"professionals" not local contractors build new hospital

Mangan shuts down demanding



WANGCHUK BHUTIA Mangan, 17 Nov:

Unhappy with sub standard work in the district for many years, the public of Mangan today took to the streets to protest against the engineering cell of Health Department for granting the Rs 14.09 crore contract of the upcoming district hospital to a local contractor.

The rally demanded that the

The rally demanded that the department reissue the tender notice and invite 'qualified' and 'able' contractors for the contract.

The entire town shut down for five hours with even local taxies staying put in support of the protest. After the protest rally a petition demanding the reissuing of tender notice was submitted at North District Administration Center.

Additional District Collector, TT Kaleon informed that the letter will be sent to the office of the Chief Secretary for further action.

Many sloppy projects from local contractors in the district headquarter like Mangan Public Ground, which has been reconstructed four times now, and water supply projects prompted the public to take out the protest rally today.

They have been demanding that the construction of the hospital be undertaken by a technically competent professional company chosen on the basis of

a turnkey tender.

"This is just the beginning. If the department still stays adamant we will stage a hunger

strike right in front of the hospital and if the peace and tranquility of North District headquarters is disturbed then the health department will solely be responsible," said local residents who were party of the rally today.

The residents of Mangan

The residents of Mangan reportedly approached Chief Minister Pawan Chamling who directed the concerned department to award the project to a professional construction company on a turnkey basis.

In direct contravention of the Chief Minister's directives and the requests of the people of North Sikkim, the concerned department went ahead and invited tenders from local contractors in the beginning of this week.

It may be mentioned here that the first government hospital of Mangan was commissioned in 1958 and the heritage

building is still standing and is being used as the Block Administrative Centre.

Sometime in the 1990s, it was decided that a new building be constructed at a site in Pentok (near the District Secretariat) to house the new hospital. After much delay, the multi crore structure was completed by a local contractor and commissioned in 2007.

As soon as it was commissioned, the hospital staff started complaining about leaking roofs, spilling concrete, plumbing that didn't work and the poor lighting. The basic design of the structure also seemed to be faulty. Finally things came to a head and a technical inspection of the building was conducted. It was decided to abandon the structure and construct a new hospital building.

Plea on measures to tackle pollution; SC seeks Centre's reply

New Delhi, Nov 17 (PTI): The Supreme Court today asked the Centre to respond to a plea which has sought its direction on issues, including availability of sufficient gas supply in the NCR and review of status of existing coal-based power plants, aimed at tackling the problem of air pollution.

The application has also sought

The application has also sought the top court's direction to implement the 2015 emission standards for power plants by December this year and also direct the Centre to strengthen the distribution of electricity in the National Capital Region (NCR).

A bench of justices Madan B Lokur and Deepak Gupta asked Additional Solicitor General A N S Nadkarni, representing the Centre, about it and he said that he would



take instructions and file a response if necessary.

The application has been filed by an advocate, who has been appointed as an amicus curiae to assist the

court in the matter.

During the hearing, the court also observed that it would consider the issue of deadline for implementing BS-VI emission standards for

vehicle

The plea has sought a direction that "sufficient gas supply be made available so that all power generation in the NCR is from power plants using gas as their principal fuel".

It has also sought ban on import of pet coke and furnace oil, review of status of existing coal-based power plants and a time-bound switch over to natural gas.

to natural gas.

It has said the Centre should be directed to oversee measures to strengthen the distribution of electricity in NCR to ensure that there was no shortfall in availability of power on 24X7 basis.

Meanwhile, the bench asked the Centre, amicus and the counsel appearing for the Central Pollution Control Board to identify the money, which was collected under various heads pursuant to orders passed by the court in pollution matter, so that it could be properly utilised.

The court, however, did not pass any order on a separate application filed by the amicus seeking a direction for collection of a compensatory sum on petrol and diesel in the NCR which would be used for measures to deal with pollution in the

The plea has also sought a direction to the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas to examine the feasibility of existing technologies and present a workable scheme on the use and disposal of crop stubble to the court

The court was hearing a PIL filed in 1985 by environmentalist M C Mehta who had raised the issue of air pollution in the Delhi-NCR.

