. The scandal is about alleged money laundering by Sharif in 1990s, when he twice served as prime minister, to purchase as-sets in London. The assets surfaced when Panama Papers leak last year revealed that they were managed through off-

shore companies owned by Sharif's children. The assets include

four expensive flats in London. Sharif has been the prime minister of Pakistan for a record three times. He leads Pakistan's most powerful political family and the ruling PML-N party.

steel coon-cum-politician, Sharif had served as the Pakistan's prime minister for the first time from 1990 to 1993. His second term from 1997 was ended in 1999 by Army chief Pervez Musharraf in a bloodless coup. In May, the Supreme Court set up a six-member joint investigation team (IIT) to investigate the charges against Sharif and his family. The IIT submitted its report to the court on July 10.

It said the lifestyle

of Sharif and his children were beyond their known sources of income, and recommended filing of a new corruption case against them. Sharif dismissed the report as a "bundle of baseless allegations" and refused to quit, despite demands to do so from several quarters, including opposi tion political parties

On July 21, the court reserved its verdict after concluding the hearing. The six-member JIT was set up with a mandate to probe the Sharif family for allegedly failing to provide the trail of money used to buy properties in London in the 1990s. The top court took up the case in October last year on petitions filed by Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf, Awami Muslim League and Jamaat-e-Islami and reserved the verdict in February after conducting hearings on a dai-ly basis. The five-judge bench that issued today's verdict comprised -- Justices Asif Saeed Khosa, Khan, Gulzar Ahmed, Sheikh Azmat Saeed and Ijazul Ahsan.

The court took up the case on November 3 last year and held 35 hearings spanning over more than 132 hours before concluding the proceedings on February 23. It had issued the 547-pages split judgement on April 20.

US Senate passes sanctions bill against Russia, Iran and North Korea

WASHINGTON, JUL 28 (PTI): In a reflection of overwhelming biparti-san support, the United States Senate has passed a bill that imposes tough and additional sanctions against Russia, Iran and North Korea, Passed by the House of Represen-tatives early this week, the Countering Ameri-ca's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act was passed by the Senate 98-2 votes

The bill now heads the White House President Donald Trump's approval.

This legislation finally holds Russia accountable for its brazen attack on America's 2016 presidential election by imposing new sanctions, strengthening existing sanctions, and requiring congres-sional oversight of any attempt to ease sanctions on Russia," said Senator John McCain, Chairman of the Senate Armed Services

Committee.

"The Senate's overwhelming vote today sends an important mes-sage that America will not tolerate attacks on our democracy or national security interests, and that we will respond to such attacks with strength, resolve, common purpose, and action," McCain said.

Earlier in the day, the White House Press Secretary Sarah Sanders said the Trump Administration supports strong sanctions against Russia, Iran and North Korea.

'The President and the administration support Iran, and North Korea.
We continue to support

strong sanctions against those three countries, and we're going to wait and see what that final legislation looks like and make sion at that point," she told reporters.

"The Congress of the United States has sent a clear message tonight to the governments of the Russian Federation, Iran and North Korea there will be consequences for their dangerous, destabilising activities against our country, our allies, our interests and our values," said Senator Ben Cardin, Ranking Member of the Senate roll lations Committee.

"Prosident Trump

must sign this legisla-tion without delay. Any equivocation or political games from the Administration after today will be completely unacceptable in the face of such overwhelming bipartisan resolve in the Senate and House." Cardin said.

The legislation, McCain said would impose mandatory sanctions on transdefence or intelligence sectors, including the FSB and the GRU, the Russian military intelligence agency that was primarily respon-sible for Russia's attack on US election. It would impose mandatory visa bans and asset freezes on any individual that undermines the cybersecurity of public or private infra-structure and democratic institutions.

Oct 2 trial date set in Kim Jong Nam's killing in Malaysia

MALAYSIA, JUL 28 (AP): A Malaysian judge set an October 2 trial date today for two women accused of murdering the North Korean leader's half

brother.

Indonesian Siti Aisyah and Vietnamese Doan Thi Huong are accused of smearing Kim Jong Nam's face with the banned VX nerve agent at a crowded airport ter-minal in Kuala Lumpur on February 13. He died about 20 minutes later. The women, who face a possible death penalty if convicted, say they were duped into thinking they were playing a harmless prank for a hidden-cam-

Judge Azmi Ariffin estimated the trial will last for two months. The women appeared in court wearing traditional Malay dresses, smiling at their lawyers and embas-sy officials. They were handcuffed as they were

led to the dock.
But after the judge left the room, Aisyah was in tears as her law-yer debriefed her. The two women are the only suspects in custody in a killing that South Korea's spy agency said was part of a five-year plot by North Korean leader Kim Iong Un to kill a brother

Malaysian police have said four North Korean suspects fled the country the same day Kim Jong Nam was killed.

North Korea has a history of ordering killings of people it views as threats to its regime. While Kim Jong Nam was not thought to be seek-ing influence, his status as eldest son in the current generation of North Korea's founding family could have made him appear to be a danger to his half brother's Pyongyang has denied ny role in the killing and has not even acknowledged that the dead man was Kim Jong Nam



t least 39 people have been injured, one seriously, after a commuter A train ploughed into the buffers at a station in Barcelona. The force of the crash at the Estacio de Franca in the north of the city crumpled the front of the carriage and tore off a sheet of metal. Emergency services said 19 of the injured, including the driver, were taken to hospital, while paramedics treated the rest at the scene

'30 US cities held counterterrorism workshops after 26/11'

WASHINGTON, Jul 28 (PTI): Based on the lessons drawn

from the 2008 Mumbai attacks, more than 30 cities in the US have conducted counterterrorism awareness workshops in the past six years to handle such sit-uations, according to an American lawmaker.

"In 2008, we witnessed members of a terrorist organisation conduct a coordinated terror attack on multiple locations in Mumbai. As the nation watched these terrorist create mayhem across Mumbai, it left our federal government wondering how to best assist our first responders in preparing for events like this on our own soil," said Congressman Mike Fitzpatrick.

Since 2011, he said, more than 30 cities have hosted "one of these workshops" to test their current plans, policies and pro-cedures in identifying any gaps in these capabilities.

According to the lawmaker, leral Emergency Management Agency, National Counterterrorism Centre and the FBI responded to the Mumbai attacks by Pakistan-based Lashker terrorists by creating the Joint Counterterrorism Awareness Workshop Series.

Fitzpatrick told the House Committee on Homeland Security vesterday that the threat of oordinated terror attack "is still very much present".

The attacks in Paris and Brussels this year were a "stark reminder" that it was essential that the first responders have communities.
