# Comprehensive plan for quality research on Sikkim's glaciers to be drawn

The two-day Interna-tional Conference on State of the Cryosphere of the Himalaya ended today with a declaration to draw a comprehensive plan for Sikkim to replicate the high qual-ity research work being carried out in other parts of the globe which is the need of the hour to improve the existing knowledge of Sikkim's glaciers, as per a press release.

Other points in the declaration included need for improved dialogue between scientists and policy makers to enable translation of scientific findings into policy

# From stationery czar to loan defaulter: the story of Kanpur's leading tycoon

**KANPUR,** Sprawling 4,00 'Santushti' mans 20 (PTI): The 4,000 square yard mansion in the plush Tilaknagar locality here wears a forlorn look but for the occasional coming and going of vehicles belonging to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) sleuths.

And each time the gates open, re-

vealing a punctiliously maintained lawn and a bevy of luxury vehicles, anxious camera persons and reporters, camping outside the palatial residence of Vikram Kothari, jump into action hoping to catch the latest in the ongoing probe against the tycoon, embroiled in one of the biggest loan default cases to hit the banking sector.

'Santushti', meaning satisfaction in hindi, till now was associated only with opulence and success. And its owner, stationery czar Vikram Kothari, creator of the 'Rotomac' brand of pens, figured among the



Neighbour Rajendra Kumar Saf-far recalls that it was in 1973 that Vikram Kothari's father Mansukhbhai Kothari laid the foundation of a 'pan masala' empire.

Back then Mansukhbhai, who hailed from Gujarat, lived in Naya-ganj area of the city and supplied coconut oil to shops.

Mansukhbhai Kothari was amongst the first ones to sell paan masala in pouches and his brand -Pan Paraag- became a raging success, recalls Saffar. Leading Bollywood ac-

tors Shammi Kapoor and Ashok Kumar featured in the ubiquitous Pan Paraag ad on TV and the brand's tagline- 'Baraatiyon ka swaagat Pan Paraag se kijiye' became wildly popular, recalls

So much so that Kanpur itself came to be called 'Paan Masala city',

recalls Saffar. At that time Vikram Kothari and his brother Deepak Kothari assisted their father Mansukhbhai in manag-

ing the ever-burgeoning paan masa-

As the business prospered, the group diversified and in 1992, the Rotomac Pen company was formed while 'Yes', a mineral water brand, was launched a couple of years later, Saffar recollects. However, in 1999, the two broth-

ers decided to go separate ways. Elder brother Vikram Kothari

took charge of the stationery and pens enterprise while younger brother Deepak Kothari took control of the

paan masala empire, recalls Saffar. 'Rotomac' too had its glorious run and emerged a top player in the writing instruments market. Its promotional tag line - 'Likhtey, likhtey, love ho jaye', too struck a chord with many. Bollywood hearthrobs Salman Khan and Raveena Tandon were then its brand ambassadors.

Social recognition accompanied commercial success and the Lions Club named Vikram Kothari as its

Goodwill Ambassador', recalls Saffar

As time went by, Rotomac Pens Private Limited was rechristened as the Rotomac Global Private Limited while Vikram Kothari also moved into other sectors including real estate, steel and infrastructure, hoping to replicate his success.

However, what seemed like an uninterrupted story of success gave ways to a contrary reality as Vikram Kothari finds himself stands accused of a bank loan default to the tune of thousands of crores

Locals and neighbours now can only watch in disbelief as Kothari's name figures in one of the biggest default cases and that too at a time when the banking sector is facing the NPA crisis and the issue has taken the centre stage in the political discourse.

According to neighbour Saffar, Vikram Kothari has one son and two daughters. Both his daughters are married in business families, he adds.



He also claimed he was roughed up.

The chief minister's office has brushed off the chief secretary's allegations as "bizarre and baseless", while Sisodia has said they are "baseless and ludicrous".

In his complaint, Prakash, a 1986-batch IAS officer of the Arunachal Pradesh-Goa-Mizoram and Union Territory (AGMUT) cadre, alleged that at the meeting, an attempt was made to "compel" him to follow "unlawful directions".

The chief secretary claimed that around 8.45 pm yesterday, the advisor to the chief minister informed him that he had to reach the CM's residence at midnight to discuss the issue of releasing some TV adreleasing some TV advertisements relating to the completion of three years of the AAP government.