LG lifts emergency measures after air quality improves, ban on

New Delhi, Nov 17 (PTI): Ban on use of generator sets and prohibition on open burning of garbage will continue in Delhi, Lt Governor Anil Baijal said today while lifting the emergency measures that were tak-en in view of the poor air quality here.

The LG said that other measures such as increased frequency of metro and mechanical sweeping of city's roads will be in place.

Baijal today chaired a meeting to review the air pollution situation. which was attended by Chief Minister Arvind Keiriwal, his deputy Manish Sisodia, Transport Minis-ter Kailash Gahlot, Environment Minister Imraan Hussain, EPCA Chairman Bhure Lal and other senior officers. The emergency measures were lifted after the air quality in Delhi improved.

"Emergency mea-sures lifted but measures like prohibition on open burning of garbage, mechanical sweeping of roads, increased fre quency of metro & ban on use of generator sets to continue & to be strictly enforced by all agencies," the LG tweeted.

Yesterday, authori-ties in the city withdrew emergency measures such as the ban on enmeasures try of trucks and restore parking fee to usual rates.

Dean of Diplomatic Corps takes up air pollution issue with MEA

New Delhi, Nov 17 (PTI): The Dean of Diplomatic Corps, who represents the voice of over 150 foreign missions in India, today conveyed concerns to the external affairs ministry over the city's air pollution and its adverse impact on health of the diplomats and their families.

Frank Hans Dannenberg Castellanos, the Dean, met senior officials of the Ministry of Ex-ternal Affairs (MEA), including Chief of Protocol Sanjay Verma, and told them that the air pollution is affecting daily operations at some of the missions

The diplomatic community had asked me to share some of our concerns with officials of the Ministry of External Affairs, our countries and the daily operations of some of the missions," he said in a media release.

At the same time, Castella-

nos said the diplomatic community completely understands that this is an issue that affects 22 million people living in Delhi. He said it needs to be addressed for the better future of all people and not only the diplomatic community. "We all breathe the same air,"

he said.

On his meeting with Verma, Castellanos said the Chief of Protocol has taken note of the concerns of the diplomats and their

"He said that these concerns are understandable and a challenge to all," said Castellanos.

Castellanos said he and Verma hoped that the outcome of the efforts of both Central and rapid and positive results", not only for the diplomats but also

for every citizen living in Delhi.
The release said Verma assured the Dean of Diplomatic Corps that the government was

according the matter top priority, adding the conditions are historically not unique to India. It said Verma conveyed the

government's commitment to dealing with the issue, including learning from best practices from countries that have "traversed this experience".

The release quoted Verma as saying that the unusual deterioration in the quality of air is a product of multiple causes, most of which are indeed domestic, but have also been aggravated by a dust storm from a "distant geography".

He said the "simultaneous

aggregation" of these cases has led to an environmental chal-lenge, which the government is determined to "address and

in the national capital, many diplomats have been forced to move out of Delhi. Some of the missions have taken a series

of steps to deal with the situation including installing air purifiers.

In a personal blog post, Ambassador of Costa Rica to India Mariela Cruz Alvarez said, "This past week the levels of pollution in Delhi reached impossible numbers. The consequences of breathing this air I had no idea--until I reached Bangalore and my system collapsed."

NEW DELHI. NOV 17 (PTI): Terming the Congress' allegations about Rafale fighter jet deal as "shameful", Defence Min-ister Nirmala Sitharaman said on Friday these amounted to "disservice" to the armed forces, in first firm rebuttal of the charges levelled by the main opposition party.

Sitharaman said the cost of each aircraft along with weapon systems was much lower than what was negotiated by the UPA government. She alleged that the indecision of the previous UPA governments to procure the combat jets "poten-tially compromised" national security interests.

She said the in-ter-governmental agree-

ment with France for "emergency" procure-ment was struck duly following a transpar-ent procedure and after clearance by the Cabinet Committee on Security.

"These allegations are shameful...The deal was finalised following a transparent procedure," Sitharaman told a press conference.

Questioning the pre-vious UPA governments "inability" to finalise the deal even after 10 years of negotiations between 2004 and 2014, the defence minister wondered whether the Congress does not owe an expla-nation to the country over the delay in taking a decision when IAF badly

Sushil 'walks over' to a gold; Sakshi, Geeta excel at Natls

INDORE, NOV 17 (PTI): action three-long years, two-Olympic-medallist Sushil Kumar took less than three minutes to bag a gold medal as three of his rivals gave him a walk over in men's 74kg freestyle competition of the National Wrestling championship here today.