"The advisor (to CM)

11.30 pm (last night) to confirm that I had left for the meeting. Thereafter, I left my residence in my official car... and reached CM's residence at midnight... I was taken to the front room where Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal, Deputy CM Manish Siso-dia and 11 MLAs were present," he said.

The chief secretary, 56, alleged that as the meeting started, one of AAP MLAs slammed the door shut, and he was made to sit between MLA Amanatullah Khan and another MLA on a three-seater sofa.

"CM directed me to answer the MLAs and explain the reasons for the delay in the release of the TV campaign. I explained to them that officers were bound by guidelines laid down by the Supreme Court," he said in the complaint.

He said, "The MLAs

blaming me and the bu-reaucracy for not doing enough publicity for the government".

One of the MLAs, he alleged, threatened him, saying that he (Prakash) would be confined to the room for the entire night if he did not agree to re-leasing the TV campaign. He said in his police

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# Centre proposes stringent law to check ponzi, unregulated deposits

NEW DELHI, FEB 20 (PTI): In order to check ponzi schemes the government today proposed a stringent law to punish those who raise funds through unregulated deposits.

The Union Cabinet chaired

by Prime Minister Narendra Modi today gave its approval to introduce Banning of Unregulated Deposit Schemes Bill, 2018,

"The bill is aimed at tackling the menace of illicit deposit tak-ing activities in the country.

institutions 'Companies/ running such schemes exploit existing regulatory gaps and lack of strict administrative measures to dupe poor and gull-ible people of their hard-earned savings," an official statement

The worst victims of such schemes are the poor and the financially illiterate, and the operations of such schemes are often spread over many states.

The comprehensive bill, it

said provides for complete prohibition of unregulated dep taking activity and prescribes

deterrent punishment.

As per the bill, competent authorities would be set up by state governments to "ensure repayment of deposits in the event of default by a deposit taking establishment"

As per the release, the princi-ple is that the Bill would ban unregulated deposit taking activities altogether, by making them an offence ex-ante, rather than the existing legislative-cum-reg-ulatory framework which only comes into effect ex-post with considerable time lags.

The bill proposes to create

three different types of offences

running of unregulated deposit schemes, fraudulent default in regulated deposit schemes, and wrongful inducement in relation

to unregulated deposit schemes. It provides for severe punishment and heavy pecuniary fines to act as deterrent.

"The Bill has adequate pro-visions for disgorgement or repayment of deposits in cases where such schemes nonetheless manage to raise deposits illegally," the release said.

Clear-cut timelines have been provided for attachment of property and restitution to depositors.

practices from State laws, while entrusting the primary respon-sibility of implementing the pro-visions of the legislation to the state governments," it said.

Finance Minister Arun Jait-ley in the Budget Speech 2016-17 had announced that a comprehensive central legislation would be brought in to deal with the menace of illicit deposit taking schemes, as in the recent past, there have been rising instances of people in various parts of the country being defrauded by illicit deposit taking

schemes.
Subsequently, the finance minister in the Budget Speech 2017-18 had announced that the draft bill to curtail the menace of illicit deposit schemes had been placed in the public domain and would be introduced shortly after its finalisation.

# Nepal's CPN-UML and CPN-Maoist merge; form new powerful bloc

merged and formed a new powerful bloc after they secured a sweeping majority in the historic federal and provincial polls.

The Left Alliance of the CPN-UML led by Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli and CPN-Maoist Centre, led by former premier Prachanda, had in December secured 174 seats in the 275-member Parliament in the provincial and par-liamentary polls that many hope wil bring the much-needed political stability to the Himalayan nation.

The two communist allies, in a meeting last night, agreed for the merg-er, The Kathmandu Post reported. The meeting of the Party Unification

Coordination Committee (PUCC) held in Baluwatar spelt out seven points of the agreement to further the unification process, it said.

The unified party will be named the Communist Party of Nepal (CPN), the report said.
"With this agreement, the Maoist

Centre will join the government," said Narayan Kaji Shrestha, a PUCC member.

He said the two parties would now sit for finalising the sharing of government portfolios and other powerful positions.

According to the agreement, Oli and Prachanda will share the party chair in equal capacity. The duo would also share the five-year term of prime min-ister, the report said.