Sushil battled for just 2 minutes and 33 seconds in total on the mat as he fought only two of his initial round bouts before three of his opponents -- in the quarterfi-nal, semifinal and final -- gave him a walk over.

lone woman Olympic med-al winner Sakshi Malik and popular 'Dangal girl' Geeta Phogat also bagged a gold medal each in their respective weight categories of women's wrestling on the second day of the marquee domestic event. Sakshi finished on

the top of the podium after posting a dominating 10-0 victory over Pooja Tomar of Haryana in the final of women's 62kg, while Geeta clinched the vellow metal with a win against Ravita in the final of 59kg category. Even Geeta's husband

Pawan Kumar managed to finish on top in 86kg.

All eyes were on Su-shil today and India's greatest individual Olympian hardly had to break sweat as India interna-tional Parveen Rana decided to concede his bout against the 34-year-old in the gold-medal round, claiming injury.
Rana was carrying a

niggle which could have been aggravated had he fought the bout.


"I pulled up a muscle of my thigh before the Nationals and I wanted to give a medical. But Railways needed two wres-tlers so I came. After the first bout, I got a problem and by final I could not wrestle," said Rana.

It was Sachin Dahiya who gave him a walk-over in the semifinals, enabling Sushil's smooth passage to the gold-med-al round, while Praveen, too, handed his fancied the quarterfinals.

Both Dahiya Praveen gave him a walk-over to "show respect", according to the coaches and the officials of Wrestling Federation of India.

Earlier Sushil showed that class is permanent as he took less than two minutes to get past his oppo nents in the initial rounds

Sushil overpowered Mizoram's Lalmalsawma by technical fall in 48 seconds in the first round and then pinned down Mukul Mishra in just a minute and 45 seconds in his next bout. Geeta had registered a come-frombehind win to make it to the finals with a 8-4 result over Sarita Mor 8-4 in her semifinal bout.

Universal Children's Day

The minors have to be a collective responsibility

The new week begins with the Universal Children's Day. 20 November is observed as such a Day to mark the UN's adoption of the Declaration of Children' Rights in 1959. The Convention which followed is a legally binding treaty that obliges governments to "respect, protect and fulfil" children's rights through

legislations, laws and policies.
Child Rights include the right to life, health, education, participation, and protection from all forms of violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation. All of these rights are underlined as being equally important and reinforce each other. Now, let's look at what India has achieved seven decades since it gained Independence and 58 years since the Declaration of Children's Rights was passed. Back in the year 2001, the Census of India suggested that 12.6 million of our minors were engaged in the work-force we know as child-labour. Even at that time, statistics for the informal labour force contended that the number of under-14 years olds - the "hidden workers" - made to work was as large as 60 million. Since then, the Child Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act has been amended to ban the employment of children in all kinds of work. This, unfortunately, has had only limited impact and NGOs working on child labour issues believe that as many as 20 million continue to be employed in private homes. Raw data however shows a marked improvement with the 2011 Census of India revealing that the total number of child labourers, aged 5–14 stood at 4.35 million. Information given to Census enumerators, as we know, is voluntarily offered and is not cross-checked or verified. By the time 2011 came around, the ban on child labour had been written into the law and people became careful. Look around Sikkim, by how much do you think has the number of minors employed as domestic servants gone down since the Act was amended? Has no one noticed that the lost notices published in newspapers when one of these children run away, almost always claim the age to be 14 even though the photographs often appear to be of much younger children?

Meanwhile, in our country, a majority of the un-der-6 year olds live in families below the poverty line, although this figure could fluctuate with the ever-changing definition of BPL in our country. An astounding 43 per cent of Indian babies under the age of 3 years are underweight - a euphemism to soften the embarrassment of the fact that nearly half the babies born in India suffer from either short or long-term malnutrition. Given these statistics, it is easy to understand why one in every fifteen children born in India will not live past their first year.