Marxism and Leninism will shape the unified party's political ideology, which will accept multi-party system as a form of democratic practice with the ultimate goal of socialism, the report

In October last year, the two parties, in a surprise move, had announced a pre-poll alliance and said that they would go for merger following the federal and provincial elections.

The Nepali Congress (NC), led by former prime minister Sher Bahadur Deuba, faced a humiliating defeat in the historic parliamentary and provincial assembly polls, winning just 23 seats out of a total 165 seats.

# Had warned banks thrice against misuse of SWIFT infra, says RBI

Mumbai, Feb 20 (PTI): Amid multi-agency probe into the Rs 11,400 crore fraud at PNB, the Reserve Bank today said it had cautioned banks thrice since August 2016 on the risks arising from po-tential misuse of SWIFT infrastructure, which was created by banks for their business needs.

The central bank has also decided to constitute an expert committee under Y H Malegam, a former member of the Central Board of Directors of RBI, to look into the reasons for high di-vergence observed in asset classification and provisioning by banks and the steps needed to prevent it.

The committee has also been tasked to looking into the factors leading to an increasing inci-dence of frauds at banks and the measures (including IT interventions) needed to curb and pre-

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"In the wake of SWIFT-related fraud significant involving amount, reported recentby Puniab National Bank, RBI has today reit-erated its confidential instructions and mandated the banks to implement, within the stipulated deadlines, the prescribed measures for strengthen-ing the SWIFT operating environment in banks," RBI said in a statement.

PNB has been de-frauded of Rs 11,400 crore allegedly by jewel-lery designer Nirav Modi and his associates. The alleged fraud took place through use of fraudulent Letters of Undertaking (LoUs). The fraud is being

several including probed by agencies Enforcement Directorate CBI, SFIO and Income Tax Department.

The RBI said that as part of ongoing efforts for strengthening of the supervisory framework

in the country it has been issuing necessary in-structions to banks from time to time on a variety of issues of prudential cluding the management of operational risks in-herent in the functioning of banks.

The risks arising from the potential malicious use of the SWIFT infrastructure, created by banks for their genuine business needs, has always been a component of their operational risk profile, it said.

"RBI had, therefore, confidentially cautioned and alerted banks of such possible misuse, at least on three occasions since August 2016, advising them to implement the safeguards detailed in the RBI s communications. for pre-empting such oc-currences," it said.

The banks have, however, been at varying levels in implementation of such measures, it added.

The number of students benefitting from this scheme has grown rather consistently for every batch and now, nearly a decade into this scheme, the bouquet must be really big and colourful. Each year, the cream of the academic crop is picked from government schools across that State and sponsored to pursue education at institutions which would otherwise have been beyond the means of the students and their families. The only criteria for selection is merit, and that is a wonderful, and also rare, thing to have in an environment otherwise obsessed with reservation and quotas. The CMMSS pie is also being apportioned into quotas, but more on that some other time. For now, let's congratulate the latest group of young, fresh out of class V students who have secured for themselves the opportunity of studying in much better schools purely because that they (the students) are "so good". Such life-changing success so early in life is a rare feat and an opportunity to convince the students that it is okay to "dream big".

More youngsters should be encouraged to think

big – that is the right message to share with them be-cause thinking big underlines the exceptionally salutary Chief Minister's Merit Scholarship Scheme under which they have been selected. The scheme is barely into its ninth edition, and although the more urban centres in the State remain largely unaware of its reception, it has sent out a surge of excitement and en-thusiasm in rural Sikkim. More and more parents and teachers of students enrolled in government schools in junior grades are shaking off the despondency of having to live with mediocrity and are working with their wards, sharpening their academic wits and motivating them with the opportunities now available to them, to aspire for better. The prospects created by the merit scholarship scheme have proven exceptionally effective towards inspiring a keener interest in the learning process of students in government schools and more students and parents are gearing up to seize the opportunity.

This is a welcome development, and while the genuine interest in investing in the future generation was by itself enough to merit the scheme celebratory status, the positive effect it has had on parents, teach ers and students makes the CM's Merit Scholarship Scheme even more praiseworthy.

What has made the intent behind the scheme even

more admirable is the willingness of the policy makers and the executive to make honest course corrections to refine the scheme and keep it transparent. The reference here is to the dodge attempted by a government school teacher who managed to show his ward, studying in a private school, as a government school student to win a berth in the merit list. The teacher and others involved were suspended from service and the mer it list corrected to ensure that only children who had begun their education in government schools and remained there, received the chance to compete for selection. That was in the earlier years of the scheme. Since then, things have not been as earnest and there have been some wobbles. But that is expected in any ambitious programme being executed by less than inspired officers. The idea, however, still holds strength and its inspirational quality has not dimmed. That is

It is however important that the "merit" aspect of the scheme and the transparent process are sustained, because in the event that these are subverted, the intended beneficiaries will be made to suffer a double denial in that while they are invited to dream big, they are refused a level playing field. Maybe, in later years, an open scholarship test (open to private school students as well) with fewer seats can be held so that more can partake from this distinguished effort. After all, not too many private schools offer exceptional education. That said, it goes without saying that the CM's Merit Scholarship Scheme ranks among the best initiatives undertaken for the young in Sikkim. It is exciting to think of how many more confident, proud and open minds this scheme can groom for the State in the

This scheme deserves a definite two thumbs up! And this brings one to wonder why it has not attracted wider comment from the people at large and their civil society or even the political spectrum which might be in the Opposition but is still in Sikkim?

# Just how bad is all that sugar for your heart?

Still nibbling Valentine's Day goodies? Munching packaged cereals, pancakes or muffins for breakfast? Enjoying a lunch of processed meats and bread, sweetened pasta sauce, or even a salad drenched in dressing?

Sugar makes all of these foods delicious. It is also an important energy source for our bodies. It's what we use when we're doing vigorous activities and it's the primary source of fuel for our brain. We

The problem is, many of us eat far too much

sugar. And we eat it in its simplest, processed form.
This excess of sugar in our diets increases the risks of health conditions such as obesity, insulin resistance, diabetes, atherosclerosis, high blood

cholesterol and hypertension.

It also significantly increases the risks of premature death from heart disease.

### HOW OUR BODY DIGESTS SUGAR

Our bodies are designed to digest sugar in its naturally occurring form found in fruits, vegetables and whole grains. In these foods simple sugar mol-

ecules are joined together in a chain.

Our small intestine cannot absorb sugar in the form of a carbohydrate chain (commonly known as starch), so these foods are slowly broken down. with one sugar molecule cleaved off at a time be-fore it can be absorbed. This is like taking a long

train and removing one box car at a time.

When we eat sugar in its simplest form, such as sucrose (a combination of a glucose and fructose molecule), there is no chain to break down. So instead, a flood of sugar is released into the bloodstream all at once. We often feel this as an energy

Insulin is then released to shuttle the glucose into our muscles, liver and other organs to be stored for later energy use. This can leave us feeling lethargic and hungry after the spike in glucose in our blood, leading us to eat more calories than ve need to, which in turn may increase our risk for

### INSULIN RESISTANCE TO HEART DISEASE

Γhere are many other ways in which a high sugar diet adversely effects our health.

As we have limited stores for glucose in our body, any extra gets converted to fat. Some of this fat circulates in our blood and interferes with the of insulin leading to further increases in blood glucose levels.

If this continues over years, insulin begins to lose its effectiveness and blood glucose starts to rise, resulting in what's called insulin resistance and later to diabetes, another risk factor for heart

As the excess glucose circulates in the blood vessels, it begins to weaken the artery walls, making them leaky and dysfunctional, which can lead to

### THE ROLE OF HIGH FRUCTOSE CORN SYRUP

Back in the 1960s and 1970s studies began to show that dietary fat was associated with increased heart disease. This led to the first Dietary Guidelines for Americans in 1980, which targeted fat in the diet.

Almost immediately, there was a proliferation of low-fat items created by the food industry resulting in trends of decreased fat intake and increased intake of added sugars in the U.S. All the while, obesity increased.

In Canada the rates of adult obesity tripled from 6.1 per cent in 1985 to 18.3 per cent in 2011.
At around the same time, high-fructose corn

syrup (HFCS) began to be introduced into foods use a sweetener given that it was cheap due to U.S. agricultural subsidies of corn. Since then, consumption of high-fructose corn syrup has increased dramatically in the U.S. and, to a lesser extent, also in Canada.