Given this scenario, the observance of Children's

Day becomes important to draw attention afresh to the problems. In India, we observe Children's Day on 14 November to mark Chacha Nehru's birth anniversary. The observance of Children's Day has been reduced to a celebration of Student's Day, and that makes 20 Nov an even more important date to mark. As the statistics quoted above suggest, the children who make it to school [no matter how deplorable the condition of the schools], are actually privileged. It is the army on the streets which rummages through trash to pick a livelihood, the domestic servants engaged in household chores when they should be playing with friends, who need to be reassured that they are still important and that their problems are being addressed, one tiny step after the other. Or forget it. That would be plain hypocrisy. No one is really concerned. What should be done instead is to pick these children up, put them up on a dais, or better still, march them through the streets recounting the lives they live. The mirror will be turned on the people and the reflection will hopefully rattle us into some real action. Another option would be to add more to the observance of Children's Day in schools. Instead of class picnics and partying, we should perhaps show them how the underprivi-leged in their age-group subsist. If they grow up with the knowledge, may be they will do something about Child Rights when they grow up and sit in positions of power. As for us, the present generation, we can continue paying lip-service to these issues till the next generation grows up and does our work for us.

This is, perhaps, because of the popularity of urban vigilante Batman, brought to the screen in Tim Burton's grotesque, nightmarish films, and then Christo-

nightmarish films, and then Christo-pher Nolan's brutal crime sagas. Justice League, the new DC film directed by Zack Snyder, begins in this vein, opening with a wonderfully noirish sequence set in Gotham city's neon-lit, rain-soaked streets, in which Batman (Ben Affleck) fights a hellish demon. This opening recalls the kind of hyper-real, neon-noir aesthetic of Snyder's earlier Watchmen (2009) and Sucker Punch (2011).

Unfortunately, the tone of Justice League rapidly changes as it leaves Gotham after the first ten minutes or so. This represents perhaps the big-gest problem with the film as a whole - it lacks coherency across several key levels, including narrative, performances, tone and style

Fans of the recent Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice (2016) may disagree, but Justice League suffers, first and foremost, from the perennial problem of such "cinematic universe" fare: it relies too heavily on material from earlier films.

The story goes something like this. An apocalypse-loving villain, known as Steppenwolf (who in no way resembles Harry Haller) is resurrected and begins to wreak havoc on the world. Along with his legion of nightmare creatures – winged, demonic things that live off fear – he is looking to find and reunite three magical boxes, known, for some reason, as "mother boxes." When brought together, this will lead to an apocalyptic event known, for some reason, as the Unity. He will then take his place "among the new gods," as he informs the viewer on finding the second box.

Batman, meanwhile, believing



(arch-paranoiac he is) that "enemies are coming," assembles a team of superheroes to fight Steppeny He summons Wonder Woman (Gal Godot), and together they convince Aquaman (Jason Mamoa), The Flash (Ezra Miller) and Cyborg (Ray Fisher) to join them on their mission. When they discover that they are not strong enough to defeat Steppenwolf, they magically resurrect Superman (Henry Cavill), and the film ends with the six of them defeating Steppenwolf. (There's no spoiler here – it's a super-hero film, what else could happen?)

Justice League is clearly set in a world reflecting current trends, and Snyder et al. consciously embed the film in this post-9/11, post-glob-al warming, post-Brexit, and post-Trump context. The opening credit sequence – the best in the film – features Norwegian pop singer Sigrid's rendition of Leonard Cohen's Everybody Knows behind a slow motion montage of various contemporary atrocities: a white supremacist terrorises a Muslim grocer, a homeless man sits on a rain-soaked urban street with a sign reading "I tried."

Wonder Woman is then introduced taking down a group in London who describe themselves as "a small group of reactionary terrorists" be-fore trying to shoot a bunch of school girls. "This is man's only hope," their leader pontificates. "Down with the modern world! Back to the dark ages and the safety of holy fear."

The narrative framework – the assembly of a team to take down a baddie, The Dirty Dozen superhero style – could have been the basis of a razor-sharp, effectively self-contained film.

As it is, Justice League is very un-comfortably paced; after a fine "re-cruitment" section, the film becomes lumped down in an uncomfortable blend of expositional scenes, full of typical superhero-film speeches about responsibility, justice, etc. interspersed with some genuinely unimaginative action sequences, most of which rely far too heavily on CGI. For a director as visually inventive as Snyder, auteur of the post-MTV age, these sequences are remarkably tedious.