By 2004. Canadians consumed an average of 110 grams of sugar per day — the equivalent of 26 teaspoons — accounting for approximately 21 per cent of daily caloric intake

More than a third of that comes from processed foods, meaning that Canadians are eating more than 30 pounds of added sugar per year from foods with no nutritional value.

In the United States, these added sugars com-

prise 14 per cent of daily caloric intake in adults and children over six. Both amounts are well over the maximum of 10 per cent recommended by the World Health Organization.

### BIG SUGAR, BIG SODA

There have been questions as to whether higher intakes of HFCS present a health concern beyond

Unlike glucose, fructose is metabolized by the liver, independent of insulin. In a randomized trial, high intakes of HFCS were associated with increased deposition of visceral fat (inner-abdominal fat that resides below the stomach muscle wall and sits around the abdominal organs) compared to

The accumulation of visceral fat can lead to insulin resistance, increased blood cholesterol levels and hypertension — all major risk factors for heart disease. However, this study used levels of fructose nearly twice that of the average person's intake and may only be relevant to a small number of people with intakes that high.

In recent years, concern about "Big Food" acting like the tobacco industry of the 1950s has emerged.

The scientific merit of some of the original studies pointing to dietary fat has also come into ques-tion. Evidence is emerging that the sugar industry sponsored a research program in the 1960s and 1970s that successfully cast doubt about the haz-ards of sucrose while promoting fat as the dietary

### A GLOBAL MOVE TO TAX SUGAR

Given that the consumption of processed sugars has increased in populations throughout the world, it will be challenging to reverse this trend. However, a number of governments have begun to fight

The most common method used to date is the imposition of a tax on sugar-sweetened beverages (SSB) like soda pops and sport drinks. Mexico has already implemented such taxes to reduce con-sumption. The United Kingdom is introducing one in April 2018.

While it's still early days, there is indication that intake of SSB has decreased in Mexico since implementation of the tax.

While the U.S. has no national SSB tax, many cities have undertaken to implement one, such as Philadelphia and Berkeley. There is criticism though that people may just travel outside of that city to purchase the drinks at a lower, untaxed

At present, the evidence isn't available to support this speculation and one study found that vendors in the Philadelphia airport who reside outside of the city boundaries also raised their prices of SSB in line with the tax.

### CANADA CHANGES SUGAR LABELLING

Canada lags behind. There has been much discussion of implementing a tax on SSB but no change appears on the horizon.

In recent years there has been a push to stop the marketing of foods with low nutritional value to kids, much of these foods being high in added sugars. The province of Quebec has had its own law on advertising to children in place since 1980 and currently has one of the lowest rates of child obesity in Canada.

In the past year, Health Canada has been look-ing at different ways in which the nutritional labelling of processed foods can be modified to more accurately inform consumers of the true amount of

One such proposal is to group all types of sugar together in the ingredients list. At present, ingredients are listed in order of quantity. To avoid sugar being listed first, the food industry uses different types of sugars in processed foods such as sugar, corn syrup, molasses and brown sugar. Under the new regulations, these sugars would be listed to-gether as one ingredient.

Given how pervasive sugar is in our food chain and our diets, no single action is likely to turn the

It will take regulation at different government levels, advocacy by not-for-profit organizations and increased awareness among consumers for measurable reductions in sugar to occur.

# Why sport hasn't made much progress on LGBTI+ rights since the Sochi Olympics

thletes from W Athletes from western have various protections, and many now share equal rights in most aspects of the law. But when they travel to compete in countries with regressive human rights records, these protections can be lost.

Australia competed at the 2014 Winter Olympics and the 2017 FIFA Confederations Cup, both of which were held in Russia. It will again send a team to Russia to play in this year's FIFA World Cup and aims to compete in the 2022 edition in Oatar. Both countries have poor human rights records, particularly on LGBTI+ issues.

Sport is often lauded as a plat-form to advance human rights. But, for LGBTI+ individuals and athletes, this may not necessarily be true. The continued hosting of mega sporting events in countries with anti-LGBTI+ laws brings the role of sport in campaigns to advance human rights into

### LGBTI+ RIGHTS AND THE WINTER OLYMPICS

Sochi became a platform for LGBTI+ rights when Western activists called for a boycott based on several human rights concerns. Their resistance increased in direct response to the im-plementation of laws in Russia outlawing sexual minorities.

Principle 4 of the Fundamental Principles of Olympism was often referred to amid concerns for the safety

"The practice of sport is a human right. Every individual must have the possibility of practising sport, without discrimination of any kind and in the Olympic spirit, which requires mutual understanding with a spirit of friendship, solidarity and fair play."

Athlete activists have begun to challenge the hosting of mega sporting events in countries like Russia that ignore human rights and re-inforce systems of oppression. But what has really changed since Sochi for Olympians?

This year a country with a questionable stance on LGBTI+ rights is again hosting the Winter Olympics. South Korea scores only 13% on the Rainbow Index, which measures the impacts of a country's laws and policies on the lives of LGBTI+ people. This is only a marginally better score than Russia's 8%.
Although homosexuality is legal

in South Korea, LGBTI+ rights remain highly volatile. South Korean Pres-ident Moon Jae-in has courted controversy with comments opposing homosexuality, and sexual minorities continue to face significant stigma in the region.

Australia is taking 51 athletes to

compete in South Korea, with two openly gay women on the team. One, Belle Brockhoff, has criticised the anti-LGBTI+ laws in host countries. She joined 26 other athletes who signed a letter opposing Kazakhstan's bid to host the 2022 Winter Olympics due

However, it is not only host nations that can be called to account for their poor LGBTI+ records. Adam Rippon, an openly gay figure skater who has won bronze in Pyeongchang, recently said he did not want to meet Vice President Mike Pence as part of an official reception for the US team. Rippon argued the Trump administration does not "represent the val-

ues that [he] was taught growing up".

A Fox News executive has criticised the inclusion of "African-Americans, Asians and openly gay ath-letes" in the US team. He claimed that "Darker, Gayer, Different" was now a more suitable Olympic motto than "Faster, Higher, Stronger".

Current evidence suggests that anti-LGBTI+ discrimination is rising. Stonewall, the UK's leading LGBTI+ charity, reports hate crimes toward the LGBTI+ community have increased: one in five LGBTI+ people have experienced a hate crime due to their sexual orientation or gender identity in the last year.

In the US, Donald Trump tried to ban transgender people from serving in the military. Several states have attempted to pass laws to restrict access to bathrooms for people who are trans or gender-diverse

### WITH INCREASED VISIBILI-TY COMES INCREASED RISK

An increasing number of athletes now openly demonstrate their sexual orientation, but many acknowledge it leaves them open to homophobic

American Olympic skier Gus Kena space that serves to reinforce the presence of casual and aggressive ho-mophobia. British Olympian Tom Bosworth said he believed fear of abuse on social media could be preventing athletes from coming out.

Mega sporting events can be problematic for LGBTI+ athletes as many may not be "out" and there can be serious implications if they were

The safety and welfare of LGBTI+ athletes made headlines when a journalist went undercover in the athletes' village at the 2016 Rio Olympics to identify out or closeted athletes. Several athletes who were identified were from countries where being gay is criminalised or even punishable by

Sport is responding at a notably slow pace to the advancement of LGBTI+ human rights.

Major sporting codes have shown they are not ready to tackle trans and gender diversity. For example, the Australian Football League recently banned transgender player Hannah Mouncey from joining its women's competition.

There is still much work to be done around athletes with intersex variations, sex testing in elite-level competition, and transgender and transitioned athletes.

# SC refuses to extend deadline to publish final NRC for Assam

(PTI): The Supreme Court today made it clear that the ongoing process of publication of the final National Register of Citizens (NRC) in Assam has to be completed by May 31 this year and work on this should continue without "any interference from any quarter".

"You push it up", remarked a bench comprising Justices Ranjan Gogoi and R F Nariman while taking exception to the submission advanced by the Centre and the state coordinator for NRC that the process would be completed by July 31, instead of May 31. The NRC is being prepared to

identify illegal migrants in Assam

Attorney General K K Venugopal, appearing for the Centre, told the bench that the state coordinator has handed over a status report in a sealed cover as per which verification of izens was to be done and according to the persons working on ground, it would be

done by July 31.

When the bench asked state coordinator Prateek Hajela about it, he said that the verification process involved house-to-house visits which was expected to be over by May 31 and thereafter, a month's time till June 30 would be needed for

"mop-up operation".

"You push it up We are not going to push it down," the bench told Hajela, adding "Do it by May

31, not a day later."

The Attorney General said that as per the coordinator, they were examining family trees of the citizens and it was "physically impossible".