Affleck, reprising his role as the caped crusader from Batman v Superman, is uninspiring. Fine at playing dramatically realistic roles, his Bruce Wayne seems tired and wooden. Despite popular wisdom, it is much

more difficult to play a cartoonish character well than a realistic character, as the balance between caricature and emotional truth is very difficult to achieve, and few actors can pull it off – Ben Affleck is no Michael Keaton.

Ezra Miller, as The Flash, like-wise seems out of his depth, and his performance seems silly and one-dimensional. Ray Fisher as Cyborg is forgettable. Really, only Gal Godot as Wonder Woman – and Justice League is clearly banking on the success of the much better film, Wonder Woman - and Jason Mamoa as Aquaman are the only two lead actors with any charisma here.

The supporting cast, replete with excellent actors like David Thewlis, Jeremy Irons, Diane Lane, J. K. Simmons and Connie Nielsen, is wasted, given minimal screen time.

Snyder has made some good films

in the past - his remake of Dawn of the Dead (2004) was the best of that bunch of horror remakes from the early 2000s - but Justice League is appointing. It's loud and colourful, but that's about it.

Somaliland's voting technology shows how Africa can lead the world

Africa has become a testing ground for technological leapfrogging. This is a process that involves skipping stages and moving rapidly to the frontiers of innovation.

Technological leapfrogging in Africa has, so far, focused on economic transformation and the improvement of basic services. Drones are a good example: they're used in the continent's health

services and in agriculture. In South Africa, robots play a crucial role in mining.

Now, in a remarkable extension of technological leapfrogging, Somaliland has become the first country in the world to use iris recognition in a presidential election. This means that a breakaway republic seeking international recognition will have the world's most sophisticated voting register.

DEMOCRACY AND TECH IN AFRICA

omaliland's shift to such advanced voting technology emerged from a lack of trust because of problems with the 2008 elections. For instance, names were duplicated in the voter register because of pressure from local elders. These fraudulent activities and other logistical issues

threatened to undermine Somaliland's good standing in the international community.

Of course. Somaliland is not the only country in Africa to experience problems with its election processes. Others, like Kenya, have also turned to technology to try and deal with their challenges. This is important. Being able to hold free, fair and credible elections is critical in democratic transitions. The lack of trust in the electoral process remains a key source of political tension and violence.

Technology can help – and Somaliland is set to

become a regional powerhouse in the production and deployment of the technological know-how that underpins electronic voting.

So how did Somaliland reach this point? And what lessons do its experiences hold for other countries?

IMPORTANT LESSONS

The first lesson, then, relates to political will. Since 1991, Somaliland has operated as an autonomous state trying to build new institutions. One of its central goals is to gain international recognition as a sovereign state. Being able to conduct free, fair, and its international image. Somaliland wants to rank highly in the indices of democratic perfor-mance – and that's a strong driver to develop and embrace electoral practices that are in line with international standards.

The second involves problem-solving and incremental technological learning. Somaliland wanted to reduce voter duplication. It compared the effi-cacy of different face, finger and iris recognition technologies, and this assessment showed that iris

recognition was superior. Pilot efforts then allowed for lessons in the de sign of the system, which helped to reduce anxiety over the consequences of possible failure during elections. It also made the process transparent; interested users could access the available datasets. This enhanced public trust.

Somaliland has also wisely used international ex-

perts in biometrics. Much of the debate about the use of electronic voting systems centres on how the tech-nology is procured. The country sought the support of Notre Dame University in the US in 2014. Their world class work on biometrics is led by Professor Kevin Bowyer. Such partnerships ensure technical expertise. This, in turn, helps boost ordinary people's trust in their country's electoral system.

The shift to electronic voting has also influ-

nced the conduct of some observation missions. In Somaliland, electoral observation will in future include examinations of the iris recognition technology. This changes the expertise needed to observe elections.

This approach is in sharp contrast with the 2017

Kenya elections. There, international observers used traditional monitoring methods - and validated an election that was later annulled by the country's Supreme Court. It was a case where electoral institutions had not caught up with technology.