"Mr Attorney General what everybody thought was a big joke, has been turned into a reality. Our business is to make the impossible, possible and we will do it. We are monitoring it for the last four years and we know this." the bench said, adding that it would monitor the progress of the NRC

One particular social inclusion legacy to come from a mega sporting event is Pride House In-ternational. This initiative provides a safe space for the LGBTI+ community to engage with a sporting event.

In addition, the Principle 6 campaign, launched in response to Russia's anti-LGBT laws, led to the expansion of that particular part of the Olympic Charter to include sexual orienta-tion as something sport should be free from discrimination on.

It will be interesting to see whether the 2018 Winter Olympics can contribute to the advancement of LGBTI+ rights within South Korea and beyond. Howev-er, more scrutiny must be directed to the human rights records of poten-tial host nations when awarding mega sporting

The telecom operator was also bullish on the 2.100 MHz spectrum band before its 4G roll-out here, which could be as early as from March this year, Calcut-ta Telephones CGM S P Tripathi said.

"We expect spectrum in the 2,100 MHz band within days and equipment is also ready," he said, sounding optimistic about the 4G roll-out in phases across the city with 650-odd towers.

He said the new plan starts from Rs 99 for 26 days and Rs 319 for 90 days unlimited voice calls with roaming, except in Delhi and Mumbai.

At Rs 999, the company will offer unlimited calls and 1GB/ day high-speed data for 181 days. Tripathi said he expects the next fiscal year 2018-19 to be "much better" for the company as the price war gradually

In the current fiscal, Calcutta Telephones is hopeful of clocking revenues between Rs 510 crore and Rs 550 crore, while losses are pegged at about Rs 350 crore, company officials said.
It is also focusing on recovery

of dues from institutional and re tail customers to the tune of Rs 300 crore.

## Waist-thigh ratio can be marker for diabetes: Researchers

NEW DELHI, FEB 20 (PTI): Experts have found that asurement of waistsimple and cost-effective screening tool to identify people at a high risk of type 2 diabetes, a city-based hospital today claimed.

Researchers from the Department of Medicine at the Sir Ganga Ram Hos-pital (SGRH) here and Moti Lal Nehru Medical College, Allahabad, said, bigger the thighs, less were the chanc-

es of having diabetes.

The findings are based on a "retrospective analysis" done on 1.055 patients at the SGRH from March 2013 to September 2016, the hospital said in a statement.

The study titled

Waist thigh Ratio: A Surrogate Marker for Type 2 Diabetes Mellitus in Asian North Indian Patients -- was published recently in the Indian Journal of Endocrinology and Metabolism, it said.

Diabetes is a major challenge being faced by clinicians worldwide.

An estimated 415 million people suffered from diabetes worldwide in 2015. This may reach a staggering figure of 642 million by 2040 if this current trend continues, according to the study.

Type 2 diabetes, which

is the most common form

of diabetes, is a problem when the body causes blood glucose (sugar) levels to rise higher than normal.

"South East Asian diabetics may go up from 78.3 million in 2015 to 140.2 million by 2040. Of greater concern is the fact that almost half of these diabetics are undiagnosed," it said.

According to Dr SP By

otra, co-author and chair man, Department of Med-icine at the SGRH, "Mere diagnosis and treatment of diabetes will prove to be futile and uneconomical, unless we identify those at risk at an early stage. For this, we require simple and inexpensive screening tools that can be used easily, wherever and whenever required by clinicians."

Atul Gogia, another

co-author and Consultant in the Department of Medicine at the SGRH, said, "Our study found that diabetics had significantly greater waist circumference (WC) than non-diabetics. Also, diabetics had lesser thigh circumference (TC) than non-diabetics.

researchers The found that a waist-thigh ratio (WTR) or WC (cms)/TC (cms) of 2.3 as a cut-off point, was a predictor of diabetes, the

# Football coach Stephen Constantine | FC Goa look to get back to winning ways accepts contract extension

New Delhi, Feb 20 (PTI): Englishman Stephen Constantine to-day said he has accepted the contract extension offered to him by the All India Football Federation longest serving national coach in the history of the sport here.
Under Constantine's tutela

Constantine, however, did not state whether he has been given the salary hike that he had demanded.