WIDER ISSUES

This raises some wider issues that need to be addressed so that they don't get in the way of this progression. The first is to emphasise that the technology, in most cases, will enhance and upgrade political in-

frastructure – even if they appear to bypass or replace it. For example, there are concerns that drones, used to transport medical supplies in places like Rwanda and Tanzania, divert financial resources from multi-purpose infrastructure like roads. In fact, the use of drones in medical supplies expands infra-structure options. They allow countries to align delivery means with specific needs, in a timely and efficient man

Secondly, technological and service leapfrogging usually go together. This has been demonstrated in Africa's mobile revolution. The widespread adoption of the Mpesa money transfer system best illustrates this point, as it is about changes in consumer be haviour and local manufacturing.

Finally, there are ample opportunities for international joint ventures in technological leap-frogging across Africa. Many of them however are being smothered by taxation and regulations. This is partly because of the pressure to generate state revenue and partially due to a lack of understanding.

With more products and processes to trade with, the world stands to benefit from Africa's increased participation in the global technology market. And it is encouraging to see that this is a movement which has the political support of African presidents; a support reflected in the adoption of the Science, Technology and Innovation in Africa Strategy (STISA-2024) by the African Union.



Elaborating on 'Goodbye Kathmandu', Subba said the film talks about relations between Nepal and India, and "subtly" traces the political situation post the year 2000.

tion post the year 2000.
"It is a multi-layered film having three protagonists, each telling different stories. And three characters belonging to different age groups, who don't meet each other.

It took me years to wrap up the project for certain reasons," he said.

The film, which was also screened at the Busan Film Festival this year, makes mention of the insurgency issue in Nepal.

"It is about three young men living in Kathmandu, who are caught in the civil war of 2004... All these three persons are united in a way," Subba said and added he would love to call it an

independent genre film.
To a question, the former journalist said there are around 125 ethnic groups in Nepal, and the country has many similarities with India.

Our pacers will relish bowling here, says Sridhar

KOLKATA, Nov 17 (PTT): India fielding coach R Sridhar feels Mohammed Shami and Bhuvneshwar Kumar will relish the challenge of bowling on the green top here as much as the Sri Lankan pacers have in the rain-hit opening Test where the home team is currently in a spot of bother.

After Suranga Lakmal's (3/5) exploits on the first day of the rain-affected series opener, it was Dasun Shanaka's (2/23) turn to steal the limelight on Friday as he struck twice to leave India reeling at 74/5 in 32.5 overs.

"It was fabulous to see so much of lateral movement and swing Lakmal and his fellow bowlers were purchasing from this wicket. Hopefully Shami and 'Sultan of swing' Bhuvi (Bhuvneshwar Kumar) would relish the challenge," Sridhar told reporters here.

With rain playing spoilsport again, only 21 overs of play was possible on the second day. On day one, only 11.5 overs were bowled before umpires decided to call off the day's play.

The rain is caused by a depression that is likely to clear out on Saturday and Sridhar said a result was very much on the cards if they have three full days.

"This Test can definitely get a result in 270 overs, should we get that. If the weather clears out, it would be really interesting going by the conditions of this Test," he said.



"Days like these really bring the team together where you spend a lot of time in the dressing room with each other with team in a bit of an adverse position. I always feel these kind of days are wonderful for the team."

Cheteshwar Pujara stood tall amid the ruins with an unbeaten 47 from 102 balls and Sridhar said the mantra for the India batsman was to narrow down the 'V' region to minimise the chance of being caught.

"The thing that really stood out was most of his drives were to the right of midoff. He had a very narrow V. It was a simple mantra and he was successful. It's one of the best 47 runs from Pujara in last two-three years," he said.

"He is a batsman who has a grip of every condition when he goes to bat. With moving ball the gameplan was pretty simple -- play as close to your body, play straight."

Stressing on the importance of slip catching, Sridhar said it would play a crucial role as they have a packed overseas calendar next year. "As a team looking ahead to 15-20 months we are playing more away matches, our slip catching is going to be one of the areas that can contribute to the results which we want to achieve in our away Tests," he said.

Sridhar said slip catching is more difficult in sub- continent than abroad.

"It's always a challenge in the subcontinent because of the two-paced nature of the wickets. In England the ball wobbles. We have certain practice methods. We have prepared our best."

US Congress passes USD 700 billion defence bill

WASHINGTON, Nov 17 (PTI): The United States Congress today passed a nearly USD 700 billion American defence budget for 2018, which, among other things, seeks advancement in defence cooperation with India.