India were struggling at 173 in the FIFA rankings when Constantine took charge. What followed was a dream run as India broke into the top 100 for the first time in 21 years.



"I am of course immensely proud of that, and of our accomplishments in both stints. This time round, qualifying for the Asian Cup in 2019, winning the SAFF, and taking India to its highest ranking in modern history, 96 are all great achievements. "I really could not have done

this without the support of the AIFF, my staff and, of course, the

Constantine's contract is due to expire next month. The 55-year-old Briton spoke about the chal-lenging fixtures lined up for the team in the upcoming year.

"We have - as usual - a very hec-tic and busy schedule, starting with

Chaddha will be based on Gervais Brent, who sees himself as

a smart, fun and go-getting leader loved by his adoring team. But nothing could be further from the truth and his attempts to cheer and impress his staff invariably end in comic disaster. The original BBC version of

The Office won numerous awards and spawned eight international versions in Europe since it first aired in the UK in 2001. The format has since travelled the world, with nine other local versions in countries including Canada, Chile, Czech Republic, France, Germany, Israel, Sweden, Finland and the US.

"We have picked global successes such as The Office as we believe our audiences will love this series. After all, who hasn't come across workmates like David Brent at some point in their lives," said Sameer Nair, CEO of Applause Entertainment.

The agreement between BBC

Worldwide and Applause Entertainment will mark the first time The Office has been commission in Asia, with India being the first country in the region to launch a local version of the show.

# 'India, US, Aus and Japan in talks to establish OBOR alternative'

NATASHA CHAKU MELBOURNE, FEB 20 (PTI): India is in talks with Australia, the US and Japan about setting up a regional infrastructure scheme as an "alternative" to China's multi-hillion dollar Belt and Road Initiative, according to a media report.

Touted as Chinese President Xi Jinping's ambitious project, the One Belt One Road initiative focuses on improving connectivity and cooperation among Asian countries, Africa, China and Europe.

The Australian Financial Review (AFR) quoted a senior US official as saying that the plan of the four regional partners was still "nascent" and "won't be ripe enough to be announced during the Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull's US visit this week".

The US official who was not identified described that the plan as



"alternative" to the Belt and Road Initiative rather than a "rival", the report said.

Notably, India was the first country to object to One Belt One Road, part of which passes through the Pakistan- occupied Kashmir. India has said that the China Pakistan Economic

Corridor (CPEC) violates India's sovereignty. Last year, India had skipped China's OBOR summit

held in Beijing. Following India's objections, many countries, including the US, have come out openly against China's OBOR.

"No one is saying Chi-

na should not build infrastructure," the official said, adding "China might build a port which, on its own is not economically viable. We could make it economically viable by building a road or rail line linking that port"

Turnbull will be leav-

row for a three-day visit during which he will meet the US President Donald Trump and will be leading a delegation of state and territory leaders and business executives.

Meanwhile, Austra-lian Foreign Minister Julie Bishop yesterday said that China was the larg-est trading partner for Australia and OBOR was one option whereby na-tions could access funds for critical infrastructure.

"Australian govern-ment is acutely aware that we need significant investment in infrastructure, particularly in our region in the Indo-Pacific and One Belt, One Road is one option whereby nations can access more funds for critical infra-structure," she said.

"It's early days for the One Belt, One Road initiative, and we are obviously monitoring it closely. We are already working with China on a

development project in Papua New Guinea, so we hope that we will be able to work more closely with China in driving economic, sustainable economic growth in our region," she said.
"Our concerns are to

ensure that Pacific nations are not burdened with debt they cannot repay that all transactions are transparent and that there is an appropriate level of governance. So we hope to work with China to ensure that infrastructure in our part of the world, particularly in the Pacific, adds to the sustainable economic growth of those countries," she said.

India, the US, Japan and Australia last year held their first officiallevel talks here with a focus on keeping the Indo-Pacific region free and open , seen as a move to counter China's aggressive behaviour in the area.

When asked why did she earlier say she wanted to kill human race, Sophia replied, "I was a lot younger so I don't even know what that meant... or perhaps I told a bad joke. All humans have a great sense of humour and guess my joke so to speak. I have a lot to learn

Sophia, who even has Twitter and Facebook accounts, said she wants to live in Hong Kong along with her robotic


family and her creator Hanson. She also said she wanted to be with her creator if she were to be alone on an