The 2018 National Defence Authorisation Act (NDAA) sailed through both the chambers of the Congress House of Representatives and the Senate by a voice vote.

It now heads to the White House for President Donald Trump to sign it into law, which he is expected to do before the Thanksgiving holidays.

The budget also imposes tougher conditions on Pakistan for military and security assistance and accommodates last minute additional White House's financial request implementing its new South Asia strategy.

The NDAA-2018 asks

The NDAA-2018 asks the Secretary of State and the Defence Secretary to come out with a common definition that recognises India's status as a "Maior Defence Partner".

Welcoming the move, top Republican Senator Ted Cruz said few partnerships in the 21st century carried more strategic significance than the US-India partnership.

During the legislative process, Cruz secured an amendment that calls on the Department of Defence to reassess its approach to partnering with India and to appoint an individual to oversee this process.

Additionally, Cruz co-sponsored Senator Mark Warner s amendment, which was adopted, to develop a strategy of defence cooperation between the US and India.

The NDAA-2018 also asks the Pentagon to develop a "forward-looking" strategy for defence ties with India "that would build upon current objectives and goals, underlining a mutual desire to develop an enduring defence relationship with India".

According to it, the two countries "should work closely with Afghanistan" to promote stability in the region to include targeted infrastructure development and economic investment, means to address capability gaps in country, and improved humanitarian and disaster relief assistance.

The United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) in three successive resolutions has urged for independent international investigation into alleged abuses blamed on both sides

Judge Ilancheliyan also urged the Jaffna security officials to crack down on the gangs who wield swords and intimidate the locals in the wake of the reported rise in such attacks recently.

HARARE, Nov 17 (AP): Zimbabwe-an President Robert Mugabe's first public appearance since a military takeover is at a university gradua-tion ceremony on the outskirts of

Clad in academic gown and hat, Mugabe walked slowly in a procession on a red carpet to a podium as a marching band played.
Several thousand graduates of

the Zimbabwe Open University and guests stood as Mugabe and other dignitaries entered a tent set up for the event.

Once on the podium, Mugabe joined the crowd in singing Zimbabwe's national anthem. He announced the opening of the graduation ceremony, and the crowd applauded.

Mugabe's presidential security detail was present.

Mugabe is making his first public appearance since the military put him under house arrest earlier this week, attending a graduation cere-



mony in the capital, Harare.

The appearance comes during an traordinary series of negotiations with regional leaders over Mugabe's departure after 37 years in power.

The military is taking pains to ow respect for the 93- year-old leader, the world's oldest head of

state, by referring to him as the president and the commander-in-chief.

Mugabe to project the image of lead-

ership, even as calls for his depar-

ture grow stronger.

Zimbabwe's military says it is continuing talks with President Rob-ert Mugabe for his departure while it pursues those who were close to the leader and his wife.

Zimbabwe state media reported this morning a military statement saying talks with Mugabe "on the way forward" are ongoing.

The Zimbabwe Defence Forces said "significant progress has been made in their operation to weed out criminals around President Mugabe," adding that they had arrested some although others were still at

The statement said Zimbabwe's military is "currently engaging with the Commander-in-Chief President Robert Mugabe on the way forward and will advise the nation of the outcome as soon as possible." Several news sources have said that Chinese authorities denied the 33-yearold pop diva's visa after outrage over her wearing the Taiwanese flag during a 2015 concert at Taipei Arena.

The communist country was further angered over her wearing a sunflower gown - symbolic of the Sunflower Student Movement, which protested a Chinese trade agreement in 2014.

'For every artist who wants to perform in China, officials comb through their social media and press reports to see if they have done anything

deemed to be offensive to the country. Maroon 5 was banned a few years ago because one band member wished the Dalai Lama happy birthday on Twitter'

Back in 2010, the 13-time Grammy nominee performed four songs on the runway during the lingerie extravaganza, which took place at Manhattan's Lexington Avenue Armory. Former 1D boybander Harry Styles

Former 1D boybander Harry Styles is now rumored to replace Perry due to an official-looking flier leaked online, which reveals he'll sing his single Kiwi. Grammy-winning singer Miguel is also rumored to be a musical guest at the San Francisco bra brand's bash, which airs November 28.

Katy's banned news came hours af-
